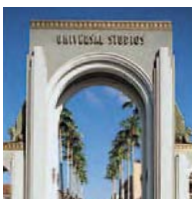

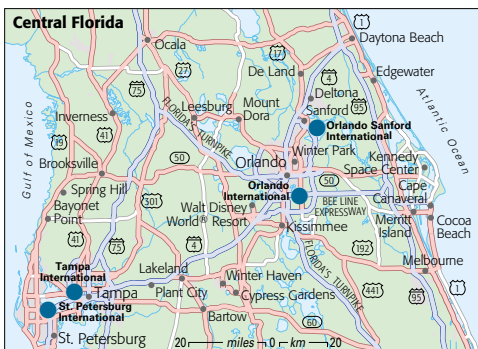

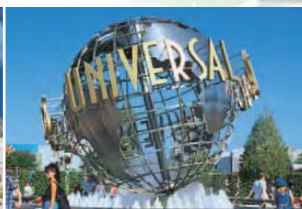
## TOP 10 Orlando Area by Area

## TOP 10 Orlando's Highlights

One word describes Orlando's transformation in the last three decades: *stunning*. The city and its suburbs have gone through a Cinderella-like metamorphosis, where plain Jane has become a worldly beauty. Millions of tourists are seduced every year by sophisticated resorts, a wide range of theme parks, must-see attractions, happening nightclubs, and winning restaurants. Here are the Top 10 Orlando sights – Orlando's best of the best.



### 1 The Magic Kingdom Park

The park that started Disney's Florida empire combines fantasy, adventure, and the future in a package of rides and shows that focuses on Disney movies and TV programs. See pp8–11.

### 2 Epcot

Inquiring minds love this Disney park, which features technology in Future World and the culture, architecture and enticing food of 11 nations in World Showcase. See pp12–15.

### 3 Disney-MGM Studios

Lights, camera, action! Movies, TV shows and stomach-churning thrill rides come together in a theme park that sometimes also serves as a working studio. See pp16–17.

### 4 Disney's Animal Kingdom Park

Visitors are brought face to face with the wild world of animals, but this kingdom's spacious environmental design doesn't always offer a front-row seat. See pp18–19.



### 5 Islands of Adventure

Universal's top-of-the-pile theme park is a magnet for thrill jockeys, with some of the fastest, highest, and best rides in town. Be warned that 9 of its 13 rides have height or health restrictions, so it's not for the young, weak of stomach, or squeamish. See pp20–23.



## 6 Universal Studios Florida

What Disney can do, Universal can equal. The movie and TV themes here can make people's wildest dreams come true or worst nightmares a (special effects) reality. From *Jaws* to *Terminator*, the silver screen comes to life. *See pp24-7.*



## 7 SeaWorld

Its laid-back pace, educational angle, and animal actors make this a popular stop for those wanting a break from the lines and stifling crowds at other parks. *See pp28-31.*

## 8 Wet 'n Wild

Some say it's hard to beat Disney's water parks, but this rival has the most thrills money can buy on the city's water scene. *See pp34-5.*

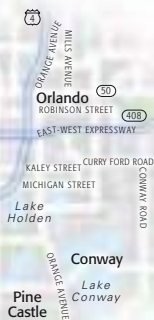


## 9 Merritt Island

Located at the Kennedy Space Center, this wildlife refuge is great for learning about local and migrating animals, while also enjoying a bit of fishing or hiking. *See pp36-7.*

## 10 Kennedy Space Center

The appeal of man in space has turned America's No. 1 space center into a stellar attraction complete with live shuttle and rocket launches. *See pp38-41.*





## TOP 10 The Magic Kingdom® Park

Walt Disney's first Florida theme park opened in 1971, envisaged as a place where dreams could come true, even if only for a little while. It took six years and \$400 million to create "Disneyland East," which has surpassed Walt's own dream: instead of being a spin-off of California's Disneyland Park, it has become the USA's most popular theme park, attracting more than 15 million visitors every year (some 40,000 each day). Although little has changed in 30 years, with more than 40 major attractions and countless minor ones, this is a true fantasy land for the young and young at heart.

**E** A smoked turkey leg at Tomorrowland's Lunching Pad makes a good quick bite, but it's cheaper to bring your own snacks and water (bottles can be filled at the park's numerous fountains).

**F** FastPass (see p132), cuts the amount of time spent standing in line for the park's most popular rides and shows.

The little publicized E Ride Nights let 5,000 people into the park at a reduced rate for three hours on select nights.

Consider visiting mid-week, as the park is at its busiest on weekends and early in the week.

As in all Disney parks, smoking is only allowed in designated outside areas.

**1** **Splash Mountain**  
Disney's 1946 film, *Song of the South*, inspires this wildly popular flume ride with Brer Rabbit leading the way through swamps, caves, and "the Laughing Place." Expect twists, turns, and a 52-ft (16-m), 45-degree, 40-mph (64-km) climax.

**2** **Big Thunder Mountain Railroad**  
Not the raciest of coasters, but the turns and dips, and realistic scenery, combine to make this an exciting trip on a runaway train through gold-rush country (above).

**3** **The Barnstormer at Goofy's Wiseacre Farm**  
Kids and some parents love this mini-roller coaster, which looks like a crop duster plane with Goofy at the controls.



**4** **Space Mountain**  
Orlando's first in-the-dark roller coaster is a ride on a rocket that shoots through hairpin turns and drops at what feels like breakneck speed, although top speed is only 28 mph (45 kmph). The cosmic effects and detail enhance this thrilling ride.

**5** **Stich's Great Escape**  
This family-friendly adventure is based on the mayhem of Stich's experiment in outer space. The ride uses sophisticated technology, with sights, sounds, and smells to add to the pandemonium.



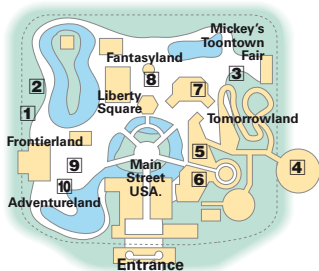


## 6 Buzz Lightyear's Space Ranger Spin

Use the laser cannons on the dashboard to set off sight-and-sound effects as you hurtle through the sky and help *Toy Story's* most famous hero save the world.

## 7 The Many Adventures of Winnie the Pooh

Pooh, Eeyore, and a whole host of A. A. Milne's lovable characters come to life in this tranquil ride through the Hundred Acre Wood.

## 8 Cinderella's Golden Carrousel

This wonderfully refurbished 1917 carousel is a real beauty. It has handsome wooden horses and an organ that plays Disney classics. Kids love it, and adults love reminiscing about the rides of yesteryear.



### Park Guide

Due to the crowds and distance involved, it takes around 20 minutes to get from the parking lots (via tram, boat, or monorail) to the park's attractions. Once inside, the Tip Board at the end of Main Street USA has the latest information on the length of lines and times of shows. Park maps are available from Guest Services to the left of the entrance. You'll need at least a day or parts of several to get the most out of the Magic Kingdom.

## 9 The Magic Carpets of Aladdin

This new Disney ride has four-passenger carpets which glide gently up and down and from side to side around a giant genie's bottle. But watch out for the sneaky, water-spitting camels.

## 10 Pirates of the Caribbean

Timbers are a-shiver as your boat cruises past a town under siege from a band of rum-soaked, Audio-Animatronic buccaneers. Dank dungeons, yo-ho-ho's, and brazen wenches – all scurvy pirate life is here.

## 10 Shows & Next Best Rides

### 1 Wishes Nighttime Spectacular

This explosive show runs nightly during summer and holidays (occasionally at other times the year). Liberty Square, Mickey's Toontown Fair, and Frontierland are the best areas in the park to take in the fabulous display. If you want to view from outside the Magic Kingdom, Disney's Grand Floridian, Polynesian, Contemporary, and Wilderness Lodge resorts all have good views from upper floors.

### 2 Walt Disney World Railroad

The antique steam-driven trains that travel this 1.5-mile (2-km) perimeter track offer a good overview of the park's sights, but more importantly allow you to get from A to B without the legwork. It stops at City Hall, Main Street USA, Frontierland, and Mickey's Toontown Fair.

### 3 Cinderella Castle

Standing 185 ft (56 m) high, this park icon is a sight to behold. Complete with Gothic spires, it's the quintessential fairytale castle, reminiscent of Neuschwanstein, mad King Ludwig of Bavaria's creation. Inside, there's only one thing of interest to visitors, the Cinderella's Royal Table restaurant, where guests can partake of a character breakfast (see p71).

### 4 Snow White's Scary Adventures

This ride lost some of its scary scenes with the evil queen and wicked witch to make it more enjoyable for smaller children. The queen still makes an appearance but is now joined by good-girl Snow White and the Prince.

### 5 It's a Small World

The insidious theme song will eat at your brain for months



after you visit, but small kids adore this slow-boat cruise through “lands” where small, Audio-Animatronic, costumed characters sing *It's a Small World After All* in their Munchkin-like voices.

## 6 Hall of Presidents

Every US president has an Audio-Animatronic likeness in this educational show that really highlights the wizardry of Walt Disney Imagineers (designers). The presidents nod and wave, and Abe Lincoln is the keynote speaker.

## 7 Diamond Horseshoe Saloon Revue

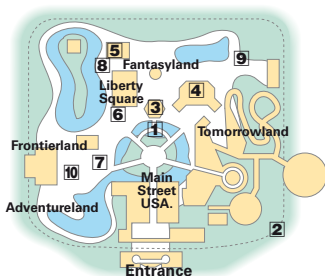
This is a high-octane show at Dr. Bill U. Later's saloon. The curtain rises, and the town marshal sings and jokes with the audience, Miss Lucille L'Amour and her dance-hall girls can-can for dear life, while cowboys cavort energetically around the set.

## 8 Haunted Mansion

A corny yet fun special-effects show with a cult following. It's a slow-moving, slightly scary ride-in-the-dark that passes a ghostly ball, graveyard band, and weird flying objects.

## 9 Mickey's Toontown Fair

Bring your autograph books to Mickey's Toontown Fair – inside the fairground's candy-striped tents are many Disney characters. There's lots of fun for little kids, such as spongy Toon Park, with its foam topiary animals.

## 10 Country Bear Jamboree

Audio-Animatronic bears croon and bellow songs in this knee-slapping revue. The finale has the audience hooting and clapping for an encore.

### Magic Kingdom Parades

During summer (and occasionally at other times of the year) a key park event is the evening parade (times vary). The original show was the Main Street Electrical Parade, which was christened at California's Disneyland Park before moving to the Magic Kingdom in 1977. Its replacement is the bigger, better, and brighter SpectroMagic. This electrifying, 20-minute extravaganza brings fountains, creatures, and floats filled with Disney characters to “light.” It has no less than 204 speakers cranking out 72,000 watts, uses 75 tons of batteries (enough to power 90 houses for the duration), and 100 miles (160 km) of fiber-optic cable. The whole show is powered by 30 mini-computers. Arrive early and try to find a spot in front of the castle. If you can't stay until dark falls, there's a 15-minute Share the Dream Come True Parade (3pm daily) where guests can see their favorite Disney characters in a procession that leaves from Frontierland to finish off down Main Street USA.

**TOP 10 Epcot®**

Walt Disney imagined Epcot (*Experimental Prototype Community of Tomorrow*) as a futuristic township where people could live, work, and play in technologically enhanced splendor. After his death in 1966, the idea changed dramatically, and Epcot opened in 1982 as a park of two halves: Future World focuses on science, technology, and the environment, while World Showcase spotlights the cultures of several nations. The pairing works because both sections are educational and appeal to curious adults and kids alike. Be warned, the park is vast, a fact that has led some to joke that its name is an acronym for "Every Person Comes Out Tired."

**1** Future World: the Coral Reef in the Living Seas Pavilion is way better than most in-park restaurants (see p95). Book ahead. World Showcase: Try fresh pastries at the Patisserie in the French Pavilion.

**2** Use FastPass (see p132) a ride reservation system.

Save time and energy by using the shuttle boats to cross from Future World to the World Showcase.

This theme park is best toured in two days, if not more.

**1 Test Track**  
 Buckle up for a \$60-dollar ride, created by a Disney-General Motors partnership. Riders in a six-passenger convertible car are taken through exhilarating brake tests, S-curves, and a 12-second, 65-mph (104-kmph) burst of speed. You must be at least 40 inches (102 cm) tall to ride.

**2 Innoventions East**  
 A refrigerator that can compile a grocery list and a toilet seat with a built-in warmer are among the "smart" furnishings in the House of Innoventions exhibit. Kids like this pavilion's Internet Zone with games such as virtual tag.

**3 Innoventions West**  
 Few can resist Video Games of Tomorrow, a Sega presentation that



lets visitors try out next generation games. In the same pavilion, Medicine's New Vision is an exhibit that offers video games along a medical theme.

**4 The Living Seas**  
 Come face to face with sharks, barracudas, manatees, and more on a cinematic journey to an undersea laboratory. There are several hands-on exhibits including a deep sea diving suit that can be tried on.

**5 Ellen's Energy Adventure**  
 A show-and-ride focusing on themes from "fossil fuel" dinosaurs to future energy concerns.

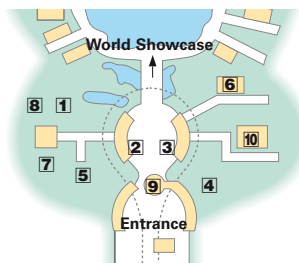


## 6 Honey I Shrank the Audience

Get ready to flinch during the Imagination Pavilion's larger-than-life film show. Seats vibrate as you're terrorized by giant mice. The family cat and dog, and a colossal 5-year-old also loom large before you "escape."

## 7 Body Wars

Hold tight as this Wonders of Life Pavilion show "reduces" you to the size of a cell for a shake, rattle, and roll rescue mission inside a human body (40-inch/102-cm minimum height).

## 8 Mission: SPACE

This popular thrill ride takes you on a journey to space with a crash landing on Mars. It is intense and not for anyone prone to motion sickness, or sensitive to tight spaces, loud noises or spinning. If you don't go on the "Mission" you can enjoy interactive games at the "Advance Training Lab."



## Park Guide

The main entrance is convenient for Future World, where nine pavilions encircle Spaceship Earth. Getting to World Showcase Lagoon and the 11 nations beyond requires a longer trek, though handy boat shuttles run from Showcase Plaza to the pavilions of Germany and Morocco. A second entrance, at International Gateway, is accessible from Disney's Yacht Club, Beach Club, and BoardWalk Inn resorts. Maps that give up-to-date show information are available at both entrances.

## 9 Spaceship Earth

The ride inside is nothing to write home about. But, this giant golf ball – actually a 180-ft (55-m) geosphere (above) – is an engineering marvel, made of 11,324 triangular aluminum panels that absorb the rain rather than letting it run off.

## 10 Living with the Land

The best of the vast Land Pavilion's exhibits involves a boat ride through rain forest, desert, and prairie biomes. It's followed by a look at agricultural experiments including hydroponics and growing plants in simulated Martian soil.

## 10 World Showcase Pavilions

**1 Canada** The star attraction here is the inspirational 360-degree CircleVision film, *O Canada!*, which reveals some of the country's scenic wonders. You also get to experience traveling by dogsled. Outside, Canada's rugged terrain is convincingly re-created. Gardens that are based on Victoria's Butchart gardens, a replica of an Indian village, and the Northwest Mercantile store, selling items such as tribal crafts and Canadian maple syrup, can be explored.

**2 China** The CircleVision movie, *Wonders of China*, is a fascinating journey through China's natural and man-made riches. The pavilion features a 15th-century Ming dynasty temple, a ceremonial gate, and tranquil gardens. The Yong Feng Shangdian Department Store (see p92) is a wonderful treasure

trove of Asian goodies. Try not to miss the dynamic Dragon Legend Acrobats who perform several times each day.

**3 Morocco** Look for the Koutoubia minaret, a copy of the tower from a 12th-century mosque in Marrakesh, and you've found this exotic pavilion. Inside, the typical souk architecture is embellished by beautiful carvings and mosaics. The Casbah marketplace (see p92) is bursting with hard-to-resist crafts sold by "merchants," and you can see carpets being woven on looms. "Local" cuisine such as couscous is available in the Pavilion's restaurant (see p97).

**4 American Adventure** Enhance your knowledge of US history in a 30-minute dramatization featuring Audio-Animatronic actors. Mark Twain and Benjamin Franklin are the narrators who explain key events, including the

writing of the Declaration of Independence, and Susan B. Anthony speaks out for women's rights. The Voices of Liberty singers perform in the main hall of the pavilion, which is modeled on Philadelphia's Liberty Hall.

## 5 Japan

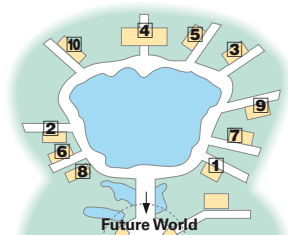
A breathtaking five-story pagoda, based on Nara's 8th-century Horyuji temple, forms the centerpiece of this architecturally amazing pavilion. The traditional Japanese gardens are pretty impressive, too, and a perfect spot to escape the throngs. The peace and quiet is only occasionally broken by the beat of drums: go investigate: the Maturiza troupe is one of the best shows in Epcot.

## 6 Norway

Norway's Maelstrom ride takes you on a 10-minute journey through fiords and fairy-tale forests in a dragon-headed vessel. You land in a 10th-century Viking village, where a short film portrays Norway's natural treasures. The realistic replica of Oslo's 14th-century Akershus Castle houses the restaurant (see p95).

## 7 United Kingdom

Examples of typical British architecture through the ages line the quaint cobblestone streets here. Apart from shops selling quintessential British merchandise

(teas, china, crystal, and more), there's also a park with a bandstand and Beatles impersonators providing entertainment.

## 8 Mexico

El Rio del Tiempo (River of Time) is an eight-minute multimedia boat ride that explores Mexico's past and present, from the Yucatan's Mayan pyramids (the pavilion is housed in a replica of one) to the urban bustle of Mexico City life. Mariachis entertain, and there's a *plaza* with stalls selling colorful souvenirs such as sombreros, *piñatas*, and leather goods.

## 9 France

This pavilion sports scale replicas, including the Eiffel Tower, and shops selling French products. The 18-minute, five-screen film, which sweeps through glorious landscapes accompanied by the music of French composers is a highlight.

## 10 Germany

In this cartoon-like, archetypal German village, you'll find a miniature model railroad, including a wonderfully detailed Bavarian Village. The Biergarten restaurant (complete with brass band) serves traditional food, and shops sell everything from Hummel figurines to wines and cuckoo clocks.

### IllumiNations

Created to celebrate the new millennium, Epcot's stunning fireworks and laser show is still thrilling visitors every night at 9pm. It is a grand half-hour, sound-and-vision nightcap which also brings the World Showcase Lagoon fountains into the act. There are scores of good viewing places all around the edge of the Lagoon.

## TOP 10 Disney-MGM Studios

Like Universal Studios, Disney-MGM Studios underscores Orlando's standing as a small, but growing, film production center and offers an up-close look at the world of "Lights! Camera! Action!". The park cost \$300 million to create and the result is an effective fusion of fun and information; the attractions tend to be complex, involving rides, shows, and educational commentary, so there really is something for everyone. Nostalgic references to Hollywood's heyday are balanced by high-tech trickery, making this a must for anyone with even a remote interest in the movies.

☉ A hand-dipped ice-cream cone at Hollywood Scoops slides down a treat, but for more substantial refreshment, try the Sci-Fi Dine-In Theater, serving diner fare in a 1950s retro setting, where guests can watch B-movie clips.

☉ Use FastPass (see p132), a ride reservation system, to cut the amount of time spent standing in line for the most popular rides and shows.

A sign warns, "prepare to merge as you've never merged before," but by then it's too late. Your limo zooms from 0 to 60 mph (97 kmph) in 2.8 seconds and into multiple inversions as Aerosmith blares at 32,000 watts (above).

#### 2 Twilight Zone™ Tower of Terror

The spooky surroundings are a façade in front of the real terror, a gut-tightening, 13-story fall. To many, it's Disney's best thrill ride.

#### 3 Fantasmic!

Lasers, fireworks, waterborne images, and a sorcerer mouse are the stars of this end-of-day extravaganza that pits the forces of good against Disney villains such as Cruella De Ville and Maleficent. Performance times vary seasonally.



#### 4 Indiana Jones™ Epic Stunt Spectacular

Indy's action-packed day is full of thrills and spills, and near-death encounters. A stunt co-ordinator explains how it's all done.

#### 5 Jim Henson's Muppet\*Vision 3-D

Miss Piggy, Kermit, and the rest of the crew star in a show celebrating both Henson's legacy and Disney's special-effects wizardry and audio-animatronics.

## 6 Disney-MGM Studios Backlot Tour

What begins as a tram tour through movie sets and the prop department ends at Catastrophe Canyon. Here, explosions, floods, and fire give riders a bit of a shake-up before getting to see behind the Canyon's scenes.

## 7 Who Wants to Be a Millionaire – Play It!

Sorry, no cash is involved. But the theme park version of this TV game show gives contestants a shot at 15 multiple-choice questions and a chance to win prizes, including a trip to New York to see a taping of the real show.

## 8 Star Tours

Climb in and swallow hard: your 40-seat spacecraft is going on a journey riddled with dips, bumps, and laser fire. The ride's technology may be a bit outdated, but forgiving Star Wars fans still say this ride hits the spot.



## Park Guide

Pick up a map from Guest Services, to the left of the entrance. Staff are on hand to help you find your way around and provide information. The tip board at Sunset and Hollywood boulevards lists up-to-the-minute information on show schedules, wait times, visiting celebrities, and ride or show closures. This park tends to be less busy at the beginning of the week, when many visitors hit the Magic Kingdom or Epcot, and it can easily be tackled in one day.

## 9 Beauty and the Beast Live on Stage!

The music from the animated film alone is enough to sell this Broadway-style show. The sets, costumes, and production numbers are pretty spectacular, too.

## 10 Voyage of the Little Mermaid

This show uses cartoons, live characters and Audio-Animatronics, as well as special effects with lasers and water to create an underwater grotto. Young children may find the lightning storm scary.

# TOP 10 Disney's Animal Kingdom® Park

As the name implies, wildlife rules at the latest addition to Disney's empire of fun. Here, the serious issue of conservation is combined with the playfulness of a theme park, though critics complain that the landscaping makes it hard to see the animals, especially in the hottest parts of the day. There's compensation in the fact that the park has some enthralling shows and rides, and rumor has it that future plans for a new zone include a roller coaster. For now, the park is all about getting back to nature, albeit of a more exotic kind than the one Florida usually has to offer.

🕒 The best times to see the animals are as soon as the park opens and within an hour of it closing, especially during the hot months (May–Sep).

### 1 Kilimanjaro Safaris

The park's most popular ride (right) puts you on a large safari jeep to bump along dirt tracks looking for black rhinos, lions, zebras, and more. You're reminded that it's a theme park, though, as a staged adventure unfolds – guests have to save the elephants from “poachers.” The animals are real, but that baobab tree was made by talented Disney artists, known as Imagineers.

### 2 Pangani Forest Exploration Trail

As you're surrounded by thick vegetation, it's sometimes hard to see the animals on this walk-in-the-woods with a difference. The gorillas are the main attraction, but if the stars of the show prove shy, there are also hippos, exotic birds, and weird-looking mole-rats.



### 3 Festival of The Lion King

One of Orlando's best shows won't fail to throw you into the spirit of things when it gets going. This production uses singers, dancers, and The Lion King's popular score to emphasize nature's diversity.

### 4 Kali River Rapids

The park's conservation message is evident on this exciting raft ride, which passes from a lush landscape to one in the process of being scorched for logging. You need to be 38 inches (96 cm) tall or more to ride, and like to get wet!



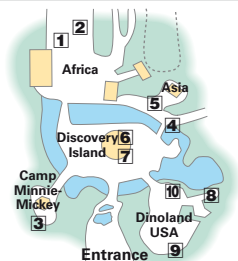


## 5 Maharajah Jungle Trek

The giant Old World fruit bats, some with man-sized wingspans, are easily spotted, but the Bengal tigers are elusive when it's hot. You might also see Komodo dragons, tapirs, and deer on this atmospheric Asian stroll.

## 6 Tree of Life

The park's symbol is this 145-ft (44-m) tall tree created by Walt Disney Imagineers. Look carefully: there are 325 mammals, reptiles, amphibians, insects, birds, dinosaurs, and Mickey's carved into its trunk, limbs, and roots.

## 7 It's Tough to Be a Bug!

Located inside the Tree of Life's 50-ft (15-m) base, this 3-D, effect-filled show offers a view of the world from an insect's perspective. The climax is sure to make an impression.

## 8 Tarzan™ Rocks!

Dancers, tumblers, and daring (often aerial) in-line skaters wearing spectacular costumes are all part of this exhilarating show, although it's Phil Collins' music that really gets the audience rocking.

The park, which is Walt Disney World Resort's largest, is divided into six zones: Oasis (the entrance area); Discovery Island (with the Tree of Life at its center); and the lands of Camp Minnie-Mickey (the main children's zone), Africa, Asia, and Dinoland USA radiating out from it. Maps are available at Guest Relations, at the entrance to the park.

## 9 DINOSAUR

Expect to be shaken up on this wild ride, which takes you back 65 million years. Convincing animatronic dinosaurs lurk in the darkness. There's a 40-inch (102-cm) minimum height requirement.

## 10 The Boneyard

Possibly the best of its kind in any of the Disney parks, this playground is a perfect place for kids to burn off surplus energy. The play area is built around the "remains" of dinosaurs. It's both educational and fun.

## TOP 10 Islands of Adventure

Orlando didn't have a lot to offer adrenalin junkies until Universal unveiled its second Central Florida park in 1999. Billed as the "world's most technologically advanced theme park," no local rivals can touch Islands of Adventure's (IOA) thrill power and innovation (although Tampa's Busch Gardens [see p82] is also highly rated by thrill-seekers). With terrifying roller coasters, three heart-stopping water attractions, and stunningly creative rides, it is the place to head for those who like to live dangerously.

- ➊ Go on. Try a green eggs and ham sandwich at the Green Eggs and Ham Café.
- ➋ The Universal Express system (see p132) cuts the amount of time spent standing in line for the most popular rides and shows.

Some of the park's rides have shorter lines for single guests and couples willing to split up.

During thunderstorms, the park's plentiful outdoor rides close.

### 2 The Amazing Adventures of Spider-Man

Slap on 3-D glasses and battle the baddies while fireballs and other computer-generated objects fly at you. The technology is amazing (below).



### 3 Doctor Doom's Fearfall

This ride climbs 200 ft (61 m), before dropping and pausing at several levels to maximum thrilling effect.

### 4 Pteranodon Flyers

Eye-catching metal gondolas swing from side to side on this prehistoric bird's-eye tour around the park's Jurassic Park zone.

### 1 Incredible Hulk Coaster

You blast out of the darkness at 40 mph (64 kmph), go weightless, and endure seven inversions and two drops during this white-knuckle ride (below).



### 5 Jurassic Park River Adventure

This ride starts slowly but quickly picks up speed as some raptors get loose (below). To escape you will have to take an 85-ft (26-m), flume-style plunge.



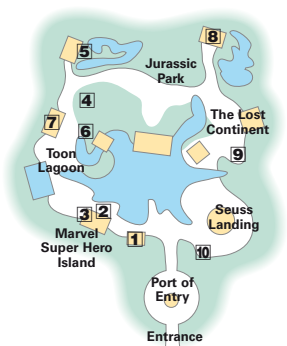


## 6 Popeye & Bluto's Bilge-Rat Barges

The water is freezing on what is Florida's bounciest raft ride. Expect to be squirted, splashed, or even drenched as your 12-passenger "barge" goes the course.

## 7 Dudley Do-Right's Ripsaw Falls

Six-passenger logs cruise the lagoon before giving riders an excuse for a good squeal, a steep drop at 50 mph (80 kmph). The ride seems to finish up "underwater."

Despite the elevators and moving sidewalks, it can still take 20 minutes to get to the attractions from the parking lot. Try to arrive early; if you are staying in a Universal Resort, you can get in before other visitors. Despite the predominance of scary rides, the park's Seuss Landing will keep younger kids happy. Maps for a handy boat shuttle, which links Port of Entry and Jurassic Park, are available at Guest Relations to the right of the Port of Entry.

## 8 Dueling Dragons

These two floorless coasters do five rollovers and come within 1 ft (30 cm) of each other no less than three times. If you are really courageous, go for seats in the front row.

## 9 Poseidon's Fury: Escape from the Lost City

Pass through a swirling vortex of water, then look on as all hell breaks loose when Poseidon and Zeus have an almighty battle.

## 10 The Cat in the Hat

Hold on as your couch spins and turns through 18 Seussian scenes. The Cat, Thing One, and Thing Two join you on a ride through a day that's anything but ordinary.

## TOP 10 Gentler Attractions

### 1 One Fish, Two Fish, Red Fish, Blue Fish

Fly your fish up, down, and all around on an aerial carousel ride just 15 ft (4 m) off the ground. If you don't do what the song says, you'll get sprayed with water.

### 2 Caro-Seuss-El

This merry-go-round replaces the traditional horses with interactive versions of Dr. Seuss's cowfish, elephant birds, and mulligatawnies. Regular carousels will never seem the same again.

### 3 If I Ran the Zoo

The 19 interactive stations in this Seussian playground use features such as flying water snakes, caves, and water cannons, and include a place to tickle the toes of a Seussian critter.

### 4 Jurassic Park Discovery Center

See through a dinosaur's eyes, match your DNA to theirs, and watch an animatronic velociraptor "hatch" in the laboratory. There are several interactive stations, where kids can brush up on their dinosaur facts.

### 5 Triceratops Discovery Trail

"She" is a 24-ft- (7-m) long, 10-ft- (3-m) high animatronic *Triceratops* dinosaur that blinks, breathes, emits a hooting cry,

and lets some guests touch her. Visit her in her paddock and listen to "trainers" talk about her care.

### 6 Camp Jurassic

Burn off energy in an adventure playground full of places to explore, including dark caves where "spitters" (small dinosaurs) lurk. See if you can find out how to make dinosaurs roar.

### 7 Me Ship, The Olive

The play area here is full of interactive fun, while Cargo Crane offers an alternative hands-on experience: a chance to fire water cannons at riders on Popeye & Bluto's Bilge-Rat Barges (see p21).

### 8 Flying Unicorn

Dueling Dragons (see p21) it ain't. This kiddie coaster has a gentle corkscrew action. Riders must be 36 inches (90 cm) tall.

### 9 The Eighth Voyage of Sinbad

This show is filled with stunts, giant flames, and explosions, as Sinbad hunts for lost treasure.

### 10 Storm Force Accelatron

Dizziness is the name of the game as you and X-Men superhero Storm spin your vehicle fast enough to create electrical energy that will send the evil Magneto to the great beyond.

- 1 Steven Spielberg produced the 3-D films shown in Spider-Man.
- 2 Spider-Man's screens are up to 90 ft (27 m) wide.
- 3 The 15-Hz square audio wave shock used in Spider-Man is a frequency low enough to make humans sick.

- 5 Dueling Dragons' Fire Dragon can travel at up to 60 mph (96 kmph), the Ice Dragon at up to 55 mph (88 kmph).

## IOA's "State-of-the-Future" Rides

Guests at Islands of Adventure (IOA) get a first-hand demonstration of some of the most technologically advanced coasters and attractions ever created. At the top of the list is *The Amazing Adventures of Spider-Man* (see p20), a ride that took half a decade and more than \$100 million to develop. New digital film technologies had to be invented for the convincing floor-to-ceiling 3-D images that are projected to a moving audience. The "Scoop" motion simulator, wind cannons, and pyrotechnics are precision-synchronized by a vast computer network. Computers also play a big part in the *Dueling Dragons* ride (see p21). They calculate the weight of every passenger load, then adjust the speed and departure sequence in order to maximize thrills on this duel coaster. Unique to the *Incredible Hulk Coaster* (see p20) is a thrust system that blasts cars out of a tunnel instead of the usual long, slow haul to the top of an incline. But even with all these high-tech innovations, some low-tech touches can't be avoided. Just below the Hulk stretches a huge net designed to catch personal belongings that fall from screaming riders.

Riders experience zero-gravity inversions as they are spun upside down at 110 ft (33 m) above the ground before dropping 105 ft (32 m) at more than 60 mph (96 kmph)

# TOP 10 Universal Studios Florida

Universal's first park in Florida opened in 1990, with movie-themed rides and shows, and a mission to steal some of Disney-MGM's limelight. But it is only since a recent revamp that the park has really taken off, due largely to the runaway success of the latest additions, the hugely popular *Men in Black Alien Attack*, *Terminator 2: 3-D*, and the child-friendly *Woody Woodpecker's KidZone*.

Don your movie star shades and grab a pastry and a cappuccino at the Beverly Hills Boulangerie.

The Universal Express ticket (see p132) lets you cut the amount of time spent in lines for the most popular rides and shows.

### 1 Terminator 2: 3-D

Live stage action, six 8-ft (2.4-m) robots, and an amazing three-screen, 3-D film (below) combine for a stunning, action-packed show (PG-13).

### 2 Back to the Future – The Ride

This head-spinning motion simulator puts original cast member Christopher Lloyd on screen, urging you through some scary mind-altering moments in space.



### 5 Shrek 4-D

This 13-minute fun-packed movie ride features excellent special effects, and is the bridge to *Shrek 2*, the next installment in the series.







## 6 Jaws

A leisurely boat tour turns into a nightmare when a large dorsal fin appears and Jaws attacks. This \$45-million ride is even scarier after dark, but the special effects are spectacular at any time of the day.

## 7 Earthquake – The Big One

All hell breaks loose when a San Francisco subway car is hit by a massive quake. Amazing effects include explosions and a catastrophic flood.

## Park Guide

It takes about 20 minutes to get from the parking lot to the attractions. Once inside, if you feel disoriented, park hosts can advise you on how best to get from A to B. If you are staying at a Universal hotel, make use of the early admission perk; if you haven't got that option, try to arrive an hour before the park opens and hit the major rides first. The park tends to be quietest midweek, and the crowds seem to evaporate when it rains, so this park is a good bet in bad weather. While it's mostly a built up mix of soundstages, backlots, sets, and shops, there are some green areas in which to take time out.



## 8 Jimmy Neutron's Nicktoon Blast

Board your rocket and chase the evil Ooblar in this neutronic driving race through a universe filled with Nickelodeon characters, including SpongeBob, Hey Arnold, and Rugrats.

## 9 Lucy: A Tribute

Lucille Ball, star of the much loved *I love Lucy* show is remembered in this exhibition. Costumes, photographs, and awards are some of the items on display chronicling her remarkable life and career.

## 10 Revenge of The Mummy

This high-speed roller-coaster propels guests through Egyptian tombs to face their fears. "Dark ride" scenes and a revolutionary induction track ensures its popularity.

Non-purist fans of this film, who don't need to see John Belushi and Dan Ackroyd in the key roles, will enjoy this foot-stomping 20-minute revue.

### 5 Animal Planet Live!

The park's newest show features wild, wacky, and occasionally weird live and video animal action. Expect plenty of audience participation.

### 6 Woody Woodpecker's Nuthouse Coaster

Very similar to the Barnstormer ride in Disney's Magic Kingdom (see p8), this 55-second ride for the young (and timid adults) has just one corkscrew curve.

### 7 E. T. Adventure

Everyone's favorite extra-terrestrial takes guests on a bike ride to save his planet. Peddle through strange landscapes to meet Tickli Moot Moot and other characters that Steven Spielberg created for this ride.

### 8 A Day in the Park with Barney

The puffy purple dinosaur is adored by preschool kids, so this 25-minute sing-along show is guaranteed to get small fans into a frenzy. Everyone else should probably steer clear.

### 9 Fievel's Playland

This partially hidden water playground has a house for kids to explore and a mini water slide, for which the line is often painfully slow.

### 10 Kidzone Trolley Characters Meet and Greet

This is the place to come and meet some of your favorite cartoon characters. They will happily pose for photos and goof around with children.

## Behind the scenes

*Universal Studios Florida is more than just a tourist attraction. It is also the state's largest full-service studio facility and the heart of central Florida's burgeoning film and television production industry – an industry that rings Orlando's cash registers to the tune of nearly \$500 million dollars annually. It's easy to see why the city is firmly in contention for the nickname "Hollywood East." Since opening in 1988, Universal Studios Florida has been the production site for more than 2,000 television shows, commercials, music videos, and movies. As well as nine enormous soundstages, there are plenty of locations around the park that are used for filming, from downtown Manhattan to the Wild West. If park guests want to be part of some camera action, they can join the studio audience when TV shows shoot episodes at Universal. Tickets for these productions are typically distributed free of charge on the day of taping. Visitors can check in advance with Guest Services to find out if special event TV shows will be taped during their visit: shooting boards and the park map should also give up-to-date details.*



### Star Spotting

Universal Studios doesn't just allow you to "ride the movies." Here, you get to meet the stars, too. Actors playing a whole host of silver screen legends and characters including the Marx Brothers, Marilyn Monroe, Charlie Chaplin, and the Flintstones can be seen around the park (especially in the Front Lot) and are always willing to pose for photos.

## TOP 10 SeaWorld Orlando

Opened in 1973, SeaWorld Orlando is the city's third major attraction. But its unique marine wildlife focus and educational goals puts it in a league all of its own. Guests can get up close and personal with killer whales, sea lions, manatees, rays, and a host of other watery creatures. The recent thrill ride additions have expanded the park's appeal to teens, confirming SeaWorld as an essential part of any family's Orlando visit.

### 2 Wild Arctic

An impressive and chilly re-creation of the Arctic, with polar bears (below), beluga whales, and walrus. Guests can opt to "arrive" by a simulated helicopter ride, but the line will be longer.



### 3 Kraken

Billed as the "tallest, fastest, longest, and only floorless roller coaster in Orlando," Kraken is a fearsome thrill. It takes riders up 15 stories, spins them upside down seven times, and goes under water, all at speeds up to 65 mph (104.6 kmph).

### 1 Shamu Adventure

The park's best live show. Killer whales (below) fling trainers in the air, beach themselves close to the crowd, and splash the first 14 rows of the audience.



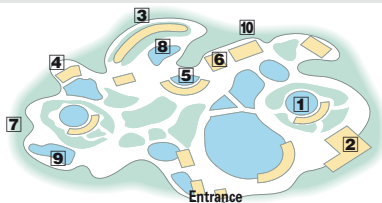
### 4 Journey to Atlantis

The big draw of this flume ride is a 60-ft (18-m) drop, but the surprise bonus is the twisting roller coaster section near the end. Everyone should expect to get wet, especially those in the front of the car.

### 5 Clyde & Seamore Take Pirate Island

This swashbuckling live-action comedy features a cast of mischievous sea lions and otters who steal the show from their human co-stars.

### 6 Shark Encounter

Here, thanks to the world's largest underwater acrylic tunnel, you can stand six inches (15 cm) from a toothy shark and glide on a people-mover through a world of slithery eels, pufferfish, and sleek barracuda.

### 7 Manatees: The Last Generation?

The hulking "sea cow" is one of the Earth's gentlest creatures but endangered due to injuries from boat propellers. This exhibit has above- and below-water viewing of those brought here to recuperate.



### 8 Pacific Point Preserve

On the surf-drenched rocks of this re-created California coast, hundreds of sea lions and seals cavort and squall in a deafening, endless request for lunch.

### Park Guide

Upon arrival, grab a map/event schedule at the Information Counter, and plan your visit according to the live shows you wish to see. The thrill rides – Wild Arctic, Kraken, and Journey To Atlantis – have the longest lines, so visit those when major live shows are taking place. Finally, consider visiting in the late afternoon and evening. Lines vanish, temperatures cool, and the park takes on a different character under the evening sky.



### 9 Dolphin Cove

The spirit of "Flipper" lives on with these playful bottlenose dolphins (*left*), which romp at the edge of a lagoon where they can be petted. The underwater viewing area is the best spot to see them in action.

### 10 Odyssey

Wonders of the sea come alive in this amazing show. This non-traditional circus combines high-flying acrobatics with music, costumes, and special effects within a spectacular set.

A multi-species cast of 18 cats, a dozen dogs, a flock of birds, a den of rats, three little pigs, and one horse prove their stage savvy in this humorous display of skills and tricks.

**2 Shamu Close Up**

The underwater viewing area for SeaWorld's killer whales offers an ongoing show of its own. This spot gives the best glimpse of adult whales tending their young.

**3 Penguin Encounter**

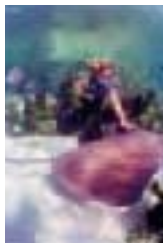
More than 100 knee-high, tuxedo-clad friends from the far north and three species of flighted birds play, swim, and chill in these freezing re-creations of polar seas and snowy banks.

**4 Key West Dolphin Fest**

Dolphins and false killer whales perform a fantastic series of "behaviors" (formerly called tricks) in this tropical-flavored show, a smaller scale version of SeaWorld's Shamu Adventure show (see p28).

**5 Stingray Lagoon**

Lean over this waist-high lagoon and pet the velvety hides of stingrays. The ever-hungry rays flock to those offering fish – feeding times are displayed next to the booth selling fish.

**Stingray Lagoon****6 Dolphin Nursery**

When park dolphins give birth, they're brought to this shaded outdoor pool to be with their young calves. Just ask, and the staffer on duty will provide lots of fascinating information.

**7 Sky Tower**

For a marvellous view of the park and all its backstage areas, take a guided trip to the top of the 450-ft- (137-m) Sky Tower. The view comes at a price – an extra admission fee is required.

**8 Clydesdale Hamlet**

Take a break from sea creatures and visit the Clydesdale Hamlet to tour the stables of the world-famous Anheuser-Busch team of Clydesdale horses. There are plenty of photo opportunities.

**9 Shamu's Happy Harbor**

Kids can only focus for so long. After that, bring them to this huge playground, complete with slides, a mini-waterpark, a four-story maze of nets, steel drums, and a separate sandbox for smaller guests.

**10 Caribbean Tidepool**

This is a hands-on encounter with fish and sea creatures from tropical reefs, including all kinds of sea urchins, starfish, and anemones.

## SeaWorld's Rescue & Rehabilitation Program

*Park staff do more than teach killer whales to splash the audience on command. As part of their commitment to conservation, animal experts at all SeaWorld parks in Orlando, Texas, and California are on call 24 hours a day to rescue sick or injured sea mammals, birds, and turtles. These animals are sheltered at the parks, nursed back to health, and – whenever possible – released into the wild. Endangered Florida manatees are regular beneficiaries of the rescue program. As a result of motorboat propellers, tangled fishing lines, and dangerous toxins, numerous manatees are injured or killed each year. When the call goes out, SeaWorld responds with a specially equipped animal rescue unit, which can begin emergency treatment on the spot. Manatees on the mend, along with those that wouldn't survive in the wild, are housed in the park's Manatee exhibit (see p29). Since SeaWorld Orlando started its rescue program in 1976, it has been responsible for saving more than 270 manatees, with more than 100 released back into the wild. By the end of 2000, SeaWorld Orlando's entire program had rescued and cared for 3,251 animals, including those from animal shelters, and released 735 back into the wild.*

### Breeding program

SeaWorld also has a hugely successful breeding program: baby penguins, seals, and no less than 10 killer whale calves have been born at SeaWorld Orlando.

## TOP 10 Wet 'n Wild

Opened in 1977 by George Millay, the founder of SeaWorld, Wet 'n Wild boasts an awesome collection of rides, family activities, and a beach party atmosphere that visitors of all ages enjoy. There is a refreshing lack of merchandise tie-ins here, even though the park is now owned by Universal Studios. The focus is on original thrill rides that leave guests breathless and grinning. Despite strong challenges by Disney World in the form of Blizzard Beach and Typhoon Lagoon, Wet 'n Wild remains the region's best water park, and one of the area's top attractions.

**Bubba's Bar-B-Q & Chicken** is a good bet for lunch. The park's food outlets only accept credit cards or prepaid money wristbands, available at Guest Services.

Steps to rides and asphalt walkways can get very hot in high temperatures. Wear non-slip footwear as protection.

Hi-speed rides can leave you uncovered! Ladies, avoid bikinis or consider adding a T-shirt.

Rides have a 36-inch (91-cm) minimum height requirement for kids riding solo.

#### 1 Der Stuka/The Bomb Bay

The park's scariest ride has two options. Der Stuka is a six-story free fall down a 78-degree incline; the steeper Bomb Bay (below) is just as high but even more terrifying.



#### 2 The Storm

Hurtle down a shoot filled with mist, thunder, and (at night) lightning, then swirl into an open bowl before dropping into a lower pool. Thrilling.

#### 3 Black Hole

Two people in a raft hang on for dear life as they travel 500 ft (153 m) of twisting tubes in pitch-black darkness (right).



#### 4 Blue Niagara

Two interwoven tubes 300-ft (92-m) long drop riders down six stories into the bracing water of a splash-landing tank.





**5 Mach 5**  
A solo flume navigated by riders on a foam mat. On tight turns, ride the flowing water as far up the wall as possible.

**6 The Flyer**  
On this watery toboggan run, four riders mount one raft and plow through 450 ft (137 m) of banked curves and racing straight runs.

**7 Lazy River**  
A mile-long (1.6-km) circular waterway (*left*), which gently winds past swaying palms, tropical flowers, and waterfalls. Perfect for slowly floating along in an inner tube (you'll need to rent one), or for a refreshing swim that takes you back to where you started.



**8 Bubba Tub**  
This six story-high slide (*left*) offers three big drops during its descent. The large circular rafts hold up to five, making it perfect for getting the whole family screaming.

## Park Guide

Wet 'n Wild's aquatic center is the giant Surf Lagoon, which is encircled by various rides. On entering the park, bear right and head to the Tube, Towel & Locker Rental counter to get a locker for your belongings. You can return to it whenever you need to during the day. Guest Services is located on the left as you go into the park. If you plan to do some tanning or lying around, try to reserve a beach chair with your towel before hitting the rides, and make sure you've got sunscreen. After that, just see which ride has the shortest line.



**10 Hydra Fighter**  
Strapped back-to-back in a swing and armed with water cannons (*above*), two riders are supposed to create their own ride. But it usually degenerates into a water fight between riders in all of the eight swings!

**9 Bubble Up**  
A slippery version of the King of the Castle game, for children up to 12 years old. Grab the ropes to try to climb up the large inflated balloon without bouncing off and falling into the 3-ft- (91-cm) deep pool. Water cannons add to the utter chaos – and to the fun.

## TOP 10 Merritt Island

Thanks to the U.S. government's race into space, Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge at the Kennedy Space Center has become the second-largest reserve in Florida. Founded in 1963 to serve as a security buffer zone for NASA, its 140,000 acres now serve as an important habitat for endangered species and a vital stop-over along the migration path of hundreds of birds. The manatees are the refuge's most popular attraction.

- Grab a bite to eat at Paul's Smoke House located directly across the Indian River Lagoon before setting out to the island.**

- The best times to spot wildlife on the Black Point Wildlife Drive are one to two hours after sunrise and one to two hours before sunset. At these times, the animals make their way to the impoundments for feeding.**

### 1 Manatee Observation Point

Though more common in spring and fall, manatees (sea cows) frequent the refuge year-round. Visitors can see these herbivorous animals up close in Banana River or from the viewing platform at Haulover Canal.



### 2 Black Point Wildlife Drive

The best places to spot wildlife here are linked by an easy access drive. Follow the seven-mile, one-way loop to see a variety of waterfowl, wading birds, and raptors.



### 3 Fishing

If you have a Florida State fishing permit (see page 341), you can cast your line on the Indian River, Banana River, and Mosquito Lagoon. Red drum, spotted sea trout, and snook are the most common catches.

### 4 Boating

Boating or canoeing is still the best way to get close to the wildlife. In season, the waterways are filled with wading birds in migratory pit stops and manatees in the depths.

## Bird Tours

**5** For those with no bird-watching experience, the reserve offers birding tours for beginners. A well-trained park volunteer teaches visitors to identify many of the different types of birds in the refuge, such as this snowy egret.

## Hiking

**6** There are four hiking trails on offer. Most are quite wet but none are too strenuous. They range from a quarter of a mile to five miles.

## Waterfowl Hunting

So large are the numbers of birds involved in the seasonal migration that hunting for ducks and coot is allowed from November to January. Permits and safety cards are required, and all expeditions must return by early afternoon.

## Visitor Center

**8** In addition to a 20-minute video of the refuge, the center has wildlife exhibits and educational displays providing a good introduction to the Island. The ponds behind the center are favorite spots for alligators.

## Audio Guide

The Visitor Center sells CDs and tape guides for the Black Point Wildlife Drive. You can also pick up a self-guiding brochure near the entrance to the drive. This provides information on the best places to spot wildlife along the route. Unless you want to keep the brochure, you are encouraged to leave it in the box at the end of the drive for other visitors to use.

## Migrations

**9** Throughout the year, the refuge plays host to migrating animals. The birds return in May, and during June and July turtles lay their eggs on the beaches. In September waterfowl are plentiful in the rivers.



## Beaches

**10** Visitors to the refuge spend more time on land than in water, but Playalinda Beach provides access, parking, and other facilities for swimmers. However, beware of alligators on the road to the beach.





# TOP 10 Kennedy Space Center

More than any other Florida attraction, the Kennedy Space Center celebrates the fruits of human inquiry and imagination. Owned by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), the center was built as a means for astronauts' and employees' families to view center operations. Today, it offers a fascinating window on life beyond Earth to more than 2.2 million visitors each year, and is the site of many dramatic space shuttle launches.

### 3 Astronaut Memorial

The Center's most sobering exhibit is this massive black granite monument to the 17 US astronauts who gave their lives for space exploration.

### 4 Astronaut Encounter

Meet a spaceman when astronauts from various space programs visit the Center (right). Expect question-and-answer periods, personal stories, video presentations, and space artifacts.

### 1 Shuttle Launches

The Center closes for part of the day when a shuttle launches, but watching this, the ultimate Florida thrill ride (below), is a moving, once-in-a-lifetime experience.

### 2 Cape Canaveral: Then & Now Tour

This two-hour tour visits attractions including historic launch pads and the US Air Force Space & Missile Museum.



### 5 LC39 Observation Gantry

Views from this tower include the Vehicle Assembly Building and the Crawlerway Track, an eight-lane highway on which shuttles trundle to the launch pad at 1 mph (1.6 kmph).

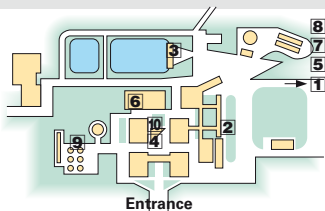






## 6 IMAX Theaters

The Center's twin, back-to-back, 5.5-story theaters show two films. The 3-D *L5: First City in Space* suggests what the first space colony might be like, while *The Dream Is Alive* is an inspiring, past-to-present feature on the space shuttle program.

## 7 International Space Station Exhibit

Here, visitors can explore detailed, full-scale models of the International Space Station's compartments and see actual components being prepared for use.



## 8 Saturn/Apollo V Center

One of only three Saturn V rockets (see p40) in existence, footage of the first Moon mission, a lunar module model (above), and other exhibits here recreate the Apollo missions.

### Center Guide

About a 45-minute drive from Orlando, the Center forms part of the Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge (see p52). Admission includes a bus tour to exhibits located away from the Visitor Complex; it's worth renting the tour's audio guide. Boarding areas for the bus tours are to the right of the ticket plaza and information center (where maps are available). Except for launch days, the center is rarely overcrowded.

## 9 Rocket Garden

Unlike any other garden you have seen, the Kennedy Space Center's contains eight actual rockets, including a Mercury Atlas similar to the one that was used to launch astronaut John Glenn. Special effects create the illusion of the rockets taking off.



## 10 Early Space & New Millennium Exhibits

These two adjoining exhibits offer passive peeks at the actual Mercury Mission Control consoles used for the first American manned flights, a chance to touch a real Mars rock (above), and the opportunity to submit your name for a future mission.

## TOP 10 Rockets: Past, Present, & Future

### 1 Jupiter C

This early variation of the Mercury Redstone rocket (*see below*) was developed by a team headed by the German scientist Wernher von Braun. The Jupiter C carried the USA's first satellite, Explorer I, which launched on January 31, 1958.

### 2 X-15

The X-15 rocket plane flew 199 missions from 1959 to 1968, carrying a who's who of astronauts, including moon-walker Neil Armstrong. It reached altitudes of 354,200 ft (107,960 m) and speeds of 4,520mph (7,274 kmph).

### 3 Mercury Redstone

This rocket carried the first American into space. Alan B. Shepard Jr.'s 15-minute, 22-second ride aboard the Freedom 7 capsule in 1961 was one of six flights in the Mercury program.

### 4 Mercury Atlas

When the six-flight Mercury program graduated from sub-orbital to orbital flights, the Atlas replaced the Mercury Redstone. This rocket took John Glenn, Scott Carpenter, Wally Schirra, and Gordon Cooper into space in 1962–3.

### 5 Titan II

When a larger capsule was needed for two-person crews, this rocket earned its place in NASA history. It was used for 10

manned flights (Gemini Titan expeditions) in 1965 and 1966.

### 6 Saturn V

At 363 ft (110 m), this was the largest launch vehicle ever produced. The highlight of its career was Apollo 11, the 8-day, 1969 mission that landed Buzz Aldrin and Neil Armstrong on the moon.

### 7 Titan Centaur

The Titan Centaur rocket launched Voyager I and II in 1977 on a mission to explore Jupiter and Saturn, Uranus, and, 12 years after its launch, Neptune.

### 8 Pegasus

Today's version of this winged wonder is less than mythical but more than capable of flying small communications satellites into a low Earth orbit from the bellies of mother ships such as the L-1011.

### 9 X-43A Launch Vehicle

These diminutive rockets may one day boost small, unmanned jets at high speeds and altitudes, improving the safety of manned flights.

### 10 X-34 Rocketplane

Welcome to the future? NASA's reusable rocket plane will look like a small space shuttle and will be able to fly at twice the speed of the X-15. However, budget cuts could mean it doesn't get off the ground at all.

## The Space Shuttle

*Due to their current and ongoing role in the space program, space shuttles (of which there are three) are the best recognized of NASA's vehicles, venturing into space with names like Discovery and Endeavor. The latter replaced the Challenger shuttle which exploded on the shuttles' 51st mission (January 28, 1986) just 73 seconds after launch, killing all seven crew members. After a two-year hiatus for safety checks, the shuttle program resumed with renewed vigor. Once in orbit, each is capable of cruising at 17,500 mph (28,163 kmph) – some 300 times faster than an average US road cruising speed of 55 mph (88 kmph) – and their cargo bays can hold a fully loaded tour bus. Yet the engineless orbiter can glide to a runway more gracefully than a pelican landing on water.*

## TOP 10 Thrill Rides

**1 Splash Mountain**  
Prepare to get wet on this deep-drop ride unless you wear protective clothing. In summer, it's a cooling trip; at any time of year it's one to enjoy as a spectator from the bridge between Frontierland and Adventureland. Even in that relative safety you may get drenched. *See p8 (Magic Kingdom).*

**2 Twilight Zone Tower of Terror**  
This is one of the rides thrill junkies rent (at a price) for their own private parties. You can have just as much fun without the premium, though be warned this ride's mechanisms sometimes develop minor glitches, causing heads to knock on the ceiling as riders plunge back to sea level. *See p16 (Disney-MGM Studios).*

**3 Rock 'n' Roller Coaster**  
This ride accelerates like a military jet. If that isn't enough to make heads spin, each 24-passenger "stretch limo" has 120 speakers that blare Aerosmith hits at a teeth-rattling decibel level. *See p16 (Disney-MGM Studios).*

**4 Incredible Hulk Coaster**  
Possibly the ultimate inversion ride – it's a zero-G-force, multi-looping ride of a lifetime. The net catches personal items riders should have stashed in a locker. *See p20 (Islands of Adventure).*

**5 Dueling Dragons**  
The ride climbs 12.5 stories above the ground before you realize it's too late and you're locked in for the duration. To increase the adrenaline rush, try to get one of the two outside seats in the first eight rows of either dragon. Centrifugal force will steal some of your courage. *See p20 (Islands of Adventure).*

**6 The Amazing Adventures of Spider-Man**  
More high-tech than Universal Studios' Back to the Future, but tamer than the Dragon and Hulk coasters. Still, it's not for those with heart problems or motion sickness tendencies. Use the single line if alone or can split from your group – it's quicker. *See p20 (Islands of Adventure).*

**7 Doctor Doom's Fearfall**  
This is a bit like free-falling in a metal harness. As your legs dangle free and you bob to a

stop, you'll probably be screaming at the top of your lungs. See p20 (*Islands of Adventure*).

### 8 Dudley Do-Right's Ripsaw Falls

Dudley can be very deceptive – it looks pretty harmless, but this ride has a big dip where, thanks to some smoke and mirrors, it feels like you've plunged 20 ft (6 m) or so under the surface of the water. See p20 (*Islands of Adventure*).

### 9 Kraken

Think pure speed as Poseidon's mythological underwater beast breaks free and without warning pulls your 32-passenger train 151 ft (46 m) closer to heaven, then dives 144 ft (44 m) back toward hell at speeds of 65 mph (104 kmph)! If you survive, expect seven loops on a 4,177-ft (1,273-m) course. This may just be the longest 3 minutes, 39 seconds of your existence. See p28 (*SeaWorld*).

### 10 Summit Plummet

No water park ride will tangle up your bathing suit faster than this 120-ft (36-m), partial-darkness ride. It starts slow, but ends in a near vertical drop that has you plummeting at 60 mph (96 kmph). It's not for the weak of heart or those under 48 inches (122 cm). See p89 (*Blizzard Beach*).

A neat aerial adventure, but it can make some riders queasy. See p20.

This ride's dizzying, 24-ft (7-m) tunnel can leave your head and tummy in a spin. See p21.

### 8 Caro-Seuss-El

Seussian characters make this carousel ride truly unique. See p22.

### 9 E.T. Adventure

You may have to wait in line a while before pedaling your bicycle past fantastic scenery and characters. See p26.

### 10 Woody Woodpecker's Nuthouse Coaster

The banked turns of this mini coaster are absolutely exhilarating. See p26.

**1 Gatorland** This park, which recently turned 50, is chock-full of around 800 lurking alligators, honking for mates, and sometimes performing tricks. The gators don't sit up and beg, but they do jump for food – raw chicken, to be exact, dangled over their ponds by a brave employee. Two hundred or so crocodiles are here to add diversity, as are snakes and other reptiles. The gator-wrestling show is an impressive must-see. *See p107.*

**2 The Holy Land Experience** Ancient Jerusalem comes to life at this attraction, which has reconstructions of Jesus' tomb, the temple, and the caves where the Dead Sea scrolls were found. Make no mistake: this is a "Christ-centered ministry," but guests of any religion can get a kick out of cast members acting out biblical scenes and telling stories from both testaments. A café serves up "Goliath burgers" among other fare. *See p98.*

**Gatorland****3 Ripley's Believe It or Not! Odditorium**

Cunningly designed, this building looks like it's about to slip into the ground. Inside, kids might squeal – and adults might cringe – over the replicas of human and animal oddities on display. Two-headed cat, anyone? A movie shows people swallowing coat hangers, light bulbs, and more. There are also plenty of quirky displays, such as a rendition of the *Mona Lisa* made out of toast. *See p98.*

**4 Titanic – Ship of Dreams**

The spirit of Leonardo DiCaprio lingers around this impressive recreation of the doomed Titanic. Guided tours by actors playing crew members and passengers bring the displays to life. Among the 200 or so exhibits are life jackets salvaged from the ship, which add a solemn touch. *See p99.*

**5 Fun Spot Action Park**

Looking for life in the fast lane? The Fun Spot's four giant go-kart tracks allow you to "vroom" at your own speed, buzzing around corkscrew turns to the finish line. There are also bumper cars and boats, a huge ferris wheel, and an arcade full of simulators to round off the package. *See p97.*





**6 SkyVenture**  
If you've always wanted to try skydiving but don't like the thought of stepping out of a plane, this vertical wind tunnel is for you.

More than 100,000 visitors each year immerse themselves in the high adventure of skydiving without ever having to pack a parachute. There are certain weight restrictions and you have to be more than three years old, but other than that no experience is necessary. **9 Reptile World Serpentarium**

This unique and educational attraction gives visitors the opportunity to watch a snake handler in action as he extracts poisonous venom from deadly snakes. It also contains the largest reptile exhibit in Florida. See p108.

**10 Winter Park Scenic Boat Tour**

Glide through three of Winter Park's lakes on a pontoon boat for this hour-long tour. Nature-lovers can spot birds such as ospreys and herons. The more materialistic can swoon over huge lake-side mansions, sometimes getting close enough to peek in a window. The architecture of Rollins College, and the secluded feel of the canals, make this tour a popular option for the kitsch-weary. See p119.

**7 A World of Orchids**  
Orchids come in a multitude of strange shapes and colors, all of which are on display at this working greenhouse, home to 1,000 of the exotic flowers. Lush paths, serene streams, and the occasional squawk from a parrot offer respite from the busy hub-bub of the theme parks. See p107.

**8 WonderWorks**  
Gimmicks abound inside this building, which, like Ripley's, is sinking into the ground, only this time it's roof first. Inside, there's an interactive arcade of some mild scientific educational value. Among the more than 85 hands-on activities, the curious can experience an earthquake or virtual hang gliding, and test their reflexes. For simple fun, the huge laser-tag field is a blast. See p99.

Unusually for Orlando, this is not an attraction but a genuine rodeo competition, with cash prizes. The action is live, unrehearsed, and, for those who've never seen the real thing before, quite something. A cheap and eventful evening out. See p109.

**4 Downtown Disney**

With three parts – Westside, Pleasure Island, and Marketplace – glittering Downtown Disney has become the epicenter of nightlife at “the Mouse.” Although Pleasure Island and its nightclubs boast the most obvious party appeal, both Westside and Marketplace are also packed day and night. Hordes of guests (especially families) stroll among the area's shops and restaurants – it's bustling, fun, and costs little to enjoy. Kids in particular like the LEGO Store's (see p92) outdoor work stations.

**5 Disney's BoardWalk**

Almost an accidental attraction, this is a re-creation of a 1940s seaside resort, complete with street performers, carnival games, great restaurants and bars. The ESPN Club is the perfect spot to draw on a beer and catch a major-league game on big-screen TVs. See p93.



## 6 Center for Birds of Prey

Founded by the Florida Audubon Society, and off the beaten tourist track, this center's primary function is to rescue and rehabilitate wounded and orphaned raptors. Birds of prey that can't be released back into the wild, however, are kept and used to educate the public about wildlife conservation. With knowledgeable staff and the opportunity to stand close to birds such as eagles and vultures, the center is a captivating treat for a handful of dollars. *See p120.*

## 7 Universal's CityWalk & Portofino Bay Boat Ride

By day, visitors stroll through this area of restaurants and shops on their way to Universal Studios and Islands of Adventure (*see pp20–27*). In the evening, CityWalk becomes its own sparkling destination, a swinging Downtown with outdoor entertainment and pulsating crowds to rival Disney's BoardWalk. ## 9 Fort Wilderness Petting Farm

## TOP 10 Places to Cool Off

**1 Wet 'n Wild**  
Orlando's best water park is full of rides and slides to keep the most hardened thrill-seeker's adrenalin pumping. But it's not all action – there are kids' rides and chill-out areas, too. *See pp34–5.*

**2 Discovery Cove**  
Need to unwind on a tropical beach, swim with dolphins, or snorkel over coral reefs? Well, if you check into Discovery Cove, you can. This exclusive (daily entry is limited to 1,000 people) and inspired Orlando attraction offers the features and personalized services of an upscale island resort. Admission is not cheap, but includes everything from lunch to wet suits and sun block. Reservations two months in advance are suggested. *See p97.*

**3 Blizzard Beach**  
In the battle for water park supremacy, Wet 'n Wild's main competitor is this sizeable Disney park. It's what a ski resort would be like if it started to melt, with water slides replacing ski runs. Geared to teens and young adults, the park offers seven water slides and excellent rides, a wave pool, and kids' areas. If park capacity is reached early (as it often is), it closes to new admissions until later in the day. *See p89.*

**4 Water Mania**  
Though not as large as Wet 'n Wild, this Kissimmee park offers a good assortment of slides and thrill rides. 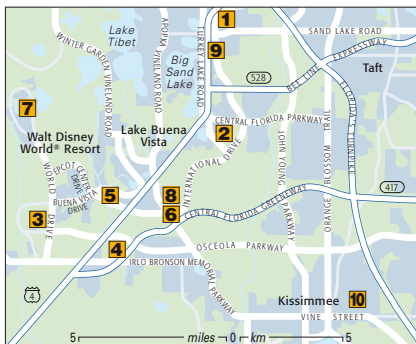

They also provide some of the best places for paddling in a boat in central Florida. 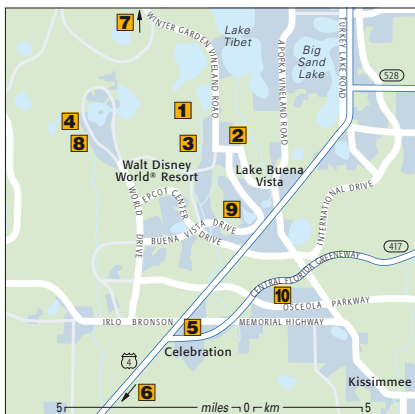

**TOP 10 Museums**

**1 Orlando Museum of Art** Following a multi-million dollar makeover in 1997, the Orlando Museum of Art (OMA) has earned a reputation as one of the southeast's top arts museums. The fine permanent collection is dominated by pre-Columbian art and American artists such as Georgia O'Keefe, George Inness, and Robert Rauschenberg. These works are supplemented by touring exhibitions from major metropolitan museums, and numerous smaller shows of regional or local significance, although curators tend to avoid overtly controversial works. *See p113.*

**2 Orlando Science Center**

This huge, attention-grabbing, exploratorium-style museum boasts hundreds of interactive, child-friendly exhibits that are designed to introduce kids of all ages to the wonders of science. The center's four floors are divided into 10 themed zones. These deal with subjects ranging from mechanics to math, health and fitness to lasers, making this an educational and fun break from the usual Orlando theme park distractions. Don't miss the CineDome, which houses the planetarium and the world's largest Iwerks® theatre. *See p113.*

**3 Orange County Regional History Center**

Given the region's relatively short history, this museum has wisely ignored geographic limitations. Exhibits not only feature local photographs and memorabilia, but a re-created Victorian parlor, a 1926 fire station, and fascinating temporary shows that cover themes relating to other parts of Florida, such as pirates and space travel. *See p113.*

**4 Charles Hosmer Morse Museum of American Art**

Here rests the world's most comprehensive collection of work by American artist Louis Comfort Tiffany, best known for his Art Nouveau stained-glass pieces. The museum's highlight is a spectacular chapel Tiffany made for the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition. There are also interesting collections of 19th- and 20th-century American paintings and jewelry. *See p119.*

**5 Cornell Fine Arts Museum**

Located on the campus of Rollins College, the small but stylish Cornell is Florida's oldest art collection. It showcases European and American paintings, sculpture, and decorative arts ranging from the Renaissance and Baroque periods to the 20th century. Among the highlights

are *Madonna and Child Enthroned* (c.1480) by Cosimo Rosselli, and *Reclining Figure* by Henry Moore (1982). See p119.

## 6 Mennello Museum of American Folk Art

This small, lakeside museum houses an unusual and charming collection of paintings by obscure curio-shop owner and Floridian folk artist, Earl Cunningham (1893–1977). In addition to his own work are traveling exhibitions featuring the works of other “outsider” artists. See p113.

## 7 Flying Tigers Warbird Restoration Museum

If aircraft history is your passion, this is a must-see. Much more than a static museum, the Warbird is a restoration hangar where historic military aircraft are painstakingly restored to pristine flying condition (those puddles of oil on the floor are real). Visitors can see a P-51 Mustang, a Lockheed P-38 Lightning, a B-17 Flying Fortress, and many others. History and restoration classes are available – as are real flights! See p108.

## 8 Albin Polasek Museum and Sculpture Gardens

Czech-American Polasek (1879–1965) was a sculptor who specialized in European figurative technique. In semi-retirement, he moved to this self-designed house and studio, where he continued working until his

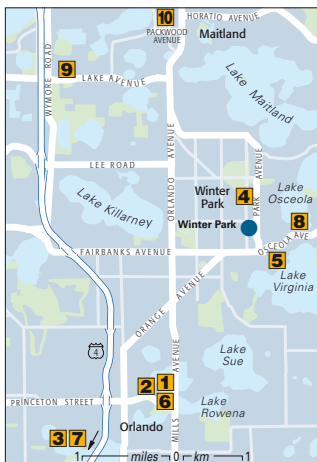
death. The beautiful gardens are filled with his sculptures, as are four galleries within the house, which also hold a few pieces from other artists. See p119.

## 9 Zora Neale Hurston National Museum of Fine Arts

Eatonville – the first incorporated African-American municipality in the USA – was the childhood home of Zora Neale Hurston (1903–1960), writer, anthropologist, and folklorist. This modest museum offers exhibitions centered on Hurston and the Eatonville of days gone by. See p120.

## 10 Maitland Historical & Telephone Museums

Artifacts, textiles, and photos from Maitland’s pioneer days through to the heydays of the citrus and lumber industries are the focus here. 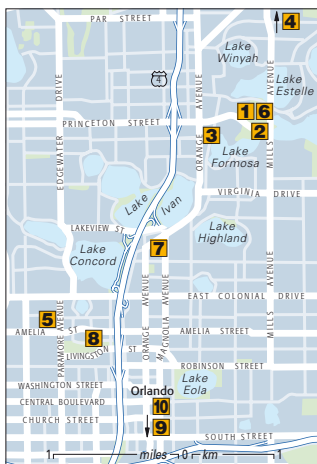

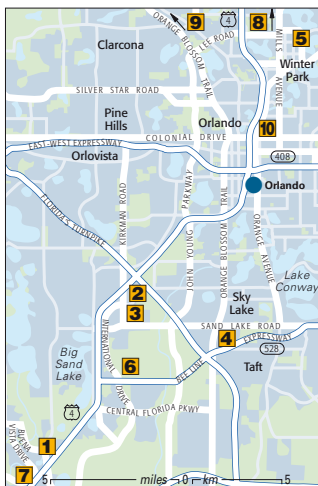

## TOP 10 High-End Restaurants

**1 Victoria & Albert's**  
The high price can limit this to very special occasions, but trust the first-class food, fine wine, and faultless staff to make a memorable visit. It's decorated like Queen Victoria's dining room, and each table gets its very own Victoria and Albert as servers. Changing menus offer seven courses of international dishes, including apple-smoked Colorado bison and black bass with couscous. Take advantage of the wine-pairings (a glass with each of the five courses); it's cheaper and more varied than buying a bottle. *See p94.*

**2 Manuel's on the 28th**  
The panorama from the floor-to-ceiling windows in this often lively 28th-floor eatery is unbeatable. The menu changes each season and might feature phyllo-wrapped lamb loin with spinach-boursin stuffing, yellowfin tuna in a green curry-and-ginger crust,

and Chilean sea bass with lump crab. Manuel's has one of the best wine lists in town. *See p117.*

**3 California Grill**  
The 15th-floor vista here gets top marks from both critics and diners (especially when the lights are dimmed for Magic Kingdom's nightly fireworks display), as does the Pacific Rim cuisine. Popular choices are seared grouper in a noodle bowl with ginger-crab salad, and pork tenderloin with polenta and mushrooms. There are also interesting vegetarian and sushi menus. It's hard to get a table on weekends. *See p94.*

**4 Emeril's of Orlando**  
Famous US TV chef Emeril Lagasse owns this place, but only appears once a month, leaving the day-to-day cooking of the creole-inspired menu to his chefs. They create treats such as quail stuffed with Louisiana oyster dressing, andouille-crust redfish, and a kosher salt and cracked black pepper rib-eye steak. This lofty place has a 12,000-bottle wine cellar. It's tough to get a table for dinner unless you book early, but there's a similar lunch menu at two-thirds of the price. 📍 *CityWalk*

**5 La Coquina**  
An imaginative beef, poultry, and seafood dinner menu makes La Coquina the most acclaimed of the Hyatt Regency's five eateries. The veal tenderloin with sake-

glazed prawns, and the sugar cane-skewered scallops with rice grits and artichokes are two hits. 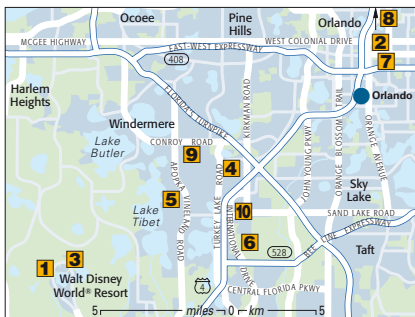
**6** **Ran-Getso of Tokyo** Sushi and sashimi are the big draw here. Try *tekka-don* (tender slices of tuna) or *una-ju* (grilled eel fillets), favorites of more adventurous diners. *Yosenabe*, a soup that blends seafood, chicken, and duck, is another popular choice. A Japanese drum group performs twice a night (Thu–Sat) and koi ponds and Japanese gardens outside help keep the mood peaceful. *See p105.*

**7** **The Boheme** Seafood and game are the stars at this stylish downtown restaurant, in the Grand Bohemian Hotel. Fans of pan-seared fish can try the Chilean sea bass or the Dover sole. Atlantic salmon is painted with an apricot-horseradish glaze and grilled. Gamier tastes are met with pheasant breast and sausage with pistachio-roast garlic stuffing, and grilled venison sirloin with boar sausage. *See p117.*

**8** **Maison & Jardin** Swiss chef Hans Spirig has spent 17 years honing the menu at this elegant restaurant. Well-heeled diners tuck into pan-seared quail and ostrich tenderloin with wild mushrooms, and veal with Maine lobster and morels. In addition to à la carte, there are two fixed-price menus and a 1,200-variety wine list. Advance reservations are essential. They'll make chicken Alfredo for kids. *See p123.*

**9** **Park Plaza Gardens** For a touch of class, book a table at the exquisite Park Plaza Gardens. The glorious cuisine (such as blackened deep sea grouper with red lentils and curry vinaigrette) is enjoyed in a divine garden, much like a French courtyard. Take your pick from one of the best wine lists in Orlando, and finish off with towering desserts such as key lime pie. *See p123.*

**10** **Siam Orchid** A crowd of well-heeled regulars and newcomers mix in the intimate rooms and split-level dining room of this upscale Thai eatery. Perennial favorites include *pad thai* (rice noodles with ground pork, seafood, crushed peanuts, and a sweet sauce) and *royal thai*, with chicken, potatoes, and onions in a yellow curry sauce. *See p105.*

**2 Romano's Macaroni Grill**  
Despite being part of a chain, Romano's has a neighborhood feel. The modestly priced Italian menu includes thin-crust pizzas cooked in a wood-burning oven, sauteed salmon scaloppini, and chicken marsala. **3 Coral Reef Restaurant**

**4 Outback Steakhouse**  
Tasty seared steaks are the headliners here; choose from rib-eyes, strips, fillets, and porter-houses. The Outback also serves good smoked ribs, shrimp and chicken over fettucine, rib-and-chicken combos, pork chops, and hamburgers. ☎ 4845 S. Kirkman Rd • Map D3 • 407-292-5111 • \$\$\$

**5 Restaurant Marrakesh**  
Mosaic tiles and a painted Moorish ceiling set the Moroccan scene. The food is flavorsome, with delights such as roast lamb *au jus* with couscous, and marinated beef shish kabobs. A belly dancer shimmies around and kids love to join her. *See p95.*

**6 Café Tu Tu Tango**  
The menu in this lofty space is Spanish tapas in name but more international in flavor, with such diverse nibbles as baked goat's cheese, tuna sashimi, alligator bites, and snapper fingers. Performers (from sword eaters to artists at work) provide the entertainment. *See p105.*

**7 Bergamo's**  
At this restaurant, the waiters sing Broadway tunes and opera while the chefs prepare the Italian menu. It covers all bases, with pasta, meat, and seafood – try the lobster, shrimp, clams, and mussels in a white wine and garlic sauce, or the veal T-bone



with olive and anchovy butter.

## TOP 10 Places to Have a Drink

**1 Metropolis**  
In a stylish velvet and cherry-wood venue, Metropolis achieves an upscale ambience often aspired to but rarely achieved in Orlando's clubs. DJs and a dance floor cater to groups of friends out for a giggle, while dark corners offer privacy for couples who want to smooch and sip cocktails. Top-class facilities include billiards tables and plenty of comfortable seating to encourage lounging around. *See p104.*

**2 Knock Knock**  
This venue looks a bit like a submarine in *20,000 Leagues Under The Sea*, with its porthole windows and distressed metal. An eclectic crowd – from models to business moguls – hang out around the circular bar listening to ambient tunes. *See p116.*

**3 Cowboys Orlando**  
Kick up your heels at this popular country music dance venue, located near downtown

Orlando. This huge club has four bar areas and state-of-the-art sound and lighting. It's open Thursday to Saturday to guests over 18 years old, and has nightly drink specials and dance contests. *See p116.*

**4 The Bar at California Grill**  
This bar is a fabulous place to kick back, enjoy a bottle of wine and watch the fireworks over the Magic Kingdom. The secret is out, though, so come early for a table. Finding a spot at other times isn't too hard as long as you avoid the dinner rush. *See p94.*

**5 Fiddler's Green**  
A big, noisy Irish pub, Fiddler's Green has an excellent beer selection, a homey, shabby ambience, and a bartender who pours faster than anyone in town. Darts and occasional live music form the entertainment, but people come here just to down a few beers and shoot the breeze. Lunch and dinner are served. *See p122.*

## 6 Bar-B-Q Bar

It's little more than an average beer joint with sticky floors and loud crowds, but Bar-B-Q is *the* place to see and be seen for the more creative set. A favorite venue with local musicians, the bar gets packed whenever there's a good band on stage. People-watch clubbers cruising the Orange Avenue strip from a sidewalk table. 📍 64 N. ## 7 Sky 60

Located above The Social (see p74), this rooftop bar is an Orange Avenue hotspot, attracting folks who prefer not to mingle with the masses but rather look down on them. ## 8 The Bösendorfer Lounge

Luxury is a tough sell Downtown, partly because the club crowd tends to be well under 30 and lacking serious funds. However, this swanky hotel bar is thriving, confirming that an older, upscale, and urbane crowd is more than willing to pay the price for a suave evening of fancy cocktails. See p74.

## 9 Dexter's of Thornton Park

A white-collar after-work crowd frequents this hugely popular bar/

restaurant in a spacious, loft-like room. On fine nights, drinkers often head for the small outdoor space or spill out onto the sidewalk, jostling and juxtaposing with the folk from the fundamentalist church and a working-class beer joint that are located on the same street. Dexter's is also known for

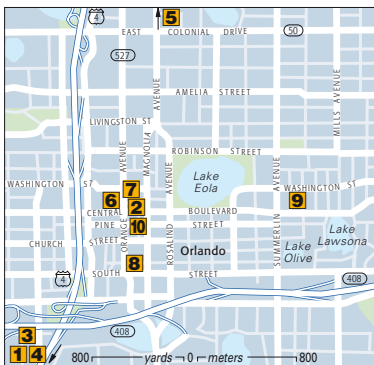

## 10 AKA Lounge

With more name changes than there are new moons, and an entrance that's tough to find (look for a doorway adjacent to the Pine Street Grill), it's a bit of a challenge to find your way into this bar. The lounge occupies the top floors of two merged brownstones, offering plenty of space, a full bar, plenty of contemporary artwork, and a fine line-up of DJs and live bands. 📍 68 E. ## TOP 10 Live Music Venues

### 1 The Social

The Social (formerly known as Sapphire) serves up an eclectic mix of live music. Sounds range from alternative rock to funk, jazz, and dance, with local DJs also gracing the club's legendary stage. For years, the club's policy of booking top national touring acts meant it was the shining light of Orlando's live music scene. Competition from much larger clubs is stiffer now, but this tiny spot, with its stylishly raw decor, remains O-Town's favorite spot to enjoy live music. *See p116.*

### 2 House of Blues

Wall-to-wall original folk art gives this giant venue a funky look. But like all things in the Disney empire, the decor hides a modern, smooth-running machine. HOB books amazing acts in every genre, from hip-hop to death-metal. Unlike many clubs, shows start and end on time, and the sound system is crystal clear. The one flaw is an incredible lack of seating with stage views, so be prepared to be on your feet all night. *See p93.*

### 3 Hard Rock Live

The ying to HOB's yang, Hard Rock has a more comfortable room, with balcony seating and good stage views. The grand ballroom decor is more apropos for acts that want to perform in an elegant setting, so it's not

surprising that top R&B artists such as Maxwell and Erykah Badu play here. The Hard Rock schedule is more erratic, with fewer top name bookings. *See p104.*

### 4 Will's Loch Haven Pub

This tiny dive has earned a reputation among local musicians for being one of the best-loved music clubs in town, with a line-up of punk, ska, and alternative rock bands. The back room stage is small and the ceiling low, but the PA is loud and the beer list huge. The front room has a pool table, and there's a patio out front in case fresh air is required. ☎ 1850 N. ### 5 The Bösendorfer Lounge

The lounge music craze that swept the nation a few years ago has almost vanished, leaving only serious practitioners. This elegant hotel bar is a swell place to sip cocktails and dig the duet in evening dress who sing near the \$250,000 Bösendorfer Grand piano. Maybe it's the heavy drapes, the dark wood, or the well-tuned ennui of some patrons, but you feel wealthy just being here. *See p116.*

### 6 Blues Bar at House of Blues

Before it evolved into a chain of mega-clubs, the original HOB concept was closer to this casual





roadhouse place, which offers bayou-inspired eats, cold beer, and live blues bands on a low stage. Though they get little promotion, the bands booked here are excellent. And even if dinner prices are inflated (*à la* everything at Disney), the cover charge is zero. See p46.

## 7 Adobe Gilas

The downside to Gilas is that they book mostly cover bands. The upside is a young, good-looking crowd getting smashed on tequila and dirty dancing with near strangers. The band usually sets up on the patio, but it's more fun and sweaty when it rains and the band crams itself into an inside corner. Sure, the southwestern theme decor gets old fast, but if you need to relive the days of dorm parties, this is the place to go. See p104.

## 8 Rock 'n Roll Beach Club

Located in Downtown Disney, Pleasure Island, this club features music from the 1950s to the 1990s. The three-story rock 'n roll mecca also has performances by live bands as well as DJs, and can squeeze in more than 400 people. See p93.

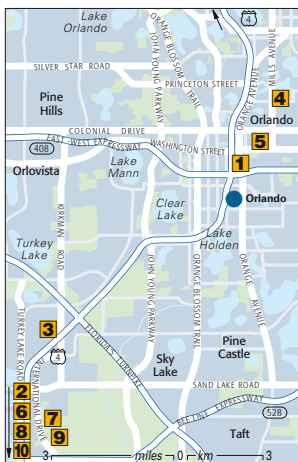
## 9 Backstage at the Rosen Plaza

This swinging nightclub is located within the Rosen Plaza Hotel on International Drive. Dance the night away to live bands and top DJs who play popular hits from the 1970s, the 1980s and the 1990s. Valet

**1 Matrix** This 15,000-sq ft (1,480 sq m) venue takes the prize for Orlando's coolest new dance club. Copping style points from the film after which it's named, Matrix offers an upscale industrial decor with a cobalt blue and stainless steel color scheme, a gigantic computerized lighting rig above the dance floor, and walls of video screens. Orlando house, techno, and electronica rule the decks. See p104.

**Blue Room**

**2 Tabu** Co-owned by one of the Backstreet Boys, this former theater is now a darkly stylish and cavernous club. The main floor boasts two large bars, a big dance floor, and video screens. Occasionally, the old upstairs balcony is transformed into a late-night sushi bar, and the lobby sometimes has a roster of supporting DJs. Lines can be long, especially when there's a big-name DJ or PA on. See p116.

**3 The Club at Firestone** Once named top club in the US by *Rolling Stone* magazine, The Club occupies the sprawling interior of one of Orlando's oldest buildings. The magic ingredients (vast size, an awe-inspiring light and sound system, and an international DJ lineup) still make this the best night out in Orlando. The Club attracts a mixed crowd that is very gay-friendly. The sounds runs from trance to hip-hop to Latin, depending on the night of the week. See p116.

**4 Cairo** Who could have guessed ancient Egypt would make such a splendid theme for a dance club? In between the Sphinx paintings and columns in this multi-level space, clubbers dance to alternative house, disco, retro-progressive music, and more. Upstairs, an excellent rooftop lounge known as the Reggae Bar features reggae and other downtempo beats. When there's a line stretching down the block, duck into Knock Knock (see p116) next door and have a drink. See p116.

**5 Icon** Between the futuristic metal decor, the barely dressed cage dancers, and the steady beat of house music, Icon is a trendy slice of Downtown's club scene. Tucked into the first floors of an otherwise nondescript office building, Icon's main room is a



surprisingly big, multi-level affair, with a hefty sound system that can rattle teeth. As with most Downtown clubs, things get moving fairly late on. *See p116.*

## 6 Samba Room

This South Orlando club is upscale and hip. It's a restaurant during the week, but on Friday and Saturday nights it also has live Latin and Reggae music, and dancing until 2am. The menu features Latin fusion cuisine and there's also a cigar lounge.

## 8 Mannequins

Pleasure Island's 21-and-over dance club is the real deal, not some Mickey Mouse knock-off of a modern club. The decor is surprisingly dark and foreboding, with an eerie industrial interior that wouldn't look out of place in a dominatrix den. The dance floor revolves while the DJs

spin techno and house. If hip, young celebrities are visiting Disney, they'll likely end up here at some point. *See p93.*

## 9 Caribbean Beach Club

While most of O-Town grooves to house, techno and electronica, the sizeable Caribbean Beach Club jams to the earthier vibes. Expect Latin, disco, calypso, soca, and reggae sounds, which pack in an ethnically diverse crowd. 📍 4919 W. Colonial Dr • Map C3 • 407-299-0706

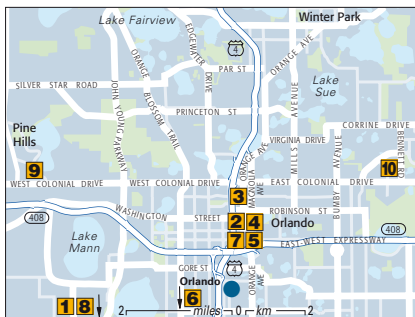
## 10 Roxy

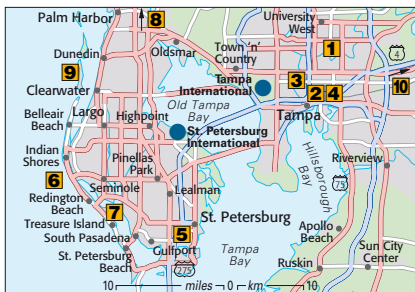

**2 Cocoa Beach**  
Just 60 miles (96 km) east of I-4 via the Bee Line Expressway, Cocoa Beach is the seashore closest to Orlando. The beach is picturesque, although the surrounding town is less so (apart from the lovely Cocoa Village near US Hwy 1). Surfing is taken seriously here, due in part to the presence of the Ron Jon Surf Shop, a vast surfing mecca that sells surf wear, beach gear, boards, and every imaginable beach accessory. *☎ Off map*

**3 Daytona Beach**  
During the annual "Spring Break," this legendary beach (just 90 minutes from Orlando along I-4) is the destination for thousands of vacationing college students, who drink and party until they drop. But sun and fun isn't all that's offered. **4 New Smyrna Beach**  
Just south of Daytona Beach, New Smyrna is a smaller, calmer town that lacks Daytona's party scene. 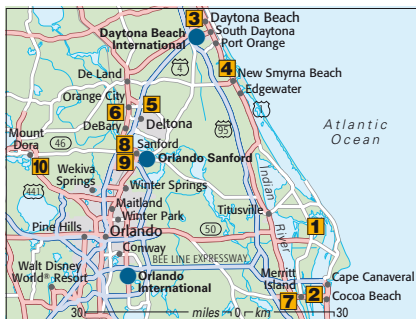

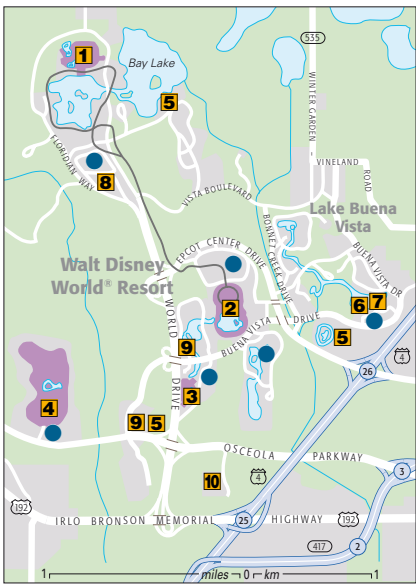

# Walt Disney World® Resort & Lake Buena Vista

THERE WAS ONLY ONE drawback to California's Disneyland, Walt Disney's first theme park, which opened in 1955: the area was prime real estate and there was no free space around the park in which to expand. So, following an aerial tour of Central Florida in 1965, Disney began covertly to buy large tracts of land. At the time, this patch of the Sunshine State was little more than cow pastures, citrus groves, and swamps, and was of little interest to anyone. Today, the 27,400-acre- (11,100-ha) Walt Disney World Resort is a self-contained and virtually self-governing entity (call 911 here and you get a Disney employee) containing four major theme parks, three water parks, several smaller attractions, and many hotels and resorts, which also spill over into the adjoining Lake Buena Vista area. For some of the 43 million guests who visit annually, it's a once-in-a-lifetime vacation, but many can't get enough of this enchanted fantasyland and return time and again to relive the experience.

But whatever extreme weather they represent, these parks have similar features: long drops to build up speed and darkened tubes to confuse you before spilling you, laughing or screaming, into a wading pool below. ### Walt Disney

Walter Elias Disney was just 26 years old when his most famous cartoon character, Mickey Mouse, was introduced in the film *Steamboat Willie* (1928). Despite escalating success in the film world as he embraced first sound then technicolor, Disney had his sights set on more than just animation. He was the man who created the theme park, which he envisaged as a kind of 3-D movie where each individual could spin his or her own story in a totally safe, controlled, and upbeat environment. His first, California's Disneyland Park, was the perfect vehicle for bringing Disney's clean-living family values and nostalgia for tradition to the masses. It was also the only one of his parks that came to fruition before his death in 1966 from lung cancer, 11 years after it opened.

### 7 DisneyQuest

This interactive, indoor theme park is divided into four zones and entertains adults as much as it does kids. Highlights of the Explore Zone include Pirates of the Caribbean: Battle for Buccaneer Gold, and Aladdin's Magic Carpet Ride. The former puts you on the deck of a two-master schooner to play cat-and-mouse with foul-playing pirates and foul-smelling sea monsters. Aladdin's Magic Carpet involves wearing a virtual reality helmet and taking a ride through the 3-D Cave of Wonders in search of the genie. In the Score Zone, it's all about testing your game-playing skills. Don't miss the Extraterrestrial Alien Encounter where you get to fly a space ship and blast gigantic robots, or the Mighty Ducks Pinball Slam, a life-size, sure-fire hit for pinball fans. The Create Zone unleashes the designer within:

build your own roller coaster (and then ride it in a simulator), or take a short course in cartooning at the Animation Academy. The Replay Zone is filled with games where for an extra charge, you can win tickets that can be redeemed for prizes you can live without. ### 8 Richard Petty Driving Experience

The two-page waiver form that riders need to sign may shake your nerve, but there's nothing virtual about this attraction. There are two options: ride or drive. For the first, take the passenger seat while a professional drives off around the track at 145 mph (233 kmph); minimum age for this option is 16. It's also a winter home for basketball's Harlem Globetrotters. Other facilities in the 200-acre (80-ha) complex, which is used for all kinds of amateur sports and athletics,

include: a fitness center; basketball, volleyball, and tennis courts; softball, soccer, and lacrosse fields; a martial-arts venue; and a golf-driving range. Disney's Wide World of Sports is also the home of the NFL Experience (see p56). ## International Drive Area

CONSIDERED THE TIMES SQUARE OF *Orlando*, *International Drive* is a brash 10-mile (16-km) strip boasting five theme parks, countless attractions open day and night, including Universal's CityWalk entertainment complex, and the USA's second-largest convention center. Added to the mix are hundreds of hotels and resorts catering to all budgets, shopping malls and outlet stores, and themed and fast-food restaurants. As a package, the result is a frenetic zone, which, despite its wall-to-wall neon signs and visual overload, has become a serious competitor of Disney World, appealing to visitors who prefer to stay away from the clutches of Mickey but want to be in the thick of the action.

salt-water lagoons, and soothing beach-resort vibe elicits just as much praise. Admission is not cheap (largely because there are never more than 1,000 visitors daily), but you get almost everything you need for the day thrown in, including sun block, lunch, and snorkel gear, as well as a seven-day pass to SeaWorld. ## 7 Ripley's Believe It or Not! Odditorium

If you're a fan of the bizarre, you'll love Ripley's. This worldwide chain of attractions displays the unbelievable finds of Robert Ripley's 40 years of adventures, the reports of which were published in more than 300 newspapers and read by more than 80 million people. The Orlando branch has a full-scale model of a 1907 Silver Ghost Rolls Royce (with moving engine parts) built out of 1,016,711 match sticks and 63 pints (36 l) of glue; a flute made of human bones; a mosaic of the Mona Lisa made out of toast; shrunken heads; a five-legged cow; and a portrait of Van Gogh made from 3,000 postcards. ## The Peabody Ducks

Their existence came about because of a practical joke, but now these five mallards, which reside in the Peabody Hotel (see p143), are among the best known and most unusual celebrities in I-Drive. As befits VIPs (Very Important Poultry), they spend much of each day in their \$100,000 glass-enclosed home, called the 'Duck Palace'. But what draws the crowds is their twice daily procession (at 11am and 5pm), when they waddle through the hotel lobby, led by their own red-coated duck master, on the way to and from the lobby fountain.

## 8 Holy Land Experience

Marvin J. Rosenthal, a Christian convert and Baptist minister, created quite a stir when he opened this religious theme park in 2001. Set in a half-scale reconstruction of the Temple of the Great King, which stood in Jerusalem in the 1st century AD, the park aims to take visitors 7,000 miles (11,200 km) away and 3,000 years back to the ancient Jerusalem of biblical times (BC 1450 to AD 66 to be exact). The attraction has models of the limestone caves where the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered and Jesus's tomb. It also has displays of rare antiquated Bibles and biblical manuscripts, an outdoor stage where actors portraying biblical personalities tell stories from the Old and New Testaments, and a café that serves Middle Eastern food. 📍 4655 Vineland Rd • Map D4 • 407-872-2272 • Open 10am–7pm, sometimes later, Mon–Sat; noon–6pm Sun • Adm





## 9 WonderWorks

You can't miss this attraction from the outside: it looks as though a classical building has landed upside down on top of a warehouse. Inside, there are 85 hands-on exhibits. Highlights include an earthquake simulator; a Bridge of Fire, where you can literally experience the hair-raising effects of 250,000 watts of static electricity; and Virtual Hoops, which uses some of the latest cinema technology to put you on TV to play basketball against one of the NBA's top players. You can also try Virtual Hang Gliding, which sends you soaring like a bird through the Grand Canyon, and WonderCoaster, which challenges your roller coaster-designing skills and then your nerve to ride your creation in a simulator. American author John Steinbeck lived here for five months in 1954 and described Parisians as “the luckiest people in the world”. Map C3

**2 8 Rue Artois**  
Here, in September 2001, the legendary Belgian mobster François Vanverbergh – godfather of the French Connection gang – fell victim to a drive-by assassin as he took his afternoon mineral water. Map C2

**3 37 Avenue Montaigne**  
Having wowed Paris with her comeback performances, iconic German actress and singer Marlene Dietrich spent her reclusive final years in a luxury apartment here. Map C3

**4 Pont de l’Alma**  
Diana, Princess of Wales, was killed in a tragic accident in the underpass here in 1997. Her unofficial monument nearby attracts thousands of visitors each year (see p48). Map C3

**5 31 Avenue George V, Hôtel George V**  
A roll-call of rockers – from the Rolling Stones and Jim Morrison to J-Lo and Ricky Martin – have made this their regular Paris home-from-home. Map C3

**6 Hôtel d’Elysée-Palace**  
Mata Hari, the Dutch spy and exotic dancer, set up her lair

in Room 113 before finally being arrested outside 25 Avenue Montaigne. Map C3

**7 37 Avenue George V**  
Franklin D. Roosevelt and his new bride visited his aunt’s apartment here in 1905. He was later commemorated in the name of a nearby avenue. Map C3

**8 49 Avenue des Champs-Elysées**  
Author Charles Dickens may well have had “the best of times and the worst of times” when he resided here from 1855–6. Ten years earlier he had also lived at 38 Rue de Courcelles. Map C3

**9 114 Avenue des Champs-Elysées**  
Brazilian aviation pioneer Alberto Santos-Dumont planned many of his amazing aeronautical feats – notably that of circling the Eiffel Tower in an airship in 1901 – from this address. Map C2

**10 102 Boulevard Haussmann**  
Hypochondriac author Marcel Proust lived in a soundproofed room here, turning memories into a masterwork. Map D2

## FOR 10 Events on the Champs-Élysées

**1 1616** Paris's grand avenue was first laid out when Marie de Médici, wife of Henri IV, had a carriage route, the Cours-la-Reine (Queen's Way), constructed through the marshland along the Seine.

**2 1667** Landscape gardener Le Nôtre lengthened the Jardin des Tuileries to meet the Cours-la-Reine, and opened up the view with a double row of chestnut trees, creating the Grand Cours.

**3 1709** The avenue was re-named the Champs-Élysées (Elysian Fields). In Greek mythology, the Elysian Fields were the "place of ideal happiness"; the abode of the blessed after death.

**4 1724** The Duke of Antin, overseer of the royal gardens, extended the avenue to the heights of Chaillot, the present site of the Arc de Triomphe (see pp24–5).

**5 1772** The Marquis of Marigny extended the avenue again, this time all the way to the Neuilly bridge over the Seine, the stretch of street now called avenue Charles-de-Gaulle.

**6 1774** Architect Jacques-Germain Soufflot lowered the hill of the Champs-Élysées by 5 m (16 ft) to

reduce the steep gradient, therefore making an easier and safer passage for residents' horses and carriages.

**7 1789** On 14 July every year Parisians celebrate Bastille Day to commemorate the start of the French Revolution (see p45). There are marching bands, military processions and Air Force jets fly overhead. In late July, "les Champs" is also the final stretch for the Tour de France bicycle race (see pp56).

**8 26 August 1944** Parisians celebrated the liberation of the city from the German Nazi Occupation of World War II with triumphant processions and festivities.

**9 30 May 1968** The infamous student demonstrations of May 1968, when riotous students protested against state authority, spilled over to massive gatherings. The demonstration here, at one of the city's main focal points, captured world news.

**10 12 November 1970** The death of President Charles de Gaulle was an immense event in France, as he had been the single most dominant French political figure for 30 years. He was honoured by a silent march along the Champs-Élysées.

## 6 Water Mania

Thirty-six acres (15 ha) of twisting, turning waterslides and plenty of places to chill out and float in an inner tube make this waterpark a particular favorite among teens and young adults. It's less themed than Disney waterparks (see p89), smaller than Wet 'n Wild (see pp34–5), but, unless the weather is bad, usually pretty crowded. ☎ 6073 W. ## A Day in Kissimmee

### Morning

📍 There are countless breakfast buffets in the area, all offering mounds of food, from fresh fruit to omelets. Find the one closest to you and start the day there. As mornings tend to be cooler and a bit less insect-ridden than afternoons, follow your meal with a self-guided tour of swamp life at **Airboat Rentals You Drive** (see p110). Head as far away as possible from the road, cut the engine, and enjoy the silence. Most of Florida used to be like this. For lunch, head to Kissimmee's historic Downtown and pop in to Azteca's (809 N. Main St), a tiny and original Tex-Mex restaurant. Be careful ordering anything "very hot"; the cook takes this as a personal challenge and will likely spice the dish so your head explodes.

### Afternoon

From Downtown, it's a short drive north to **Gatorland**. The massive gators prowling the front lakes are the big attraction. But smart guests will take the Swamp Walk, check out the crocodile pens, and survey the alligator breeding marsh from the observation tower. There are four live animal shows but if time is tight, Gator Jump-A-Roo and Gator Wrestling are the essentials.

### Evening

📍 For dinner, the slightly camp **Pacino's Italian Ristorante** (see p111) is popular for its home-style Italian favorites and delicious pizza. Afterwards, take another short drive to **Old Town** where kids can play on the rides while adults watch from a bench enjoying an ice cream.

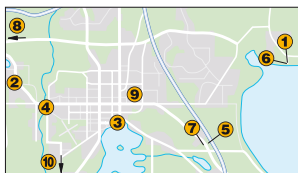

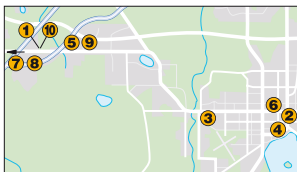

# Downtown Orlando

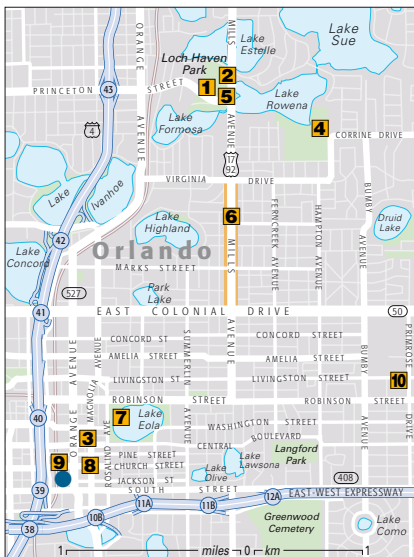
**M**OST FOLKS ASSUME ORLANDO IS *just about Walt Disney and amusement parks, with the odd cowboy and conservative Christian thrown in for good measure. But that's not the case. Long a state capital for the banking and citrus industries, Orlando's Downtown also contains several of the city's leading museums, as well as its best-known park, a lovely green oasis that surrounds Lake Eola, which boasts dramatic skyline vistas. By day Downtown is a relaxed southern enclave, but by night it transforms into a throbbing club scene – despite the decline of the famous entertainment, dining, and shopping zone, Church Street Station. Orange Avenue is the main street and most evenings, herds of party people, both gay and straight, migrate from club to club in search of cheap drinks and hot DJs – and there are plenty of both.*

**1 Orlando Science Center**

The workings of the natural world, from the infinitesimal to the overwhelming, are on display here. Big interactive fun awaits at the Body Zone, where a huge mouth introduces an exhibit about the digestive system. The vast Cinedome shows movies about topics such as Egyptian treasures and ocean life, and on weekend evenings, stargazers can pick out the planets through a telescope.

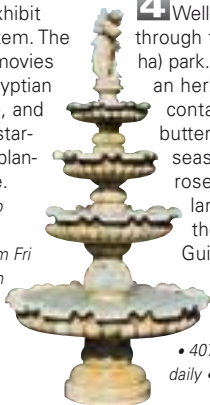
**3 Orange County Regional History Center**

From the informative to the kitsch, the History Center highlights the formative periods and industries of Central Florida. Dioramas show scenes of early Native Americans, and a re-created Florida Cracker house can be inspected. There's also a display called The Day We Changed, which chronicles the impact of the arrival of the Disney theme parks. Some exhibits fall a little flat, but many elements, such as the stuffed alligators and pink

**5 Mennello Museum of American Folk Art**

Half of the Mennello is devoted to the work of Florida folk artist Earl Cunningham (1893–1977), who created vibrant, whimsical pastoral paintings glowing with orange skies and yellow rivers. The other half houses traveling exhibits of folk art. The lakeside grounds contain wonderfully quirky sculptures scattered here and there. 📍 900 E. **6 The Vietnamese District**  
 This area, also known as the ViMi district (for the crossroads at Virginia and Mills avenues), is a less obvious ethnic enclave than, say, New York's Chinatown. Nevertheless, it is still clustered with Vietnamese restaurants and shops, as well as delights from other Asian countries. The thickest concentration is south of Virginia, at Colonial Drive. 📍 *Mills Ave bet Virginia Ave & Colonial Dr • Map N3*

**7 Lake Eola Park**  
 A pedestrian-only path encircles Lake Eola, offering a pleasing view of downtown's skyline. Those willing to exert their leg muscles can rent swan-shaped paddle boats (see p47). Real swans drift along in the lake's shallow water and will venture onto dry land if offered a handful of the food that can be bought for small change. Plays and concerts are performed at the Walt Disney Amphitheater, a bandshell with surprisingly decent acoustics. Disney's presence is more ostentatiously displayed with the rather incongruous Millennium clock located on the lake's southern side. 📍 *Map P3*

**8 Orlando Hauntings Ghost Tours**  
 A guide in 19th-century costume holds a lantern and tries his best to spook his willing participants, while leading this 90-minute walking tour. Groups of up to 25 people hear tales of murder, morbidity, and ghost sightings, and as an added bonus, the guide recounts wonderful anecdotes and information about the architecture and history of Downtown's most interesting buildings.

**9 Church Street**  
 The stretch of Church Street that lies between Orange Avenue and I-4 is thick with enough specialty shops, restaurants, and bars to keep visitors engaged for hours. The anchor is Church Street Station, although the closure of several of its restaurants and shows has lessened the appeal of the complex.

Despite this slowdown, the bar strip on the eastern side of Church Street near Orange Avenue remains very popular, especially with its three-level complex that has different bars on each floor. On weekend evenings, the street is blocked to traffic, which makes it easy to zigzag between watering holes such as the Ybor Martini Bar and Mulvaney's, although hipper bars are found around the corner on Orange Avenue (see p116). 📍 *Church St bet. ### 10 Colonial Lanes

For more than 50 years, the venerable Colonial Lanes has offered patrons the sociable and quintessential blue-collar pastime of bowling. This 32-lane facility is a friendly and noisy place to knock over a few pins, so rent some shoes, pick out a ball, and let the computer keep score – but bear in mind that league bowling takes over the place between 6pm and 9pm every night, so

avoid those times, unless you're happy to watch. After the game, the place to go is the Colonial Lanes Bar & Restaurant, parts of which resemble a giant sunken living room (with bartenders standing on a lower floor than customers). Drinks are cheap, and the concept of rounding off prices never caught on here, so don't be surprised if your tab is a quirky \$4.38. 📍 400 N. ## A Day Downtown

### Morning

Begin with a big healthy breakfast at JP's Everyday Gourmet (63 E. Pine St) before visiting the **Orange County Regional History Center**, a homespun place that reveals the pre-Disney history of the region. For lunch, wander over to **Café Annie** (see p117). This authentic café has Greek and Lebanese food, including mixed platters. This kind of food usually has lots of vegetarian options.

### Afternoon

After lunch, jump in the car or grab a cab to Loch Haven Park, where the **Orlando Museum of Art**, the **Orlando Science Center**, and the **Mennello Museum of American Folk Art** (for all see p113) reside within easy walking distance of each other. The Science Center, with its four floors of interactive fun, is the best bet for kids. Art lovers can easily hit the Mennello and the OMA in the same afternoon but if time is short, the OMA deserves priority. Make a dinner stop in the Vietnamese district where Vinh's Restaurant (1231 E. Colonial Dr) serves up a top-notch bowl of comforting *pho*, a traditional, and delicious noodle soup.

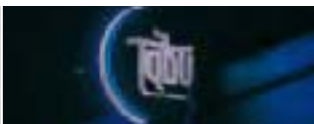
### Evening

The downtown club scene starts late, so kick off with an early cocktail at **The Bösendorfer Lounge** (see p116). Fans of live music should head to **The Social** (see p116), where shows start around 10pm. 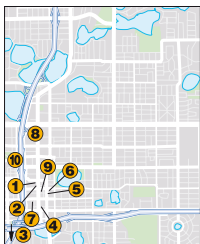

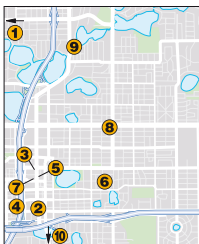

## Winter Park, Maitland, & Eatonville

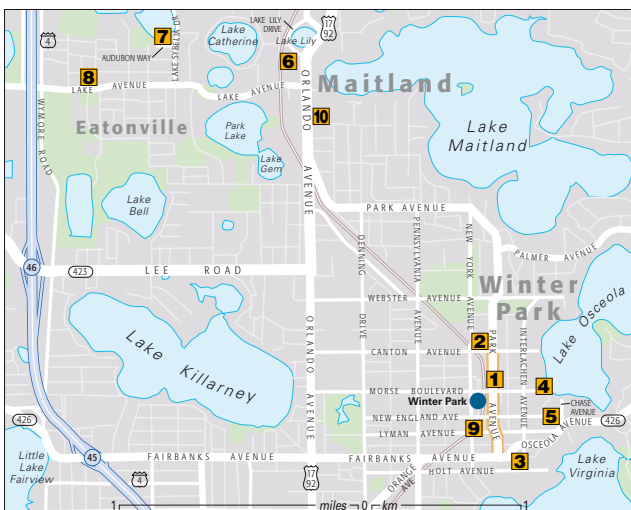
**T**RUE TO ITS NAME, *Winter Park* was chartered in 1887 as a winter resort for wealthy – and cold – Northerners. It evolved into a suburb of metropolitan Orlando, but still retains the charm and character of a wealthy, small town, with excellent shops, bars, and restaurants, and a sprinkling of interesting museums. The areas of Maitland and Eatonville, to the north and east, are more residential, but also have some worthwhile attractions, which make a pleasant change from south Orlando's mass-market theme parks.

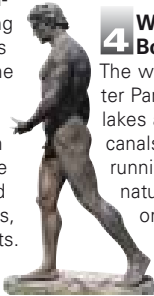
## 1 Park Avenue

The stretch of Park Avenue between Fairbanks and Swoope avenues is a thriving and delectable slice of urban living. This is the kind of manageable, old-style downtown, which is usually erased in the rush to suburbanize the Sunshine State. There's bucolic Central Park; buildings are rarely over three stories and contain fashionable shops or eateries at ground level; and all around, the sidewalks are full of people enjoying the day. 📍 *Map L4*

## 2 Charles Hosmer Morse Museum of American Art

The imposing, windowless walls of this museum rather ironically contain an outstanding collection of beautiful glass windows and objects by the American artist, Louis Comfort Tiffany. 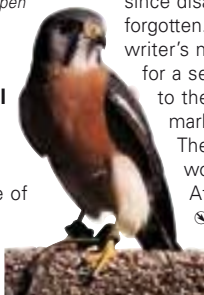
## 6 Historic Waterhouse Residence & Carpentry Museum

William H. Waterhouse was a carpenter who came to Central Florida in the early 1880s and built this lovely home overlooking Lake Lily. Pristinely restored and maintained by the Maitland Historical Society, the home, Waterhouse's carpentry shop, and the property's remarkable collection of hand-crafted furniture offer a glimpse into the DIY days of Maitland's past. Woodworking buffs will be wowed by Waterhouse's extensive use of heart of pine, a wood rarely seen today. Tours lasting about 40 minutes are offered. The Waterhouse facilities nicely complement the Maitland Historical Museum and the Telephone Museum (see p61), both located just a few blocks away and also run by the Maitland Historical Society. ☎ 820 Lake Lilly Dr

## 7 Audubon National Center for Birds of Prey

Think of this place as a halfway house for some of the most impressive examples of Florida's birdlife. It was created by the Florida Audubon Society to rescue,

rehabilitate, and release wounded raptors (birds of prey). Those that wouldn't survive being released into the wild are kept here, living a pampered existence in a lovely lakeside location, while helping to educate visitors about wildlife issues and conserva-

tion. Guests aren't allowed to observe the rehabilitation process, but permanent residents on view usually include vultures, bald eagles, screech owls, hawks, ospreys, and more.

## 8 Zora Neale Hurston National Museum of Fine Arts

Zora Neale Hurston earned fame as one of the brightest stars of Harlem's literary heyday in the 1920 and 1930s. Many of her most famous writings (including the 1937 novel, *Their Eyes Were Watching God*) reflected life in her hometown of Eatonville, the first incorporated African-American municipality in the USA. The front porches and stores of Eatonville, where Zora's characters lived and spun their tales, have long since disappeared, but she is not forgotten. This museum keeps the writer's memory alive, with maps for a self-guided walking tour to the remaining literary landmarks of her neighbourhood. The museum also exhibits work by contemporary African-American artists.

## A Day in Winter Park

### Morning

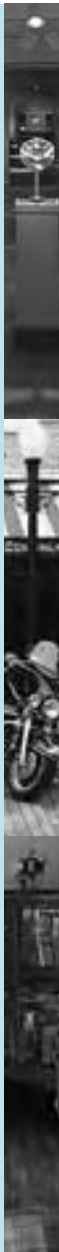
🕒 Begin with a hearty breakfast at the **Briarpatch Restaurant** (see p123). You'll probably have to wait a bit, especially on weekends, so grab a newspaper. Then take time to wander the north end of **Park Avenue** (see p119), where a multitude of charming one-off boutiques cater to upscale shopping tastes. At Cole Avenue pop in to the **Charles Hosmer Morse Museum** (see p119); its outstanding collection of Tiffany glass is a must-see. Follow this with a relaxing trip on the **Winter Park Scenic Boat Tour** (see p119), which departs from a dock on Morse Street, just a 15-minute walk away. On your return, lunch options are plentiful, but if the weather is good, grab one of the sidewalk tables at the **R Bistro** (see p122) for some good food and serious people-watching.

### Afternoon

After lunch, continue south on Park Avenue to Rollins College, home of the excellent **Cornell Fine Arts Museum** (see p119) and spend the rest of the afternoon enjoying this small but excellent collection.

### Evening

Then, it's a ten-minute car ride north to Maitland's **Enzian Theater** where you can settle in to enjoy the latest in US and foreign independent films with a bottle of wine and a cheese plate. End the day at the bustling **Brio Tuscan Grille** (see p123) just a few minutes south by car, savoring a pink cosmopolitan or a gorgonzola-encrusted steak.

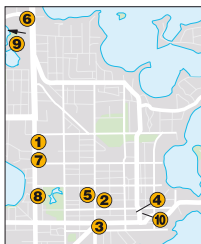

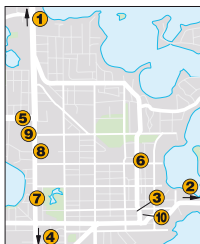

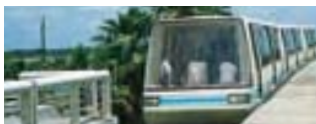

## TOP 10 Things to Know Before You Go

### 1 Orlando International Airport

Serving more than 100 cities worldwide, and handling 31 million passengers a year, this is the city's busiest airport. Forty scheduled airlines use it: the major domestic carriers include Delta, American, Northwest, US Airways, America West, and Southwest. British Airways, Virgin Atlantic, Air Canada, Iberia, and Saudi Arabian Airlines are some of its international carriers. Check the website (*see p130*) for information and maps to make sure you don't spend more time there than you need to. The airport is located about a 30-minute drive from Walt Disney World – if traffic is good.

### 2 Orlando Sanford International

Orlando's second airport, used primarily by international flights, is around an hour's drive from the Disney resorts. It is far smaller (used by just 1.2 million passengers per year) and promises a less crowded, less hectic start to a vacation.

### 3 Orlando Executive Airport

Situated just three miles (5 km) from the city's business center, Orlando's original airport is today used by private charters for both business and pleasure travelers.

### 4 US Entry Requirements for Canadian Visitors

Canadians only need some kind of photo ID and proof of residence to travel to the US.

### 5 US Entry Requirements for Overseas Visitors

Citizens from the UK, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand and many European countries may visit for up to 90 days without a visa if they have a valid passport. Other nationals should apply for a visa from their local US consulate or embassy well before they travel. For the latest information check on-line ([www.state.gov](http://www.state.gov)).

### 6 Arriving by Train & Bus

Two Greyhound bus terminals and four Amtrak rail stations (including Sanford's Auto train terminal) serve the Orlando area. Tickets are rarely much cheaper than those for equivalent journeys by air.

### 7 Consolidators & Packagers

Consolidators buy bulk airline seats (and occasionally rooms) to sell at cheaper prices. Try 800-FLY-CHEAP (800-359-2432; [www.1800flycheap.com](http://www.1800flycheap.com)). Packagers sell full or partial packages that can include flight, room, rental car, and theme park tickets. Some parks have their own; or try [www.vactionpackager.com](http://www.vactionpackager.com).

### 8 Beat the Crowds

Theme park crowds are thinnest from the second week in September to the third week in November, the first two weeks of December, mid-January to mid-March, and late April through the third week of May. These are the periods when most American children are in school, although weekends are always busy.

### 9 Weather Wise

Heat and humidity can be oppressive in summer, when temperatures easily hit 90°F (32°C) and lightning is another summer threat. High pollen counts in spring can make life hell for allergy sufferers and hurricane season is from August to November.

### 10 Online Planning

USA Tourist ([www.usatourist.com](http://www.usatourist.com)) is one of the best multilingual resources. It has information on attractions, hotels, restaurants, and more in English, Spanish, French, Japanese, and German. Search engines are also useful for planning a trip, while MapQuest ([www.mapquest.com](http://www.mapquest.com)) can help you plan a route once you've arrived.

## 10 Tips on Getting Around Orlando

### 1 Renting a Car

Most major car rental companies have offices at or near both major airports, as well as in town. Many also have shuttles serving the Amtrak and Greyhound stations. Most agencies offer special deals via their websites (see p130) or packagers. Local maps are provided, and staff can help plan the route to your hotel.

### 2 Navigating Orlando

The city's major north-south artery is Interstate Highway 4 (Hwy I-4), which connects the main tourist areas. The Bee Line Expressway (Hwy 528) is an east-west tollway useful for reaching the Kennedy Space Center (see pp38-41). Most main roads suffer gridlock during rush hour (7-9am and 4-6pm daily).

### 3 Shuttle Options

Mears shuttle buses travel from Orlando International Airport to hotels (the price varies according to distance), and around the tourist areas, including the Kennedy Space Center. ### 4 Hotel Shuttles

Some hotels offer an airport shuttle service, and many offer transport to and from theme parks and other attractions several times per day. The service is usually free of charge to the parks nearest them, or available for a small charge to get to the others. Inquire about services when booking or planning your vacation.

### 5 Taking a Taxi

Taxis can be an economical way to get around for groups of four or five people. The fares from Orlando International and Orlando Sanford International airports to Walt Disney World are around \$40 and \$110 (plus tip) respectively. Extra charges apply at nights, weekends, and on public holidays. Cabs are easily found at airports and major hotels – otherwise call (see p131), as they are not that easy to flag down in the street.

### 6 The Disney Transportation System

Disney's free transportation system (monorail, buses, water taxis, and ferries) means you can save money by not renting a car and paying for gas and parking. It's best for guests who will spend most of their time with Mickey. But the circuits are set in stone and it can sometimes take an hour to reach some destinations in the resort.

### 7 The I-Ride Trolley

This service is a convenient and cheap way to get from A to B along the Universal, Sea-World, and International Drive corridor. Trolleys run every 15 minutes, 7am-11:30pm daily, and make 54 stops. Exact change is required. ☎ 407-248-9590

### 8 Lynx Buses

The paper is available in restaurants, shops, clubs, convenience stores, and street boxes all over town.

### 5 Watermark

This free bi-weekly newspaper is the voice of Orlando's extensive gay and lesbian community. Not particularly radical, it offers splendid coverage of arts and events and is the best resource for clubs, shows, and more for the community. As well as national media superstar and controversial presenter Howard Stern's syndicated show (weekday mornings), the schedule of this radio station is filled with local talk radio personalities. All offer an interesting window into Orlando's current state of mind.

### 9 WMFE 90.7-FM

The area's best public radio station is best known for intelligent hourly news. The rest of the day offers light classical music – useful for calming down frustrated drivers in I-4 road jams (see p140) – with weekends turned over to syndicated public radio shows.

### 10 Brochure Racks

Virtually every hotel, restaurant, and attraction offers a huge lobby display packed with brochures and tourist guides covering almost all the hotels, restaurants, and smaller attractions in the area. Besides the maps and general information, discount coupons are common in these publications, so they're worth picking up (see p133).

## TOP 10 Tips on Shopping & Tickets

### 1 Shopping Hours

Shops in theme parks keep the same hours as the parks. Malls and outlets are usually open from 9 or 10am until 9pm Monday to Saturday and at least noon to 6pm on Sunday. Shops outside the main tourist areas tend to open from 9am to 5pm Monday through Saturday.

### 2 Sales Tax

With the exception of groceries and some medications, all purchases in Orlando are subject to a 6 per cent state and local sales tax.

### 3 Sales

Look for winter-wear bargains from March through April, and summer bargains from August to October as the seasonal stock changes. In August, with the approach of the new school year, there are good buys on kids' clothes. The day after Thanksgiving is the biggest shopping day of the year, with huge pre-Christmas sales attracting hordes of shoppers.

### 4 Outlets

Outlet stores sell last season's fashions at discounted prices. Shoppers who know the suggested retail prices of the goods they seek will be able to tell what is – and what isn't – a bargain. Some stores promise as much as 75 per cent discount and some actually deliver.

Others don't. The big players here are the Orlando Premium and Belz outlets (*see p66*).

### 5 Gifts & Souvenirs

Apart from cheap T-shirts, stuffed animals, and baseball caps, Orlando does have some more original souvenirs. These include Florida oranges, alligator meat and leather products, and manatee memorabilia.

### 6 Shipping Home

If you have bought more souvenirs than you can carry home, why not ship them? Disney and Universal parks, resorts, and shops can make the arrangements, usually via United Parcel Service (UPS). Do-it-yourselfers must take their packages to UPS (call 1-800-742-5877 for the nearest center) or the US Postal Service (1-800-275-8777).

### 7 Buy Theme Park Tickets Online

Disney ([www.disneyworld.com](http://www.disneyworld.com)) allows guests to buy tickets online, saving on time waiting in line, but they must be picked up in person. Universal ([www.universalorlando.com](http://www.universalorlando.com)) mails online tickets to buyers; buy at least five weeks in advance. SeaWorld's online service ([www.seaworld.com](http://www.seaworld.com)) lets buyers print out their tickets and, when they arrive at the park, go straight to the turnstiles, where they are verified.

### 8 Multi-Day & Multi-Park Passes

Disney's Park Hopper and Park Hopper Plus tickets are valid for four to seven days. Both include unlimited entry to the four parks; the Park Hopper Plus tickets also include entry to other Disney attractions. The discounts aren't great, but you save time waiting in line. Universal (which also offers a separate two-to-three-day pass for Universal Parks only), SeaWorld, Wet 'n Wild, and Tampa's Busch Gardens have joined up to offer the unlimited access, 14-day FlexTicket.

### 9 Cutting in Line

Disney (FastPass) and Universal and SeaWorld (Express) offer a system that cuts out the long wait for the most popular rides and shows. Just slide your ticket through the turnstile to get an allocated time for your visit. When it's time, simply go to the particular attraction's designated entrance to take your place.

### 10 Concierge Desks

Most upscale and some moderately priced hotels have concierge desks in the lobby. They're great places to make restaurant reservations or buy tickets for theme parks and other attractions. They don't give discounts, but most do offer the convenience of waiting in a short line as opposed to a long one in the parks.

## TOP 10 Tips for the Budget Conscious

### 1 The Magicard

The Orlando/Orange County CVB's (see p128) Magicard offers \$500 worth of discounts on accommodation, car rentals, attractions, meals, shopping, and more. It also offers deals that combine rooms with attraction and theme park tickets. Each card is valid for up to six people, and it's free. Allow four weeks for delivery. ☎ 407-363-5872 • www.orlandoinfo.com

### 2 Hotel Handouts

Many hotels and motels offer freebies such as continental breakfasts, evening hors d'oeuvres, and newspapers. Their coupon racks are stuffed with two-for-one and other special deals on meals and attractions. For those without a car, most hotels have free or low-fee shuttle services to the parks.

### 3 Newspaper Coupons

The Sunday travel sections in many major US newspapers lure people to Orlando with offers of coupons, cheap fares, and package deals. Once here, read the Orlando Sentinel (especially Friday's Calendar section), as well as the free papers available on street corners and in hotel lobbies, all of which feature lots of discounts and offers. See p128.

### 4 Rooms with Cooking Facilities

Travelers can save big by booking a room with a kitchen, kitchenette, or even just a microwave and refrigerator. Apart from Walt Disney World properties, most accommodation is close to supermarkets or delicatessens, some of which deliver for a small fee.

### 5 Pack a Snack & Water

Theme-park prices for refreshments are 30–50 per cent higher than what people pay outside the parks. The parks prohibit coolers (containers for keeping food and drink cool), but guests can bring their own bottled water and snacks. Some parks have fountains, but the water in Central Florida does not taste particularly sweet.

### 6 Eat Big Early & Late

It's often unnecessary to eat three big meals a day, particularly in the hottest months of the year. If you want to skip, or go light on, lunch, you can eat well – and cheaply – before and after your theme-park visit by having a low-priced, all-you-can-eat, buffet breakfast and an early-bird dinner (see p134).

### 7 Fast Food & Family Restaurants

Orlando is chock-full of fast-food outlets. The city

also has an abundance of very well-priced family restaurants (see pp70–71). Most have kids' menus, which can be even cheaper at lunchtime.

### 8 OTIX!

The cultural crowd isn't left out of the discount mix. The city's CVB (see p128) regularly has half-price tickets, including those for opera, ballet, music, and theater. The tickets are for same-day performances, and while information is available by phone, the tickets must be picked up in person. ☎ 407-872-2382

### 9 Staying at Disney on the Cheap

People who really want to stay at Disney World, but can't afford the prices, can find the cheapest rates at the All-Star resorts (see p142). Rack rates (those anyone can get without a discount) are extraordinarily reasonable and kids also stay free. But be warned: rooms at these "value" resorts are very cramped.

### 10 Gas for Renters

Never buy gas for a rental car from the car hire company itself. Some of their offers sound enticing, especially those offering cheaper gas if you buy up front rather than when the car is returned. Most of the time, fuel prices are cheaper – sometimes much cheaper – around town.

## TOP 10 Tips on Eating & Drinking

### 1 Disney World's Priority Seating

Disney restaurants don't take reservations. In their place, they use what they call a priority seating system. Callers are given a time to arrive; when they turn up, the next available table is given to them (as opposed to a table being held open). Note that all restaurants inside Disney parks, except Animal Kingdom's Rainforest Café, require park admission.

### 2 Reservations

Whenever restaurants accept reservations, make them – especially in the main tourist areas of I-Drive, Lake Buena Vista, and along Irló Bronson Memorial Highway in Kissimmee. Not having a reservation can mean waiting two hours for a table during prime dining time, usually 6–8:30pm. Some restaurants refuse to seat diners who have not reserved in advance and upscale eateries may be unable to accommodate you unless you reserve far ahead.

### 3 Gratuities

Wait staff expect a tip of at least 15 per cent. Those who are particularly helpful may deserve 20 per cent; you may want to give just 10 per cent to those who aren't. Some restaurants now add tips to the bill, so check before paying.

### 4 Smoking

New laws passed in Florida mean that all restaurants are now non-smoking establishments. If you want to smoke while you drink, you have to find a bar where eating is only incidental to drinking. If you aren't sure, just smoke outside.

### 5 Buffet Breakfast Bargains

There are several modestly priced, all-you-can-eat breakfast buffets around town (especially on I-Drive and in Kissimmee). For a handful of dollars, you can fill your stomach and save money by eating a light lunch or skipping it altogether.

### 6 Early Birds

Some value restaurants offer cut-rate meals when business is slow, which is usually between 4pm and 6pm, Monday–Friday. These early-bird deals are usually advertised outside and are offered in the free coupon books found in hotel lobbies and tourist attractions. Many of these restaurants also offer 2-for-1 drink specials during these times.

### 7 Lunch Menus vs Dinner Menus

Many upscale restaurants are not only hard to get in to at dinnertime, but the menus are very expensive. The lunch menu might have fewer options, and portions

tend to be a little less generous, but the prices are lower. To save money – and your digestive system – consider eating your main meal at mid-day and eating lighter at night.

### 8 Special Diets

Some restaurants that don't normally offer meat- and seafood-free options are happy to prepare vegetarian dishes, with some prior warning. Disney restaurants go one step further and provide for a variety of other dietary needs, including kosher, fat- or sugar-free, plus lactose intolerance and allergies. Give 24 hours' notice. ☎ 407-824-2222 (407-939-3463 if staying on Disney property).

### 9 Happy Hours

Many bars (and restaurants) have happy hours, usually from 4–7pm, when drinks are often two for the price of one. They sometimes serve special hors d'oeuvres as well.

### 10 Hotel Mini Bars

Put bluntly, these are rip-offs. Years ago, inventive guests drank the good stuff and refilled the bottles with cheap brands. So now the mini bars have a sensor: remove the bottle for 10 seconds and you get charged – a lot – for it.

## TOP 10 Health Tips

### 1 Heat, Sun & Insects

Heat and humidity during the summer season (June to mid-September) can cause dehydration, so be sure to drink at least two quarts (two liters) of fluids (preferably water) each day, and wear a wide-brimmed hat and airy clothes. Not only does too much sun result in nasty burns, but it can also cause sun poisoning. Use a sunscreen with a high protection factor. And as much as Disney and Universal want to erase blood-sucking flies and mosquitoes, they can't, so remember to use insect repellent in summer.

### 2 911

This is the number to call for emergency health matters and for immediate police or fire assistance.

### 3 Hospitals & First Aid

Ask at your hotel or resort reception for the nearest hospital. Make sure you have some kind of insurance, otherwise hospital costs can be crippling. All of the major parks have first-aid clinics for minor ailments.

### 4 Ask-A-Pharmacist

Most pharmacists are happy to give you first aid advice, as well as advice regarding how to take medicines. Most pharmacies are not open 24 hours, but pharmacists

will usually give advice over the phone so call a Walgreens or a CVS Pharmacy, which are usually open 24 hours. See p131.

### 5 In-Room Medical Care

House calls are a thing of the past in most US cities, but the tourist areas in Orlando have two services that make house and hotel-room calls. Doctors on Call Service and Centra Care In-Room Services cover most of the areas from Downtown south to Disney and Kissimmee. ☎ *Doctors on Call Service* • 407-399-3627 ☎ *Centra Care In-Room Services* • 407-238-2000

### 6 Centra Care Walk-In Clinics

Centra Care (affiliated with the Florida Hospital) has walk-in clinics scattered throughout Orange, Seminole, and Osceola counties (see p131). These clinics can handle minor emergencies (broken limbs, cuts requiring stitches, and fevers), but not life-threatening situations, for which you should call 911.

### 7 24-Hour Pharmacies

Several drug stores sell over-the-counter and prescription drugs around the clock (see p131). Additional pharmacies, with regular hours, are listed in the Yellow Pages.

### 8 Dental Referral Service

This nationwide, toll-free service helps people to find the nearest suitable dentist. The telephones are answered 8am–8pm Monday–Friday; the automated answering service informs callers of the website then puts them on hold to speak to an operator. Those who prefer to choose for themselves, or anyone needing 24-hour aid, should use the Yellow Pages (or see p131). ☎ 888-343-3440 800-511-8663 • [www.dentalreferral.com](http://www.dentalreferral.com)

### 9 Poison Control

This 24-hour hotline can and has saved lives. Operators can help deal with a problem, summon rescuers, and answer questions. But, don't overlook 911 for any emergency situation. ☎ 800-222-1222.

### 10 Florida Tourism Industry Marketing Corp

While it shouldn't be used for emergencies, this tourism-funded group can provide basic information about medical services and assistance throughout the state. It also has a range of other services, including assistance with lost credit cards and documents, help with accidents, directions, and more. Operators can help in more than 150 languages. ☎ 800-647-9284

## TOP 10 Communications & Money Tips

### 1 Making Phone Calls

Orlando's recent growth has created a problem for telephone companies. Local numbers are a 10-digit number – the area code (Central Florida's is 407), plus the seven digit number. If calling a number with a different area (or toll-free) code, dial 1 before the code and phone number. To make calls overseas, consider buying a phone card.

### 2 Internet Access

Internet cafes (see p131) offer email and internet services for varying prices. Public libraries offer free access to the internet.

### 3 Languages

Disney, Universal, and larger hotels have multilingual staff who speak Spanish, French, German, and, in some cases, Dutch, Japanese, and other languages. They also have information printed in these languages. The Orlando/Orange County Convention & Visitors Bureau and USA Tourist have multilingual websites.

### 4 Post Offices

The United States Postal Service (USPS) has five post offices in the Orlando area. Opening hours vary, but they are usually 9am to 5pm weekdays, although some

open Saturday mornings as well. Drugstores and hotels often sell stamps, but they are slightly more expensive than those sold at post offices. Mailboxes, which are blue, are on most main streets and in hotels. Most major hotels also have daily collection services.

### 5 Credit Cards & Traveler's Checks

Most hotels, restaurants, attractions, and shops accept American Express, Diners Club, Discover, MasterCard, and Visa credit cards. Some also take Carte Blanche and JCB cards. US dollar denominations of American Express, Thomas Cook, and Visa traveler's checks are widely accepted with ID.

### 6 Currency & Exchanges

Dollar notes come in \$1, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, and \$100 bills. Coins in circulation are of 1 cent, 5 cents (a nickel), 10 cents (a dime), and 25 cents (a quarter) value. One-dollar and 50 cent coins exist but are very rare. Currency exchanges are based at all the airports, major branches of banks, and near guest services or guest relations in all major theme parks.

### 7 ATMs

Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs) are located at almost all bank branches, in all major

theme parks, major shopping malls, some hotels, and at airports. Most also accept withdrawals on American Express, MasterCard, and Visa credit cards. There is a \$1.50 to \$3 advance charge for cards not affiliated to that particular bank. It's often cheaper to use a debit card, but not all debit systems are supported by US banks; check the symbols on the ATM to see if yours is one that is accepted.

### 8 Bank Opening Hours

Most Central Florida banks are open 9am to 4pm weekdays (to 6pm on Friday). A few branches also open Saturday mornings. Most have ATMs with 24-hour access.

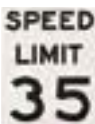
### 9 Western Union

International money transfers can be sent to more than 101,000 Western Union agents and offices in 187 countries. They can also arrange international telegrams.

### 10 Taxes

The USA doesn't have a national sales tax. Instead, individual states and counties set the rate of sales tax. Florida levies a six per cent state, or state and local tax, on everything except groceries and certain medicines. Hotels also add an extra three to five per cent bed tax (see p141).

## TOP 10 Safety Tips

### 1 On the Coast

Florida's beaches are usually well supervised by lifeguards, but still keep a close eye on young children and stick to areas where you can see the lifeguards. The same goes for rivers and pools.

### 2 Non-Emergency Numbers

Outside city limits, county sheriff's offices (see p131) are the primary police agencies: in Central Florida they are in Orange County, Osceola County, and Seminole County. For traffic and highway-related matters, call the Florida Highway Patrol. For coastal issues, see the Florida Marine Patrol. ☎ *Florida Highway Patrol* • 407-897-5959 ☎ *Florida Marine Patrol* • 321-383-2740

### 3 Hurricanes

The coast is usually hit hardest by hurricanes, but Central Florida is also affected. Hurricane season is from August to November. If caught in one, stay inside, away from windows, and have lots of water, canned food, and a flashlight to hand. For more tips and up-to-date forecasts, see the Hurricane Weather Center. ☎ <http://hurricane.weathercenter.com>

### 4 General Safety

Always keep car and hotel-room doors locked. Before driving, ask the rental-car company, your hotel's front-desk staff,

or the Florida Tourism Industry Marketing Corporation (see p135) for the safest and most direct route to your destination. Don't let strangers change your currency, and when paying for anything, check you've been given the correct change before leaving the premises.

### 5 Valuables

Smart travelers leave valuables at home. If you do bring watches, jewelry, or other items of value, keep them in a hotel safe. The safes in hotel rooms should only be used for less valuable items. It's also advisable to carry credit cards or traveler's checks rather than large amounts of cash.

### 6 Stay in Populated, Well-Lit Areas

Orlando doesn't have the same crime rate as many cities, but it has its share of thieves who prey on the unsuspecting. At night, avoid badly lit areas (especially Downtown's westside, south of Colonial Drive), and at all times be wary of pickpockets.

### 7 Lost Children

Nothing frightens a parent or guardian more than turning away for a moment only to find their child gone. It happens every day in Orlando's theme parks. To help staff reunite families, children under seven should wear tags with their name, hotel, and a contact

number on it. When any member of your group gets lost, find a park employee for assistance.

### 8 Seat Belts

Florida law requires seat belts to be worn by the driver and all passengers over the age of three. Children three years and under must ride in a car seat – most rental-car agencies can provide them. Those who don't heed the seat-belt law risk a fine of \$50.

### 9 Drinking & Driving

In a word: Don't. In the best case, it can be costly. In the worst case, it can be deadly. Florida strictly enforces this law. Violators risk time in jail if convicted of a drink-driving offense. Have a designated driver in the group, skip alcohol for the night, use public transport, or grab taxis. Police are known to survey bars to see who is drinking, then wait outside until drinkers get in a car to drive off, when they are tested.

### 10 Speed Limits

Speed limits on interstates, toll roads, and major highways range from 55 to 70 mph (88–112 kmph). On smaller highways, the limit is 45 mph (72 kmph), and in residential areas, it's 30 to 35 mph (48–56 kmph). Fines begin at \$160, doubling if it's in a school or construction zone.

## TOP 10 Tips for Families

### 1 Name Tags & Reunion Places

It's very easy to get lost in crowded theme parks. If that happens, find a park employee (they're usually in uniform) and ask for help. Kids seven and under should wear tags bearing their name, hotel, and a contact number. Older kids and adults should pick a place inside the park to meet if they become separated.

### 2 Parent-Swaps

Height restrictions (see below) mean that some younger children may not be able to go on certain rides. The theme parks usually have a program that lets one parent ride while the other tends to the kids in a special waiting area. Then the second parent can go on the ride: it might not be so much fun riding by yourself but at least you don't have to wait in line again.

### 3 Stroller Rental & Baby Care

All the major theme parks offer stroller rental. There are also excellent nursing facilities, often with free formula provided. Diaper changing tables can be found in women's and some men's restrooms, and diapers are available free of charge at Universal's parks.

### 4 Breaks

Theme parks are trying at any time of year,

but excessively so in summer, when even standing in line can be exhausting. Plan regular breaks at air-conditioned venues (best visited around midday, when it's hottest outside), or "splash areas" (see below).

### 5 Refreshments

Bring snacks for energy and don't forget water. The parks have a few drinking fountains, but bottled water is very expensive.

### 6 Getting Wet & Not Getting Wet

Take a change of clothes to the theme parks, if not for yourself then for the children. Apart from water rides where you might expect to get wet, kids enjoy running through "splash areas" to cool off, and drying off naturally might not be possible. A rain poncho is smart year round, since Florida has rainy spells in both summer and winter.

### 7 Theme Park Ride Restrictions

Disney parks tend to have few health and height restrictions, although Disney-MGM Studios is a little restrictive. Universal's parks can be more limiting for younger kids, especially Islands of Adventure (with warnings on nine of the 13 major rides), but like Universal Studios, it has a dedicated kids' area. SeaWorld has height restrictions on a

couple of rides, while at Discovery Cove, you must be at least six years old to swim with the dolphins. Non-swimmers can still join in, but obviously can't enjoy the full experience.

### 8 Children's Menus

Most of the more expensive and dressy restaurants discourage young diners either by failing to provide children's menus or with outright bans on anyone under 17 years of age. However, most restaurants have some kind of kids' menu, usually in the \$4 to \$6 range. Some also provide distractions such as crayons and coloring-in placemats.

### 9 Character Meals

Disney lures families with children to a dozen of their restaurants to charge exorbitant prices for eating breakfast, lunch, or dinner with humans dressed in Disney character costumes. Universal also has one "character" restaurant, and there are some similar set-ups outside of theme parks. See p71.

### 10 Kids Stay Free

Orlando is Kidsville. The little ones don't pay, but they're the reason adults do. Smart hoteliers let kids stay free. Most rooms have beds for four, so even if there are only two in the party, the extra beds are part of the deal.

## TOP 10 Things to Avoid

### 1 Park Visits When School's Out

All the parks are packed during school breaks (late Jun–late Aug; late Dec–early Jan; mid-Feb, and Easter), since that's when locals hit the parks with their kids. Summer is the worst, since not only is it crowded, but it's also brutally hot. The least crowded months are November plus early and late February.

### 2 Theme Park Isolation

Don't spend every waking minute in Orlando's theme parks, because burn-out is inevitable. Make sure you take time to see Central Florida's natural attractions (see p82–5), smaller attractions (see p44–5), and museums (see p60–61).

### 3 Early Arrivals

It might seem smart to hit the theme parks as soon as they open, but it is not always the best plan. Kids who arrive early tend to collapse by 2pm and are a mess the rest of the day. Instead, take it easy in the morning and head for the parks in the afternoons and evenings. Temperatures are cooler and the parks take on a magical glow under the lights.

### 4 Inflexibility

Relax. It's a vacation. There are no prizes for those who joylessly cram

every single ride at their chosen theme park into one day. Make plans, but be flexible. Don't attempt to do everything on your list, and maybe save a few things for the next visit.

### 5 Big Meals In-Park

In general, theme-park food is bland and overpriced, so don't waste your main meal of the day on it. Instead, at Universal, check out the eateries on Citywalk (see p105); while at Disney, visit one of the excellent resort dining options, where you'll find that high-end restaurants offer great value. Parks allow same-day re-entry on single tickets – just be sure to get your hand stamped before leaving.

### 6 Free and Discount Tickets

There are a lot of offers floating around Orlando that sound too good to be true. If someone promises free or heavily discounted tickets, ask "What's the catch?," especially if they're promising a Disney ticket. Most are timeshare salespeople trying to get you to "buy" a week's holiday for the next 20 years. In some cases they have legitimate tickets, but most of the time you have to endure hours of sales pitches. Usually, such properties are overpriced.

### 7 Wearing Skimpy Bathing Suits at Water Parks

Ladies should consider one-piece suits at water parks since most of the best rides can quickly rip off a bikini top. Alternatively, wear a T-shirt over the bikini for added protection. Guys, for reasons not necessary to elaborate upon here, should avoid Speedos altogether.

### 8 Public Transport

Lynx buses might appear to be everywhere, but don't set your schedule by them, especially for longer trips. They stop frequently, are notoriously slow, and are generally ignored by locals.

### 9 Downtown's Westside

The area of Downtown south of Colonial Drive and west of I-4 is not a particularly safe place to wander around. Avoid it. But if you are going to a destination here, including the Greyhound Bus station, call a cab.

### 10 Rush Hour on I-4

Sometimes called "Orlando's Parking Lot," I-4 can get very congested, particularly during evening rush hour (3–6:30pm), as attraction employees head home. Disney-generated traffic on I-4, between Lake Buena Vista and US Hwy 192, has a life of its own. Traffic jams there can occur around the clock.

## TOP 10 Accommodation Tips

### 1 Bed & Sales Taxes

Hotels have an assortment of hidden add-ons that can come as a surprise when you get the bill. Charges for the mini-bar and pay-per-view movies are always inflated. But the sales tax (see p132) and bed tax can really add to the bill. Orange County, including the theme parks, I-Drive, and downtown Orlando, adds five per cent bed tax; Osceola County, which includes Kissimmee, adds 6 per cent; and Seminole County, which includes Sanford (see p85), adds a 3 per cent tax. Don't forget to factor in these extras when determining your vacation budget.

### 2 Rack Rates

These are the rates no one should agree to pay for a room! They're the walk-in-and-ask rates anyone can get without a coupon or package, and without asking for a discount or special deal. They're used in this book to provide a guide price, but don't settle for them. Insist on a better deal – it is almost always possible.

### 3 Rooms with a View

Many properties charge more for a room that has a view of anything other than the parking lot or the building next door. Before you pay, consider how much time you will want to spend in your room.

### 4 The Pros of Staying with Mickey

The main benefits are proximity to the parks, access to the free Disney transportation system (see p127), preferred tee times at Disney golf courses (see pp54–5), and an easy way to break up the day by returning to base for a midday nap or swim.

### 5 The Cons of Staying with Mickey

Rates at Disney World Resorts are about 30 per cent more than comparable accommodation on the outside, the transportation system is slow, and if you don't have a car and don't take cabs, you tend to be stuck with Disney, including at meal times.

### 6 Types of Accommodation

Orlando has almost 107,000 hotel rooms. Most tend to be functional budget options, but there are plenty of upscale choices, too, from lavish resorts to one-off B&Bs and boutique hotels.

### 7 Booking Services

In addition to making independent reservations or dealing directly with Disney or Universal resorts, vacationers can use reservations networks to book rooms. Central Reservation Service (CRS), Orlando.com, and Vacation Works are three of the more popular ones. Walt Disney World • 407-828-8101 • www.disney

### 8 Land-Sea Options

### 9 Family-Friendly Motels

Most Orlando properties go the extra mile to make sure kids are treated like royalty. In fact, most let kids under 17 stay free with accompanying adults. Holiday Inn Family Suites (see p145) and Holiday Inn Sunspree (see p145) offer more than the usual child-friendly amenities.

### 10 In-Room Calls

Don't use the in-room phone to make any calls without knowing the billing policy. Some hotels offer free local calls, while others charge double or more the 35¢ cost of using an outside pay phone. Some impose a \$1-plus service charge whenever the phone is used (including for toll-free numbers), in addition to long-distance rates.

### 1 Disney's Grand Floridian Resort & Spa

Disney's top hotel is an opulent, early 20th-century New England-style resort. Expect a ragtime mood and intimate rooms that promise romance and great views. ### 2 Disney's BoardWalk Inn & Villas

### 8 Disney's Port Orleans Resort
