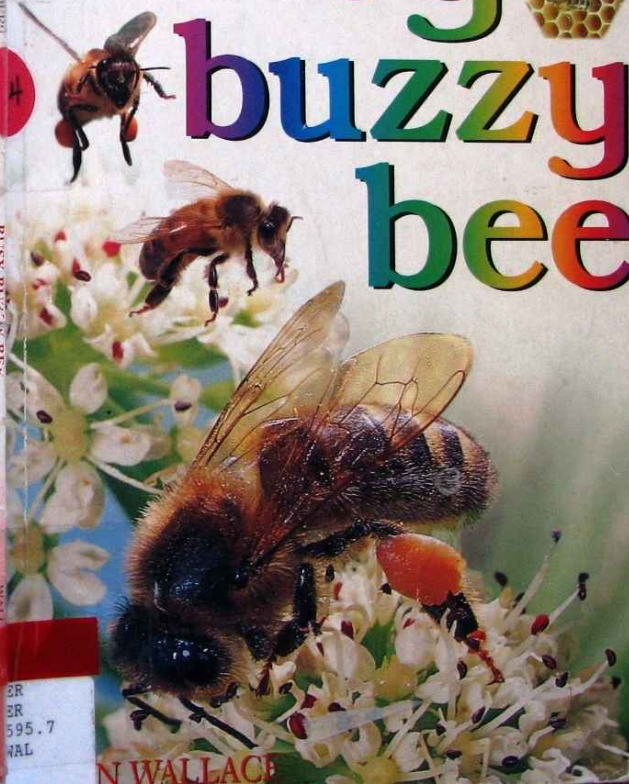

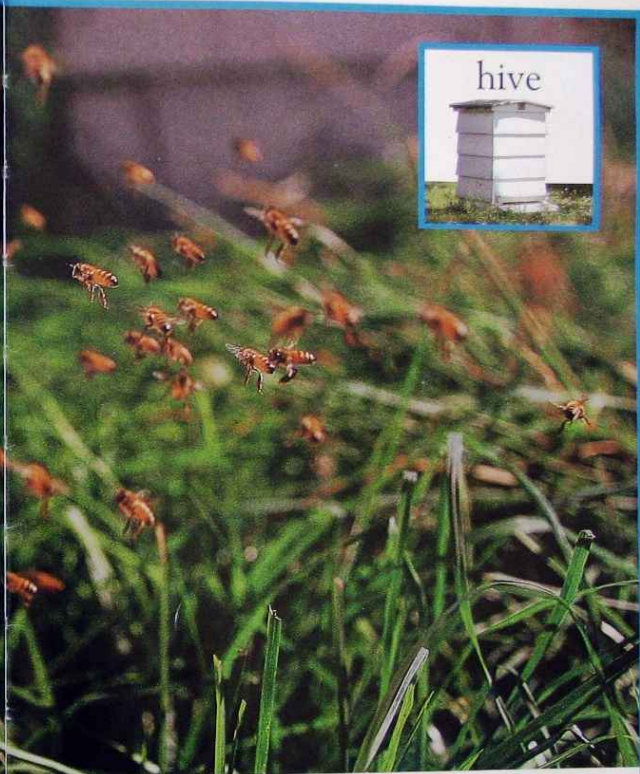

The field is full of wild flowers.



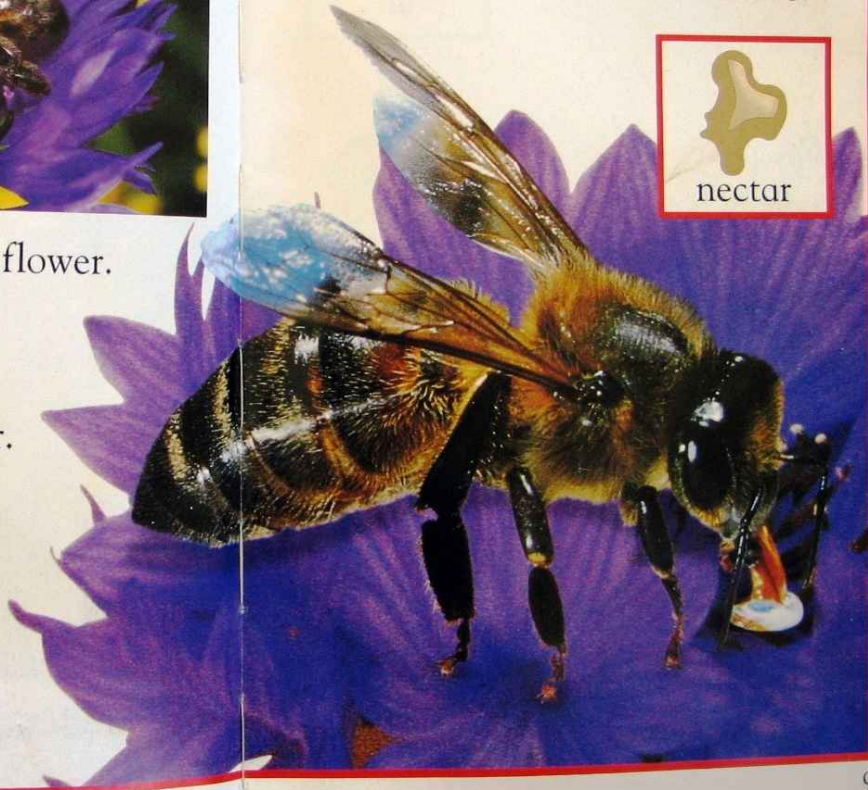
Busy Bee lands on a flower.

the bees make cells.

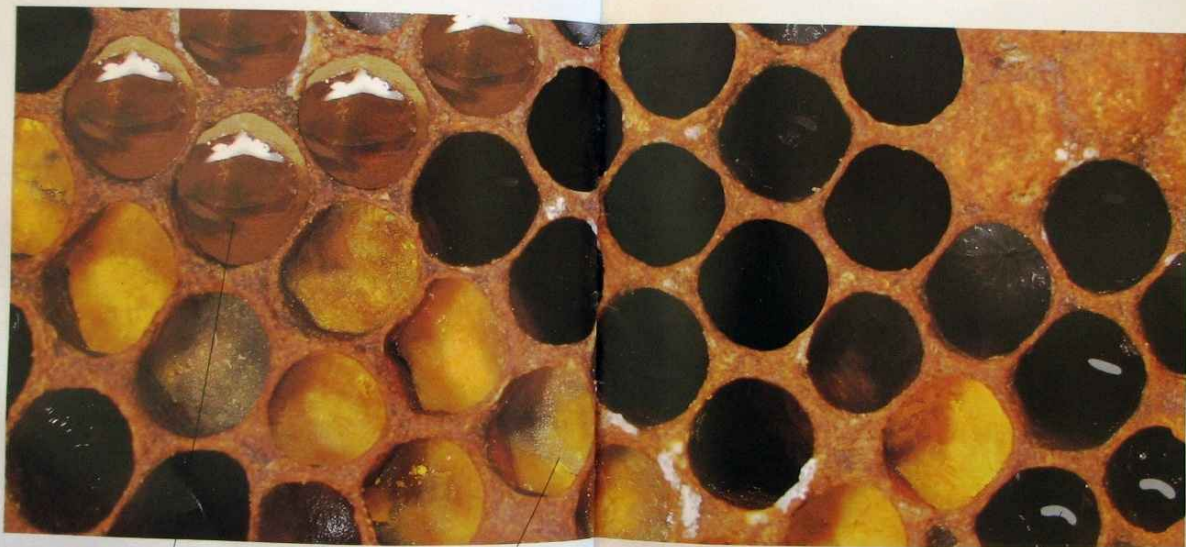

bee

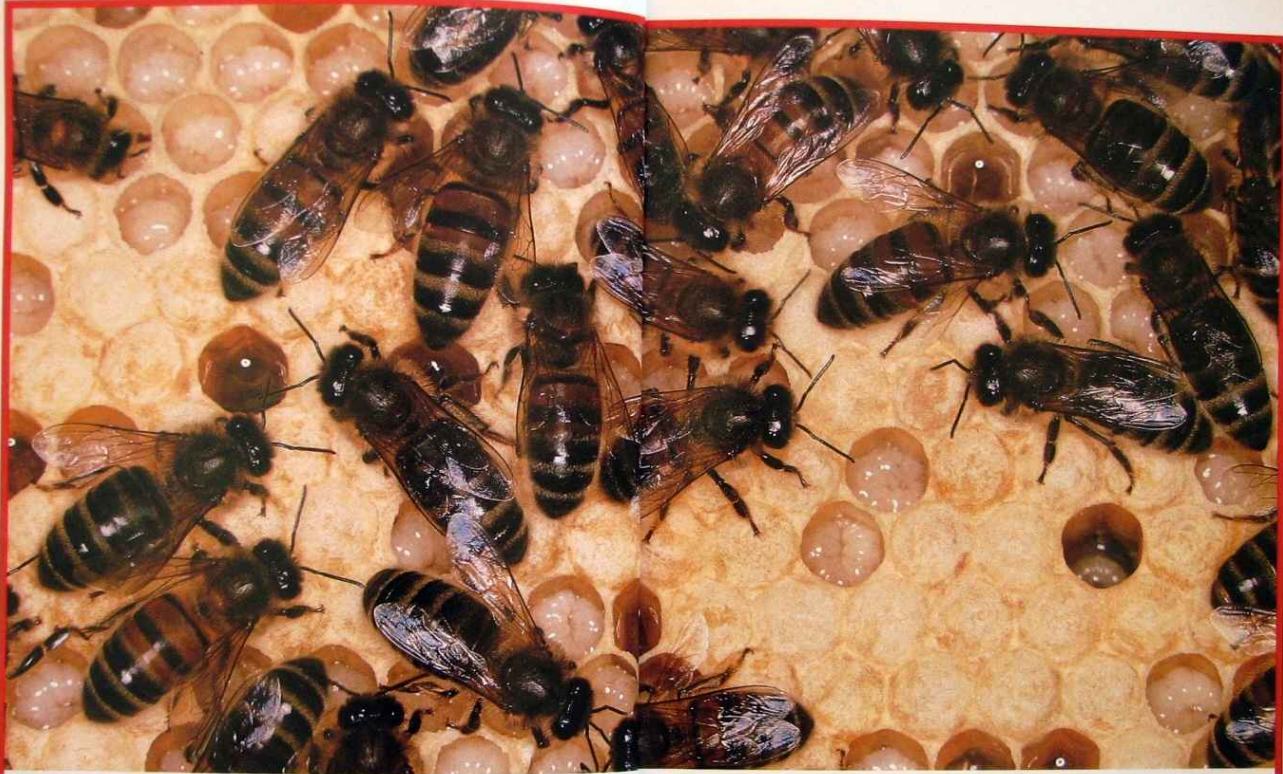


Inside their cells,

grubs to bees.

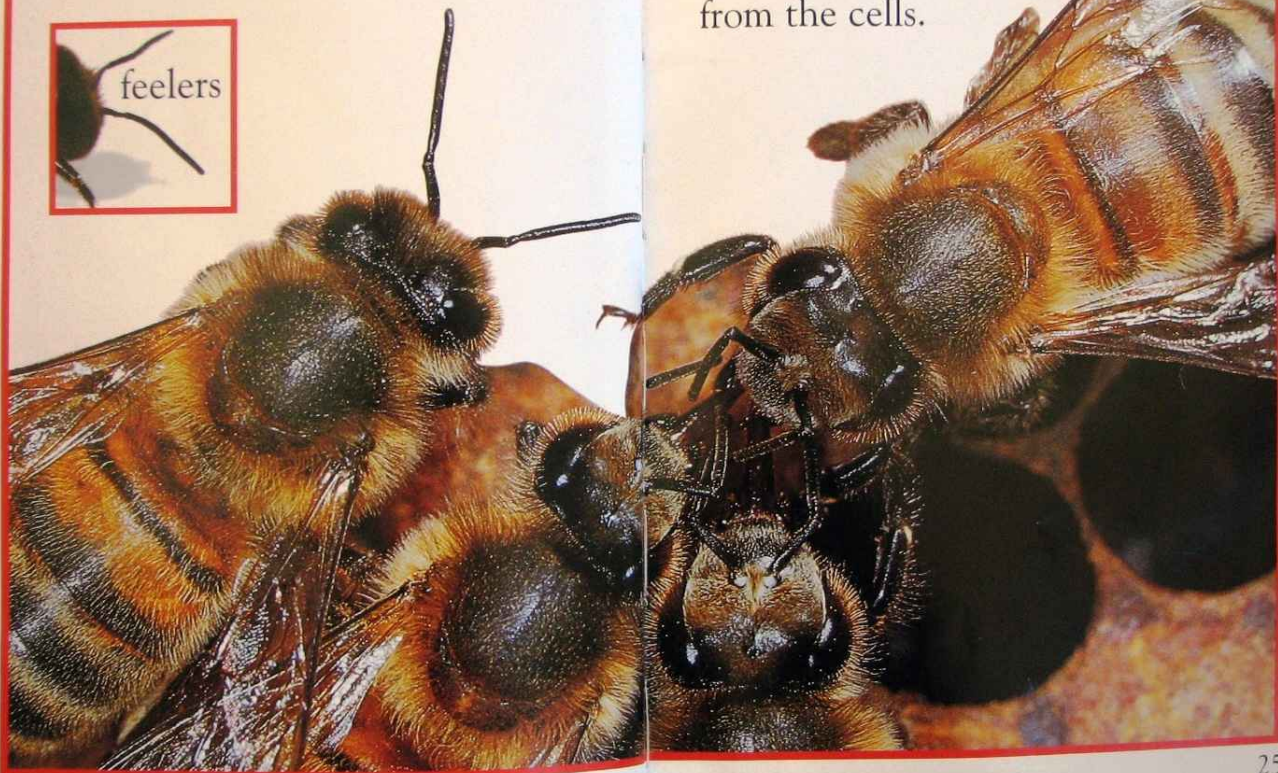


They crawl out and wait

more flower nectar?

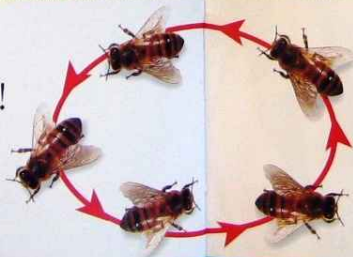


Where can
