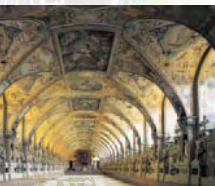

TOP 10 Munich Highlights

Of the city he lived in for many years, 20th-century writer Thomas Mann said that "Munich glows". And indeed, the sky is often a brilliant blue dotted with puffy white clouds in "Italy's northernmost city", where the relaxed, often Baroque lifestyle gives it a southern flair. Englischer Garten and the Isar meadows are right in the middle of the city; Starnberger See and the mountains are virtually on the doorstep. But Munich is also a city of art and culture with an abundance of historic buildings, museum treasures, and a lively cultural scene. Fine art, leisure, and la dolce vita make this a unique city.



1 Deutsches Museum
Renowned as the oldest and largest museum of science and technology in the world, the museum attracts more than 1.3 million visitors every year (see pp8–11).

Schloss Nymphenburg **2**

Ludwig I's Gallery of Beauties features portraits of noblewomen and famous beauties, such as the tailor's daughter, Helene Sedlmayr (see pp12–13).



3 Museumsviertel
Three Pinakotheken (picture galleries) now lie side by side in the Museum District. The oldest, the Alte Pinakothek in a reconstructed building from 1836, is devoted to historic European painting – its collection boasts priceless treasures including panels by Albrecht Dürer (see pp14–17).

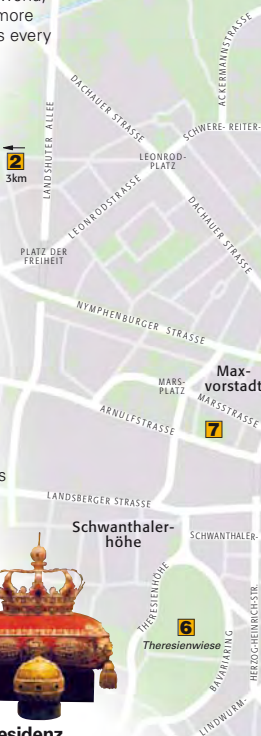
In 1972, a large park, including an artificial hill, was created from World War II rubble for the Summer Olympics. At the time, the distinctive tent roof was considered an architectural innovation (see pp18–19).

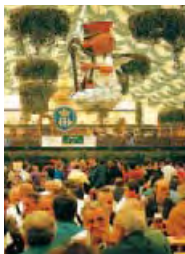


5 Residenz
Dating back to 1358, the Residenz has been expanded by various wings and courtyards over the centuries (see pp20–21).

6 Oktoberfest

First held to celebrate the wedding of Ludwig I (1810), this is the largest folk festival in the world. Some six million visitors flock to the fairgrounds every year (see pp22–3).



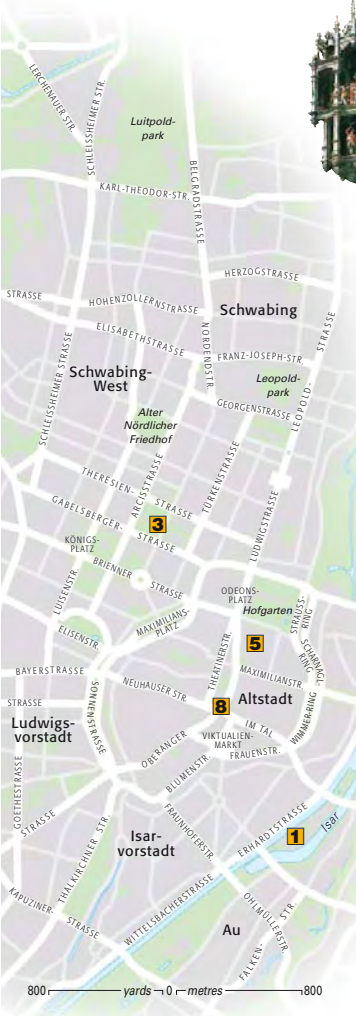
Beer Gardens

Locals are passionate about their beer garden tradition – bring your own food and pay only for a cool pint (see pp24–5).



8 Around Marienplatz

Site of the Neues Rathaus (New Town Hall) Marienplatz is the main square. The historic carved figures of the Glockenspiel in the town hall tower come alive in a coopers' dance three times a day (see pp26–7).



Schloss Neuschwanstein

Ludwig II's most famous castle was inspired by his admiration of Wagner's operas (see pp28–31).



Starnberger See

This lovely scenic lake on Munich's doorstep is surrounded by picturesque towns, royal summer palaces, and the popular Buchheim Museum (see pp32–3).



With 1.3 million inhabitants, Munich is Germany's third-largest city.



Top 10 Deutsches Museum

The Deutsches Museum, founded by Oskar von Miller in 1903, is housed on an island in the Isar River in a building dating from 1925. The world's largest museum of technology and engineering is a tour de force – only a fraction of the exhibits can be viewed in a single day. The best approach is to plan your visit in advance.

 A good alternative to the museum cafeteria is Café Stör in the Müller Baths, a magnificent Art Nouveau building across from the museum.

1 Galileo's Workshop
In the Physics section, a reconstruction of Galileo's workshop (above) features a large collection of equipment used by the famous astronomer and physicist.

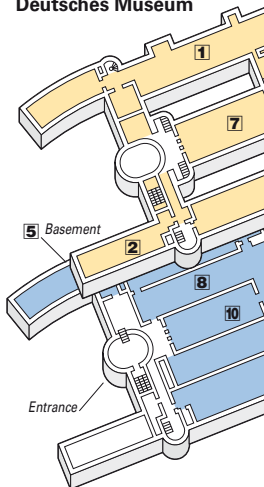
2 Pharmaceuticals
The highlight of this section, opened in 2000, is a model of a human cell magnified 350,000 times (below).



3 Enigma Machine

The Enigma encoding machine (above), built during World War II, is a fine example of early information technology.

4 Zeiss Planetarium

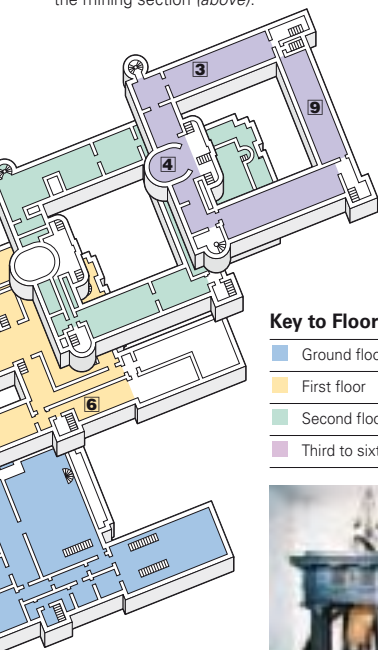
Projected onto the 15-m (49-ft) dome of the sixth floor are the sun, the moon, the planets, constellations, and nebulae, as well as the more than 5,000 fixed stars visible to the naked eye.





5 Mining

Exhibits on mining technology over five centuries are featured in the mining section (*above*).



7 Aviation and Space Travel

Dozens of airplanes are on display, including an original by the Wright brothers and the famous Junkers JU-52. You can even board some planes. More exhibits on travel are housed at *Flugwerft Schleißheim*, a branch museum.

9 Telecommunications

Superb exhibits such as the first 19th-century telegraph, Thomas Edison's gramophone, and a 1913 AEG transmitter are displayed here, along with the latest in communications technology.



10 Marine Navigation

Along with countless model ships, the vast exhibition hall features several original sail- and steamboats, such as the 1932 steam tugboat *Renzo* and the wooden fishing vessel *Ewer Maria* (*above*).

6 Musical Instruments

Sounds for Hitchcock's *The Birds* were created on the trautonium (*below*).



8 Power Machinery

Steam engines, motor engines, and turbines are to be found here. Some of these colossal machines, like the Alban high-pressure steam engine (*above*), are veritable works of art.



Museum Guide

The museum's 17,000 exhibits are displayed over six floors. The lower floors feature heavy vehicles and sections dealing with chemistry, physics, scientific instruments, and aviation. The middle floors are dedicated to the decorative arts, and the upper floors are devoted to astronomy, information technology, and micro-electronics. The Zeiss Planetarium is located in the dome on the sixth floor.

TOP 10 Deutsches Museum Collections

1 Physics & Astronomy

The physics section features mechanical aids such as pulleys, pumps, and measuring and observation devices – including Foucault's pendulum, which featured in Umberto Eco's eponymous novel. A sense of the size and age of our universe is conveyed in the astronomy section.

2 Clocks, Chemistry, Pharmaceuticals & Environment

Examples of traditional craftsmanship are on display in the extensive clock and watch exhibit. In the chemistry section, famous experiments and a reconstruction of Justus von Liebig's laboratory fascinate visitors. Rooms dedicated to pharmaceuticals show the evolution of drug research. Ecological issues are dealt with in the environment exhibit.

3 Mining, Metallurgy, & Agriculture

In the basement, a re-created mine is complemented by exhibits on the more than 12,000-year-old history of metallurgy. The agriculture section demonstrates the cultivation of cereals and grain, brewing, and sugar refining.

4 Glass Ceramics, & Machine Tools

In this section, materials and production techniques used in a variety

of industries are on display. These include exhibits demonstrating glass and paper manufacture; the range of ceramics manufacture, from bricks to fine china; and tools from Stone Age drills to computer-controlled lathes.

5 Energy Technology

From original windmills to plasma- and fusion-technology, this section features inventions that facilitate everyday life. The huge steam engines and high-voltage experiments are not to be missed.

6 Communications

In addition to telegraph and radio equipment, this department includes sections on printing technology, photography, and film. Visitors can marvel at room-sized computers from the 1940s and 1950s.

7 Marine Navigation

Numerous models of ships illustrate several millennia of marine navigation. The rescue cruiser *Theodor Heuss* is displayed in the open-air exhibition space to the south of the museum.

8 Aviation and Space Travel

In the vast hall, 220 years of aviation history are re-created – from the Montgolfier brothers'

hot-air balloons to modern jets. The space travel section includes a replica of the Spacelab.

9 Civil Engineering

An authentic suspension bridge dominates the exhibition hall; wall-mounted screens track the oscillations as visitors venture onto and then cross over this swaying bridge.

10 Kid's Kingdom

Reserved exclusively for children and accompanying adults, this section is designed for young scientists, ages three and up. Interactive exhibits let children experience phenomena such as communication, energy, optics, and acoustics. The Technical Toys section offers welcome relaxation after all the hands-on research.

The Branch Museums

Flugwerft Schleißheim, the Deutsches Museum's branch museum on the history of aviation, is located in an old airplane hanger on a historic airfield in Schleißheim (Effnerstraße 18, Oberschleißheim; 089/31 57 14-0). In addition to the old buildings and the airfield itself, this site offers 7,800 sq m (84,000 sq ft) of exhibition space housing over 50 airplanes, helicopters, and hang-gliders, as well as instruments and equipment. There are special exhibitions, children's tours, and expert-guided tours. The museum also has a shop and a restaurant – Pegasus – that serves as a year-round venue for exhibitions by young artists.

The Verkehrszentrum, or Transportation Centre, was opened in 2003 on the Theresienhöhe (Theresienhöhe 14a; 089-21 79 529). Three heritage-protected halls, once home to the Munich Fair, now house historic locomotives, automobiles, carriages, and bicycles. With this branch museum, the Deutsches Museum has created the largest transportation museum in the world, offering a detailed and comprehensive exploration of urban transportation, travel, mobility, and transportation technology. Special exhibitions and lectures round out the programme.



Top 10 Schloss Nymphenburg

To celebrate the birth of their son in 1664, the Elector Ferdinand Maria and his wife Henrietta Adelaide of Savoy commissioned Agostino Barelli to build a summer palace to the west of Munich. The wings and annexe buildings were added from 1701 onwards. The historic gardens to the rear of the palace beckon for a pleasant stroll. Over the course of 300 years, the original ornamental garden was expanded into a vast ensemble comprising a Baroque garden, a system of canals, and small pavilions scattered throughout the park.

1 The Palace

Maximilian II Emanuel and Karl Albrecht expanded the original 1664 villa by adding buildings designed by Enrico Zucalli and Joseph Effner. Arcaded galleries connect them to the main building, contributing to the harmony of the ensemble (right).



2 Gallery of Beauties

Ludwig I commissioned Joseph Stieler to create a gallery of beauties – a collection of portraits of noblewomen, townswomen, and dancers – such as Helene Sedlmayr, a beautiful tailor's daughter (above).



3 Steinerner Saal

The Rococo embellishment in the spacious ballroom was created by Johann B Zimmermann and Cuviliés the Elder during the reign of Maximilian III Joseph.

4 Lackkabinett

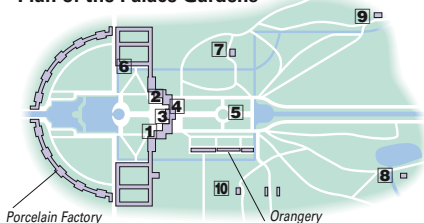
Exquisite Chinese motifs in black lacquer on wood panelling are reprised in the Rococo ceiling fresco (below).



5 Palace Gardens

Symmetrically laid-out French gardens to the rear of the palace give way to an English-style landscaped park, which was established using the existing forest. The gardens feature pavilions, lodges, fountains, ornamental ponds, and other park installations.

6 Marstallmuseum

This building houses carriages and sleighs that once belonged to the Bavarian rulers. Ludwig II's gilded state coach (*below*) is one such example.



7 Amalienburg

Built by Cuviliés the Elder between 1734 and 1739 for Electress Amelia, this small hunting lodge is a masterpiece of European Rococo (*right*).



8 Pagodenburg

In this 18th-century pavilion with an unusual octagonal floorplan, Western and Eastern ornamentation is beautifully combined (*above*). The ground floor is decorated with Delft tiles.

9 Badenburg

Featuring a ballroom and a two-storey bathing hall containing a heated pool – making it one of Europe's first – this pavilion is definitely worth a visit. Three of the pavilion's rooms are lined in costly Chinese wallpaper.

10 Magdalenenklaue

Grottoes and follies were an expression of 18th-century romantic yearnings. This folly contains rooms of monastic severity, which served as a peaceful retreat for Maximilian Emanuel, along with a chapel located in a grotto.

From Formal Garden to Palace Park

In 1664, the site featured an ornamental garden. This was enlarged in 1701 and a canal was added. Its transformation into a formal Baroque garden began in 1715 under the direction of Dominique Girard and Joseph Effner, who built a system of canals, fountains, hedged gardens, and a forest-like park. Pavilions and lodges were added over the course of the 18th century. In the 19th century, Friedrich L von Sckell reconfigured the park in the style of an English landscape garden.

Top 10 Museum District – Alte Pinakothek

The Museum District comprises three major museums: the Alte Pinakothek, the Neue Pinakothek, and the Pinakothek der Moderne (see pp16–17).

Nearby is the Glyptothek, the National Collection of Antiquities, and Lenbachhaus. The Alte Pinakothek was founded by Ludwig I, designed by Leo von Klenze, and opened in 1836. It houses the collections of Bavarian dukes, electors, and kings, as well as the treasures of dissolved monasteries. Today, the museum holds priceless masterpieces of 14th- to 18th-century art.

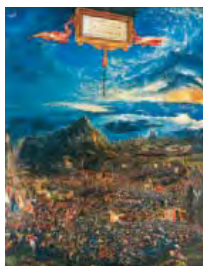

1 Battle of Alexander at Issus

Altdorfer's 1529 painting depicts the decisive moment of Alexander the Great's victory over the Persian King Darius (*below*).



2 Deposition from the Cross

Dramatic lighting characterizes Rembrandt's 1634 masterpiece. It is exhibited in the Dutch painting collection, which also features landscapes and other works.



3 Land of Cockaigne

Breughel, the most famous representative of the Flemish School, offers a satirical depiction of gluttony and idleness (*above*). This piece is part of a section also housing a large collection of Rubens' paintings.

4 Pietà

Sandro Botticelli's 1495 painting captivates the viewer with its rich red hues and strong contrasts. It is one of the masterpieces in the Italian painting section.

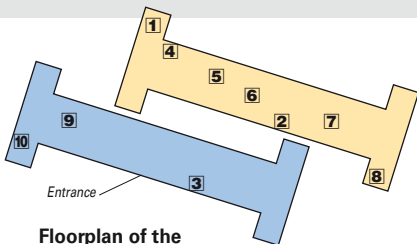
5 Portrait of Karl V

In 1548, the Italian painter Titian created this portrait of the emperor Karl V on the occasion of the Peace of Augsburg.



6 The Abduction of the Daughters of Leukippos

Rubens' 1618 high Baroque masterpiece (above).

9 Four Apostles

The Albrecht Dürer collection documents the development of the artist from his *Self-Portrait in Fur Coat* (1500) to the *Four Apostles* (1526), painted two years before his death.

10 Adoration of the Magi

The late Gothic work by Holbein the Elder from 1502 is one part of the *Eight Scenes from the Virgin's Life* altarpiece.



8 Disrobing of Christ

El Greco created this sombre work around 1579 (below). It is part of the small yet exquisite collection of Spanish paintings.



7 Portrait of Willem van Heythuisen

Hals' magnificent painting (1625–30) is an outstanding example of Dutch portraiture (above). The collection includes landscape and other works.



Museum Guide

The Alte Pinakothek's collections are housed on two floors. German painting up to 1500 is located on the ground floor. On the first floor, German painting after 1500, Old Dutch Masters, Italian Renaissance painting, 17th-century French, Flemish, and Dutch painting, and a somewhat smaller Spanish collection are on display. More than 700 works of art are on view in the museum's 19 main rooms and 47 side galleries. The cafeteria and a bookshop are also located on the ground floor.

TOP 10 Neue & Pinakothek der Moderne

1 *Neptune's Horses*

In this 1892 painting, Walter Crane fuses Pre-Raphaelite expression with Art Nouveau and Symbolist influences.

2 *The Poor Poet*

Carl Spitzweg's famous 1898 painting captures the spirit of the Biedermeier period.

3 *Boys on the Beach*

Dating from 1898, this work by Max Liebermann exemplifies the preoccupation of German Impressionists with capturing the play of light in their work.

4 *Breakfast in the Studio*

Edouard Manet's painting from 1869 – a seminal work of strong light and dark contrasts that heralds the beginning of Impressionism – is one of the highlights of the Neue Pinakothek.

5 *Play of the Waves*

Arnold Böcklin's oeuvre was heavily inspired by classical mythological themes. This work from 1883 depicts water

The Design Collection

6 The Classic Modern Collection

The museum's collection is divided into two principal sections. The Classic Modern encompasses the period up to 1960 and features works by Kirchner, Nolde, Braque, Picasso, Klee, Beckmann, and others.

7 The Contemporary Art Collection

This section documents the art scene from 1960 onward and includes works by Beuys, Baselitz, Warhol, de Kooning, Twombly, and others.

8 The Graphic Arts Collection

A wide range of works from the Old Masters (Rembrandt, Titian) to Cézanne are some of the highlights of this collection, along with modern graphic works by Baselitz and Wols, and Franz

10 The Design Collection

Modern utilitarian objects are the theme of this collection. Comprising nearly 60,000 objects, the exhibits range from chairs (Thonet room), to 1960s Pop furniture, to objects from the world of aerodynamics and computer design.

9 The Architecture Collection

Some 350,000 architectural drawings and plans, roughly 100,000 photographs, and approximately 500 models are presented in rotating exhibits

Museum & Art District

Founded by Ludwig I, the Neue Pinakothek was opened in 1853; it was destroyed in 1944. The new structure, designed by Alexander von Branca, was inaugurated nearly four decades later, in 1981. With a permanent collection of over 4,500 paintings and 300 sculptures, the Neue Pinakothek is one of the most important museums of 19th-century art. The spacious building designed by Stephan Braunfels for the Pinakothek der Moderne was inaugurated in 2002 as a site for art of the 20th and 21st centuries. With over 20,000 sq m (215,300 sq ft) of floor space, the museum provides ample room for both permanent and special exhibitions. All galleries are grouped around a central rotunda and linked via a network of stairs. At first sharply criticized because of the exorbitant building costs of €121 million, the museum has since been acknowledged as one of the most impressive art collections in the world.

The three Pinakotheks in the Museum District are soon to be joined by additional museums such as the Brandhorst collection. A photography museum is also under discussion. The Glyptothek, the Museum of Antiquities, and the Lenbachhaus are within easy walking distance of each other and constitute the nexus of the future Art District. The Museum District is also home to dozens of private galleries.

Top 10 Olympiapark

In preparation for the 1972 Olympic Games, a former airfield and parade ground were transformed into an Olympic park. The park features landscaped hills, an artificial lake, a communications tower, and sports facilities. Designed by the firm of Behnisch & Partners, the elegant, airy ensemble derives its character chiefly from the transparent tensile roof designed by Frei Otto. Tent-shaped, it covers part of the stadium, the hall, and the pool, and is considered a masterpiece of modern architecture.

1 Olympic Tower

A high-speed elevator transports visitors to the observation platform and revolving restaurant of this 290-m- (900-ft-) high Olympic Tower (right). From here there are fabulous views of the park and city and, when the famous Föhn winds are blowing, you can even see the Alps.

2 Revolving Restaurant

The Olympic Tower's revolving restaurant, located 180 m (825 ft) above the ground, serves bistro food at lunch and gourmet fare in the evening. It completes a 360-degree rotation every 49 minutes, providing diners with a unique panoramic vista.

3 Olympic Stadium

Seating almost 67,000 spectators, this stadium (right) was home to the FC Bayern football club for years. The club has now moved and the stadium is used for a variety of other events.



4 Olympic Hall

Conceived from the outset as a multipurpose venue, the Olympic Hall holds up to 14,000 spectators. Covering the hall is a large section of the spectacular tent-shaped tensile roof, suspended from 58 pylons. Used for a wide variety of sports events, the Olympic Hall also serves as a venue for concerts, conferences, and fairs.



5 Lake & Park

Piled-up war rubble served as the base for the small hills on the grounds. After they were landscaped, boulevards and an artificial lake were added, creating a perfect park for walking. Climb to the top of the Olympiaberg for a spectacular view of the park and city.

10 Theatron & Other Facilities

The many attractions in Olympiapark include tennis courts, an indoor cycling racetrack, a beach volleyball court, a basketball court, rowboats on the lake, and summer curling. The Theatron (*above*), an amphitheatre with seating for 6,000, is used as a venue for free open-air concerts in summer.

6 Olympic Skating Rink

The skating rink is a perfect place to practise skating or ice-dancing to music. Skates are available for hire.



7 Indoor Ski Slope

Have fun on the 150-m- (500-ft-) long artificial ski slope. There's a ski school, lift, après-ski lodge, and equipment for rent.

9 Father Timofej's Chapel

This Russian Orthodox chapel (*above*), built (without a permit) by Russians Timofej and Natasha in 1951 on the Olympic grounds, still stands today.



8 Olympic Aquatic Centre

One of the largest in Europe, this aquatic centre (*right*) offers diving pools, saunas, a steam grotto, sunbathing lawns, exercise rooms, and wellness programmes.

5 September 1972

A black day for Munich: Palestinian terrorists, members of the Black September group, infiltrated the Olympic Village at 4am, shot two members of the Israeli team, and took nine athletes hostage. Police efforts to free the hostages at Fürstenfeldbruck airport failed. Nine Israeli hostages, five Palestinians, and one policeman died. Despite these tragic events, the decision was made to carry on with the Games after a brief break.

Top 10 Residenz

Located in the heart of the city, this former residence of Bavarian kings and home of the Wittelsbach dynasty until 1918 was gradually transformed from a moated castle (1385) into an extensive complex with seven courtyards. Highlights include the largest secular Renaissance building (the Antiquarium), interiors from the 17th century and the Rococo period, and Leo von Klenze's Classicist Königsbau. The complex also houses special collections such as the silver and church vestments collection, and porcelain from the 18th and 19th centuries.

The historic Café Tambosi in the Hofgarten offers light meals. The Pfälzer Residenzweinstube (Residenzstr. 1) offers heartier fare.

1 Antiquarium
Commissioned by Albrecht V, this Renaissance jewel was built between 1568 and 1571. Allegoric frescoes, grotesques, and Bavarian landscape scenes embellish the 69-m- (225-ft-) long barrel vault. The Antiquarium was restored between 1995 and 2000 (centre).

2 Cuvilliés Theater
Built between 1751 and 1755, this beautiful Rococo theatre by Cuvilliés the Elder is widely regarded as Europe's finest (below).



3 Schatzkammer
The 16th-century Schatzkammer contains worked gold, porcelain, the Wittelsbach dynasty's crown jewels, and many other treasures (left).



4 Hofkapelle
This elaborately stuccoed chapel was built by Krümpner in 1601-14.

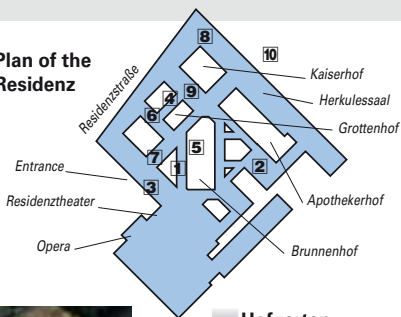


The Coin Collection and the Egyptian Art Museum have separate opening hours and entrance fees.

5 Courtyards

You enter Kaiserhof through the northern Renaissance doorway; the southern doorway leads into the Mannerist Grottenhof. Brunnenhof has an octagonal shape. Apothekehof is the largest courtyard, the Cuvillies Theater courtyard the smallest.

10 Hofgarten

Bordered by formal flowerbeds and hedges, and shaded by linden trees, this Renaissance garden on the north side of the Residenz has an Italian air. The Temple of Diana, a small pavilion lined with seashells designed by Heinrich Schön the Elder, marks the centre of a network of paths, which criss-crosses the garden. To the east lies the Bavarian State Chancellery, a much-debated modern structure incorporating the ruin of the former army museum.



Destruction and Reconstruction

Bavaria's rulers built the Residenz over hundreds of years; in just a few hours during World War II, large sections of it were destroyed. Reconstruction began immediately after the war ended. Many of the art treasures stored elsewhere during the war were returned safely – sometimes by circuitous routes. Visitors can view some 130 rooms documenting princely culture from four centuries.

6 Reiche Kapelle

With its ebony altar and silver bas-reliefs, Maximilian I's private chapel (1607) is a prime example of Mannerist architecture (*below*).

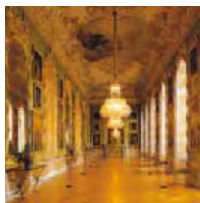


8 Egyptian Art Museum

This museum, opened in 1970 in a wing of the Residenz alongside the Hofgarten, houses a fine collection of pieces from ancient Egypt and the Coptic period (*above right*).

9 Coin Collection

Here the largest coin collection in the world can be found, along with exhibits of weights and measures.



7 Reiche Zimmer

Walk through the Rittersaal to reach this series of rooms done in the early Rococo style. The Reiche Zimmer, designed in 1730 by François Cuvillies, and the Grüne Galerie (*right*), are but two of the stunning rooms.



The Herkulesaal in the Residenz, formerly a throne hall, is a popular concert venue because of its excellent acoustics.



Top 10 Oktoberfest

With more than six million visitors, over five million litres of beer, 200,000 pairs of pork sausages, and 100 spit-roasted oxen – Munich's Oktoberfest is the largest folk fair in the world. At the foot of the Bavaria statue, a huge field, the Theresienwiese (Wiesn for short), is transformed into a fairground with beer tents operated by traditional breweries, rides, and a variety of vendors selling gingerbread hearts, roast chicken, and fresh pretzels. For 16 days, visitors and locals, some in traditional costume, indulge in Bavarian revelry.

1 Grand Entry

Since 1925, the Wiesn opening is signalled by the Saturday morning Grand Entry of the Oktoberfest landlords. Draught horses decked in festive harnesses pull flower-decorated brewery wagons (*below*) through the city. They are accompanied by brass bands and brewery owners, families, and workers in traditional costume.

2 O'zapft is!

The Grand Entry is followed by the opening ceremony in the oldest Wiesn beer tent, Schottenhamel. At noon, Munich's mayor taps the first beer barrel and says "O'zapft is!" – the barrel is tapped.



3 Beer Tents

Beer is king in the large tents, where patrons link arms and sway to the music of brass bands, and challenge each other to drink yet another *Maß* or litre (*above*). The motto is: "Everyone has a right to his or her own beer heaven." For a less beery ambience, visit one of the smaller tents, such as Fischer Vroni.



4 Oxen Roast

Entire oxen are roasted on a spit right before your eyes. A portion of roast oxen or a pork hock with crackling are just two of the traditional and hearty Bavarian treats served up at the Oktoberfest. Some 100 oxen are slaughtered for the Wiesn every year.

7 Flea Circus

Another old-time tradition: the tiny trained creatures and their lord and master have entertained spectators for over half a century. The flea circus is an absolute must for all fans of yesteryear.

9 Memorial

On 29 September 1980 at about 10:30pm, a bomb exploded near a Wiesn exit. Thirteen people were killed and more than 200 were injured. A stele (left) stands as a reminder of the attack carried out by a neo-Nazi.

10 Statue of Bavaria

In 1843, Ludwig I commissioned Leo von Klenze to build the Ruhmeshalle (Hall of Fame) on the Theresienhöhe; today, it houses the busts of famous Bavarians. The colossal statue of Bavaria by Ludwig Schwanthaler (cast in ore by Ferdinand von Miller) rises in front of the hall. A platform inside the statue's head offers a spectacular view of the Wiesn (below).



5 Steckerlfisch

The air is not only filled with the smell of beer but also with the tantalizing aroma of grilled fish – *Steckerlfisch* (fish on a stick) – prepared on a charcoal grill (right).



6 Beim Schichtl

Welcome one and all to this cabaret – a Wiesn fixture since 1871. Today you can still watch acts such as the “beheading” of a living person on the guillotine (below).



8 Rides

With traditional amusement rides such as the merry-go-round, clay-pigeon shooting, and the sedate Crinoline, or the latest thrilling attractions such as Euro-Star, Freefall, and several roller-coasters – there's something for everyone, from children to adrenaline addicts. The slowly rotating giant Ferris wheel offers a spectacular view of the scenery.

The History of the Oktoberfest

The marriage of Crown Prince Ludwig and Therese von Sachsen-Hildburghausen on 12 October 1810 was celebrated with a five-day festival on Theresienwiese, named in honour of the bride. A horse race capping the festivities was slated to be repeated the following October. It became an annual event, quickly growing into a major fair with rides and beer stalls. The first “beer palaces” appeared in 1896. Today, the fair attracts millions of tourists and is famous worldwide.



Top 10 Beer Gardens

In summer, Bavaria's "liquid food" is served in beer gardens. And summer unofficially begins during Lent in March, when the breweries market their bock beers such as Salvator, Maximator, or Triumphator. No matter what you drink – ale, light beer, or Weißbier (wheat beer) from Augustiner, Löwenbräu, or Paulaner – if you haven't sat on a wooden bench beneath the chestnut trees on a mild summer's night and sipped a Maß (a litre) of beer while enjoying the aroma of pork sausage or grilled fish, you simply don't know Munich.

1 Augustiner-Keller
This vast beer garden shaded by ancient chestnut trees, near a former place of execution, has existed since the 19th century. Two hundred decorated tables for regular patrons add a whimsical note (above). On beautiful summer evenings, this beer garden is packed. Don't miss the special Augustiner brew from wooden barrels. ☉ Arnulfstr. 52 • 5,000 seats (2,000 full-service) • playground

2 Löwenbräukeller
A quintessential Munich beer garden. The historic building – near Löwenbräu brewery – hosts annual carnival balls and the tapping of the first Triumphator barrel. ☉ Stiglmaierplatz • 1,300 seats



3 Flaucher
Located on the banks of the Isar beneath a mature stand of trees, this lovely beer garden has a park-like feel. Popular in the daytime with cyclists, sunbathers, volleyball players, and families with children, it is romantic in the evenings by candlelight. ☉ Isarauen 8 • 2,000 seats • large playground

4 Hirschgarten
Munich's largest beer garden – which features deer in an enclosure after which the beer garden is named – lies near Nymphenburg Palace. The golden Augustiner brews flow from a huge "stag" barrel. ☉ Hirschgarten 1 • 8,000 seats • large playground

5 Chinesischer Turm

In the Chinese Pagoda, an Englischer Garten landmark (*right*), brass bands play on the second floor on weekends. It is frequented mainly by students, tourists, and local characters.

9 Muffathalle Beer Garden

On a prime site beside the Isar, Munich's newest beer garden sports umbrellas instead of traditional chestnut trees. The Muffathalle menu is well-suited to the beer garden – both are varied and full of surprises.

10 Hofbräukeller

Across the Isar in Haidhausen, the Hofbräukeller, once also the site of the brewery and its beer cellar, has attracted patrons since 1892. The canopy of chestnuts (*below*) is so dense that patrons remain dry and comfortable even on rainy days. 📍 *Innere Wiener Str. 19* • 1,700 seats (400 full-service) • playground



6 Seehaus

A place to see and be seen, this popular beer garden lies in the centre of the Englischer Garten on a small lake. The terrace overlooking the lake is more stylish, but the beer garden has a cosy atmosphere (*above*).

7 Sankt-Emmerams-Mühle

A beer garden that is both trendy and pastoral.

8 Paulaner

The brewery's beer garden on the Nockenberg is rather small, but famous for its beer. In March, the brewery hosts a highly original annual event, the Salvator-tapping. There is much laughter as prominent politicians meet, submit to an evening of ribbing, and savour the new bock beer (*left*). 📍 *Hochstr. 77* • historic garden pavilion in the beer garden • playground

Purity Law for Bavarian Beer

Munich is home to many brewery dynasties. Locals often choose their favourite pubs and beer gardens based on the brews they serve rather than location or food. Personal preferences aside, the Purity Law, which dates back to 1516, is strictly applied to all local beers. According to this law, beer is pure only when it is brewed exclusively from malt (which is germinated grain, usually wheat, barley or spelt), hops, yeast, and water. No additives are allowed.



Make sure you try “Radi” (white or red radish), “Obazda” (seasoned Camembert), Steckerlfisch, and a large pretzel.

Top 10 Around Marienplatz

Henry the Lion transformed Marienplatz into the centre of Munich – and it remains the heart of the city today. This is where the Neues Rathaus (New Town Hall) stands, major public transit lines meet, and locals and visitors alike stroll past street entertainers, or sit at the restaurant and café patios lining the square. A pedestrian zone begins at the western end of the square; the elegant Weinstraße and Theatinerstraße lead off from the north; toward the east are the Isartor and Maximilianstraße, and to the south the Viktualienmarkt.

1 Marienplatz

Dominated by the Neues Rathaus, the square (*centre*) features a golden statue of the Virgin Mary from 1590, and the 19th-century Fischbrunnen (Fish Fountain). On Ash Wednesday, the mayor and town councillors wash their wallets there so that the city's coffers will always be full.

2 Neues Rathaus

Built between 1867 and 1908, the Neo-Gothic Neues Rathaus (New Town Hall) is topped by the Münchner Kindl (Munich Child), the city's symbol. At 11am, noon, and, from May to October, also at 5pm, people gather on Marienplatz to enjoy the town hall's famous Glockenspiel – a chiming clock with dancing figures.

3 Altes Rathaus

Now home to a toy museum, the Gothic Altes Rathaus (Old Town Hall) of 1474 has been rebuilt often, but the hall on the ground floor and the tower, once a city gate, are original.



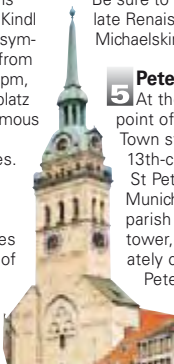
4 Pedestrian Zone

Munich's most popular traffic-free shopping zone begins at the western end of the square and stretches to Karlsplatz.

Be sure to see the late Renaissance Michaelskirche.

5 Peterskirche

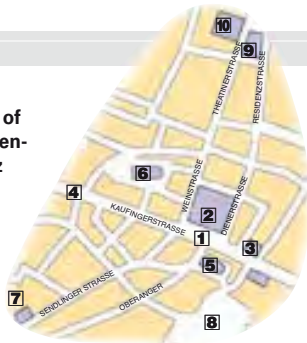
At the highest point of the Old Town stands the 13th-century St Peter's, Munich's oldest parish church. Its tower, affectionately called Old Peter (*left*), commands a fine view.



6 Frauenkirche

Topped by onion domes, the Frauenkirche is Munich's best-known symbol. Built in record time (1468–88), the church is the largest Gothic basilica in southern Germany. Highlights include choir figures by Erasmus Grasser and the tomb of Ludwig IV of Bavaria.

10 Theatinerkirche

Munich's "Italian mile" begins with the Theatinerkirche (1663–1768) – an exuberant blend of large Baroque domes, flowing volutes, a gigantic cupola, and Rococo façades (above).

7 Asamkirche

Bequeathed to the city by the Asam brothers, this church (1733–46) is a jewel of the late Baroque – a soaring natural stone façade on the outside and an exquisitely ornamented grotto on the inside. Egid Quirin Asam paid for the church (below), which was built near his home.



8 Viktualienmarkt

Since 1807, this colourful food market has thrived here. A stroll past the 140 market stalls is a treat not to be missed (above).

9 Feldherrnhalle

Modelled on Loggia dei Lanzi in Florence, Friedrich von Gärtner built the Feldherrnhalle in 1844 as a monument to Bavaria's military heroes. It marks the boundary between Old Town and Schwabing.

Münchener Kindl

Perched atop the Town Hall tower, grasping the gospel in its left hand and its right hand raised in a gesture of benediction, the Münchener Kindl in its monk's habit is a reminder of the city's monkish origins. Dressed in black and yellow, the colours of the city, it accompanies all official processions – including the Oktoberfest – on horseback. It is also found on postcards, beer bottles, and even sewer covers. The "child's" gender remains a mystery. The live stand-in is always a woman.



The Schrammehalle was once located on the southern end of the Viktualienmarkt. It was saved and is currently being reconstructed.

Top 10 Neuschwanstein and Ludwig II

An idealized vision of a knight's castle on the outside and a homage to Wagner's operas on the inside, Neuschwanstein was Ludwig II's most ambitious project. During the same period, he commissioned Linderhof and Herrenchiemsee, two castles in the French style. More than 50 million visitors have admired these fairy-tale castles since they were built by the shy and world-weary king. At Neuschwanstein, in particular, there seems to be no low season. A daytrip from Munich toward Füssen in the Schwangau is an unforgettable experience.

1 The Building

The foundation stone was laid in 1869, the gatehouse was completed in 1873, and the castle in 1884 (centre). Work continued, with the king constantly altering the plans, until his death in 1886. The keep and Ritterbad (knight's bath) were never completed.

2 Throne Hall

Gold, saints, and a touch of Byzantium: the throne hall is modelled in part after Munich's All Saints Church and the Hagia Sophia in Istanbul. Originally, the throne was to stand – like an altar – in the apse (below).



3 Bedroom

In contrast to the romanticism of the living quarters, the bedroom was designed in a Gothic style complete with elaborately carved oak panelling. Scenes from Wagner's *Tristan and Isolde* decorate the walls.

4 Chapel

Altar and murals depict Ludwig IX, the beatified king of France and namesake of the fairy-tale king of Bavaria.

5 Study

Ludwig's study is filled with pictures from Wagner's opera *Tannhäuser*. On his desk is a fanciful pen-and-ink set in the shape of *Lohengrin*.





7 Grotto

Going between the living room and study, visitors pass through a grotto, where a small waterfall flowed during the king's lifetime (*left*). The larger Venus grotto, complete with an artificial lake, is located in the park of Linderhof Castle (*see p30*).



9 Winter Garden

Adjoining the grotto, the winter garden affords a spectacular view of Allgäu (*above*) through a large window.

10 Hohenschwangau

Ludwig spent part of his childhood and youth in this summer palace, which is located in wildly romantic scenery. His father, Maximilian II, restored the palace fully in 1832. Hohenschwangau's coat of arms bears a swan – later often depicted as Lohengrin's swan, which is a constantly recurring motif throughout Neuschwanstein.



6 Minstrel's Room

Influenced by the ceremonial hall of the Wartburg in Eisenach, this is the castle's largest room. The walls are decorated with scenes from the legend of Parzival and his quest for the Holy Grail (*below*).



8 Dining Room

Dishes were transported in an elevator from the kitchen three stories below to the dining room, where the shy king took most of his meals on his own. Murals depict the tradition of the minstrel's song.

New Technology in an Old Castle

Despite the medieval ambience, Neuschwanstein is full of high-tech features from its era.

The dining room was equipped with a serving hatch and elevator that went up three floors.

The kitchen had warm running water and automatic roasting spits. Forced-air central heating kept the rooms warm. Toilets were fitted with an automatic flush mechanism. An electric intercom was used to communicate with servants, and the second and third floors were linked by a telephone.



To the left of Pöllat Gorge stood the ruins of two small castles. Ludwig II had Neuschwanstein built on the site of these ruins.

Top 10 Linderhof & Herrenchiemsee

1 Linderhof Castle

Linderhof's history began as a hunting lodge of Maximilian II that Ludwig II had dismantled and reassembled in the park in 1872. Originally planned as a second Versailles, the castle turned out to be far more modest in scale, albeit designed in a delightful and whimsical neo-Rococo style.

2 Castle Park

Set in a landscape garden, the park is a French-style formal garden created from 1870 onwards using designs by Carl von Effner. Its parterres are reminiscent of the Baroque style, its terraces of the Renaissance.

3 Fountain of Neptune With Cascades

On the north side of the castle, cascades flow across 30 steps

bounded by the Fountain of Neptune at the bottom and the music pavilion at the top. Arcades flank the two sides of the waterfall.

4 Grotto of Venus

Designed to emulate the Hörselberg in Wagner's opera, *Tannhäuser*, this artificial grotto, complete with stalactites, features a lake on which the king was rowed about in a gilded barge.

5 Moorish Kiosk

Created for the Paris World's Fair in 1867, Ludwig II acquired the pavilion for Linderhof in 1876.

6 Chapel

This is the oldest structure of the castle complex, built in 1668 as the chapel of St Anna.

7 Herrenchiemsee Castle

On the island of Herrenchiemsee in Lake Chiemsee, Ludwig II finally began to build his "New Versailles" in 1878. Seven years later, he ran out of funds after completing 20 magnificent rooms, which are open to visitors today.

8 King Ludwig II Museum

The museum is housed in the south wing of the New Castle and documents the life of "Kini," a Bavarian nickname for the king, in a series of 12 rooms.

9 Hall of Mirrors

With its 90-m (290-ft) length, the Hall of Mirrors surpasses its



predecessor at Versailles. The lavish ceiling frescoes depict Louis XIV, the French “Sun King.”

10 Castle Gardens

Another homage to Versailles are the gardens on the west side of the castle, where water features enchant visitors from May to October. With a picturesque view of the castle and Lake Chiemsee, this is a wonderful place for a stroll. Horse-drawn carriages run from the ferry dock to the castle.

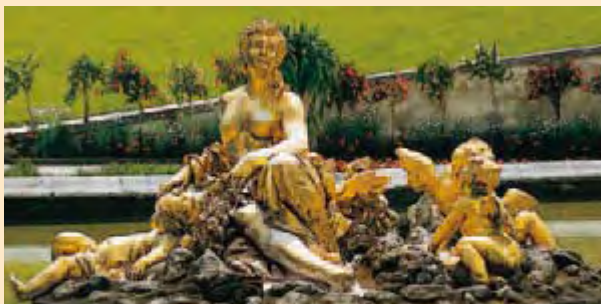

Ludwig II and His Castles

“Kini’s” building mania began in 1867. At first, he concentrated his efforts in Munich, where he redesigned his private palace apartments. But he was already planning his fairy-tale castles. In 1868, he developed the plans for Linderhof – the only castle to be completed. After work started at Neuschwanstein in 1869, Ludwig focused entirely on the Hohenschwangau region. Construction on Herrenchiemsee Castle began in 1878; Ludwig spent a mere nine days there. Projects were planned for Munich, too, including a festival hall for Wagner operas (of which a smaller version was built in Bayreuth in 1976). By 1886, Ludwig was in debt by 14 million marks. With bankruptcy looming, the King was removed from power, and died shortly thereafter.

Top 10 Starnberger See

Of all the lakes in Munich's lake region, Starnberger See is the most popular, being practically on the city's doorstep. It is also the largest body of water in the region – 21 km (13 miles) long, 5 km (3 miles) wide, and up to 125 m (415 ft) deep – and offers attractive spots for bathing, sailing, and surfing. Members of the nobility built their summer residences here; Empress Elisabeth (Sisi) spent her summers at Possenhofen, while her cousin Ludwig II resided at Berg. The best way to experience the lake is to take a steamboat trip.

1 Starnberg

In the 19th century, this former fishing village developed into a popular summer resort (*centre*). Over the past decades, Munich's elite has settled here, building on land that can make access to the lake difficult. A walk on the promenade is still a very pleasant experience and there is a good golf course not too far from the town.

2 Possenhofen

Possenhofen boasts a beautiful beach and many old villas. The castle Possenhofen, with its four battle-tower towers built in 1536 and reconstructed in the 17th century, was a refuge for Sisi – Empress Elisabeth.

3 "Weißblaue Dampferflotte"

The fleet of the Bavarian Steamboat Company offers theme tours and excursions, as well as providing public transportation.



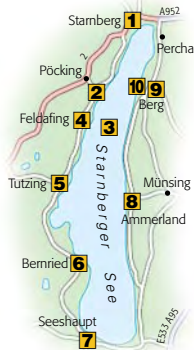
4 Roseninsel

A romantic destination for daytrips, this small island off the town of Feldafing was settled as far back as prehistoric times. In 1853 Peter J Lenné and Franz J Kreuter built a casino with a park and a formal rose garden on the island (*below*).



5 Schloss Tutzing

This horseshoe-shaped palace surrounded by a landscaped park is home to the Protestant Academy (*right*). From Tutzing station, it is just a short walk to the Ilkahöhe (*see p70*) and a restaurant of the same name. On clear days, the view of the Alps is magnificent.

9 Schloss Berg

Berg is the birthplace of author Oskar Maria Graf. The palace served as the summer residence of the Wittelsbach dynasty and of Ludwig II, the fairy-tale king who died in the nearby lake.

10 Commemorative Cross for Ludwig II

A cross on the shore of the lake marks the spot where Ludwig II was found dead in the water. Fans of the "Kini" meet here every year on the anniversary of his death.

The Mysterious Death of Ludwig II

Was it a murderous plot, suicide, or a heart attack in the frigid waters? On the evening of 13 June 1886, Ludwig II set out for a walk with Dr von Gudden, his personal physician. Later, both were found floating dead in the lake – von Gudden bore scratch marks on his face. Conspiracy theories have abounded ever since, a posthumous confirmation of Ludwig's remark: "I wish to remain an everlasting mystery to myself and to others."

6 Buchheim Museum

Nestled in a park north of Bernried, Buchheim Museum houses an impressive collection of Expressionist art as well as folklore and ethnological exhibits, more than 3,000 paperweights, African masks, and much more.

7 Seeshaupt

Attractively located at the southern tip of Lake Starnberg, with a harbour full of yachts and a lovely lakeside promenade, Seeshaupt has managed to preserve its rural character. From here, it is just a short trip to the Osterseen nature reserve.

8 Schloss Ammerland

King Ludwig I bequeathed this castle (*below*) to the musician, author, and illustrator Franz von Pocci. Built between 1683 and 1685, it is beautifully located on the eastern shore of the lake.

TOP 10 Historic Events

1 1158: Foundation of the City
Welf Henry the Lion, Duke of Bavaria, tore down the old salt bridge in 1157–8 and erected a new crossing over the Isar River, a short distance to the south. There, the small town of München developed into the royal residence city of Munich. The day on which the Hohenstaufen Emperor Friedrich Barbarossa awarded the town the right to hold a market and mint coins, 14 June 1158, is still celebrated as Munich's birthday.

2 1240–1918: The Wittelsbach Dynasty

From 1240 onward, the Wittelsbach dynasty was instrumental in defining the evolution of the city. They graduated from simple dukes to electors and finally to kings. Ludwig I commissioned the erection of Classical public buildings in Munich; Ludwig II built larger-than-life fairy-tale castles; the last member of the Wittelsbach dynasty, Ludwig III, had to flee Bavaria after World War I.

3 1328: Ludwig the Bavarian – German Emperor

In 1314, Duke Ludwig IV (the Bavarian) was elected king of Germany; in 1328, he was crowned emperor of the Holy Roman Empire.

4 1442: Expulsion of the Jews from Munich

Following pogroms against the Jews in the 13th and 14th centuries, Duke Albrecht III gave

the order to expel all Jews from Upper Bavaria in 1442. Jewish culture did not return to Munich until the 18th century.

5 1806: Capital of the Kingdom of Bavaria

In the wake of the Napoleonic redrafting of Europe, the Electorate of Bavaria was elevated to a kingdom, with Munich as the capital and royal residence of the much-enlarged new state. The boundaries of Bavaria at that time were already roughly the same as they are today.

6 1848: March Revolution – Abdication of Ludwig I

In March of 1849, revolutionary uprisings reached Munich, culminating in the storming of the Zeughaus (the treasury, currently the Stadtmuseum). Having lost the confidence of the court and the bourgeoisie, (in part because

of an affair with the notorious dancer Lola Montez), Ludwig I was forced to abdicate.

7 1918–19: November Revolution and Räterepublik

On the night of 8 November 1918, the socialist Kurt Eisner proclaimed the “Free State of Bavaria” in the Mathäserbräu (today a cinema with a commemorative Eisner column). Eisner became president for a brief period. Following his assassination on 21 February 1919 by a monarchist extremist, *Räterepubliken* (Soviet republics) emerged in Munich and other Bavarian cities. These were quickly suppressed by government troops.

8 1935–45: “Capital of the Movement”

Hitler’s party, the NSDAP, grew out of a small cell that began in Munich. As early as 1923, Hitler attempted his first coup (*Hitlerputsch*) against the Weimar Republic. As a sign of thanks, Munich was given the title “Capital of the Movement” in 1935, after the Nazis seized power.

9 **1962: Schwabinger Riots**
In the summer of 1962, harmless buskers were a catalyst for violent clashes between youths and the Munich police forces that lasted for several days. These events inspired the city and the police to rethink their hardline policy on police intervention.

10 **1972: Olympic Games**
Munich and environs hosted the 20th Olympic Games in 1972. A terror attack on 5 September against the Olympic team from Israel, resulting in the deaths of nine athletes, overshadowed the Games (see p19).

Top 10 Famous Citizens

1 **Asam Brothers**
Cosmas Damien (1687–1739) and Egid Quirin (1692–1750) Asam were the chief proponents of Bavarian Rococo.

2 **Maximilian Joseph von Montgelas**
Montgelas (1759–1838) is the acknowledged creator of the modern Bavarian state.

3 **Ludwig I**
Numerous magnificent buildings were built by King Ludwig I (1786–1868). In 1826, he transferred the university from Landshut to Munich.

4 **Lola Montez**
As the mistress of Ludwig I, Lola Montez (1818–61) is said to have had great influence on the sovereign.

5 **Ludwig II**
“Kini” Ludwig II (1845–1886), has gone down in history as the “fairy-tale king.”

6 **Franz von Lenbach**
The “Painter Prince” (1836–1904) greatly influenced Munich’s art scene.

7 **Franz von Stuck**
Stuck (1863–1928) was co-founder of the Munich Secession. His Art Nouveau villa is now a museum.

8 **Thomas Mann**
In 1933, the Nobel Laureate of Literature (1875–1955) left his hometown, never to return.

9 **Karl Valentin**
Satirist, actor, comedian, and a well-known character in the city, Valentin (1882–1948) performed for many years with his sidekick Liesl Karlstadt.

10 **Scholl Siblings**
Hans (1918–43) and Sophie (1921–43) were active in the “White Rose” resistance group. They were denounced in 1943 and executed.

Top 10 Gardens & Parks

1 Schloss Nymphenburg
Enclosed by a wall, this 2-km- (1-mile-) wide park extends west from the palace 1.5 km (1 mile). Picturesque pavilions and follies are scattered throughout the park, which has been declared a nature reserve to protect the 300-year-old trees (see pp12–13).

2 Englischer Garten
With 373 hectares (922 acres), the Englischer Garten is the largest urban park in Germany and the green lung of the city. It serves as a leisure paradise in summer, when thousands lounge in the sun on the expansive meadows, and cyclists, joggers, and roller-bladers zoom along the paths. The surface of the Kleinhesseloher See is dotted with boats, while surfers try their luck on the Eisbach near the Haus der Kunst. For a welcome refreshment, try a cool beer in

one of the beer gardens (see pp24–5) at the Chinesischer Turm, the Seehaus, the Hirschau, and the Aumeister. An American, Benjamin Thompson, known as Count Rumford (1753–1814), conceived the idea of the park, which was designed by Ludwig von Sckell as a prime example of classical landscape park design. In 1837, the Monopteros, a mock Greek temple, was built on an artificial hill. Map G4–H1

3 Botanischer Garten
This is one of the most important botanical gardens in the world. Created in the park at Nymphenburg in 1914, some 14,000 plant species from around the globe are cultivated here. In the greenhouses, visitors can embark on journeys to tropical rainforests or arid deserts.

4 Westpark
An expanse of 72 hectares (178 acres) has been landscaped with numerous artificial hills, paths, a lake, and ponds. Created for the International Garden Exhibition in 1983, the western section of the park features an impressive East Asian ensemble with Chinese and Japanese gardens, and Thai and Nepalese pagodas. Concerts, plays, and open-air film screenings are presented on the lakeside stage in summer. Map B6–C6



5 Hofgarten

In the 17th century, the Hofgarten was laid out on the north side of the Residenz in the style of Renaissance gardens. It is bounded on two sides by long arcades. Rows of mature linden, chestnut, and maple trees provide welcome shade for *boule* players in summer. Tango aficionados meet at the Temple of Diana – a polygonal pavilion with a shallow dome – for dances on mild summer evenings (see p20).

6 Alter Botanischer Garten

During the 19th century, the former botanical garden was located in this small park. Today, it serves as the perfect oasis to relax in after a shopping spree in the nearby pedestrian zone and city centre. Map J3

7 Bavariapark

This park lies directly behind the statue of Bavaria and the Ruhmeshalle, and stretches westward on the Theresienhöhe. It was designed by order of Ludwig I and received its current name after the Bavaria statue was completed in 1850. It is an ideal place to take a break from the hustle and bustle of the Oktoberfest. Map D5

8 Luitpoldpark

Created on the occasion of Prince Regent Luitpold's 90th birthday, the park was expanded in 1950 by a hill built out of rubble, the Luitpoldhügel, which commands a fine view of the city. On clear days, you can see all the way to the Alps.

9 Hofgarten Schleißheim

Stretching between the Neues Schloss in Schleißheim and Schloss Lustheim, this is one of the few gardens from the Baroque era that has retained most of its original form. Enrico Zuccalli (1642–1724) created the basic layout with canals in

1684. Dominique Girard added parterres and a cascade from 1715 onward, creating the tremendous illusion of depth that characterizes the principal axis. The cascade, located in front of the Neues Schloss,

was renovated in 1999. Oberschleißheim, Neues Schloss

10 River Meadows along the Isar (Isarauen) and Rose Garden

The long stretch of the Isarauen serves as the city's other green lung. South of the Wittelsbacher Bridge is the rose garden. In addition to many rose species, it features a large collection of exotic trees and shrubs, as well as a small teaching garden with poisonous plants. Map E6

Top 10 Churches & Houses of Worship

1 Frauenkirche
Munich's 15th-century cathedral dominates the city silhouette with its twin towers (*see p27*).

2 Asamkirche
Dedicated to St Johann-Nepomuk, this late Baroque church built by the Asam brothers features ceiling frescoes depicting the saint (*see p27*).

3 Peterskirche (Old Peter)
Although this is the oldest parish church in the city (13th century), the interior is a mix of Gothic (altar by Schrenk), Baroque (baptismal font), and Rococo (side altars). Climbing the 302 steps to the top of the Renaissance tower is worth the effort (*see p26*).

4 Ludwigskirche
Friedrich von Gärtner built this church, which is flanked by two towers, in the style of Italian Romanesque (1829–43). The glo-

5 Michaelskirche
An important structure in many ways, this is the largest late Renaissance church north of the Alps. Construction began in 1538. It features the second-largest barrel vault in the world, after St Peter's in Rome, and was built for the Jesuits. The crypt contains the sarcophagi of Elector Maximilian I and Ludwig II. Not to be missed is the bronze figure of St Michael battling the dragon (1585). ☉ Neuhauser Str. 6

6 Theatinerkirche
Construction of this church, which is also called St Cajetan, was begun in 1663 to mark the birth of the heir to Elector Ferdinand. It is the most Italianate of all Munich's churches (*see p27*).

7 Klosterkirche St Anna
The Lehel district is home to Munich's earliest Rococo church, built by Johann Michael Fischer from 1727 to 1733, with an interior designed by the Asam brothers. Construction of the nearby neo-Romanesque parish church of St Anna began in 1887. ☉ St-Anna-Platz 21 or 5 • Map M4 & N4

8 Heiliggeistkirche
The beginning of the 13th century saw the creation of a hospital church at this site, followed in 1392 by a Gothic basilica. In 1724, the existing structure was remodelled in the Baroque style. 9 Damenstift St Anna
St Anna was originally a monastery of Sisters of the Salesian Order. Today, it is a school. The façade and interior of this late Baroque church were designed in the 18th century by the Asam brothers. 10 Synagogue and Jewish Centre

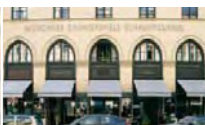

TOP 10 Opera, Concerts & Theatre

1 Bayerische Staatsoper
Built in 1811, the neo-Classical national theatre was reconstructed (1823–5) after a fire. It grew into one of the most important music stages, and premieres of Wagner operas were held here in the presence of Ludwig II. Closed for many years after the end of World War II, the theatre re-opened in 1963. 4 Münchner Kammerspiele
Built by Richard Riemerschmid in 1901 and now restored, this theatre became the home of the Münchner Kammerspiele in 1926. Inside, Art Nouveau rules, with intertwining ornamentation and dozens of lighting fixtures in the shape of flower buds. During the 1920s, the Kammerspiele was considered the most important stage outside Berlin and caused quite a stir staging works by Bertolt Brecht and others. 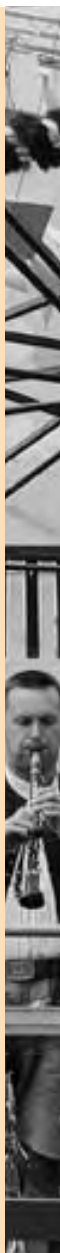

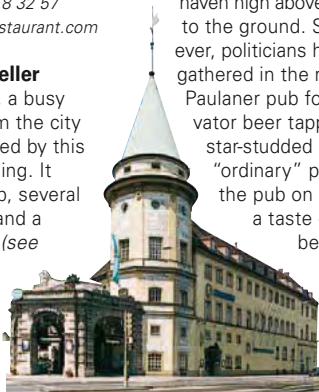

Top 10 Munich Beers

1 Augustiner
Brewed since 1328 in the monastery near the cathedral, Augustiner is widely regarded as the champagne of beers.

2 Franziskaner Weißbier
Franciscan friars have brewed this beer since 1363 in the former monastery on Residenzstraße. Now part of the Spaten-Löwenbräu Group.

3 Paulaner
Pauline monks in the Au began to brew beer as far back as 1634. Salvator beer is still made using monk Barnabas Still's 18th-century recipe.

4 Löwenbräu
Traditional brew with a history going back to the 14th century. Since the 19th century, the brewery has been the largest in Munich.

5 Hofbräu
Duke Wilhelm V founded his own court brewery in 1589. A new fermenting site was set up on Platzl in 1607 (today Hofbräuhaus).

6 Spaten
Dating from the 14th century, the brewery is named after the 16th-century Spatt family.

7 Unertl Weißbier
To some, Unertl from Haag in Upper Bavaria is the Weißbier *par excellence*.

8 Erdinger Weißbier

TOP 10 Markets & Fairs

1 Viktualienmarkt
For a special experience, be sure to visit the Viktualienmarkt (see p27), founded in 1807. Formerly a farmers' market, it has evolved into a shopping destination for gourmets. From Monday to Saturday, you will find daily offerings of fresh fruit and vegetables, meat, eggs, honey, and flowers, as well as exotic spices and other speciality foods. Trained as a shoemaker, he became a popular comedic music virtuoso (1871–1937).

4 Minna Reverelli

Born Hermina Knapp (1892–1947), Minna was the Queen of Yodeling at Platzl.

5 Ratschkathl

Cabaret artiste Ida Schumacher (1894–1956) was the best *Ratschkathl*. She created the tram-track-crack-cleaning-lady character.

6 Roider Jackl

A farmer’s son (1906–75) famous for his spirited performances of *Gstanzln* – satirical rhymes set to music – and a master of barbed humour.

7 Blasius

Pseudonym of Sigi (Siegfried) Sommer (1915–96), author of a popular column in the *Münchner Abendzeitung*.

8 Bally Prell

Decked out in colourful costumes, she recited rhymes to delighted audiences (1922–82).

9 Walter Sedlmayr

A home-grown talent and local favourite (1926–90), he was a successful stage actor and adman for Paulaner beer.

10 Helmut Fischer

Munich actor (1926–92), best remembered for his role as Monaco-Franze in the TV series of the same name.

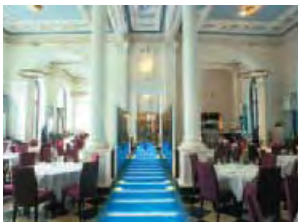

Top 10 Shopping

1 Pedestrian Zone

Munich's central pedestrian zone stretches along Kaufingerstraße and Neuhauser Straße to Karlsplatz/Stachus. Here you will find all the major European chains and many department stores. Estimates show that Germany's largest retail turnover per minute happens right here. Beyond Stachus, there are more stores in Sonnenstraße, Schützenstraße, and in the Elisenhof at the main railway station. 📍 *Map K4–L4*

2 Theatinerstraße

Affluent shoppers head to Munich's most elegant shopping street, which starts at Marienhof behind the Town Hall. The number of fashion boutiques and high-end stores has swelled since the classy Fünf Höfe shopping arcades opened. 📍 *Map L4*

3 Fünf Höfe

Historic buildings and contemporary architecture, arcades, courtyards, stores (Manufaktur, Emporio Armani), culture (Kunsthalle of the Hypo-Kulturstiftung), and fine gastronomy (Schumann's daytime bar, Ederer, Barista, Café Kunsthalle) – this award-winning jewel of urban design by architects Herzog and de Meuron covers the area between Theatiner-, Kardinal-Faulhaber-, Maffei- and Salvatorstraße. 📍 *Map L4*

4 Odeonsplatz & Brienner Straße

Luxury stores and boutiques line this square and the exclusive boulevard that runs off it. Here, you will also find an exemplary piece of urban renewal – the 19th-century Luitpoldblock with luxury shops, galleries, and Café Luitpold (see p61) with its palm garden. 📍 *Map L3*

5 Maximilianstraße

Maximilian II laid out this elegant boulevard in the mid-19th century. Extending between the Nationaltheater and the Altstadttrug, it has evolved into one of Europe's most exclusive shopping destinations. Bulgari, Armani, Chanel, and other shops beckon beneath the pointed arches designed by Friedrich Bürklein. The boulevard is also home to the Hotel Vierjahreszeiten, the Kammerspiele, and – since the autumn of 2003 – the Maximilianhöfe. 📍 *Map M4*



6 Maximilianhöfe

The Maximilianhöfe is a complex encompassing a reconstructed Bürklein building on Maximilianstraße, a complex with offices and luxury boutiques (Gianfranco Ferré, Dolce & Gabbana, and others), and the state opera's new rehearsal stage, featuring a transparent curtain façade. At the centre of the ensemble, the historic colonnaded hall of the former stables of the royal riding school has been preserved. The restaurant Brenner is a hidden treasure. Map M4

Worth a stroll in its own right, Munich's oldest market is surrounded by speciality shops of all sizes. To the south, you'll find the shops of the Gärtnerplatz district, while many small antique shops and the city's largest supermarket for organic foods line the narrow streets leading to Isartor. On the west side, in the direction of Rindermarkt, a new shopping arcade has been created around the medieval Löwenturm. Map L5

9 Around the University

Bounded by the Amalienstraße, Türkenstraße, and Adalbertstraße, the student quarter features not only many excellent bookshops but also boutiques of

2 Deutsches Museum

Older children will be fascinated by many displays in the largest museum of technology in the world – from classic building block sets to full-size jet airplanes. Young children will delight in exploring the Kinderreich section. Devoted entirely to “scientists” aged three and up, children can experience physics first-hand through interactive exhibits. Equally fun for kids of all ages is the Technisches Spielzeug (Technical Toys) exhibit and a “planet walk” from the Sun to Pluto, which takes about an hour to complete (see pp8–11).

**TOP 10 Walks & Cycling Tours****1 Walk through the Englischer Garten**

From the Haus der Kunst (see p37), walk north through the beautiful section of the park that was landscaped 200 years ago. At Kleinhesseloher See, a footbridge takes you over a highway into the newer section of the park and to your final destination, the utterly charming Aumeister beer garden. ☎ 1.5–2 hrs • Zum Aumeister, Sondermeierstr. 1, (089) 32 52 24

2 Hiking along the Isar Departing from the Deutsches Museum (see pp8–11), walk south upriver along the right bank of the Isar. 3 A Walk in Westpark Set off at the eastern end of Westpark at the corner of Hansastr. and Baumgartnerstr. The Alphorn was a means of communication between cow-herders across long distances, as was yodelling, which evolved into a style of singing. Young men danced the Schuhplattler – a folk dance involving much slapping of shoe soles. These traditions are a mainstay at regional folk festivals.

10 Folk Dress

Each region has its own distinctive folk dress, and folklore associations keep the tradition alive, parading regional costumes in processions and at festivals such as the Wiesn.

Top 10 Holidays & Celebrations

1 New Year's Eve

Best places to enjoy the spectacular fireworks: Bavaria statue, Olympiaberg, high-rises, and the highest banks of the Isar.

2 Epiphany

During the week before 6 Jan, children dress up as the Three Magi and go door to door, collecting money for charity.

3 Ash Wednesday

Carnival (*Fasching*) is followed by a fasting period and the start of the bock beer season.

4 Easter

Easter egg hunts in Tierpark Hellabrunn and other locations.

5 Labour Day

The raising of the Maypole and union marches are on 1 May.

6 Corpus Christi

One of the most important days in the Bavarian Catholic calendar. Munich has a large procession.

7 Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving and *Kirchweih* (consecration of churches) fall on the same day. The Auer Herbstdult (see p52) often begins on Thanksgiving, as does the *Almabtrieb*, when the cattle are driven from Alpine summer pastures.

8 All Saints' Day

On 1 Nov, graves are decorated and lanterns lit. Halloween is celebrated the night before.

9 St Martin's Day

Children carry lanterns in processions led by a rider dressed as St Martin. Roast goose is traditional at dinner.

10 Christmas

Christkindl markets start on the first day of Advent. Midnight mass is held 24 Dec.



Curling and a trial of strength called **Fingerhakeln** (finger wrestling) are traditional Bavarian sports.

Downtown & Old Town

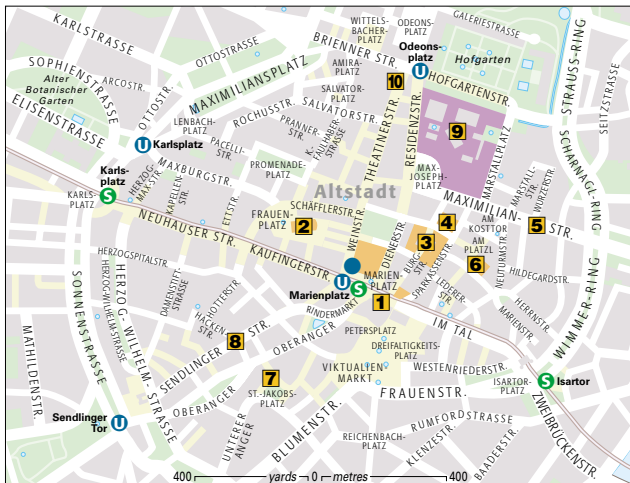
MUNICH'S HISTORIC OLD TOWN is also the downtown area. This is where you will find many historic buildings as well as Marienplatz, (the historic central square), and the Residenz. In the past, further expansion was hindered by the Englischer Garten to the northeast and the Isar River to the east. Within the boundaries of the old town gates – Karlstor, Isartor, Odeonsplatz, and Sendlinger Tor – lie the principal shopping districts. Here you will find the pedestrian zone, Theatinerstraße, and Maximilianstraße. However, Marienplatz remains the true heart of Munich for visitors and locals alike.

1 Marienplatz, Neues & Altes Rathaus

The Mariensäule (Column of the Virgin), from 1590, and the 19th-century fish fountain on Marienplatz are popular meeting spots. Although the square is dominated by the ornate Neues Rathaus, or New Town Hall (1867–1908), the eastern side is bounded by the Gothic simplicity of the Altes Rathaus, or Old Town Hall, built during the 15th century. The Glockenspiel, a chiming clock, is not to be missed (*see pp26–7*).

4 Alte Münze

Northeast of the Alter Hof lies the Münzhof (1567), the former royal stables of the Bavarian rulers. This stunning Renaissance courtyard with arcades rising across three stories held the stables and coach

houses, as well as the library and treasure chamber of Albrecht V. In the 19th century, the complex was converted into the state mint, hence the name Alte Münze, or Old Mint. Coins were minted here as recently as 1983. 📍 *Hofgraben 4 • Map L4–M4 • Courtyard open year-round*

2 Frauenkirche

Weinstraße, a lane off Marienplatz, leads to the Frauenkirche (1468–88), a basilica designed by Jörg von Halsbach. A lack of funds forced him to abandon his idea of Gothic towers. The “Swiss bonnets” that top the towers were added later and are perhaps the forerunners of all the onion domes in Bavaria. Highlights are the emperor’s tomb, Erasmus Grasser’s carving, and the statue of St Christopher (*see p27*).

3 Alter Hof

Built within the city walls between 1253 and 1255, the former residence of the Wittelsbach dynasty lies northeast of Marienplatz. Preserved in its original form, the west wing features a gatehouse embellished with the family’s coat of arms. A bay window, known as the Affenturm, or Monkey Tower, is another original element. According to legend, a court monkey abducted young Ludwig IV, the future emperor

5 Maximilianstraße

Maximilian II built this monumental boulevard between 1852 and 1855. The stretch between Max-Joseph-Platz and Alstadtring (*see pp66–7*) is one of the world’s most exclusive shopping streets. In the arcades, luxury boutiques such as Armani, Jill Sander, and Chanel offer their exquisite wares; the Hotel Vierjahreszeiten and the Kammerspiele are also found here, as is the new Maximilianhöfe complex (*see p67*). At its far end, the boulevard is flanked with ornate public buildings. 📍 *Map M4*

6 Hofbräuhaus & Platzl
 Munich's most famous pub dates from 1896 and was originally the royal court brewery, founded in 1598 by Wilhelm V. There is space for 1,000 patrons on the ground floor, where Hofbräu is, of course, the main beverage served – over 10,000 litres (2,600 gallons) per day. A barrel-vaulted banquet hall occupies the second floor and the complex also features a beautiful small beer garden. Walk through the winding lanes nearby, such as Burgstraße, to enjoy one of Munich's most historic districts.

7 Sankt-Jakobs-Platz & Stadtmuseum

This site is currently under development and will be home to the new Jewish synagogue, museum, and community centre. The square is also home to the Stadtmuseum, which occupies six buildings, including the Marstall (royal stables) and the former Zeughaus (arsenal). Renamed Stadtmuseum (city museum) in 1954, the museum contains several permanent collections complemented by changing exhibitions. The film museum enjoys international

renown (see p36 & p54), especially for reconstructions of silent films. Ignaz-Günther-Haus – a late Gothic building that was the home and studio of the famous Rococo sculptor – stands on the west side of the square. ☎ St-Jakobs-Platz 1 & 15 • Map L5 • www.muenchen.de/stadtmuseum

8 Sendlinger Straße & Sendlinger Tor

For a long time this was one of the oldest retail strips in the city, with shops owned by the same families for generations. In recent years, Sendlinger Straße has become more elegant – and more expensive. If you prefer a more eclectic experience, wander into the adjacent side streets and lanes, where you can browse in the many stores to your heart's content. Be sure to visit the two Rococo jewels of the district – the Asamkirche (see p27 & p40)

and the Asamhaus at Sendlinger Straße No. 34. Egid Quirin Asam acquired the building (unfortunately closed to the public) and adapted it to his own needs. One of the windows affords a direct view of the high altar in the Asamkirche. A surviving element of the medieval

Odeon

The former Odeon at Odeonsplatz 3 was a glamorous concert hall financed by Ludwig I with funds taken from the defence fund, despite resistance from his cabinet. Built by Klenze in 1828, the building was destroyed in World War II. After the war, only the walls surrounding the inner courtyard were rebuilt to full height. The complex now houses the Ministry of the Interior.

9 Residenz & Hofgarten
Munich's largest historic complex, the Residenz (see p39), lies adjacent to the Hofgarten, with its lovely plantings and arcades. To the north, the garden is bounded by the Bavarian Chancellery (1989–93), which incorporates the ruins of an army museum. Remnants of a 16th-century wall and garden are visible behind glass on one side. 📍 *Map L3–L4 & M3–M4*

10 Odeonsplatz, Theatinerkirche & Feldherrnhalle
Princely palaces once occupied the area between Residenz and Theatinerkirche (see p27 & p40). From 1800, old fortifications here were dismantled to make way for the Ludwigstraße, which ends or begins – depending upon your viewpoint – with Odeonsplatz and the Feldherrnhalle. Statues of the Bavarian field marshals Tilly and Wrede are displayed in the niches of the loggia. 📍 *Map L3*

An Old Town Stroll

Morning

📍 From Marienplatz walk through the pedestrian zone to Mazaristr., which will lead you to the **Frauenkirche** (see p79). Continue north along Maffeistr. to the **Fünf Höfe** complex (see pp66–7) and stroll along Theatinerstr. to Odeonsplatz with **Theatinerkirche** and **Feldherrnhalle**. Enjoy an excellent cup of coffee with a view of the Hofgarten at **Café Tambosi**. You will need half a day to tour the **Residenz**, but you can explore the palace's many inner courtyards on your own. Cross the Residenzstr. to Max-Joseph-Platz and the opera and exclusive shops along Maximilianstr. Return to Marienplatz via Dinerstr., **Alter Hof**, and **Platzl**, just in time for the clock's chiming (at 11am or noon). Walk along Tal to the **Weißes Bräuhaus** at No.10 for a traditional Bavarian lunch.

Afternoon

After lunch, climb to the top of **St Peter's** (see p26) and take in the glorious view of the Old Town. Then walk through the Rindermarkt with its medieval Löwenturm and right into Sendlinger Str. Although **Asamhaus** (No. 34) is closed to the public, the interior of the late Baroque **Asamkirche** (No. 62) will take your breath away. Keep left to reach St-Jakobs-Platz, the Stadtmuseum, and the future synagogue. Drop into the **Stadtcafé** for an afternoon break. From **Viktualienmarkt**, just around the corner, go east to **Isartor** and the Valentin-Museum (see p82) or south to the **Gärtnerplatz** district with its many pubs and bars.

10 Best of the Rest

1 Isartor & Valentin-Musäum

Dedicated to the city's favourite son, Karl Valentin (1882–1948), the Valentin-Musäum is situated in the south tower of the Isartor (14th century). A small room in the tower furnished in turn-of-the-19th-century style houses a café.

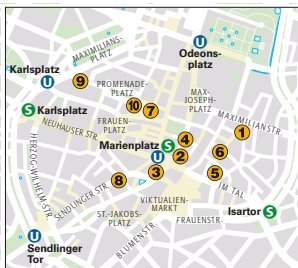

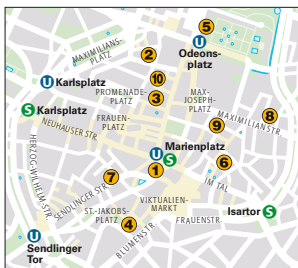

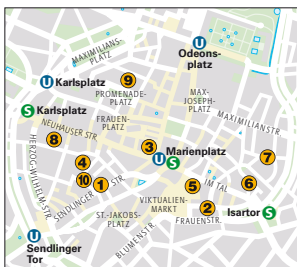

Schwabing & University District

ENCOMPASSING SCHWABING, MAXVORSTADT, and the fringes of Lehel, this district covers the entire area lying to the left and right of Ludwigstraße and Leopoldstraße. At the beginning of the 19th century, the expansion of the Old Town north and west of Odeonsplatz began with the development of Maxvorstadt, then a suburb. This is where you will find numerous museums, the university, polytechnics, colleges, and libraries. Schwabing, an idyllic suburb to the north, became a well-known bohemian district inhabited by artists and intellectuals toward the end of the 19th century. Even today, you can still feel the flair of this interesting area, the centre of Art Nouveau in Germany.

1 Ludwigstraße & Siegestor

After the old town wall was pulled down, Ludwig I commissioned a monumental boulevard in the Italian Renaissance style – the Ludwigstraße (1815–50). This splendid street is bounded by the Feldherrnhalle to the south (see p81) and the Siegestor (Victory Gate) to the north. Based on the Arch of Constantine in Rome, the Siegestor is crowned by the figure of Bavaria riding a chariot drawn by four lions. Designed for victory parades in honour of the Bavarian army, the gate, damaged in World War II, has been restored. The 1958 inscription reads “Dedicated to victory, destroyed in war, an entreaty for peace.” Map L3–M1

2 Ludwigskirche

Designed in the Italian Romanesque style, St Ludwig’s Church (1829–43) is home to the second-largest church fresco in the world (see p40).

3 Bayerische Staatsbibliothek

The Bavarian State library is the second-largest municipal library in Germany, with more than 6 million volumes, 70,000 manuscripts, and valuable handwritten documents and prints. It has as its nucleus the 16th-century collections of Albrecht V and Wilhelm V. Today’s building is the

4 Ludwig-Maximilians-Universität

6 Leopoldstraße & Münchner Freiheit

Passing beneath the Siegestor, you will enter Schwabing and the district's principal promenade, the Leopoldstraße. Flanked by shops, pavement cafés, and fast-food outlets, the boulevard has lost some of its 1960s and '70s air, when a new generation of film-makers, students, and bohemians set the tone, but there are still some interesting pockets. One of the route's highlights is the Walking Man (1995), a 17-m- (55-ft-) high sculpture by Jonathan Borofsky at Ainmillerstraße 36. On the northern end of the Münchner Freiheit, in a café of the same name, tables are set out in summer beneath a larger-than-life statue of actor Helmut Fischer.

Jugendstil

Munich is the birthplace of Jugendstil, the German equivalent to Art Nouveau. In 1896, the first issue of the art journal *Jugend* (Youth) was published here, which gave the new movement – characterized by its decorative, linear style of undulating tendrils and plant stems – its name. Over 100 artists had joined forces to protest the “tyranny” of painter baron Franz von Lenbach.

Beautifully preserved Art Nouveau houses are to be found on several side streets off Leopoldstraße, notably Georgenstraße (Nos. 8–10) and Ainmillerstraße (Nos. 20, 22, 33, 34, 35, and 37). Take a detour onto Kaiserstraße for a glimpse of a pretty ensemble from the Foundation Period. Hohenzollernstraße and the section of Maxvorstadt bounded by Schelling-, Türken-, and Barerstraße, are packed with fun and eccentric boutiques (see p91). Nearly all side streets off the south side of Leopoldstraße lead to the Englischer Garten. 🗺 Map F3–G2

7 Englischer Garten

Schwabing's “backyard” is Germany's largest urban park, offering a host of leisure opportunities – walks, beer gardens (Seehaus, Chinesischer Turm, Hirschau), jogging, boating, and – for the adventurous – surfing in the Eisbach, a small rocky stream with icy waters. The streets to the south of Münchner Freiheit lead almost directly to the Kleinhesseloher See and the Seehaus beer garden in the park (see p38).

8 Around Königsplatz

Munich owes its Royal Square, or Königsplatz, to Ludwig I and the vision of architect Leo von Klenze. The Propyläen (Doric) and the Glyptothek (Ionic), housing a magnificent sculpture collection, and the Antikensammlung (Corinthian), a collection of antiquities, were all built between 1816 and 1862 (see p36). Directly behind the Propyläen lies the Lenbachhaus (see p36); and one block farther down, the Paläontologische Museum (see p37). On the east side, the Königsplatz merges with the

Karolinenplatz. The obelisk at its centre is a memorial to Bavarian soldiers who died in Napoleon's Russian campaign. During the Nazi era, Königsplatz was used for rallies and parades. Another relic of that era is today's Academy of Music and Theatre, then the so-called Führer-Bau, in which the infamous Munich Agreement was ratified in 1938. Today, this magnificent square is used for open-air events in summer.

9 Museum District

Near Königsplatz on Barerstraße are the three large Pinakotheken (see pp14–17). Additional museums are planned for this district. ☉ Map K2–K3

10 Olympiapark

Completed for the 1972 Summer Olympic Games, this vast park and complex to the north has become Munich's main sports and amusement park complex (see pp18–19).

A Day in the University District

Morning

Begin your day in true bohemian style at the **Café Münchner Freiheit**. Afterward, stroll down **Leopoldstr.** and turn into Kaiserstr., with its pretty houses. Lenin lived at No. 46. At Kaiserplatz, follow Friedrichstr. to the corner of Ainmillerstr., with its Art Nouveau houses (Nos. 20–37). Continue along Friedrichstr. to Georgenstr. 8 and the **Palais Pacelli**, next door to the **Palais Bissing**. From here return to Leopoldstr. and the **Academy of Fine Arts** near the **Siegestor**. Walk to the **university** and cross the inner courtyard of the main building, which will bring you to the student district around Amalienstr., with its many cafés and restaurants. If you like French cuisine, try the excellent **Bistro Terrine** in Amalienpassage.

Afternoon

Depending on weather and inclination, you can devote these hours to nature or culture. If you love the outdoors, take a walk in the **Englischer Garten** (see p70) and treat yourself to a beer-garden visit. Art lovers turn from Amalienstr. onto Schellingstr. and walk to the corner of Barer Str., which leads to the three **Pinakotheken** (see pp14–17). Having feasted on art, take a break in one of the cafés (either at the Neue Pinakothek or the Pinakothek der Moderne). At the **Glyptothek** on Königsplatz, the cafe is also very pretty; if you prefer strolling, explore its sculpture collection and the adjacent **Antikensammlungen** (see p36).



In the 1920s, the artists Rilke, Gabriele Münter, Kandinsky, and Klee, to name but a few, lived in Ainmillerstraße.

TO 10 Best of the Rest

1 Erlöserkirche

This Protestant Art Nouveau church occupies the northern end of the Münchner Freiheit.

2 Wedekindplatz

Once the heart of rural Schwabing, the square on Feilitzschstraße is now somewhat rundown. It was the site, in 1962, of the local riots, known as "Schwabinger Krawalle" (see p35). ☎ Map G2

3 Elisabethplatz

A piece of old Schwabing, this square is named after the Austrian empress. A market, the largest in the city after Viktualienmarkt, has been held here since 1903. ☎ Map F3 • Market: 10am–6pm Mon–Fri, 10am–3pm Sat

4 Alter Nördlicher Friedhof

There's nothing morbid about this park-like former cemetery that dates back to 1866 and has since been given over to the public for recreation and relaxation. Children play on the lawn among old tombstones while adults seek shade on the benches beneath the trees. ☎ *Zwischen Ziebland-, Arcis-, Adalbert- & Luisenstr.* • Map F3

5 Luitpoldpark

This park was created out of rubble from World War II. The restaurant in the Baroque Bamberger Haus features ornate dining rooms and a pretty terrace for outdoor dining during warm weather (see p38).

6 Nikolaiplatz & Seidlvilla

At the corner of Sieges- and Josephsstraße you'll come upon this tranquil square. The Seidlvilla (1905) was saved from demolition and converted into a centre for readings, concerts, and exhibitions.

7 Kaiserplatz & Kaiserstraße

Russian Expressionist painter Vasili Kandinsky captured the silhouette of St Ursula's church on canvas. Ornate buildings from the Foundation Period flank the Kaiserstraße. In 1902, Lenin lived at No. 46. ☎ Map F2

8 BMW-Museum

The clover-leaf BMW-tower and the bowl-shaped museum at its base are being modernized. For the next few years, the exhibits on the history of automobile design will be shown in the Earth Lounge (the parking garage deck at the Olympic Tower). ☎ *Petuelring 130* • Map E1 • Open 9am–5pm daily

9 Museum Reich der Kristalle

Next door to the Pinakothek der Moderne, this museum houses a large collection of crystals and minerals. ☎ Map L2

10 Museums on Prinzregentenstraße

The upper end of Prinzregentenstraße is home to the Haus der Kunst, the Bayerisches Nationalmuseum, and the Schack-Galerie (see pp36–7).

Along the Isar River

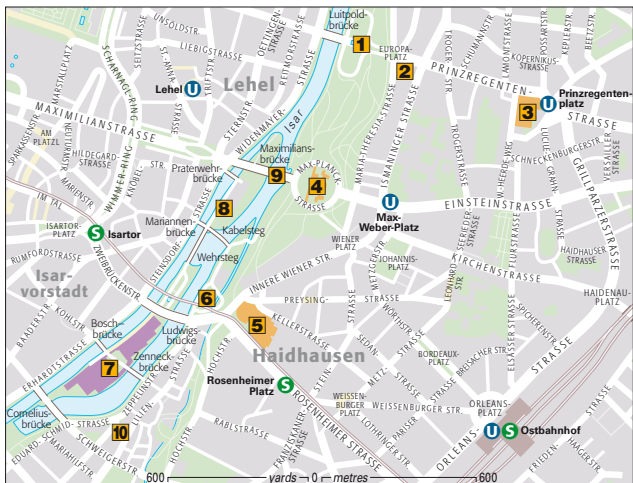
FOUR DISTINCT NEIGHBOURHOODS flank the east bank of the Isar: Bogenhausen, Haidhausen, Au, and Giesing. Bogenhausen is an exclusive district studded with villas and inhabited by many prominent citizens; lively Haidhausen has the best and most extensive bar scene; parts of Au and Giesing, on the other hand, still have a special working-class charm. All were on the "other side" of the Isar from the Old Town and long retained their village character. To the west of the Isar, on the left bank, lie the Englischer Garten, Lehel with its beautiful historic buildings, and the Glockenbach quarter, Munich's gay village. Most sights are found along the left bank, such as Müller'sches Volksbad, Villa Stuck, and – on an island in the river – the Deutsches Museum.

1 Friedensengel

Soaring high above the banks of the Isar, the Friedensengel (Angel of Peace, 1896–99) commemorates the Franco-Prussian war of 1870–71. Based on the Greek goddess Nike, this gilded figure stands 6 m (20 ft) tall. At its foot, two sweeping flights of stairs lead down from the escarpment to a terraced park with fountains on the lower end of Prinzregentenstraße. ☉ *Prinzregentenstr.* • Map P3

2 Museum Villa Stuck

Not far from the Friedensengel is the villa (1897–98) of painter Franz von Stuck, in itself a work of art. A miller's son, Stuck quickly rose to fame and was instrumental in the creation of a Munich style of Art Nouveau – Jugendstil (see p88). The villa has served as a museum since 1968. On view are Stuck's private rooms, a permanent Art Nouveau collection, and changing exhibitions in the studio wing (see p37).

4 Maximilianeum

This building in Haidhausen by Friedrich Bürklein (1857–74), on the high banks of the Isar, marks the end of Maximilianstraße. The seat of the Bavarian parliament since 1949, Maximilian II

built this massive structure as a school for gifted students from poor backgrounds. The school is now housed in the rear building.

3 Prinzregententheater

This theatre is one of several monumental buildings on this stretch of Prinzregentenstraße in Bogenhausen (see p43). It was

5 Gasteig

The site of the former Bürger-spital hospital, and Bürgerbräukeller, where Georg Elser failed in 1939 to assassinate Hitler, it was transformed into the red-brick Gasteig cultural centre between 1978 and 1985. Its facilities include the Munich Philharmonic, the Carl Orff concert hall, the headquarters of the adult education centre (Volkshochschule), and the municipal library.

6 Müller'sches Volksbad
Named after Karl Müller – a private citizen who financed the project – this Art Nouveau bathing temple was built from 1897 to 1901 and is based on a design by Carl Hocheder. It was the first public pool in the city and is still one of the most beautiful today. The pool was strictly divided into a men's and a women's area: the men's pool has a barrel vault, the women's a large cupola. It is worth going for a swim just to see the interior and the facilities – which include therapeutic baths and a Roman steam room. Afterwards, drop by Café Stör. 📍 Map N5

Glasscherben District

Haidhausen used to lie beyond the city boundaries. A poor, rural village, it was referred to as a "Glasscherbenviertel" or "broken glass district." After 1871,

French reparation payments launched development in this area, which explains the names of streets in the district – such as Pariser Str., Sedanstr., Bordeauxplatz, and Metzstraße.

7 Deutsches Museum

Looking diagonally across from the Müller'sche Volksbad, the island seen in the Isar is home to the largest museum of technology in the world. Eighty per cent of the Deutsches Museum was destroyed in World War II; however, the doors to the collection were open again by 1948. Plan at least a full day to see the principal exhibits (see pp8–11).

8 Praterinsel & Alpine Museum

Immediately adjacent to the museum island are two other small islands, Praterinsel and Kalkinsel. The Alpine Museum, run by the German Alpine Association, is located on Praterinsel. It documents the history of mountaineering and features special exhibitions throughout the year. A teaching garden displays the various types of rock found in the Alpine regions. Old factories on Praterinsel – in the former Riemerschmid distillery – have been converted into a cultural centre with artists' studios. The ensemble is home to ongoing exhibitions and special events, such as the Comicfest. Tango fans gather in the courtyard on summer nights to enjoy this most sensual of dances.

9 Isar Bridges

From the bridges that cross the Isar you can enjoy wonderful views of the river and the cityscape. One of the most historically important is the Ludwigsbrücke, between Deutsches Museum and Müller'sches Volksbad. Henry the Lion ordered that the bridge, built in 1157–58 by the Bishop of Freising, be demolished (it was located near today's

Oberföhring). This meant the salt road was diverted – effectively usurping lucrative customs fees from the bishopric. Henry then ordered a new bridge built farther to the south – where today's Ludwigsbrücke stands. The new bridge, by which Benedictine monks had settled, was quickly surrounded by a thriving settlement later called München (literally, "near the monks").

10 Auer-Mühlbach District & Valentin-Haus

In the past, several small creeks ran through Munich, many of which were later filled in with concrete. One of the surviving creeks is the Auer Mühlbach, which is most visible east of the Isar. Just south of Ludwigsbrücke, this creek has formed a small island that is home to a restored ensemble of historic houses. Karl Valentin's birthplace is nearby at Zeppelinstraße 41. The building is not open to the public. 📍 Map N6

A Day on the Isar

Morning

📍 Setting off from the **Müller'sche Volksbad** after coffee or breakfast at **Café Stör**, turn left at the baths along the Isar to the to the footbridge, which leads to **Praterinsel**. Walk through the teaching garden of the **Alpine Museum** (no entrance fee) and then across the island – making a brief stop at the **cultural centre** – until you reach Maximiliansbrücke, which will take you directly to the **Maximilianeum**. Pass the monument and turn right onto Sckellstr. Follow this street to Wiener Platz, its market stalls, and the **Hofbräukeller**. A narrow lane – An der Kreppe – runs from Wiener Platz to several of the historic inns found in the Glasscherben district. The **Hofbräukeller** offers reasonably priced food and a beer garden in summer.

Afternoon

Return to Sckellstr., cross Einsteinstr., and walk along Maria-Theresa-Str., flanked by beautiful Foundation Period and Art Nouveau houses. To the left, the shops in the arcades in Maximilianstr. invite browsing. Regardless of the route you take, all paths will eventually lead you to the **Friedensengel**. Continue along for a few minutes until you reach **Villa Stuck**, the Art Nouveau museum *par excellence*. For a coffee break, try **Wiener's** (Ismaninger Str. 71a), close to the No. 18 tram stop. Take the tram back to the city centre (Karlsplatz). The ride will take you past some of the most beautiful spots in Munich.



Some 64 beer cellars were located along the Isar between Wiener Platz and Gasteig in the 1860s when the area was a brewery district.

This small church, first mentioned in historical records in 1313, is set on the banks of the Isar. The cloister is a mirror image of that at Altötting. ☎ *Innere Wiener Str. 1* • Map N5

The Lehel district, part of which is located in the Old Town, boasts many buildings from the Foundation Period. The streets around Thierschplatz are worth a stroll. ☎ Map M5

5 Sankt Lukas

St Luke's is known for its choral concerts (see p41). ☎ *Mariannenplatz 3* • Map N5

6 Monastery Church St Anna

This Rococo jewel in the Lehel district was built by Johann Michael Fischer, with

ornamentation by the Asam brothers. ☎ *St-Anna-Platz 21* • Map M4

7 Annakirche (St Anna)

A neo-Romanesque parish church, St Anna (1892) is the result of an architecture competition. ☎ *St-Anna-Platz 5* • Map N4

8 Upper Maximilianstraße & Maxmonument

The stretch between the old ring road (Altstadtring) and the Maximilianeum is flanked by ornate public buildings, including the Völkerkundemuseum and the Parliament of Upper Bavaria. A monument to Maximilian II stands at the centre of a roundabout. ☎ Map M4–N4

9 Staatliches Museum für Völkerkunde

Dating from 1859–65, this stately building in the style of the Maximilian era has been home to the Völkerkundemuseum (museum of ethnology) since 1926. The collection comprises over 300,000 objects from cultures beyond Europe (see p37).

10 Museums on Prinzregentenstraße

The upper stretch of Prinzregentenstraße is home to the Haus der Kunst, the National Gallery (Nationalmuseum), and the Schack Galerie (see pp36–7).

South & West

SOUTH AND WEST OF THE CENTRE, Munich has a suburban and exclusive residential character, with the exception of the Westend and Neuhausen districts. The latter, which lies to the north, includes Rotkreuzplatz – a square surrounded by beautiful tree-lined streets and bordered by late-19th-century buildings. In recent years, a vibrant bar and restaurant scene has evolved here. Multicultural Westend is far more colourful, and some sections, especially near the Alte Messe, are becoming trendy. Affluent residential areas lie in the south, in Harlaching and above all in Grünwald, where tram No. 25 offers a scenic ride through forests studded with impressive villas. Munich's Isar has been reclaimed in the south and once again follows its natural, meandering route. Beautiful paths beckon walkers alongside the river. You will find Munich's Isar beach, Flaucher, next to the popular Flaucher beer garden, and Tierpark Hellabrunn, the city's superb zoo.

1 Bavaria

Munich's tallest "female," Bavaria stands 18.5 m (59 ft) high. She holds an oak wreath in her hand, while a lion, Bavaria's heraldic beast, lies at her feet. Designed by Ludwig Schwanthaler and cast by Ferdinand von Miller, the statue (1840–50) was a masterpiece of technological achievement at the time, incorporating an observation platform in the head (see p23). Klenze's Ruhmeshalle, with busts honouring famous Bavarians, stands behind the colossal statue.

2 Alte Messe & Verkehrszentrum

Since the trade fair moved to Riem, the site of the Alte Messe (old fair) on Schwanthalerhöhe has been imaginatively developed. Elegant residences have been built on the former fairgrounds, and many of the former exhibition halls have been converted to cultural uses. The Verkehrszentrum, Deutsches Museum's excellent branch museum of transport, is housed here in three halls (see p11). Bavariapark, which lies nearby, was created by Ludwig I (see p39).

3 Westend

The many Turkish, Greek, and other ethnic stores and bars contribute greatly to the appeal of this area, which – at 40 per cent – has the largest foreign population in the city, fertile ground for the vibrant arts scene emerging here. More and more galleries and advertising agencies are setting up shop here every year. ☎ *Map D5*

4 Westpark

A smaller, west-end version of the Englischer Garten, Westpark was created for the fourth International Garden Show in 1983 and offers landscaped lawns and gardens, as well as picnic and barbecue facilities. Especially pretty is the Asian section with its Japanese garden, Thai pagoda, and other highlights (see p38).

Palmenhaus

An ideal sanctuary on a rainy day, this historic glass-and-iron greenhouse in the Botanical Gardens makes you feel as though you have been transported to a tropical paradise. Tall, slender palm trees overgrown with deep green vines create a jungle-like atmosphere.

5 Neuhausen

Rotkreuzplatz is the centre of this, Munich's second-largest urban district. Countless bars and restaurants line the streets surrounding the square. The many old but well-preserved low-rise apartment buildings found here make this a popular residential area. The adjacent Nymphenburg is more exclusive, with its large single-family homes and villas. Expansive green zones – the Botanical Gardens, Nymphenburg Park, and the Hirschgarten, which has the city's largest beer garden – enhance the quality of life in this district. 📍 *Map C3–D3*

6 Schloss Nymphenburg & Schlosspark

When Adelaide of Savoy gave birth to the heir to the throne, Max Emanuel, in 1663, her husband, Elector Ferdinand, celebrated the event both by donating funds to build the Theatinerkirche (see p40) but also by presenting his wife with their future summer residence at Schloss Nymphenburg. Built by the architect Barelli from 1664 onward, the Schloss ensemble underwent many expansions – in the end, the main building achieved an impressive length of 650 m (2,150 ft). The

park, originally a small decorative garden, evolved into a large landscaped park, interspersed with several pavilions: Badenburg, Pagodenburg, Amalienburg, and Magdalenenklause. For a special coffee break, visit the Schloss-café in the exotic Palmenhaus (see pp12–13).

7 Botanischer Garten

The Botanischer Garten (Botanical Gardens) were laid out beside Nymphenburg Park at the start of the 20th century. Over 14,000 plant species are cultivated here. Highlights include the Alpinum, an Alpine rock garden, the Arboretum, a spectacular display of rhododendron blossoms, the fern glen, and the greenhouses (see p38).

8 Schloss Blumenburg

A path with lovely views leads from Nymphenburg Park to Schloss Blumenburg. Situated amid meadows and fields, this former royal hunting lodge, built between 1435 and 1439 on an island in the Würm River by Duke Albrecht III, is rural in character.

A late Gothic chapel was added in 1488. Today, Blutenburg houses the Internationale Jugendbibliothek. The castle café is perfect for a coffee break. 📍 *Map A2*

9 Tierpark Hellabrunn
When Munich's Tierpark was founded in 1911, it was the first zoo in the world that arranged animal enclosures and pavilions according to continents and geographic origins. Highlights include a large aviary, a jungle tent with lions and tigers, and a new tropical forest and aquarium pavilion, where monkeys, snakes, and fish inhabit a jungle and coral-reef habitat. 📍 *Tierparkstr. 30 • Map E6*

10 Grünwald
This exclusive villa district lies to the south of the city. The 12th-century Castle Grünwald houses an archaeological collection that includes Roman artifacts. Geiseltasteig and Bavaria-Filmstadt are also located in this district (see p54). 📍 *Map S2*

A Day in Westend

Morning

🕒 Begin at the **Bavaria** (see p105). Climb up to the statue's head and enjoy the glorious view across Theresienwiese. Behind the Ruhmeshalle is the attractive **Bavariapark**. Walk through to its northern end and visit the impressive collection of the **Verkehrszentrum** (see p11), a branch museum of the Deutsches Museum, housed in three historic fair halls. Cross Heimeranstr. and follow Ganghoferstr. until it intersects with Tulbeckstr. Here, **Kao Kao** is a good choice for a coffee break (Tulbeckstr. 9). Stroll and browse in the multicultural district from Tulbeckstr. to Ganghoferstr., and then on to Gollierstr., which ends at Gollierplatz. For lunch, try **Rüen Thai** (Kazmaistr. 58), one of the best Thai restaurants in the city.

Afternoon

Ganghoferstr. and Pfeuferstr. will take you over a S-Bahn track bridge into the eastern section of **Westpark**. Stroll westward, past the mysterious "floating" granite sphere, to the marshland ponds and try to spot the frogs. Walking across a bridge over a major city motorway takes you into the western section of the park and its Thai pagoda, Japanese garden, rose garden with over 2,000 roses, and a manmade lake complete with stage at its centre for open-air music, theatre, and film in summer. For coffee or a pint of beer, stop in at the **See-Café** or the restaurant set in the tranquil surroundings of the rose garden.

Top 10 Best of the Rest

1 Flaucher
Munich's Isar beach *par excellence*. Every summer, sun worshippers flock to the gravel banks along the southern Isar, and many stop in at the pretty beer garden of the same name (*see p24*).

2 Floßlände
River rafts full of merry revellers land here in summer. Downstream, the Isar is being restored to its natural state as gravel islands, canal walls, and artificial embankments are removed. The waves and rapids at the Flößlände are a paradise for surfers, and an alternative to the frigid Eisbach near the Haus der Kunst. Nearby is the Floßlände pub and beer garden (Zentralländstraße 30), and the Asam-Schlössl.

3 Asam-Schlössl
Cosmas Damian Asam acquired this 17th-century building in 1724 and decorated the façade with frescoes. The small castle houses a restaurant with a beautiful garden. ☎ *Maria-Einsiedel-Str. 45*

4 South Isar Banks & Großhesseloher Bridge
Wonderful paths along the right banks of the Isar River are ideal for walking. To the south, the Großhesseloher Bridge leads across the Isar to the Waldwirtschaft pub and beer garden (Großhesselohe, Georg-Kalb-Straße 3). Farther along the river is a pub in the old Isartal train station (Großhesselohe, Kreuzeckstr. 23).

5 Marienklause
In 1865 Martin Achleiter, the lock-keeper at Auer-Mühlbach, built this timber chapel to give thanks for having survived floods and falling rocks in the gorge.

6 Gutshof Mengerschwaige
This 1803 manor house with beer garden – once the love nest of Lola Montez and Ludwig I – is an ideal destination at the end of a day's excursion. ☎ *München-Harlaching, Mengerschwaigstr. 4*

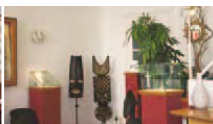
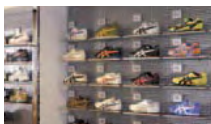
7 Geiseltasteig & Bavaria Filmstadt
Called "Hollywood on the Isar," Geiseltasteig is a historic film-studio complex, where productions for television and the big screen are made. Enjoy guided tours and stunt shows at Bavaria Filmstadt (*see p54*).

8 Schäftlarn Monastery
Founded in 762, this monastery with Baroque church is located between Grünwald and Wolfratshausen and has a popular small pub with beer garden. ☎ *Map S2*

9 Hirschgarten
Largest beer garden in the city, near Nymphenburg palace, with deer pens (*see p24*).

10 Nymphenburg
A beautiful residential neighbourhood, with villas flanking both sides of the boulevard leading to the palace.

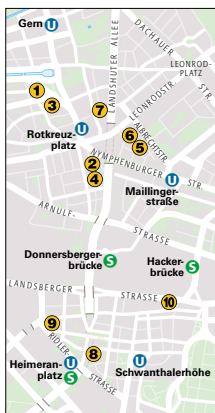

TOP 10 Around Munich

1 Schloss Schleißheim

Maximilian II Emanuel, the Elector, wanted to rival Versailles with the Neues Schloss (New Palace). Begun in 1701 based on plans by Enrico Zuccalli and completed in 1719 by Joseph Effner, the complex includes a hunting lodge and Schloss Lustheim, a small summer palace on the eastern edge of the Baroque park (see p39), also designed by Zuccalli.

The latter houses an important collection of early Meißner porcelain. Oberschleißheim is home to the Flugwerft Schleißheim (see p11).

2 Freising

The historic seat of a bishopric, the town is dominated by the cathedral and the bishop's residence, situated on a hill known as the *Mons Doctus* – Learned Mount. Designed as a Roman basilica with five aisles, the cathedral was completed in 1205 and

embellished from 1723 to 1724 by the Asam brothers, with stucco and stained-glass windows. Not to be missed are the Romanesque crypt and its famous *Bestiensäule*, a column elaborately carved with fabled beasts. Near the cathedral lies the former Benedictine monastery, Weihestephan. Today, it is a brewery – arguably the oldest in the world – with a wonderful beer garden. ☎ Map T1

3 Dachau

Set in the foothills along the Amper River, some 15 km (9 miles) north of Munich, Dachau is a small town built around a prominent palace – part Renaissance, part Baroque – which has an excellent restaurant. In 1933, the first Nazi concentration camp was set up here, now a place of remembrance – the KZ Gedenkstätte – one of the most frequented in Europe today. 4 Herrmannsdorfer Landwerkstätten

Near Glonn, 30 km (19 miles) southeast of Munich, the Herrmannsdorfer Landwerkstätten complex was completed in 1986. The centre produces, processes, and sells organic food products,



and features a gourmet restaurant and beer garden. Take the time for a walk to view works of art such as chimes and sculptures placed throughout the grounds. 📍 *Map T2*

5 Kloster Andechs

Situated on the eastern shore of Ammersee on a hill rising to a height of 200 m (650 ft), this monastery with its lovely Rococo church is one of the most important pilgrimage sites in Germany. Many, however, journey here to sample the famous monastery beer, served in the beer garden and pub. 📍 *Map R2*

6 Fürstenfeldbruck

Lining its elongated town square, Fürstenfeldbruck boasts a town hall and historic houses in the Baroque and neo-Classical style, and a Baroque abbey by Antonio Viscardi. Its stunning interior includes work by the Asam brothers, among others. 📍 *Map R2–S2*

7 Wolfratshausen & Rafting on the Isar

Wolfratshausen lies some 30 km (19 miles) south of Munich on the River Loisach and has a long central market street flanked by 17th- to 18th-century Upper Bavarian gabled town houses. This small town is the starting point for river-rafting tours to Munich, which launch at the Loisach bridge. These are cheerful excursions accompanied by music, picnics, and beer, down the rafting chutes of the Isar to the central landing area near Tierpark Hellabrunn. During the six-hour ride, passengers experience the largest chute in Europe with an 18-m- (60-ft-) drop in altitude. 📍 *Map S3*

8 Ammersee

Bavaria's third-largest lake, Ammersee lies in a glacial basin from the Ice Age surrounded by forested moraines. Under clear skies, there is a glorious view of the Alps. Its shoreline is studded with many small towns, offering activities such as sailing, rowing, surfing, cycling, hiking, and much more. 📍 *Map R2*

9 Osterseen

South of Lake Starnberg near Seeshaupt, travellers will find the delightful Osterseen, a group of some 20 small moorland lakes that are among the warmest in Bavaria. This is a perfect spot to go for swimming and peaceful walks in a nature reserve. 📍 *Map S3*

10 Landsberg am Lech

This is a city straight out of a picture book. Lining the triangular market square are beautiful town houses and a stunning stucco town hall. It was built around 1700 by the famous building master Dominikus Zimmermann, who also served as mayor of Landsberg (1749–54). The 36-m- (125-ft-) high Bayertor, dating from around 1425, is one of the most impressive medieval city gates in Bavaria. 📍 *Map R2*

Garmisch-Partenkirchen & Zugspitze

DEEP GREEN MEADOWS, snow-capped mountains, steep gorges carved out by streams, ancient monasteries, and old houses with colourful painted façades – in this region, Bavaria looks like a picture postcard come to life. Germany's highest peak, the towering Zugspitze (2,950 m/9,700 ft), soars into the sky here. Locals also refer to the region encompassing Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Oberammergau, and Murnau – set in the Alps and the foothills against the impressive backdrop of the Wetterstein massif – as Werdenfelser Land. The Alpine foothills of Bavaria offer cultural highlights, such as King Ludwig II's Schloss Linderhof, and Münter house in Murnau, as well as awesome natural beauty, in places such as Eibsee, Partnachklamm, and Murnauer Moos. The full spectrum of attractions awaits summer and winter visitors. Excellent ski resorts around Garmisch and on Zugspitz itself draw hordes of visitors in winter. A day excursion by car is the most comfortable way of exploring this area. However, there are excellent links by rail and bus between Munich and the main attractions in the Zugspitz region.

1 Garmisch-Partenkirchen Located at the base of the Wetterstein massif and the Zugspitze, the capital of Werdenfelser Land is one of the most popular tourist attractions in Germany. Garmisch-Partenkirchen, which has a population of 30,000, is chiefly known as a winter sports resort. The Winter Olympics were held here in 1936. In summer, the town draws just as many visitors as a spa town and is an ideal base for mountain hiking and excursions into the region. Map R4

2 Zugspitze One of the best ways to enjoy Zugspitze is to take a round trip from the base of the mountain on the mountain train and cable cars. In Garmisch, the journey begins on a funicular, which takes you to the Schneeferner glacier on the Zugspitzplatt. Here you switch to a cable car, which ascends to the summit (2,950 m/9,700 ft). The observation platform affords a spectacular panoramic vista – in clear weather, all the way to the Dolomites in Italy. Take the Eibsee cable car on your return trip down to the valley – you'll be treated once again to wonderful views of Eibsee, Garmisch-Partenkirchen, and Werdenfelser Land. Map R4

3 Eibsee Embedded in the rocky landscape of the Zugspitz massif, the deep blue waters of Eibsee lie nearly 1,000 m (3,300 ft) above sea level. The lake formed after a powerful rock avalanche created a deep crater. A walk around the lake takes roughly two hours. The shore is dotted with many scenic bays and idyllic beaches, which are perfect for taking a break or – in summer – a dip in the lake. Map R4

4 Partnachklamm One of the most impressive gorges in the Bavarian Alps, the Partnachklamm is some 700 m (2,300 ft) long; the rock face along its sides reaches a height of nearly 100 m (330 ft). A short walk from the Olympic ski-jump stadium in Garmisch will take you to the entrance to the gorge. Map R4 • open year-round

5 Höllentalklamm Located near Garmisch at Grainach, this gorge is entirely different in character to Partnachklamm. The Hammersbach stream tumbles through a one-km- (half-mile-) long gorge down into the valley. Challenging hiking paths lead through lit tunnels. Hiking boots and surefootedness are absolutely essential for an excursion in this gorge. Map R4 • closed Nov–May

The Zugspitzplatt is a glacier region left over from the ice age and includes the receding Schneeferner glacier, where there is always snow.

Königshaus am Schachen

A post-and-beam house was built on the Schachenalm, a lovely mountain pasture 1,900 m (6,200 ft) above sea level, in 1869 to serve as a refuge for Ludwig II during his mountain excursions. The ground floor is panelled in knotty pine, while the entire upper floor is given over to the Maurische Saal, a Moorish banquet hall: its colourful stained-glass windows, candelabra, and peacock feathers reflect the fascination with the Orient typical of the era.

6 Kloster Ettal

Founded by Emperor Ludwig the Bavarian in 1330, the abbey now houses a boarding school. The domed structure of the abbey church was reconstructed in Bavarian Rococo style after a fire. Ettal monastery produces famous herbal liqueurs – dry (green in colour), sweet (amber), and bitter (brown). ☎ Map R4

7 Schloss Linderhof

Located in the Graswangtal on a beautiful tributary of the River Ammer, Schloss Linderhof lies 10 km (6 miles) outside Ettal (see p30). ☎ Ettal, Linderhof 12

8 Oberammergau

This historic spa town is world-renowned for its passion plays – lay theatre performed by

locals. Most of Oberammergau's population participates in mounting the event once a decade. This picturesque town is also noted for its façade frescoes. Fran Seraph Zwinck (1748–92), Germany's most famous façade fresco painter, was born here.

9 Murnau am Staffelsee

Painters Wassily Kandinsky (1866–1944) and Gabriele Münter (1877–1962) and writer Ödön von Horváth (1901–38) worked and lived in this picturesque town. Follow in the footsteps of the Blue Rider art group – the Münter-Haus

Baroque & Rococo in Pfaffenwinkel

PFAFFENWINKEL IS A CLASSIC ALPINE foothill region. *Gently sloping hills and verdant pastures alternate with forests, fens, and small lakes. Geographically, the region is bounded by the Lech, Ammer, and Loisach rivers, and by the southern end of Ammersee and Starnberger See, reaching all the way to the Ammergau mountains. It is known for its abundance of Baroque monasteries and Rococo churches, such as Benediktbeuren and Wieskirche, characterized by the style developed at the world-renowned stucco school at Wessobrunn. The name of the region comes from the words “Pfaffen,” which is local dialect for priest, and “Winkel” for corner. Natural beauty abounds in Pfaffenwinkel, with its gorges such as Ammerschlucht, romantic mountain lakes such as the deep, dark blue Walchensee, high mountains with lovely vistas, and lonely fens. By car, the region is reached from Munich via motorway A95 or regional roads B2 and B11. There are also excellent rail and bus links.*

1 Kloster Wessobrunn
In the 17th and 18th centuries, Wessobrunn was the centre of the art of stuccowork. Masterbuilders of monasteries and master stucco-workers trained here, including Joseph Schmuzer (1683–1752) and Dominikus Zimmermann (1685–1766), who went on to build and decorate many of the monasteries and churches in southern Germany in the Baroque manner. Wessobrunn stucco became famous around the world through the work of the Schmuzer and Zimmermann families. Part of the monastery, including the gallery in the Fürstentrakt and Tassilo hall, is open to the public.

One of the oldest German-language manuscripts, the *Wessobrunner Prayer*, dating to around 800, was once held in the monastery's library. 2 Hoher Peißenberg
At an elevation of nearly 1,000 m (3,300 ft), the Hohe Peißenberg is not only the

geographical centre of Pfaffenwinkel, it also affords one of the most beautiful panoramic vistas in the Alpine foothills – the entire mountain range and the gently rolling hills and sparkling lakes at the foot of the Alps lie before you. Meteorological data have been recorded on the Hohe Peißenberg since 1781 – at first by Augustine choirmasters from nearby Rottenbach monastery (see p122). 3 Kloster Steingaden
In 1147, the Premonstratensians built this monastery and abbey under Duke Welf VI. It was the most important centre of monastic life in Bavaria during that era. Surviving elements include the Romanesque cloisters with late Gothic vaulting and a Romanesque basilica, whose exterior form has been preserved. 4 Wieskirche Known simply as the Wieskirche, the pilgrimage church Zum Gegeißelten Heiland in der Wiese near Steingaden (1746–54) is renowned as a prime example of German Rococo. It represents the work of Dominikus Zimmermann, the famous architect and stuccowork master from Wessobrunn, at his peak. 5 Kloster Benediktbeuern Benediktbeuern (739) is one of the oldest monasteries in the foothills of the Alps. Karl the

Wessobrunn Stuccowork

In the 17th and 18th centuries, the most important stuccowork masters came from around the monastery at Wessobrunn. Johann Schmuzer (1642–1701) is regarded as the founder of the Wessobrunn school. The Schmuzer, Zimmermann, and Feichtmayr families spread its fame throughout Europe. Stucco masterpieces are found in the monasteries and abbeys of Wessobrunn, Ettal, Rottenbuch, Weingarten, Zwiefalten, Ottobeuren, Bad Wörishofen, and Steingaden.

Great's acquisition of the arm relic of St Boniface elevated the monastery to the most important cult site of the saint in German-speaking countries. Built between 1669 and 1679, the Baroque monastery is still intact today. Kaspar Feichmayr of Weilheim built the church with twin towers in the Italian late Baroque style. Famous in its time, the holdings at the mon-

astery library included the *Carmina Burana* – the most important collection of medieval minstrel songs. The manuscript dates back to the 13th century and is now housed at the Bayerische Staatsbibliothek.

Following secularization, the monastery complex was used for a time as a glassworks. At the beginning of the 19th century, it housed an institute for optics led by the famous optician and physician Joseph von Fraunhofer (1787–1826), who discovered the waves in the solar spectrum that were named after him. Today, the monastery accommodates institutes of pedagogy and theology of the Silesian Order.

6 Kloster Rottenbuch Founded in 1073 by Duke Welf IV, this monastery for Augustine Canons survives to this day. It features a rare blend of Romanesque, Gothic, and Rococo architectural styles. 7 Kloster Schäftlarn

Benedictine monks founded a monastery at this site as far back as 762. The buildings seen at Schäftlarn today were built in 1702–07 after designs by Giovanni A Viscardi. Consecrated in 1760, the abbey is considered a masterpiece of Bavarian Rococo. Much of the stucco decoration is the work of the famous Zimmermann family. The beautiful beer garden attached to the monastery is perfect for a small repast. Map S3

8 Kochel am See

At the centre of this popular lakeside resort stands a monument to the legendary blacksmith Balthes, a hero of the Bavarian peasant uprising against Austria in 1705. This was also where the painter Franz Marc lived and worked in the early 20th century. His home has been converted into a museum of his works and those of his friends in the Blue Rider group. 9 Kochelsee & Walchensee

About half of Kochelsee is surrounded by steep hills. Covering an area of just under 6 sq km (2.5 sq miles), the lake is 66 m (215 ft) deep in some parts. Excellent hiking paths run along its shores. A short distance to the south, and some 200 m (655 ft) higher, lies the blue-green

Walchensee. Covering 16 sq km (6.5 sq miles) and with a depth of up to 190 m (650 ft), it is the largest and deepest mountain lake in Germany and, in summer, a wind-surfer's paradise. A cable car affording a glorious view of both lakes runs up to Herzogstand (1,750 m/5,700 ft).

10 Schongau

This picturesque town is located on a hill on the river Lech. A historic town wall with walkways, towers, and gates gives Schongau a medieval air. Altenstadt, 3 km (2 miles) to the north, was previously Schongau's old centre before the town spread. It boasts the Michaelskirche, the finest Romanesque vaulted basilica in Upper Bavaria. Containing, among other treasures, a carved Romanesque font, the church was built in 1200. Map R3 • www.schongau.de

Lakes & Towns in Upper Bavaria

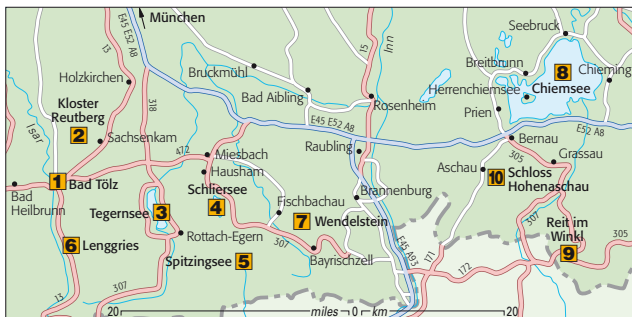
WITH ITS GENTLE MORAINES HILLS and rugged mountains created during the Ice Age, peaceful moor lakes and rapid mountain streams, and picturesque towns and villages, the sub-Alpine region of Upper Bavaria is full of natural beauty. This is especially true of Tölzer Land and the Chiemgau, both of which are true havens for holiday-makers. For sports enthusiasts there is skiing, hiking, cycling, and windsurfing in places such as Reit im Winkl and on Spitzingsee. Culture buffs can visit ancient monasteries and Baroque churches, among them Frauenchiemsee and Hohenaschau. Weekend-trippers have an abundance of excursions to choose from – for example Kloster Reutberg or Tegernsee – and spa-lovers can recuperate and relax in the therapeutic Kneipp water treatments offered at spa towns such as Bad Tölz. From Munich, Tölzer Land and Chiemgau are reached by car via A8 and regional roads B318 and B472; there are also excellent rail and bus links to the region.

1 Bad Tölz

Located where the Isar River surfaces from an Alpine valley and flows into the sub-Alpine foothills, Bad Tölz is a popular spa and winter resort. On the right side of the river lies the picturesque old town, with its impressive Marktstraße lined with ornate stucco-work façades, mottos, and frescoes. Alpmare, one of Germany's largest waterparks, is favoured by spa guests and fun-seekers alike. A big annual attraction is the Leonhardifahrt, on 6 November, a procession in honour of St Leonhard, patron saint of horses. It is one of the largest processions in traditional costume in Upper Bavaria.

2 Kloster Reutberg

Situated atop a small hill near Bad Tölz, this monastery was founded by the Sisters of the Franciscan Order in the 17th century. The Baroque abbey is open to the public. It is also worth a trip for the spectacular view of the Alps from the monastery's beer garden. For a pleasant stroll head to the romantic Kirchsee nearby, a good spot for summer swimming.

3 Tegernsee

Framed by wooded mountains, Tegernsee is one of the largest mountain lakes in Upper Bavaria, with an area of 9 sq km (3.5 sq miles) and a length of 6 km (3.5 miles). Its beautiful setting and easy accessibility – it is only 50

km (30 miles) from Munich – have made the lake one of the most popular excursion and holiday destinations since the notion of taking summer breaks began in the 19th century. Tegernsee, Bad Wiessee, and Rottach-Egern form a picturesque chain of towns on the shores of the lake and attract visi-

4 Schliersee

Although less famous than Tegernsee, Schliersee, on the edge of the Alps, is just as attractive a lake. Its appeal lies mainly in the beauty of the surrounding mountains. One of the principal sights in the spa town of Schliersee is the St Sixtus church, with its 18th-century frescoes by Johann B Zimmermann. For an attractive country walk, take the 7 km (4 mile) path around the lake. 📍 Map T3

5 Spitzingsee
Wildly romantic, the Spitzingsee (1,100 m/3,600 ft) attracts mountain hikers in summer. In winter, skiers enjoy 30 km (19 miles) of groomed ski runs, serviced by 18 cable cars and ski lifts. This is Germany's largest continuous ski region. Map T4

6 Lenggries
Located on the Isar River in the Isarwinkel area, Lenggries is a health and winter resort. It is a perfect departure point for excursions into the mountains, such as to Brauneck's summit, which can be reached by foot or by cable car. 7 Wendelstein near Bayrischzell

Altes Schloss, Chiemsee

Around 1130, an Augustine Canons' seminary was built on the foundations of an eighth-century Benedictine abbey at Herrenchiemsee. Renovated in the Baroque style, it closed in 1803. Ludwig II purchased the island in 1873, built the Neues Schloss, and converted the seminary into private apartments – the Altes Schloss. An exhibit in the seminary documents the constitution of the German Federal Republic, signed and ratified here in 1948.

8 Chiemsee

9 Reit im Winkl
This resort near the Austrian border lies in a snowbelt, and so offers some of the best skiing in the Bavarian Alps. Excellent ski runs are maintained near the Winklmoosalm (1,150m/3,800 ft), home of Olympian skier Rosi Mittermaier. Map U3

10 Schloss Hohenaschau
Castle Hohenaschau dates from the 12th century. Renaissance (16th century) and late Baroque (17th century) additions are the chapel and the charity house – Prientalmuseum. TOP 10 Along the Inn River

1 Rott am Inn
Perched high on the banks above the Inn River is the abbey of Sts Marinus und Anianus, a masterpiece of Bavarian Rococo. Between 1758 and 1763 Johann Michael Fischer rebuilt the church, incorporating the Romanesque east towers into his design. The soaring interior is impressive with its daring spatial design and fine decoration. 📍 *Map T2*

2 Schloss Amerang
Situated on a rise surrounded by deep natural ditches, the palace lies just south of the town of the same name. From the outside, the palace looks like a medieval fortress. Its large cloistered courtyard dates from the second half of the 16th century. Noted for its excellent acoustics, the courtyard is a regular venue for summer concerts. 📍 *Map U2*

3 Kloster Attel
Built in 1715, this Baroque church belonging to the Benedictine abbey is well worth a visit. A Roman memorial stone from AD 204 is incorporated in the imposing church entrance. Limburg, the seat of the Hallgrafen dynasty, was formerly located near the monastery. By relocating its principality to Wasserburg in 1137, the family caused the cultural flowering of that town. 📍 *Map T2*

4 Wasserburg
Wasserburg benefits from its location on a spoon-shaped promontory in the Inn River. Typical of the Inn region, the old town is distinguished by wide, open squares lined with arcaded, leafy walkways. Its streets are lined with old houses with colourful painted façades, pretty bay windows, and stepped gables. All these elements give Wasserburg an Italian air. For a stunning view of the old town, head to the *Schöne Aussicht* (beautiful vista) lookout on the opposite side of the river. A wonderful path lined with works of art runs along this stretch of the Inn. 📍 *Map U2*

5 Gars am Inn
This former Augustine Canons' seminary, with its early Baroque abbey, was built by Gaspare and Domenico Zucalli between 1661 and 1690. The interior is decorated with lavish stuccowork. 📍 *Map U2*



6 Au am Inn

The Au monastery, founded by the Augustine Canons in the 12th century, occupies an idyllic spot on a bend in the Inn River. It was reconstructed after a fire in the 18th century. The former library, decorated with frescoes, is a highlight of the complex, which is now also home to a restaurant with an attractive beer garden. Map U2

7 Mühldorf

This picturesque town, which lies on a peninsula in the Inn River, was an important trading post during the Middle Ages. The old town is defined by the 500-m- (1,650-ft-) long market square flanked by houses typical of towns along this river – those with romantic arcades and stepped gables. City gates mark the ends of the square. The Nagelschmiedturm, with its Romanesque basement, is worth seeing. Map U2

8 Altötting

Bavaria's oldest pilgrimage site, Altötting lies on a hill near the right bank of the Inn River. A small, octagonal chapel with a central aisle, the Holy Chapel dates from 750. It was subsequently expanded by a nave. In the interior, a silver tabernacle set into a shell-lined niche on the eastern end contains the votive image of "Our Dear Lady of Altötting" – a revered Black Madonna (c.1300) carved from linden wood. Another feature of interest is the panorama re-creating the view from Golgotha in Jerusalem at the time of the Crucifixion, which is located in a domed structure east of the town centre. This is a monumental

depiction of the Passion of Christ, with life-size figures in the foreground representing the stations of the cross. Map V2

9 Burghausen

Burghausen experienced its heyday in the Middle Ages when it was a centre of the salt trade and, occasionally, the Wittelsbachs' second seat of government.

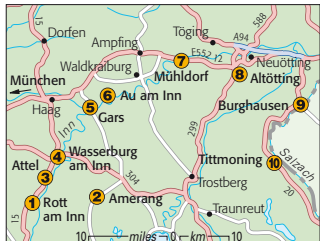
The enormous castle, one of Germany's largest, is fascinating. Built in 1255, it was added to and became a fortress at the end of the 15th century. Other highlights include the Gothic Jakobskirche, the 16th-century town hall, and the 18th-century Schutzengelskirche, all on the market square. 10 Tittmoning

This is one of the most beautiful small towns in eastern Bavaria. After the salt trade collapsed, the town succeeded in preserving its historic image. Two city gates lead to a trapezoidal town square with stuccoed houses. A 13th-century castle set on the hill above the town gives a fine view of the surrounding countryside. TOP 10 Planning Your Trip

1 When to Go

Munich is worth visiting any time of year. The city shines in spring, summer, and autumn, but winter also offers many delights, such as cultural events and, of course, the ski slopes in the Alps.

2 Climate

January can bring glorious blue skies to Munich; April is often fickle, and May can be either summery and warm, or quite cold. Beer garden season officially begins in May. The many lakes near Munich are warmest in August. Autumn often has summer-like temperatures, perfect for walks in the countryside.

3 Information

The official tourist offices are excellent sources of information, both in Munich and in towns such as Garmisch-Partenkirchen. They mail information on request.

4 Internet

Most Munich attractions, institutions, and events are posted on the Internet. Simply enter a subject word into a search engine of your choice, add the specification "Munich."

5 Travel Insurance

EU members should carry with them an E111 slip from their insurance

company, which may entitle them to free or reduced-cost medical treatment. Before travelling, ask your insurance agent what is covered; you may wish to purchase additional insurance. Visitors from non-EU countries are advised to have comprehensive insurance in place before travelling. This should cover accidents, illness, and theft. Cancellation insurance may also be worthwhile.

6 Visas & Passports

Citizens of countries belonging to the European Union, and of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and the US do not require a visa to visit Germany as long as their stay does not exceed 90 days. Visitors from South Africa will need a visa. Citizens of many EU countries do not require a passport, just a national identity card with photograph to enter Germany. Given heightened security measures over the past few years, it is a good idea to carry photo identification at all times when travelling in Germany.

7 Customs

Visitors from non-EU countries who are 17 years and older may import up to 200 cigarettes and one litre of spirits or two litres of wine. The importation of firearms is prohibited. For EU citizens there are no customs restrictions if the goods are for personal use.

8 Maps

Free city maps of Munich are available at the local tourist bureaus. Maps of the surrounding region, including southern Bavaria, are available at bookshops, downtown department stores, and petrol stations.

9 Driving Licence

EU citizens and visitors from Western countries need only their national driving licences; citizens from other countries will require an international driving licence.

10 Planning Your Stay

The main sights of Munich can generally be seen in one week. Plan for a longer stay if you wish to make excursions to Neuschwanstein, the Alps, or the picturesque towns and lakes in Upper Bavaria.

1 Munich Airport

Franz-Joseph-Strauß Airport, recently expanded with the addition of Terminal 2, is a major air-travel hub. Most international and domestic airlines pass through here. It features a business and restaurant complex, doctors' offices, a MediCare centre, and the nearby AirportClinic M, a small hospital. ☎ *Flight info: (089) 97 52 13 13*

3 Connections into the City

Munich airport, located on A92, lies 28 km (17 miles) outside the city. The S-Bahn, whose lines S1 (rear carriages marked *Flughafen*) and S8 provide direct access to and from the airport, will take you to Marienplatz in 37 minutes, while an airport coach to the central railway station takes about 45 minutes, as does a taxi.

4 Arriving by Train

Whether you are arriving from Berlin, Paris, Amsterdam, Rome, or

Budapest – trains arriving from all directions pull in to the Hauptbahnhof, Munich's central railway station. There are as many as three daily direct rail links to the major European capitals. Southern Bavaria is well served by an extensive railway network.

5 German Trains

German trains and railway lines are operated by the Deutsche Bahn AG. Long-distance routes are served by InterCity Express trains (ICE), InterCity (IC) and EuroCity (EC) trains; the network also runs Interregio (IR) and Regional Express (RE) for shorter distances. The S-Bahn, the suburban trains, link the city to towns and communities within a radius of about 50 km (30 miles). If you decide to travel by rail, you can save considerably by booking ahead. ☎ www.bahn.de

6 Ostbahnhof

Some InterCity (IC) and EuroCity (EC) trains stop at the Ostbahnhof. This railway station is also the departure point for trains to the south and east, and for car trains to northern Germany and Italy.

7 Arriving by Coach

Many long-distance coaches depart and arrive at the central coach

terminal, Zentralen Omnibusbahnhof (ZOB) next door to the Hauptbahnhof. The most popular routes are operated by Eurolines and Deutsche Touring GmbH. 8 Arriving by Car

Six motorways lead into Munich from six directions (A8 Salzburg, A96 Lindau, A8 Stuttgart, A9 Berlin, A95 Garmisch-Partenkirchen, and A92 Deggendorf). The Autobahn ring road enables you to bypass Munich in part. If you want to drive into the city, you will need to take two additional ring roads: the Mittlerer Ring, and the Altstadttring.

9 Rental Cars

All major rental car operators – including Avis, Europcar, Hertz, and the Munich firm Sixt – have offices at the airport or the central railway station.

10 Rules of the Road

Speed limits within Munich city limits are 50 km/h (30 mph). Seat belts must be worn at all times, and children under 12 must travel in the back seat.

TOP 10 Getting Around Munich

1 U-Bahn

The underground rail network, U-Bahn, runs modern and comfortable cars. Nearly all U-Bahn stations are wheelchair accessible. Eight lines are currently in operation within city boundaries. By 2006, U-Bahn line U6 to the new Allianz Arena in Fröttmaning will be completed. When boarding a train, check the direction panel as well as the destination to ensure you board the correct train.

2 S-Bahn

Radiating in all directions from the city centre, the suburban rail network, S-Bahn, is ideal for excursions to towns, lakes, and other destinations in the surrounding countryside. The S-Bahn is also an important urban network: its central stretch from Hackerbrücke to Ostbahnhof (via Hauptbahnhof, Stachus, and Marienplatz) offers transfer points to the U-Bahn, buses, and trams. The S-Bahn (S1 and S8) is also an inexpensive and fast link between the city centre and the airport. Most S-Bahn stations are wheelchair accessible.

3 Tram

Usually less crowded than S- and U-Bahn trains, the trams in Munich are also an attractive alternative because they allow passengers to see the city as they travel. Route Nos. 18 and 19, running through Old Town, are an

good choice for inexpensive sightseeing. The No. 25 route to Grünwald is particularly scenic. Most tram cars are equipped with ramps for wheelchair access.

4 Bus

The city's buses are suitable when travelling short distances. Most provide links to S- and U-Bahn stations. Bus No. 100 runs past several museums (see p36). Specially marked buses have ramps for wheelchair access.

5 Tickets

All public transit operated by the MVV (Munich Traffic and Tariff Association) use the same tickets, which can be purchased at dispensers at U- and S-Bahn stations, and on trams and buses. The city and its environs are divided into four zones, and ticket prices depend on how many zones you travel through. You can choose from several kinds of tickets: multi-ride (*Streifenkarten*), single-ride (*Einzelkarten*), and day (*Tageskarten*). Weekly and monthly passes are also available. The best choice for visitors is to buy a day ticket or to take advantage of special rates, for example, the München Welcome Card (see p138), sold at tourist offices in the town hall, the central railway station, the airport, and other locations. Before boarding the train, you must stamp your ticket

in a franking machine, usually located at the top of the stairs leading down to the platform.

6 Car

Driving in Munich can be harrowing. Traffic is often heavy, rush-hour traffic jams are frequent, and local drivers often make quick decisions. Street parking is difficult to find and car parks are expensive.

7 Bicycle

Munich is a bicycle-friendly city, with many cycling paths. Bicycles can be rented at a reasonable price. ☎ *Call a Bike*, (07 00) 05 22 55 22 • *Mike's Bike Tours*, (089) 25 54 39 87

8 On Foot

Exploring Old Town is best done on foot. Other areas easy to explore on foot are Schwabing, Haidhausen, the Isar banks, Westend, and Neuhausen.

9 Taxis

There are several free city magazines, usually available in pubs, bars, and boutiques. Most list cinema and theatre events, and information on current events. *In München* is the longest

running and most informative; another established city magazine is *go*.

8 Media

Munich is said to be second only to New York City in publishing; it is also an important media centre: many radio and television stations – public and private – are headquartered here. The largest daily newspapers, the *Süddeutsche Zeitung* (SZ) and the *Münchner Merkur*, print local news and events sections, as does the popular press, *AZ* (*Abendzeitung*) and *TZ* (*Tageszeitung*). Bayerische Rundfunk, the local public broadcasting station, broadcasts on five channels; several private stations broadcast news, and music.

1 Banks

Most German and many international banks have branches in Munich. Banks are generally open from 8:30am to 4pm Monday to Friday, although hours can vary depending on the day of the week. The main branches of the larger German banks are as follows: Bayerische Landesbank, Brienner Straße 18; Commerzbank, Maximiliansplatz 19; Deutsche Bank, Promenadeplatz 15; Dresdner Bank, and Promenadeplatz 7. Two Reisebank branches, one at the Hauptbahnhof and one at the airport, have longer opening hours.

2 Exchange

For visitors from other European countries, the days of currency exchange are a thing of the past. All non-EU travellers can exchange foreign currency into Euros at exchange bureaus, for example, at the railway station, or banks. Several currency exchange machines are available downtown. A note of caution: fees and exchange rates vary, tending to be highest at hotels.

3 ATMs

Bank machines are widely available throughout the city, and even in smaller towns. You can withdraw money by credit card with your PIN, or by using any card showing a global banking symbol, such as Cirrus. ATMs are accessible 24 hours.

4 Credit Cards

All hotels, with the exception of small bed-and-breakfast establishments, most department stores, and boutiques, as well as restaurants accept major credit cards. Cash is still required in smaller establishments and most beer gardens. Posted outside the entrances to restaurants and stores are the logos of the credit cards accepted within.

5 Travellers' Cheques

Travellers' cheques are a safe method of payment, although they are only accepted at large hotels and major department stores. Otherwise, you can exchange travellers' cheques for cash at a bank.

6 Payphones

Deutsche Telekom operates all public payphones, which accept coins, phone cards, and sometimes credit cards, although coin pay phones are being phased out. At some high-tech telephone booths you can make phone calls, surf the Internet, and send and receive e-mail. Phone cards are sold at post offices, tobacconists, and in some supermarkets.

7 Mobile Phones

T-Mobile, Vodafone, and O2 provide service through most of Bavaria. A note of caution: reception may still be difficult in some remote areas. The use of mobile phones on all public transit is allowed, although reception may not be good. Check with your mobile phone provider before leaving home to find out if your phone can be used in Germany.

8 Post Offices

Most post offices are open from Monday to Friday, 8am to 6pm, and Saturday from 8am to noon. You can also buy stamps at automated dispensers and in some stationery shops. The yellow letterboxes have two letter slots – one for mail within the city and the other for outbound mail.

9 Internet

All museums, and many hotels and restaurants are listed on the Internet. Major hotels, and some smaller hotels, offer Internet access to their guests, but there is often a fee.

10 Internet Cafés

In Munich you will find many Internet cafés, including one that caters to gays and lesbians (see p63). The easyInternet-Café at Bahnhofplatz 1, across from the central railway station is open 24 hours.

10 Security & Health

1 Emergency Numbers

The emergency number for fire department, rescue, or ambulance is 112. For police emergencies, dial 110. In addition, there are the following emergency and help lines:

2 Hospitals

If you are visiting from the EU (European Union), paramedic, hospital, and doctors' services are generally covered by your national health insurance. If you are visiting from other countries, it is advisable to take out travel insurance before starting your trip.

3 Doctors & Dentists

For everything other than acute emergencies, visitors are advised to consult doctors or dentists during standard clinic hours. Addresses of doctors and specialists are listed in the *Gelbe Seiten* (yellow pages). Services are covered for EU citizens upon presentation of the E111 insurance form.

4 Pharmacies

Pharmacies are identified with a large red "A" – which stands for the

German word for pharmacy (*Apothek*). Most are open until 7pm or 8pm. After 8pm, every pharmacy posts the name and address of the nearest pharmacy that is open late. You can also call the pharmacy emergency line. ☎ (089) 55 17 71

5 Crime

Munich has one of the lowest crime rates not only in Germany but in all of Europe, and Bavaria has the highest rate of crime-solving in Germany. In other words, you can feel perfectly safe during your vacation in Munich; simply observe standard precautions such as avoiding parks or outlying areas at night, especially on your own.

6 Pickpockets

Crowds are magnets for gangs of pickpockets everywhere, and the same is true in Munich. Be vigilant in crowded U-Bahn or S-Bahn cars, or when walking through crowded areas such as the pedestrian zone – and especially the Oktoberfest.

8 Mountain Safety

If you are making an excursion into the mountains, be sure to have appropriate footwear and clothing. For hikes, you should obtain precise route and weather information ahead of time. You should avoid hiking alone. In winter, it is vital to pay attention to avalanche warnings. The emergency number 112 is also used for the Alps throughout Europe – mobile phone reception is usually good.

9 Road & Traffic Information

10 Women Travelling Alone

Women travelling on their own will feel perfectly comfortable and safe in Munich if they observe normal precautions. Ask for a room near the elevator in your hotel if you are safety-conscious, and do not let strangers into your hotel room. Some parking lots have reserved, well-lit, parking spots for women.

10 Families, Seniors & the Disabled

1 Discounts

Families with children are entitled to a number of discounts. Entrance fees to many sights and for sports events at Olympiapark are reduced for both children and seniors. The München Welcome Card covers all travel by public transit in the city and up to a 50 per cent discount for many tourist attractions. One- and three-day cards are sold at the tourist office's information kiosks at Marienplatz, Hauptbahnhof, and the airport.

2 Children's Programmes

Munich's tourist office, the Fremdenverkehrsamt München, will provide you with information on the many children's summer programmes offered by the city. 3 Family-Friendly Restaurants

Seniors enjoy many discounts as well as a wide variety of special sporting and hiking activities, guided tours, excursions, and social events.

5 Cobblestones

Several areas in Munich still feature original cobblestone paving, which may be a challenge for wheelchair users.

6 Public Transit (MVV)

Most S- and U-Bahn stations have been made wheelchair accessible, as have most trams. Special low-axle buses are marked with a disabled sign to indicate that they are equipped with a ramp for access. Easy-access public toilets are found most readily in public transit stations. Details are provided in the MVV brochure *Barrier-free*, available at MVV ticket kiosks.

7 Guided Tours for the Disabled

City tours for the hearing impaired, with guides trained in international sign language, are organized by the Fremdenverkehrsamt München. Operators such as the *Weis(s)er Stadtvogel* and *Stat-treisen München e.V.* also

9 Easy-Access Hotels

Unfortunately, there are few hotels in Munich that are truly equipped for the needs of wheelchair users. Many hotels occupy historic buildings, which are difficult to retrofit. Be sure to check ahead when booking a room.

10 Useful Information

1 **Weißwurst after 12 Noon**

In the past, *Weißwurst* was eaten as a late or second breakfast. Highly perishable, these white veal sausages were kept in large pots of boiling water from early morning until noon. This led to an unspoken rule: never eat *Weißwurst* after noon. Although this is no longer necessary thanks to modern cooking methods, the old tradition is still observed by many locals.

2 **Bockbeer**

Beer temptations can reach a peak during the *Starkbier* (bockbeer) season, but you should remember that *Starkbier* has an alcohol content ranging from 6.5 to over 7.5 per cent. Enjoy the tasty brews – just be sure not to overindulge.

3 **Bavarian Words**

Even if you know German, the local dialect is still quite a challenge. There are a few key expressions: rolls, called *Brötchen* elsewhere, are called *Semmeln* here; *Weizenbier* (wheat beer) is called *Weißbier*, and a *Radler* could be either a cyclist or a shandy, a mixture of beer and lemonade.

4 **Cyclists & Rollerbladers**

Munich is a wonderful city for cyclists, and many locals jump on their bikes in summer. Unfortunately, there are always a few

bad apples. As a pedestrian, you should watch out for cyclists barrelling along pavements, sometimes even going in the wrong direction down a one-way street, or turning sharp corners quickly. The same is true of some rollerbladers.

5 **Alcohol at the Wheel**

It goes without saying that beer is very tempting for cyclists barrelling along pavements, sometimes even going in the wrong direction down a one-way street, or turning sharp corners quickly. The same is true of some rollerbladers.

6 **Rush Hour**

Aside from the difficulty of finding parking in the inner city, driving within the boundaries of the *Altstadtring* (ring road) during rush hour is no fun. Take public transit; it will get you to your destination with greater speed and far less aggravation.

7 **Pickpockets**

Munich is a safe city. However, some caution is advised at certain tourist centres and crowded sights. Here, as elsewhere, there are gangs of pickpockets. Be especially vigilant on crowded platforms, in S- and U-Bahn stations and train cars, at large open-air events such as Oktoberfest, and in the pedestrian zone.

8 **Parking Infractions**

It is best to adhere to all parking rules. Parking attendants patrol the streets, especially in the inner city, and issue tickets when cars are illegally parked or when parking is unpaid. Rental car agencies will present you with any tickets when you return your car, and unpaid fines are collected throughout the European Union. In some areas, parking is restricted to residents with parking permits. If your car has been tagged and towed, call the police for information on where you can collect it – and pay the horrendously steep fines.

9 **Taxis during Oktoberfest**

There are two times of year when taxis are extremely hard to come by – New Year's Eve and Oktoberfest, which is usually held the last two weeks in September. Near Theresienwiese during Oktoberfest, taxi drivers may refuse to carry passengers who appear intoxicated.

10 **Hotels during Oktoberfest**

Munich hotels, even luxury hotels, tend to be fully booked during Oktoberfest. If you are planning a stay at this time, reserve well in advance and make sure to notify the hotel if you are arriving after 5pm so that your room will be held for you.

TOP 10 Munich on a Budget

1 Free Museum Admission

On Sundays, admission is free to all state and municipal museums, including the Bayerische Nationalmuseum, Lenbachhaus, and the Münchner Stadtmuseum (see p36). Free admission is only applicable to the permanent collections.

2 Cheap Eats

Many ethnic eateries in Munich are tasty and inexpensive choices for quick snacks, take-aways and meals. Pizza and kebabs are widely available, and small Turkish or Asian kiosks offer quick meals, some even have small tables or counters. Highly recommended is the *Suppenküche* (soup restaurant) in the Viktualienmarkt.

3 Cheap Restaurants

Traditional pubs with Bavarian cuisine tend to be quite inexpensive. Most restaurants have *prix fixe* menus at lunch, which are considerably less expensive than the evening menus. This is also true for some of the top restaurants where, if you have time to enjoy a four-course meal at lunch, you're in for a treat.

4 Accommodation

Hotels in Munich can be expensive. Consider staying in the surrounding areas for less costly accommodation. One alternative is to rent an

apartment through one of several agencies – apartments are available for stays as short as a few days or long as a few months (see p149). Camping is another viable alternative in summer.

5 Admission Discounts

In the evening just prior to the start of the performance, box offices at theatres, concert halls, and other venues offer discounted admission for students and seniors.

6 Public Transport

Visitors to Munich can benefit from a wide range of discounted tickets for public transportation, especially for the city centre area. With the day pass you can travel all day without restrictions. Three-day passes are best for weekend trips, while partner passes, for up to five people, are a family-friendly option. The München Welcome Card is a special pass offered by the MVV, a combined travel-and-admissions pass that is sold at information kiosks (see p138). Children under six travel free; children over six and youth pay reduced fares.

7 Flea Markets

Flea markets and the three Auer Dulten (see p52) are an inexpensive way to spend a fun day strolling and browsing. Prices are usually low and real treasures can sometimes be found.

8 Free Concerts

The concert marathon at the Theatron in Olympiapark is free every summer. Students at the *Hochschule für Musik* (music conservatory), located at Arcisstr. 12, also put on excellent free concerts.

9 Cheap Sight-seeing

Board an eastbound tram No. 18 or No. 19 at Stachus. These routes travel through some of the most beautiful areas of Munich.

10 Open Houses & Long Nights

Nearly all attractions and institutions have an open house each calendar year. Ask at the Munich tourist office to find out when these events, usually free of charge, will take place. The *Lange Nächte* (long nights) are especially popular. These are extended-hour opening nights for museums, theatres, music, and more – all for a flat fee. Buses shuttle between dozens of participating venues during these events.

10 Things to Buy

1 Nymphenburger Porzellan

Be it a porcelain figurine or a dining set – all the pieces at the porcelain manufacture at Schloss Nymphenburg (see p12) are based on historic models. These pieces are of high artistic value and hence quite expensive.

2 Chocolates by Elly Seidl

3 Folk Dress

Classic folk dress – and their contemporary versions – make good souvenirs. Accessories, such as belts, hats, and fringed scarves are also available. These are fashioned from fine materials such as leather, linen, wool, and loden, and are correspondingly expensive. Hard to beat are *Lederhose*, traditional Bavarian leather knickerbockers, which never wear out and get more and more beautiful with age. ☎ *Loden Frey, Maffeistr. 7–9 • Map L4 • Wallach Haus, Residenzstr. 3 • Map L4*

4 Reproductions in Museum Shops

As in New York, Rome, and Berlin, the shops in Munich's museums sell fine reproductions of works of art, limited editions, posters, and reproductions of designer pieces from both their own collections and those of other museums.

5 Beer Mugs

There is no need to buy them only at Oktoberfest. Simple beer mugs and glasses or more elaborate ones with decorated zinc lids and painted designs are available in most antique shops, in the department stores lining the pedestrian zone, and behind Frauenkirche. If you happen to be in a traditional Bavarian pub and really like the brewery mugs or glasses, you can ask whether you may purchase one.

6 Special Toys

The museum shop at the Deutsches Museum carries an outstanding selection of unique toys, from building sets to robots – enthusiastically received by children and adults alike. (see pp8–9).

7 Dolls in Folk Dress

These are very popular collectors' items, especially the antique dolls. Fashioned with artfully painted porcelain heads – often with real hair – and draped in

precious fabrics, they are beautiful pieces to look at. ☎ *Das Puppenhaus, Blumenburgstr. 63 • Map D3*

8 Dukatz Tableware

A perfect souvenir for those who love German literature, Dukatz cups and saucers are inscribed with humorous and subtle quotes by Bavarian author Oskar Maria Graf. They are for sale at Dukatz café. ☎ *Dukatz, Salvatorplatz 1 • Map L3*

9 Glass Painting & Religious Art

Much *verre églomisé* (painting on glass, often with religious motifs) originates in the Murnau region. Traditional crib figures are created in the town of Oberammergau, a centre for woodcarving. Antique and specialty shops carry a wide range of religious and folk art.

10 Soccer Memorabilia

The shops of Munich's two opposing soccer clubs are located nearly opposite one another next door to the Hofbräuhaus. They carry everything that a true fan's heart desires. 10 Shopping Tips

1 Opening Hours

Most stores in the city are open 9am to 8pm Monday to Saturday. Government offices, banks, and post offices close earlier, usually at 4pm, 5pm, or 6pm. On Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve, most stores close at noon. Stores in small towns outside Munich keep shorter hours, often closing at 5pm weekdays, at noon on Saturday, and on Wednesday afternoons. Hours may well be extended in the near future, as the legal retail closing hours are currently the subject of lively debate.

2 Sales/Discounts

End-of-summer and -winter sales have been undermined for some time now by special sales events all year long. Just keep your eyes open for *Rabatt* (discount) or *Sonderverkauf* (special sale) signs. Price labels on merchandise are non-negotiable in most stores. At wholesalers, in some boutiques, and at flea markets, you can try your hand at bargaining for a reduced price.

3 Payment by Credit Card

Most city-centre stores accept all major credit cards. Outside the city and in smaller boutiques, credit cards might not be taken, with the exception of the EC card, the European credit card, which is accepted everywhere.

4 Consumer Protection

The Landratsamt of Munich (regional and municipal affairs office) is responsible for food and consumer goods. 5 Sales Tax

In Germany, sales tax (*Mehrwertsteuer*) is 16 per cent and included in the marked price. Travellers from non-EU countries can apply for a refund with the relevant documents from Global Refund either at the airport or by mail from home. The Customs official has to see the goods purchased and stamp the sales receipts when you leave Germany.

6 Exchange

Full-price items have limited warranties and can be exchanged if they are damaged or otherwise unsatisfactory; in some cases, you will get a full cash refund. Note: there is usually no exchange policy for discounted items.

7 Fashion

Fashion boutiques are located chiefly in the main shopping districts,

especially the pedestrian zones, Sendlinger Straße, Maximilianstraße, Theatinerstraße, and in Schwabing on Leopoldstraße and around the university (see p66).

8 Music

In addition to the large chains such as WOM, Saturn, MediaMarkt, and the CD sections of department stores, you'll find an interesting selection in independent stores, such as Hieber am Dom (Liebfrauenstr. 1), which also carries a large collection of sheet music. Ludwig Beck am Rathaus (see p83) offers excellent jazz, worldbeat, blues, and classics, both modern and traditional.

9 Books

Munich's principal bookseller is Hugendubel department store, whose flagship store is located on Marienplatz. Many small independent bookshops, including those selling foreign-language books, are located in the university district. If you have a passion for antiquarian books, be sure to visit Kitzinger (see p91).

10 Factory Outlets

Factory outlets have now come into fashion in Munich. Many are located outside the city in commercial districts. Your best bet is to check on the Internet. ☎ *www.factory-outlet-shop.de • www.werk.acityline.de/mshow*

10 Hotel and Restaurant Tips

1 Room Reservations

You can book hotel rooms by phone, fax, or e-mail. The Munich tourist office also offers a free booking service 8am to 7pm Monday to Friday, and 10am to 6pm Saturday.

2 Hotel Categories

The number of stars indicates the quality of a hotel – and its price. Most room prices in Munich hotels include breakfast. Prices vary depending on the season – with Oktoberfest being the most expensive – and room comfort. Many hotels offer special weekend packages or reduced prices at low season. Check the Internet for online specials, too.

3 Choosing a Hotel

Munich hotel prices are generally higher than those of hotels in the rest of Bavaria. The prices indicated in the various sections of this guide (see p144) are average prices only. However, even in Munich there are less expensive alternatives; such as small hotels, bed-and-breakfast establishments, hostels, and short-term rental apartments (see p148).

4 Restaurant Reservations

It is advisable to reserve tables at all gourmet and popular restaurants, and

whenever you are dining in a group, especially at weekends. If there are just one or two of you, finding a seat at a table in a traditional pub is easy – just walk in and sit down at a free table or at empty seats at a larger table (first asking if the seats are free). Keep in mind that these pubs always have a number of tables reserved for regular patrons, often with a sign hanging over them saying *Stammtisch* (table reserved for regulars).

5 Tipping

Service (about 12 per cent) and food tax (about 7 per cent) are included in restaurant bills but it is customary to round out the bill and give a tip of up to 10 per cent.

6 Dining Hours

Most restaurants open for lunch, although some are only open from 6pm. Establishments that are open at lunch sometimes close for a few hours in the afternoon. Evening restaurants are open until midnight or later. Beer gardens in the city close at 11pm. Most restaurants post their menus – including daily specials – on pavement boards or at the door.

7 Bavarian Cuisine

True Bavarian cuisine is best experienced in the traditional pubs or brewery-operated restaurants (see p50). Try *Weißwurst*

(poached white veal sausage) with sweet mustard and a pretzel, *Schweinshax'n* (grilled pork knuckle) or *Schweinsbraten* (roast pork), served with potato dumplings and red cabbage. Fresh fish such as *Forelle* (trout) or *Renke* (whitefish from mountain lakes) are usually served whole and are excellently prepared, even in small country restaurants. *Brotzeit* – cold cuts, cheese, and radish served with bread – is especially popular in beer gardens.

8 Other Cuisines

Like most large cities, Munich has a wide variety of ethnic restaurants – from Middle Eastern to Polynesian. Local residents are especially fond of Italian cuisine.

9 Gourmet Dining

Munich is home to an impressive array of top-notch restaurants and expensive, fashionable establishments. Some of the city's gourmet restaurants are among the very best in Europe (see p64).

10 Dress Code

Your attire should be at least as elegant as the restaurant. For men, this means a jacket or blazer – with or without a tie – and appropriate footwear (no running shoes and no shorts). Otherwise, the dress code is generally casual and relaxed, especially in beer gardens.

1 Mandarin Oriental

First-class service and historic ambience near the Maximilianstraße. This five-star hotel has 53 rooms and 20 suites, as well as banquet and conference facilities.
