# TOP 10 The Greek Islands' Highlights

Comprising over 6,000 islands and islets, spread across several archipelagos, the Greek Islands offer a fabulous choice of holiday destinations. Some host bustling holiday resorts, while others consist solely of rural communities, and ancient temples sit alongside cosmopolitan towns. Add beaches, pine forests, olive groves and coastlines indented with spectacular coves and bays, and the result is a collection of islands just begging to be explored.



## 1 Corfu Old Town

The arcaded terraces of the Listón, the ancient fortresses of Palaió Frouíro and Néo Frouíro, and Plateía Spianáda, with its Venetian architecture, all combine to give Corfu Old Town its infinite charm. Museums include the Antivouniótissa Museum (see pp8–9).



## 2 Rhodes Old Town

This city was occupied by the Knights Hospitallers (1309–1522) who left such magnificent treasures as the Palace of the Grand Masters and the Street of the Knights (see pp10–11).



## 3 Monastery of St John, Pátmos

Dedicated to St John, who reputedly wrote the *Book of Revelation* nearby, this 11th-century monastery is a UNESCO site (see pp12–13).



## 4 Delos

According to Greek mythology, this tiny uninhabited island was the birthplace of Apollo and Artemis, and an important place of worship. It has remains of civilizations dating from the 3rd century BC (see pp14–15).

## 5 Néa Moní, Híos

Containing one of Greece's finest collections of mosaics, this 11th-century monastery was built by Emperor Constantine IX Monomachos (see pp16–17).






### 6 Pythagóreio and Heraion, Sámos

The remains of Pythagóreio, an ancient Greek and Roman fortified port, and Heraion, a Neolithic temple, have put Sámos on the heritage map (see pp18–19).




### 7 Phaestos Palace, Crete

The remains of this palace, one of the two from the Minoan period, were found at what is one of Crete's most important archaeological sites (see pp20–21).



### 8 Palace of Knossos, Crete

The largest Bronze Age archaeological site on Crete, the remains of the Minoan Palace of Knossos gives an incomparable insight into this ancient civilization (see pp22–5).



**10** **Évia** This long narrow and largely mountainous island lies off the coast of mainland Greece. Évia has been ruled in turn by the Macedonians,

Romans, Venetians and Ottoman Turks. Their influence gives the island its inimitable character and distinct architecture (see pp28–9).



### 9 Temple of Aphaia, Égina

A well-preserved Doric temple dedicated to Aphaia, the ancient Greek goddess of fertility, this structure dates from around 480 BC. It stands on a hilltop covered with pine trees on the island of Égina (see pp26–7).

## TOP 10 Corfu Old Town

With its cobbled plazas and tiny alleyways dating back to ancient times, Corfu Old Town continues to retain its old-world charm. Palaces, museums, fortresses, gourmet restaurants, traditional tavernas, cultural venues and a lively harbour combine to give the town its inimitable character. It has beautiful arcades reminiscent of the finest in Paris along with elegant Venetian mansions, which line the town's main thoroughfare, the Kapodistrou. Add Greek, Italian and British influences and you have an eclectic architectural anthology.

**1 Palaió Frouíro**  
A landmark of the capital, the Old Fortress was built in the 16th century on a tiny islet to protect the city from invaders. Its interiors have been restored and it has become a popular venue for cultural events. At its base stands St George's Church.



**3 Plateía Spianáda**  
One of the largest squares in Greece, the Plateía Spianáda (right) is always bustling. Its Venetian and French architecture give it an elegant feel. The labyrinth of alleyways off the square, Campiello, is one of the town's oldest parts.



**2 Néo Frouíro**  
The Venetians built this mighty fort (left) in the 1500s to strengthen the town's defences. Despite its name, the New Fortress was completed only a few years after the Old Fortress. With a maze of tiny medieval walkways to explore, the former naval garrison is now open to the public.





#### 4 The Listón

The Listón was built by the French in the early 1800s, inspired by the grandiose buildings along the Rue de Rivoli in Paris. Its arcaded terraces were once used solely by the town's aristocrats, but are now full of stylish cafés where locals and visitors chill out.



#### 5 Maitland Rotunda

Built to commemorate the life of Sir Thomas Maitland, the first Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands during the British administration, this 19th-century monument (*above*) dominates the southern end of Plateia Spianáda.

#### 6 Church of Ágios Spyridon

Named after Corfu's patron saint, St Spyridon, whose remains lie here in a lavish silver coffin, this 16th-century church is an Old Town landmark. It has a distinct red-topped campanile with bells that ring out at regular intervals.

#### 7 Palace of St Michael and St George

Dating from the British period, this imposing Georgian-style palace has been the home of the Greek royal family, the British High Commission and the island's treasury. It now houses the Museum of Asiatic Art.



#### 8 Dimarchío

The Dimarchío, or Town Hall, is a classic Venetian-style building that was once the San Giacomo theatre, a favourite haunt of the island's nobility.



#### 10 Antivouniótissa Museum

With its Byzantine and post-Byzantine icons and ecclesiastical artifacts collection, this museum (*above*) is located in the Church of Panagía (Our Lady) Antivouniótissa, one of the city's oldest religious buildings.

#### 9 The Old Port

While cruise ships tend to head for the New Port these days, in ancient times the Old Port (*below*) would have been a hive of nautical activity. It is located between the fortresses and is in one of the most picturesque parts of the Old Town.



#### The Mános Collection

One of the key exhibits at the Museum of Asiatic Art in Corfu Old Town is the Mános Collection, which comprises about 11,000 items. Corfiot diplomat Grigórios Mános (1850–1929) had a passion for Japanese, Chinese and Korean art, furnishings, ceramics and weapons. He amassed a fabulous private collection and donated it to the government to establish a museum in Corfu. Mános was alive to see the opening of the museum in 1927.



## TOP 10 Rhodes Old Town

*This medieval citadel at the heart of Rhodes Town, the capital of Rhodes island, is a "living museum" showcasing the ancient and the medieval areas of the city. The Knights Hospitallers occupied the city from 1309 and transformed it into a formidable stronghold, but in 1522 Suleiman the Magnificent, Sultan of the Ottoman Empire, conquered the Knights. The walled city boasts outstanding buildings from both periods, including the Palace of the Grand Masters, Street of the Knights, mosques and hammams.*

### 1 Palace of the Grand Masters

Located in the citadel in the Collachium area, this is a replica of the original Knights' palace destroyed in 1856. The Italians rebuilt it and it is a museum now (above).

### 2 Hóra

The citadel is divided into two main areas, the Collachium and the larger Hóra (Bourg), home to some of the city's busiest streets. Street cafés vie for attention with markets full of stalls.



### 3 Street of the Knights

A cobble street (below) with arched bridges and lined with the Inns of the Tongues, this famous site dates from the 14th century. Although remodelled, it is recognised as one of the world's finest examples of Gothic urbanism.






**4 Medieval City Walls**  
The Knights built the walls (above) on Byzantine fortifications to completely encircle and thus protect their city. The 4-km- (6-mile-) long walls contain a labyrinth of tiny alleyways.



**5 Archaeological Museum, Rhodes**  
Known for its amphorae collection and artifacts (left), this museum is housed in the Hospital of the Knights. Its infirmary is the main exhibition hall.

**6 Jewish Quarter**  
This area dates from the 1st century AD. The Plateia Martýron Evraïon (left) has a very moving monument to the Rhodian Jews who died in WWII concentration camps.



**7 Mosque of Suleiman the Magnificent**  
Erected as a triumphal mosque by Suleiman in 1522, the present structure (above) was built in 1808 using materials from the original.



**9 Church of Panagía tou Kástrou**  
The Virgin of the Castle was once a Byzantine cathedral and the most important ecclesiastical building in Rhodes. Built in the 11th century, it conforms to a domed, cross-in-square architectural style and has a richly carved interior.

**8 Marine Gate**  
Dominating the Plateia Ippokrátous, Pýli Agías Aikaterínis, known as Marine Gate, is a mighty bastion of two towers and is the most magnificent of all the gates leading to the inner Old Town. It is located beside the Commercial Harbour.

**Decorative Arts Museum 10**  
Housed in the former Knights' arsenal, this museum has a super collection of artifacts from the Dodecanese, including traditional costumes and embroideries (right), carved wood and ceramics, some dating from the 17th century.



Rhodes Old Town was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1988.



# TOP 10 Monastery of St John, Pátmos

The island of Pátmos is reputedly where St John wrote the Book of Revelation, or the Book of the Apocalypse, in AD 95. This book is the last of the New Testament. He is said to have lived the life of a hermit in a cave in ancient Hóra, where he received apocalyptic visions from Jesus Christ that compelled him to write the work. The Holy Cave of the Apocalypse lies close to the monastic complex of the Monastery of St John, built in 1088 in the saint's honour. Hóra, the cave and monastery are a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

**1 Hóra**  
This ancient settlement has over 40 monasteries and chapels and is one of the few places where early-Christian ceremonies are still practised. The town is famous for its Byzantine architecture, including *man-tómata* – window mouldings with a decorative cross.

**2 Monastery of St John**  
An imposing 11th-century fortification dominating the skyline above Hóra (*below*), this monastery is one of the most sacred Christian sites in the world. Fabulous icons and treasures are on display.



**3 The Walls**  
The fortified walls of the monastery were built because of the threat of invasions. In some places they are said to be very deep and contain fragments of the ancient Temple of Artemis that stood on the site and was destroyed in the 11th century.



St John is said to have been one of the 12 apostles of Jesus Christ.



#### 4 Chapel of the Holy Cross

Many small chapels were built in the monastery because law dictated that prayer could be heard in a chapel only once a day. Among them are the chapels of the Holy Cross (*above*), Holy Apostles and John the Baptist.

#### 5 Icon of St John

The most sacred treasure is the Icon of St John, housed in the inner narthex of the monastery. Dating from the 12th century, it shows the saint holding his work.



#### 6 Hospitality of Abraham

A fabulous work of art, this 12th-century fresco (*above*) from the Chapel of Panagia depicts three angels receiving hospitality from the patriarch Abraham. It was painted over once and was only discovered after an earthquake in 1956.

#### 7 The Chapel of Christodóulou

Ioánnis Christódoulos, the Blessed, was the monk who had the St John Monastery built. It took three years to complete. This chapel is dedicated to him and houses his remains in a marble sarcophagus.



#### 8 The Treasury

Thousands of manuscripts, parchment documents, books, ecclesiastical art, gems and a fabulous silverware collection (*below*) are exhibited for the public.



#### 10 Chrysobull

The Chrysobull is the Treasury's star exhibit. A parchment scroll, it is a deed sealed in gold by the Byzantine Emperor Aléxios Komnínos, commissioning Ioánnis Christódoulos to found the monastery in 1088.

#### 9 Cave of the Apocalypse

The cave (*below*) contains a rock where *Revelation* was written, and a crack in the wall through which St John heard a voice and saw a vision. He lived here in exile during the reign of Roman Emperor Domitian (AD 51–96).



#### Book of Revelation

One of the most important books of the *New Testament*, the *Book of Revelation* says that there were seven early-Christian communities in Asia Minor that received a letter from St John following his vision. It is believed St John was from Ephesus in modern day Turkey. He is known by a number of names, including John of Pátmos, John the Divine, John the Apostle and Saint John the Theologian, although a modern theory says that these were different people.



UNESCO awarded Hóra, the Monastery of St John and the Cave of the Apocalypse World Heritage status in 1999.

# TOP 10 Delos

The island of Delos, home to civilizations as far back as 2500 BC, is one of the world's most important archaeological sites. As the mythological birthplace of the sun god, Apollo, and his twin, Artemis, the goddess of the moon and the hunt, it was the most sacred place of worship in ancient Greece. The old port, with its magnificent sanctuary, amphitheatre and dwellings, can be explored.

**1 Sanctuary of Apollo**  
With its three temples, Pórinos Naós (6th century BC), the Great Temple of Apollo (477 BC) and the later Temple of Athenians, this sanctuary would have been at the heart of Delos culture.



**3 Sacred Lake**  
According to legend, this lake (*above*) was where Apollo and Artemis were born to Leto. Though dry now, a wall denotes its boundaries.

**4 Temple of Delians**  
The classic Doric-style Temple of the Delians (*below*) is one of the many excavated along with the Roman-era Temple of Isis and the 5th-century Temple of Hera.



**2 Theatre Quarter**  
The remains of lavish homes, many with colonnaded courtyards, suggest that the Theatre Quarter was a small but exclusive residential area. Its key feature is a spectacular amphitheatre (*main image*) which was designed to hold over 5,000 spectators.




## 5 Terrace of the Lions

This row of lions (*above*) is one of the iconic images of Delos. Dating from the 7th century BC and carved of Naxian marble, they overlook the Sacred Lake. Now replaced by replicas, the original statues are housed in the Delos Archaeological Museum.



## 6 Agorá of the Competaliasts

The remains of shops and potholes for awnings (*above*) can be seen in the Hellenistic-era marketplace near the Sacred Harbour. The stone-paved ground is heavily worn.



## 7 Hall of the Poseidoniasts

The cultic hall (*above*) housed meeting rooms and shops belonging to merchants from Beirut, who worshipped Baal, known as Poseidon, here.



## 9 House of Dolphins

With its floor mosaic of dolphins at play (*above*), this house to the amphitheatre's north, is very well preserved. Dating from the 2nd century BC, it gives an insight into the fashion of the day.

## 8 Maritime Quarter

Revolving around the Sacred Harbour, the Maritime Quarter was the main residential area of Delos. Among the ruins are floor mosaics of the mansions built by wealthy merchants.

## 10 Sanctuary of Dionysos

Dedicated to Dionysos, god of wine and ecstasy, and Zeus's son, this sanctuary (*right*) was used for ritual worship and is known for its 2,300-year-old phallic monuments.





# TOP 10 Néa Moní, Híos

Considered one of the finest examples of architecture from the Macedonian Renaissance, this UNESCO World Heritage Site is famous for its golden mosaics. Located just west of Híos town, the 11th-century Néa Moní, meaning New Monastery, was built by Byzantine Emperor Constantine IX Monomachos and Empress Zoe (r.1042–1050). According to legend, three monks found a miraculous icon of the Virgin Mary here. It became an influential and wealthy monastery but its decline began when the Ottomans plundered Híos in 1822.

**5** Néa Moní is undergoing an extensive restoration programme and some areas of the complex may be closed to visitors.

**6** The monastery is surrounded by small villages that have tavernas and coffee shops for refreshment.

**1** **The Narthex**  
The esonarthex (inner narthex) and the exonarthex (outer narthex) entrances (above) feature some of the monastery's most prized mosaics. There is also a marble inlaid floor, which was a sign of wealth in Byzantine times.

**3** **Cistern**  
A key part of the monastery's infrastructure, the cistern, or *kinsterna*, is a well-preserved underground complex of marble columns, arches and vaults, designed to collect and hold rain water. This water was supplied to the monks.



**2** **St Luke's Chapel**  
This small chapel, (below) dedicated to St Luke, the early-Christian author of the *Gospel of Luke*, is near the monks' cemetery, just outside the monastery's boundary wall. Its architecture is typical of the 11th-century ecclesiastical style.





#### 4 Mosaics

Worked in marble on a gold background, the mosaics depict biblical scenes and figures. The works include the famous *Anástasis* (Resurrection), showing Christ's rescue of Adam and Eve from Hell (*above*).

#### 5 Skull Cabinet

A macabre sight, this cabinet contains skulls and bones of the islanders massacred by the Ottomans in 1822. The dead included 600 monks from Néa Moní.

#### 6 The Belfry

The original majestic belfry was built in the early 16th century. It collapsed during the 1881 earthquake and was rebuilt in 1900.



#### 7 Monks' Cells

The Venetian-period cells (*above*), known as Keliá, are where the monks would have slept. Though most are in a ruined state, one has been renovated and houses a small museum.

#### 8 Trapeza

The dining hall, or refectory, is where the monks would have met for meals. A once-massive structure, it was damaged in 1822 by the Ottomans and again by the 1881 earthquake. Its remains can be visited.

#### 9 The Catholicon


The Catholicon, or Katholikón, is the main part of the church between the esonarthex and exonarthex. Dedicated to the Virgin Mary, it is a rare early example of insular octagonal architecture and is dominated by its dome.

#### Macedonian Renaissance Art

The Macedonian Renaissance, a period of Byzantine art, began in the late 9th century and continued till the mid-11th century. During this time, cross-in-square and octagonal churches with fabulous frescoes, icons and mosaics were commissioned. The use of marble and ivory, often on gold and black backgrounds, became fashionable. Finest examples from the period are Ósios Loukás Moní and Dafní Moní on the Greek mainland, which share UNESCO status with Néa Moní.

#### Churches

The monastery **10** has two small churches. One is dedicated to the Holy Cross (*right*). The other, Pandeimon, is named after the saint who, according to legend, became a martyr during the Roman persecution of Christians in AD 303.



## TOP 10 Pythagóreo and Heraion, Sámos

Pythagóreo, named after the ancient philosopher Pythagóras, and the Sanctuary of Heraion are two treasures of Sámos. Pythagóreo, now a bustling holiday resort, was an important port in antiquity, its fortifications acting as a stronghold against invasion. Remains of the town's citadel, along with Roman baths, the harbour and an extravagant aqueduct, Tunnel of Efpálinos, can be seen. Nearby, Heraion is a sanctuary where Hera, the Greek goddess of fertility, was cult worshipped. Its architecture is among the finest from the period.



Wild flowers in Pythagóreo, Sámos


**6** Only a few trees provide any shade at the Sanctuary of Heraion and some of the other remains around Pythagóreo, so be sure to wear a hat and carry water if visiting in the hot summer months.

**6** When visiting the ancient site at Pythagóreo and the nearby Sanctuary of Heraion, visitors can stop for refreshments at Pythagóreo's many tavernas and restaurants.

**1** **Tunnel of Efpálinos**  
Built in the 6th century by ruler Polykrates to provide his people with water, this aqueduct (*above*) is an engineering marvel. It is notable as being one of the first to be excavated from both ends.



**2** **Statue of Pythagóras**  
Standing on the harbourside at Pythagóreo, this 3-m- (9-ft-) tall statue celebrates the life of Pythagóras the Samian, who was born on the island in 570 BC. The town is named after him.

**3** **Castle of Lykoúrgos Logothétis**  
This castle (*left*) and tower was built by a local hero, Lykoúrgos Logothétis, three years after his heroic part in the War of Independence of 1821. It is believed to stand on the site of the ancient acropolis.





#### 4 Ancient Port

Sámos was a major naval and mercantile power in the 6th century BC. Its port (*above*) was once bustling with ships and merchants, through which produce, materials and grain were traded. It brought great wealth to the island.

#### 5 Ancient Harbour

Pythagóreo's harbour is considered to be the oldest man-made maritime installation in the Mediterranean Sea. Dating from the 6th century BC, it is now silted up and can be crossed by a causeway.



#### 6 Ancient Fortification

The city walls (*above*) of Pythagóreo, known as Polykrates Wall, date from the 6th century BC and surround the ancient town and its harbour. They run from the Lykoúrgos Logothétis tower to the Tunnel of Efpálinos.


#### 7 Sanctuary of Heraion

Within the grounds of this sanctuary, dedicated to Hera, are the archaeological remains of an early-Christian basilica and the Temple of Hera. There are statues (*main image*) on the Sacred Way path leading to the temple.



#### 8 Temple of Hera

A single column (*left*) is all that remains of the temple, but evidence indicates that it was once among the largest in antiquity. The goddess Hera is said to have been born, raised and worshipped here.



#### 9 Greek and Roman Remains

A wealth of Roman remains lie around Pythagóreo, including an amphitheatre and an acropolis located in the castle grounds (*below*).



#### 10 Treasures from Pythagóreo and Heraion

Many Pythagóreo and Heraion treasures, including Kouros, a 5-m- (16-ft-) tall marble statue dedicated to Apollo and dating to 580 BC, are displayed in the museum in Vathy.

#### Pythagóras

Pythagóras was a 5th-century BC Greek philosopher, mathematician and scientist, known for his theorem of the geometry of triangles. He is also credited with Pythagórean tuning, a system whereby musical instruments are tuned to intervals on a 3:2 ratio. According to legend, he was the son of Apollo. He was also the founder of an ancient religious movement, Pythagóreanism.



Pythagóreo is sometimes spelt as Pythagóreion or Pythagório.

## TOP 10 Phaestos Palace, Crete

Phaestos, one of the great cities of ancient Greece, is believed to have been founded by the mythological King Minos of Crete. Overlooking Crete's Messára Plain, this remarkable archaeological site was discovered in the 1880s. Comprising the remains of a palace built in the late Bronze Age, this well-preserved site provides a fascinating insight into Minoan life. Another palace occupied the site before being destroyed in an earthquake, and fragments of it remain.



**1 Main Hall**  
This hall (above), with 10 storage rooms, is where artifacts such as clay seals from the Protopalatial period were discovered.


**2 Grand Staircase**  
This immense flight of stone steps leading to the propylon (porch) was the main entrance to both the new and the old palaces, and linked the lower and upper levels of the west courtyard.

**3 West Courtyard**  
Dating from around 1900 BC, this courtyard (below) was used for plays, religious rituals and ceremonies. To the north are eight rows of stone seats once used by spectators.



**4 Church of St George of Falándra**  
This small 16th-century church, to the west of the palace, has served the local community since Venetian rule. It has an elaborate façade.





### 5 Archives Room

Best known for being where the Phaestos Disc (*see box*) was discovered in 1903, the archives room consisted of chambers constructed of sun-dried bricks made from mud, clay and sand. Valuables would have been kept here.



### 6 Central Courtyard

This monumental paved courtyard (*left*), once flanked on two sides by covered walkways, may have been a parade ground. Recesses in the walls by the main entrance are believed to have been sentry boxes.



### 7 The Peristyle Hall

This hall comprised a covered walkway and private courtyard (*above*), which would have led to the Royal Apartments. The courtyard probably contained a small garden.

### 8 Northeast Quarter

This quarter housed the artisans' workshops where crafts included weaving and the making of clay pots. In the courtyard the remains of a furnace used for smelting metal can still be seen.

### Royal Apartments 9

Comprising the King's and the Queen's Megarons (chambers), these rooms (*right*) would have been highly ornate. The floors were alabaster-lined. One of the finest lustral basins on Crete was found here.



### 10 First Palace

The original palace was built during the Protopalatial period but was damaged by earthquakes and rebuilt many times. The oldest palatial ruin on Crete, it lies to the site's southeast (*left*).

### The Phaestos Disc

This 17th-century BC clay disk, 16 cm (6 inches) in diameter, has the finest example of Minoan script ever discovered. It is now in the Irákleio Archaeological Museum (*see p97*). The inscription uses 45 pictorial words, thought to be religious text. Spiralling from the outer edge to the centre, the signs, stamped on clay, are the earliest known form of typography.



## TOP 10 Palace of Knossos, Crete

Knossos, inhabited since Neolithic times, became a powerful commercial and political centre when the legendary King Minos built his palace here in around 1900 BC. The first palace was destroyed in around 1700 BC but this seat of royalty and hub of Minoan life was quickly rebuilt. Discovered in 1878, the second palace comprises a maze of apartments, workrooms and courtyards, many with replica frescoes – originals are in Irákleio Archaeological Museum (see p97) – showing Bronze Age life. Knossos is the world's largest Minoan site.

### 2 The Royal Apartments

Containing the King's Megaron (chamber), known as the Hall of the Double Axes, and the Queen's Megaron decorated with the famous dolphin fresco replica (above), the apartments had the rarity of a private bathroom.



### 1 The Palace

Built around a central courtyard, the palace complex (main image) was arranged with four wings that contained the royal apartments, the throne room, chapels, administration rooms and workshops. Private dwellings dot its periphery. It dates back to 2000–1350 BC.


### 3 The Throne Room

This imposing room has a carved stone throne copy (left), believed to be in the image of a priestess. The room was probably used for worship. A griffin fresco guards the throne.





**4 Hall of the Royal Guard**  
 One of several administrative areas, this hall (above), adjacent to the royal quarters, would have been heavily guarded. It is where the King's guardsmen lived and worked. The wall frescoes here depict shields.



**5 Corridor of the Procession**  
 This corridor is the main entrance to the site. It has a copy of the original *Procession* fresco, with over 500 figures.



**6 Horn of Consecration**  
 Standing about 3 m (9 ft) tall, this restored ancient stone symbol (above) is said to represent the horns of a bull, considered sacred in Minoan times.

**7 Private Houses**  
 Among the remains of dwellings are the Royal Villa, which is religious in design and probably the home of a priest, and the Villa of Dionysus, where he was cult worshipped.

**8 Workshops**  
 The remains of workshops used for food preparation and crafts, such as pottery, are mainly in the east wing. Excavations revealed many *pithoi* (jars), which were used for storage (right).



**9 Royal Road**  
 Said to be the oldest paved road in Europe, the Royal Road heads towards the northwest of the site to the town of Knossos. The theatre and the Little Palace, a smaller version of the main building, are located just off the road.

**Priest-King Fresco 10**  
 This replica (right) of the original brightly coloured fresco of the *Priest-King* wearing a crown of lilies and feathers, is a detail segment from the *Procession* fresco. It is also known as the fresco of the *Prince of Lilies*.



**Sir Arthur Evans**  
 Credited with unearthing the Palace of Knossos, deciphering ancient Cretan script and giving the Minoan civilization its name, Sir Arthur Evans (1851–1941) was a rich British archaeologist with a passion for Crete. In 1878, Cretan Minos Kalokairinós had found Knossos but the ruling Ottoman Turks thwarted his excavation. Sir Evans purchased the site in 1898 and mounted the excavation.

## TOP 10 Treasures from Knossos

**1 Snake Goddess**  
A ceramic female figure just over 34 cm (13 inches) tall and decorated with a fine tin glaze, this faïence statuette is considered one of the finest examples of Minoan art. It was discovered in 1903.

**2 La Parisienne Fresco**  
This fresco of a young girl with large eyes, ruby red lips and long dark curls was christened *La Parisienne* by Sir Arthur Evans because of its beauty. Dating from around 1450 BC, it is one of the oldest examples of Minoan art.

**3 Blue Bird Fresco**  
A work of vivid colour, this fresco shows a bird on a rock surrounded by flowers. Dating from the late Bronze Age, it is one of the earliest paintings found in the House of Frescoes at Knossos.

**4 Bull Leaper Fresco**  
Dating from around 1550 BC, this wall painting depicts bull-leaping, an athletic event held during Minoan times. It shows three figures representing each stage of the feat. An abstract border in shades of blue and red surrounds the picture.

**5 Bull's Head Rhyton**  
This black steatite jug, used for drinking or pouring, was known as a rhyton. It was fashioned into the head of a bull, the most sacred animal in Minoan culture, and has eyes of rock crystal and eyelashes of jasper.

**6 Dolphin Fresco**  
Depicting several lavishly coloured blue-grey dolphins swimming with various other sea creatures, this celebrated late-Bronze Age fresco would probably have decorated the Queen's Megaron.

**7 The Bull-Leaping Figurine**  
Considered one of the earliest examples of chryselephantine art, in which ivory figures are "clothed" in garments of gold

## Minoan Art

While little Minoan art remains from the Prepalatial period (3500–1900 BC) other than fragments of pottery, there are magnificent examples from the Protopalatial period (1900–1700 BC) and the Neopalatial period (1700–1425 BC), when Cretans are said to have been encouraged to express themselves creatively. Wall frescoes were painted in vivid colours, with figures and animals depicted in great anatomical detail and showing a natural “movement”. The *La Parisienne* and the *Bull Leaper* frescoes are prime examples. Similar detailing was fashioned into gold and silver jewellery, chryselephantine ivory, gold-leaf figures and faïence objects moulded from clay for making seals. Development of a primitive form of potter’s wheel meant potters could produce both practical and decorative pottery. The *Kamares* style of symmetrical, rounded vases and rhyton jugs with thin walls was typical of the period. Minoan art often included representations of sacred animals.

leaf, this figurine is in a leaping position. Dating back to 1550 BC, it is famous for its detail.

### 8 Priest-King Fresco

This fresco, dating from about 1550 BC, portrays the *Prince of Lilies*, believed to have been the Priest-King. The brightly coloured painting shows a figure with a peacock feather headdress.

### 9 Isopata Ring

Discovered in a grave, the Isopata gold signet ring, dating from 1600 to 1400 BC, shows

four female figures wearing elaborate costumes and dancing among flowers. Well-preserved, it is famous for its remarkable detailing.

### 10 Faïence Plaque Collection

A collection of ceramic plaques, which includes the famous wild goat and kid plaque found in the sacred treasury rooms of the palace, show the use of the faïence technique of tin glazing. These plaques are believed to have been used as inlays.

## TOP 10 Temple of Aphaia, Égina

Named after princess Aphaia, who became a Greek goddess of fertility, this magnificent temple is thought to have been built around 480 BC with loot seized from the Persians after their defeat by the Greeks at the Battle of Salamis. It is located on the site of an earlier temple, the remains of which are said to have been used in the temple's construction. Standing majestically on a pine tree-covered hilltop above the Agia Marina resort, this temple is the most important monument in the Sanctuary of Aphaia.



**1 Doric Columns**  
The temple was built according to the hexastyle format of the Doric period, with 12 outer columns along its longer sides and six along its shorter ends as seen in this model (above). They incline to strengthen the building. All the columns were fluted except three.

**3 The Altar**  
Remains of Aphaia's altar were discovered at one side of the temple, near the sanctuary's centre. A paved path with a ramp, possibly lined with statues, would have given access to the temple. Offerings to Aphaia were burnt at the altar.



**2 Sphinx Statues**  
Four marble Sphinx statues would have been positioned at each corner of the temple's roof. With the head and breasts of a woman, body of a lion, a serpent's tail and wings of an eagle, the Sphinx was a popular figure of Greek mythology.

**4 Inner Columns**  
The inner columns (left) enclose the cella (see opposite), and are presented in a two-row, two-storey fashion with the lower columns supporting a platform for the upper columns. The fluted design echoes that of the outer Doric columns.



A 5th-century temple dedicated to the god Apollo lies a short distance from the Temple of Aphaia.



### 5 East Pediment

The 480-BC sculpture of Greek warrior Telamon fighting the Trojan king Laomedon adorned the temple's east pediment. A re-creation sits there now (*above*).

### 6 West Pediment

The re-creation of the west pediment sculpture depicts the mythological hero Ajax (*below*) fighting in the Trojan War. Dating from the Archaic period (800–480 BC), the figure is intricately carved in white marble mined in Páros in the Cyclades.



### 7 Limestone Architraves

Porous local limestone was used to construct the architraves (*below*), which were plain with a narrow band of plain metopes alternating with carved triglyphs above. They would have been covered with stucco and richly painted.



### 8 Prónaos and Opisthódomos

The temple is balanced symmetrically by its portico, *prónaos* (walkways) at its entrance and a small room to its rear, the *opisthódomos*. The cella's façade would have been between these two.



### 9 Figurines

Excavated female fertility figurines and pottery dating from the Bronze Age suggest that the temple has been a site of cult worship for more than 4,000 years. Artifacts can be seen in the Archaeological Museum of Égina.

### 10 Cella

Traditionally a cella, also known as a naos, is an inner chamber housing a cult sculpture of the deity to whom the temple is dedicated (*left*). This cella would have had a statue of Aphaia and offerings would have been laid out in front of it.

### Aphaia

According to legend, the princess Aphaia was saved after she attempted suicide by jumping into fishing nets in the waters off Égina, while fleeing from an unwelcome admirer. She was much loved by the goddess Artemis, who, relieved that she had been saved, made her a goddess and a sanctuary was built in her name. To the people of Égina she is their legend, but Cretans also claim that the story happened on Crete, where she is known as Diktyнна.



# TOP 10 Évvia

This long and narrow island, which is separated from mainland Greece by the Euripus Strait, is the second-largest Greek island. Largely mountainous, Évvia was inhabited in prehistoric times when it was home to two wealthy city-states, Chalcis, on the site of its present capital Halkída, and Erétria. The remains of Erétria can be seen near the modern town of the same name. Évvia has a long commercial history and was known for the Euboian scale of weights and measures used throughout Greece. The island has been inhabited by Sicilians, Macedonians, Venetians and Turks, all of whom left their legacy on its architecture and culture.

Évvia can be reached by boat, rail or road. It has a good network of roads linking its capital, Halkída, with other major towns. The mountain roads can be windy and uneven, so care needs to be taken.

Although largely untouched by tourism, Évvia has a varied selection of eateries. Its tavernas serve traditional food and are a great place to mix with locals.





**1 Halkída**  
Évvia's capital, Halkída has a mix of modern and historic buildings. Its waterfront boasts many tavernas and hotels. Venetian and Turkish influences can be seen in the Kástro quarter.

**3 Límni**  
An attractive town of cobbled streets, a pretty harbour and elegant stone houses that hint at its past wealth, Límni (*below*) was a key maritime port in the 19th century. Today, it is a popular holiday location.




**2 Ancient Erétria**  
Excavations at the site of ancient Erétria began in the late 1890s. Finds, such as a statue of goddess Athena (*left*), pottery and tools dating back to prehistoric times, were unearthed and can now be seen in the Archaeological Museum of Erétria.





**4 Kými** Picturesque, with Neo-Classical mansions overlooking the sea, Kými was a wealthy village during the 19th century due to its thriving maritime industry. Today, it is a place to see traditional crafts, such as embroidered household items (*left*), and visit the “health-giving” natural springs.



**5 Loutrá Edipsou** With its warm, sulphurous water, which has attracted the rich for centuries, Loutrá Edipsou is the largest spa town in Greece. Neo-Classical buildings line its harbour, while local fishermen continue to ply their trade in the wide bay (*right*).



**6 Évvia's Mountains** At 1,745 m (5,720 ft), Mount Dírfys is Évvia's highest peak. It is followed by mounts Óchi, Ólympos, Pixariá and Kandili, all of which have dramatic rock formations and landscapes of pine forest and grasslands.

**7 Stení** One of the island's many unspoiled mountain villages, Stení lies on the slopes of Mount Dírfys. Affording cooler temperatures than the coastal villages, it is popular with locals and visitors, especially in summer.



**8 Kárystos** The spectacular slopes of Mount Óchi and the village of Mýli form the backdrop to this scenic fishing port and holiday hotspot. Its Folk Museum, Neo-Classical buildings and Venetian Boúrtzi fortress (*main image*) are worth a visit.

**9 Ochthoniá** A Frankish castle and Venetian watchtowers adorn Ochthoniá's skyline. Its coast has a series of deserted beaches (*above*) that lead to a dramatic wall of cliffs, known as Cape Ochthoniá.

### Geórgios Papanikolaóu

Physician Geórgios Papanikolaóu (1883–1962) was born on Évvia. A pioneer of the study of human cells, cytology, he invented the cervical smear test, or Pap Test, used worldwide in the detection and prevention of cancer of the cervix. His statue stands in the main square in his birthplace, Kými. His image was used on the 10,000 drachma banknote until 2001.

**10 Prokópi** Head for Prokópi, a sleepy village on the slopes of Mount Kandili, for fabulous pine-forest views. The large village has white-washed stone houses (*right*). Pilgrims come here to worship the 18th-century saint, St John the Russian.



Évvia is home to Arvanites – descendants of 15th-century Albanian immigrants – who speak their own dialect, Arvanítika.

The early-Bronze Age civilization that existed in the Cyclades before the advent of the Minoans is thought to be the Greek Islands' earliest civilization. This important period of Mediterranean history is best known for its female icons carved from marble. Its people were believed to be great fishermen.

**Cycladic marble figurine****4 197–146 BC: Roman Invasion**

Subjugation by the Romans started in 197 BC and the Roman period began when Corinth was defeated and Greece became part of the Roman Empire in 146 BC. It was a period of change, and Greece, supported by its isles, became the cultural centre of the Roman Empire. Corinth was rebuilt in 46 BC.

**2 700 BC: Creation of the Dorian Hexapolis**

Along with the Ionians and the Aeolians, the Dorians were a tribe of ancient Greece and are mentioned in the *Odyssey*. They created the Dorian Hexapolis, a coalition of six cities, to serve the people and the gods. These were Camirus, Lindus and Lalyosos on Rhodes, Cnidus and Halicarnassus in Caria, a region of western Anatolia, and Kos.

**3 431–404 BC: Peloponnesian War**

A period of unrest between the residents of Corfu, allies of the Athens empire, and their colonizers, the Corinthians, triggered the Peloponnesian War. It was fought between the Athenian and Spartan empires. Harmony with the signing of the Peace of Nicias treaty in 421 BC was short-lived. The Spartans eventually triumphed at the mighty battle at Aegospotami.

**5 1204–1797: Venetian Occupation**

The Republic of Venice took control of the Ionians from 1204. This was a key period in the history of the islands – it was due to strong Venetian fortifications that they were able to escape occupation during the Ottoman invasion of Greece. As a result, the islands remained Christian.

**6 1309–1522: Knights Hospitallers**

Knights Hospitallers, Order of St John of Jerusalem, invaded many islands in the 14th century, particularly those in the Dodecanese. They brought much wealth and built strongholds to protect their cities. Their architectural legacy is most notable in Rhodes. The Knights were overthrown in Rhodes by the Ottomans in 1522.

**7 Ottoman Rule**

There have been several periods of Ottoman rule in the islands, the most notable being



in the 14th, 16th, 17th and 19th centuries. For example, the Sultan of the Ottoman Empire, Suleiman the Magnificent, captured islands in the Cyclades and Dodecanese in the 1500s, while Crete fell in the 17th century.

### 8 1814–1864: British Protectorate

The Greek Islands came under the protectorate of the British in 1814, and, following the Greek War of Independence waged by revolutionaries from 1821 to 1829, overthrew the last period of rule under the Ottoman Empire. The islands acquired Union with Greece in 1864.

### 9 1941: Axis Occupation

During World War II, the Axis alliance, which included Germany and Italy, took control of Greece and, in 1941, many of the islands were ruled by the Italians. In 1943, the Germans evicted the Italians and immediately exerted their power by sending local Jews to their death.

### 10 1953: Major Earthquake

The most significant event in modern history was the earthquake that hit the Ionian islands in 1953. This major earthquake, measuring 7.1 on the Richter scale, caused massive damage, destroying many towns. Today, all buildings are built to earthquake-proof standards.

## Top 10 Historical Figures

### 1 Hippocrates (460–370 BC)

The ancient Greek physician, known as the “Father of Medicine”, was born on Kos.

### 2 Emperor Aléxios Komnínos (1081–1118)

He ruled during the Byzantine period and was instrumental in building many monasteries.

### 3 Lámbros Katsónis (1752–1804)

An 18th-century naval hero, Katsónis fought the Ottomans with his small fleet.

### 4 Napoleon Bonaparte (1769–1821)

Napoleon, later Emperor Napoleon I, conquered the Venetian Republic in 1797.

### 5 Ioánnis Kapodistrias (1776–1831)

The Greek state's first governor after Ottoman occupation in 1827 was from the Ionians.

### 6 Dionýsios Solomós (1798–1857)

Born in Zákynthos, poet Solomós wrote the Greek national anthem.

### 7 William Gladstone (1809–1898)

Key UK government figure and later Prime Minister who was instrumental in giving the islands to Greece in 1864.

### 8 Empress Elisabeth of Austria (1837–1898)

Empress Elisabeth of Austria built the Achilleion Palace in Corfu during the 1890s.

### 9 Sir Arthur Evans (1851–1941)

Archaeologist who found the Palace of Knossos and identified the Minoan civilization.

### 10 Duke of Edinburgh (b.1921)

Husband of Queen Elizabeth II and the grandson of King George I, he was born in Corfu.

**1 Pórto Katsíki, Lefkáda**  
With its dazzling white sheer cliffs, vivid blue sea and golden sand, this beach is one of the best on the island. It lies in a wide horseshoe-shaped bay and is reached by a series of steps from the parking area, or by boat from nearby Vasilíki (see p61).

**2 Lithí Beach, Híos**  
This huge horseshoe-shaped beach lies just west of Híos Town. It is famous for its natural beauty, its astonishing sunsets and the many fine fish tavernas that vie for attention. ☉ Map K5

**3 Navágio Beach, Zákynthos**  
Also known as Shipwreck Bay because of a freighter that sits partially buried in sand, this white-sand beach lies in a sheltered bay with soaring cliffs enclosing it. World famous, it is quiet except when day-trippers descend to take photographs. It is signposted from Volímes village (see p74).

**4 Yaliskári Beach, Corfu**  
A small, sandy beach with clusters of rock formations and a pine tree forest that descends almost to the water's edge in places, Yaliskári is one of the most secluded beaches along this coastline. It lies in a bay and is a popular picnic and swimming spot with locals. ☉ Map A5

**5 Eliá and Agrári Beaches, Mykonos**  
The long Eliá and Agrári beaches merge almost seamlessly, except for a cluster of rocks, to form the island's longest stretch of sand. Both have soft sand but Eliá, a Blue Flag beach, is more organized with parasols and cafés, while Agrári is quieter and more relaxing. ☉ Map P6

**6 Ágios Geórgios Beach, Santoríni**  
Comprising the Blue Flag award-winning Périssa and neighbouring Perivolos beaches, the long stretch of sand at Ágios Geórgios is touristy, with restaurants, bars, tavernas and outlets for water-skiing, diving, snorkelling, sailing and banana-boat riding. It is nonetheless picturesque, with the black sand and clear waters giving it its identity (see p92).

**7 Falásarna Beach, Crete**  
Widely considered to be one of the finest on Crete, this pretty but often windy beach has golden sand and shallow turquoise waters. It lines one of

the bays of the Gramvoússa peninsula and has a small harbour. Nearby are the ruins of the ancient Falásarna city. *Map D6*

**7 Fínikas Bay, Sýros**  
A natural harbour sheltered from the northern meltemi winds by a rocky backdrop, which is dotted with white-washed houses, this pretty bay is always buzzing with activity from fishing boats and yachts. It is the island's second port after Ermoúpoli. Its narrow beach is sandy and scattered with tamarisk trees (*see p92*).

**9 Psilí Ámmos Beach, Pátmos**  
Meaning "fine sand", the pretty Psilí Ámmos beach lives up to its name with soft, golden sand and secluded dunes. The sea here is shallow and crystal clear. Tucked cosily in a deep cove, the beach is best visited by boat, although it can be reached by a small road followed by a descent down a rocky path (*see p60*).

**10 Banana Beach, Skiáthos**  
One of the beach's two banana-shaped halves is picturesque and sandy. It has umbrellas, sun-loungers, the odd taverna and a few businesses offering watersports. The other half, locally known as Petit Banana, is quiet, secluded and popular with naturists. *Map M1*

## Top 10 Diving Hotspots

**1 Chaniá Bay, Crete**  
Shipwrecks and amphorae are visible in the shallow waters of this bay. *Map D6*

**2 Fiskárdo, Kefalloniá**  
Dive sites are known for their underwater life here, including damselfish that swim in the canyons. *Map G2*

**3 Kalafátis, Mýkonos**  
Shoals of barracuda swim amongst shipwrecks off this beach, including a wreck 20 m (66 ft) in the sea. *Map P6*

**4 Ágios Nikólaos, Crete**  
See ancient remains and study underwater wrecks, caverns and reef off this popular diving spot. *Map F6*

**5 Psalídi, Kos**  
Psalídi is known for its sheer cliffs, caverns full of sponges and shoals of sea bream. *Map Y1*

**6 Laganás Bay, Zákynthos**  
This is the breeding ground of the endangered loggerhead turtle (*caretta caretta*) and also a celebrated party resort and diving spot (*see p74*).

**7 Périσα, Santoríni**  
Underwater rock formations created by the lava from this volcanic island can be seen off Périσα. *Map V3*

**8 Xirókampos, Léros**  
Ancient artifacts are among the things to see along this stretch of coast, home to the 3rd-century Castle of Lepída. *Map F4*

**9 Paleokastrítsa, Corfu**  
Caves and marine life draw divers to Liapádes Reef, off Paleokastrítsa. *Map A5*

**10 Vasilikí, Lefkáda**  
Numerous dive sites can be found off Vasilikí, including those featuring canyons and cave swims. *Map G1*

## TOP 10 Natural Wonders

### 1 Islets of the Greek Islands

Thousands of islets dot the sea around the Greek Islands. Some, such as Néa Kaméni off Santoríni, are uninhabited and volcanic, while others, such as the Diapontian islands off Corfu, have rich vegetation, small communities and great beaches.

### 2 Samariá Gorge, Crete

A stunning creation of nature, the gorge stretches about 16 km (10 miles) from the Omalós plateau to Agía Rouméli to the south. Towering rock walls have been created over millennia by a river, and at a spot called Iron Gates (Sideróportes), they are only 3 m (10 ft) apart. The gorge is a national park (see p97).

### 3 Blue Caves, Zákynthos

A rock formation of arches and caverns, the Blue Caves are foremost among the natural

wonders of Zákynthos. The sea appears bright blue due to the reflection of the sun between the arches, and contrasts sharply with the white cliffs. Take a boat from Cape Skinári lighthouse for the best views (see p74).

### 4 Korissión Lagoon, Corfu

This freshwater lagoon is separated from the sea by a narrow stretch of sand dunes and beaches. Enclosed by a forest, it is a natural habitat for wildlife and many bird species, including sandpipers and egrets. Walking beside the lagoon is a magical experience (see p72).

### 5 Caves of Sámi, Kefalloniá

Melissáni cave and lake is the highlight of an extraordinary network of subterranean waterways and caverns originating at Katavothres, on the other side of the island. It is said to have been the sanctuary of the god Pan and several nymphs, including Melissáni. Nearby is the Drogarátí cave with its famous stalactites and stalagmites (see p70).

### 6 Extinct Volcano Polyvótis, Níssyros

This extinct volcano is one of the main attractions of Níssyros. It is around 260 m (860 ft) in diameter and 30 m (100 ft) deep, and surrounded by a grey landscape of craters. Steps lead down to its core. Its last eruption is said to have been over 5,000 years ago. ☹ Map X3

**7 Myrto Bay, Kefalloniá**  
One of the foremost sights of Kefalloniá, this bay is famous for its dazzling white-pebble beach formed by fragments from the calcite-rich limestone cliffs that surround it, and its vivid turquoise sea. Myrto beach has been voted one of the best in the world (see p70).

**8 Nydri Waterfalls, Lefkáda**  
These waterfalls, located in the Dimosári gorge, are the most spectacular of the many falls on the island. Cascades of water fall into pools of crystal-clear water, which are popular with swimmers (see p69).

**9 Caldera, Santoríni**  
This water-filled cauldron lies off Santoríni and was created in 1450 BC, when a huge volcanic eruption blasted through the once-circular island, creating its current crescent shape. The Néa Kaméni and Palaia Kaméni islands emerged from the water with subsequent volcanic activity, and continue to be volcanic. 🗺 Map U2

**10 Thérmes Hot Springs, Kos**  
These are perhaps the most famous hot springs on the Greek Islands. Thérmes beach is known for its naturally warm pool in the rocks, which is fed by hot springs and is said to have curative powers. 🗺 Map Y2

## Top 10 Trees and Fruits

- 1 Olives**  
Greece is home to the largest variety of olives in the world. The green and black olives found in groves throughout the islands are either eaten or made into oil.
- 2 Figs**  
The deep purple fig can be seen amongst the large leaves of fig trees in summer.
- 3 Vines**  
Vines grow wild or in vineyards, with the green and black grapes used to make wine and liquors.
- 4 Apples**  
Local apples are usually small and sweet, and are used for cooking or served at the end of a meal.
- 5 Pomegranates**  
Pomegranates, which can be seen in late summer, were mentioned in the *Odyssey* and are used to make grenadine.
- 6 Bananas**  
The local variety of this fruit is small and grown on the lower, warmer plains of the islands.
- 7 Cretan Plane Tree**  
Endemic to Crete, the striking plane tree is often found in villages and provides welcome shade.
- 8 Carob Tree**  
With its dark seed pods used as a chocolate alternative, the carob tree is a key part of the landscape.
- 9 Cypress Tree**  
Tall and elegant, the cypress tree is from the conifer family and is seen in gardens and in the wild.
- 10 Cedar Tree**  
Forests of the broad-branched cedar tree can be found at higher altitudes throughout the islands.



Carob seeds were once used to measure the weight of diamonds. Its name and "carat" are derived from the Greek, kerátion.

# TOP 10 Myths and Legends

**1 Homer's Odyssey**  
 Believed to date from around the 8th century BC but based on earlier myths, Homer's epic poem *The Odyssey* suggests that Itháki was the home of the ancient hero King Odysseus. In the story, he returns home from the battle at Troy as a great warrior to be reunited with his love, Penelope.

**2 Poseidon**  
 As per Greek mythology, Paxí was created by the god of the sea, Poseidon, known as Neptune in Latin. Enraged at having no peace and quiet with his wife Amphitrite, he dealt a blow to Corfu with his three-pronged spear, known as a trident, splitting the island in two. Paxí thus became their place of sanctuary.

**3 Sappho**  
 Sappho was a prolific poet from the island of Lésvos who lived from around 620 to 570 BC. One legend claims she was in love with Phaon, an ugly ferryman, whom the goddess Aphrodite transformed into a man of beauty. Phaon then rejected Sappho who, broken hearted, threw herself to her death from the cliffs near Cape Lefkátas, Lefkáda.

**4 St John**  
 Often referred to as John of Pátmos, the saint is said to have

written the New Testament's *Book of Revelation* after he saw a vision of Christ in the Cave of the Apocalypse in Hóra, Pátmos. The nearby monastery of St John, which was founded in 1088 by the monk Christódoulos Letrínos in his honour, is one of the world's most sacred sites (see pp12–13).

**5 Hippocrates**  
 Considered one of the main figures in ancient Greek medicine, Hippocrates was born in around 460 BC on Kos. A teacher of medicine, the physician is credited with rejecting superstitions and pioneering thinking on diet and environment being the cause of illness. The Hippocratic Oath is still taken by doctors today.


**6 The Giant Polyvotis**  
 Polyvotis was part of an ancient race of fearsome giants, according to Greek mythology. During one of the legendary battles with the gods, Polyvotis infuriated Poseidon and the angry sea god cut off a part of Kos and threw it at the giant. The rock, once called Polyvotis, became known as Níssyros.

**7 Minos**  
 The Minoan civilization, which existed from around 2700 to 1450 BC and shaped the history of Crete, was named after Minos,

the mythical king of the island. He was the son of Zeus, king of the gods, and Europa, and lived at Knossos. Minos features on Greek coins.

**8 Helios and Rhode**  
According to legend, Helios, the sun god, was a handsome Titan, who was cult worshipped on an island called Rhode (modern-day Rhodes). The island takes its name from a nymph of the same name with whom Helios had fallen in love.

**9 The Lady of Ro**  
Born in 1890 on the Greek island of Kastellórizo, just off Turkey, Déspina Achladióti was forced to flee to nearby uninhabited Ro during WWII. She became a hero for raising the Greek flag every day even though Ro was not a Greek island. The flag is still raised today in memory of the Lady of Ro.

**10 St Francis of Assisi**  
A friar of the Roman Catholic Church and founder of the Franciscans, St Francis of Assisi is said to have considered Kefalloniá a spiritual home. In the 13th century he founded the beautiful Moní Theotókou Sisión, near Lourdáta, as a refuge.

## Top 10 Ancient Sites

- 1 Delos**  
Mythological birthplace of Apollo, this sacred island has been inhabited since around 2500 BC (see pp14–15).
- 2 Pythagóreio, Sámos**  
The site of an ancient fortified port and known for its 6th-century BC aqueduct, the Tunnel of Eupalinos (see pp18–19).
- 3 Phaestos Palace, Crete**  
Site of a palace dating from 1450 BC, considered to be some of the finest Minoan remains (see pp20–21).
- 4 Ancient Thíra, Santoríni**  
Ptolemaic, Hellenistic and Roman remains can be seen at the site of the ancient Dorian city of Thíra (see p90).
- 5 Ancient Akrotíri, Santoríni**  
This late-Neolithic complex is well-preserved, as it lay buried after a volcanic eruption in Minoan times (see p90).
- 6 Paleókaстро, Kefalloniá**  
The fortifications and citadel walls of the ancient city of Paleókaстро are well-preserved (see p76).
- 7 Angelókaстро, Corfu**  
Site of a 13th-century fortress that formed a hilltop acropolis. 🗺 Map A5
- 8 Ancient Erétria, Évvia**  
Dating from the 6th–5th century BC, this ancient city has yielded important Neolithic and Helladic finds (see p28).
- 9 Paleóchora, Itháki**  
Once the capital of Itháki, Paleóchora's medieval ruins include stone houses and churches. 🗺 Map H2
- 10 Ypapantí, Paxi**  
Legend has it that this cave was a Byzantine church dedicated to the Presentation of Christ in the temple. 🗺 Map B2

**TOP 10 Museums and Galleries****1 Archaeological Museum Pythagóreo, Sámos**

This museum's impressive collection includes pottery dating from the 9th to the 2nd centuries BC. A prize exhibit is a marble statue of Aiakes, father of the tyrant Polykrates, who, in the 5th century BC, seized power in Aegean and Ionian islands.

**2 Aegean Maritime Museum, Mýkonos**

With its collection of nautical instruments, coins and paintings, this museum preserves Aegean maritime history (see p86).

**3 Irákleio Archaeological Museum, Crete**

This fine museum has Minoan artifacts, including faïence figurines and frescoes, ceramics and jewellery (see p97).

**4 Archaeological Museum, Lefkáda**

The collection of artifacts exhibited in this museum date from the early Bronze Age. They were excavated from sites around the island, including Kariotes, outside Lefkada Town, and Nydrí, on the east coast.



**5 Antivouniótissa Museum, Corfu**

Housed in the Church of Panagía Antivouniótissa, this museum is also known as the Byzantine Museum. It contains Byzantine and post-Byzantine artifacts and ecclesiastical icons dating back five centuries (see pp8–9).

**6 Archaeological Museum, Rhodes**

Located in the 15th-century Hospital of the Knights, this museum displays a collection of Classical, Hellenistic and Roman sculptures as well as mosaic floors from Rhodes Town and Kárpathos. Rhodian funerary slabs dating from the period of the Knights, with personal coats of arms are also exhibited (see pp10–11).

## 7 Archaeological Museum, Corfu

Originally built to house treasures found at the Temple of Artemis on the Mon Repos Estate, this museum now has other exhibits too, including finds from a 13th-century fortress at Kassiópi and the Corfu Town citadel (see p72).

## 8 Byzantine Museum, Rhodes

The museum has an impressive collection of icons and frescos, including 12th-century examples painted in the Comneni period, when figures were less geometric. Housed in a church near the Old Town's Mylon Gate, it was built as a cathedral under the Knights' rule. *Apéllou near Mylon Gate, Rhodes Town* • Map V4 • 22410 75674 • Open summer: 8am–8pm; winter: 8am–3pm • Adm

## 9 Museum of Solomós, Zákynthos

With its collection of furniture, photographs and personal possessions, this museum is dedicated to eminent Zákynthians. These include Dionýsios Solomós, the national poet and author of the Greek National Anthem, and the 19th-century writer Andréas Kálvos. *Plateia Agiou Markou, Zákynthos Town* • Map H4 • 26950 48982 • Open 9am–2pm daily • Adm

## 10 Byzantine Museum, Zákynthos

An amazing collection of art from churches and monasteries destroyed in the 1953 earthquake, including woodcarvings, icons, wall paintings and sculptures, are displayed here (see p74).

## Top 10 Unusual Museums

### 1 Phonograph Museum, Lefkáda

This is a private collection of old records and phonographs. *Map G1* • 26450 21088

### 2 Paper Money Museum, Corfu

Banknotes from German, British, Italian and Greek eras trace Corfu's history. *Map B5* • 26610 41552

### 3 Lace Museum, Zákynthos

The traditional art of lace-making is the focus of this museum. *Map H4*

### 4 Decorative Arts Museum, Rhodes

Folk costumes and crafts from the 1600s are on display here (see p10).

### 5 Folk Museum, Mýkonos

A windmill, plus rare textiles and ceramics, show how rural dwellers lived (see p86).

### 6 Palaeontological Museum, Tilos

Exhibits include fossils of dwarf elephants that became extinct in 4500 BC. *Map G5*

### 7 Museum of Modern Art, Ándros

Works by Matisse, Picasso and local artists are on display here. *Map N4* • 22820 22444

### 8 Gallery of Tíniot Artists, Tínos

Exhibits works by local artists from the 20th century onwards. *Map N5* • 22830 22670

### 9 Kazantzákis Museum, Crete

This is dedicated to the Cretan writer, Níkos Kazantzákis. *Map E6* • 28107 42451

### 10 Vamvakáris Museum, Sýros

Musician Márkos Vamvakáris' belongings are displayed here. *Map N6* • 22810 82934

An architectural triumph built into the Prophítis Ilías mountainside, this 11th-century monastery was built for the Virgin Mary, protector of Amorgós island. It contains sacred treasures, including a 15th-century icon of the Virgin Mary. Resident monks host a festival here every 21 November.

**2 Moní Zoödóchou Pigís, Póros**

This 18th-century monastery is called Zoödóchos Pigi (meaning life-giving) because it is built around a curative spring. This white structure, surrounded by pine forest, is an appealing sight. The fine collection of icons and the intricately carved gilded iconostasis separating the nave from the sanctuary are noteworthy. 📍 *Póros Town • Map K3*

**3 Nía Moní, Híos**

A UNESCO World Heritage Site, this austere monastery was built in the 11th century by Byzantine emperor Constantine IX Monomacho on the site

where a miraculous icon of the Virgin Mary was discovered. It is noted for its superb mosaics, considered among the finest Macedonian Renaissance art in Greece (*see pp16–17*).

**4 Moní Platyτέρα, Corfu**

Dedicated to the Virgin Mary and to saint Chrysanthos, this 18th–19th-century monastery has post-Byzantine icons by famous local painters Klontzás and Ventoúras. It houses the mausoleum of the first Governor of Greece, Ioannis Kapodistrias, a Corfiot who took office in 1827. 📍 *Corfu Town • Map B5*

**5 Moní of the Panagía Odigitría, Lefkáda**

Built in the 1400s and noted for its traditional single-aisle architecture, austere exterior and intricate timber roof, this monastery is the island's oldest. It is dedicated to Odigitría, an ancient name for the Virgin Mary depicted in religious icons. 📍 *Lefkáda Town • Map G1*

**6 Moní Panagía of Vlachéma, Corfu**

A landmark of Corfu, this white monastery stands on an islet in the Chalikópoulos Lagoon off Kanóni. It is reached by a small causeway. This 17th-century monastery, which has also been a convent has interesting architectural features and ecclesiastical icons. 📍 *Kanóni • Map B5*

**Moní Panagía of Vlachéma, Corfu**

**7 Moní Katharón, Itháki**  
 Believed to originate from before the 17th century and built at an altitude of 600 m (1,970 ft), this monastery is one of the oldest and highest in the islands. Remote and beautiful, it was renovated after the earthquake of 1953 and is dedicated to the Virgin Mary. 📍 *Anogi* • Map G2

**8 Moní of St John of Lagadá, Zákynthos**  
 Frescos and gilded iconostasis, which date back centuries, make the journey to this remote and atmospheric monastery worthwhile. Built in the 16th century and remodelled in the 17th, it had many houses and chapels at one time. Today it is home to just one monk. 📍 *Katastári* • Map H4

**9 Moní Transfiguration of the Saviour, Zákynthos**  
 This Byzantine monastery, dedicated to Ágios Dionýsios, the patron saint of Zákynthos, is an isolated structure on the island of Stamfordíni in the Strofádes, a mini archipelago that belongs to the Greek Orthodox Church. 📍 *Map B4*

**10 Moní Agíou Gerásimou, Kefalloniá**  
 A white-walled, red-roofed structure on the Mount Enos foothills, this monastery is dedicated to Gerásimos, Kefalloniá's patron saint. According to legend, Gerásimos lived in nearby caves. His mausoleum is in the monastery. 📍 *Frangáta* • Map G3

## Top 10 Religious Festivals

**1 Good Friday**  
 Easter, the most important festival of the year, starts with Epitáfios, a procession depicting the funeral of Christ.

**2 Easter Sunday**  
 After midnight on Saturday, worshippers light candles in a church to depict the bringing of holy light and good fortune.

**3 Annunciation**  
 Marked by a feast, this festival, held on 25 March, is a celebration of when the angel Gabriel announced that Mary would be the Holy Mother.

**4 Epiphany**  
 On 6 January, Epiphany events take place throughout the islands and are marked by the blessing of water.

**5 Lenten Monday**  
 Religious services, feasts and carnivals are held in the three weeks prior to Lenten Monday (Katharí Deftéra).

**6 Lent**  
 A period of penance to commemorate Jesus fasting before Easter, Lent culminates in Pentecost in June.

**7 Pentecost**  
 Sometimes known as the Feast of Weeks, Pentecost marks the descent of the Holy Ghost on the Apostles.

**8 Dormition of the Virgin**  
 The most important religious celebration after Easter takes place every 15 August throughout the islands.

**9 Traditional Festivals**  
 Taking place throughout the year, these festivals (*panegíria*) celebrate each island's patron saint.

**10 Christmas**  
 Christ's birth is celebrated with services, prayers and the giving of gifts.

**TOP 10 Picturesque Villages**

**1 Pélekas, Corfu**  
Pélekas is a picturesque village of bougainvillea-covered stone houses, olive groves and vineyards, with traditional tavernas and small hotels, that has resisted mass tourism. Sitting on a hill overlooking unspoilt sandy beaches, it is known for its breathtaking sunsets. 📍 Map A5

**2 Anogí, Itháki**  
A traditional village of olive trees and stone walls, Anogí is around 500 m (1,640 ft) above sea level, with great views. One of Itháki's most remote and oldest communities, it has its origins in medieval times. The people observe old customs and speak a distinct dialect. 📍 Map G2

**3 Fiskárdo, Kefalloniá**  
This quintessential picture-postcard village miraculously survived the great earthquake of 1953 and retains many original Venetian buildings. Painted in soft pastel shades, the houses that were once the homes of

merchants line its yacht-filled harbour. Most now host tavernas, restaurants and shops (see p76).

**4 Lagopóda, Zákynthos**  
One of the mountain villages on Zákynthos, sleepy Lagopoda offers a rare glimpse into how the people of Zákynthos have lived for centuries. It is characterized by its cobbled alleyways, stone houses with vine-covered courtyards and its pretty church. 📍 Map H4

**5 Imerovígli, Santoríni**  
With dazzling white and blue square houses and blue-domed churches descending down the hillside to the bay, Imerovígli is a typical Santoríni village. Facing west, over the flooded caldera, its sunsets are a photographer's dream (see p90).

**6 Kontiás, Límnos**  
Kontiás is one of the most charming villages on the island. Its architecture reflects Venetian, Byzantine and Ottoman influences. Surrounded by pine forest,

it has some glorious beaches. Kontiás is the seat of the municipality. 🗺 *Map E2*

**7 Asfendioú Villages, Kos**  
This cluster of villages on the slopes of Mount Díkéos, comprising Zía (Evangelístria), Ágios Dimítrios, Asómatos and Lagoúdi, is surrounded by forest and springs. The villages retain their old charm with stone houses and Byzantine churches. 🗺 *Map X2*

**8 Pýrgos, Tínos**  
Houses, fountains, churches and public buildings sculpted from white marble give this village a distinct beauty. Marble has been used here for centuries, making it the birthplace of many great sculptors and home of the Tínos School of Fine Arts. 🗺 *Map N5*

**9 Oía, Santoríni**  
A popular holiday spot, Oía is a lovely village of blue-domed churches, white houses and tiny alleyways huddled on the hillside overlooking the volcano. It has many tavernas, gift shops, a maritime museum and the remains of a Venetian fortress (see p90).

**10 Náoussa, Páros**  
Considered one of the prettiest villages in the Cyclades, this small fishing port is characterized by white houses, chapels, a bustling harbour and tiny lanes. Despite development, it has not lost its traditional charm. 🗺 *Map E4*

## Top 10 Animals and Birds

**1 Loggerhead Turtle**  
Zákynthos' Laganás Bay (see p74), is one of the key breeding grounds for this endangered turtle.

**2 Monk Seal**  
One of the rarest seals in the world, the monk seal can be seen off the islands, in particular in the Cyclades and northern Sporades.

**3 Moorish Gecko**  
Usually found "sun-bathing" on walls in summer, this grey-brown reptile can grow to around 15 cm (6 in) in length.

**4 Mílos Viper**  
This distinctive venomous snake is found mainly on the Mílos and Kímolos islands in the Cyclades.

**5 Freyer's Grayling Butterfly**  
Small and dark brown in colour, the Freyer's Grayling is native to the Mediterranean and seen in July and August.

**6 Kri-Kri**  
A protected species, this wild goat is a native of Crete and found mainly in the Samariá gorge.

**7 Dolphin**  
Look out for bottlenosed, striped and common dolphins when sailing in the Ionian and Aegean waters.

**8 Sardinian Warbler**  
This striking native Ionian bird can be identified by its black head and red eye ring.

**9 Scops Owl**  
These small grey owls are hardly visible but their trill can be heard at night.

**10 Eleonora's Falcon**  
Kestrels, eagles and falcons, including Eleonora's falcon, are seen in large numbers around the islands.

**2 Captain Corelli's Mandolin, Kefalloniá**  
 Nicolas Cage and Penelope Cruz were in this 2001 film set during the Italian occupation.

**3 Zorba the Greek, Crete**  
 Based on the book by Cretan writer Nikos Kazantzákis, this 1964 film starred Anthony Quinn.

**4 Tomb Raider: The Cradle of Life, Santoríni**  
 A 2001 film starring Angelina Jolie as Lara Croft, this film was shot on Santoríni.

**5 For Your Eyes Only, Corfu**  
 The casino scene of this 1981 film starring Roger Moore as 007 was shot in the Achilleion Palace, Corfu (see p72).

**6 Shirley Valentine, Mýkonos**  
 This 1989 film starred Pauline Collins as a bored housewife on holiday in Greece.

**7 Bourne Identity, Mýkonos**  
 The concluding scenes of this 2002 film starring Matt Damon were shot here.

**8 Guns of Navarone, Rhodes**  
 Gregory Peck and David Niven were the big names in this 1961 film about German-occupied Greece.

 Starring Sophia Loren as sponge-diver Phaedra, this 1957 film made Ýdra famous.

**10 Big Blue, Amorgós**  
 Released in 1988, this English-language version of the French classic *Le Grand Bleu* starred actor Jean Reno.

## TOP 10 Outdoor Activities

**1 Sailing**  
The Greek Islands boast some of the best sailing waters in the world, as well as marinas and anchorages. Although tidal variation is minimal and the climate is mild, winds can vary between the island groups and present a challenge for even the most experienced sailor. For example, in the Ionians, the *maistro* wind tends to be gentler than the Aegean Sea's meltemi, which can reach gale force.

**2 Fishing**  
The islands are known for their fishing harbours. While most of these are industry-driven to provide fish and seafood, such as octopus, lobster and shrimps for restaurants, others offer organised pleasure trips for holiday-makers. Among the harbours where boats leave for trips are Égina in the





Argo-Saronics, Pátmos in the Dodecanese and Fiskárdo in Kefalloniá.

**3 Walking**  
The islands offer fabulous countryside to explore on foot, with some areas, such as Crete's Samariá gorge

(see p97), having designated hiking trails. These pass by valleys and rivers, villages, vineyards and olive groves, plus the odd taverna for refreshment. Always carry bottled water and a phone.

**4 Cycling**  
Bicycles, mountain bikes and mopeds can be hired at moderate cost in most resorts, including those on Santoríni and Mýkonos in the Cyclades, Corfu or Crete. Enjoy leisurely family outings along plains and coastal roads. For keen endurance cyclists, the rugged terrain of many of the islands can be a challenge.

## 5 Watersports

Snorkelling and dive sites can be found on almost every island, with qualified companies offering tuition and outings for beginners, as well as challenging deep dives. Surface watersports like windsurfing, which is popular in Naxos because of the strong winds, along with water-skiing and kayaking, are available. Families can also enjoy the thrill of banana rides and pedalos.

## 6 Paragliding

Major resorts such as Kos and Rhodes in the Dodecanese, Mýkonos and Páros in the Cyclades, Nydrí on Lefkáda and Sidári on Corfu offer the chance for visitors to enjoy the thrill of paragliding. The charges are usually for about an hour.

## 7 Golf

Although there are only a handful of international-standard courses in the Greek Islands, golf is a very popular sport on the islands. Among the best are the 18-hole courses at Ropa Valley on Corfu, Afandou Golf Course on Rhodes and the Crete Golf Club at Chersónissos (Hersonissos), Crete. The sport is promoted by the Hellenic Golf Federation. ☎ [www.hgf.gr](http://www.hgf.gr)

## 8 Tennis

Most of the larger hotels and resorts have flood-lit courts, and the all-weather municipality courts are generally open for visitors' use. Tennis has been played in Greece for centuries; in fact, it was a feature of the celebrations marking the first modern Olympic Games in Athens in 1896. The regulating body is the Hellenic Tennis Federation.

## 9 Horse Riding

Privately owned riding centres are dotted around the islands, including the Naxos Horse Riding Club, Naxos; Akrotíri Horse Riding Farm, Tsiliví, Zákynthos; and the Trailriders Horse Riding Club, Corfu. Taking a trek through olive groves or farmland in the early morning or late evening, when the sun is at its lowest and coolest, is a magical experience.

## TOP 10 Greek Dishes

**1 Mezédes**  
An assortment of small dishes usually starting with salad, dips and pitta bread, *mezédes* are a great way to sample many local dishes in one meal. Typical main dishes include octopus, shrimp and *keftédes*, *souvláki* and *kléftiko* for the meat option. Most restaurants also offer vegetarian *mezédes*.


**2 Saganáki**  
This dish, often served for lunch, consists of cheese cooked in a frying pan (*saganáki*) and served with bread. The ingredients added to the pan can vary, but usually include seafood, onions or just lemon juice. The dish is often served flambéed at the table.

**3 Pastitsáda**  
A speciality on Corfu but served throughout the islands, *pastitsáda* is a dish of chicken, or occasionally beef, cooked in the oven with tomato, peppers, onion and cinnamon. It is generally served with pasta. Variations include substituting the meat with seafood such as lobster, or using tofu for vegetarian versions.

**4 Kléftiko**  
*Kléftiko*, meaning stolen meat, is a dish of lamb or goat that is cooked slowly over coals in a special oven, sometimes for around 8 hours. Traditionally the meat would be sealed in

**5 Sofrito**  
Although most popular on Corfu, where it originated, this dish is now increasingly seen elsewhere on the islands. It is made using a delicious recipe of veal that is cooked slowly in a creamy white wine, garlic and herb sauce, traditionally topped with herbs and served with rice and salad.

**6 Souvláki**  
*Souvláki* is a dish of diced pork on skewers, usually char-grilled and served with lemon and herbs, accompanied by salad and fried potatoes. It is also a popular fast-food option, served in *souvlatzídiko* outlets in pitta bread with salad and dressing. Chicken, fish and vegetables are modern variations.

**7 Moussakás**  
A delicious dish made of aubergine sautéed in olive oil, sliced tomatoes and potato layered with minced meat – usually lamb – and topped with a béchamel sauce. Lots of garlic, herbs, spices and onion, plus a dash of wine, give it its flavour. Generally served with a salad.

**8 Glyká Koutaliou**  
These confectionaries can be eaten as a snack or to complete a meal. Cherries, pineapple pieces, melons and even peppers, aubergines, almonds and walnuts are candied until they are soft and syrupy. *Glyká koutaliou*, literally “spoon sweets”, have been made in the villages for decades and are often served with ice cream.

**9 Loukoumádes**  
A sweet snack, often served at street festivals, *loukoumádes* are small dough balls deep-fried and sprinkled with sugar. Restaurants also dip the balls in honey or sugar syrup, sprinkle with cinnamon and serve with ice cream.

**10 Keftédes**  
These tasty meatballs, made of minced meat – usually beef – with breadcrumbs, garlic and herbs, are fried in olive oil and sometimes served with a tomato sauce. It is a popular dish in the islands, especially on Crete.

## Top 10 Mezé Dishes

- 1 Taramosaláta**  
A dip made from the roe of mullet or cod, and also often served as a starter with bread.
- 2 Tahíni**  
Made with pureed sesame seeds, this *mezé* or appetiser dip has a distinctive flavour.
- 3 Tzatzíki**  
A light dip always served cold, *tzatzíki* is made with strained yoghurt, garlic and cucumber.
- 4 Dolmádes**  
Vine leaves stuffed with currants, rice and pine nuts, *dolmádes* is a popular *mezé* dish.
- 5 Skordaliá**  
A dip or sauce of the Ionians, *skordaliá* is made of mashed potato, garlic and lemon.
- 6 Loukánika**  
Pork sausage flavoured with fennel and orange, and usually served sliced, as a *mezé* dish.
- 7 Olives with Garlic**  
Black and green olives are always served as a part of *mezédes*; garlic is often added, giving them a bite.
- 8 Melitzanosaláta**  
Aubergines are cooked and pureed with tomatoes, garlic and lemon to create this tasty dip.
- 9 Revithosaláta**  
Sometimes known as hummus, *revithosaláta* is a Greek dip made with chickpeas, garlic and coriander.
- 10 Choriátiki Saláta (Greek Salad)**  
An appetizing blend of tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers and olives, topped with feta cheese and basil.

## TOP 10 Arts and Crafts

### 1 Lace and Embroidery

Lace and embroidered cushions, tablecloths and bread baskets are still handmade in many villages. Karyá in central Lefkáda is famous for its needlecraft, known as *karsanía*, and has a small museum dedicated to the craft. Tourist areas may have similar items, but these are often mass-produced.

### 2 Leatherware

Craftsmen can be seen in small workshops making leather sandals or the traditional knee-high boots. Both are made by hand as they have been for centuries. Hand-crafted leather purses, handbags and belts are also popular souvenirs.

### 3 Rugs

The art of making a genuine sheep- or goat-wool rug, known as *flokáti*, has a long tradition in the Greek Islands. It dates from the 5th century, when mountain shepherds wore them for warmth. More recently they covered the stone floors of village homes. Nowadays, most rugs are made by machine.

### 4 Jewellery

Gold and silver are a good purchase in the islands and main towns offer a wide choice of modern and traditional designs. Often the pieces echo ancient Greek styles. In Crete,

for example, many items are styled on Minoan jewellery. Rustic handmade pieces may be found in the villages.

### 5 Copperware

Nowadays, copperware tends to be used for decorative purposes only, but there was a time when local communities relied on the metal to make everyday household pots and pans. The traditional pot with a handle used to make Greek coffee, known as a *bríki*, is still in daily use.

### 6 Carved Wooden Spoons

Almost always made from olive wood, these beautiful spoons are products of a craft that has been handed down through generations. The wood is crafted into the shape of a spoon and its handle can be ornate or simply a figure. They are usually for display purposes and can be found in most gift shops.

**7 Ceramics** Individual islands have their own style of painting ceramics. Égina is known for its more flowery designs, while Mýkonos artisans often paint traditional Greek figures. Villages are the best place to see authentic items. Rural ceramics tend to be unglazed rather than the colourful glazed items in gift shops.

**8 Icons** Religious icons depicting the Virgin and Child, and saints and angels, have been created for centuries, many originating on Crete. St Luke is credited with being the first iconographer and his icons are considered sacred in the Greek Orthodox Church. Visit churches to see genuine icons, as those on display in gift shops will be mass-produced.

**9 Beads** Known as *kombolói* (worry beads), these strings of beads can be found in gift shops, markets and jewellers throughout the islands. Greeks thread them through their fingers for relaxation. Some strings are coloured and worn as a fashion accessory.

**10 Wall Hangings** Weaving thick cloth and mounting it on a top frame for hanging on a wall is an old craft still practised today. Locals will have several of these hangings in their home as decoration. Gift shops sell them as souvenirs.

## Top 10 Popular Souvenirs

**1 Olive Oil** Bottles of oil produced from the olives grown on the islands can be found in gift shops and supermarkets.

**2 Honey** Honey, sometimes flavoured with thyme, is produced and used in traditional cakes and desserts.

**3 Herbs and Spices** Grown in quantity throughout the islands, herbs and spices can make good souvenirs.

**4 Leather Sandals** Leather sandals made in a village workshop are useful, as well as being reminders of the holiday.

**5 Plaques** Sculpted in wood, stone and resin plaques are usually ornate and depict scenes of rural life.

**6 Baklava Pastries** Made of *fýllo* pastry layers with nuts and drenched in honey, the baklava makes a great gift.

**7 Jewellery** Strings of coloured worry beads and items of gold or silver are popular souvenirs.

**8 Ornate Pottery** Pottery jugs, bowls, candle holders and plates painted in traditional design are ideal to take back home.

**9 Glyká Koutaliouí Confectionery** Candied pieces of fruit, nuts and sometimes vegetables, these sweets, though full of calories, are mouthwatering.

**10 Embroidered Linen** Often trimmed with lace, these cushions and tablecloths are beautiful and elegant reminders of a holiday in the Greek Islands.

## TOP 10 Festivals and Events

### 1 Festivals for Patron Saints

Ágios Nikodímos Day on Náxos and the Litany of Ágios Spyridon in Corfu are just two of the many festivals that take place around the Greek Islands through the year, commemorating each island's patron saint. Festivals usually involve parades, music, dance, fireworks and feasts.

### 2 Hippocrátia Festival, Kos

The annual Hippocrátia Festival's highlight is a recital of the Hippocratic Oath. Kos, Hippocrates' birthplace, celebrates with educational displays for children, folkloric exhibitions, music programmes and theatrical shows. The festival runs for several weeks from July to September.

### 3 Cultural Festivals

The islands are known for their festivals of art, literature, history and theatre. These include the Festival of the Aegean, held in Sýros each July, which involves opera and performances of Shakespeare. In May, Rhodes hosts its Medieval Rose Festival, while in August, Lefkáda hosts its Festival of Art and Literature.

### 4 Folklore Festivals

It is the tradition for every village in Greece to host a folklore festival (*panegýri*) at least once a year, usually during the summer. It is a time when people meet up with friends, feast together and dance.

Musicians play traditional songs, while dance troupes perform folkloric dances.

### 5 Religious Festivals

After Easter and Christmas, the most celebrated religious day is the Dormition of the Virgin, or Feast of Assumption, on 15 August. It is believed that on this day the Virgin, Mary the Theotókos, ascended to heaven. Families celebrate with prayer, a feast and traditional dancing and music.

### 6 Ochi Day

A public holiday on 28 October commemorates the day in 1940 when the Greek Prime Minister, Ioánnis Metaxás, rejected Mussolini's ultimatum to allow Axis forces to occupy parts of Greece. Metaxás said "*ochi*", meaning "no". It marked the start of Greece's involvement in WWII.

## 7 International Festivals

Among the many festivals held on the islands are the Winter Festival in Kos which boasts international music and dance performers, the Argostóli International Choral Festival in Kefalloniá (August), the International Puppet Festival in Ýdra (July) and the International Music Festival in Santoríni (September).

## 8 Name Days

Most children born in Greece are given the name of a saint. On that saint's feast day everyone with the same name celebrates. For example, 7 January is the name day for Ioánnis (John). In Chaniá on Crete, many males with this name will visit the Church of Ágios Ioánnis and then have a party. Name days are more important than birthdays.

## 9 Town Carnivals

February is the carnival month on the Greek Islands, and every town puts on events lasting about a week, usually culminating in a procession of floats. Most people, especially children, wear fancy dress.

## 10 Food and Wine Festivals

A successful food harvest or wine year is celebrated in style. On Kos, for example, there is a Fish Festival and a Honey Festival in August, while Crete has a Chestnut Festival in October. All islands host a wine festival with live music, usually in September.

## Top 10 Drinks

### 1 Retsína

A powerful wine flavoured with pine resin, *retsína* is the traditional white wine of Greece. It is quite often served chilled.

### 2 Oúzo

*Oúzo* is a strong aniseed-flavoured spirit which can be enjoyed neat or mixed with water.

### 3 Greek Coffee

Made in a copper pot known as a *bríki*, thick and strong Greek coffee is made by boiling finely ground coffee and sugar together.

### 4 Metaxa

Metaxa is a famous brand of strong cask-matured wine, which is dark brown in colour and tastes rather like brandy.

### 5 Tsípouro

Distilled from the residue of grapes as well as olives, *tsípouro* is a popular after-dinner liqueur.

### 6 Cocktails

Served mainly in beach bars, cocktails are almost always colourful and highly decorated.

### 7 Kumquat Liqueur

A popular speciality on Corfu, this is a sweet liqueur, flavoured with the citrus fruit kumquat.

### 8 Mythos Beer

Mythos is a light lager and probably the best-known of all the Greek beers.

### 9 Frappé

A great way to enjoy coffee when the weather is hot, a frappé is a frothy, iced version.

### 10 Soft Drinks

Major international soft drinks are sold in the Greek Islands, and there are some good local brands too.

## TOP 10 Restaurants

### 1 Papagalos Restaurant, Santoríni

One of the best on the island and among the 50 best Greek restaurants, Papagalos has a refreshing approach to cuisine. Its Greek menu uses only the freshest seafood and organic produce direct from the farmer. Lamb chops with crispy vine leaves and *tzatzíki*, and the baby spinach and haloumi salad are house specialities. Fine wines, martinis and espresso complete the experience. The restaurant also offers takeaway meals and wines (see p91).

### 3 Tassia, Kefalloniá

Run by cook-book author Tassía Dendrínou, who still does much of the cooking herself, this restaurant is housed in a delightful Venetian building overlooking Fiskárho's harbour. The menu features dishes from Tassía's own books, including traditional Kefallonian meat pie and lobster spaghetti. The extensive wine list has international and local vintages (see p77).

### 2 Taverna Karbouris, Corfu

One of Corfu's oldest north-coast tavernas, Karbouris has become a local landmark. Traditional Greek cuisine, such as *kléftiko*, is served at this family-run taverna. You can sit near the swimming pool or inside in the attractive dining room (see p73).

### 4 Sirines Restaurant, Itháki

Located in Ithaki Yacht Club, Sirines (Sirens) Restaurant is known for its menu and the collection of shipping memorabilia that adorns the walls. Run by Marina Fotopoulou, who specializes in Ithakian cuisine, it offers delicious dishes such as langoustine prawns in a mustard and lemon sauce and vegetarian *moussakás*. Organically grown vegetables are used. ☎ Ithaki Yacht Club • Map H2 • 26740 33001 • €€

## 5 Mesogeios Restaurant, Kárpáthos

Located on the waterfront, this lively restaurant is known for its good selection of local dishes and its friendly staff. Diners sit at tables and chairs painted the colour of the sea, and can select from a menu that includes stuffed clams, squid or artichokes, goat *stifádo* (stew) and *makarónia*, a delicious local pasta. Right next to Mesogeios is its twin restaurant, Didyma, an integrated grill house (see p113).

## 6 Adonis Fish Tavern, Égina

This is one of the many traditional-style fish tavernas that line Pérdika's bustling harbour-side. Its delicious menu offers starters such as Greek salad and dips, followed by dishes that include octopus cooked with tomatoes and herbs, prawns with *ouzo*, lobster and pasta, and sea bream with onions. Wine is mainly local (see p147).

## 7 Alexis4Seasons, Rhodes

Housed in a period mansion with a roof garden and lounge bar, this award-winning restaurant has a gourmet-style menu with Mediterranean and Greek influences. The emphasis is on seafood and the vegetables come from its own garden. Specialities include smoked salmon, scallops in white vodka sauce and prawn risotto. A fine wine list, immaculate staff and elegant surroundings complete the dining experience (see p111).

## 8 Ristorante Italiano Veneto, Crete

This super Italian-themed restaurant is housed in a restored 15th-century stone mansion. Gnocchi, noodles and fusilli pasta, tempting home-made sauces and

pizzas fresh from the wood oven are on the menu, along with classic Italian á la carte dishes and desserts. It has a collection of vintage Italian wines (see p101).

## 9 Sea Satin Market, Mýkonos

This waterfront restaurant, located below the famous windmills offering views of Little Venice's neighbourhood, is one of the trendiest in town. Diners can select their fish from the day's catch at the ice counter, see it cooked on charcoal grills and then enjoy the exquisite flavour, or select a starter and platter from the menu (see p87).

## 10 La Maison de Catherine, Mýkonos

This classy restaurant is known for its artfully presented tables, á la carte menu of Greek dishes with a Gallic twist and its fine wine list. Classical music playing in the background enhances the experience. Be sure to try the prawns in a delicious tomato and *ouzo* sauce. Elegant touches like crisp linen make this a memorable place (see p87).

Set in a tiny cove surrounded by cypress trees, this sandy horseshoe-shaped beach has escaped development and offers a peaceful place to relax. Its plentiful trees provide ample shade. The beach looks out over the picturesque fishing harbour of Kouloura village, where a handful of small tavernas serve refreshments.

**2 Psilí Ámmos Beach, Pátmos**

Located in a picturesque cove, Psilí Ámmos, meaning "fine sand", has golden dunes dotted with tamarisk trees, which provide welcome shade. The sea is shallow and crystal clear. Access to the beach is on foot along a small road or by fishing boat from Skála, which means it is rarely crowded. 📍 *Southwest coast near Diakófti* • Map *F4*

**Psilí Ámmos beach, Pátmos****View from Kouloura beach, Corfu****3 Ágia Marína Beach, Spétses**

Spétses has some of the best beaches in the Argo-Saronics, with Ágia Marína beach being one of the most popular. For seclusion, head off around the headland, between some rocks, to a tiny bay of fine golden sand and pebbles lapped by the sea. Excavations here have unearthed early-Bronze Age remains. 📍 Near *Dápiá* • Map *D4*

**4 Ftenágia Beach, Chálki**

The quintessential secluded beach, Ftenágia is nestled in a small cove along a hiking route from Emporió village, which is its only access. It is popular with yacht owners, who often anchor off-shore and swim in its safe waters. The beach is a mix of sand and pebbles, and has a small taverna.

### 5 **Porto Katsíki Beach, Lefkída**

Reached by descending a series of steps or by boat from the resorts of Nydrí and Vassilikí, this beach attracts visitors because of its reputation as being the island's most beautiful spot. It is horseshoe shaped with fine golden sand, striking white cliffs topped by lush vegetation and some interesting rock formations.

### 6 **Agrári Beach, Mýkonos**

Sand dunes set amongst green shrubs characterize this secluded beach. It is enclosed in a bay by a hillside of forest and rock formations, and can be reached by a sharply descending, narrow footpath or by caique.

This beach is popular with nature-lovers. It has a small taverna. Nearby is the busier Eliá beach. 📍 *South coast • Map P6*

### 7 **Pahiá Ámmos Beach, Tínos**

Pahiá Ámmos beach is a world away from the crowds: the only noise you will hear is the sound of the sea. It is surrounded by rugged terrain, with a small road providing access. Set in a natural bay, the beach is made up of a series of sand dunes. 📍 *Near Ágios Ioánnis • Map P5*

### 8 **Megálo Limonári Beach, Meganíssi**

This long stretch of beach, shielded by trees, is reachable only on foot or bike along a track from Katoméri village. As such, only those keen on seclusion are likely to make the journey. However, it is worth the effort as the beach is sandy and the crystal-clear water is ideal for swimming. 📍 *East coast near Katoméri • Map H1*

### 9 **Adrína Beach, Skópelos**

Reached from Pánormos by walking through a forest of scented pine trees or by boat, this beach is often deserted. It is a mix of pebble and sand, with lots of tiny coves to explore.

Opposite is Dasiá island, which, according to legend, is named after a female pirate who drowned off its shore. 📍 *Near Pánormos • Map M1*

### 10 **Elafoníssi Beach, Crete**

With its white sand that has a pinkish tint due to fragments of coral, and its great expanse of shallow turquoise sea, this beach is one of the most idyllic spots on Crete. It is located on the Elafoníssi islet and can be reached by crossing the reef on foot or by boat. 📍 *Elafoníssi islet, off Palaiochóra • Map D6*

## The Ionians

**T**HE GREENEST AND MOST FERTILE of all the island groups, the Ionian islands sit in turquoise waters off the western coast of Greece. They consist of six main islands: Kefalloniá, the largest, followed by Corfu, Paxí, Zákynthos, Itháki and Lefkáda. There are also many smaller inhabited islands including Andípaxi and Meganíssi as well as clusters of tiny islets such as the Strofádes. The islands have been populated by ancient Greeks, Romans, Byzantines, Venetians, French and British, all of whom have left their

legacy in traditions and architecture. They offer a fabulous combination of mountain and forest landscapes, beaches, bustling towns, idyllic villages and ancient sites.

## 1 Corfu Old Town, Corfu

At the heart of the capital and port of Corfu, the Old Town is a mixture of imposing fortresses, cobbled streets, elegant squares and bustling harbour. It is the largest medieval city in Greece. It is an easy distance between the main sights, which include the fortresses, the Old Port, the French-inspired Listón and the Palace of St Michael and St George. To its south is the Mon Repos Estate (*see p72*), site of the ancient city Palaeópolis (*see pp8–9*).

## 2 Paxí

To the south of Corfu is Paxí, a pretty island covered in olive groves. Its busy capital, Gäios, sits in a harbour lined with tavernas from where you can relax and watch yachts sail by. In the bay are two islets, the fortified Ágios Nikólaos and Panagía, which provide a natural breakwater. Paxí has a rugged coastline interspersed with small coves and fishing villages like Longós and Lákka. Magaziá is famous for its sunsets. *Map B2*

## 3 Lefkáda

The small, mountainous island of Lefkáda is covered with forests of pine and cypress trees. Its capital is Lefkáda Town,

which is connected to the mainland by two bridges. Its buildings were reconstructed after a devastating earthquake in 1948 using brightly coloured metals. Vasilíkí and Nydrí, along with the Póрто Katsíki beach (*see p61*), are popular tourist spots, while off-shore lie the Meganíssi, Madourí and Spárti islands (*see p80*). *Map G1*

## 4 Nydrí Waterfalls, Lefkáda

Lefkáda has a rare beauty where nature has created some spectacular gorges with sheer rock faces and amazing waterfalls. The Nydrí Waterfalls, which lie to one end of the Dimosári gorge near Perigiáli and Nydrí, are the most impressive. Underground caverns of water help fuel the cascades, which plunge at an alarming rate to crystal-clear pools. The waterfalls are a wondrous sight and visitors can take a refreshing dip in the pools. *Map G1*

**5 Kefalloniá** The largest Ionian island, Kefalloniá is green and mountainous. It is known for its vineyards, subterranean waterways, caves and indented coastline. Its Mt Énos (Aínos) is over 1,600 m (5,200 ft) high and carpeted with almost black fir trees and old olive trees. Kefalloniá's main towns and villages include Sámi, the capital Argostóli, Fiskárdo, Skála and Lixóuri (see p76). ☉ Map G2

**6 Mýrtos Bay, Kefalloniá** Mýrtos Bay is considered to be the most photographed bay on the island. Its waters are brilliant turquoise, created by a beach of white pebbles that glisten in the sunlight. The steeply shelving seabed gives a graduated richness to the colour. It lies between Mt Kalón Oréon and Mt Agía Dynatí, famous in Greek mythology as the rock thrown by Cronus, leader of the Titans. ☉ Near *Divaráta* • Map G2

### Gerald Durrell

When Durrell moved with his family to Corfu as a boy in 1935, he became fascinated by the island's flora and fauna. The start of a life-long love of animals, Durrell's Corfiot years were later recounted in his *Corfu Trilogy – My Family and Other Animals* (1956), *Birds, Beasts, and Relatives* (1969) and *The Garden of the Gods* (1978).

### 7 Caves of Sámi, Kefalloniá

Sámi has an extraordinary network of subterranean waterways and caves. The huge Drogarátí cave, believed to be more than a million years old, has hundreds of stalactites and stalagmites, formed over thousands of years. With superb acoustics, the creatively lit cave is

often used for cultural and musical events. Nearby is the equally famous Melissáni cave, said to have been the sanctuary of the god Pan. Its lake is deep blue, highlighted by the sun shining through a hole in the cave's roof. Other minor caves nearby are Angaláki, Zervátí, Ágii Theódori and Agía Eleoúsa. ☉ Map G3 • Drogarátí and Melissáni caves: open 8am–8pm daily; adm

**8 Itháki** Itháki is famous for being mentioned in the works of Homer, and is thought to be the home of the mythological King Odysseus. It has a contrasting landscape with mountains and cliffs to the west and dense forest and pebble coves to the east. Its Heptanesian capital, Vathý, has buildings of traditional architecture, which look out over one of the world's largest

harbours. Other attractions include Píso Aetós, believed to be the site of Odysseus's palace, and the pretty Fríkes harbour. 📍 *Map H2*

**9 Zákynthos**  
Zákynthos is a gem of an island with high mountains clothed in cypress trees and some stunning beaches, the most famous of which are Navágio (see p74) and Laganás bay in the south. Its bustling capital, Zákynthos Town, was rebuilt to its original Venetian look and layout after being destroyed in the 1953 earthquake. Places to visit include the beautiful Blue Caves (see p36), where the sea has eroded the rocks into caverns. 📍 *Map G4*

**10 Andípaxi**  
Lying to Paxí's south is the small satellite island of Andípaxi, with a population of less than 60 permanent inhabitants. It is a haven of clear turquoise waters and golden beaches, including Vríka beach, nestled in a sheltered cove, and nearby Voutoúmi beach. It is possible to take a walk along the coastal path that links the two. Andípaxi, which can be reached by boat from Gáios on Paxí, is covered with vineyards, which provide the grapes used to make its local wine. 📍 *Map B2*

## Island Hopping Around the Ionians

### Morning

 The Ionian islands are scattered over a large area and not given to island hopping in the same way as the other Greek island groups. However, it is still possible to get from one island to another relatively easily. Kefalloniá, Zákynthos and Corfu, for example, all have airports offering domestic flights, while yacht charter companies offer boat hire. Ferries also ply between most of the islands.

One of the most popular ferry routes is a day-trip to **Paxí** from Corfu. Start your day at the New Port in **Corfu Town** and look for the signs indicating where you can catch the Flying Dolphin hydrofoil. There is one that leaves at 8:30am on most days during summer. Do not worry if you miss it, there is a hydrofoil departure a little later, too. On board you can relax before disembarking at **Gáios** New Port on Paxí. The journey time is about an hour. In Gáios you can hire a car or taxi to take you around the island. Head to **Longós** for a delicious lunch at one of the waterfront tavernas.

### Afternoon

After lunch take the road signposted to **Lákka**. Be sure to explore the town before driving south past the communities of Magaziá and Oziás, then back to Gáios. Take time to explore the harbourside.  Enjoy a meal and then hop on your hydrofoil, which departs around 7pm, for the return journey.

**4 Mount Pantokrátor**

**5 Korissión Lagoon**  
This 5-km- (3-mile-) long freshwater lagoon is home to many species of wildlife. 📍 *Map B6*

**6 Gardiki Castle**  
The ruins of this bastion, built by a 13th-century duke, Michail Angelos Komninós II, are well-preserved. 📍 *Map B6*

**7 Lefkimmi Town**  
The tall houses and tiny streets in this attractive riverside town, famous for its excellent wine, are good examples of local architecture. 📍 *Map B6*

**8 Kassiópi**  
A popular tourist village, Kassiópi offers a wide choice of harbourside tavernas. Important artifacts excavated at Angevin castle ruins are displayed in the Archeological Museum. 📍 *Map B4*

**9 Sidári**  
Pre-Neolithic remains found here reveal Sidári's long history. It is now a tourist hotspot famous for its rock formations which have created a channel, known as the Canal d'Amour. 📍 *Map A4*

**3 Blue Caves**

One of the few villages to escape destruction in the 1953 earthquake, Kerí retains original stone houses. Surrounded by vineyards, it produces some of the island's best wine. ☉ *Map H4*

**5 Laganás Bay**  
This is a breeding ground for the endangered loggerhead turtle. These creatures come ashore to lay their eggs on the protected Laganás beach. ☉ *Map H4*

**6 Volímes**  
This mountain village is best known for its traditional textiles and its Venetian Baroque church,

Agía Paraskeví, which has the finest gilded iconostasis screens on the island. ☉ *Map G4*

**7 Navágio Beach**  
This stunning beach is often called Shipwreck Bay because of a freighter that sits partially buried in the sand in this sheltered cove. ☉ *Near Volímes* • *Map G4*

**8 Anafoníttria**  
Zákynthos' patron saint, St Dionýsios, was a monk at the 14th-century monastery of Panagía Anafoníttria, located in this sleepy mountain village. ☉ *Near Volímes* • *Map G4*

This small traditional village is best known for the temple of Artemis, where remains, such as coins and ceramics, were discovered. ☉ *Map H4*

**10 Maherádo**

**1 Mýrtos Bay**  
Widely considered one of the most beautiful bays in the world, Mýrtos Bay boasts exquisite turquoise sea and dazzling white sand. 📍 *Near Divaráta • Map G2*

**2 Sámi**  
With its traditional houses and lively harbour full of tavernas, Sámi is popular with visitors. It is famous for Melissáni lake and Drogaráti cave. 📍 *Map G2*

**3 Argostóli**  
Kefalloniá's capital, Argostóli, was almost entirely destroyed in the 1953 earthquake. It was rebuilt partly in its original Venetian style, and life here revolves around its main square, Plateía Valliánou. 📍 *Map G3*

**4 Lixoúri**  
The island's second-largest community, Lixoúri is an elegant town on the coast of the Pallíki peninsula. It has remained a popular tourist spot since the 19th century. 📍 *Map G3*

**5 Paleókastró**  
This is one of the oldest sites on the island. Excavations here have revealed the remains of a fortress, coins, pottery and 1600-BC Mycenaean tombs. 📍 *Map G3*

**6 Lake Ávythos**  
According to folklore, Lake Ávythos is bottomless. It is a habitat for diverse flora and fauna. 📍 *Near Agios Nikólaos • Map H3*

**7 Skála**  
The remains of Old Skála, which was destroyed in the 1953 earthquake, and a Roman Villa with well-preserved mosaics are worth seeing in this attractive beach-side resort. 📍 *Map H3*

**8 Ássos**  
One of the island's prettiest coastal villages, Ássos has traditional architecture and sandy beaches. A small isthmus joins it to a Venetian castle's remains atop an islet. 📍 *Map G2*

Overlooking the bay, this picturesque fishing harbour, lined by tavernas, has clear water and a long sandy beach. Nearby are the remains of a small 13th-century monastery. 📍 *Map G3*

## TOP 10 Islands and Islets

### 1 Ereíkoussa Island

Characterized by its cypress trees, great beaches and the small town of Pórto where most of its inhabitants live, Ereíkoussa is one of the Diapontian islands and can be reached by boat from Sidári. ☎ *Corfu • Map A1*

### 2 Samothráki Island

The smallest Diapontian island, Samothráki is known for its quiet pace of life. Tiny communities can be found in Benátika and around the port of Plákes. ☎ *Corfu • Map A1*

### 3 Othonoí Island

Othonoí is where Odysseus met Nausika, according to Greek mythology. Offering a peaceful way of life, it is the largest Diapontian island, located between Samothráki and Ereíkoussa. ☎ *Corfu • Map A1*

### 4 Meganíssi Island

Rural Meganíssi is the largest island off Lefkáda. It has quiet beaches and just three villages, including attractive Katoméri and the capital Vathý, which has a harbour lined with yacht moorings. ☎ *Lefkáda • Map H1*

### 5 Madourí Island

Located in the bay off Nydrí, Madourí is a heavily forested island. Its sheltered coastline makes it a popular spot to sail around. The Greek poet Aristotélis Valaoritís (1824–1879) once lived here. ☎ *Lefkáda • Map H1*

### 6 Spárti Island

Spárti is covered with dense forest. Boats on day trips often drop anchor in the shallow water and sheltered coves of its slightly indented coastline. ☎ *Lefkáda • Map H1*

### 7 Diá Island

Sometimes known as Theionísi, Diá island is the source of many legends. The most popular of these is that it was home to a temple dedicated to the Greek god Zeus. ☎ *Off Argostóli, Kefalloniá • Map G3*

### 8 Skorpídi Islet

A small islet off the private Skorpiós island, Skorpídi is known for its wildlife and wide variety of birds. You can take a boat from Nydrí and anchor up for a lovely day out. ☎ *Lefkáda • Map H1*

### 9 Lazaréto Islet

The serene little islet of Lazaréto brings a smile to your face as you pass it by in the harbour of Vathý. It has a pretty whitewashed chapel, set among dense trees. ☎ *Itháki • Map H2*

### 10 Strofádes Islands

Part of the Zákynthos National Sea Park, the Strofádes islands of Arpiá and Stamfáni, plus a few smaller islets, are uninhabited except for the wildlife and a lone monk who is said to live there. ☎ *Near Zákynthos • Map B4*

## TOP 10 Best Beaches

### 1 Paleokastrítsa Beach, Corfu

A favourite of Sir Frederick Adam (see p72), this sandy beach is quiet with just a handful of nearby tavernas. Offshore lies the Liapádes reef, a popular diving and snorkelling spot.

### 2 Myrtilótissa Beach, Corfu

Sheer cliffs and golden sand characterize this horseshoe-shaped beach, which has been described as Europe's most beautiful. It is favoured by naturists because of its seclusion. 📍 West coast • Map A5

### 3 Káthisma Beach, Lefkáda

There are interesting caves and rocks for snorkellers to explore around this west-coast beach. For those who like to take it easy, the sand is soft and the waters, cool. 📍 Kalamítsi • Map G1

### 4 Pórtos Katsíki Beach, Lefkáda

With its horseshoe-shaped bay of golden sand and high cliffs, forested backdrop and curious off-shore rock formations, this is among the most picturesque beaches on Lefkáda (see p61).

### 5 Laganás Beach, Zákynthos

This beach is particularly sandy, making it popular with not only visitors, but also with the endangered loggerhead turtles, the *caretta caretta*, which lay their eggs here. 📍 Map H4

### 6 Megálo Limonári Beach, Meganíssi

Surrounded by forest and with beautiful soft sand, this isolated beach is tucked in a small bay on Meganíssi island. To find it, look out for signposts from Katoméri village (see p61).

### 7 Gidáki Beach, Itháki

With a hiking track as its only access, Gidáki beach is unknown to most visitors and is therefore a great place to relax. Its bay, however, attracts some boats from Vathý during summer.

### 8 Arkoudáki Beach, Paxi

This secluded sandy beach can only be reached by boat and is therefore quiet. It is a favourite spot with people coming ashore from their yachts anchored in the bay. 📍 Near Lákka • Map A2

### 9 Navágio Beach, Zákynthos

World famous, this white sandy beach is protected by soaring cliffs on both sides. Also known as Shipwreck Bay, which refers to the freighter that sits partially buried in the sand, the beach is accessible only by boat (see p74).

### 10 Emblísi Beach, Kefalloniá

Located in a deep bay surrounded by cypress trees and olive groves, this secluded sand and pebble beach is one of the finest here. Its waters are shallow and safe. 📍 Fiskárdo • Map G2

# The Cyclades

WITH QUAIN BLUE AND WHITE HOUSES, windmills and domed churches set against a backdrop of alluring beaches and crystal-clear water, the Cyclades are among the most stunning Greek islands. The villages are often perched on stark mountainsides, while the sea is full of yachts and fishing boats. Located between mainland Greece and the Dodecanese islands, they number 140, of which 24 are inhabited. Some, such as volcanic Santorini, the party island of Mykonos and the group's largest, Náxos, are cosmopolitan holiday destinations, while Ándros, Tinos, Syros and Milos are more traditional.

The name of the island group derives from the word kýklos (circle), because the islands surround the holy island of Delos.

## 1 Delos

An open-air museum, the uninhabited island of Delos is a UNESCO site in its entirety. It has fabulous archaeological remains dating mostly from Hellenistic times, among them a sanctuary, the Sacred Harbour and a huge amphitheatre. The birthplace of Apollo and Artemis, ancient Delos was a major place of worship. The Ionians arrived in 1000 BC, bringing with them the idea of cult worship, followed by the Naxians, the Polykrates and the Athenians. Great wealth preceded abandonment in favour of Athens, but it remains one of Greece's foremost historic sites (*see pp14–15*).

## 2 Ándros

Ándros is the northernmost island in the Cyclades. Life on this largely mountainous island revolves around the capital, Ándros Town, also known as Hóra, which boasts elegant Neo-Classical mansions in its pedestrianized centre, and a fascinating Archaeological Museum. The island's main settlements include Korthí, the inland medieval village of Mesariá, and Gávrio, while ancient Paleópolis lies near the west coast. The harbour wall that once protected it can still be seen just offshore.

## 3 Tínos

This holy island is famous for the church of the Panagía Evangelístria and its miraculous icon of the Virgin Mary, which attracts pilgrims throughout the year. Tínos is an unspoilt, fertile island and one of the most picturesque in the Cyclades. Its landscape is dotted with appealing villages, windmills, hundreds of chapels, and magnificent dovecotes. Its inhabitants are known for their creative skills – marble sculptures and folk art can be seen everywhere. 📍 *Map N5*

## 4 Ermouúpoli, Sýros

Known as the “Queen of the Aegean”, the city of Ermouúpoli on Sýros is the administrative and commercial capital of the Cyclades. In the 19th century it was Greece's leading port and had a thriving shipbuilding industry, which made the island very wealthy. The capital is built in the style of an amphitheatre around a deep harbour, one of several that line the coastline of Sýros. The island is mountainous, interspersed with fertile plains and villages, and cosmopolitan, offering fine beaches and various amenities. 📍 *Map N6*



### Remote Islands

Visiting the more isolated islands is one of the best experiences in the Cyclades. Folégandros is a delight, with its lighthouse, Asprópounta, and tiny blue and white villages. It lies off Síkinos, famous for its squid fishing, which is just off Íos. Sífnos is especially popular with walkers, as is Kéa. Do not miss Anáfi, Kýthnos and Sérifos.

### 5 Páros and Andíparos

Páros is a popular European holiday destination and, as such, offers a huge choice when it comes to tavernas, restaurants and nightspots, especially in the main towns of Paroikía, the capital, and Náoussa. Inland are tiny mountain villages, with the former capital of the island, Léfkes – a charming hamlet of medieval houses and alleyways – being the highest. Nearby Andíparos, with its elegant cafés, centres on its Venetian Kástro and is popular for day trips from Páros. Frequent ferries link the two islands.  Map E4

### 6 Mýkonos

Mýkonos is known for its marvellous beaches. Picturesque Psaroú and Eliá are two of the most popular, while Paradise and

Super Paradise are livelier and popular with nudists. A round-the-clock party island, Mýkonos revolves around its eponymous capital town, an agreeable place of alleyways and stone houses, many now housing restaurants and bars. Do visit Alefkándra, known as Little Venice, and the town's outstanding museums. Inland, the landscape is sprinkled with windmills and villages, full of traditional charm.  Map P6

### 7 Náxos

The centre of the Cycladic civilization during the early Bronze Age (3000–2000 BC), Náxos has a phenomenal history. It was one of the first islands to use natural marble, a feature of the ancient artifacts found at its archaeological sites and the material used for its landmark Portára gateway, said to be the entrance to a 5th-century-BC Temple of Apollo.

Náxos is the largest of the Cyclades, with its bustling capital the most populated. It is an island of citrus groves, beaches and sea caves.  Map Q4

### 8 Mílos and Kímolos

Mílos is famous for being where the *Venus de Milo* statue, now in the Louvre in Paris, was discovered. It is a volcanic island of extraordinary horizontal white rock formations that have created an almost lunar landscape. Wealthy under the Minoans and Mycenaeans, and colonized by the Athenians in the 4th century BC, Mílos is an island of rural villages and beaches today. Its main town is Pláka, believed to be built

on the acropolis of Mílos. About an hour away by boat lies serene Kimolos, home to the endangered monk seal (see p45). 📍 *Map D5*

**9 Santoríni**  
Crescent-shaped Santoríni owes its formation to a massive volcanic eruption that destroyed part of this once-circular island in 1450 BC. The resulting underwater crater has been associated with the legend of the lost city of Atlantis. Santoríni remains at the centre of the South Aegean Volcanic Arc. Inhabited since Minoan times and named by the Venetians in the 13th century, this stunning island of dazzling white villages, museums, black-sand beaches, thermal springs and luxuriant vineyards is a quintessential Greek island. 📍 *Map T1*

**10 Íos**  
In antiquity Íos was famous as being the burial place of the ancient Greek poet Homer, and each year a festival, the Omíra, is held in his honour. This mountainous island is speckled with hundreds of chapels and tiny villages, and its capital, Hóra, is an enchanting conglomeration of white houses, blue-domed churches and courtyards. There is also a continually growing number of tavernas and bars here. The island boasts some of the best beaches in the Cyclades, and has long established itself as a young people's party island. 📍 *Map E5*

## Day Trip from Mýkonos to Delos

### Morning

After a hearty breakfast at your accommodation, head down to the quayside at **Mýkonos Town** and look out for the departure points marked for **Delos** (see pp14–15). There are ferries and many smaller boats to choose from. Timings vary according to the season and the weather conditions, so be sure to check in advance to ensure you arrive in good time. Take refreshments with you as there is a limited choice on the boats and on Delos. Most of the boats leave at around 10am for the 30-minute crossing. The sea can get a bit rough so be prepared. Once aboard, enjoy the sea breeze and your first glimpse of Delos ahead. On disembarking, head for the Maritime Quarter and see the Sacred Harbour, the Theatre Quarter, with its remains of mosaic-rich houses, the Sacred Lake, with its iconic terrace of lion statues, and the Sanctuaries of Apollo and Dionysos. There is a small restaurant in the Sanctuary of Apollo for a quick bite before you head back to Mýkonos.

### Afternoon

Boats tend to leave Delos at 12:30pm, 1:30pm and 3pm, but again be sure to check as timings can vary. If you aim for the 3pm it will give you plenty of time to see the extensive archaeological site on Delos and absorb its atmosphere. Once back on Mýkonos, enjoy a leisurely afternoon siesta before a delicious meal at the taverna on the harbourside.

- 6 Folk Museum, Mýkonos**

- 7 The Harbour**

- 8 Áno Méra**  
 This village, the island's largest after Mýkonos Town, offers a glimpse into the island's past. Stone houses covered with bougainvillea line its alleyways and the monastery of Panagia Tourlianí dominates the skyline. *Central Mýkonos* • *Map P6*
- 9 Moní Panagia Tourlianí**  
 Founded in the 16th century and restored in 1767, this superb monastery is dedicated to the island's protectress. Its white exterior, red-domed roof and a sculpted marble tower, the work of Tíniot craftsmen, have made it a landmark. *Central Mýkonos* • *Map P6* • 22890 71249 • *Open by arrangement*
- 10 Paleokástro**  
 Believed to be the site of an ancient city, Paleokástro lies on a hill in the island's most verdant area. *Central Mýkonos* • *Map P6*

## TOP 10 Sights: Naxos

**1 Naxos Town**  
Dominated by the Protára gateway, Naxos Town is a heady mix of history and modernity. Its Venetian castle and the church of Panagía Myrtidiótissa are well worth a visit. *Map Q4*

**2 Mount Zeus**  
Also known as Mount Zía or Zía Óros, this is the Cyclades' highest mountain at more than 1,000 m (3,300 ft). Well known for its hiking trails. *Map R6*

**3 Chalkí**  
The former capital of Naxos, Chalkí is full of Neo-Classical buildings. It is surrounded by olive groves and its 9th-century church has notable frescoes and well-preserved towers. *Map R5*

**4 Apeíranthos**  
White marble houses dot the hillside of this pretty village. Sights of interest include one of the island's oldest churches, the Panagía Apeíranthos, and four small museums. *Map R5*

**5 Glinádo**  
A charming village of white-washed stone houses with blue painted doors and tiny courtyards full of bougainvillea, Glinádo has been preserved as a traditional Naxiot community. *Map Q5*

**6 Apóllon**  
The fishing village of Apóllon or Apóllonas is the site of an ancient marble quarry. Its

entrance has a huge 6th-century-BC marble statue, Kouros. Tavernas line its sandy beach, popular with swimmers. *Map S4*

**7 Komiakí**  
Komiakí, or Koronída, is one of the island's highest villages and is known for traditional crafts, especially lace. *Map R4*

**8 Melanés Valley**  
Full of olive and citrus trees, this valley has many pretty villages including Kourouchóri, Flerió and Melanés. *Map R5*

**9 Áno Sagrí**  
Windmills and Byzantine churches dot the lush plateau around Áno Sagrí. Its chapel of Ágios Ioánnis Gyroulás is said to be built over the 530 BC Temple of Demeter. Located nearby is the Tower of Somarípa. *Map R5*

**10 Tragéa Valley**  
The Panagía Drosianí church is one of this valley's most memorable sights. Tragéa has one of the Cyclades' largest olive industries. *Map R5*

**4 Ancient Thíra**

**6 Imerovígli**  
This quiet, traditional village provides visitors with a rare

glimpse into everyday life. It has stone houses and chapels and great views of the flooded caldera. ☎ *Map U2*

A hilltop village of white and blue houses built around a Venetian castle, Pýrgos' landmark is the Monastery of Prophítis Ilias. ☎ *Map U2*

**8 Oía**  
Much photographed due to its pretty blue and white houses, Oía is also famous for its sunsets. Near the port is a small maritime museum. ☎ *Map U1*

**9 Kaméni Islets**  
These two uninhabited islets, Néa Kaméni and Palaia Kaméni, appeared in the sea after a volcanic eruption in 1450 BC. They were formed from lava and ash – and are still volcanic. ☎ *Map U2*

**10 Thirassía Island**  
Separated from Santoríni by volcanic activity, Thirassía is a rocky island dotted with small hamlets, such as Manolás, and a few tavernas. ☎ *Map T2*

### 4 Agrári Beach, Mýkonos

### 5 Ágios Geórgios Beach, Santoríni

## Crete

CRETE HAS ALWAYS BEEN *an island that captures the imagination, with some of the world's finest ancient sites, including the palaces of Phaestos and Knossos. The birthplace of Europe's oldest civilization, the enigmatic Minoan culture that flourished over 4,000 years ago, Crete was also ruled by the Romans, Byzantines and Venetians. Cretan resistance against occupation by the Ottoman Turks (1669–1898) and the Germans in WWII is legendary. The largest of the Greek Islands and the fifth-largest in the Mediterranean, mountainous Crete has a distinct culture and its own dialect. Its capital city is the cosmopolitan Irákleio, also known as Heraklion. Chaniá and Réthymno are its other two major towns, while the Samariá gorge is its top natural attraction.*

### 1 Phaestos Palace

One of the great city-state palaces of the Minoan period, this fabulous structure lay hidden for over 3,000 years before being discovered by Italian archaeologist Frederico Halbherr in the late 19th century. The well-preserved sights include the grand staircase and the central courtyard (see pp20–21).

### 2 Palace of Knossos

Knossos was the capital of Minoan Crete and its palace was an architectural marvel. The original palace, dating from about 1900 BC, was destroyed by an earthquake but was quickly rebuilt. The remains were discovered and restored by Sir Arthur Evans in 1878 (see pp22–3).

### 3 Samariá Gorge

Created over millennia by a river running between two mountains, the dramatic Samariá gorge is one of the longest and deepest canyons in Europe. Visitors can walk from the village of Omalós, along the 16-km- (10-mile-) long gorge to the coastal village of Agía Roumeli. Along the way are towering rock faces, springs and chapels, such as Ágios Nikólaos. The area became a national park in 1962, primarily to protect the rare kri-kri goat (see p45) and its natural habitat. ☉ 44 km (27 miles) south of Chaniá • Map D6 • 28210 67179 • Open Apr–Oct: 6am–4pm daily (weather permitting) • Adm

### 4 Irákleio

With a mixture of elegant Venetian mansions, busy streets, a harbour full of fishing boats and squares full of chic restaurants, tavernas

and designer fashion shops, Irákleio is a traditional Greek city with a distinctly modern twist. It is Crete's capital city and its administrative, commercial and cultural hub. At its heart is the pedestrianized Plateía Eleftheríou Venizélou, with the restored 13th-century church of Ágios Márkos. Must-see sights include the Archaeological Museum, which boasts the best collection of Minoan art in the world. ☉ Map E6

### 5 Irákleio Archaeological Museum

This magnificent state-of-the-art museum houses the world's finest collection of Minoan treasures. Among its exhibits are the famous Phaestos Disc found at the Phaestos Palace (see p21). Other exhibits on display are the Snake Goddess figurine and the Bull's Head Rhyton, dating from the 16th-century-BC Palace of Knossos, along with pieces dating from Neolithic through to Roman times (see p22). ☉ Map E6 • 28102 79086 • Open summer: 8am–8pm, 1:30–8pm Mon, winter: 8:30am–3pm daily • Adm • Special ticket available (see p22).

**6 Chaniá** A sprawling fortified city in the foothills of the Lefká Óri mountains, Chaniá was the city-state of Kydonia in ancient times. Along with Phaestos and Knossos, it was one of the most powerful cities during the Minoan period. Decline was followed by renewed importance under the Venetians. Chaniá was the capital of Crete until 1971. Today, life in the city revolves around its scenic harbour and the historic Spíántza Quarter, with its Venetian houses lining cobbled streets, modern restaurants and art galleries. 📍 *Map D6*

**7 Réthymno** With a well-preserved Venetian fortress, picturesque harbour famous for its 13th-century lighthouse, and fish tavernas, Réthymno is a refined holiday destination. One of its elegant Venetian mansions now houses the small Historical and Folk Art Museum. Along with Irákleio, Réthymno is home to the Crete University and a school of philosophy. Once the Greco-Roman city of Rithymna, it was important enough to mint its own coins. The town's crest is based on one of these old coins. 📍 *Map E6 • Historical and Folk Art Museum: Vernadou; 28310 23398; open Mon–Sat; adm*

**8 Górtys** Thought to have been inhabited since Neolithic times, Górtys, or Gortyn, became the powerful capital of Crete, ahead of Phaestos, after the Roman invasion of 65 BC. Its power lasted until AD 7, when invading Arabs destroyed the city. The remains of its citadel and agora (market place), the *praetorium* (governor's house), temples and a cemetery can be visited. A three-aisled basilica, Ágios Títos, dominates the entrance. **9 Royal Villa at Agia Triada** Built during the Neopalatial period of the 16th century BC, this Minoan villa was one of the

The script, known as boustrophedon, has alternate lines written from right to left, then left to right. It uses symbols of the Doric Cretan dialect, dating from around 500 BC.



first palaces to be constructed in much smaller proportions than those of Phaestos and Knossos, which was the fashion of the day. Believed to be a summer residence, it consisted of two wings built to form an L-shape, with courtyards, staircases and workshops. Excavations revealed many artifacts, including clay seals and tablets with Minoan script. Other finds include a black stone harvester vase depicting Neopalatial art (see p25) and a carved boxer rhyton jug, which suggest this was a palace of great wealth. 📍 3 km (2 miles) west of Phaestos, Irákleio • Map E6 • 27230 22448 • Open 8:30am–3pm Tue–Sun • Adm • Special ticket available for the Villa and the Phaestos Palace (see p20)

**10 Palace of Malia**  
A little inland from the bustle of one of Crete's most popular holiday hotspots are the archaeological remains of Malia, one of the island's most prosperous Minoan cities. The palace, noted for its layout, was constructed around a courtyard with a central altar. It has raised paths, known as processional ways, leading to its west entrance. Inside there is a labyrinth of crypts that were probably used for cult worship. Important treasures unearthed here include the famous *kernos*, believed to be a vessel used for sacrifices. 📍 Malia, Irákleio • Map E6 • 28970 31597 • Open 8:30am–3pm Tue–Sun • Adm

## A Hike Along the Samariá Gorge

🕒 Have a hearty breakfast, pack plenty of snacks, a water bottle (which can be replenished in the gorge), sun cream and plasters before heading off on this approximately 6-hour trip. Wear light clothing but take a jumper as it can be cold at higher altitudes, and always wear a hat. You will need sturdy walking shoes.

Fully prepared, head for the village of **Omalós**. The best option, if you plan to hike the length of the gorge, is to go by bus because you'll be tired going home, but if you intend hiking just a short distance and returning to Omalós, there is a car park. Opening times can vary according to the weather, so be sure to check. Aim to arrive early.

From Omalós, make your way across the plateau before taking a sharp descent down the snaking path known as Xylóskalo. It is around 2 km (1 mile) long. Follow the sign-posted route, which will take you past chapels like the tiny **Ágios Nikólaos** and **Óssia María**, which has some fine 14th-century frescoes. You will pass the deserted village of **Samariá** and a landmark spot known as Sideróportes, where the path considerably narrows between towering mountainsides. Heading down the gorge, you will pass by the old village of **Agía Rouméli**, before reaching the new Agía Rouméli on the coast, about 6 hours since you started. Take a ferry to **Chóra Sfakíon**, where there are buses.

- 5** **Mátala**

Paleochóra's landmark is the remains of a Venetian castle destroyed by pirates. The village stands on a headland that divides the beach in two. The resort is popular with wind-surfers. ☉ *West coast* • *Map D6*

One of the cleanest beaches on Crete, this long stretch of golden sand is lapped by turquoise sea. It is known for its magical sunsets. Nearby tavernas provide refreshment. ☉ *West coast • Map D6*

**2 Gramvoússa Peninsula**  
Along with Falásarna, there are many isolated and peaceful beaches and sandy coves dotting the coast of this unspoiled peninsula. Most are only accessible only by boat. ☉ *West coast • Map D6*

**3 Vái Beach**  
With its wild date-palm grove, perhaps Europe's largest, and its golden sand dunes, Vái beach is among the island's most beautiful. ☉ *East coast • Map F6*

**4 Amníssos Beach**  
The main beach of Irákleio is a stretch of golden sand with lots of charm. It is famous for having been the port of Knossos, and archaeological remains have been discovered here. ☉ *Map E6*

**5 Siteía Beach**  
Awarded a Blue Flag for cleanliness, this sandy beach lines a deep horseshoe-shaped bay and is near the picturesque Siteía village. It is popular for windsurfing. ☉ *North coast • Map F6*

**6 Sísi's Beaches**  
Sísi village has two beaches, one a secluded stretch of sand in the small Avláki bay and the other just off the harbour near tavernas and bars. ☉ *East coast • Map F6*

**7 Préveli Beach**  
The Kourtalióti river meets the sea at Préveli, where the green river, blue sea, date palms and "Greek bamboo" (calamus reeds) create a tropical oasis feel. ☉ *South coast • Map E6*

**8 Stavros Beach**  
Tucked in a sandy cove, this unspoiled beach is best known as being one of the locations for the film *Zorba the Greek*. There are only a few small tavernas. ☉ *North coast • Map D6*

**9 Réthymno Beach**  
Although usually crowded because its main section is in Réthymno city, this beach is nonetheless beautiful. It is about 20 km (13 miles) long and dotted with palm trees and tavernas. ☉ *North coast • Map E6*

**10 Mýrtos Beach**  
Surrounded by citrus groves and banana plantations, the secluded beach of Mýrtos is an idyllic spot on the island. It is sandy, with a few pebbles. ☉ *South coast • Map F6*

## TOP 10 Islands and Islets

- 1 Gávdos Island**  
This cedar- and pine-covered island has the distinction of being Greece's southernmost boundary. It has quaint villages and beaches. According to Homer's *The Odyssey*, the nymph Calypso lived here. 📍 *Off Sfakiá • Map D6*
- 2 Día Island**  
This island is a nature reserve for the rare Cretan goat, the kri-kri (see p45). It boasts excellent waters for swimming and snorkelling, coves to explore and a church to visit. 📍 *Off Irákleio • Map E6*
- 3 Dragonáda Island**  
Remains of ancient habitation and early-Christian tombstones have been found on this island in the Dionysádes archipelago. Now uninhabited, it is covered with vegetation. 📍 *Off Siteía • Map F6*
- 4 Koufoníssi Island**  
Characterized by its desert landscape of fine sand dotted with tamarisk trees, this deserted island has archaeological remains, now being excavated, that suggest it was inhabited in ancient times. 📍 *Off Goúddouras • Map F6*
- 5 Chryssí Island**  
An island of volcanic rock and sand dunes, Chryssí is uninhabited. However, it has a well-preserved 700-year-old church, Ágios Nikólaos, an ancient port and remains from the Minoan period to explore. 📍 *Off Ierápetra • Map E6*
- 6 Paximádia Island**  
Comprising two small rocky islets, Paximádia island was once named the Islets of Dionýsoi, after Dionysos, the god of wine. Today, they are a popular boat-trip destination from Mátala. 📍 *Off Mátala • Map E6*
- 7 Elafoníssi Islet**  
Reached by crossing a reef, this scenic islet is covered with trees and has beaches made up of tiny coral fragments, which give them a pinkish hue. It is surrounded by shallow aquamarine water. 📍 *Off Paleochóra • Map D6*
- 8 Spinalónga Island**  
An imposing Venetian fortification dominates this lush island, making it a popular day-trip spot. Ferry boats dock at its picturesque quayside, allowing visitors to explore the island. 📍 *Off Ágios Nikólaos • Map F6*
- 9 Gramvoússa Island**  
This small unspoiled island off the Gramvoússa peninsula is a habitat for wildlife. In Venetian times it was a key defense location. The former stronghold now attracts day-trippers in summer. 📍 *Off Kastélli Kissámou • Map D6*
- 10 Psíra Island**  
This barren island traces its history back to Minoan times, when it was inhabited and lay off what is believed to have been a harbour lined with merchants' homes. 📍 *Off Ágios Nikólaos • Map F6*







# The Dodecanese

**S**CATTERED ALONG THE COAST OF TURKEY, *the Dodecanese is the most southerly group of Greek islands, its hot climate, pretty whitewashed villages and fine beaches attracting many visitors. The largest islands are Rhodes, Kárpáthos and Kos, all of which are popular holiday spots. Many smaller islands and islets make up the rest of the group. The history of the Dodecanese spans millennia, from the Dorians, who settled here in ancient times, through the Knights Hospitallers, the Ottomans and the Italians – all of whom left an indelible mark on the look and culture of the islands.*

## 1 Rhodes Old Town

The Palace of the Grand Masters and the Street of the Knights are two of the fabulous sights to see in this city, which dates largely from the time of the Knights Hospitallers. Bounded by imposing city walls, it also has Ottoman mosques and a Jewish Quarter. The city offers a choice of restaurants, museums and churches, such as the lavish Panagía tou Kástrou (see pp10–11).

## 2 Monastery of St John, Pátmos

Known as the Jerusalem of the Aegean, Pátmos is renowned as the place where St John wrote the biblical *Book of Revelation* (or *Apocalypse*) in AD 95. At its heart is the UNESCO World Heritage Site, Hóra: a collection of Byzantine monasteries and chapels, including the Monastery of St John. Nearby is a small church, Agía Ánna, and the Holy Cave of the Apocalypse, the spot where St John is said to have written the work (see pp12–13).

## 3 Kos

The home of Hippocrates, the father of medicine (see p33), Kos is the third-largest island in the group. It dates from Neolithic times and was a founding member of the Dorian Hexapolis (see p32) in 700 BC. Life today revolves around its capital, Kos Town, which is dominated by the 15th-century Castle of the Knights. Boulevards lined with cafés and chic restaurants sit beside ancient ruins. A marina full of yachts and a vibrant nightlife characterize the modern town, created after an earthquake destroyed the old town in 1933. Map X2

## 4 Léros

With its pretty valleys and slow pace of life, Léros is a great place to unwind. It tends to attract writers, musicians and artists, who have helped create its identity as a cultural centre. Its capital, Agía Marína, ascends from the harbourside through alleyways of Neo-Classical buildings and tiny white cottages to a hilltop dominated by the remains of a Knights' castle. Lakkí, the island's main port, is one of the largest natural harbours in the Mediterranean. Map F4

## 5 Kálymnos


Several remains of ancient settlements testify to Kálymnos's long history. Be sure to visit its Archaeological Museum, where locally found Neolithic, Minoan and Mycenaean figurines are on display. Its capital is Póthia, a picturesque town where brightly coloured houses of local spongefishers line the deep harbour in amphitheatre-fashion. A church dedicated to Christ the Saviour, notable for its beautiful frescoes and iconostasis, is Póthia's principal landmark. Except for two valleys with tiny villages, the rest of the isle is mountainous.

**6 Astypálea**  
The small island of Astypálea, which means "old city", was ruled by a Venetian family for several hundred years. They gave it the style it retains to this day. Its capital, Hóra, has many white houses with brightly painted windows and doors that dot the landscape as it rises towards a fortified castle. Astypálea's villages include the growing resort of Maltezána, while its coastline has coves that are popular with yacht owners. Important finds from the island's prehistoric period are housed in the Archaeological Museum. 📍 *Map F5* • *Archaeological Museum: 22430 61500; open Mar–Nov: 6–8:30pm, Tue–Sun*

**7 Sými**  
A popular destination for holidays and day trips from Rhodes, Sými is a mountainous island with villages, beaches and

bustling harbours to explore. The streets of its capital, Sými Town, and its main port of Gäios are lined with stately mansions from the 19th century, when the island had a thriving boat-building industry. Said to be the birthplace of the ancient Greek goddesses the Three Graces (*see box*), and taking its name from Syme, Poseidon's wife, Sými has a history spanning millennia. Its museum has some important artifacts. 📍 *Map G5* • *Archaeological Museum: 22460 49283; open 8:30am–3pm, Tue–Sun*

**8 Chálki**  
Chálki is a small island that revolves around its only community, the 200 or so inhabitants of Emborió. It is reached by boat from Rhodes. Emborió boasts the highest bell tower in the Dodecanese, on the golden-stone Ágios Nikólaos church. In

### The Three Graces

In Greek and Roman mythology, the Three Graces were ancient goddesses. Also known as the Charites, they were believed to be the daughters of Zeus, the god of thunder, and his wife Eurynome. The youngest, Aglaea, was the goddess of beauty and Hephaestus' wife. Her sisters, Euphrosyne and Thalia, were the goddesses of joy and good cheer.



the past, Chálki had flourishing copper-ore mining and sponge-fishing industries but it now relies only on tourism. Visitors can enjoy its rural feel, its beaches, such as Ftenágia and Trachiá, and the deserted Chorió village, with its Knights' castle. Map G5

**9 Kárpathos**  
The group's second-largest island, Kárpathos is characterized by its indented coastline, sandy beaches and high mountains. The highest is Kalí Límni, at 1,214 m (3,983 ft). The capital, Pigádia, also known as Kárpathos Town, is cosmopolitan, with a mix of hotels and restaurants. The island boasts bustling resorts, such as Ammopí and Lefkós. Thriving traditional rural villages, such as Menetés, where artifacts have been discovered from the Middle Ages, and Óthos, famous for its traditional Kárpathian houses are definitely worth a visit. Map X5

**10 Níssyros**  
A volcanic island, Níssyros is known for the unique species of flora and fauna that grow in its mineral-rich soil. It is possible to visit the 260-m- (853-ft-) wide crater of the extinct volcano at Polyvótis, in the isle's centre. Villages and towns, including Mandráki, the pretty capital and port, lie in the lower coastal plains. According to mythology, Níssyros and Kos were once one island (see p38). Map F5

## Day Trip from Rhodes to Chálki

Although the Dodecanese islands are strung out and the only way to see all the islands is to sail or take ferries over several days, it is possible to take a day trip from one island to another. A popular route is from **Rhodes Town** (see p107) to **Emborió** on **Chálki**. Boats also leave from **Skála Kameírou** (see p110) on Rhodes to Chálki.

### Morning

After a good breakfast, head for **Mandráki harbour** in Rhodes New Town. You will need to get there early as most boats and hydrofoils to Chálki leave at about 9am. It is a good idea to check the timings a day before at a travel agency. Hop on board for the 2-hour sail that takes you along the coastline, past the islet of **Alímia** to the gorgeous harbour of **Emborió**.

Refreshments are usually available on board. Upon disembarking, take time to walk along the harbourside and enjoy a delicious lunch at one of the tavernas that line the harbour.

### Afternoon

Take a taxi to see the imposing crusader castle that sits high above the harbour. It is worth the trip and the view across towards Rhodes is rewarding in itself. You can also visit the island's churches and monasteries, such as the **Moní Agiou Ioánnou Prodrómou**, which has breathtaking icons. Refresh yourself at Ftenagia Restaurant near **Ftenágia beach** (see p60), before making your way back to the harbour for the return crossing.

**1 Asklipeió**  
Home to some of the finest 17th-century frescoes, the Dormition of the Virgin church has put this pretty village on the map. 📍 *Inland from Líndos • Map U5*

**2 Ancient lalyssos**  
This mountainside city was part of Rhodes' ancient city-state and retained its importance during Byzantine, Knights and Ottoman times. It is the site of Moní Filerímou. 📍 *Near Triánda • Map V4*

**3 Líndos Acropolis**  
The ancient acropolis and a 3rd-century BC temple dedicated to the goddess Athena are the main remains of a great Doric city-state formed by Líndos, lalyssos and Kámeiros. 📍 *Líndos • Map U5*

**4 Ancient Kámeiros**  
This fascinating site from the 5th century BC is one of the finest examples of Doric city planning. See remnants of a temple, dwellings and public baths. 📍 *Kámeiros, near Kalavárda • Map U4*

**5 Petaloúdes**  
Known as the Valley of Butterflies, this area has numerous trees that secrete a vanilla-scented gum, used for incense. It attracts thousands of butterflies and moths. 📍 *Petalouúdes • Map U4*

**6 Monólithos**  
This quiet village is famous for a 15th-century fortress built on a sheer rock by Grand Master

d'Aubusson of the Knights Hospitallers. It has a lovely beach, Fournoi. 📍 *Near Fournoi • Map T5*

**7 Profitis Ilias**  
The densely forested Profitis Ilias mountain was a natural park under Italian rule. It is famous for its nature trails and walks today. 📍 *Inland from Kalavárda • Map U5*

**8 Moní Filerímou**  
A place of worship for over 2,000 years, the Moní Filerímou is famous for the Our Lady of Filérimos complex of four chapels. 📍 *Near Triánda • Map V4*

**9 Skála Kameírou**  
This once major ancient city port has one of the most impressive castle ruins on the island – the 16th-century Castle of Kritinía. 📍 *Map T5*

**10 Émbona**  
Characterized by endless vineyards, Émbona is a delightful traditional mountain village. 📍 *Inland from Skála Kameírou • Map U5*

### 1 **Pigádia (Kárpathos Town)**

Tavernas line the harbourside of this modern capital, which has grown from being an ordinary port town to a centre of finance and commerce. The adjacent Vróndis bay has a lovely beach.

### 2 **Menetés**

This charming village's main street is lined with pastel-coloured Neo-Classical houses and interspersed by tiny alleyways of steep steps. 📍 *Map X6*

### 3 **Arkása**

Arkása is a bustling resort, but it is also the site of the ancient city of Arkesia. You can see ruins of the 4th-century church of Agía Anastasia, where important archaeological finds were discovered. 📍 *Map X6*

### 4 **Apéri**

A village of elegant white-washed mansions and squares that sit amphitheatre-fashion in the foothills of Mt Kalí Límni, Apéri was the capital of Kárpathos until 1892. 📍 *Map X5*

### 5 **Óthos**

A pretty village of traditional Karpathian houses, Óthos is the island's highest community at 450 m (1,500 ft). It is known for its red wine and festivals. 📍 *Map X5*

### 6 **Diáfani**

A picturesque village that revolves around its intermittently busy harbour, Diáfani is popular with day-trippers. It offers sandy beaches and family tavernas.

### 7 **Ólympos**

With its working windmills, painted stone houses and locals in traditional dress speaking a Dorian dialect, Ólympos is like a living museum. 📍 *Map X4*

### 8 **Ammopí**

The Ammopí resort is best known for its beaches, which are among the best on the island. Mikrí Ammopí occupies a crescent of golden sand. Megáli Ammopí and Votsalákia are also fine. 📍 *Map Y6*

### 9 **Lefkós**

This pretty village, a top holiday spot, boasts a series of white sandy bays nestled in deep coves, crystal-clear water and a backdrop of pine trees.

## TOP 10 Sights: Kos

### 1 Kos Town

The 16th-century Castle of the Knights and remains such as the 3rd-century BC agora, dominate the capital city. Restaurants along palm-lined avenues give it a cosmopolitan feel. Map Y1

### 2 Asklepieíon

Once a centre of healing, Asklepieíon is one of Greece's most important historic sites. See remains of the 3rd-century Temple of Apollo, Hippocrates' garden and Roman baths. Map Y1

### 3 Ziá

Preserved as a model village, Ziá has a Byzantine church and stone houses lining cobbled pathways. It is one of the Asfendiou Villages (see p45). Map X2

### 4 Paleó Pýli

Spectacularly perched on a clifftop, with its walls built into the rock, this abandoned fortified town is famous for its Byzantine churches. Map X2

### 5 Kardámena

One of Greece's liveliest resorts, Kardamena, a former fishing village, offers watersports, boat trips, nightclubs, bars and tavernas. Map X2

### 6 Mastichári

Boasting some of the best beaches on the west coast, this pretty fishing harbour is popular with locals. Its tavernas serve fabulous fish. Map X2

### 7 Andimácheia

Known for its windmills and traditional houses, this village is dominated by the 14th-century Castle of Andimácheia built by the Knights Hospitallers as a prison. Map X2

### 8 Kéfalos

An elevated village of white-washed houses with cobbled pathways descending to the beach, Kéfalos is home to the ruined Castle of the Knights. Map W2

### 9 Kamári

With its volcanic backdrop and soft sandy beach, known as Paradise beach, this village is a popular holiday spot. Resorts and restaurants line its waterfront. Map W2

### 10 Tigáki

Popular with ornithologists, Tigáki is known for its abundance of wetland bird species, which flock to its salt lakes. The village also has sandy beaches and shallow waters, making it safe for children. Map X1

## TOP 10 Beaches and Islets

### 1 Psilí Ámmos Beach, Pátmos

A long golden-sand beach dotted with trees and sandwiched between turquoise sea and a mountainous backdrop, this is the best beach on the island of Pátmos. Accessibility is difficult, so it rarely hosts more than a handful of sunbathers (see p60).

### 2 Arginónta Beach, Kálymnos

A forested hillside descends almost to the water's edge here, gently giving way to the sand and pebble Arginónta beach. Tavernas are located in a village nearby.

### 3 Katsadiás Beach, Lipsí

A series of sandy coves lead to the beautifully wide sand and shingle Katsadiás beach. It is a popular anchorage for yachts due to its seclusion, shelter and shallow water.

### 4 Tría Marmária Beach, Astypálea

These three beaches are known by a single name. Each is horseshoe-shaped and secluded, enclosed by a rugged landscape and deep bays of azure water.

### 5 Ágios Antónis Beach, Tílos

High rugged mountains plunge to meet this sandy beach and its crystal-clear blue bay. The view is dramatic.

### 6 Póntamos Beach, Chálki

Chálki has several beautiful beaches, including Ftenágia and Dýo Yialí, but Póntamos is the only one you do not need a boat to reach. Golden sand and shallow water make this beach ideal for children.

This tiny islet has one of the best beaches in the Dodecanese. The long beach, with soft sand and shallow waters, is popular with day trippers.

## The Northeast Aegean Islands

A COLLAGE OF ANCIENT RUINS, *fabulous beaches, quaint villages and lush countryside*, this archipelago is one of the least touched by modern-day tourism. The group comprises the larger islands of *Límnos*, with its elegant capital *Mýrina*, *Lésvos*, famous for its olives, *Híos*, which is both beautiful and vibrant, *Sámos*, known for its potent Muscat wine, and quiet, unspoilt *Ikária*. The group also includes *Thássos*, inhabited since the Stone Age and with a tourism-oriented present, and undeveloped *Samothráki*, both up near the Macedonian coast. The islands share a landscape of rugged mountains, indented coastlines and glorious beaches. Tiny islets dot the surrounding waters, including *Fóurni*, *Ágios Efstrátios*, *Psará* and the wildlife haven of *Andipsara*.



## 1 Néa Moní, Híos

Pride of the Northeast Aegean Islands, this once wealthy 11th-century monastery is considered one of the finest examples of Macedonian Renaissance art and architecture in the world (see pp16–17).

## 2 Vathý, Sámos

The capital of Sámos, Vathý is an attractive town that hugs the base of the island's deepest bay. Its narrow, cobbled lanes are lined with red-roofed Neo-Classical mansions, while the more modern area is a shoppers' delight. Beyond are lush mountains with valleys of vineyards. Also known as Sámos Town, Vathý and its surrounding villages are famous for their golden, sweet Muscat wine. Its archaeological museum has a rich collection of artifacts, including the famous 580 BC *koúros* (male nude statue). Map F4 • *Archaeological Museum of Sámos: Kapetán Gymnasiárchou Katevéni, Vathý; 22730 27469; open 8:30am–3pm Tue–Sun; adm*

links with the Cyclades. In the 7th century BC, settlers from Páros colonized parts of Thássos and, with its natural gold and marble resources, the island has known a history of wealth and power. Today, this pine-covered island of white beaches, ancient ruins and a coastline of deep bays is a popular package holiday destination. Its inland villages offer a glimpse of the past. Map E1

## 3 Pythagóreo and Heraion, Sámos

The town of Pythagóreo is a popular tourist spot but beyond the tavernas lining its harbour, visitors will find vestiges of a centuries-old civilization. Nearby is the Sanctuary of Heraion, said to be where Hera, the goddess of fertility, was cult worshipped (see pp18–19).

## 5 Fourni

While almost every family on Fourni owns a fishing boat, few own a car, which probably explains why activity centres around its bustling harbourside.

It is here where most of the Fourni residents live and work, and where visitors can find small tavernas and some excellent shops. An island of cliffs, long stretches of sandy beach and deep bays that once made it a pirates'

## 4 Thássos

This almost circular island has remains from the Bronze Age that suggest it had strong

paradise, this is a popular day-trip destination from the nearby islands of Sámos, Pátmos and Ikaría. Map F4

**6 Lésvos**  
The third largest Greek island, Lésvos revolves around its capital, the elegant Mytilíni. Impressive churches and mansions line its harbourside. The town of Agiásos is considered the island's most picturesque and is famous for owning an icon believed to have been painted by St Luke. Villages of interest include Ypsiloú, situated near a fossilized forest and an extinct volcano. Lésvos, or Lesbos as it is often referred to, is most famous as being the birthplace of Sappho, the ancient female poet who wrote erotic poems to other women. 📍 *Map Q1*

**7 Límnos**  
In Greek mythology, Límnos is credited with being where Hephaestus, the god of metal-working, landed after being hurled out of Olympus by his angry father Zeus. A volcanic

### Sanctuary of the Great Gods, Samothráki

This sanctuary dates from Pan-Hellenic times and was the most important religious site for cult worship in ancient Aeolia, Thrace and Macedonia. Followers included the Spartan leader Lysander. The sanctuary grew during the Hellenistic era. Today, its remains include a cult initiation room and an amphitheatre.

island, Límnos, or Lemnos, is largely flat with vineyards of lava soil sloping towards wide, sandy beaches. Its capital is Mýrina, a town of Neo-Classical and Ottoman buildings and cobbled streets, dominated by its imposing Venetian *kástro* (castle). The island is known for its outstanding wine and herbal honey. 📍 *Map E1*

**8 Ikaría**  
Ikaría is named after Ikaros, the foolhardy son of ancient craftsman Daedalus. According to legend, Ikaros fell to his death after flying too close to the sun in artificial wings. It has been inhabited since Neolithic times, and was part of the Genoese Aegean Empire and later the Ottoman Empire until its independence in 1912. Once a favourite haunt of pirates, evident in the defensive layout of its villages, Ikaría has rich soil

which produces excellent wines. Its residents are known for their longevity. Map F4

**9 Psará and Andípsara**  
 Psará is best known for its heroic Freedom or Death flag to which Psariots have been famously faithful in the face of battle. The most celebrated stance was in 1824 when, faced with the Ottoman invasion, residents blew both themselves and their invaders up with gunpowder. A poem, *The Destruction of Psará*, was written by Greek poet Dionýsios Solomós to mark the event. Psará's neighbour is the uninhabited Andípsara island. An important environmental and wildlife sanctuary, many interesting birds roost here, including Eleonora's falcon and the Mediterranean shearwater. Off Híos • Map E3

**10 Samothráki**  
 With the 1,600-m- (5,250-ft-) high Mt Fengári, hot thermal springs, olives groves, forests of oak and chestnut and two spectacular waterfalls, Samothráki has one of the most dramatic landscapes of all the East Aegean islands. At its heart is the capital Hóra, an elegant town of squares and cobbled streets. Nearby is the ancient capital of the island, Palaiópolis, and the remains of the Sanctuary of the Great Gods. Map E1

## Day Trip to Fourni

### Morning

Fourni can be reached easily by ferry from **Vathy** harbour or **Pátmos** harbour on Sámos and **Ágios Kirykos** on Ikaría. Fourni Ferries and Greek Ferries are two of the companies serving the island. Departure and return times, as well as prices, vary, so do check in advance. After a hearty breakfast, head to the port of your choice. Most ferries leave between 9am and 10am and crossing times are short (under 20 minutes from Ikaría). Ferries pull into Fourni's harbour, a lively place of working fishermen, who mingle with visitors and local families going about their daily business. Promenade cafés offer the chance of a mid-morning coffee and snack. From here, head into Fourni town which centres around its main square, linked with the harbour by a single tree-lined street. Take time to admire the traditional Eastern Aegean architecture and shop along the agorá, known locally as the "shopping mile". Be sure to stop for lunch in one of the fish tavernas for which Fourni is famous.

### Afternoon

After lunch, take a short walk to **Kambí**, famous for its windmills, and **Psili Ámmos**, where there are some fine beaches and bays to explore. Alternatively, head north by car or boat to the small, sleepy village of **Chrisomiliá**, where life has changed little in many decades, before heading back to the harbour for your return crossing.

## TOP 10 Sights: Híos

**1 Híos Town**  
With a history that has seen prosperity under the Genoese, a massacre by the Ottomans and huge earthquake destruction, Híos is now an attractive and modern capital. *Map L5*

**2 Avgónyma**  
One of the most attractive hillside villages on the island, Avgónyma has elegantly restored houses and is home to many Greek-Americans. *Map K5*

**3 Moní Mouúndon**  
This 16th-century monastery is known for its well-preserved murals, including the famous *Salvation of Souls on the Ladder*. It is only open to the public for its festival every 29 August. *Map K4*

**4 Volissós**  
This picturesque village, with restored stone houses arranged in amphitheatre-fashion around a mountain, is dominated by a ruined Byzantine castle. *Map K4*

**5 Kámbos**  
Wealthy merchants and nobles once had summer mansions in Kámbos, before Híos' destruction in 1822. Citrus groves surround this popular area. *Map L5*

**6 Vrontádos**  
Known for its landmark windmills,

this village hugs the shore of a bay. Fishing boats line its quayside. Sights include the Moní Agíou Stefánou monastery. *Map L5*

**7 Mastic Villages**  
Known as *mastihohória* or "mastic villages", these 20 or so fortified settlements, including Mestá, Pýrgi and Olýmbi, are so called due to the lucrative mastic gum industry. *Map K6*

**8 Mestá**  
Mesta has one of the finest examples of defensive architecture for which the mastic villages are known. Its outer stone buildings join to create a wall. Its castle and churches are also worth visiting. *Map K6*

**9 Pýrgi**  
Named after a medieval tower that stands in the village, Pýrgi is best known for its painted houses. Many façades are decorated with the grey and white geometric pattern known as *xystá*. *Map K6*

**10 Olýmbi**  
With its fortress-like layout whereby the whole village is contained within a wall, the only entrance being the Kato Porta watchtower, Olýmbi is regarded as a medieval monument. *Map K6*



## TOP 10 Sights: Lésvos

### 1 Mytilíni Town

The capital of Lésvos, Mytilíni has a multi-cultural feel, with a selection of fine international restaurants, waterfront bars, museums, *belle époque* churches and Venetian and Ottoman mansions. Map S2

### 2 Mithymna (Mólyvos)

Dominated by its Byzantine castle, this village, locally known as Mólyvos, is characterized by its colourful stone houses and harbour. Mithymna is believed to be the birthplace of ancient poet Arion. Map R1

### 3 Moní Ypsilou

Founded in the 12th century, this sprawling monastery sits on top of an extinct volcano, Mt Órdymnos. It has a superb collection of religious icons and an intricate wood ceiling in its *katholikon* (main church). Map Q2

### 4 Agiásos

Famous as a centre for pottery (still practiced today), this picturesque village is a labyrinth of tiny lanes lined with stone houses. Its church dates from the 12th century. Map R2

### 5 Sykaminiá

Perched on Mt Lepétymnos' slopes, life in this village of red and white houses revolves around its harbour. Strátis Myrivílis, author of the novel *The Mermaid Madonna* which is set on Lésvos, was born here. Map R1

### 6 Sigrí

A quiet harbour, Sigrí boasts a petrified forest – fossils of trees buried under lava for three million years. Map Q2

### 7 Ándissa

An unspoilt village, Ándissa lies near the site of a former city destroyed in 168 BC by the Romans. Life centres around its café-lined square. Map Q2

### 8 Mantamádos

This village of paved squares and stone houses is famous for its pottery and a rare icon of the saint Taxiarch Archangel Michael displayed in its monastery, the Moní Taxiarchón. Map S1

### 9 Kalloní

Situated at the crossroads for routes to and from the main towns, this hillside village is famous for its sardines. Map R2

### 10 Pétra

A once sleepy village, Pétra is becoming a popular holiday spot due to its wide beach and shallow water. A volcanic monolith dominates its shore. Map R1

- 1 Elínda Beach, Híos**  
This is a wonderful secluded beach of fine, golden sand and crystal-clear water within a deep bay. The surrounding hills protect the bay from strong winds.

- 2 Mávros Gialós, Híos**  
Also known as Mávra Vólia, this beach lines a bay of turquoise waters. It has black pebbles, which were created by the lava of a nearby volcano and worn smooth by the sea over time.

- 3 Kokkári Beach, Sámos**  
Catching strong winds, Kokkári is one of the islands' best beaches for windsurfing. The pebbled beach lies next to a tourist resort, which has a variety of amenities. ☉ *North coast • Map F4*
- 4 Mykáli Beach, Sámos**

- 5 Fóurni Island**

Widely regarded as one of the most beautiful harbours in the Greek Islands, this richly forested bay of pine and olive trees has two sandy beaches, clear waters and unusual rock formations.

- 10 Ánaxos Beach, Lésvos**  
Looking across the bay towards Mólivos, this lively beach is long, sandy and lined with bars and tavernas. There are resorts nearby, making it popular with tourists. ☉ *Pétra • Map R1*

## The Sporádes and Évvia

THE SPORÁDES, GREEK FOR “SCATTERED”, dot the Aegean Sea in an irregular fashion. Although some isles were inhabited in antiquity, they only really came to the fore in modern times as a haunt of the rich and famous. There are 24 islands, of which five are inhabited. These are Skiáthos, which became legendary in the 1960s for the stories of celebrities seen partying on expensive yachts, the holiday island of Skópelos and the quieter Skýros, Alónissos and Peristéra. All five islands are famous for their beaches and vineyards. Huge and unspoilt, Évvia has a long maritime history. In fact, its ports were among Greece’s wealthiest in the 19th century.

### 1 Skiáthos

Its 44-km (30-mile) coast is lined, almost exclusively, with soft sandy beaches that have made Skiáthos a popular holiday destination. The most famous beach is Koukounariés, where luxury yachts moor. A good range of hotels, restaurants and bars has steadily grown to cater to visitors, especially in the south, but despite this the island has managed to retain its rural charm. Inland, it has forests of pine, olive groves and mountains, with rural villages, churches and deserted monasteries dotting the landscape. Map M1

### 2 Skiáthos Town

The main port and capital of Skiáthos island, this bustling place still retains a timeless quality. Its restaurants and bars have somehow managed to blend in with their surroundings of red-roofed stone buildings, churches, cobbled lanes and courtyards. The town's harbour, once an important shipbuilding centre, lies between two hills. At its entrance is a pine-covered peninsula. The skyline of Skiáthos Town is dominated by churches, including the island's cathedral of Trión Lerarchón. Be sure to see the old quarter of Limniá, with its period merchants' houses. Map M1

### 3 Skópelos

Lush pine forests cover the island's two peaks, Délfí and Paloúki, and valleys of citrus groves, orchards and endless vineyards yield the delicious fruits and wines the island is famous for. Skópelos has many bays and fabulous sandy beaches, including the stunning beach of Limnonári. The main communities are located in Skópelos Town, Glóssa and the small port of AgnónDas. There are also hamlets with enchanting farmhouses, known as *kalývia*. Map M1

### 4 Skópelos Town

The capital of Skópelos and its main port, Skópelos Town lies in a deep bay with traditional mansions and more than a hundred churches built in amphitheatre style. They, and the town's cobbled lanes, ascend to a hilltop *kástro* (fortress). The view from this Venetian castle is spectacular. The town is also the commercial hub of the island, its fishing harbour a hive of activity. It is known for having some of the best fish restaurants on the island. Map M1

### Aléxandros Papadiamántis

One of Greece's most famous writers, Aléxandros Papadiamántis (1851–1911) was born on Skiáthos. His works, written in the country's then official language of Katharevousa, feature Skiáthos as their backdrop. They include the acclaimed *The Murderess* and the serialized *Merchants of the Nations*. He died a recluse on the island.

### 5 Alónissos

Alónissos, the third largest of the Sporádes, is relatively untouched by tourism. Its 3,000 or so residents live in or around Patitíri and Paleá Alónissos, with only a handful living in its more rugged interior. Life here revolves around farming and working the vineyards. The island is known for its marine park, which offers protection to rare and endangered animal species, including the monk seal (see p45). The isle's craggy limestone coastline and nearby islets are a natural habitat for the seal. 🗺 Map N1

### 6 Patitíri

Patitíri is the capital and main port of Alónissos, replacing the nearby old capital, known as Hóra. Its picturesque lanes are lined with traditional white houses that have red roofs and courtyards. Patitíri was built after Hóra was destroyed in the 1965 earthquake. The town radiates

from the harbour, where tavernas line the seafront, fishing and pleasure craft bob in the water and ferries leave from the quay-side to nearby islands. 🗺 Map N1

### 7 Skýros

A dramatic rock formation with slopes covered in white houses greets you on approaching Skýros. The largest of the Sporádes, it has mythological links to Achilles and King Theseus. It was colonized by Athenians, conquered by Macedonians and Romans and used as a place of exile in Byzantine times. It is now famous for its own pony breed, the Skýros pony, and for furniture craftsmanship. It is a traditional, peaceful haven. 🗺 Map P2

### 8 Skýros Town

Crowned by a part-Byzantine, part-Venetian fortress, known as the Castle of Lykomedes, which stands on the site of an ancient acropolis, Skýros Town is one of the prettiest capitals in the Sporádes. Lanes amble down the hillside from the castle to the harbour. The town's white-washed cube houses lining arched lanes bear a striking similarity to villages in the Cyclades. Around the town are chapels and churches, some with blue painted domes. There are museums, including the Archaeological Museum, where



displays from Neolithic times can be seen. 🗺 *Map P2 • Archaeological Museum: Platía Brooke; 22220 91327; open summer: 8am–7pm daily, winter: 8:30am–3pm daily; adm*

**9** **Évvia** The fascinating archaeological site of Erétria, one of the city-states of ancient Évvia, is a must for visitors to the island. The other was Chalcis, which stood on the site of the island's modern capital, Halkída. Other places to visit include the scenic village of Prokópi and the ports of Kárystos and Kými, along with the largest spa town in Greece, Loutrá Edipsouí (see pp28–9).

**10** **Peristéra** Peristéra is one of several smaller isles and islets that lie off Alónissos but unlike Skantzouúra, Pipéri and Gioúra, which are home to rare wildlife, it is the only one inhabited by humans. A rugged isle separated from Alónissos by just two narrow stretches of water, it is popular with sailing enthusiasts who anchor off its shores. It has sandy beaches, plus the remains of an old castle to explore. 🗺 *Map N1*

## Day Trip to Alónissos

### Morning

🕒 A great day out from **Skiáthos** or **Skópelos** is to take a ferry or hydrofoil to nearby **Alónissos**. Both the scenery and the pace of life are quite different here. Departure times vary according to the day and season, so check in advance the destination boards on the quayside marked to **Patitíri**, Alónissos. Most boats depart from 9:30 to 10:30am, so head for the quayside after a good breakfast. Boats leave from **Skiáthos Town** and take from 50 minutes to more than 2 hours to reach Patitíri, depending on the kind of boat. From Skópelos the journey takes only around 25 minutes.



On board the boat, enjoy the coastal scenery before disembarking at Patitíri. Check the time of your return ferry or hydrofoil as timetables do change. At Patitíri you can enjoy coffee or an early lunch before exploring the island. You can take a bus (timetables at the stop opposite the quay), or hire a taxi, car or bike. There are beach-hopping water taxis available too.

### Afternoon



After lunch explore the port town of Patitíri before heading west to the old capital, **Paleá Alónissos**, perched precariously on a cliff-top. Head north to the seaside village of **Stení Vála**, where you can enjoy a bite to eat at one of its tavernas. From here a road snakes towards the remote village of **Yérakas** (see p134). Retrace your steps back to Patitíri for your return journey.

Scenic Mólos and its neighbour Magaziá are two of the holiday resorts on Skýros. Their beaches, including sandy Mólos and more tranquil and natural Kareflouí, are the closest to Skýros Town.

### 9 **Pouriá, Skýros**

Pouriá is a traditional coastal village known for the unusual rock formations that lie just off its shoreline. A haven for snorkellers, fish can be seen swimming through the sea-worn arches.

## TOP 10 Best Beaches



**Mandráki beach, Skiáthos**

**1 Banana Beach, Skiáthos**  
Sweeping around a large bay, this beach has amenities that include tavernas and watersports. A nudist beach, Little Banana, lies behind the rocks at one end. ☼ *South coast, near Koukounariés • Map M1*

**2 Mandráki Beach, Skiáthos**  
This beach lies in a series of secluded coves known as Eliá, Mandráki and Angistrós bays. It is a very isolated spot. ☼ *West coast, near Mandráki • Map M1*

**3 Lalária Beach, Skiáthos**  
Known for its unusual rock formations, sheer white cliffs and fine white sand, this beautiful beach can be reached only by boat. ☼ *North coast • Map M1*

**4 Adrína Beach, Skópelos**  
Head along the path from Pánormos village or by boat to get to this deserted shingle beach, which is enclosed by a pine forest. ☼ *Adína, Pánormos • Map M1*

**5 Glystéri Beach, Skópelos**  
This fine shingle beach lies in a small cove off a bay that protects it from strong winds. It

is good for swimming and there are tavernas here. ☼ *North coast near Skópelos Town • Map M1*

**6 Velanió Beach, Skópelos**  
A beach of fine golden sand lapped by crystal-clear waters, Velanió is reached by a sign-posted path. Its beauty is that it is undeveloped and secluded. It is an official nudist beach. ☼ *Southeast coast, near Stáfylos • Map M2*

**7 Yérakas Beach, Alónissos**  
This usually desolate beach is home to a research centre of the Hellenic Society for the Study and Protection of the Monk Seal. ☼ *North coast • Map N1*

**8 Ágios Pétros Beach, Skýros**  
A pretty beach with rocks and surrounded by cedar trees, Ágios Pétros lies in a small bay. It is a popular sailing spot with locals. ☼ *Atsítsa, north coast • Map P2*

**9 Palamári Beach, Skýros**  
This beach is located next to the remains of the ancient town of Palamári. Quiet and peaceful, it has golden sand, clear water and a few sleepy tavernas nearby. ☼ *North coast • Map P2*

**10 Ochthoniá Beach, Évvia**  
Usually deserted, this beach lies near the wild cliffs, rich vegetation and trees of Cape Ochthoniá. Waves can be seen breaking on the shoreline. ☼ *Northeast coast • Map N3*

## TOP 10 Islands and Islets

### 1 Peristéra Island

This small island is one of several that lie off Alónissos and are part of the Sporádes Marine Park. Its sandy coves attract the endangered monk seal (see p45).

📍 Off Alónissos • Map N1

### 2 Valáxa Island

This uninhabited island and its neighbouring Skyrópoulo and Erinía islets attract yachtsmen because of their sheltered coves. Boat trips are available from Péfkos.

### 3 Petáli Island

This rugged island is said to have been owned by royals and several celebrities, including the famous Spanish painter Pablo Picasso, whose house still stands in the forest near the beach.

### 4 Dýo Adélfia

The twin islets of Mikró and Megálo Adélfia are known for their great scuba-diving spots. However, the sport is strictly controlled as the islets lie in the Sporádes Marine Park.

### 5 Pipéri Island

Covered by pine forest, this island lies in the Sporádes Marine Park. It is home to rare flora and fauna, including the endangered Eleonora's falcon (see p45). Disembarking here is prohibited but you can view the wildlife from a boat.

### 6 Skantzoúra

This small archipelago of six islets is known for its beautiful cedars and its sacred monastery, the Moní Evangelístria, which lies on its main island. Hellenistic remains suggest ancient occupation.

### 7 Kyrá Panagía Island

This tiny island has the remains of a settlement, which is believed to be ancient Alónissos. Today there are just a handful of residents, who have built a community administered from Alónissos.

### 8 Gióúra Island

Uninhabited and part of the Sporádes Marine Park, this small, rugged island has archaeological remains that suggest it was inhabited as far back as Neolithic times.

### 9 Árgos Island

Árgos can only be reached by private boat and is a popular anchorage for yachts sailing around the Sporádes. The views of Skiáthos Town from the island's shores are outstanding.

### 10 Tsougríá Island

Along with its islet, Tsougríáki, this richly forested island has a couple of sandy beaches within protected bays and is a popular day-trip destination for visitors staying in Skiáthos.



## The Argo-Saronic Islands

COMPRISING THE MAIN ISLANDS of Égina, Salamína, Póros, Spétses and Ýdra, with the traditionally Ionian Kýthira further south, the Argo-Saronics stretch some 200 km (125 miles) from Piraeus in Athens to the Peloponnese coast. Both Égina and Salamína were famous for their maritime activities, while Póros and Spétses are better known for their bustling modern capitals, ceramics and pine forests. Ýdra is cosmopolitan and remote Kýthira is one of the candidates for the birthplace of Aphrodite, the goddess of love. Smaller islets, such as Angístri, Moní, Trikéri and Spetsopoúla beg to be explored. The archipelago has a refined feel in many of its towns, and yet by contrast, small sailing caiques and mules form the only means of transport on some islands.

Temple of Aphaia, Égina

**1 Égina** Famous for being where the world's first ever coins were minted in 700 BC and home to the impressive Temple of Aphaia, Égina (see pp26–7) is a pine-covered island with picturesque bays and beaches. Égina Town, its capital, hugs a natural harbour and multiple ferries from Athens arrive here daily. The island has enjoyed a lively past and much prosperity as a major maritime trading centre. Today, life quietly revolves around the production of pistachio nuts, considered the best in Greece. Map L1

**2 Angístri** With a timeless charm and verdant landscape of pine trees, Angístri lies a short distance to the southwest of Égina and is a popular summer haunt of Athenian weekenders. Its main port is Skála, where there are a handful of hotels and restaurants, and the island's best beach, which runs along the coast from its church. In the past, the island has enjoyed reflected glory and wealth from Égina, and excavations at the sites of Megarítissa, Apónissos and ancient Metochí have revealed many valuable treasures. Map J2

**3 Salamína** The largest of the Saronic Gulf islands and separated from mainland Greece by a 2-km- (1.3-mile-) wide strait, crescent-shaped Salamína is most famous for being the site of the

historic Battle of Salamis in 480 BC. The battle between the victorious Greek fleet and the Persian Empire was fought in the strait with the Salaminians playing a key role. The island's capital, Salamína Town, lies in a deep bay to the west while Ágios Nikólaos is its most popular holiday spot. To the north is the base of the Hellenic Navy. The island is the legendary birthplace of the god Ajax. Map D3

**4 Moní Faneroméniis, Salamína**

The 17th-century Moní Faneroméniis is located on the north coast of Salamína on the spot where a preserved 18th-century icon, known as the Noefaneísis Panagía, was discovered by saint Lauréntos.

It depicts the *Last Judgement*. The monastery was used during the War of Independence (1821–9) as a hospital and refuge for women, children and Greek freedom fighters. In 1944, it was converted into a convent. Today, the monastery is a popular attraction for visitors and the nuns host a festival every year on August 23 in honour of the Virgin Mary. Salamína

### Ajax

A mythological Greek hero, Ajax was made famous in Homer's *Iliad* and *Odyssey*, both poems about the Trojan War. Ajax is said to have been born at Kanákia on the island of Salamina. The King of Salamis, Ajax was, according to legend, a man of great strength and was a fearsome warrior, like his cousin Achilles.

**5 Póros** Póros lies a short distance from Galatás in the Peloponnese and is made up of two islands: the richly forested but almost uninhabited Kalávria to the north and Sfairiá to the south. They are connected by a causeway. Its harbourside capital, Póros Town, lies on Sfairiá and despite the rapid growth of its tourism industry has managed to retain its massive charm. Tiny streets, lined with pastel-coloured 19th-century houses clinging to the hillside, give the town its character. 📍 *Map K3*

**6 Temple of Poseidon, Póros** Heading inland from the Moní Zoódóchou Pigís, near the coast in the heart of Kalávria, are the ruins of the Temple of Poseidon. Believed to have been constructed around 520 BC, the structure was a refuge for Kalavrian tribes. Built in Doric style, it would have originally had 12 columns along its longer sides and 6 along its shorter sides. The site is said to have been where the orator Demosthenes poisoned himself in 322 BC rather than be captured by the Macedonians. 📍 *Kalávria • Map K3*

**7 Spétses** Spétses is characterized by the scent of the pine forest that was planted in the early 1900s. The interior is dotted with holiday homes. Spétses Town, its capital, is the largest community and spreads along the eastern coastline for 2 km (1.3 miles). Here, life revolves around Dápia quay, where fashionable tavernas look out over the bay. The Ágios Nikólaos church and 19th-century mansions give a clue to the town's past wealth, largely made from shipbuilding. Archaeological finds suggest the island has been occupied since ancient times. 📍 *Map D4*

**8 Ýdra** A once sleepy island, Ýdra rose to fame in the 1960s when two films were shot here: *Boy on a Dolphin* starring Sophia Loren and the comedy *Island of Love*. The glamour has remained ever since. Pretty white-washed mansions belonging to artists, writers and the Athenian elite cling to the hillside, which rises steeply from the harbour. It has chic tavernas and a few beaches accessible only by yacht and caique. Road-free Ýdra is regarded as an exclusive holiday destination. 📍 *Map D4*

## 9 Ýdra Town

Ýdra Town, capital of Ýdra, is a charming mix of harbourside tavernas, frequented by a chic clientele, and elegant pastel-coloured homes. Built by mariners who had amassed wealth during the Napoleonic Wars by building blockades, these early 19th-century mansions, known as *archontiká*, are built of local stone. Mostly private homes, one mansion houses a marine academy and one a school of fine arts. Ýdra is known for the smart yachts that line its harbour.

## 10 KÝthira

Arriving on KÝthira island feels like stepping back in time. Tiny lanes flanked by dry-stone walls link dozens of hamlets with traditional blue and white homes, many showing elements of Venetian architecture. KÝthira lies south of the Peloponnese and was once governed by the Venetians and British as part of the Ionians, but is now an Argo-Saronic island. Many of its residents are returning Australian Kythirans who have, in turn, given the island a distinctive character. Its way of life is slow and the tourism low-key. 📍 Map C5

## Day Trip from Égina to Angístri

### Morning

Many ferries run between the northern Argo-Saronic islands daily, with one of the most popular day trips being between **Égina** and **Angístri**. Start your day with a good breakfast and head to the harbourside at **Égina Town**. The harbour is easy to find and big boards detail the ferry departure times. Look out for the one marked Skála, Angístri Island. The first ferry leaves at about 9:30am and then every couple of hours, but times do vary so be sure to check. Caiques also ply the waters at irregular times. The ferry crossing takes about 20 minutes. Look out for **Moní island** to your left and **Metopí islet** to your right, and then look ahead to capture your first glimpse of picturesque **Skála**. Once you have disembarked, stop for coffee before making your way to the beach. You can also hire a scooter or bike to explore the island. If you are lucky, you may catch one of the infrequent buses that run from Skála to **Limenária** via the small port of **Mýlos**, all of which have tavernas for lunch.

### Afternoon

On the steep hillside above Skála, **Metochí** provides a sense of the island's history and breathtaking views. Retrace your steps back to Skála in time to catch a return ferry. They leave around 5:40pm, but check as times can vary. Arriving back in Égina you can enjoy a delicious evening meal at one of the harbourside restaurants.

## TOP 10 Best of the Rest

- 1 Sárpa Bay, Égina**  
 With crystal-clear waters, this bay, off the road to Pérdika, is one of the capital's best. It has a café and golden sand dotted with tropical-style umbrellas.  *Égina Town • Map K1*
- 2 Souvála, Égina**  
 Famous for its mineral-rich springs, the once sleepy fishing village of Souvála is now Égina's second port. Ferries arrive here from Athens. It is a picturesque spot with tavernas lining its esplanade.  *Near Vathý • Map L1*
- 3 Megalochóri, Angístri**  
 The capital of Angístri island, Megalochóri (Mýlos) is an unspoiled coastal village of blue and white stone houses. These cluster along tiny streets that give no hint of this village's former historic importance as a key naval base.  *Map J2*
- 4 Kamíni, Ýdra**  
 Known as Mikró Kamíni, for its diminutive nature, this picturesque little fishing harbour has its own castle, a collection of traditional tavernas and a quiet beach.  *Map D4*
- 5 Vlychós, Ýdra**  
 A tiny village that revolves around its enchanting blue and white church, Vlychós has a pretty beach dotted with tropical-style sun umbrellas. A handful of tavernas and a small resort are close by.  *Map D4*
- 6 Bísti Bay, Ýdra**  
 Bísti bay, with its pebbly beach and safe water, is a lovely spot, especially for water-sports. Kayaking, snorkelling and scuba diving trips are available.  *Map D4*
- 7 Zogeriá Bay, Spétses**  
 This bay, the most beautiful on Spétses, is the island's best-kept secret. It lies in a small cove surrounded by a dense, scented pine forest. Its beach is sandy and water sapphire blue.  *Map D4*
- 8 Ambelákia, Salamína**  
 This is the oldest village on the island, and is famous as the site of the Battle of Salamis (see p141). It boasts a citadel, a port and the ancient ruins of an acropolis.  *Map D3*
- 9 Boúrtzi, Póros**  
 A tiny fortified island, Boúrtzi has a chequered past. Under the rule of Basil I the Macedon (AD 812–886), it was the scene of battles against the Saracens and was later used by the Germans as a refuge during WWII.  *Map K3*
- 10 Venetian Castles, Kýthira**  
 Kýthira has several fortifications, including a mighty Venetian castle that stands on rocks overlooking its capital. Nearby are the ruins of the Kato Hora castle with its well-preserved Lion of St Mark statue and the Avlémonas bastion.

## TOP 10 Sights: Égina

**1 Égina Town**  
Neo-Classical buildings in pastel shades, often occupied by a fish taverna selling the catch of the day, line this town's hugely picturesque harbour. Fishing boats crowd its waterside, while landmarks include the ruins of the Temple of Apollo. 🗺 Map K1

**2 Temple of Apollo**  
Just one column is left of this great 6th-century BC temple built in honour of Apollo, prompting it to be known as Kolóna ("The Column"). 🗺 Map K1

**3 Temple of Aphaia**  
This well-preserved temple of goddess Aphaia is more than 2,500 years old (see pp26–7).

**4 Monastery of Agios Nektários**  
This monastery houses one of the largest Greek Orthodox cathedrals in the world. It was built in the early 1900s by the patron saint of the island, Nektários, who is buried here. 🗺 Map K1

**5 Pérdika**  
The quaint fishing harbour of Pérdika is a gem. It is lined with fish tavernas where you can sit and watch fishing vessels and yachts. Surrounded by nature, it is a walker's paradise. 🗺 Map K2

**6 Paleohóra**  
For around 1,000 years until the early 19th century, this deserted village was Égina's capital. It

is said its inhabitants were forced into slavery by pirates. Visitors can see the remains of churches here. 🗺 Map L1

**7 Mesagrós**  
Known for its ceramics, this mountain village is a popular tourist spot. It has traditional 19th-century houses and the pretty church of Polítissa. 🗺 Map L1

**8 Kypséli**  
Pistachio plantations stretch along the Kypséli plateau, producing the island's biggest export. It is the fastest-growing business district of Égina. 🗺 Map K1

**9 Agía Marína**  
This cosmopolitan holiday resort has hotels, tavernas and a sandy beach. It takes its name from the little church that stands in the bay. 🗺 Map L1

**10 Pahiá Ráhi**  
This rural village on the slopes of Mt Óros is home to the Hellenic Wildlife Hospital of Égina, a refuge for sick animals. 🗺 Map L2 • [www.ekpazp.gr](http://www.ekpazp.gr)

## TOP 10 Islands and Islets

### 1 Moní Island

Reached from Pérdika by boat, this peaceful pine-covered island – inhabited only by deer and goats – is popular with day-trippers who flock to its beaches.

📍 *Between Égina and Angístri • Map K2*

### 2 Trikéri and Spetsopóula Islands

Lying off the coast of Spétses, the tiny, somewhat barren island of Trikéri and the privately-owned Spetsopóula island are popular landmarks with sailors. Although there are no public moorings, yachts often sail in their waters.

📍 *East of Spétses • Map D4*

### 3 Metopí Islet

This little islet, dominated by its church, offers tranquility and just nature for company. It has some fine beaches and moorings, making it a popular day-trip destination from Égina or Skála.

📍 *Between Égina and Angístri • Map K2*

### 4 Dokós Island

Inhabited since Neolithic times and with valuable Hellenic and Byzantine archaeological remains, this remote island is now home to Orthodox monks.

📍 *North of Ýdra • Map D4*

### 5 Alexandros Island

Often known as Platoníssi Nísida, Aléxandros is one of the many islands lying to the south of Ýdra. Quiet and undeveloped, it has pretty coves and beaches.

📍 *Southwest of Ýdra • Map D4*

### 6 Petássi Island

Popular with yachtsmen, this small island offers a few safe anchorages in the sheltered Bísti bay. There are also many coves along its indented coastline.

📍 *Northwest of Ýdra • Map D4*

### 7 Elafónissos Island

Its sand dunes, stretching as far as the eye can see, attract visitors from the Peloponnese, who make a short sea crossing to reach this almost barren island. Its main settlement is the small port.

### 8 Andikýthira Island

This isolated little island has a population of around 50, all of whom live in the three villages of Potamós, Galaniána and Harhaliána. Fishing and farming are its only industries.

📍 *South of Kýthira • Map D5*

### 9 Nafítilos Islet

Nafítilos, along with a cluster of other tiny islets, including Psíra, Poretí, Thérmones and Póri, lie off Kýthira's coast. All are uninhabited and are popular with day-trippers due to their glorious beaches.

### 10 Makroníssi Island

Reached by a causeway from Diakófti, this relatively flat island has rich vegetation, lots of birdlife, sandy beaches and is popular with walkers. Its small port is extremely picturesque.

## TOP 10 Best Beaches

**1 Agía Marína Beach, Égina**  
This small, bustling resort, popular with wind surfers and sailing enthusiasts, is picturesque with its white-washed houses, tavernas and fabulous beach.

**2 Marathónas Beach, Égina**  
Busy yet scenic, the beach alongside the fishing village of Marathónas is known for its excellent selection of fish restaurants. With sun umbrellas, snorkelling and diving available, this beach is a popular spot.

**3 Aiginítissa Beach, Égina**  
Quieter than its neighbour, Marathónas, this beach has shallow crystal-clear water ideal for children. Sun loungers and shades are available. 📍 *South of Égina Town • Map K1*

**4 Skála Beach, Angístri**  
The longest stretch of beach on the island and its sandiest, Skála attracts both locals and day-trippers from Égina. It runs along the coast from the town's Ágii Anárgyroi church. 📍 *Map K2*

**5 Neóríon Beach, Póros**  
Sandy and surrounded by tall pine trees, this is one of the most picturesque beaches on the island. Sometimes known as Mikró Neório, it has a good selection of tavernas as well as watersports to enjoy. 📍 *Northwest of Póros Town • Map K1*

**6 Russian Bay, Póros**  
Taking its name from when it harboured the Russian ships that supported the Greek fleet during the revolution of the 1820s, this sheltered bay has golden sand and a handful of tavernas.  
📍 *Northwest of Póros Town • Map K1*

**7 Agía Paraskeví Beach, Spétses**  
The beautiful church of Agía Paraskeví lends its name to this long stretch of sand and pebble beach enclosed within a cove. Fragrant pine trees provide it with shelter. 📍 *Near Dápia • Map D4*

**8 Ágii Anárgyroi Beach, Spétses**  
Of the many good beaches in the Argo-Saronics, the Ágii Anárgyroi is the largest. Lying in a cove, this popular sandy beach has shallow waters for safe swimming. 📍 *Near Dápia • Map D4*

**9 Agía Marína, Spétses**  
Famous as much for its beauty as for the remains of an early-Bronze Age civilization, this beach has watersports and sun beds. Inland is a chapel of the same name. 📍 *Near Dápia • Map D4*


**10 Palaiópoli Beach, Kýthira**

## TOP 10 General Information

### 1 When to Go

The Greek Islands are primarily a summer destination, but the mild winter months are also great for an activity holiday. In the cooler months (December–February) snow can fall in the mountains. Average temperatures are around 26°C (79°F) in summer and 10°C (50°F) in winter.

### 2 Where to Go

The larger islands, such as Corfu and Kefalloniá in the Ionians, Rhodes and Kos in the Dodecanese, Mykonos and Santoríni in the Cyclades and Crete are ideal for beach holidays, while the smaller, more rural islands, offer a more relaxed pace.

### 3 Tourist Offices

There are tourist and tourist police offices in most main towns on the islands, but they would prefer you telephone with your enquiry rather than walking in. The exception is the airport desks, where information on hotels, car hire and attractions is available. The tourist police number for all islands is 171.

### 4 Passport and Visas

EU citizens visiting the Greek islands need only a valid passport and can stay for an unlimited period. Most other visitors, including citizens of the USA, Canada, New

Zealand and Australia can stay for up to 90 days without a visa. Other non-EU citizens should consult the Greek embassy in their home country before departure, to be sure of having the correct documentation.

### 5 Customs

Duty-paid goods such as alcohol and perfumes for personal use are no longer subject to official limits within the EU, and there is no restriction on the amount of money you can bring in for holiday use. However, please declare large sums. The removal of archaeological artifacts is strictly prohibited. Non-EU citizens may be spot checked.

### 6 Currency

The currency of the Greek Islands is the euro. It comes in denominations of 1, 2, 5, 10, 20, 50 cents and 1 and 2 euro coins, and banknotes of 5, 10, 20, 50, 100, 200 and 500 euros. Visitors may bring in an unlimited amount of foreign currency, but large sums should be declared on arrival.

### 7 What to Take

If you take prescribed medicines, carry enough for your stay, along with a doctor's note. In terms of clothes, the islands have a relaxed way of life so take beachwear for resort-style holidays, casual wear for evenings,

sports clothing and a jumper for cool evenings. Do pack sunscreen, aftersun and a sun hat.

### 8 Electricity

The standard current throughout the islands is 230V AC (50Hz). The plugs are two round pin variety, or three round pin for some appliances. Adaptors for British and transformers for some American appliances may not always be available, so carry what you need.

### 9 Children

The islands are family-orientated, with most attractions, hotels and restaurants providing amenities for children. Take care to prevent sunburn and on beaches, where there are often strong sea currents. Products like nappies are available in supermarkets, but if travelling with a baby on formula food, be sure to pack plenty, as the same brand may not be available.

### 10 Weddings

There's nothing more romantic than a wedding on a Greek Island beach. The procedure for civil marriages is straightforward, although church wedding formalities vary between the islands. Couples need to present the correct documentation before the big day. Many hotels have dedicated wedding planners.

## TOP 10 Getting There and Around

### 1 Package Holidays

Most visitors arrive on a package organized by a holiday company that includes inward and outward flights, accommodation and transfers to and from the airports. Package holidays tend to be beach or resort orientated, but specialist walking, sailing, diving and wedding packages are also available.

### 2 By Scheduled Flight

The Greek Islands are served directly by many European airlines and by intercontinental companies via domestic connections from the Elefthérios Venizélos international airport in Athens. Most flights arrive at the main airports, such as Corfu, Kefalloniá and Zákynthos in the Ionians, Haniá and Iráklío on Crete, Rhodes, Kos, Sámos and Skiáthos. Domestic flights link the islands.

### 3 By Charter Flight

Tour operators specializing in beach and resort holidays, weddings and activity holidays fly charter flights into the main airports of the Ionians, Cyclades, Aegean, Dodecanese and Crete from key locations around Europe. Some fly throughout the year, while others offer a limited service in winter.

### 4 By Boat

The island groups are well served by ferries. Many routes start in Athens and the city's Piraeus Port has dozens of boats leaving for Crete, the Cyclades, the Dodecanese, the North and South Aegean, and the Saronic Gulf, while other ports such as Igoumenítsa, Pátra and Kyllíni serve the Ionians.

### 5 By Yacht

There is a wide choice of marinas and anchorages for yachtsmen to disembark and come ashore. Among them are the Gouviá Marina and Limín Kérkyra Marina on Corfu, the Kos Marina, Ágios Nikólaos at Lassíthi on Crete, the Marina Mandráki on Rhodes and the marinas at Skiáthos and Sýros.

### 6 By Cruise Ship

The islands appear on many cruise ship itineraries. These floating hotels can often be seen anchored a little way off Corfu Town's coastline or at the harbour of Zákynthos. Other popular ports of call include Rhodes and Pátmos in the Dodecanese, Santoríni and Mýkonos in the Cyclades and Crete.

### 7 Car Hire

All airports, resorts and many smaller towns have car hire company offices. You can hire a 4WD if planning to

explore off-road or a minibus, if travelling with a group. Family cars are also available. A full driving licence held for at least a year is required. US licence holders must have an International Driving Permit.

### 8 Rules of the Road

Driving is on the right, with priority from the right at junctions. Observe speed limits and be especially careful while driving in mountainous areas or villages. Highways tend to be in good order. Children under 12 must not travel in the front.

### 9 By Bus

Most bus services are operated by local companies. Town harbours usually house bus stations. A journey can feel a little like stepping back in time, as many vehicles are older models. There are intercity buses linking major island capitals to Athens, which include the cost of the ferry.

### 10 By Taxi

It is generally easy to find a taxi on any of the islands. The main towns have taxi ranks and even the smallest villages have a vehicle available to hire. Taxis are metered and inexpensive, but if hiring a taxi for a day's sightseeing, it is a good idea to negotiate a fixed price beforehand.

## TOP 10 Special Concerns

### 1 Sight and Hearing Difficulties

Few archaeological sites or museums around the islands provide their guides in a Braille format or have them adapted to audio for visually impaired visitors, or even versions of their narratives to assist those with hearing difficulties. However, the Greek Tourist Organization is keen to reverse this.

### 2 Wheelchair Access

Hotels and restaurants are now introducing ramps and bathroom facilities suitable for accommodating wheelchairs, but public buildings, museums and especially archaeological sites where the ground is uneven still present a problem for users. The Greek Tourist Organization has a leaflet designed to assist wheelchair users.

### 3 Travelling With Children

Children will adore the Greek Islands, especially if they are keen on sailing, snorkelling or playing on the beach, but care should be taken to avoid sunburn and accidents in strong sea currents. Supermarkets and pharmacies generally stock medicines and nappies, although in case of any special dietary needs, do carry what you require, as the same brands may not always be available.

### 4 Senior Citizens

Greek people are especially respectful of older folk and it is not uncommon to see all generations of a family dining together in a restaurant. Risks are few but can include heat exhaustion and dehydration, so wear a hat and drink lots of water.

### 5 Women Travellers

While Greece and its islands are generally safe for women travelling alone or in a group, some incidents have been reported, so normal care should be taken. It is advisable to avoid walking alone at night, accepting lifts from strangers and ensuring someone is always aware of your plans.

### 6 Gay and Lesbian Travellers

Many of the laid-back islands, such as Rhodes, Mykonos and Santorini, are open-minded when it comes to homosexuality. No longer considered an illegal relationship, homosexual couples are generally accepted, and some beaches, clubs and boat charter companies are now exclusively gay.

### 7 Special Diets

The Greek diet largely comprises meat, fish, vegetables and fruit, but dairy products such as yoghurt and nuts are often used in dishes too. Visitors with diabetes,

lactose or gluten intolerances, nut allergies, or those following a vegetarian or vegan diet need to exercise care. Some restaurants have vegetarian options and, with advance notice, will cater for special diets.

### 8 Student Travellers

The Greek Islands are popular with students and many companies specialize in student travel. Concessions are not usual for ferry, train or bus travel, but some museums and sites offer discounts, or even free admission, on production of a student identity card.

### 9 Travelling With Pets

There are strict rules on bringing pets into Greece and its islands. A pet must be micro-chipped and have an up-to-date rabies vaccination record. If travelling from another EU country it is possible to apply for a pet passport and some airlines will carry animals, but pets may have to be quarantined on arrival.

### 10 Smoking

Greeks are a nation of smokers and measures introduced by the government to ban smoking in public places are often ignored, or observed with reluctance. Restaurants may provide a smoking area, but in public buildings you will see no-smoking signs.

## TOP 10 Specialist Holidays

### 1 Archaeology

The fabulous palaces of Knossos and Phaestos on Crete, Paleókastró on Kefaloniá and the ruined temples on Corfu's Mon Repos Estate are some of the places that appear on holiday tour itineraries. In addition, the island of Delos is one of Greece's most important archaeological sites.

### 2 Island Hopping

The island groups lend themselves to hopping from one port to another. Numerous ferries ply between the islands. For example, in the Ionians it is easy to reach Paxí from Corfu, or from Nydrí on Lefkáda to Fiskárdo on Kefaloniá, or to Frikes on Itháki, while in the Cyclades you have the choice of visiting all the islands.

### 3 Wildlife

The islands and islets provide an ecosystem for many flower varieties as well as wildlife and bird species that can be seen on specialist holidays. The Aegean alone has some 80 indigenous plants, including the *pancratium maritimum* or sea daffodil, and some 300 resident and migratory birds, including the endangered Bonelli's eagle.

### 4 Walking and Hiking

While the hilly landscape can present challenges to the novice hiker, there

are designated trails from long, difficult routes to small ones over flat terrain. Many take in sights too. For example, the Paleohóra to Vathý route on Itháki is a 4-km (3-mile) walk with a break at the Melissáni cave.

### 5 Cruising and Sailing

With a good choice of ports, marinas and anchorages, a mild climate with moderate winds most of the time, and tide movements that change by just a little each day, the waters around the Greek Islands are ideal for cruising and sailing holidays. Harbour-side tavernas add to the charm of the experience.

### 6 Cooking

Greeks are famous for their love of food and some of their most delicious recipes are steeped in tradition. Covered by vineyards, the islands are known for their wine. The advent of cuisine-themed holidays is new to the isles but are gaining popularity. Wine tours are also becoming common.

### 7 Painting

Specialist companies and individuals do offer painting holidays, but this is one of the easiest types of breaks to do alone. The landscape of flowers and trees, tiny villages of white-washed, red-roofed stone buildings, harbours full of

boats and crystal clear turquoise seas make this an enchanting place to capture on canvas.

### 8 Horse Riding

It is magical to take a trek through olive groves or farmland in the early morning or mid-evening. Centres under the Hellenic Equestrian Federation dot the isles. They include the Range Rodeo Riding Club, Corfu, Kos Riding Club and Rodu Riding Club Kadmos, Rhodes. ☎ *Hellenic Equestrian Federation* • 22990 49350 • [www.equestrian.org.gr](http://www.equestrian.org.gr)

### 9 Golf

There aren't too many good international standard courses to choose from. Two of the largest are the Corfu Golf Club and the Crete Golf Club, both 18-hole courses. They have the usual hire facilities, a driving range and Pro Shop. The Hellenic Golf Federation controls the sport. ☎ *Hellenic Golf Federation* • 21089 41933 • [www.hgf.gr](http://www.hgf.gr)

### 10 Diving and Snorkelling

Seeing the underwater beauty of the islands has long been a popular holiday choice for many diving and snorkelling enthusiasts. Government regulated schools can be found in all the major coastal towns, each offering dives for novices and experienced divers.

## TOP 10 Banking and Communications

### 1 Currency

The islands adopted the euro in 2001, replacing the long standing drachma. The euro comes in eight coins of 1, 2, 5, 10, 20, 50 cents, and 1 and 2 euros, and banknotes in 5, 10, 20, 50, 100, 200 and 500 denominations. Changing money to euros is quite easy, even in smaller towns.

### 2 Banks

The opening hours of the islands' banks are 8am through to 2pm on each weekday except until 1.30pm on Fridays. Banks are generally closed in the afternoons and on Saturdays, although in major tourist areas some banks stay open later, especially during the summer months.

### 3 ATMs

Smaller towns and even villages are catching up by having their own ATMs, but still these machines are usually only found in the main towns and in tourist areas. Operating round the clock and dispensing local currency, the ATMs generally accept all major cards.

### 4 Credit Cards

Visa, Mastercard, Diners Club and American Express credit cards as well as major debit cards, are almost always accepted by

hotels, larger restaurants and shops in main towns, but cash is preferred in smaller establishments. Most village stores and tavernas only accept cash.

### 5 Language

Like the rest of Greece, islanders use modern Greek, which is derived from the ancient language used in the classical era and the New Testament of the Christian Bible. It uses the Greek alphabet, which has 24 letters from Alpha through to Omega. However, English is widely spoken because most Greeks have studied it to some extent.

### 6 Telephones

The Greek telecommunications company, Organismós Tilepikoinoníon Elládos (OTE), provides good service, although prices can vary with local calls being inexpensive and calls to neighbouring islands or international calls being quite expensive. Towns have telephone booths, as do some villages. Phoncards are available at kiosks.

### 7 Post Offices

Opening times are from around 7.30am to 2pm on weekdays, although larger post offices often stay open later and on Saturday, especially in holiday

resorts. All major towns and most of the villages have post offices, which are easily identified by the blue and yellow signs that read *tahydromío* (post office). Letter boxes are bright yellow.

### 8 Internet

The fast-moving world of technology hasn't bypassed the islands. Many hotels now offer guests Internet facilities and every town and most villages have at least one Internet café.

### 9 Newspapers and Magazines

British and European newspapers are usually available in kiosks, supermarkets and hotel foyers the day after publication, although the mark up can be substantial. English and Greek language local publications, which tend to focus on current news and events, are available too, along with international magazines.

### 10 Television and Radio

Greece has state-owned television and radio stations that are broadcast around the islands. There are also several privately-owned stations which provide a glimpse of local culture. Hotels tend to have satellite television installed for a choice of international news and lifestyle channels.

## TOP 10 Security and Health

### 1 Emergency Numbers

In the event of an emergency dial 100 for police, 166 for an ambulance and 199 to alert the fire department. Dial 107 to find out the opening times of the nearest pharmacy. The coastguard can be called by VHF radio or by telephone on 108. Response times to emergency calls are generally good.

### 2 Police

There are two divisions of police in the Greek Islands: the tourist police, who monitor hotels, restaurants and venues catering to tourists, and the regular police, who handle incidents of crime. The tourist police can be contacted by dialling 171. English is widely spoken.

### 3 Ambulance

Medical facilities are generally good in the major towns, although less so in the villages. Ambulance response times are good, but, as few roads have names, be prepared to give details of sights when giving directions. Telephone 166 for an ambulance in the event of a medical emergency.

### 4 Fire

Like residents, visitors should look out for and report any fires. They ignite with some

regularity in the height of summer and because of the tinder dry landscape flames can spread rapidly. For emergencies, call 199.

### 5 Health Insurance

Citizens of the EU are entitled to free emergency medical care as reciprocal arrangements are in place with Greece and its islands. Before travelling, visitors should obtain a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) available from the Department of Health. The EHIC does not replace health insurance. Non-EU citizens should always have insurance.

### 6 Hospitals

Greek National Health Service facilities can be limited on the islands, although the larger towns have modern hospitals with accident and emergency departments. Staff usually speak English. Air ambulances are available, if necessary, to fly serious cases to the state-of-the-art hospitals in Athens.

### 7 Doctors

As with dentists, doctors' private fees are payable immediately on treatment and a receipt is given for insurance purposes. Emergency medical situations should always be referred to a hospital, rather than a practitioner. Hotels can recommend local

doctors who can assist with minor medical problems. Most will speak English well.

### 8 Dental Care

Dental practices are run on a private basis, with fees for emergency treatment payable immediately. Receipts are given for insurance purposes. Dentists have usually trained in Athens or further afield like the UK and, as such, the standard of knowledge and care throughout the islands is high.

### 9 Pharmacies

Pharmacists are highly trained and can advise on ailments as well as prescribe and dispense certain medicines. Identified by a green cross, pharmacies stock a large range of medication, although it is wise to carry prescribed drugs sufficient for your stay. Telephone 107 for information on timings for pharmacies.

### 10 Crime

The crime rate is especially low in the islands, although reports of theft and assaults tend to occur more frequently in the tourist areas than in the villages. It is wise to take sensible precautions, such as ensuring you do not keep all your documents or money together, watching your valuables and locking your car.

## TOP 10 Budget Tips

### 1 Travelling Off-Season

Autumn, winter and spring in the Greek Islands can be glorious. Taking a package holiday during off-season is often much cheaper and offers an opportunity to explore the islands minus the crowds. Enjoy autumn colours or spring flowers and take walks in pleasant temperatures – all with great savings.

### 2 Cheap Flights

Explore the possibility of booking a low-cost flight and then accommodation separately. If you can be flexible on dates, you are likely to pay a lot less. Check the Internet or ask your agent for any last-minute deals, which can often be much cheaper than booking from a brochure months in advance.

### 3 Discounts

If planning ahead, check if the company offers discounts for early booking. It can amount to substantial savings. If you are a senior citizen or a student, do not forget that you may get a discount on entry charges to museums and archaeological sites with proof of age.

### 4 Self-Catering

Staying in self-catering accommodation can be cost effective and lots of fun. It means you can experience the lively

atmosphere of a local market, buy fresh produce and eat at home or head off into the forest for a barbecue like the locals. You also have the flexibility to try out the local tavernas.

### 5 Hostels

The islands have a long tradition of being an island-hopping, backpackers' paradise and a selection of hostel-style accommodation has developed. Although not luxurious and rarely offering a range of facilities, hostels are usually comfortable and can be a good place to stay for anyone on a budget.

### 6 Picnics

Picnics are a favourite summer Sunday event for Greek families. You will see all generations laughing and eating together in designated picnic spots that often overlook beaches or are located in pine forests. Fun to prepare with fresh, inexpensive produce from local markets, picnics are cheap and may even mean you can mingle with the locals.

### 7 Free Entertainment

Impromptu festivals with music and dancing or more organized open-air concerts are commonplace in towns and village squares throughout the islands. Many celebrate religious milestones,

such as Easter or Lent, or derive from traditions such as when a successful harvest is gathered in. Visitors are always welcome to join in.

### 8 Camping

There are some great, inexpensive camp sites, many with restaurants, showers, supermarkets and, in some cases, leisure facilities such as a swimming pool. The most popular are those next to beaches, in forests or olive groves. In high summer you will need to book in advance.

### 9 Working Holidays

Holiday work tends to revolve around tourist areas and working as a holiday rep, in a restaurant or bar, or driving public vehicles provided you have the right qualifications, are all possibilities. EU citizens do not need a work permit, although they should register for residency after 90 days. Nationals of other countries need a work permit.

### 10 Hitchhiking

Hitchhiking is a good way to get around for travellers on a budget, and is generally accepted as a way of life here. In fact, it is a great way to meet locals who tend to be generous in giving lifts and information on what to do and where to go. Women travelling alone should exercise the usual caution.

## TOP 10 Things to Avoid

### 1 Military Zones

Army, navy and air force military zones and bases tend to be clearly signposted and it is best to avoid them in case your actions are misunderstood. Do not photograph any military personnel, or any building, vehicle or place that appears to be military, without permission.

### 2 Photography

Along with military premises and personnel, do not take photographs inside churches or monasteries as it is considered disrespectful. If you are planning to take pictures in a museum, a privately owned attraction or an archaeological site, always check if photography is allowed. Sometimes it is but without flash. Video equipment is treated the same.

### 3 Offending your Host

Greek people are extremely sociable and will often extend an invitation to you to dine with their family. Consider this an honour and expect a large gathering. Always take flowers, wine, chocolate or pastries for the host. Dress smart-casual unless dining in a top-notch restaurant.

### 4 Sunburn

Prolonged exposure to the sun should be avoided. Always apply plenty of high-factor sun-

protection cream especially if swimming, and wear sunglasses and a hat. Fair-skinned people and children are particularly vulnerable to sunburn. Heat exhaustion is a serious affliction; take adequate precautions.

### 5 Dehydration

Always drink plenty of water to avoid dehydration. Carry water when visiting archaeological sites and outdoor attractions in particular, as drinking water is not always available. Bottled water is available from all supermarkets and kiosks. If you do get dehydrated, seek medical help.

### 6 Mosquitoes

Mosquitoes do not carry serious diseases in Greece but they can leave a nasty bite. Some people may even get a reaction to a mosquito bite, in which case a pharmacy should be able to advise. Wear repellent, especially after dark or when near stagnant water, and invest in a plug-in deterrent device.

### 7 Scams

Scams and hard-sell schemes, such as property or boat timeshare schemes, although rare in the Greek islands, do exist and tourists are often the victims. Take sensible precautions and be on your guard. If you are offered an opportunity that sounds too good to

be true, it probably is. Read the small print before signing anything.

### 8 Crime

Always take care when carrying valuables, especially in crowded areas, and be sure to securely lock your vehicle or accommodation when leaving personal items behind. Crimes such as pick-pocketing, theft from cars and burglaries are rare but again, sensible precautions should be taken. Violent crime is extremely rare.

### 9 Drugs

The authorities have a zero-tolerance policy when it comes to the use or dealing of drugs and as a result the consumption of such substances is relatively low. Carrying drugs into the country can result in serious consequences. Take a note from your doctor if carrying prescribed drugs.

### 10 Dubious Clubs

Some of the larger resorts like to cater for all types of visitors and as such a selection of late-night clubs are available. Some are advertised as "adults only". The authorities regularly monitor such venues to ensure they conform to strict guidelines but visitors wishing for a milder form of evening entertainment might do best to avoid them.

## TOP 10 Dining Tips

### 1 Restaurants

The Greek Islands offer a fabulous choice of places to satisfy your tastebuds, from traditional tavernas to French, Italian, Oriental and even Mexican restaurants. However, do look out for restaurants in tourist areas that advertise “international” cuisine and have what appears to be an endless menu – chances are the food will be microwaved.

### 2 Tavernas

Look out for family-owned tavernas that have local specialities on the menu. Dishes, such as *kléftiko* (lamb slow-cooked with herbs in a special domed oven), will almost certainly be freshly prepared. A stay in the islands wouldn't be complete without a meal at a traditional taverna.

### 3 Cafés and Snack Bars

Every village, however small, will have at least one café. These *kafenias* are an institution throughout the islands and act as the central point of a community. Generally, they serve just coffee, water and spirits, but some also serve sandwiches or light meals and are more akin to a snack bar.

### 4 Fast Food

American-style hamburger restaurants, pizza parlours and ice-cream shops have made

their mark on the Greek islands and can be found in most major towns. The local equivalent is a *souvlatzídiko*, which sells delicious *souvláki* (chunks of pork or chicken char-grilled with herbs). Look out for bakeries offering freshly made pastries.

### 5 Vegetarians

Dishes such as vegetable *moussakás* appear on many tavernas' menus, although few restaurants are exclusively vegetarian. Greeks are a nation of meat-lovers but because many fast for Lent as part of the Greek Orthodox tradition, recipes for fruit and vegetable dishes have been handed down through the generations.

### 6 Local Beers and Spirits

A range of excellent beers are brewed in Greece, such as the famous Mythos brand, while popular spirits include *tsibouro*, made from grape pulp, and the aniseed-flavoured *ouzo*, which turns white when water is added. There are local versions of white rum, brandy and other spirits, while Greece's traditional wine is *retsína*.

### 7 Water

It is completely safe to drink tap water in the Greek Islands. However, on some islands the water has a slight brackish taste as a result

of the desalination process. Beware of restaurant staff pushing bottled water on you by claiming the mains supply is undrinkable or unsafe. While bottled water is available everywhere, filling up from the tap for excursions saves the use of excess plastic bottles.

### 8 Soft Drinks

A wide range of internationally known soft drinks, plus a selection of locally produced alternatives in bottles and cartons, can be found in supermarkets and kiosks. Fruit juices can be purchased in large cartons or smaller versions. Restaurants and bars will always have soft drinks.

### 9 Menus

Menus are usually written in Greek and English, although in smaller village tavernas they may be in Greek only. Some may not have a menu at all. Often diners are invited into the kitchen to choose their meal or are advised as to what is being cooked that day. Check the price before ordering.

### 10 Service Charges

A service charge is included in the price of meals on the menu. However, if the service you received was good then you might like to consider rounding up the bill or adding up to ten per cent as a tip.

## TOP 10 Accommodation Tips

### 1 High and Low Season

Most hotels in the Greek Islands will have at least two sets of rates, one for the high season (around June to September) and one for the low season (October to May). The exception will be the Christmas, New Year and Easter holiday periods, when prices rise accordingly.

### 2 Package Holidays

The Greek Islands are a popular package-holiday destination. Normally including flights, accommodation, transfers to and from the airport and sometimes car hire and child care, a package can be less expensive and is a convenient way to arrange a holiday, especially for families.

### 3 Reservations

It is becoming easier to make reservations with hotels and resorts via the Internet, although the traditional way of making a booking by telephone and fax is still the norm. A credit card may be used to make a deposit, and confirmation is likely to be sent by email or post.

### 4 Booking Before You Go

While there are many hotels, resort complexes and villas of all star ratings on the islands, they can get booked up many months, even

years, in advance by the big tour operators. Therefore, it is wise to book in advance in high season, or if you wish to stay at a particular location or have specific requirements.

### 5 Booking When You Get There

Some visitors might prefer the spontaneity of island hopping and selecting accommodation on arrival. Airports and ports generally have tourist information offices where local hotels, resorts, villas and camp sites can assist you in your search for a suitable place to stay. On some islands, proprietors still meet ferries.

### 6 Tipping

It is generally unnecessary to tip if a hotel employee has shown you to your room, although if the person has been particularly helpful or you are staying in a five-star hotel with porters, then you might like to tip a few euros. Chamber staff would also appreciate a few euros for their services.

### 7 Hotel Grading

Greek Island hotels and tourist accommodation is monitored by the Greek National Tourist Organization. It regularly monitors establishments to ensure its strict guidelines for facilities and services are met, and implements a grading system. Grades range

from A for the best to E, plus an L grade for luxury hotels.

### 8 Apartments

Apartments designated for tourists come under the same Greek National Tourist Organization's classification system as hotels, irrespective of whether they are private or in a resort-style complex. Grades, and in turn prices, are dependent on the facilities offered, such as a communal swimming pool, a maid service and the number of bedrooms.

### 9 Villas

A villa holiday can be a good option for visitors keen on flexibility. Ranging from two-bedroom villas to large, luxurious residences. Always check if they come fully equipped. Most will include the use of a swimming pool with sun loungers. Like apartments, villas are graded and can be located in town centres or the countryside.

### 10 Rural Properties

A great way to sample local life is to stay in a private rural villa or in a villager's own home. Villas, which come under the grading system if designed for tourists, are often advertised privately or are available through a specialist company, while rooms can be found simply by asking at the local coffee shop.
