





# About this Book

Located in the heart of Europe, Germany offers its visitors a diverse experience. Historic monuments, evocative landscapes, scenic towns and romantic medieval cities await those driving through this fascinating country. From the green marshes and pristine sandy coasts of the north to the mountainous and wooded regions of the south, the 24 leisurely drives in this book take you on a trip through a hospitable country while showing charming. lesser-known places off the beaten track.

The delightful landscape ranges from the windy Baltic Coast to the remote valleys of the Black Forest and from rolling green pastures to dramatic mountain peaks. Travelers will discover reminders of Germany's riveting past, delve into the alluring multicultural life of its cities, enjoy fine traditional cuisine. and marvel at the country's beautiful natural vistas. Expect delightful surprises around every bend, packed with the sights, sounds, and flavors of the real Germany.

#### **Getting Started**

The front section of the guide provides all the practical information needed to plan and enjoy a driving trip in Germany. It includes an overview of when to go and how to get there, advice on renting a vehicle, and details of any documentation required. The advice ranges from driving rules to road conditions, buying gasoline to breakdown or accident procedures the kind of background knowledge that will help to make driving stress free. There is information on money, opening hours, communications, health and safety, and other practical matters as well as advice on accommodation and dining options, to ensure that you experience the very best of Germany's hospitality. A language section at the back lists essential words and phrases, including key drivingrelated vocabulary.

#### The Drives

The main touring section of the quide is divided into 24 scenic drives. ranging in duration from one to six days. All the tours can be undertaken in a standard vehicle, and no special driving skills are required. Each drive

begins with a list of highlights and a clearly mapped itinerary. There is useful advice on the best time of year to do the drive, road conditions. market days, and major festival dates. The tour pages contain detailed descriptions of each stop on the route, linked by clear driving instructions. Side panels highlight information on the most authentic places to stay and eat. Tinted boxes feature background information and interesting anecdotes.

Fach drive features at least one mapped town or countryside walking tour, designed to take a maximum of two hours at a gentle pace with stops along the way.

The tours are flexible: they can be linked to create a longer driving trip: others can be shortened into day trips while based in a region.

#### Using the Sheet Map

A pull-out road map of the entire country is attached at the back of this quide. This map contains all the information you need to drive around Germany and to navigate between the tours. All highways, major roads, airports both domestic and international plus ferry ports are clearly identified This makes the nullout map an excellent addition to the drive itinerary maps within the book. The pull-out map also has a comprehensive index for easy location of sights. The map is further supplemented by a clear distance chart, so you can gauge the distances between the major cities.

# **Introducing Germany**

Germany is a country of marked contrasts. and this is nowhere more apparent than in its geographic diversity. Modern cities of glass and steel sit only a few minutes away from thickly wooded forests dotted with romantic castles Germany's combination of multicultural cities, historic architecture, and charming medieval villages set in breathtakingly beautiful countryside make it an ideal vacation destination. The country's main road network is extensive and well maintained, but it is

the smaller roads that lead into the heart of the region. Here, through castles, villages, and magnificent palaces, Germany's rich history is waiting to be discovered. Take a break to sample some exceptional wines – the most famous vineyards are in the western part of the country, especially the Pfalz and Rheinhessen regions – or take time to admire the natural landscape, from the stunning beauty of the German Alps to the myriad glacial lakes in the Müritz Nationalpark.

#### When to Go

The itinerary for each of the drives suggests the best times of the year to make the trip, based on the region. Visits to cities and historic buildings are best made in the spring or early fall as it can get very hot in summer. However. July and August are the ideal months for a vacation by the sea or one of the numerous lakes Winter offers skiing in the Alps, southern Germany, the Black Forest, or the Harz Mountains. The country also hosts numerous events throughout the vear, which makes a visit worthwhile during any seasons. In fall, visitors can participate in traditional folkloric festivals such as Freimarkt in Bremen, which is held in mid-October, In December, festive Christmas markets are held all over the country. They are particularly charming in southern German cities with historic town centers and are good places to pick up souvenirs and presents.

#### Times to Avoid

In late July and August, it can get very hot, especially in the southwestern regions. The busiest period is during the school breaks, which see a great surge in traffic levels. These are set independently in each state and take place in early April (Easter vacations), July and August (summer vacations) and

October (fall vacations) Roads can get particularly busy around Easter and national public holidays. To eniov a stress-free trip, it is best to avoid driving at these times of the year. A visit to northern and eastern Germany between November and late February can be unpleasant due to harsh winter winds and low temperatures, Ice, rain, and sleet make it challenging to drive and uncomfortable for sightseeing.

#### **Festivals**

Nearly every town and village hosts a parade, street shows, concerts, and fairs. These include folk festivals connected to local traditions, such as the asparagus or grape harvest. In April and May, the first spring fairs are held. It is also time for the solemn. observance of Faster. In June, a

number of classical music events take place and July is a popular month for lively wine and beer festivals. January and February are the Carnival season while December is synonymous with Christmas celebrations

A popular destination. Germany is well connected to the rest of the world. Every large city in the country has an airport. most of which offer international flights. All the major US airlines also operate regular flights to Germany. The increase in the number of low-cost flights has made it much easier to travel to Germany from various European cities. Travelers from outside Europe may find it cheaper to fly via London to take advantage of the many budget flights available from the UK. Car rental services are well established at all the big airports in the country.

#### Arriving by Air

Germany's most important airports are Frankfurt am Main, Munich, and Düsseldorf, from where connecting flights can be made to other German cities. If coming from outside Europe, visitors are most likely to arrive at one of these major airports.

The largest German airports are Frankfurt am Main and Munich The gigantic airport in Frankfurt comprises two terminals, which are connected by a fast overground railway. The airport in Munich is somewhat smaller, but still very popular. Among the busiest airports are Düsseldorf Cologne-Bonn and Berlin, which is also where Schönefeld airport is located. Most airports are 12-25 miles (20-40 km) outside the nearest city and connected to the center by local transport or the Autobahn, International hubs such as Frankfurt, Munich. and Düsseldorf offer long-distance train connections.

Germany's national carrier is Lufthansa, which operates regular, scheduled flights to destinations all around the world. Germany and the US are well connected through direct flights from major US cities such as New York, Washington DC. Boston, Chicago, San Francisco, and Los Angeles. Air Canada operates daily flights from Canadian hubs to Frankfurt and Munich in arrangement with Lufthansa. Other carriers that offer flights to Germany are

Delta Airlines, Oantas and United Airlines, British Airways offers regular, scheduled flights from London (Heathrow and Gatwick) to maior German destinations as well as from several regional airports in the UK. Traveling to Germany by air and then renting a pre-booked car is certainly the best option for tourists from North America, South Africa, New Zealand and Australia

In addition to Lufthansa, there are a number of other smaller carriers in Germany including Air Berlin and German Wings. These often offer cheaper fares than Lufthansa on internal routes, as well as providing air links with small airports such as Augsburg, Dortmund, and Erfurt.



#### Arriving by Sea

There are ferry ports in many coastal cities, including Kiel, Lübeck, Rostock. Travemunde, and Sassnitz. The major operators are DEDS Lisco Scandlines Finnlines and Color Line Visitors traveling to Germany by car from the UK will first have to decide which ferry crossing to use (unless using the Furotunnel). The shortest crossings are from Dover to Ostende in Belgium, or to Calais, in France. However, these will also require a fairly lengthy road trip. The Holland route of Harwich to Hook is useful for those starting their trip in Germany's northern region. For a direct ferry crossing to Germany Scandinavian Seaways operates services from Harwich and North Shields to Hamburg, Travelers coming from Ireland should first connect with a ferry service from Dublin to England before taking one of the options mentioned above. The latest provision to make a journey from the UK to mainland Europe by car is by using the Eurotunnel from Folkestone to Calais. The car is carried by train in just 35 mintues.

Arriving by Train

Long-distance trains called EuroCity (EC) trains connect all important German cities with major European destinations. There are also overnight trains (City Night Line) from various European cities such as Amsterdam. Copenhagen, Belgrade, Budapest, Prague, Rome, Venice, and Vienna. Eurostar's high-speed passenger service also offers many cheap

options for traveling by train. The **Deutsche Bahn**, Germany's national railway company, operates highly modern, high-speed trains. the InterCity Express (ICF). The long distance ICE network is also linked to the international airport hubs of Frankfurt and Düsseldorf However ticket rates in the express trains are quite expensive. Seat reservations are recommended during the tourist season and public holidays

Train tickets can be bought and reservations made through travel agents or at the railroad station at the Reisezentrum, which also acts as an information center Tickets can also be reserved by telephone or through the Internet, where a detailed timetable can be viewed to plan an itinerary Furail Passes such as the Eurail Global Pass, which allows unlimited first-class travel in 21 countries, are also a good option.

#### Arriving by Coach

Traveling to Germany by coach is not a very enjoyable experience, as the distances are often long and fares not cheap when compared with low-cost airlines Furolines is the provider of international coach services to Germany, A hop-on, hop-off bus service. Busabout, serves Berlin, Dresden, Munich, and Stuttgart.

Most towns have a bus station located in the town center called 70B (Zentraler Omnibus Bahnhof). where timetables can be obtained and tickets purchased. It is best to inquire at the tourist information center for travel details.

# Practical Information

Germany is a country that is well prepared to receive visitors. Public services operate smoothly and efficiently, and the health system is good. Every town, large and small, has a tourist information center that can offer quidance on finding accommodation and information about local restaurants, attractions and activities. Germany is a safe country for travel, and its police are highly trained to deal with any emergency. Communication networks are good and almost all banks have ATMs.

#### Language

Although all Germans do speak German, many of them use dialects that are sometimes almost incomprehensible, especially to foreigners with limited knowledge of German The most difficult dialects to understand are probably those of southern Germany, particularly Bayarian and Schwabian, but Frisian and Saxon dialects are also likely to cause communication problems. even for German-speaking visitors. However, English is usually understood, particularly in larger cities and in places frequented by foreign tourists.

#### Passports and Visas

Citizens of the US, Canada, Australia. New Zealand and FU member states do not need a visa to visit Germany as long as their stay does not exceed three months. However, visitors from South Africa do need a visa Nationals from most other countries require a Schengen Visa, named for the 1995 Schengen Agreement that abolished passport controls between Austria. Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Iceland, Italy, Greece, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Spain, and

Sweden. This visa is valid for stays of up to 90 days. Visitors should check with the German embassy or consulate in their own country prior to traveling or visit the Federal Foreign Office website and search for

Most embassies, including those of the US and the UK are located in Berlin, but consulates can be found in other major cities.

#### Travel Insurance

All travelers are strongly advised to take out travel insurance that covers for a broad range of possible emergencies. It is mandatory for all foreign visitors to have a medical insurance policy with sufficient protection on a visit to Germany.

In addition to medical insurance, a comprehensive policy will normally cover the holder for loss or theft of luggage and other belongings, such as passports and money, damage or injury to a third party; personal accidents: and delayed or canceled flights. Most policies also cover legal costs up to a certain limit. A standard policy will not cover hazardous or extreme sports, so anyone planning to go surfing, skiing, or rock-climbing must check their

policy: extra coverage can usually be added for a small premium. Most credit card companies offer insurance for lost luggage: one is also entitled to compensation in case of flight delays and cancellation

#### Health

Germany poses no serious health hazards for travelers and no vaccinations are required before entering the country. Ticks are prevalent in rural areas, especially during the summer months. Avoid long grass, keep to paths and wear long pants and sturdy shoes.

Those who require prescribed medication should ensure that they take enough to cover their stay, as it may not be available locally. Citizens of FU member states can obtain free medical assistance in Germany if they hold a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC). Travelers can apply for the card by filling in form E111 at any of the main post offices or online before leaving home. To call an ambulance in the event of an emergency, dial 19222 plus the area code if using a cell phone or simply 112 without the area code if calling from a pay phone. Pharmacies (Apotheke) can be identified by a sign

bearing a large red "A." They are usually open from 8am to 6pm and also have a list of doctors in the area.

#### Personal Security

As in other countries, visitors are far safer in towns and villages than in big cities, where vigilance is needed against pickpockets and petty thieves. One should be particularly cautious in crowded places, such as railroad nlatforms and on trains and buses as well as at popular tourist sights. Leave passports, jewelery and expensive items in the hotel safe, and keep valuables such as cameras and audio equipment concealed under clothing when walking around, Park the car in a safe parking lot. Report thefts and burglaries immediately to the police. The German police can be recognized by their green or blue uniforms. There are motorized police units (Verkehrspolizei) that patrol German cities by car, motorcycle. bicycle, and even on horses. To telephone the Emergency Services (fire and police), dial 110. There are emergency buttons on the platforms of the public transport systems in the bigger cities. Contact the local lost **property** office (Fundbüro) – there is one located in every German city to report lost property. The railway

network. Deutsche Bahn, has its own lost property offices, as do the urban transport systems in individual towns. In the event of a more serious problem such as the loss of a passport, visitors should approach their consulate Officials at the consulate can help travelers to get a new passport or obtain legal advice. In some circumstances, they may even finance the purchase of a ticket home.

#### **Disabled Travelers**

Germany is well prepared to receive disabled travelers. Large museums and historic monuments have special ramps or lifts for people who are confined to wheelchairs. Offices and banks are also accessible to wheelchair users, and there are usually lifts at railroad stations and larger underground stations. Most public transport vehicles have been adapted to take wheelchair passengers. Many hotels, especially the higher grades, offer suitably equipped bedrooms, Contact NatKo for further information.

#### Communication

Postal and telecommunications services are very well developed in Germany, German phone numbers have area codes up to six digits long, beginning with 0 followed by a local number of five to nine digits. depending on the region. When dialing within the country use the full area code

Public telephones are serviced by Deutsche Telekom, Some accept coins, others require credit cards, or phonecards, which can be purchased at post offices. Coins of smaller denominations are not accepted and unused coins are returned, but no change is given Card-operated phones are located at central locations in cities as well as at airports and train stations. It might be useful to have a mobile phone when traveling in Germany. especially in remote areas. Travelers should discuss their requirements with their domestic network provider beforehand. Charges vary according to the facilities and coverage offered. Be aware that roaming charges are higher than at home. If from an EU country, tariffs should be less than 50 cents per minute; outside the FU. they may be substantially higher. A money-saving option would be to buy a local SIM card in Germany.

Deutsche Post operates most postal services in Germany, Post offices are usually open Mon-Fri from 8am to 6pm and 8am to noon on Saturdays. Internet cafés can be found in all bigger cities and most hotels offer Internet services to their quests. An increasing number of hotels, restaurants, and cafés provide Wi-Fi access to their customers.

#### **Banks and Money**

The Furo (€) has been Germany's currency since 2002. There are seven denominations of Furo banknote: the grev €5, the pink €10, the blue €20 the orange €50 the green €100 the vellow €200, and the purple €500. There are eight coins: €2 and €1 50 cents 20 cents 10 cents 5 2 and 1 cents The 2- and 1-Furo coins, are both silver and gold in color. The 50-, 20-, and 10-cent coins are gold. The 5-, 2-, and 1-cent coins are bronze.

ATM machines can be found all over the country, but it is best to

check with your bank or credit card company for fees Travelers can change foreign currency at a bank or at exchange bureaus called Wechselstuhen There are no restrictions on the amount of foreign currency that can be brought into Germany. When changing cash. a commission may be

charged for the transaction. It is best to check this before undertaking an exchange.

Most banks are open Mon-Fri from 9am to 3:30 pm with a lunch break from noon to 1pm. However, in larger cities they may keep longer opening hours. Exchange bureaus are located at airports, and train stations, as well as at many places that are frequented by tourists. It is advisable to take advantage of the services of the Reise Bank, which has branches at airports and railroad stations. It is common to use travelers' checks when traveling



in Germany, even though taking money out at ATMs is more popular. One can cash checks at banks and exchange bureaus Credit cards can

be used for payments almost everywhere but be aware that some restaurants and smaller shops might not accept this form of payment. Credit card companies and banks are increasingly vigilant against fraud, so it is wise to let them. know that you will be using the card abroad, so that they do not put a block on further use. It is also a good idea to

A very well-developed network of tourist information centers exists in Germany. These are usually run by the city or regional tourist authority and can be found all over the country. Tourist information centers have different names in Germany such as Touristeninformation. Fremdenverkehrsamt, or Fremdenverkehrszentrale. They provide information on opening hours of monuments and museums,

accommodation, organized excursions and city tours. They also sell or give away useful material about city attractions, such as guidebooks, maps and postcards, and may be able to find and book a hotel room. The website of **German National Tourist Office** is also a useful source of travel information. Many cities also sell a Welcome Card, which allows the user 2–5 days free use of public transport and discounted access to museums.

#### **Opening Hours**

The opening hours of shops, offices. and other businesses depend to a great extent on the size of the town. In larger cities, the usual office opening hours are Mon-Sat from 9am to 6pm. Supermarkets and other shops often have longer opening hours (mostly until 8pm). In smaller towns, however, nothing tends to open until 10am, Shops everywhere are usually closed on Sundays, Museums and historic monuments are also usually open from 9am to 6pm. However, some places might be closed on a particular day, often Monday, so check opening hours before arranging a visit.

#### Time

Germany uses Central European Time, which is GMT plus one hour. There is Daylight Saving Time between the end of March and the end of October, when the clocks move forward one hour on the last Sunday in March and back on the last Sunday in October.

#### Electricity

Germany's electrical system provides 220V, except in some hotel bathrooms, where a lower current is provided as a standard safety measure. US 110V appliances will need a transformer. However, UK 220V appliances can be plugged into German sockets with an adaptor.

#### **Smoking in Public**

Due to the federal system of government, the law on smoking in Germany varies from state to state. However, smoking is completely banned on public transportation and in hospitals, airports, public and federal buildings, including the Parliament. However, there are differences between the German states when it comes to smoking in bars and restaurants. In some places, such as small pubs and bars, or during late hours, the ban is not observed at all.

# **Driving in Germany**

Driving is one of the best ways to explore Germany. The road conditions are among the best in the world and a well-developed network of Autobahns (motoways) and major roads allows access to almost every corner of the country However, it is the scenic drives away from the urban centers. through Germany's beautiful landscapes that provide a unique experience. To make the most of your trip, it is best to know the basics of driving in Germany before you get started.

#### Insurance and Breakdown Coverage

When renting a car, insurance is usually included in the rate. However, you should check the details of the rental company's policy, If you are traveling in your own vehicle, make sure that your insurance is valid in Germany, so that in the event of an accident, any damage will be covered. Most UK motoring services such as the Automobile Association (AA) and Royal Automobile Club (RAC), offer insurance for assistance, breakdown, and recovery in Germany, European breakdown, and repatriation cover is also available with the Allgemeiner Deutscher Automobil Club (ADAC)

#### What to Take

Driving licenses from America and Australia are recognized in Germany. However, citizens of non-Furopean countries should carry an International Driving Permit. Several agencies (www. drivers.com)are authorized to issue the permit. including the automobile association of the driver's home country. In order to drive in Germany, EU drivers must hold a valid driving license and carry the registration documents and insurance policy for the vehicle.

Seat belts are compulsory in Germany, and there must be a warning triangle in the car, in case of a breakdown, Also, every registered vehicle must carry a first-aid kit that includes disposable surgical gloves and a thermal blanket. If you rent a car, make sure that such a kit is provided with the car.

#### **Road Systems**

Germany is famous for the Autobahn - a well-developed network of toll-free highways. The prefix "A" on a blue sign indicates the Autobahn, Besides the highways, there are well-maintained major roads (Bundesstrasse), which can be distinguished by the prefix "B" on a yellow sign.

#### **Speed Limits and Fines**

There is no specific speed limit for driving on the Autobahn, although many sections of it recommend a speed of 81 mph (130 kph). On major roads, the speed limit is 62 mph (100 kph), and inside a city and in built-up areas, it is 31 mph (50 kph). There are mobile speed cameras and radars (quite often at construction sites) and heavy fines may be imposed if you exceed these speed

limits. As a rule, the most severe fines. including the possible revoking of a driving license, begin at exceeding 30 kph (19 mph) over the speed limit. Fines can also be incurred for tailgating and parking in prohibited areas. In both cases, your car rental company will bill you for any ticket that is sent to them, along with an administration fee.

Do not drink and drive The law is stringent and penalties high. The legal limit is 0.5 mg, but if you are stopped for another traffic offense, the limit drops to 0.3 ma. The police can impose a fine on the spot. It is also illegal to use a mobile phone while driving. This also applies if the car is standing but the engine is running. If caught, drivers will be fined \$77 (€60). However, bluetooth headsets are allowed.

#### Rules of the Road

Driving is on the right in Germany, and seat belts must be worn at all times by the driver and all passengers, front seat and back. Knowing the general rules of the road is important. Be aware that passing other cars is only allowed in the left lane. Under no circumstances should you ever pass in the right

lane. There is no sign indicating otherwise, but there is a strict rechts vor links rule, meaning that a car or any other vehicle coming from a street on your right has the right of way

Germans usually drive very fast and quite aggressively. In the event of an accident on the highway, or if a traffic jam necessitates an abrupt reduction in speed, drivers should turn on their flashing emergency lights to warn other drivers.

Distances are indicated in kilometers. Most road signs are internationally understood, though there are some signs which are specific to Germany. For example, on Autobahns, a vellow triangular warning sign with a row of cars indicates a possible traffic jam. On mountain roads, a sign showing a tire wrapped in a chain, accompanied by the word Schnee, warns of difficult road conditions due to heavy snowfall requiring snow chains. A vellow sign with the word Umleituna indicates a diversion. A horizontal blue arrow with the word Finbahnstrasse refers to a one-way street. A special rule concerns the so-called Low Emission Zones or Green Zones implemented

in 32 cities throughout the country. One is only allowed to access such a zone if the vehicle carries an Emissions Badge (Umweltplakette). If entering a Green Zone with a vehicle that does not display such a badge, you could be fined \$52 (€40). Visitors can obtain a sticker permitting entry into environmental (pollution-controlled) zones from car dealers, repair centers and garages in Germany. It can also be ordered online at www.umweltplakette.de

#### **Buving Gasoline**

Germany has a good network of gas stations (Tankstelle). Unleaded gas (Renzin) and diesel are also widely available. Leaded gas is no longer sold but you can purchase a lead substitute additive and add it to the fuel tank. Fuel in Germany is quite expensive. Prices can vary substantially and are among the highest in Europe. On smaller roads. and in more remote areas, it might sometimes take more time to find a gas station, so make sure that you have enough fuel when traveling through less densely populated regions. Visit www.benzinpreis.de for the latest updates on fuel prices in Germany.

#### Road Conditions

Most roads in Germany are well surfaced and usually well marked. However, the Bundesstrassen, or state roads, do vary in quality. In the north and west, and the touring areas of the Rhine Valley the Black Forest and Bayaria the roads are well paved and in good condition

The well-established network of highways allows you to travel to most regions within a few hours. Regular maintenance work on the roads can generate problems.

especially during the busy summer from July to mid-September. German-speaking drivers can listen to the radio for regular updates on the traffic situation or obtain information on traffic conditions by visiting the website www.verkehrsinfo.de

#### Taking a Break

If you are feeling tired, or lost, it is a good idea to pull over and take a break There are numerous marked rest areas along highways and major roads where you can park the car, stretch your legs, and consult a map. Such places also often have clean public facilities. Highways also have service stations at regular intervals, where you can stop for fuel and simple German food such as Wiener Schnitzel and Currywurst. On minor roads, and in remote areas, gas stations may be few and far hetween

The scenic landscape can sometimes be a distraction for drivers, so it is best to stop and admire the views. Parks and areas with nature trails also make good picnic stops.

#### Breakdown and Accident **Procedures**

If you have a problem on the Autobahn, you can use one of the vellow pillars with emergency buttons located along the road to call for help. In case of a breakdown or accident, move the car safely off the road, turn on hazard lights and put out a warning triangle: it is

> compulsory to carry one and use it. Car hire companies will normally supply a number to call in case of an emergency or problems with the vehicle. Usually they use the assistance of

the ADAC (see p.1.7); the motoring club will send a breakdown service In case of an accident that involves another vehicle, you will need to exchange the insurance details. name, address, and car registration details with the other parties involved, and if possible, jointly determine the cause of the accident.

Parking and access

In the case of a serious accident. the police are quick to arrive at the scene and provide support. For minor accidents, the police do not always appear, but you can call the emergency number 112 to ask for assistance if you have problems with the other party involved in the accident. Circumstances can be confusing at the time of an accident, so do not admit fault, accept liability, or give money to any party, which is illegal in Germany. If possible,

take down details from any independent witnesses. It is also wise to take photographs of any damage to the vehicle as well as the scene of the accident

#### Parking

Lack of parking space can be a problem in cities. Using one of the multi-story parking lots (Parkhaus) is a convenient option, although they are expensive. A green or red sign in front of the parking lot will indicate whether there is an empty parking space. You pay for the number of hours that you park the car. Parking in city centers is often limited to 2 to 3 hours. Payment can be made with coins or (rarely) credit card to an automatic parking-ticket machine, which will issue receipts that are placed on the inside of the windscreen. There are also parking meters with a timer that allow parking for up to 2 hours. In many large cities, there are "Park and Ride" areas outside the center. It is possible to park your car here to take advantage of the well-developed public transport system.

It is never worth leaving your car in a prohibited area – a traffic warden will impose a fine and

arrange for the vehicle to be towed away. Retrieving an impounded car is expensive and difficult.

#### Maps

It is always helpful to have a map with you when driving through Germany. Free tourist maps are widely available, but they are seldom useful for back roads driving. The best option is to buy an up-to-date road atlas that provides detailed maps of all regions of Germany. You can usually purchase road maps at gas stations, bookstores, and tourist information centers.

#### Trailers, Camper Vans, and Motorhomes

Camping in Germany is a great way to experience the country and enjoy its green landscapes. Trailers and motorhomes (RVs) are subject to the same rules of the road as other vehicles. There are many well-maintained camp sites in the country that are ideal for a tour with a trailer, camper van, or motorhome. These are generally open from April to September, although many are open year round.

Most camp sites accept the Camping Card International (CCI), a document that can be used as a form of identity and is accepted

by many camp sites as security in lieu of a passport. Many camp sites also offer discounts on presentation of the CCI

When driving an RV or trailer outside cities, do not exceed speeds of 43 mph (70 kph) and 62 mph (100 kph) on highways. The traffic police are strict about speeding, so be aware that you might have to pay a heavy fine if caught driving too fast. The websites of the German National Tourist Office and Eurocampings offers up-to-date information about most camp sites in Germany. It enables you to search for your desired camping location and gives detailed information about sites.

#### Transporting Bicycles, Roof Racks, and Trailers

Bicycle carriers, roof racks, and trailers must be strongly attached to the car. You can either affix the bicycle behind the vehicle or on top of the car. If you are using a roof rack, make sure that the weight of the items you want to transport is evenly distributed on the rack. As far as trailers are concerned. make sure that the items inside are properly secured so that nothing moves around in case of braking or defensive driving action.

#### Motorcycles

The drives presented in this quide are also ideal for a motorcycle trip. The well-maintained roads that crisscross Germany's countryside allow one to enjoy a feeling of freedom while discovering beautiful vistas. To rent a bike, get in touch with one of the major rental services well in advance as rental stations do not always have them available

AdMo Tours is a national motorbike rental chain where motorcycles and dirt bikes can be booked for short periods. Several brands are available for hire including BMW Harley Suzuki, and many more.

It is mandatory for motorcyclists and passengers to wear protective helmets at all times. Drivers must have a valid driving license to cover a motorcycle or moped, and an insurance policy.

The rules of the road are the same for motorcyclists as for other drivers. although you should take additional safety precautions. Go slow when filtering or driving between traffic lanes. Give other vehicles a wide berth when passing them, and be aware that they might not always see you. Motorcycles must have rear number plate lighting.

#### **Driving with Children**

Drivers must ensure that all passengers under the age of 14 wear seat belts or sit in an approved child restraint. Make sure that their seat belts are always fastened. This is not only obligatory by law, but also important for their safety. Babies must never be placed in a rear-facing car seat in the passenger seat if there is an active airbag fitted, as it can

cause serious injury or death to the child in a crash. Children under the age of 12 have to be seated in a special child car seat. In this case, it does not matter if the child is seated on the back seat or on the front seat. However there is an exception to this rule for children who are shorter than 5 ft (150 cm). Children below this height have to sit in the back seat

Remember to request any necessary child seats in advance when making your rental reservation.

#### **Disabled Drivers**

There are a number of parking concessions for disabled drivers in Germany. Visitors from non-EU countries who wish to apply for temporary parking permits should get in touch with the local council or the district authority. Germany's Federal Ministry of Transport. **Building and Urban Affairs** can advise travelers on this matter. Applicants have to provide a disability ID and a passport-sized photograph, Medical documentation regarding their disabled status might also be required. Parking for disabled drivers can be found in all public areas, indicated with a sign displaying a wheelchair.

#### Car and Camper Van Rental

Most of the big international car rental companies, such as Budget, Avis. Sixt, and Hertz, have offices at airports, rail stations, and more expensive hotels, and offer a wide range of vehicles. The ADAC. Germany's and Europe's largest automobile club, offers rental services for tourists who cannot bring their own vehicle to Germany.

You can call the ADAC service number (see p.17) to find out how to arrange the booking.

To rent a vehicle it is necessary to present a passport and a driver's license Drivers must be over 18 however, check before you make vour reservation regarding "age restrictions" It's recommended that you book in advance, especially during peak season – you will often get a better rate. Rental rates usually include unlimited mileage. but do double check Consider renting a smaller car than you may be used to at home, as they are much easier to handle on narrow country roads than big SUVs. If vou need a child seat, it should be booked in advance as well.

Third-party insurance is compulsory and is included in the rate. Some rental agreements also include a Collision Damage Waiver (CDW), which limits your liability for damages to the rental car, theft loss coverage and personal injury insurance; others charge additional fees for these items. Be sure to read your agreement carefully so that you fully understand what your coverage and liabilities are. Some drivers may be able to use insurance from a personal

credit card to claim CDW, but check carefully with your credit card company beforehand to make sure they will cover your trip abroad, and be prepared to show proof of coverage.

#### **Driving in Winter**

If driving through Germany during the winter, you should buy or rent chains (if there is heavy snow) or at least the essential winter tires. From December to March, roads in mountain areas can be coated with snow and ice. Highways are kept clear, but side roads may be closed completely, and access to other roads may only be permitted for vehicles fitted with snow chains.

When renting a car, make sure you get winter tires along with the car, even though many companies offer just regular summer tires. Note that car companies usually charge extra for snow chains. Make sure that the tires are in good condition. In case of an accident, if the car does not have adequate tires, the insurance cover may not remain valid. The maximum speed possible with snow chains is 30 mph (50 kph). In Germany, winter tires are not mandatory, but on the spot fines can be imposed if the vehicle is not equipped for winter weather

conditions. In other words, fines can be levied for not enough windshield cleansing fluid or use of the wrong sort of tires. Bring plenty of warm clothes a blanket food, and water during winter travel in case of major delays on the Autobahn, or if travelling under hazardous conditions in mountainous areas. Alwavs reduce your speed in adverse conditions, as you will need a longer braking distance, and poor visibility gives less time to react.

In high-altitude regions and mountainous areas, vou may encounterice and snow in winter Slow down, especially for curves and turns, and keep your actions steady and deliberate to avoid sliding out of control. If the car skids, take your foot off the accelerator – do not brake – and turn the wheel into the skid until the car corrects itself. Watch out for ice, especially on bridges and overpasses, which freeze up first. If you hit a patch. do not brake or turn the wheel. but keep as straight as possible and coast over it.

When conditions reduce light levels, dipped headlights should be used. Turn on fog lights whenever visibility is less than 328 ft (100 m).

# Where to Stav

Germany, like many other countries, has numerous hotels converted from palaces, castles, and other historic buildings. The range of prices for a night's accommodation is wide. and depends on the services offered and the location of the establishment. Lodgings can be particularly expensive in the centers of larger cities. However, smaller towns located in the tourist areas often have rooms to rent at reasonable rates. Set amid country landscapes, charming, family-run. hotels providing comfortable rooms and local specialities reflect the unique character of Germany's back roads.

#### Hotels

Hotels in Germany are categorized according to the number of stars awarded for facilities, and not the standards of service. However, the star rating is no guide to the more subjective charms of a hotel, such as the style of decor or the kind of regional cuisine served. In larger cities, it is not difficult to find accommodation in deluxe hotels that are often part of an international chain. Away from the cities, high prices generally apply to rooms in comfortable hotels in beautiful locations or those provided within historic palaces or villas. There are many smaller hotels, too, offering good, affordable lodgings. Often the name Schlosshotel indicates a hotel within a palace. Many of these hotels are members of organizations such as Historic Hotels of Europe, who can provide further information.

A hotel labeled *Garni* suggests that there is no restaurant on the premises, only a dining room where breakfast is served. Apartmenthotels offer suites with equipped kitchens or a kitchen annexe.

#### Guesthouses

Guesthouses (Gasthof) can be found throughout the country, usually located in private houses that function as traditional bed and breakfast places. Often labeled as Pension or Hotelpension, the distinction between a small hotel a pension, and a private B&B varies from region to region. Quite popular, they are a good value for money. Located in smaller towns and villages, they are cheaper than hotels: however, the standards of service and facilities offered are also lower. The rooms are usually cozy and comfortable, and equipped with TV and a bathroom. Guests can also expect a large German breakfast in most questhouses.

#### Youth Hostels

Youth hostels (Jugendherberge) represent the cheapest option for a stay and can be located in almost every town, as well as major tourist areas in Germany. Some are housed in very attractive historic buildings. While they offer cheap lodging, the standards are still surprisingly good.

Accommodation is usually provided in double or triple rooms, as well as in dormitories. In order to stay at a vouth hostel, quests must carry a membership card of the Youth Hostels Association (YHA), which can be obtained from the association in their home country. Prices vary between €12 and €25 per day, depending on the choice of room and the region where the hostel is located

#### Camping

Summer is the best time for a camping trip to Germany, as most camp sites close between November and March. These sites are well equipped, and usually have access to a shared kitchen, bathroom, and laundry facilities, as well as refuse stations. Most offer power connections. Some also feature playgrounds and restaurants and organize sports activities. A lot of camp sites also have additional cabins apart from pitches for tents, motorhomes, or trailers. Visitors should reserve a spot well in advance if visiting during the busy summer season, especially at popular destinations.

#### Self-catering

Along the country roads, spectacular natural backdrops provide perfect settings for a picnic. Supermarkets are usually well stocked with all that travelers will need for an enjoyable outing such as a great variety of food and camping crockery. Be sure to check the opening hours for supermarkets and convenience stores as very few are open at night or on Sundays, and almost none for 24 hours. Outdoor markets, often held on Saturdays or Wednesdays, are also a good place to pick up fresh produce that is easily transported.

#### Booking

Reservations for accommodations can be made directly with the hotel by telephone, Internet, letter, or fax. Visitors can also contact the local tourist office and ask them to make the arrangements. The office can also provide information about rooms in private homes, as well as advice on the availability of other accommodation options in the area. A written confirmation may be required to make a reservation, along with a credit card number. It is best to inform the establishment concerned if arriving late or if delayed.

#### **Facilities and Prices**

With a wide range of accommodation available - from the basic to the luxurious - the facilities available generally reflect the price paid Luxuries such as swimming pools and saunas are more often available in high-end hotels. For simple accommodation in beautiful surroundings, questhouses are a good option. However, prices are also heavily influenced by other factors, such as the time of year.

In resort areas, prices are highest in summer, while in larger cities. spring and fall are more expensive. Prices may also double if a city or region is hosting a special event. This is especially the case for commercial fairs and cultural festivals. In cities, hotels situated in the centers are particularly costly, as are establishments housed within historic palaces or charming villas. However, many hotels have reduced prices on weekends

# Where to Fat

Each region of Germany can be distinguished by its cuisine. Menus increasingly feature local produce and there are markets where one can stock up on gourmet delights. Many establishments specialize in regional fare, which although heavy, is appetizing. In addition, ethnic cuisine, notably Italian, Greek, Thai, Turkish, Chinese, and Indian, is popular throughout the country and can be enjoyed even in smaller towns. Some fine restaurants run by master chefs serve European cuisine of the highest quality.

#### Practical Information

Most restaurants are onen from noon but sometimes close for a break between 3 and 6pm, while cafés open from 9am. Many are closed for one day during the week On Sundays, brunch is served in most places until 2pm. During the lunch period, between noon and 2pm. many establishments offer a fixedprice menu that is cheaper than in the evenings. Dinner is usually served after 7pm. Calling to make a reservation is recommended in popular city restaurants.

The cost of a meal depends on the location. While a three-course meal in some restaurants may cost \$13 (€10), it is more expensive in downtown areas of larger cities. In more upscale restaurants, expect to pay up to \$94 (€70). Alcoholic drinks can be guite costly, but beer, the national drink, is cheap. In general, the prices on a menu include service and tax, but it is common to leave a tip, around 10 percent of the total bill. Restaurants usually accept credit cards and display the logos of acceptable cards at the entrance.

In most good restaurants, the menu is written in German and English, and sometimes also in

French. In cafés and less expensive restaurants, the menu may be handwritten in German, in which case the staff may help with a translation.

#### Restaurants

The term Restaurant is used to define both upmarket restaurants offering fine cuisine at steep prices, as well as popular local establishments that serve affordable food For regional cuisine, visit one of the many Ratskellers found in the cellars of old town halls all across Germany, which serve Sauerkraut (fermented shredded cabbage) and regional specialities at affordable prices. They usually have atmospheric interiors that are well adapted to the vaulted, dark spaces of the historic cellars. Weinstuben (wine bars) or Bierstuben (beer bars) also offer great local food such as seasonal vegetables in a Hollandaise sauce or with dumplings. accompanied by local beverages. A Gasthaus refers to a rather simple restaurant serving good regional cuisine in a family atmosphere. Self-service venues offering snacks are known as Imbiss. These can vary from a stall serving baked sausages and canned drink to kiosks with an

extensive choice of salads and fast food. These kinsks are often run. by immigrants. In fact, in most large German towns, there are numerous kiosks serving Arabic, Turkish. Chinese and American food For a sandwich or a healthy salad, visitors can also try the restaurants or cafeteria facilities in department stores, which are usually self-service.

#### Cafés and Bars

The term café has a variety of connotations in Germany, Often, this is a place that offers good breakfast options in the morning, while serving mostly international cuisine from noon onward. Sometimes a café will have a selection of cakes on display. In addition, at any time of the day and evening, customers can have coffee or ice cream. Many of these establishments turn into bars in the evening when alcoholic drinks are served and live music is played.

A typical venue to have a drink in Germany is the Kneipe, which can best be compared to an English pub in terms of its atmosphere. A wide range of alcoholic drinks is available here, and sometimes loud music is played. The most commonly served beer is pilsner, a bottom-fermented

pilsner lager. Brown ales are also popular. Schwarzbier, a top-fermented brown ale is increasingly popular as is Weizenbier, a bitter top-fermented beer. A small variety of dishes such as *Strammer Max* (a slice of toast with ham and fried egg) are usually offered and diners can often enjoy indoor games such as pool, darts, or foosball.

#### Local Markets

Lively markets are held at designated locations in the centers of towns and villages all across the country. Shopping at these markets is the best way to sample local flavors. A good introduction to the specialities of the region; they have a lively atmosphere and offer a great choice of fresh, highquality food. Farmers come to these markets to sell their fresh produce.

Many farmers also have shops on their farm, where they sell their goods. When driving through regions known for their agricultural produce, keep an eye out for fresh fruit and vegetables, honey, wine, or sausages on sale. Each driving tour notes the location and days of the week for markets around the region. Other great places to visit are bakeries.

A Bäckerei specializes in bread and rolls, while a Konditorei mainly makes pastries, cakes, and sometimes chocolates. Germans make excellent breads often organic from various grains. Bread in Germany is of two kinds: rolls (brötchen) and loaves (brot) Delicatessens where one can find high-quality sausages. cheese, meat, and fish are also worth a visit. Special deli counters can be also be found in major supermarkets. However, prices can be quite high here. All kinds of fresh meats and sausages can also be bought at the butchers' shops (Fleischern), easily found in any city or town.

#### Picnics and Outdoor BBOs

There are many nice locations especially designated for picnics in Germany. These are usually situated in pleasant green areas and are equipped with outdoor tables and garbage cans. Most towns have a shop or a delicatessen where one can grab picnic supplies such as cold cuts, sliced cheeses, breads, and salads. Traditional German potato salad and pasta dishes are often sold in convenient deli-style plastic containers for easy carrying on a road trip.

# The Flavors of Germany

Germany is home to a variety of cuisines, with significant differences in culinary traditions between its regions. However, the country is unified by its love of meat, bread, sausages, and beer. Though traditional meals can be high in calories, a new generation of chefs is improvising German classics to create "nouvelle" dishes. Fresh produce can be found at the many farmers' markets and charming stores across the country and homemade breads and cheeses and locally caught fish, are usually of a high standard

#### Northern Coast

Northern German food is meant to sustain fishermen during long cold days, and to this end, is full of starches. The hardships of life in the northern coast are reflected in the hearty and filling cuisine of this region, much of which makes use of ocean fish such as halibut or plaice or freshwater fish such as trout. The popularity of Matjes, salted herrings with cream and onions. served with baked potatoes, has spread from the northern cities to the rest of the country. Warming stews and soups, such as Pichelsteiner Eintopf, a one-pot dish with meat. potatoes and vegetables cooked in broth for the harsh winter months. are readily available, as is potato, salad, which is served hot or cold with chopped pickle relish or onions. Potatoes, often cooked with bacon, are by far the most popular side dish in the region.

#### Rhineland and Southwestern Germany

This part of Germany, with its winegrowing regions along the rivers Rhine, Mosel and Neckar, is known for its superb, often Frenchinfluenced, gourmet feasts. Swabian food is rich, traditional German cuisine Pasta and bread feature largely in a Swabian meal including Maultaschen, large pasta parcels containing meat, cheese, or vegetables served in soup or butter. or *Spätzle*, a type of pasta, which in Bavaria is made with beer instead of water Swahian food is often referred to as "wet" food, since it is often drenched in sauce or melted butter. The Pfalz, a region of southwestern Germany, is famous for its Pfälzer Saumagen, sow's stomach filled with sausage, herbs, and notatoes The Franks inhabitants of Franconia, part of Bayaria, produce perhaps the finest gingerbread in the country, as well as Nürnberger Rostbratwürstchen (small, spicy roast sausages), and dishes using rare types of fish, such as sheatfish.

#### Saxony and Thuringia

Thüringer Bratwurst, a spicy roasted sausage served with mustard, originates from this east German region, as does Sauerbraten, roast beef marinated in vinegar. Meat is not the only option, however, as Thuringian food is heavily influenced by the wide variety of vegetables grown. Asparagus, cabbage, and cauliflower dishes are also served.

Saxony is widely known for its cakes. or Stollen: there are strict requirements which must be met for a cake to be considered an authentic Dresdner Stollen, including where it is made geographically. These cakes are usually served on or around Christmas. Another cake originating in Saxony is Baumkuchen, a multi-lavered, pyramidshaped cake covered in a chocolate glaze. Thuringia is more likely to serve Bechkuchen (sheet cakes). such as Streusel-Kuchen, a German crumb cake

#### **Bavaria**

Much of southeastern Germany's cuisine is heavily influenced by Eastern Europe, as demonstrated by the goulash dishes and dumplings that regularly feature on the menu. Knödel, for example, are boiled dumplings made in a variety of ways with several types of filling, such as liver, onions, or eag: Semmelknödel are bread-based dumplings with onion and egg, and Leberknödel are liver dumplings. Bavarian food, which the world identifies with Germany,

is filling and hearty: beer and pretzels, white sausages, Squerkraut (dish made with fermented cabbage), and roast pork are fixtures of the traditional Bayarian menu. The Weisswurst (white sausage) has its origins in Munich where several "rules" were made for its consumption. including not eating it after midnight.

#### Breads

Germany is home to an incredibly large variety of breads, including pretzels, Laugenbrötchen (salty sourdough rolls), Semmel (milkdough rolls). Berliner Landbrot (mild rve breads), Mehrkornbrotchen (mixed grain rolls), and many more. Bakeries are ubiquitous, so freshly-baked bread and rolls are always available, and in many regions, such as Swabia, there's no meal without bread. German breakfasts consist mainly of different types of bread and toppings such as iam or cheese.

#### Beer

Beer is more than the most popular beverage in Germany – it is a way of life, with many regional specialities and locally produced brews available throughout the country. Bavaria, a major brewing center, is home to brands that are known the world

over for quality and taste, such as Beck's, Löwenbräu, and Bitburger. Brown ales are popular, particularly in the south, but the most commonly drunk beer is pilsner. a bottom-fermented lager.

#### Wine

Germany is renowned for its delicious white wines, particularly those made from the Riesling grape. Among the most highly prized are those from the Rheingau region. Lovers of red wine can try Assmannshausen Spätburgunder, produced from the Pinot Noir grape, German wines are largely categorized into three groups according to their quality: the lowest is Tafelwein. then *Qualitätswein*, and the highest is Qualitätswein mit Prädikat. The term Trocken indicates a dry wine, Halbtrocken, semi-dry, and Suss, the sweet variety. Excellent sparkling wines known as Sekt, are also produced in Germany.



# **Dramatic North Sea Coast**

The sweeping, green marshy lowlands of northern Germany form the backdrop to this picturesque drive. Beginning at Lüneburg, the route traverses the state of Lower Saxony (Niedersachsen) to Germany's far northwest, East Frisia (Ostfriesland). It continues through scenic villages set in fields of heather and orchard blossoms in the Altes Land (Old Land) to reach some outstanding medieval city centers such as the one in the Hanseatic city of Bremen, whose grand Gothic and Renaissance landmarks are reminders of its remarkable former wealth. The drive also explores fascinating natural landscapes such as the North Sea tideland nature reserve and the East Frisian barrier Islands (Ostfriesische Inseln).

#### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish: Lüneburg to Fast Frisia and the East Frisian Islands

Number of days: 3-4 days, allowing half a day to explore Bremen.

Distance: 311 miles (500 km)

Road conditions: All roads along this drive are in very good condition.

When to go: For warm and dry weather. the best time to visit this region is between late May and mid-August. It is particularly lovely in late April when cherry and apple orchards blossom.

Opening times: Most shops and attractions are open from 9am to 6pm, Monday to Friday.

Main market days: Lüneburg: Wed & Sat: Bremen: Mon-Fri: Verden an der Aller: Tue & Fri

#### 1 Lüneburg

#### Lower Saxony; 21335

This former salt-mining hub and Hanseatic city was once one of the richest in Germany. Lüneburg's past wealth is evident in the splendid gables that line the streets of its old town. One of the city's three Gothic churches, the

Johanniskirche, has a 354-ft (108-m) high brick steeple that leans more than 6 ft (2 m) from the perpendicular. Built between 1300 and 1370 and restored in 1420, it is considered a major example of north German brick architecture.

The city's most important monument is the Rathaus (lan-Mar: open Tue-Sat: Apr-Dec: open daily), located in Am Markt, This town hall, parts of which date back to the 13th century, is one of the most architecturally interesting town halls in northern Germany. Its council chamber features Renaissance woodwork by 16th-century artist Albert von Soest, and the Museum im Rathaus holds a remarkable collection of municipal silverware. To the left of the town hall the Schroederstrasse is lined with good restaurants, cafés, and bars. Stroll on Ilmenaustrasse, which

runs past the old port on the Ilmenau river. On Lüner Strasse stands the **Altes Kaufhaus**, a former herring warehouse with a superb Baroque façade. This striking building was formerly used to load salt on to ships. A walk across the historic heart of the city leads to **Michaeliskirche**, with its beautiful basilica. consecrated in 1409.

From Lüneburg, take the B209 toward Amelinghausen, then follow the road to Soderstorf. Take Schulstrasse toward Evendorf and then Evendorf Dorfstrasse to Egestorf, then get on to Schätzendorfer Strasse in the direction of Hanstedt. In Schätzendorf, turn left to Undeloh.

#### 2 Lüneburger Heide

#### Lower Saxonv: 21274

Situated south of Hamburg, between the Elbe and Aller rivers, the Lüneburger Heide is a remote, enticing heathland and nature reserve. The half-stepped terrain also serves as grazing land for a special breed of sheep, the Heidschnucken. Starting at the pretty village of **Undeloh**, this area can easily be explored on foot, by bike or horse-drawn carriage (Mühlenstrasse 2, Bispingen; 01805 20 07 05). The highlight is the traditional village of **Wilsede**, whose tranguil





scenery and quaint houses set among trees is a reminder of its bucolic past. Not far from here is the **Wilseder Berg** the highest point of the moraine region, which offers a panoramic view of the countryside.

From Undeloh, head to Handeloh. Continue on Handeloher Strasse to Welle. Turn right on to the B3 and cross the A1. Continue on this road, then turn left on to the B73 and pass Neukloster Hedendorf, Turn right on Jorker Strasse to Jork.

#### Altes Land Hamburg: 21635

The flat floodplains of the Altes Land along the banks of the lower Elbe teem with cherry and apple orchards. The area is particularly lovely between April and May when the trees are in bloom and the whole countryside turns into an ocean of white and pink. In the midst of these natural surroundings, charming red-brick

roofs and decorated gables await the visitor. There are a number of villages to be discovered, such as Neuenfelde. Borstel, Steinkirchen, Hollern, and Jork, with many Baroque churches that are worth visiting. The unofficial capital of the Altes Land, Jork offers some delightful restaurants. Neuenfelde attracts visitors with its pretty rose gardens; another draw is the historic windmill of Hollern-Twielenfleth.

#### Lower Saxony: 21680

A medieval Hanseatic town located to the west of Hamburg, Stade has retained most of its characteristic halftimbered buildings, the most attractive of which can be found along the old harbor, Alter Hafen, Located in a granary built during the time of the Swedish occupation in the 17th century. Schwedenspeicher-

Museum (closed Mon) houses exhibits on the history of the town. Nearby, a building at Am Wasser West 7 displays the Kaufmann Collection (closed Mon), comprising works of

artists from Worpswede (see p38). Other attractions are the Bürgermeister-Hintze-Haus at Am Wasser

West 23 and the Rathaus both of which date from the 17th century. Stade also has its share of grand churches, such as the 14th-

century Gothic St. Wilhadi (closed Sun) and the 17th-century St. Cosmas und Damiani (closed Sun).

Bremen's harbor, Bremerhaven, is worth visiting for its museums. Designed by renowned architect Hans Scharoun, the **Deutsches Schiffahrtsmuseum** (Nov–19 Mar: closed Mon; 25 Mar–Oct: open daily), or the German Maritime Museum, includes an open-air museum and a harbor museum. This site features both originals and models of a wide

range of ships. The most attractive exhibit here is the *Seute Deern*, the last great German sailing ship. The

Deutsches Auswandererhaus, a museum, recounts the German emigrant experience of the 19th century with costumed models and replicas of the cabins and family histories written in the travellers' own words

Return to the B6, which meets the A27. Continue on the A27, then turn right on the B6 to reach Bremen.

#### 6 Bremen

Bremen: 21895

A prosperous city on the Weser river with a colorful 1,200-year history, Bremen is Germany's oldest port still in use today. The magnificent town hall and the grand old statue of Roland, both on the market square, represent its main tourist attractions and are listed as UNESCO World Heritage Sites.

A two-hour walking tour

Exit the parking lot and continue on
Langenstrasse, then turn left on
Am Markt to the Marktplatz ①,
the heart of the city. The town
hall, the cathedral, and the
Roland statue dominate
this impressive square.
The statue of Roland, a
knight of Charlemagne
who is considered the city's
protector, was erected in
1404. Roland's sword of
justice symbolizes the

judiciary's independence, and its engraved motto confirms the emperor's edict conferring town rights on Bremen. The second monument on the square is the statue of the Bremen Town Musicians, famous protagonists of a Grimm fairy tale. Constructed in 1953, local legend has it that touching the front hooves of the donkey will make wishes come true. From here, turn right on to

Am Dom to visit the Gothic town hall, the Rathaus ② (closed Sat & Sun). Built between 1405 and 1410, the edifice has a Renaissance façade that dates to the early 17th century. Inside the great hall, a lovely fresco from 1932 portrays Solomon's court. Walk along Am Dom to the 11th-century Dom ③

(open daily), which stands nearby. The façade of this Romanesque cathedral features two spires. Inside are historic treasures such as the stone basreliefs dividing the western choir stalls. In the second eastern chapel,





visitors can see the oldest Bremen sculpture of Christ the Omninotent dating back to 1050. Return along Am Dom and turn left on to Am Markt to the Mannerist **Schütting** (4). a former meeting place for merchants, with a Renaissance facade. Head south and walk along Am Markt which becomes

Böttcherstrasse (5). This lively street was transformed into a Gothic-cum-Art Nouveau fantasy in the 1920s by artists commissioned by the coffee magnate Ludwig Roselius. Don't miss the golden bas-relief at the entrance to the street. There are also attractions such as the Paula-Modersohn-Becker art museum. Return to the Rathaus and walk along Am Dom, turn right on to Balgebrückstrasse, left on to Dechanatstrasse and then turn right to reach the **Schnoorviertel 6**). located in the eastern quarter of the city center. A historic area with many houses dating from between the 15th and 18th centuries, this district boasts a collection of art galleries and restaurants Continue on this

road, which becomes Stavendamm. turn right on to Tiefer which becomes Martinistrasse, to return to the parking lot

Cross the A27 and aet on to Hauptstrasse, which becomes Falkenberger Landstrasse, Turn left on to Worphauser Landstrasse in the direction of Worphausen. Continue on this road, which becomes Ostendorfer Strasse Turn left on Hembera Strasse to Worpswede.

#### Bremen Town Musicians

A famous fairy tale, the Bremen Town Musicians was written by the Brothers Grimm. In the story, a donkey, a dog, a cat, and a rooster leave their farms when their owners decide to kill them. They meet by coincidence and decide to travel to Bremen, a town known for its freespirited society, to make a living as musicians. On the way, they encounter some robbers in a cottage and frighten them away with their disharmonious music. The robbers abandon the cottage and the animals live there forever.



#### Lower Saxony; 27726

Situated northeast of Bremen. the small village of Worpswede is a must-see for art lovers. A number of famous painters notably Fritz Mackensen, Otto Modersohn. Hans am Ende, Fritz Overbeck, and Heinrich Vogeler, lived here from 1889 until the end of World War II. The greatest of them all was perhaps Paula Modersohn-Becker one of the most important exponents of early Expressionism. The Grosse Kunstschau and the Worpsweder Kunsthalle (closed Mon) where the work of the founding members of the colony is displayed, are worth a visit. Most of the paintings on display highlight the scenic beauty of northern Germany, showing moorland, birch trees, and marshlands under wide open skies. Visiting poets such as Bohemian-Austrian Rainer Maria Rilke helped establish the legendary reputation of this hamlet. Even today, many painters live in Worpswede, and the village is proud of its cultural scene.

Take the Kirchdamm to Grasberg and then the Speckmannstasse to Fischerhude.

#### 8 Fischerhude

#### Lower Saxony: 27726

Another attraction for art lovers is nearby Fischerhude, which nestles in the Wümme river lowlands, surrounded by waterways and drainage canals that frame the captivating meadows and fertile fields. With its idvllic farmhouses, some of which are centuries old, this village leaves the visitor with a distinct impression of the region's lifestyle as it was hundreds of vears ago. At the end of the 19th century. Fischerhude also became an important cultural colony, attracting artists such as Heinrich Breling, the landscape painter Otto Modersohn. the sculptor Clara Rilke-Westhoff, and the author Diedrich Speckmann.

■ Leave Fischerhude following signs to Sagehorn and then on to Oyten. Take the A1 towards Bremen, then the A27 southeastwards, and then Hamburger Strasse to Verden an der Aller

#### 9 Verden an der Aller

#### Lower Saxony: 27238

The town of Verden an der Aller is known for its attractive churches, such as the Johanniskirche, the Andreaskirche, and the Lutheran cathedral, the Dom, all of which adorn the town center. The cathedral's hall features a multi-sided presbytery and a passageway dating from between 1268 and 1311. The town's horseback riding and racing tradition is honored in the Deutsches Pferdemuseum (closed Mon), which features a vast collection of equestrian artifacts. North of the cathedral, the Domherrenhaus

houses the Historisches Museum (closed Mon) which displays exhibits on the town's history.

☐ Take the minor road to Svke via Thedinghausen. Follow signs to Nordwohlde, turning right to Harpstedt, Drive to Wildeshausen and take the B213 to Cloppenbura, Follow sians to the Museumsdorf.

#### Cloppenburg

Lower Saxony: 49661

The market town of Cloppenburg is famous for its interesting open-air museum. Museumsdorf (onen daily). a re-creation of a medieval village Attractions include half-timbered houses windmills and a small 17thcentury church. Also worth a visit are the megalithic graves of Visbek (04445 89 00 35: www.vishek.de) to the east of Cloppenburg, which date from 3.500 to 1.800 BC. The main attraction is the 263-ft (80-m) grave known as Visbeker Bräutigam (Visbek groom) and the 321-ft (100-m) Visbeker Braut (bride).

☐ Take the B72 and drive through Aurich to ioin B210, then turn left, takina B72 followina sians to Norden. Here, several ports serve as the springboard to the Frisian Islands.

#### East Frisia and the East Frisian Islands


Lower Saxonv: 26506

With its unique landscape and lovely beaches, East Frisia is a perfect place to end a tour of northern Germany. Meadows dotted with windmills characterize the countryside. Along the North Sea Coast extends the helt of several Fast Frisian Islands: Norderney. Baltrum, Langeoog, Spiekeroog, and Wangerooge. All around them is

the Nationalpark Niedersächsisches Wattenmeer, listed as a UNESCO



World Heritage Site, A popular excursion here is the "Watt Walk" to the wetlands that are formed when mud is deposited by tides. This tour by local experts (Ostfriesland Tourism: Ledastrasse 10. 26789 Leer: www.ostfriesland-tourism. com) includes an introduction to the unique ecosystem. Tours on horsedrawn carriages are also a delightful way to explore this nature reserve. The Moor und Fehnmuseum (closed Mon) situated in Elisabethfehn southeast of the town of Leer, is also worth a visit. The museum is dedicated to the extraction of peat and exhibits the world's largest plough.

# Wonders of Schleswig-Holstein

Situated between the Baltic and the North seas and bordered by the Elbe river and Denmark, Schleswig-Holstein is the northernmost state in Germany. A predominantly maritime region, it has endless white sand beaches and impressive lakes. The stops along this route include a visit to the historic old town of Lübeck, an architectural gem and a UNESCO World Heritage Site, and to the lovely lakes around Plön. The drive traverses pretty, tree-lined country roads through a largely agricultural region, where the pace of life is more relaxed, pausing at the charming towns of Holstein's Switzerland. The trip also weaves in a visit to the city of Kiel,

#### Wedel

#### Schleswig-Holstein; 22880

Situated on the Elbe river's right bank, Wedel was once an important cattle market. A reminder of this is the

Roland of Wedel monument that stands in the Marktplatz as a symbol of market law. The town's main attraction is the Willkomm-Höft (welcome point) on the Elbe. Vessels arriving here have been traditionally greeted with flag signals since 1952, while the national anthem of the country of

origin of the ship is played.

# 2 Ahrensburg

#### Schleswig-Holstein; 22926

Located in the Tunneltal, Ahrensburg is part of the Hamburg metropolitan

area. The town's highlight is the Renaissance **Schloss Ahrensburg** (Mar–Oct: open Sat & Sun; Nov–Feb: open Wed, Sat & Sun), which dates back to 1595. The building has four prominent corner towers and luxurious interiors.

⊞ Head to the A1, cross it to reach Stubben, then get on to Labenz. Take Klein Kinkrade then Hauptstrasse to Sierksrade. Take the B208 to Ratzeburg.

#### Ratzeburg

#### Schleswig-Holstein; 23909

Ratzeburg is situated on an island in the Grosser Ratzeburger See. In 1143, Heinrich der Löwe (Henry the Lion) became the ruler of the town and was respon-

sible for the construction of the Romanesque **Dom** (May–Sept: open daily; Oct–Apr: closed Mon). An early example of brick architecture, the cathedral features decorative elements in the southern vestibule.

Return to Harmsdorf and

### 4 Lübeck

#### Schleswig-Holstein; 23552

By the end of the Middle Ages, Lübeck had become one of the richest and most powerful Hanseatic towns in Europe. Today, it is renowned for its unique *Backsteingotik* (north German Gothic brick architecture) and seven towers. The town was also home to Nobel Laureate Thomas Mann, one of the most famous figures in the German literary world.



#### A two-hour walking tour

Exiting the parking lot at the end of Wallstrasse, turn right on to Holstenstrasse to the **Holstentor** ①, or Holsten gate. Based on Flemish designs, the gate was built by Hinrich Helmstede at the end of the 15th century. Continue on Holstenstrasse to the 14th-century **Petrikirche** ② (closed Mon). or Church of St. Peter.

Lübeck's only five-naved church.
Turn left into Schlusselbuden to visit
Marienkirche ③ (open daily), which
houses great art treasures. From here,
turn left into Mengstrasse to the
Schabbelhaus ④, a charming patrician house with stepped gables.
Return to Schlusselbuden and continue along Mengstrasse to the
Gothic Buddenbrookhaus ⑤ (open

daily) once the home of Thomas Mann It now houses a museum dedicated to the Mann family. Next. turn right on to Breite Strasse to the 13th-century Rathaus (6), Germany's most famous brick town hall Return along Breite Strasse to the 15th-century Jakobikirche (7), a Baroque church on the right Turn right into Kobera, then left into Grosse Burgstrasse to the **Burgtor** (8), an ancient gate that bears testimony to the town's historic fortifications. Return to Grosse Burgstrasse to the Heiligen-Geist-Hospital (9), a Gothic brick building notorious for its spiky towers. Continue into Koniasstrasse. turn left on to Mühlenstrasse then right on to Dankwartsgrube, and left again into Pferdemarkt for the Herz-Jesu-Kirche (1), on the right. This 19thcentury church houses a memorial to four cleraymen who were executed during the Third Reich for resisting the Nazi regime. Across the parade square stands the **Dom** (1) (open daily), built in the 12th and 13th centuries. Highlights include a triumphal cross sculpted from an oak tree. Get on to St. Annen-Strasse to visit Kunsthalle St.-Annen 12, or St. Anne's Museum (open daily), which is housed in an Augustinian convent. Return to Kohlmarkt, turning left on Holstenstrasse for the parking lot.



☐ Take the A1 to Ratekau and then past Neustadt to take the B501 to Heiliaenhafen. Then turn on to the R207 to Fehmarn

#### **Thomas Mann**

Thomas Mann, one of Germany's most influential writers, was awarded the Nobel Prize for literature for his works Ruddenbrooks and Der Zauberbera (The Magic Mountain) in 1929. An anti-fascist, Mann emigrated to Switzerland in 1933 and to the US in 1939. Disowned by his country, he became the leading voice of Exilliteratur, the exiled German literature that was outlawed by the Nazi regime.

#### Fehmarn

#### Schleswig-Holstein: 23769

This Baltic Coast island is renowned for its serene beaches, pristine landscape, and some 2,200 hours of sun per year. The best way to explore Fehmarn is on

> foot or a bike. Visitors can also relax at one of several wellness spas (www.inselwellnessfehmarn.de) or play golf on one of the prettiest golf courses in Germany. The biggest village is **Burg auf** Fehmarn, home to the St. Nikolai Kirche, or St. Nikolai church. To. the southwest of the island stands the 121-ft (37-m) tall lighthouse Flügge, which offers panoramic views of the island.

### **6** Holsteinische Schweiz

#### Schleswig-Holstein; 24301

The area's low moraine hills, which reach a height of 538 ft (164 m), and 140 lakes are the reasons why this area is known as Holstein's Switzerland. The best way to explore this region is on a bike tour. The main center of this holiday area is **Plön** on the Grosser. Plöner See or Lake Plön, Preetz, an old shoemakers' town and Bosau, home to a Romanesque church, are nearby. Visit the town of **Futin** referred to as the "Weimar of the North" because of its pretty buildings. Eutin's brick schloss contains Rococo stuccowork and paintings by German artist Johann Heinrich Wilhelm Tischbein (1751–1828), which were inspired by the *Iliad* and the *Odyssey*, epic poems written by Homer.

☐ Take the B76 to Kiel. To reach the beach resort of Laboe, follow the B502 to the north.

#### Kiel

#### Schleswig-Holstein; 24103

Schleswig-Holstein's capital Kiel marks the beginning of the Nord-Ostsee-Kanal, or Kiel Canal, which was built at the end of the 19th century to connect the Baltic Sea and the North Sea. Germany's main submarine base during World War II, this town is now known for its beautiful coastline of tiny beaches and inlets. Every summer. the town attracts vachtsmen for the famous Kieler Woche or Kiel Week (www.kieler-woche.de). A walk along the Schweden-Kai embankment leads to the Nikolaikirche, which has a Gothic altar, and to the Rathaus, or town hall. About 4 miles (6 km) from the town is the Schleswig-Holsteinisches Freilichtmuseum (open daily), an open-air museum with exhibits on German rural architecture.

Around 11 miles (18 km) from Kiel is the beach resort of Laboe. Visit the **U-Boat Museum**, which tells the history of Germany's feared submarine fleet in World War II.

From Kiel, take the B76 to Eckernförde and on to Schleswig.

#### Schleswig

#### Schleswig-Holstein; 24837

A principal seat of the Vikings, Schleswig became a bishopric as early as 947. The town's main attraction is **Schloss Gottorf** (Apr-Oct: open daily; Nov-Mar: closed Mon), which served as the residence of the dukes of Schleswig-Holstein from 1544 to 1713. This castle houses a regional museum, **Schleswig-Holsteinisches Landesmuseum**, and the **Archäologisches Landesmuseum**.



Where to Stay: inexpensive, under €70; moderate, €70–€150; expensive, over €150



Also visit the **Dom** (open daily) which displays the Bordesholmer altar, a masterpiece of Gothic carving, Stroll around the fishermen's district of Holm and visit the Viking Museum **Haithabu** (Apr–Oct: open daily: Nov–Mar: closed Mon), which sheds light on the days when the Vikings used Schleswig as their headquarters.

Take the B76, which becomes Bundesstrasse and then Schleswiaer Strasse to Flensbura.

#### ¶ Flensburg

#### Schleswig-Holstein; 24901

Germany's northernmost town, Flensburg was an important trading center in the 16th century. The town's trademark northern gate. the Nordertor, dates from 1595. Visitors can explore the fascinating Schiffahrtsmuseum (closed Mon) or maritime museum. The town is home to four outstanding churches the Marienkirche features a Renaissance altar; nearby Heilig-Geist-Kirche, or Church of the Holy Ghost, belongs to the town's Danish community: the Nikolaikirche houses an amazing Renaissance organ and the Johanniskirche has a superb painted ceiling. About 6 miles (9 km) from the town center stands the

historic 16th-century Schloss

Glücksburg (May-Oct: open daily: Nov-Apr: open Sat & Sun) with massive corner towers. West of the town is Seebüll. where Expressionist painter Fmil Nolde (1867-1956) lived and worked.

Continue on the B199 to reach Niehull. Take the car-train Niehull-Westerland to reach the island of Sylt.

#### Svlt

#### Schleswig-Holstein; 25980

The North Frisian Islands lie scattered in the North Sea 4 miles (6 km) off Schleswig-Holstein. Sylt, the largest island, is 25-mile (40-km) long. Known for its posh villas vibrant nightlife and Michelinstarred restaurants its highlights include sandy beaches, red cliffs, and the "Watt." the expanse of mudflats in Nationalpark Schleswig-Holsteinisches Wattenmeer Relay at one of Sylt's many spas (Arosa Sylt: www.resort.a-rosa.de: Bundersand: www. bundersand.de) before visiting Westerland the main town Stroll down Friedrichstrasse to a seafood restaurant, or take a detour to visit the neighboring Kampen, an affluent resort. Also explore the nearby

Amrum and Helgoland, Germany's only deep-sea islands. ☐ Take a car-train from Westerland to Niebüll then take the B5 to Husum.

#### Husum

#### Schleswig-Holstein: 25813

A medieval seaport with a colorful North Sea harbor, Husum has a delightful old town. The town's central market square is filled with charming 17th- and 18th-century buildings. Husum was home to the German poet and writer Theodor Storm (1817-88), whose residence Theodor Storm Haus (Apr-Oct: open daily; Nov-Mar: open Tue, Thu, Sat) now houses a small museum that displays exhibits



## The Baltic Coast

Decorative Gothic brickwork in cozy old towns, beautiful beaches with their distinctive *Strandkörbe* (wicker chairs), and restaurants serving fresh fish are what make the Baltic Coast a popular holiday destination for Germans, even though it is yet to be discovered by foreign visitors. Going eastward along the coastline and to the islands of Rügen and Usedom, this tour takes drivers through unspoiled scenery. The route starts inland in the spa town of Bad Doberan, then goes through Stralsund and Greifswald, ports of the medieval Hanseatic League. The tour also takes visitors to the *belle époque* resorts of the Kaisers on the islands of Rügen and Usedom and through former fishing villages on the Fischland peninsula, now transformed into fashionable resorts.



Start/finish Bad Doheran to Usedom

Number of days: 5-6 days, allowing one day to explore Rügen.

Distance: 283 miles (456 km)

Road conditions: There are excellent single-lane and dual-lane B-roads except on Rügen, which has some short coppled stretches

When to go: The best time to visit for a beach holiday is between June and early September, though Rügen and Usedom can get busy between July and August Christmas and New Year is the high season for visitors.

Neo-Classical buildings, and a historic steam train (daily) to the seaside resort of Kühlungsborn, 4 miles (6 km) away from the town, are reminders of Bad Doberan's days as a fashionable health spa established in 1801 by the Duke of Mecklenburg, Friedrich Franz, Prior to this, the town's only claim to fame was its graceful Gothic Münster (open daily). The church's rich medieval furnishings attest to the wealth of the Cistercian Order: the ailded high altar dating from 1300 is said to be the oldest wing altar in the world.

☐ Turn left out of the Münster parking lot to join the B105 to Rostock. Follow signs to Zentrum, then to "City" parking lot in Lange Strasse.

#### Rostock

#### Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania: 18055

Industrialization after World War II turned Rostock into Germany's largest Baltic port and the biggest city in the state. However, it still has historic monuments and is a popular beach resort. One of the highlights of the city is the 15th-century

Marienkirche (open daily) on Lange Strasse, Behind the church's altar is a contemporary astronomical clock,

whose clockwork apostles parade in front of Jesus when the clock strikes noon. Post-war rebuilding has returned some of the city's sights to their former glory. These include the Neuer Markt opposite the church with its multicolored gabled houses. the town hall, and Kröpeliner Strasse. the shopping high street To get to the beach, return down Lange Strasse to find the R103 to Warnemiinde The fish restaurants and houtiques of this seaside suburb are as much of a surprise as its powder-fine beach dotted with wicker chairs or Strandkörbe.

☐ Continue on the B103 for the ferry at Passaaierkai across the Warnow to Hohe Düne, Drive to Niederhagen, turn riaht toward Rostock at Rövershagen. then take the R105 toward Ribnitz. After 6 miles (10 km), turn left to reach the Fischland peninsula.

#### Fischland

#### Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania: 18347

Artists acclaim the unspoiled rural landscapes of this peninsula, which extends parallel to the coast. In 1880. an artist's colony was founded in the fishing village of Ahrenshoop. which is now a chic seaside retreat. Kunstkaten (closed Mon) holds art exhibitions in a traditional house and a retrospective art museum is scheduled to open in 2012. Drive through the woods of Darss and beyond Prerow am Darss to Zingst. whose coastal marshes host middle Europe's largest crane roost in spring and fall. Zingst also has a museum on the peninsula's culture (closed Mon).

Take the main road to Barth, then follow signs to Löbnitz to take the B105 to Stralsund. Turn toward the Altstadt on to the B96 and follow sians to the Ozeaneum parking lot.



#### Stralsund

#### Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania: 18439

An exquisite skyline hints at Stralsund's architectural wealth. Ringed by water its Gothic core has impressed visitors for centuries from the merchants who came to trade in one of the most powerful medieval ports in the Baltic to the UNESCO inspectors who awarded it World Heritage Site status in 2002.

Portal of the

#### A one-hour walking tour

From the parking lot, walk to the old harbor to see the windiammer Gorch Fock (1) (open daily), which is permanently moored here for tours. Among the 19th-century warehouses along the seafront is the Ozeaneum (2)

where visitors can walk through the spectacular glass tunnels at the North and Baltic Sea aguariums and explore the auditorium, which has lifesize models of whales. Rehind it and across the Fährkanal, merchants' gabled houses line the

Nikolaikirche, Stralsund Fährstrasse (3) which linked the hubs of medieval life in Stralsund: port and government, Carl Wilhelm Scheele, the 18th-century scientist who discovered the existence of oxygen, was born at No. 27-28, which now hosts exhibitions.

Continue down the street to Alter Markt 4) to see one of the finest ensembles of Gothic architecture in the Baltic - the 14th-century Rathaus (town hall) with its rosetted façade to let strong winter winds through: St. Nikolaikirche (open daily), whose Novgorod altar depicts fur traders hunting squirrels to sell to a Hanseatic League merchant; and Wulflam Haus, built for a wealthy patrician family. It is also possible to see reminders of the two centuries of Swedish rule that followed the Thirty Years' War -Commandantenhaus, the grey Baroque governor's residence with its Swedish coat of arms, and, inside the town hall, a bust of the Swedish King Gustav Adolf. Walk south from Alter Markt, on to the high street, Ossenreyerstrasse (5); the bookshop at No. 14 is thought to be the town's oldest secular building, dating from 1258. Continue right, around the corner on to Apollonienmarkt, then turn right into Mönchstrasse to reach

the 13th-century Kloster St.

Katharinen 6. Now deconsecrated, it

houses an aquarium (open daily) and a culture museum (Feh-Oct: open daily: Nov-lan: closed Mon) with a muraled refectory. The museum ticket also provides access to the Gothic house of a merchant at No. 38 on Mönchstrasse and a museum of Mecklenburg

> folk culture at No. 23 on. Böttcherstrasse For an image of Stralsund in its prime.

walk southwards down Mönchstrasse to

Marienkirche (7) on Neuer Markt The town's largest church has lovely stellar vaulting as well as views out to sea from its octagonal tower (open

daily). A ten-minute walk between the historic houses on Frankenstrasse off Neuer Markt leads back to the harbor and to the parking lot near the Ozeaneum.

Return to the B96 and follow signs to Insel Rügen. Drive across the suspension bridge, then turn right toward Putbus. Parkina is on the Markt.



#### B Rügen

#### Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania: 18556, 18546, 18609

Two centuries of tourism have not marred the appeal of Germany's largest island (357 sq miles/926 sq km). Whether exploring its rural villages, relaxing in beach resorts in *belle époque* villas, riding a vintage steam train or strolling along chalk cliffs, Rügen's appeal is timeless and simple.

#### ① Puthus

Puthus's Markt with its Neo-Classical theater and smart Circus, would not look out of place in a city. In this large village, however, it appears almost aristocratic, Prince Wilhelm Malte I. had hoped to create a Prussian St. Tropez when he unsuccessfully planned the village as a health spa in 1809. Unfortunately, his castle was blown up with dynamite in the 1960s - the story goes that a local mayor wanted to impress East Germany's Communist rulers – although the orangery and park remain, as does the colonnaded Radehaus or bathhouse which lies 1 mile (2 km) away, near Lauterbach. From here, it is possible to take a boat trip to the Vilm Island Nature Reserve.

☐ Drive through Putbus toward the seaside town of Binz. Beyond Nistelitz village, turn left at the T-junction, then turn right to reach the Jagdschloss Granitz parking lot.

#### ② Jagdschloss Granitz

A Neo-Classical hunting castle of Prince Wilhelm Malte I, Jagdschloss Granitz (May–Sept: open daily; Oct–Apr: closed Mon) crowns the Tempelburg Hill, the highest point in east Rügen. Climb up the castle's 125-ft (38-m) high tower for a sweeping panorama of the Baltic Sea. An apocryphal tale

explains this curiosity as the prince's ruse to settle a land dispute – Swedish rulers agreed he could own whatever he saw from his castle.

Spread along the coast beyond, **Binz**, Rügen's premier seaside resort, is renowed for its ornate villas and fine beach.

☐ Head through Binz to Sassnitz to take the B96 to the Nationalpark Jasmund and the Königsstuhl parking lot in Hagen village. Visitors can either take the bus to

#### The Rasender Roland

The Rasender Roland (open daily; www.ruegensche-baederbahn.de), or Racing Roland, is a steam-powered narrow-gauge railroad that plies on Rügen and provides an enjoyable change from traveling by car. The steam locomotives whistle out of Putbus station northwards through the fields at 19 mph (30 kph), pause at Jagdschloss Granitz and Binz en route before terminating an hour later in Göhren in east Rügen.

# Königsstuhl, or opt for a pleasant 2-mile (3-km) stroll.

#### ③ Königsstuhl

A lovely road from Sassnitz cuts through the Nationalpark Jasmund. a landscape of spacious beech woods that cover white chalk sea cliffs Romantic artist Caspar David Friedrich (1774–1840) immortalized the scenery in his etchings and oils, so popularizing the Königsstuhl (open daily) that in 1865 Kasier Wilhelm I himself inspected the chalk bluff with his daughter Princess Viktoria. Königsstuhl literally means "king's stool," a name derived from the tradition that Rügen's early rulers followed to prove themselves worthy by climbing the 388-ft (118-m) high cliff. For a





better view, walk 547 vards (500 m) south to the Victoriasicht viewpoint or to the beach via steep steps.

☐ Continue down the road to reioin B96 then head toward Altenkirchen. Turn right to reach the parking lot at Putaarten. Tourist trains leave every 10 mins for Kap Arkona and Vitt. otherwise it is a 1 mile (2 km) walk.

#### Strolling the Stubbenkammer

The Köniasstuhl is the most accessible of the Stubbenkammer cliffs that line Rügen's east coast. Marked by a blue stripe, the Hochuferweg path is a beautiful clifftop trail that leads south to Sassnitz, This 5-mile (8-km) long path. with beech woods on one side and a shifting emerald-iade sea on the other, passes the Kollicker Ort navigation light before proceeding through Ernst, Moritz, Arndt, Sicht, and the Wissower Klinken viewpoints. Another hour's walk leads to Sassnitz, from where there are taxis or buses back to Königsstuhl.

#### (4) Kap Arkona

Two lighthouses (open daily), the smaller by the 19th-century Prussian architect Karl Friedrich Schinkel afford a view over the rapefields that cover the cliffs of Kap Arkona, the wind-blown tip of Rügen. A 1-mile (2-km) path around the cape returns to the parking lot via the earthworks of the Jaromarsburg (open daily), a fortified temple of the Slavic tribes who occupied Rügen until the 12th century. Continue on the path to Vitt, an idyllic ancient fishing hamlet cupped in a dell behind the beach, where Slavic runes number some houses. Do not miss the folk mural in the village's 19th-century chapel.

Return to Altenkirchen, then go to Wiek, and take the car ferry, Wittower Fähre. Drive to Ginast, then join the B96 at Samtens, and past Stralsund. ioin the B105 to Greifswald. Parkina is available at the Zentrum, by the harbor and at the Markt

#### **6** Greifswald

#### Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania; 17489

This former Hanseatic town is situated 3 miles (5 km) from the Bay of Greifswald. Caspar David Friedrich (1774–1840), the Romantic painter, drew inspiration from the town's **Altstadt**, with its gabled houses and

**Altstadt**, with its gabled houses and picturesque spires. Representations of the Gothic merchants' houses on the Markt and the cathedral with its striking twin-bulbed tower can be seen on his canvases in the excellent **Pommersches Landesmuseum** 

(closed Mon), which also has displays on regional history. Drive 1 mile (2 km) east on Wolgaster Strasse to Wiek, a pretty harbor scented with the smell of smoking fish, then on to Eldena and the ruins of a

Continue past Eldena to Kemnitz, then to Pritzwald to reach the B111 to Wolgast. Parking is available on Platz der Juaend opposite St. Petrikirche.

13th-century Cistercian monastery.

another favorite subject of the artist.

#### Wolgast

#### Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania; 17438 Now peaceful after being wrecked by war for centuries, the "Gateway to the island of Usedom" is an ideal stop on the drive Visitors can walk behind

the 14th-century parish church, **St. Petrikirche**, which has part of an early Slavic temple next to the rear portal and a copy of 16th-century artist Hans Holbein's *Totentanz* frieze, into the cozy Altstadt. Rebuilt after being burnt down by Peter the Great of Russia in 1713, the old town clusters above a small harbor where grain ships docked in the 19th century.

Other highlights include the **Alter Speicher**, an 262-ft (80-m) long half-timbered granary, one of the largest buildings in the old town and the family home of Philipp Otto Runge (1777–1810), the famous Romantic painter.

Continue on the B111 over the bridge on to Usedom. Turn left after miles (5 km) to reach Peenemunde.

#### Usedom

#### Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania: 17424

The island, named after the village of Usedom and separated from the mainland by the Peenestrom Strait. is the second largest in Germany, covering an area of 172 sq miles (445 sa km). Renowned for its great natural beauty. Usedom has white beaches, forests, peat bogs, and bays overgrown with rushes in the south. The island is linked to the mainland by two drawbridges near Anklam and Wolgast.

Historically, the most interesting spot on the island is the Historisch-technisches Informationszenytum (Apr-Sept: open daily: Oct-Mar: closed Mon) at Peenemünde. located in military territory. On October 3, 1942. Luftwaffe scientists successfully launched a rocket here after seven years of testing. Originally intended for a jet plane, the technology was hijacked by the Nazis to develop the V-1 and V-2 Veraeltunaswaffen (vengeance weapons) – flying bombs that were used to attack London in 1944. The museum documents this breakthrough in science and its post-war consequences. Return to the B111 junction and then turn left to reach Heringsdorf Park near the tourist office. The largest resort in Usedom spreads out behind a silvery sand beach with continental Europe's longest pier (555 vards/508 m). In the late 19th century, this was the playground of Prussia's elite, as is evident in the palatial

With Bad Doberan 1 as a base, visit the Münster, its Gothic altars steeped in medieval mystery, then tour the Marienkirche in Rostock 2 and the beach at Warnemünde. Drive to the art colony beach resort of Ahrenshoop on Fischland 3 for lunch and some window shopping. Later, stroll on an unspoiled beach, then either admire

Prerow am Darss's museum or, in spring and fall, go bird-watching at Zingst.

Take the B105 to Rostock and then the B103 to Warnemünde, Follow the drivina instructions through Ahrenshoop to Zinast, then take the B105 back to Bad Doheran.

#### Culture and coast

In Stralsund 4 explore the Alter Markt's fine ensemble of Gothic buildings before driving to Rügen Island 5 for a clifftop stroll at the

Königsstuhl, the ideal way to work up an appetite for lunch on the beach at Binz. Leave the car at the parking lot in Jagdschloss Granitz, a Neo-Classical castle, and make the return trip to Putbus, Rügen's first resort, by vintage steam train. End the day relaxing at the beach resort of Binz, which is near the castle.

Take the B96 to Sassnitz, then follow driving instructions to Königsstühl and in reverse to Binz. Take the B196 to Bergen to rejoin th B96 for Stralsund.

# Land of a Thousand Lakes

Numerous glacial lakes give the heart of Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania (Mecklenburg-Vorpommern) its nickname, the "Land of a Thousand Lakes." This aquatic mosaic encompasses everything from small freshwater seas to myriad minor pools in the Müritz-Nationalpark, where astonishing birdlife is as much a part of the scenery as sweeping vistas. This tour takes drivers from coast to country: from the cobbled lanes of the medieval port of Wismar to Schwerin, the capital of the state, with its enchanting castle, then east into the state's rustic heart around Güstrow, finally ending at Neustrelitz, the former Residenzstadt of a duchy.



Start/finish Wismar to Neustrelitz

Number of days: 2-3 days, allowing half a day to explore Wismar.

Distance: 155 miles (250 km)

Road conditions: Roads are good except in the Müritz-Nationalpark. where a section of paved track and unsurfaced road can be tricky in winter when it snows. Roads are well marked outside the national park.

When to go: Late spring to fall is a good time to visit the region. Visitors should not miss the spectacular annual crane migration in mid-October. Most facilities in the park close from November to April, and small lakes often freeze in winter

Opening times: Most shops are open from 9am to 5pm, Monday to Friday, Attractions are open from 9am to 5pm, but are generally closed on Mondavs.

Main market days: Wismar: Tue, Thu & Sat: Schwerin: Wed & Fri: Güstrow: Tue, Thu & Sat: Waren: Tue & Thu.

Major festivals: Wismar: Hafentage (harbor festival), 2nd weekend in Jun: Schwerin: Schlossfestspiele (music festival), Jun-Jul: Altstadtfest (old town festival), mid-Sept.


Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania; 23952

A provincial town on the Baltic Sea, Wismar is worth a visit for its faded grandeur and historic charm. Renovation has repaired the damage wreaked by World War II to restore something of the looks of the town's golden ages. It was declared a World Heritage Site in 2002.

#### A 90-minute walking tour

Take Bergstrasse from behind the parking lot to reach the cobbled **Markt** ①. A showpiece of restoration work, this is one of the largest market squares in north Germany. To the north of the square is the Neo-Classical Rathaus, which houses a museum (open daily) in its cellar with displays on the town's history. Cross

the main shopping street, Hegede, behind the tourist office, to reach the town's Gothic quarter. Only an archdeacon's house on the corner of Sargmacherstrasse and the massive tower of **Marienkirche** ② remain from before the Allied bombing raids in 1945. Take a tour up the 262-ft (80-m) tower (open daily), which has displays on medieval construction techniques.



#### Swedish Heads

Wismar's unofficial mascots, these brightly painted, moustachioed figures have lions' heads for hats. One bust is in the Markt, two more are near the mouth of the old port, all replicas of two "Swedish Heads" that stood at the harbor mouth during the Swedish occupation. One theory behind the name suggests that the original busts came from an 18thcentury Swedish merchant ship.

A little further, on Vor dem Fürstenhof. is the **Fürstenhof** 3. An Italian-style palace for the dukes of Mecklenburg. this Mannerist building has terracotta friezes that retell the stories of the Trojan Wars and the Prodigal Son

Further down this road stands St. Georgen Kirche 4), the largest church in Wismar. The Grosse Hohe Strasse leading northward from the church portal threads down to the cobbled Lübsche Strasse. once a mercantile thoroughfare. On its junction with Neustadt is the Heiligen-Geist-Kirche (5) (open daily).

a fine example of a hospital church. Take Neustadt from beside the church and continue down it to cross the Grube – Germany's first urban canal, dug in the mid-1200s - and to get to the ring road and the Alter **Hafen (6)**. The port may look familiar to film buffs, as it was featured in the classic silent movie Nosferatu (1922). Opposite is the Wassertor ①, the last of the gateways in the town's medieval fortifications. Return to the Grube and follow it eastward to the Nikolaikirche (8). This bulky late-Gothic basilica was once the church of medieval seafarers and, despite its size, managed to survive World War II's air raids. View glazed friezes on its facade before marveling at the 121-ft (37-m) high interior with original frescoes. Continue alongside the Grube and then cross it on Schweinsbrücke or "pigs bridge." Here stands the Schabbellhaus (9), a Dutch Renaissance mansion whose museum (closed Mon) contains one of the original "Swedish Heads" among many paintings and curios. Continue southward on ABC-Strasse to reach the Markt, then take Bergstrasse back to the parking lot.

☐ Turn right from the parking lot on to Dr-Leber-Strasse, then turn left to

ioin the B106 to Schwerin, Follow sians for Am Schloss parkina lot opposite the palace.

#### Schwerin

Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania: 19053

Picturesquely situated amidst several lakes the state capital's main attraction is hard to miss. The ducal Schloss bristling with towers and topped with a gilded turret like a crown, looks like something out of Cinderella, Duke Paul Friedrich Franz II's inspiration for the renovation of his dynastic residence came from the Loire's Chambord Chateau The palace's showrooms (open daily) revel in ancestral pomp. Across the palace footbridge is the state museum Staatliches Museum (closed Mon). Highlights include 17th-century Flemish art and works by Rembrandt. After the visit, enjoy a cruise (www.weisseflotteschwerin.de) on

the Schweriner See. Drive around the lake to follow signs to Ludwiaslust, then to the B321. In Zippendorf, park at Am Strand.

#### Zippendorf and Muess Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania: 19063

About 2 miles (3 km) from Schwerin's city center, the lakeside suburb of Zippendorf is a great place to relax on the beach or stroll around the lake. About 1 mile (2 km) from here lies another suburb, Muess. Its open-air museum, Freilichtmuseum (mid-Apr-Oct: closed Mon), provides a glimpse of rustic Mecklenbura.

Continue west on the B321 past Crivitz and turn left to Goldbera. Take the B192 to Dobbertin, turn right to Güstrow, and follow sians to Zentrum. Turn left on to Wallensteinstrasse to park near the Schloss.

#### 4 Güstrow

#### Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania: 18273

The old town in Güstrow is dominated by its 16th-century Schloss (Apr-Oct: open daily; Nov–Mar: closed Mon), built by the Italian architect Franz Parr Highlights include its banquet hall with striking stucco hunting scenes. Among its glass and antiques is the Menagerie series that Flemish artist Maerten de Vos (1532-1603) created at the height of the Age of Exploration. The nearby **Dom** contains the tombs of the palace's founder. Duke Ulrich. and his two wives. This early-Gothic basilica has a bronze angel by Ernst Barlach, Germany's finest Expressionist sculptor. His work can also be seen in Gertrudenkapelle (Gertrude Chapel) (open daily) and Atelierhaus, 2 miles (3 km) east of Güstrow.

From the parking lot, return to the main road and turn left onto Goldberger Strasse. Turn right onto Plauer Strasse for the B104. In Teterow, take the B108 to Burg Schlitz.

#### Burg Schlitz

#### Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania; 17166

Nicknamed "Mecklenburg Switzerland" due to its low moraine hills, the municipality of Hohen Demzin is known for its palaces, the grandest of which is the Neo-Classical Burg Schlitz. Built in the 1820s for Count Schlitz, it is now a luxury hotel that stands within beautifully landscaped parkland. Near its



chapel is the Secessionist nymph fountain, cast in 1903 for a Berlin department store. A copy of the fountain stands in New York's Central Park.

Continue south on the B108 to
Waren; drive into Zentrum for parking
lots around the harbor.

# 6 Müritz-Nationalpark Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania: 17192

Covering an area of 124 sq miles (322 sq km), the Müritz-Nationalpark is famous for its birdlife and boating facilities. Foreign visitors, however, have not yet discovered the tiny glacial lakes, forests, and abundant birdlife of this sparsely populated and quiet backwater destination.

A half-timbered town on the north shore of the Müritzsee (Lake Müritz), **Waren** is an ideal base for tourists with its beaches, hiking, and boating options (03991 153 40; www.mueritzfsch.de). At 44 sq miles (115 sq km), Müritzsee is Germany's largest lake after Constance. Visitors can find a bench at the harbor and enjoy the bustle as motorboats and small yachts tie up at the wharf or embark on a cruise on the lake (Weisse Flotte Muritz, Kietzstrasse 17; 03991 12 26 68; www.mueritzschiffpht.de) aboard a

#### **Winged Wonders**


Renowned for its birdlife, the Müritz-Nationalpark is a popular destination for those who want to spot the ospreys and sea eagles that breed here. Visitors can get information about sightings from the park center at Federow where there is an observation station. The spectacular avian show in the second half of October should not be missed. Thousands of cranes can be seen migrating south. The marshland around the Rederangsee, south of Federow, is a favorite roosting area.



vintage steamer. The **Müritzeum** (03991 633 680; www.mueritzeum.de), at the eastern edge of the old town, houses the nation's largest freshwater aguarium and has displays on ecology.

Return from the center to locate brown signs for the Müritz-National park on the B192. After half a mile (1 km) turn right following parking signs on Meckleburger Strasse and head to **Federow**. Visitors can pick up maps from the park center in Federow (May-Oct: open daily) and then continue to the hamlet of Speck on the banks of the Specker See (Lake Speck); it is possible to spot osprevs on a 1.5 mile (2.5 km) circuit of the lake Another walk ascends to a viewing platform on the Käflingsberg Hill; the trail head is just over half a mile (1 km) from the end of the paved road

For a long walk, continue walking on the track beyond Speck, then turn left at the crossroads to the farming villages of **Granzin** and **Dalmsdorf**, where residents sell smoked fish by the roadside. Canoes can be rented (Kormoran Kanutouing Granzin 38, 17237 Kratzeburg-Granzin; www.kormoran-kanutouring.de) between April and early October to view the scenery around the lake.





Return to Waren and turn right onto the B192. At Möllenhagen, turn right again following signs to Ankershagen, Peckatel, and Blumenholz. Turn right onto the B96 and take the Neustrelitz/ Kiefernheide exit to Neustrelitz.

#### Neustrelitz

#### Mecklenburg-Lower Pomerania; 17235

Designed in the 1730s as the Residenzstadt, or residence town, of a minor Mecklenburg duchy, the origins of Neustrelitz as a custom-built capital are evident in its unique and symmetrically designed Markt or marketplace, with streets that radiate like spokes from the corners. Visitors can better appreciate the square's perfect geometry from a viewing platform in the Baroque town church and then take the Schlosstrasse to the Schloss. This ducal palace was destroyed in World War II, but its gardens retain their naturalistic English style as designed by Peter Josef Lenné. the great Prussian garden designer of the 19th century. The orangery also remains intact and is now a restaurant. Its interiors were designed by the 19th-century master architect Karl Schinkel and Prussian court sculptor Christian Daniel Rauch.

In Schwerin ②, visit Staatliches Museum, then drive east to Güstrow ④ for lunch. Explore the Dom and Schloss, and head to Wismar ① to view more architectural wonders. End the day on Zippendorf's 3 beach.

Take the B104 northward from the Schloss in Schwerin to Güstrow. Return on the B104 to Prüzen, turn right to Bützow, and head to Steinhagen, Neukloster. Then turn right onto the B192. Go left at Zurow to the B105 to reach Wismar. Follow the driving instructions to reach Zippendorf.

#### Outdoor escapes

Spend a day in Waren and explore the Müritz-Nationalpark **6**. Visit the park center in Federow or go on a hike up the Käflingsberg. Drive to Granzin to go canoeing before strolling around the Schloss gardens of Neustrelitz **7**.

Follow instructions to Neustrelitz. Retrace the route to Waren.

# History and Revolutions Along the Elbe

This tour loosely follows the Elbe, a major river that runs through Saxony-Anhalt (Sachsen-Anhalt), a state dotted with historic sights. In the 7th century, the river formed a natural frontier between Germans in the west and Slavic tribes in the east. In the 10th century, however, the German Saxons made a concerted effort to secure the border and colonize and Christianize the east, to which end. they built a series of great churches and abbeys in Magdeburg, Havelberg and Jerichow. With the border secured, river trade helped settlements flourish – in particular the town of Tangermünde, whose half-timbered core has been wonderfully preserved. Further south along the Flbe, the small town of Rismark Lutherstadt Wittenberg is renowned as the birthplace of Protestantism. History is not the only attraction on this route: large portions of the Elbe are part of a UNESCO-designated biosphere reserve that offers good hiking, as do the wonderful country gardens of Wörlitz.



# 1 Havelberg Saxony-Anhalt: 39532

Havelberg's old town occupies a small island in the Havel river close to its confluence with the Elbe. This town was founded as a Christian missionary outpost in 948 by Emperor

Otto I, who sensed a perfect defensive position in heathen Slav territory. Medieval houses still cluster in the old town, and above them looms the somber **Dom St. Marien** (open daily), built between 1150 and 1170. The cathedral was destroyed in a huge fire in the 13th century, and its present appearance is the result of Gothic additions to its Romanesque core, with impressive results. Its most remarkable feature is a 14th-century

remarkable feature is a 14th-century stone choir screen carved with scenes from the New Testament.

☐ Turn right in the direction of Genthiner Strasse and stay on the B107 to Jerichow. Turn right at the town entrance to the Abbey parking lot.

#### 2 Jerichow Abbey Saxony-Anhalt; 39319

Like the Dom at Havelberg, Jerichow Abbey (closed Mon) was built during a spate of mid-12th-century ecclesiastical expansion. This Premonstratensian convent was founded in 1144, making it one of northern Germany's oldest brick buildings. The abbey museum displays the brick building methods that became typical of the region as it was settled in by the Germans.

Drive along the B107, turn left on to the B188 westwards to Tangermünde.

Leave the B188, going southward on Arneburger Strasse. Bear right on Lindenstrasse, then left on Grete-Minde to park on Lange Strasse.

#### 3 Tangermünde Saxony-Anhalt; 39585

Central Tangermünde is a snapshot of the early 17th century – almost all the half-timbered houses along its central cobblestoned Lange Strasse replaced those lost in a fire in 1617. The fire was blamed on an innocent Grete Minde, who was thought to want revenge after the town's court refused her inheritence. She was soon after burned as a witch, but is now celebrated by a bronze statue that stands

to the left of the **Rathaus**, one of the few buildings to escape the blaze. Built in the 1430s, it bristles with gables and ornamentation. A stroll down Kirchstrasse reveals a series of timber-framed bouses en route to

the late-Gothic St. Stephanskirche. completed at the end of the 15th century. The church was built by Charles IV. King of Bohemia, who used the town as his second royal residence after Prague. Behind the church are the remains of his castle, which was destroyed in 1640 by a Swedish campaign in the Thirty Years' War

☐ Turn left to Lüderitz on to the R189 which becomes the R71 in Maadebura, Follow sians to Zentrum then the Dom to reach the Domplatz for on-street parkina.

#### Friedensreich Hundertwasser

The Grüne Zitadelle in Magdeburg was the last work of Austrian architect and designer Friedensreich Hundertwasser (1928-2000). Inspired by Antonio Gaudí and Gustav Klimt, Hundertwasser is famed for his rejection of straight lines in favor of unruly shapes, bright colors and chaotic designs. Fascinated by spirals, he called straight lines "the devil's tools."

#### Magdeburg Saxony-Anhalt: 39104

Established as a trading post by Charlemagne in the 9th century. Magdeburg became the main residence of Emperor Otto I in the 10th century. The town was brutally sacked in 1631 by Catholic imperial forces, while World War II leveled most of it. However, Maadeburg is not without reminders of its glorious past. The most impressive is the Gothic Dom St. Mauritius und St. Katharina (open daily) with distinctive octagonal turrets and spires. Its construction began in



1209, vastly enlarging an earlier monastery church founded by Otto I in 926. Look out for the emperor's tomb, sculptor Frnst Barlach's contemplative 1929 memorial to the dead of World War I, and the sculpture of the Maadeburger Virains (1240). illustrating the Parable of the Ten Virgins. In contrast, the most celebrated new building is the Grine Zitadelle (tour: daily) With its playful curves and colours, this apartment complex, designed by Austrian architect Friedensreich Hundertwasser, is a key landmark.

☐ Turn right along Frnst-Reuter-Allee and continue on the Brückstrasse. which becomes the B1, on to the B184. In Dessau, turn right on Rosslauer Allee then right on to Antoinettenstrasse. which becomes Puschkinallee, then left on Gropiusallee to the parking lot.

#### Bauhausgebäude Saxony-Anhalt: 06846

Built in 1925 in Dessau, the Bauhaus **School** continues to be a design school The work of architect Walter Gropius, this white concrete building is famed for the Bauhaus logo beside its parking lot and the innovative balconies at the back of the building. Its small museum, Ausstellung im Bauhaus (open Mon-Fri), has displays showcasing the application of Bauhaus theory to many areas of art and design. The front desk also sells tickets to the other Bauhaus attractions: the Meisterhäuser (masters' houses) and the Törten, a 1920s prototype housing estate, 4 miles (7 km) southeast of central Dessau.

☐ Go back to Puschkinallee, turn right and follow the street to the T-junction with Friedrichstrasse. Turn left then riaht on to Kavalierstrasse. Turn left to Vockerode, and at the T-junction, turn left to Wörlitz. Turn left on Seespitze and follow signs to the parking lot.

#### **Bauhaus**

The Bauhaus movement was begun in 1918 by painter Max Pechstein to utilize art for revolutionary purposes. One of its members, architect Walter Gropius, founded the design school. At odds with the Nazis during World War II, many members went into exile in the US, where they founded the International Style movement.

#### Wörlitz

#### Saxony-Anhalt: 06786

Many splendid residences set in landscaped gardens were huilt around Dessau in the 18th and 19th centuries Of these the most impressive is Wörlitz where Gothic follies and mock Classical statues dot manicured lawns while swans and rowing boats bob on a tranquil lake. Prince

Leopold III of Anhalt, along with his court architect Friedrich Wilhelm von Erdman, built the gardens in the second half of the 18th century. At the center stands the Neo-Classical

Schloss Wörlitz (open daily) with its muted Baroque decor. Behind the palace, the central lake spreads out and gondola tours pass beneath an array of bridges around the lake. Other park attractions include the Gotisches Haus, the prince's Neo-Gothic residence the mock Italian landscape Insel Stein and a synagogue (all open daily) modeled on the Temple of Vesta in Rome

☐ Turn left on Erdmannsdorff to Wittenberaer Strasse to ioin the B2. Turn right at the B187, then left at Elsterstrasse and riaht on Am Hauptbahnhof to exit on Lutherstrasse. Turn left at Neustrasse to park.

#### WALKING AROUND WÖRLITZ

The 35-mile (56-km) Gartenreichtour Fürst Franz hiking and biking trail travels through the nearby UNESCO biosphere reserve. Well-marked from Wörlitz parking lot, the closest point of interest along the route is the fishing village of Vockerode and the adjacent royal woodland park, Sieglitzer, both around 4 miles (6 km) to the west of Wörlitz. www.woerlitz-information.de: www.dessau-tourismus.de

#### Lutherstadt Wittenberg Saxony-Anhalt; 06886

Clinging to a scenic stretch of the Elbe, the tidy little town of Lutherstadt Wittenberg is named after its most famous resident. Martin Luther, who came here in 1508 and sparked the Protestant Reformation. It now basks in this golden era, celebrating the homes and graves of those who together created the "Protestant Rome."

#### A two-hour walking tour

From the Neustrasse parking lot turn left onto Mittelstrasse and follow it to Collegienstrasse where. beside a small park, lies the Lutherhaus (1) (Apr-Oct: open daily: Nov-Mar: closed Mon). formerly the Augustinian monastery into which Luther entered on arriving in the town. Dissolved during the Reformation,

one of the monastery's wings served as the Luther family residence. Today it contains a collection of Reformation relics: Luther's desk, pulpit, and first editions of many of his books. Outside the Lutherhaus and on the corner of Lutherstrasse and Am Hauptbahnhof, grows an old oak, the Luthereiche ②.

which was planted in 1830 on the spot where Luther displayed his





conviction in 1520 by publicly burning the papal bull threatening his excommunication. Further along Collegienstrasse from the Lutherhaus is the Renaissance Melanchthonhaus (3) (closed Man) the former house of Humanist Philipp Melanchthon. Luther's closest associate and the author of Augsburg Confession, a statement of belief that became the Protestant constitution. Further on, Collegienstrasse ends at the Marktplatz (4), where 19th-century statues of Luther and Melanchthon stand. To their right, an alley cuts through a row of townhouses to the Stadtkirche St. Marien (5) (open daily).



#### Luther's Living Room

Look out for Luther's living room in the Lutherhaus Left as bare as it was in 1535, it is easy to imagine his students gathered here for the religious conversations that were later compiled in the book Table Talk. Luther's views on many religious and social matters are candidly outlined in the book.

where Luther married Katharina von Bora and their six children were hantized. This church dates from 1300 and contains an altar (1547) painted by the artist Lucas Cranach the Elder and his son. On the southern side of the Marktplatz is the Cranachhaus 6. once the residence of the artist. A few doors to the right is his former studio. the Galerie im Cranachhaus (open daily). Further left, Schlossstrasse leads to the old palace and the Gothic Schlosskirche (7) (open daily). On October 31, 1517, Luther is said to have pinned his 95 theses on its door. which has since been replaced with a bronze door with the theses inscribed in Latin. His tombstone lies below the pulpit, opposite that of Melanchthon. The stairs up the Schlossturm (castle tower) next door offers pretty views over the town. Take the Schlosstrasse to Collegienstrasse, turn left into Mittelstrasse to the parking lot.

Take the B1 and turn left on to the B107 to Jerichow and then Havelbera.

#### Landscape and architecture

Follow the tour from Magdeburg 4 to the Bauhaus design school 5 Next, head for the charming, Englishstyle gardens of Wörlitz 6. If the weather is bad, visit the other

Bauhaus buildings in Dessau; if it is fine, enjoy a picnic in Wörlitz.





#### Schloss Charlottenburg Rerlin: 14059

The castle at Charlottenburg (closed Mon) was designed as a summer home for Sophie Charlotte, Elector Friedrich III's wife. Construction of the Altes Schloss the old castle designed by the German architect Johann Arnold Nering (1659-95) began in 1695 and the **Neuer Flügel** (closed Tue). or new wing, was added in the 18th century. The interior of the building was fully restored after World War II.

The Nering-Eosander-Bau (closed Mon), the palace in the Altes Schloss. contains the suites of Friedrich III and his wife. Its highlights include the Oak Gallery and the early 18th-century palace chapel. The Neuer Flügel is famous for its Goldene Galerie, a huge golden ballroom, as well as for its collection of paintings by Watteau, Chardin, and Pense (quided tours only).

The park behind the castle was originally French Baroque, but was reconstructed after World War II Dotted with interestina buildinas, it is open to visitors all through the year and is a scenic refuge for city dwellers, joggers, and families.

☐ Take the A115 toward Potsdam and turn on to Spanische Allee, which becomes Wannseebadwea, following sians to Strandbad Wannsee.

#### Strandbad Wannsee Berlin: 14129

The public lido Strandbad Wannsee (17 Apr-25 Sept: open daily), was constructed at the beginning of the 20th century and is big enough to accommodate 40.000 people on its artificial sandy beach. Its buildings, including the changing rooms. eateries, and bathrooms, were built in the straightfoward, functional Neue Sachlichkeit, or New Objectivity style, spearheaded by the architect Martin Wagner. Alternatively, stroll down Wannseebadweg to explore the nearby Schwanenwerder Island, which is home to some stunning villas.

Return to the A115 toward Potsdam and take the exit to Wannsee. Follow the B1 and continue westward to reach Klein Glienicke.



#### Klein Glienicke

#### Berlin: 14129

Klein Glienicke

For centuries, the Hohenzollern Dynasty, who first ruled as Prussian electors and kings and later as emperors, transformed the sandy glades, pine forests, and lakes southwest of Berlin into picture-perfect

> Kulturlandschaft – manmade landscapes of parks and palaces. Among the most brilliant of these is Klein Glienicke, built for Prince Karl of Prussia in the early 19th century. The vast park comprises the Schloss Glienicke (Apr-

Oct: closed Mon; Nov–Mar: open Sat & Sun), the Jagdschloss Glienicke, or Glienicke Hunting Lodge, and a number of smaller buildings. The palace and park were declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1990.

The simple Neo-Classical façade of the charming Schloss Glienicke has a solemn dignity about it that was once admired by Goethe (see p108). Inside, the atmosphere is rich, with many lovely paintings, colorful walls, and rooms that are elegantly appointed with the architect Schinkel's furnishings and lit by bright, golden chandeliers. The proportions are perfect, giving the entire ensemble a particularly harmonious look.

The adjoining park has a mock monastery, or Klosterhof, a coach house, and the Grosse Neugierde, a Neo-Classical pavilion that offers splendid views of the Havel river.

Return to the B1 and then continue on it toward Potsdam. Once in the city, follow the signs toward Park Sanssouci.



#### Park Sanssouci

Brandenburg; 14469

A vast collection of ornate gardens, water features, and follies, Park Sanssouci is also home to fantastic Neo-Classical, Baroque, and Rococo palaces and pavilions. The first building on the site was the enchanting Schloss Sanssouci, built for the Prussian King Frederick the Great in 1745. Over the next 150 years, the park was transformed into one of the finest royal complexes in Europe.

## A two-hour walking tour

Arrive early at Park
Sanssouci in order to
avoid the crowds. Georg
Wenzeslaus von Knobelsdorff
(1699–1753) built this lavish
complex between 1745 and
1747. From the parking lot.

walk to the surprisingly small Schloss Sanssouci (1) (auided tours only), which served the art-loving Frederick the Great as a retreat from wars and daily politics. Start the tour through the park at this magnificent Rococo palace, set atop beautiful terraced lands with grapevines. To the east of the palace stands the **Bildergalerie** (2), home to the king's collection of 17th-century Italian and Dutch paintings, including works by Caravaggio. Rubens, and Van Dvck. To the west of the palace is the massive Neue Kammern 3 (Apr: open Sat & Sun; May-Oct: closed Mon), the new chambers,

formerly used as a guesthouse by the royal family.

Cross the Maulbeerallee and follow signs to **Orangerieschloss ()** (Apr: open Sat & Sun; May—Oct: closed Mon), which dates back to 1860 and now houses the tourist information center.

for the park. The Neues Palais (5)

(Apr: open Wed; Nov-Mar: open Wed-Mon), or New Palace, is much larger and grander than Schloss Sanssouci. It is accessed by following Hauptallee, the straight avenue that runs through Park Sanssouci. This palace was built after the Seven

Years'War (1756–63) as a symbol of the strength and stability of Frederick's reign in the wake of the conflict. Highlights of this palace include the Grotto Hall where marble walls and columns are decorated with marine motifs. The upper gallery has paintings by 17th-century masters and the theater is still used to host performances of classical music.

Take the path to the south of the Neues Palais to Schloss Charlottenhof, a palace that was built in 1826 during the reign of Frederick William IV by architect Karl Friedrich Schinkel in typical Neo-Classical style. From here, walk to the neighboring Römische Bäder (May-Oct: closed Mon), or Roman Baths, and the Chinesisches Teehaus (a) (May-Oct: closed Mon). Designed in an imitation Chinese style that was fashionable in 1757, this Rococo tea house was once used to host royal tea parties. An exhibition of exquisite

norcelain is now housed here Walk eastward from here and across the canal to the Italienische Friedenskirche (7), home to a 12thcentury Byzantine mosaic. This Neo-Romanesque church is modeled on the Rasilica of San Clemente in Rome Walk back to the main avenue and follow signs back to the parking lot

Visitors can also opt for a detour to Schloss Cecilienhof (closed Mon) huilt for Crown Prince Wilhelm in 1913 It is located in the Neuer Garten, or New Garden, a section of the park that borders on Heiliger See. The palace is famous for having hosted the Potsdam Conference in 1945 when the heads of the Allied nations discussed the fate of post-war Germany. To reach the palace from Schloss Sanssoucci walk east on Voltaireweg, then Reisterweg and Alleestrasse, or take Bus No. 603 from outside Park Sanssouci.

From Schloss Sanssouci follow sians toward Babelsbera and then to Alexandrowka to reach the Russische Kolonie.

#### Russische Kolonie and Holländisches Viertel Brandenburg: 14467

A short drive from the Neuer Garten. Russische Kolonie, the Russian colony, is a charming residential area known for its wooden log cabins, each with an enchanting little garden. It was built in 1826 for the singers of a Russian choir – a present from Tsar Alexander I of Russia to Prussia. In turn, the Prussian king built the Russian-style houses so



that the choir would feel more at home in Potsdam, Follow the B2 to the **Holländisches Viertel**, or Dutch quarter. It has 134 red-brick gabled houses along cobblestoned allevs that were built by Dutch craftsmen in the first half of the 18th century. during the reign of Friedrich Wilhelm I.

Follow signs southeastward to the Filmpark Babelsbera.

#### Filmpark Babelsberg Brandenburg: 14482

This film park was laid out on the site where Germany's first films were produced in 1912. The major films created in these studios were Metropolis, by the Austrian-American filmmaker Fritz Lang, and Blue Angel, which turned the actress Marlene Dietrich into a star. The film park was also used for the production of Nazi propaganda films during Hitler's rule. Today, it is one of Europe's largest studio complexes and the source of blockbusters such as Ouentin Tarantino's Inalourious Basterds. Visitors can admire some of the sets as well as strintmen in action

## **Grand Old Prussian Avenues**

Around Berlin, scores of venerable, tree-lined Prussian avenues slice through the flat countryside to connect a series of varied attractions. Amid the forested rolling hills between Brandenburg and Mecklenburg-Western Pomerania in the north is Rheinsberg, a pretty town with a modest palace that was once a favorite of Frederick the Great. A short drive south is the former concentration camp of Sachsenhausen. More pleasant reminders of the past lie to the east, including the 13th-century monastery at Chorin and a remarkable Prussian ship hoist at Niederfinow. To the south, the leafy hills around Buckow are perfect for hiking, while the myriad waterways that crisscross the UNESCO-designated biosphere reserve of Spreewald can be explored in a punt. The Spreewald region also bears remnants of the Sorbian culture that prevailed before the 10th-century German conquest.



#### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

**Start/finish:** Schloss Rheinsberg to Freilandmuseum Lehde.

**Number of days:** 3 days, allowing half a day to explore Buckow.

Distance: 186 miles (300 km).

**Road conditions:** Generally well paved and straight minor roads.

When to go: Summer is best for attending music festivals and visiting Buckow and the Spreewald region. In winter, allow plenty of time in the warmth of the Tropical Islands.

**Opening times:** Most attractions open daily, while shops usually open from 9am to 5pm, Monday to Friday, but close early on Saturdays. Shops and services are closed on Sundays. Restaurants generally close around 10pm.

Main market days: Schloss Rheinsberg: Wed & Sat; Lübben: Wed & Fri.

**Shopping:** In Rheinsberg, look out for traditional pottery with its trademark dark blue and cream glazes.

Major festivals: Schloss Rheinsberg: Rheinsberger Musiktage (music days), May/Jun; Kammeroper Schloss Rheinsberg (opera festival), late Jun/mid-Aug; Kloster Chorin: Choriner Musiksommer (classical music festival), Jun; Buckow: Literatursommer (literary summer festival), May–Aug.

#### **DAY TRIP OPTIONS**

Families will enjoy boating in Spreewald before taking a splash in the Tropical Islands. History enthusiasts can head to the monastery in Chorin followed by a visit to the ship hoist at Niederfinow and, later, take a walk around Buckow. ## 1 Schloss Rheinsberg

According to Frederick the Great. king of Prussia, his happiest days were spent in the Schloss Rheinsberg (closed Mon), located in a sedate little town of the same name. Here, in the early 18th century, he studied for the throne, wrote flute sonatas. and gave occasional concerts. Later the palace served as a sanatorium. It has since been renovated and has become a popular attraction with lovely gardens; some of the elegant palace rooms can be visited. Highlights include the Spiegelsaal (mirror hall), with its dizzying ceiling fresco by court painter Antoine Pesne, and the Baroque Muschelsaal (shell hall) with its maritime theme. The north wing of the palace houses the Tucholsky Literaturmuseum (closed Mon), which examines the life of pacifist and left-wing journalist


Kurt Tucholsky (1890–1935).

#### **Rheinsberg and Kurt Tucholsky**

The picturesque setting of Rheinsberg provided Kurt Tucholsky with inspiration for his novel Rheinsberg: Ein Bilderbuch für Verliebte (Rheinsberg: a Picture Book for Lovers), a cheerful love story laced with criticism of bourgeois thought and nationalism. This made it one of the books burned by the Nazis once they came to power, though by then Tucholsky had already left Germany. He died in exile, in Sweden, before the World War II he had predicted broke out.

Köpernitz, turn left in the direction of Gransee. From here, turn right and get onto the B96 to Nassenheide. Take the exit toward Oranienburg-Nord then turn left on Granseer Strasse toward Sachsenhausen. Turn left on to the Friedrichsthaler Strasse, and almost at the roundabout, exit onto Sophie-Scholl-Strasse, which becomes Aderluch. Turn left on Schäferweg to reach the parking lot at the former camp gates.



#### Gedenkstätte Sachsenhausen

Brandenburg: 16515

A poignant reminder of one of the most oppressive regimes of the 20th century, the Gedenkstätte Sachsenhausen, or memorial (open daily; museums: closed Mon), portrays the atrocities that occurred here when it was converted into a concentration camp during World War II. The Sachsenhausen became a model for most other Nazi camps. Though it was never designated a full-blown

"death camp," around half of its 220,000 prisoners were killed. Inside, several museums detail the lives and fates of the prisoners and document the horrors of systematic executions. Take a tour of the hall that examines the Soviet Special Camp (1945–50) that existed here after World War II when the Russians imprisoned 60,000 suspected Nazis and killed at least 12,000 of them, although most of them were probably innocent.

☐ Turn left from the parking lot on Strasse der Nationen and then right on to Strasse der Einheit. Take the B273 to Wandlitz, then turn left in the direction of Bisenthal and continue toward Eberswalde. In Eberswalde, turn right on to the B167, then left over the canal towards Angermünde. Finally, turn left at the sign for the cloister parking lot.

#### Kloster Chorin

Brandenburg: 17279

Founded in 1258 by Cistercian monks, Chorin cloister (open daily) is studded with decorative brickwork. One of the grandest red-brick structures in Germany, its scale is impressive even today; it is hard to imagine what its impact would have been in the 12th century. Dissolved in 1542, the monastery slowly crumbled until the 19th century, when its slender arches, graceful windows, and step gables were renovated during the Romantic movement. The surrounding parkland beside a pretty lake offers an idyllic walk.



## 4 The Schiffshebewerk

A huge iron sentinel perched amid rolling green hills the Schiffshebewerk (ship hoist) has a framework of gigantic girders designed for lifting boats 118 ft (36 m) between the Oder river and the Oder-Havel canal, two vital regional waterways. The ship hoist cuts the process of transferring giant barges from several tedious hours to just 20 minutes On its completion in 1934, it was the largest of its kind and remains impressive, particularly when viewed from the upper platform (open daily), a vantage point that provides good views. It is also possible to be a part of the experience by being lifted or lowered in a boat, such as those belonging to Fahrgastschiffahrt Neumann (03334 244 05: www finowkanalschiffahrt.de), whose ticket booth is in the Schiffshebewerk parking lot information kiosk. An adjacent visitors' center (open daily) details the construction of the hoist and of a new structure that is

#### Buckow

Brandenburg; 15377

With its rolling hills, trickling streams, and languid lakes, the sleepy little spa town of Buckow has long been a popular getaway from Berlin. Poet and playwright Bertolt Brecht was among those drawn here, spending several summers in an idyllic lakeside cottage. The house now makes an interesting stop on a walk around the three lakes between which Buckow nestles.

#### A 90-minute walking tour


From the parking lot, turn left down to Schulstrasse, left again along Hauptstrasse, and then look for a right turn down Erlenweg to the lovely lakeside promenade Follow this around the Buckowsee lake, turn right at a junction in the path to arrive at the **Brecht-Weigel-Haus** (1) (open Wed-Sun), where the artist couple Brecht and his wife. Helene Weigel. spent many summers in the mid-1950s. It is now a memorial to their time spent here. The interior of the house displays rustic furnishings alongside photo exhibits and the famous covered wagon used in Brecht's play Mother Courage and Her Children. From the house, follow Werderstrasse uphill then turn left up Bertolt-Brecht-Strasse, which climbs steeply to offer superb lake views. Buckow's ritziest homes are found

here. Most are attractive **pre-World War II villas** ② built with Art Nouveau touches. Turn left down Ringstrasse and left again on to the shores of the Schermützelsee, Buckow's largest lake. Here, **Strandbad Buckow** ③, a popular swimming beach, provides facilities as well as opportunities for renting row boats (www.buckow-online.de/freizeit/sport/sport.html). The hour-long lake tours by Seetours (Apr-Oct: open daily: 033433 232) also begin from here.

A marked path behind and uphill from the beach leads up the side of **Schlossberg** ③, a small hill that provides pretty views of the town. This leads back down to follow the banks of Griepensee to a small bridge beside the **Schweizer Haus** ③, a visitors' center that has a series of information boards and interactive displays about the local ecology and hiking routes. It faces Lindenstrasse,

which leads to Königstrasse and into **Buckow's center** ⑤, with its smattering of shops. Return to the parking lot by walking left along Hauptstrasse and turning left again into Schulstrasse.

Return to the B168 and continue to Müncheberg then to Beerfelde. Follow the B168, bypassing Fürstenwalde, then turn riaht on to Hauptstrasse, following signs to Alt Schadow. Take Lubbener Strasse. which becomes Dorfstrasse to Schlepzia, Turn left, go past Krausnick-Gr. Wasserbura then turn right to the parking lot at the Tropical Islands.



## **6** Tropical Islands

Brandenburg; 15910

Occupying a former Zeppelin hangar, Tropical Islands (open daily), is a landscaped indoor park complex which contains plenty of water-based attractions, such as pools, lagoons, whirlpools, waterfalls, and saunas as well as a number of restaurants. Enjoy the lush landscape and look out for the tropical birds that luxuriate in the constant 81° F (27° C) temperature of the complex.

Return to Krausnick-Gr.
Wasserburg and head to Schlepzig.
From here turn right, then right again
to get on to the B87 to park at the
harborside parkina lot in Lübben.



#### 7 Lübben Brandenburg: 15907

The largest Spreewald town, Lübben bustles with hotels and restaurants. Its most popular attraction is the pretty Schloss (Apr–Oct: closed Mon; Nov–Mar: open Wed–Sun), which houses a regional history museum. Behind the

palace is the attractive Schlossinsel, an artificial archipelago with gardens and a leafy maze. Nearby, the busy harbor area buzzes with punts, or *Kahn*, which cruise the surrounding waterways. A number of operators (www.bootsverleipetrick. de) provide tours as well as canoe or kayak rentals

From the parking lot turn left on to the B87 then left again, following signs to Lübbenau. From Lübbenau, turn left at Dammstrasse and park in central Lübbenau for a 2 mile (4 km)

#### 8 Freilandmuseum Lehde Brandenburg: 03222

Popular for punting and canoeing trips, the village of Lehde is dominated by the Freilandmuseum Lehde (Apr-Oct open daily). This museum recreates a traditional Sorbian village, using original houses and farmhouses. Take a look at the simple, rustic furnishings inside, including some memorable beds designed to sleep a whole family.

#### The Sorbs

Germany's only indigenous ethnic minority, the Sorbs, now just 60,000 in number, can trace their ancestry back to the Slavic Wends, who, in the 5th century, settled in the Lusatia swamps between the Oder and Elbe rivers. In the 10th century, this region was conquered and forcibly Germanized. Yet Sorbian is still spoken in the region, most street signs are bilingual, and popular Sorbian festivals are still observed.

From Chorin, take the Angermünder Strasse to Britz, then turn on to Oderberger Strasse and further on to Coderberger Strasse, then An der Schleusentreppe and Hebewerk Strasse to Niederfinow. Take the B167 to Sternebech, which joins the B35. Then take the Hauptstrasse following the signs to Buckow.

#### History and architecture

Visit the memorial at Sachsenhausen 2 before heading to the delightful Schloss Rheinsberg 1.

Take the B96 to Gransee. Take the Sonnenberger Strasse and then the Rheinsberger Strasse to Koppernitz, following signs to Rheinsberg.

## Palaces and Castles of Münsterland

The plains on the German-Dutch border see few visitors except those who stop by Westphalia's (Nordrhein-Westfalen) capital, the lively university city of Münster. Yet, with its short distances and straight roads, Münsterland provides perfect back roads touring. It is a sparsely populated landscape of half-timbered farmsteads, windmills, and woods, as well as of spires that soar above neat market squares. The countryside is dotted with numerous moated castles and manor houses on artificial islets – the hundred or so *Wasserschlösschen* (water castles) from a feudal past still largely privately owned by noble families. Starting at the historic town of Kalkar, this tour takes drivers to the architecturally rich city of Münster.



#### **PLAN YOUR DRIVE**

Start/finish: Kalkar to Münster.

Number of days: 2 days, allowing half a day to explore Münster.

Distance: 97 miles (156 km).

**Road conditions:** The region has well-marked roads. There is some congestion during rush hour in the short section of the road into Münster.

**When to go:** It is best to visit this region in late spring or summer, when palace gardens are in full bloom.

**Opening times:** Most restaurants are closed either on Mondays or Tuesdays.

Main market days: Kalkar: Thu; Xanten: Mon, Thu & Sat; Münster: Wed & Sat (produce and crafts market).

**Major festivals:** Münster: The Send (funfair and crafts market) early Mar, 3rd or 4th weekend in Jun & Sept.

#### **■** Kalkar

#### North Rhine-Westphalia: 47546

Cafés and shops occupy the patricians' houses on Kalkar's cobbled Marktplatz, dominated by the 15th-century **Rathaus**. The square is a fine place to sit and soak up the atmosphere of this historic town. Highlights include **St. Nikolaikirche** (open daily), whose stunningly intricate altars date from Kalkar's golden age in the 15th and 16th centuries; the high altar was created by three craftsmen over 12 years.

■ Leave the town on Altkakaren Strasse to the left of the church. Turn left at the roundabout on to the B57 toward Xanten. Parking is available in the Archäologischer Park and in Xanten's Ostwall and Markt.

#### 2 Xanten

#### North Rhine-Westphalia: 46509

Located by the mighty Rhine river, Xanten was once a Roman metropolis known as Colonia Ulpia Traiana. Today's walled town was established around a memorial church, **Dom St. Victor**. Built on top of the grave of the martyr St. Victor, the church was first named *Ad Sanctos* (by the saints), which was soon shortened to Xanten.

On the outskirts of the town is the **Archäologischer Park** (open daily), which, with its reconstructed Roman public buildings, hints at the scale of this 1st-century port, which housed 10,000 people. A museum by the baths has displays on the town's Roman past.

Continue on the B57 and turn left toward Wesel. Follow the B58 through Wesel to turn left on to the B70 to Raesfeld. Park at the Schloss.

#### Schloss Raesfeld

#### North Rhine-Westphalia: 46348

The 17th-century moated palace of Count Alexander II von Velen, Schloss Raesfeld, was described as a "trumpet blast in stone", and is still an impressive edifice with a fine Baroque altar in its chapel. A riverside walk through the garden behind the palace leads to a ruined watermill

Drive through Raesfeld and take the B224 at the roundabout on the outskirts of the town. Turn left at Erle to reach Lembeck. Follow signs to the Schloss.

#### Chateaux of Münsterland

Without a defensive hill anywhere on the plains of Münsterland, feudal rulers in the Middle Ages turned to water for protection. Broad moats were dug to encircle their Wasserschlösschen. More powerful cannons and peace rendered such defenses obsolete in the 17th century, so aristocrats recreated their strongholds as chateaux-style status symbols. Around 100 of these remain within a 50-mile (100-km) radius of Münster, of which 40 are still owned by the original noble families.

#### Schloss Lembeck

#### North Rhine-Westphalia: 46286

The formidable gatehouse of the moated Schloss Lembeck (Mar–Nov: open daily), belies the Baroque elegance inside. The Westphalian court architect Johann Conrad Schlaun introduced Italianate style to the castle in the 17th century, when he redesigned the Festsaal, or Celebration Hall. Visit the rhododendron park.

■ Turn right from the entrance of the castle and left at T-junction on to the B58. Drive through Haltern, turn left in Lüdinghausen at the white sign for "Burgen" and park at the castle. **Above left** Reconstructed Roman ruin in the Archäologischer Park, Xanten **Above** right Moated entrance to Schloss Raesfeld

#### Burg Vischering

North Rhine-Westphalia; 59348

Bura Vischerina (open daily) is one of the oldest and best-preserved castles in Münsterland Founded in 1270 it was extended in the 16th and 17th centuries. Across a drawbridge from agricultural outbuildings. the formidable U-shaped palace retains its loopholes (arrow slits in the walls) and hattlements. The castle also has features of early Renaissance palaces with its Oriel windows, gables, and the sandstone fireplaces inside its painted halls. Walk through the surrounding woodland for picture-postcard views of the castle reflected in the moat.

Return to the B58 and follow signs to Nordkirchen. Follow signs from the town center to "Wasserschloss".

Parking is available at the castle.

#### 6 Schloss Nordkirchen North Rhine-Westphalia: 59394

The vast, moated Schloss Nordkirchen, (open Sun) nicknamed the "Westphalian Versailles," is a perfectly symmetrical French Baroque castle. It was designed by the German architect Johann Conrad Schlaun (1695–1773) as an aristocratic status symbol. Now a

school of finance, it has Baroque gardens (open daily) sprinkled with white statuary.

Return to Lüdinghausen to reach the B235. Past Senden, turn right toward Albachten. Once past Roxel, turn left to park at Burg Hülshoff.

## Burg Hülshoff

North Rhine-Westphalia; 48329

The writer and poet Annette von Droste-Hülshoff, the most celebrated member of the aristocratic Hülshoff Dynasty, was born at Burg Hülshoff in 1797. The castle's ground floor (Feb-Dec: open daily) is a shrine to the writer, who is regarded as Germany's very own Emily Brontë – both writers died unmarried and penned somber tales steeped in their personal tragedies. There are splendid views of this Renaissance manor rising from its moat from the adjoining park, restored to recreate the gardens in which Hülshoff found inspiration.

Return to Roxel, turn left on to Roxeler Strasse to Münster. Continue on Einsteinstrasse and Wilhelmstrasse, turn right at the B219 junction. Park in front of Schloss Münster.

#### Revolution in Münster

Religious disaffection during the Reformation led to one of the most colorful episodes in Münster's history. A fundamentalist Anabaptist regime seized control of the city in 1534, with a Dutchman named Jan van Leiden at its head – money was made obsolete, property communal, and polygamy a duty. However, the city was recaptured in 1535 and van Leiden and his lieutenants were executed and their bodies hung in cages from the Lambertikirche spire as a warning to others.



#### Münster

North Rhine-Westphalia: 48143

Steeped in centuries of learning, the capital of Westphalia is the university city par excellence. World War II saw 90 per cent of the old town laid to ruins, but most of it has now been rebuilt. In 2004, the UN Environmental Programme hailed Münster as the world's most livable city. For visitors, its shops and fine cuisine add to its appeal and complement the impressive monuments and museums.

#### A 90-minute walking tour

The parking lot is located in the forecourt of **Schloss Münster** ①, the palace of Münster's Prince-Bishop rulers. Designed by the court's masterarchitect Johann Conrad Schlaun, the Baroque residence is now the main university building. From the parking lot, cross the road into Frauenstrasse. Turn left into Jüdefelderstrasse to the

Kuhviertel (2), a cozy nest of lanes full of student drinking dens. Walk back to Frauenstrasse and turn left to the Gothic Liebfrauenkirche, the Church

of Our Lady, popularly called Überwasserkirche ③, or church over water, after the Aa river behind it.

Continue down the road and cross the Aa to reach a cobbled lane framed by the twin spires of the **Dom** 

St. Paul (4), built in the 13th century to replace the monastery that gave Münster its name. Inside is a beautifully painted 16th-century astronomical clock by painter Ludger Tom Ring and a frieze in the Romanesque


vestibule illustrating the labors of the months. Opposite the cathedral, the Landesmuseum ③ (closed Mon) displays art and sculpture from the medieval to the modern ages. It includes religious sculptures by Münster's Heinrich Brabender that survived the Anabaptist purges. Walk across Domplatz to Prinzipalmarkt, a former merchants' street that now has some of the finest shops. Ahead is

the gabled Gothic Rathaus (a) (closed Mon) where the Catholic faction brokered a peace deal to end the Thirty Years' War. Walk down the main street to the 15th-century Lambertikirche (a). The three iron cages attached to its spire were used to display the executed Anabaptist revolutionaries. Turn right in front of the church to

stroll down Salzstrasse. Go past the **Stadtmuseum** (3) (closed Mon) at No. 28, which has Anabaptist exhibits, to the Promenadenring parkland that circles the city. A stroll along the promenade leads back to the parking lot.





## **Mystical Mountains**

A popular outdoor retreat for northern Germans, the scenic Harz mountain range lies where Saxony-Anhalt (Sachsen-Anhalt), Thuringia (Thüringen), and Lower Saxony (Niedersachsen) meet. Soaring peaks are absent here, but thickly wooded mountains abound, with pretty villages and modest resort towns tucked between them. The Harz's highest peak, the Brocken, is also its centerpiece, not least for its long-standing mystical associations with witchcraft. Mining too has been an integral part of life here, and old mines have now been made into attractions, but the Harz is famous mostly for hiking and cycling opportunities in summer and tobogganing and skiing in winter. The old narrow-gauge railroad network, complete with steam trains, is ideal for exploring the gateway towns of Quedlinburg and Goslar, both UNESCO World Heritage Sites.



Number of days: 2-3 days, allowing half a day to explore Goslar.

Distance: 86 miles (139 km).

Road conditions: Well paved, though many roads through the mountains tend to be steep and winding.

When to go: It is possible to visit year round, but minor roads are occasionally snowbound from December to March. Winter is best for skiing and sledding.

Opening times: Most attractions open daily, while shops open from 9am to 5pm, Monday to Friday, but close earlier on Saturday, Most shops and services are closed on Sunday, Restaurants generally close around 10pm.

## Burg Falkenstein Saxony-Anhalt: 06543

Sitting on a rocky outcrop, the stocky Burg Falkenstein (*Apr–Oct: open daily; Nov–Mar: closed Mon*) provides views over wooded hills and the eastern plains of Saxony-Anhalt, making it the most attractive castle in the Harz. Built between 1120 and 1180, it has since been expanded. Inside, the chapel is a highlight, as is the walk around its interiors, which include a museum. Falconry displays (*Mar–Oct: closed Mon*) are an added attraction.

Follow signs to Ballenstedt and turn left on to the B185. At the T-junction, turn right to Rieder. In Gernrode, turn right on Bergstrasse to Lindenstrasse. Park in Harzer Uhrenfabrik.

#### 2 Harzer Uhrenfabrik Saxony-Anhalt: 06507

Woodcarving has long been a traditional craft in the Harz, which is known for its cuckoo clocks.

The Harzer Uhrenfabrik factory (open daily) is one of the few places in Germany where visitors can watch clocks being made. A few paces down, Lindenstrasse lead to the **Stiftskirche St. Cyriakus**. An early pioneer of the Romanesque style, it is one of the country's best preserved churches

☐ Head back towards Rieder, but turn left on to Quedlinburger Strasse before the town of Quedlinburg. In Quedlinburg's town center, turn left on to Steinbrücke, then left again on to Carl-Ritter-Strasse parking lot.


### Quedlinburg

Saxony-Anhalt: 06484 Set in the rolling foothills of the Harz. the town of Ouedlinburg dates back to its foundation as a fortress in 922 after which it became the favorite residence of Saxon emperors. The town flourished as a center for dves. paper production, and engineering in the Middle Ages, when most of its half-timbered houses were built. Reached by continuing along Carl-Ritter-Strasse from the parking lot. then turning left up Finkenherd, the Schlossberg (open daily) is a knuckle of rock that served as the foundation for a 16th-century Renaissance castle constructed around the Stiftskirche St. Servatius (closed Mon), built between 1070 and 1129. The adjacent Schlossmuseum (open Sat–Thu) has local treasures dating back to the

Stone Age. To the right of the castle

with a courtvard that hosts the

gates is a row of half-timbered houses



where the 1920s works of this Bauhaus artist are displayed To the left of Carl-Ritter-Strasse, on Wordgasse, lies the Fachwerkmuseum (onen Fri-Wed). Germany's oldest half-timbered house. built in 1310, now a construction museum Turn left for a short walk to the Markt. One of its many attractive buildings is the Rathaus parts of which date back to 1320

🖪 Leave Quedlinhura on Gernröder Wea. which becomes Suderöder Chausee, then turn right on Suderöder Strasse for Thale. In Thale, turn left, then right to Hexentanzplatz parking lot.

#### Walpurgisnacht

Walpurgisnacht (April 30) probably began as a Celtic festival celebrating spring, but developed a reputation for black magic. Legends grew of witches and warlocks flying up to the Brocken to recount the past year's evil deeds before holding an orgy that included the devil himself. So powerful were these legends that for centuries church bells would toll on Walpurgisnacht to deter evil forces.

#### The Hexentanzplatz Saxony-Anhalt: 06502

The Hexentanzplatz, or "witches' dance place" probably began life as a spiritual place used for Celtic rituals and sacrifices. Later, it became known as an occult center, where witches were said to gather before flying to the Brocken on Walpurgisnacht. Today, revellers arrive on the same night to eniov the celebrations. A modest museum, the

Walpurgishalle (May–Oct: open daily), explains pagan worship in German with vivid drawings and a ghoulish Germanic sacrificial stone.

From Thale, return to the T-junction and turn left. Continue on the same road and turn right on to the B81. In Blankenburg, turn left on to the B27 to the parking lot left beyond the caves.

#### Rübeland Höhlen

#### Saxonv-Anhalt: 38889

Since its chance discovery by a 15th-century miner, the 600,000year-old **Baumannshöhle** (open daily) has attracted visitors keen to



tread in the footsteps of Stone Age inhabitants and Ice Age bears some of whose skeletons remain here The adjacent Hermannshöhle (closed Nov-Apr) has impressive stalagmites and stalactites.

Continue on the B27, turn right at Elend, and continue to Schierke; park at the railroad station

#### The Brocken

#### Saxony-Anhalt: 38879


The ascent of the Brocken (3.747 ft/ 1.141 m), the highest peak in the Harz. is a vital part of any Harz itinerary. The easiest way to reach the top is by the

> narrow-gauge Brockenbahn railroad. which climbs steeply to a height of 3,691 ft (1,125 m). Trains depart from Schierke for the short journey. Here. the Brockenmuseum (open daily) displays exhibits on the mountain's geology and mythology. An easy 1.5-mile (2.5-km)

path loops the summit,

#### Steam Trains in the Harz

Steaming through 87 miles (140 km) of track through the mountains, the Harzer Schmalspurbahn (www.hsbwr.de) is the largest narrow-gauge network in Europe. Many of the steam trains are from the 1950s, but one has been in service since 1887. The railroad lines link Quedlinburg, Nordhausen, and Wernigerode with the Brocken. Round trips depart on

Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays.

#### HIKING IN THE BODE VALLEY

The Hexenstieg or Witches' Trail along the Bode Valley, takes in spectacular scenery, passing gnarled trees that are centuries old. This path is best explored. by first taking a bus No. 18 from Thale's train station to the village of Treseburg. then walking the back downstream. which takes between 2-3 hours. For a longer walk, take the chairlift to Hexentanzplatz, then walk the 6-mile (10-km) trail to Treseburg, stop for lunch, then return to Thale via the Hexenstieg – a walk of 4–5 hours. Maps are available at the tourist information office (Rathausplatz 1. 06502 Thale: 03947 25 97).

The Harz's second-highest peak, the Wurmberg (3.186 ft/971 m) is a venue for many outdoor sports (open daily). In winter the ski lift (www.wurmheraseilhahn de) of the resort town of Braunlage is used by snowboarders. In summer the Wurmberg's chairlift carries hikers to a good selection of trails. Hiking from the summit to the hase takes around 1.5 hours

☐ Turn riaht on to Pfaffenstiea. left on to Am Amtswea. then right on Harzburger Strasse. Turn right on the B4. and in Bad Harzbura, turn left on to Harzburger Strasse. Take the B498 and aet on to the R241 to Goslar. In Goslar. turn right, then left to the parking lot.

#### 6 Goslar

Lower Saxony: 38640

One of Germany's most attractive towns. Goslar is famous for its half-timbered houses. The discovery of silver in the 10th century made it one of Europe's leading towns but it fell into decline after the Duke of Braunschweig-Wolfenbüttel claimed the mine in 1532. Much of the town has been preserved, along with its Romanesque palace.

#### A two-hour walking tour

Exit the parking lot on Bäckerstrasse. turn right then left on to Fischemäker Strasse and follow it to Goslar's Markt (1), where a group of half-timbered buildings surround a 13th-century

fountain on which Goslar's imperial eagle puffs out his chest. The old treasury building to the left is famed for its 18th-century carillon (open daily) in which parading figures tell the story of mining history. Opposite,



the 15th-century Rathaus with its Gothic gables looks most impressive at night. Behind it is the Romanesque market church or Marktkirche. The 16th-century half-timbered **Brusttuch** Haus (2) with its excellent woodwork lies behind the church From the left of the house Hoher Wea heads to the Musikinstrumente-und Puppenmuseum (3) (open daily), which boasts Germany's oldest instrument: a hurdy-gurdy. Further along Hoher Weg, a path to the left follows the Abzucht stream, which leads to the Goslarer Museum (4) (closed Mon). Inside the Goslarer Evangeliar a jewelencrusted book of gospels, and the Bergkanne a stein with figures of miners, are displayed. Back to Hoher Weg, the **Grosses-Heiliges-Kreuz** (5) (open daily), a former hospice, is now a craft center. At the end of Hoher Wea is the Domyorhalle, the vestibule of a church that once housed the Kaiserstuhl, the imperial throne. Down the street to the right is the Kaiserpfalz 6) (open daily), the 11thcentury imperial palace of Heinrich III. Later, it was used as a granary, until it was rescued by Kaiser Wilhelm Lin. 1868 for the Second Reich, Inside, the Ulrichskapelle is the resting place of





Heinrich III's heart in a gilt box. From Kaisernfalz go left to Bergstrasse On the opposite corner is the Baroque Siemenshaus (7) (open Tue & Thu), the family home of the Siemens industrialist family. A short walk from here to lakohistrasse leads to Mönchehaus Museum (8) (closed Mon), which displays the work of artists including Willem de Kooning, Continue down Jakobistrasse to the parking lot.

Turn right on to Vogelsang, left on to Bäckerstrasse, then right on to Mauerstrasse, and left on to Okerstrasse. Turn right on to the B241 and left on to Rammelsberger Strasse to the museum

#### Rammelsberger Bergbaumuseum

Lower Saxonv: 38640

For a millennium the Rammelsberger silver mine formed Goslar's economic backbone. Closed down in 1998, it has since become the **Bergbaumuseum** (open daily) that chronicles the mine's history. Visitors can don overalls and tour the 18th- and 19th-century shafts. #### DAY TRIP OPTIONS

Despite its many dark and remote corners, the Harz is compact and within range of day trips. Quedlinburg is a good base and is well served by the narrow-gauge railroad.

#### Castles and caves

From Quelinburg 3, head to Thale and walk along the Bode Valley. If there is time to spare, the Harzer Uhrenfabrik 2 at Gernrode is a good wet-weather option, along with the Burg Falkenstein 1 or the Rübeland Höhlen 5

Follow thr route to Thale and continue to the T-junction after Neinstedt. Turn right and head to Gernrode, then take the road to Ballenstedt and continue to Bura Falkenstein. For the caves, head from Thale to Blankenburg and on to the B27.

#### Magical Brocken

Enjoy a ride on the narrow-gauge trains from Quedlinburg 3 to the summit of the Brocken 6.

Ouedlinbura's railroad station is at the end of Bahnhofstrasse; from the market walk along Steinbrücke and then turn right down Bahnhofstrasse.

#### Picturesque Harz

Explore Goslar 8, a pretty town with 18 00 half-timbered houses and then head to the interesting to visit the old silver mine, and learn about the history of mining in this region.

Follow the route to Goslar, then the B241 to Rammelsberger Bergbaumuseum.



## Hilltop Castles and Lush Landscapes

Hilltop ski resorts, spa towns, and the network of hiking trails through the Thuringian Forest (Thüringer Wald) have transformed the "green heart" of Germany into a holiday playground. Yet, thanks to its fragmentation into a patchwork of small duchies in the 16th and 17th centuries, Thuringia (Thüringen) is just as rich in history and art. References to luminaries such as composer Johann Sebastian Bach, reformer Martin Luther, and writer and polymath Johann Wolfgang von Goethe appear regularly on a route that begins at a fairy-tale castle in Eisenach and winds deep into the Thuringian Forest, a wooded upland where cozy timber-framed towns and ducal palaces nestle beneath pineclad hills. The route emerges from this timeless landscape to veer east toward its final stop. Weimar, a cradle of culture that appeals to head and heart alike.

#### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish: The Wartburg to Schloss Belvedere.

Number of days: 3-4 days, allowing half a day to explore Weimar.

Distance: 155 miles (250 km).

Road conditions: Roads are generally good in the Thuringian Forest. In winter, snow can be a problem.

When to go: The best time to visit is summer (June to August), when flowers carpet the meadows, festivals are in full swing, and hiking is idyllic. The ski season is from mid-December to February.

Opening times: Most shops are open from 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday, Many museums in Weimar are closed on Mondays.

Main market days: The Wartburg: Wed & Thu: Ilmenau: Thu & Fri: Arnstadt: Tue, Fri & Sat; Erfurt: Mon-Sat: Weimar: Wed. Thu-Sun.

Major festivals: Erfurt: Krämerbrückenfest (merchant's bridge medieval festival), Jun; Musicals/ theater on Domplatz steps, Jul-Aug; Weimar: Wine Festival, Aug; Weimarer Zwiebelmarkt (onion festival), Oct.

#### **DAY TRIP OPTIONS**

Meiningen is an ideal base for outdoor activities in the Thuringian Forest, with **skiing** in Oberhof and walks around Ilmenau. Visit Weimar to see splendid art galleries, and aristocratic palaces, then stop by Erfurt's Gothic cathedral and take a side-trip to Arnstadt, For full details, see p111.

## The Wartburg

#### Thuringia; 99817

Clasped to a ridge south of Eisenach. the Wartburg (open daily) is a wellspring of German identity. The castle's Romanesque Palas, or Great Hall, is rich with 19th-century murals and mosaics. According to legend medieval bards once battled for their lives in singing contests romanticized in Wagner's opera, Tannhäuser, The exiled Martin Luther hid here while translating the New Testament into German in 1521. In 1817, student fraternities from across the country gathered here to demonstrate for a united Germany. Drive to the old town of Eisenach on the B19 to pay tribute to Johann Sebastian Bach, by visiting the Bachhaus (open daily), the museum built on what was thought to be the site of his birth.

Follow signs for Naturpark-Route
Thüringer Wald on the B7 then the B88.
At Thal, take the B88 to Seebach, Tabarz,
and then Friedrichroda. Turn right at the
T-junction and park on the main square.

#### Priedrichroda

#### Thuringia; 99894

Spa waters have attracted vacationers to Friedrichroda for the past two centuries. In 1835, Britain's Princess Victoria came here to take a cure and fell in love with Duke Albert of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, her future husband. Tour the gardens of the Neo-Gothic Schloss Reinhardsbrunn (May-Oct: open Sat & Sun) where the two royals met. Return to Tabarz to visit the Marienglashöhle (open daily) grotto. It literally means "Mary's Glass Cave," which alludes to the gypsum crystals found here that were mined for altar decoration.

Return to Tabarz, then turn left at the brown panorama symbol and drive through the town center. Drive uphill, following signs to turn right toward Grosser Inselsberg.

#### Grosser Inselsberg

#### Thuringia: 98599

A patchwork of woodland and meadow spreads out beneath one of the highest mountains in the Thuringian Forest. At 3,012 ft (918 m), it has forested hills to the south and foothills rolling north to Eisenach. Well known as a winter ski resort, Grosser Inselsberg is also a popular destination in summer. Adventure enthusiasts can try walking a section of the Rennsteig, Germany's most popular long-distance footpath, to climb to the summit or whizz downhill through the pine trees on a summer toboggan run (Mar–Oct: open daily).

Return to the main road and head to Brotterode. Turn left in the town center, following signs to Schmalkalden. Parking is available in the Pfaffenwiese parking lot, past the roundabout.



### Forest train to Gotha

A novel way to visit Gotha and Schloss Friedenstein (see p109) and do some sightseeing is on the Thüringerwaldbahn from Friedrichroda The Thuringian Forest Train (tram No. 4) takes 50 minutes to cover the 12-mile (20-km) journey northwards to Gotha, Trams depart twice an hour in summer and once an hour in winter from Friedrichroda

### Schmalkalden


### Thuringia: 98574

So quaint are its timber-framed buildings that it is hard to believe that Schmalkalden was briefly the epicenter of European politics. An imperial meeting was convened here in 1537 to reconcile the continent's Catholic rulers with Protestant princes and Martin Luther. Up the high street from the town square, Altmarkt, a mosaic of historic buildings, is the red-beamed Lutherhaus, Martin Luther's residence during the Imperial Diet. The Reformation also changed Schloss Wilhelmsburg (Apr-Oct: open daily: Nov-Mar: closed Mon). This castle's chapel was one of the first to represent Luther's elevation of the spoken word over decoration.

Continue along Recklinghäuser Strasse, turn right at the T-junction to take the B19 to Meiningen. Drive into the center, and at Sächsischer Hof hotel. turn right to park on Klostergasse or park past the Schloss in the Zentrum West parking lot.

### Meiningen Thuringia; 98617

A past life as the Residenzstadt or royal seat of the Saxe-Meiningen dukes lends Meiningen an aristocratic



air Romantic composers such as Franz Liszt and Johannes Brahms conducted the town's orchestra and its court theater was acclaimed across Europe. Today, the town retains a reputation for ballet, theater and classical music (www.das-meininger-theater.de). The Ducal Riding Hall (closed Mon), which stands next to Schloss Flisabethenburg (closed Mon), displays backdrops from 19th-century theater productions. Do not miss the castle's stuccoed café.

Follow the one-way system to Neu-Ulmer-Strasse and turn left toward Suhl. In Rohr, follow signs to Benshausen, then to Zella-Mehlis on the B62. Take the Bahnhof Strasse then the Oberhofer Strasse, which becomes the Heinrich-Ehrhardt-Strasse to Oberhof and turn toward Oberhof-Sud to park beside the Haus des Gastes.

# Oberhof

### Thuringia: 98559

Spread over a ridge at 2,822 ft (860 m), Oberhof is the main winter playground of the Thuringian Forest. Skiers and snowboarders have a choice of slopes, and non-skiers can swish downhill in rubber rings or on a toboggan. Skiing is possible even in summer, on a 1-mile (2-km) long circuit in the DKB-Skisport-Halle (open daily; www.oberhof-skisporthalle.de). Visitors can also hike through the surrounding high meadows on circular trails; maps are available in the Haus des Gastes.

■ Leave Oberhof via Crawinkler Strasse and follow signs to Ohrdruf. Turn right toward Crawinkel, then take the B88 to Ilmenau, via a short section of the A71. Leave the A71 at Ilmenau West to park beside Erfurter Strasse, iust before the sian to the Rathaus.



### Ilmenau

### Thuringia: 98693

"I was always happy to spend time here," wrote JW Goethe, 18th-century playwright and philosopher, about this university town. Ilmenau returned the compliment by dedicating the **Goethe Stadtmuseum** (open daily) to the father of the German Enlightenment. The museum is located in the Baroque Amtshaus on the Markt, where a bronze of Goethe rests on a heach

☐ Take the Bücheloher Strasse, following signs to Martinroda, Neusiss and Dosdorf to Arnstadt. Go straight over the roundabout into Plauesche Strasse toward the tower and park on Ried

### Arnstadt

### Thuringia; 99310

A medieval watchtower at Arnstadt's entrance hints at the charm of this old town at the forest's edge. Full of half-timbered houses and tangled lanes, it is a great place to explore. The **Markt** has a Renaissance town hall and the Bachkirche. Arnstadt was the home of the composer Johann Sebastian Bach, who, at the age of 18, scandalized the congregation of the Bachkirche with his contrapuntal style on the organ. In the **Schlossmuseum** (closed Mon) on Erfurter Strasse are 18th-century doll tableaus and porcelain displays.

Return to the roundabout and turn left on to Lindenallee, following signs to Zentrum. Turn left at the roundabout on to Wachsenburgallee, then right and then left on to Ohrdrufer Strasse toward Gotha to reach Holzhausen.

### Johann Wolfgang von Goethe

The Frankfurt-born son of a wealthy family, Goethe (1748-1832) found fame at the age of 26 as the author of The Sorrows of Young Werther. This tale of obsessive love not only hecame the hest seller of the early Romantic movement, but also led to Goethe's appointment as ducal adviser in Weimar in 1775 Yet to label Goethe as just a writer is inadequate Between court duties he conducted scientific experiments studied geology designed palaces and gardens collected antiquities and penned his masterpiece. Faust. Author Thomas Mann dubbed him "the greatest German of all."


### Drei Gleichen

### Thuringia; 99869

Three castles, collectively known as Drei Gleichen, crown the hills en route to Gotha The 17thcentury Wachsenburg is the best preserved after its restoration as a hotel and restaurant: it is worth a visit for the view from its perch above Holzhausen village. Continue for 3 miles (5 km) on the road to reach Thuringia's oldest castle, the Mühlberg (Mar-Oct: open daily). a ruin located above its sleepy village. A further 1 mile (2 km) drive northward toward Wandersleben leads to the ruined Burg Gleichen. which still retains its impressive defensive walls.

From Mühlberg, continue to Gotha via Wechmar and Schwabhausen. Turn right on to the B247 and follow signs to Gotha and brown signs to Schloss Friedenstein.





### In Goethe's Footsteps

While JW Goethe admired Ilmenau town, it was the local countryside that inspired his artistic and scientific work. Many visitors come solely to walk "auf Goethes Spuren" (in Goethe's footsteps) on the Goethewanderweg. The appeal of this 13-mile (20-km) hike to Stützerbach is its scenic variety. Marked by Goethe's "g" monogram, the trail begins in Ilmenau's Markt and passes cliffs and caves before it ascends into high country. Goethe museums lie en route - the cabin in which he wrote Wanderers Nachtlied on Kickelhahn Hill and the ducal hunting lodge Jagdhaus Gabelbach (closed Mon), which has exhibits on his science studies. The Ilmenau tourist office (www. rennsteia-bus.de), in the Amtshaus, stocks maps of the walk.

# 10 Schloss Friedenstein Thuringia: 99867

The dynastic residence of the House of Saxe-Coburg (closed Mon; www.stiftungfriedenstein.de) – better known in Britain as the House of Windsor – holds interest for everyone. Works by Cranach the Elder and a sumptuous oil painting of 15th-century suitors, Gotha Lovers, star in an art gallery. The floors above have fabulously stuccoed period rooms, museums of antiquities and regional culture, and the perfectly preserved court theater, Eckhof-Theater. One of the oldest stages in Europe, it hosts a drama festival in July and August.

 ☐ Continue on Stieler Strasse, across the B247, to take the B7 to Erfurt. At the B7/B4 junction, turn left on to Heinrichstrasse toward the Dom. Park in Domplatz's underground parking lot.

### 1 Erfurt

### Thuringia; 99084

Bursting with history and university life. Erfurt is a splendid little city and the capital of the Thuringian state. It is also the oldest settlement in the region, with its earliest historical records dating from AD 729. Ascend the sweeping steps from Domplatz to the **Dom St. Marien**. This cathedral has a low-lit High Gothic choir, with original choir stalls, 14th- and 15thcentury stained-glass windows and Wolfram, a Romanesque bronze candelabra (c. 1160) shaped like a man The adiacent five-nave Severikirche has more Gothic furnishings and the sarcophagus of St. Severus. The main street off Domplatz, Marktstrasse, leads to Fischmarkt, surrounded by Renaissance patricians' houses. The "merchant's bridge." Krämerbrücke. spans the Gera river and has picturepostcard views.

Return to the B4/B7 junction to take the B7 to Weimar. Follow signs to Zentrum and park at the Goethehaus parking lot on Ackerwand.

### Weimar

Thuringia: 99423

For outsiders, Weimar is synonymous with the Weimar Republic government of Germany in the 1920s. At home, however, the erstwhile court-town is lauded as a cradle of German culture, a former home to poets, artists, composers, and philosophers, a wellspring of the German Enlightenment, and the birthplace of Bauhaus design.

### A 90-minute walking tour

Walk to Ackerwand from the parking lot and turn right into the pedestrianized Frauenplan to reach Goethes Wohnhaus (1) (closed Mon) on the corner of Seifengasse. Goethe occupied this Baroque house for 50 years as an adviser to the Saxe-Weimar court. Displays in its rooms include sculpture and art acquired during his Italian travels and a piano on which composer Felix Mendelssohn showcased work-in-progress after dinner. An adjacent museum (closed Mon) details court life in contemporary Weimar Walk down to the end of Seifengasse to see the Platz der Demokratie ②. Surrounded by ducal Baroque palaces, this square helps visitors gauge the former glory of Weimar. The centerpiece of the square is an equestrian statue of Goethe's aesthete employer. Duke Carl August. To the right of the square is the **Grünes Schloss** (3) (closed Mon; limited number of tickets) home to one of Europe's finest Rococo libraries,

established by the duke's wife. Duchess Anna Amalia Walk west across the square to reach the Markt (4), which has a Renaissance fountain: houses, including that of the great German painter Lucas Cranach the Flder: and the Neo-Gothic town hall Walk across the Markt and turn left into Frauentorstrasse and then right into Schillerstrasse named after the dramatist Friedrich von Schiller At No. 12 is **Schillerhaus** (5) (closed Mon), a relatively modest residence compared to that of Schiller's friend Goethe. Schillerstrasse arcs into Theaterplatz (6), which has a famous statue of Goethe and Schiller by sculptor Ernst Rietschel and the theater in which the German National Assembly ratified the liberal Weimar Republic in 1919. Opposite is the **Wittumspalais** (7) (closed Mon), where at a round table, the duchess hosted soirées attended by Weimar's intellectual luminaries. Its Neo-Classical interiors are the town's finest. Next door is the museum of Bauhaus design. Zeughof threads





between the two and joins Rittergasse to emerge at Herderplatz. on which is the Kirche St. Peter und Paul (8). The church's sumptuous triptych was painted by Cranach.

This painting serves as an introduction to the art in the **Stadtschloss** (9) (closed Mon) at the end of Vorwerksgasse, which runs behind the church. Rebuilt in Neo-Classical style on Goethe's advice, this palace

houses the Saxe-Weimar dynasty's gallery, including Cranach's wedding portraits of Johann Friedrich and his bride. On leaving the palace from the southern side, emerge at its original Renaissance gateway and tower. Walk behind the palace and cross the IIm to reach a broad park, Follow signs to

the Goethes Gartenhaus (10) (open daily) beside the Ilm. This summerhouse was given to Goethe for drawing up the plans for Weimar. Cross the river on a footbridge to the left of the house, and turn

right. Beyond a folly, on Marienstrasse. lies Liszthaus (Apr–Oct: open Wed–Mon). home of the Romantic composer Franz Liszt, Turn right into Ackerwand to return to the parking lot.

☐ Turn left on to Marienstrasse and continue on it to reach the Schloss Relvedere

### Schloss Belvedere Thuringia: 99425

# **Outdoor pursuits**

Explore Meiningen 5 before driving to the half-timbered houses in Schmalkalden 4, leaving time for the palace chapel before setting off to ski or hike in Oberhof 6, and to work up an appetite for lunch in Arnstadt 8. Visitors can then either stroll its streets or drive to Ilmenau 7 for a walk on the Goethewanderweg.

Follow the B19 to Schmalkalden, then retrace the route to Meiningen and take the B62 and Heinrich-Ehrhardt-Strasse to Oberhof. Follow the route to Arnstadt, and then retrace the route to Ilmenau.

### Classics and culture

In Weimar 12. tour Goethe's house before traveling back in time with Erfurt's 111 Krämerbrücke and cathedral, both medieval

showpieces of the state's capital city. Next, browse the art in Schloss Friedenstein 100, then return east past Drei Gleichen 9 to Arnstadt 8. Drivers can then travel back to Weimar to spend time in Schloss Belvedere's (B) gardens.

Follow the B7 to Erfurt, then continue on it to Schloss Friedenstein. Follow the tour in reverse order to Arnstadt and then retrace the entire route back to Weimar to reach Schloss Belvedere.

# On the Trail of the Sun King

Saxony (Sachsen) promotes itself as the "state of the arts" and its brooding castles. Gothic hall churches and opulent palaces are fine representatives of centuries of artistic brilliance. This is a state as rich in landscapes as it is in culture. There is a real sense of transition on this route, as it emerges from the Erzgebirge. an upland whose old towns are full of mining history, folk crafts, and charm, to follow the trail of Augustus the Strong, an 18th-century Saxon Sun King who erected some of the most sensational Baroque architecture around his capital. Dresden. The mood changes again as the route travels east along the Elbe into Saxon Switzerland, a realm full of fantastical rock plateaus and mystery. 

### Zwickau Saxonv: 08056

Music and motor cars have made Zwickau famous In 1810 Romantic composer Robert Schumann was born in **Hauptmarkt** (closed Mon), in the old town, a block across from the Dom St. Marien. This church's richly decorated Gothic altar was made by the tutor of the Renaissance master-artist Albrecht Dürer, In more recent history, Zwickau was renowned for the cars produced

by the Horch factory – Audis. Daimlers and Trabants, the 500 cc steel and plastic workhorses of Eastern Bloc transport, Some of these models are superbly displayed in the August Horch Museum (closed Mon) to the north of the center.

From the Zentrum parking lot, turn right on to the B173/Dr-Friedrichs-Ring. a one-way system. At the T-junction, turn left toward Schneeberg on the B93. Park on the Markt.

# Erzaebirae

### Saxony: 08289, 09456, 09427, 09573 & 09599

Rich deposits of silver, tin, copper, and cobalt earned the uplands along the Czech border the name "Ore Mountains." When these reserves waned, the miners turned to folk crafts, so this route along the Sächsische Silberstrasse (Saxon Silver Route) offers both historical romance and an opportunity to buy beautiful handicrafts such as wooden toys and lace.

### 1) Schneeberg

An enormous Markt boxed in by Baroque townhouses and signs declaring Glück auf - the traditional "good luck" salutation of miners - are

reminders of the wealthy past of this silver-mining town. Another testament to Schneebera's former status is St. Wolfgangkirche at the top of the Markt, a late-Gothic hall church whose altarpiece is by the Renaissance artist Lucas Cranach the Flder (1472-1553). The Museum für beramännische Volkskunst (closed

church contains examples of the miners' folk crafts

Retrace the route to B93, then take the B169 to Aue. Take the B101 past Schwarzenberg and Raschau to Annaberg-Buchholz. Turn left on to the Sehmatalstrasse at the sharp right bend before the viaduct and park at Frohnauer Hammer parkina lot.

### (2) Annaberg-Buchholz

One of the major attractions in this hilltop town is the Frohnauer Hammer (tours daily). Visitors will probably hear this mechanical marvel before seeing it. Inside a shingle-roofed building, a 17thcentury contraption harnesses energy from a stream to power three hammers that weigh up to 551 lb (250 kg) each. It is the last forge of its kind in Europe and, until 1904 it produced iron and copper products.

samples of which are on display in an exhibition room above. Drive back to the B101, go beneath the viaduct. and then turn left at the roundabout. Around a tight bend, turn right into the Altstadt and park at the Markt. In Annaberg-Buchholz's old town. grand townhouses suggest a place of some importance. The richest silver seams in the area funded both its main square and St. Annenkirche whose rough exterior belies a beautiful interior. Notoriously superstitious, miners hoped their lavish outlay would find favor with St. Anne, the profession's patron. saint. Pravers were said just before a shift in a contemporary shaft now accessed via a mining museum (open daily) opposite the church door.

☐ Continue north on the B101 and turn left on to the B95 toward Chemnitz Turn left in central Ehrenfriedersdorf toward Greifensteine for the entrance



### (3) Greifensteine

Around 300 million years ago. magma bubbling up through fissures in the Earth's crust wore away the surrounding sandstone to leave these strange granite outcrops, which appear unexpectedly in a pine forest like fortifications of a fantastic castle. Walk around their bases before ascending a walkway for a panoramic view. Long mined as a quarry by locals, the rocks are put to better use today as a natural amphitheater for musicals and opera in summer (www.greifensteine.com).

Back in Ehrenfriedersdorf, turn left at the T-iunction and then right toward Dreibach and Scharfenstein to Zschopau. Drive through the town center to Waldkirchen and turn left to Augustusburg: park below the Schloss.

### (4) Schloss Augustusburg

Several sights in one courtvard castle make this 16th-century royal hunting lodge (open daily) a family favorite. Visitors can buy a combination ticket to access a trio of museums: former banqueting chambers whose displays on hunting are upstaged by murals of gamboling hares: displays of vintage motorbikes; and the fairytale carriages of Saxony's rulers in the old stables. Also of interest are the historic rooms of the **Lindenhaus** (tours daily) and a dungeon full of grisly torture instruments. Displays of falconry staged by the drawbridge offer a glimpse of the castle's past (Faster–Oct: closed Mon)

☐ Continue north, following signs to Flöha and ioin the B180 then the B173 to Freiburg. Follow signs to Zentrum and park on Schlossplatz.

### (5) Freibera

Historic and postcard-pretty, old Freiberg is a delight. Having emerged from World War II unscathed, the main square. Obermarkt, crowded by narrow 17th-century merchants' houses, is a slice of bygone Germany. The town's name literally means "Free Mountain," as the wealth from silver-mining was all tax free. Silver also funded Freiberg's architectural treasure, the late-Gothic Dom St.

Marien (tours daily), which has a sculpture of a miner gesturing up to its Tulip Pulpit (1505). A town and mining museum, Stadt-und

Bergbaumuseum (closed Mon), stands opposite the cathedral.

☐ Turn right from Schlossplatz and then right again on to Leipziger Strasse to find the B101 to Nossen then Meissen. Park beside the river at Zentrum.

# Meissen Saxonv: 01662

Although famous for porcelain. Meissen is also worth visiting for its cobbled lanes. In the town's Domplatz. a High Gothic cathedral with a ducal chapel and an altarpiece by Lucas Cranach the Flder adjoins the 16thcentury Albrechtsburg (open daily). In 1710, Augustus the Strong converted the palace into the first porcelain factory outside East Asia. Meissen china is now manufactured at a factory (tours daily) 1 mile (1.5 km) south of the center where there is an exhibition center and a shop (open daily).

☐ Turn right beneath Albrechtsburg to cross the river on the B101. Follow signs to Moritzburg; park at the palace.

# Schloss Moritzburg Saxonv: 01468

Unimpressed by a small hunting lodge he had inherited. Augustus the Strong ordered his court architect Matthäus Daniel Pöppelmann to build him a Baroque pleasure palace. The finest craftsmen in Saxony were hired to create the decadent interiors (Apr-Oct tours daily Nov-mid-lan & Feh-Mar tours Tue-Sun). Highlights include a banqueting hall with hunting trophies and the royal four-poster bed with iridescent feather tapestries.

Follow sians to Dresden and to Innere Altstadt, crossina the Elbe on Carolabrücke, Go over Rathenauplatz on to St. Petersburger Strasse and turn right for the parking lot.

# Dresden

Saxonv: 01067

So devastating was an Allied air raid in February 1945 that, for most, the name of Saxony's capital is synonymous with destruction. In fact, Dresden is better understood in terms of its resurrection. After decades of Communist neglect, the old town's Baroque monuments are being rebuilt and the "Florence of the Elbe" is regaining its former glory.

### A one-hour walking tour

From the parking lot on Schiessgasse, walk up Landhausstrasse to reach the epicenter of Dresden's rejuvenation, the Neumarkt, and the symbol of its revival, the **Frauenkirche** ①. After it was rebuilt, thousands gathered to celebrate the reconsecration of this Baroque church in October 2005. Original fire-blackened blocks stand out in its new sandstone. The crucifix in its interior was forged by a Coventry silversmith whose father flew in the Allied raid – a poignant symbol of reconciliation. A rear

entrance provides access up the bell-like cupola (open daily) for views over the cafés of the Neumarkt. Turn right on to Salzgasse and visit the Museum Festung Dresden (open daily) to explore casements and cannon rooms. Visitors can admire sculpture and art from the 19th century in the Albertinum (closed Mon), reopened in 2010, or art exhibitions in the Staatliche Kunstsammlungen, its interior still raw from bomb damage, or simply stroll on the **Brühlscher Terrasse** ②, the handsome riverfront belvedere that was revered as the

"balcony of Europe" in Dresden's heyday. Ascend a staircase, to the left, to access the Brühlscher Terrasse atop the town's fortifications

toward the tiered spire of the Hofkirche and the Schlossplatz, beside the State Parliament. First, though, turn left on to Augustusstrasse for the Fürstenzug ③, a 335-ft (102-m) long frieze, made of 24,000 Meissen china tiles, which depicts pinks appropriate of

Continue down the terrace.

which depicts eight centuries of Saxon rulers in a medieval pageant. Behind this is the Sca Renaissance courtyard of the royal stables, the

Johanneum 4), which houses a transport museum (closed Mon). Return to the Schlossplatz. The Italian-designed Catholic Hofkirche (5) was Augustus's bid to appease the Pope, who had begun to suspect that the elector's conversion to Catholicism was just a ruse to claim the Polish crown. Take a look at its all-German interior, furnished with a Rococo pulpit by court sculptor Balthasar Permoser. Then walk round to Theaterplatz and the prestigious **Semperoper 6**, which replicates the opera house where composer Richard Wagner premiered works such as Tannhäuser. The showpiece of Dresden is the Baroque palace, **Zwinger** (7), next door, Ascend via its outstanding Wallpavillon gateway to walk the balustrade. It has three museums (closed Mon): the Gemäldegalerie Alte Meister.

Rüstkammer and Porzellansammlung. Exit via the Glockenspielpavillon, named for its carillon of porcelain bells, and pass the former palace guardhouse, now a ticket booking center,

to reach the **Residenzschloss** (apen Wed–Mon), the colossal electors' palace. Augustus's treasury (Grünes Gewölbe) within has many bejeweled gold and porcelain trinkets. Ascend the tower (late Mar–Oct: open Wed–Mon) for a view over the skyline. Exit left from the palace to see the antithesis of such decadence; the

River cruisers ply the Elbe three times a day, stopping at various destinations along the river. At Königstein, **Kanu Aktiv Tours** (035021 59 99 60; www. **kanu-aktiv-tours.de**) rents canoes and kayaks. The modern cruisers of **Sachsische Dampschiffahrt** (www.saechsische-dampfschiffahrt. **de**) depart regularly on stately cruises up the Elbe to Bad Schandau via all the destinations included in this tour.

# **6** Schloss Pillnitz

### Saxonv: 01326

A drive along the Flbe offers views of the 19th-century villas and palaces on the river's northern bank The inspiration for these buildings was Schloss Pillnitz, an extraordinary ensemble begun in 1720 to host the summertime revels of Augustus the Strong. Architect Pöppelmann reflected the ruler's admiration for autocratic Oriental emperors in the chinoiserie of the facing wings, one of which contains a craft museum (Mav-Oct: open daily). Learn about the complex's creation in the Neues Palace (Apr-Oct: closed Mon: Nov-Mar: open Sat-Sun). then explore the gardens (open daily) to find a large palm house and the Triton Gondola, in which Augustus' son cruised up the Elbe.

Continue on north bank road to reach the main road and the B172 to Pirna-Zentrum. In the town center, turn right following signs to Gross Sedlitz and park at Barockgarten.

# Gross Sedlitz

### Saxonv: 01809

Fountains and flowerbeds, parterre patterns and statues of antique deities make this the most grandiose of Augustus's pleasure gardens A synthesis of late-Baroque Italian and French styles, its symmetry reflects the Age of Reason (the 17th century flourishing of philosophical thought). It opens onto an immaculate green where Augustus the Strong played bowls, then sweeps down to a lower terrace, a radiant green divided by channels and backed by the rhythmic arches of an orangery full of fragrant Tuscan orange trees

Return to Pirna and drive over the B172 into the Zentrum. Park beside the river in the lot P6, or on Markt beyond the viaduct.

### Wines of Saxony

The northern slopes of the Flbe are sufficiently sun-drenched to allow viticulture. Müller-Thurgau (also called Rivaner), fresh and full of character, is the most popular variety of grape cultivated here. followed by Riesling and Weissburgunder (Pinot Blanc). This region's white wines are generally medium-dry and sprightly, while reds such as Traminer and Blau Spätburgunder tend to be aromatic. Although locally produced wines can be tasted in a Weinstube in Meissen, aficionados should visit the acclaimed Schloss Wackerbarth estate (open daily: www.schloss-wackerbarth.de) in Radebul, near Dresden.

### Pirna Saxonv: 01796

A checkerboard of Baroque streets shaded in dusty pastels, the town of Pirna is centered on the cobbled Markt, seemingly unchanged since it was painted by the Italian artist Canaletto in 1754: a copy of the painting is in the tourist office at No. 7. Carved portals still front handsome merchants' mansions the town hall continues to be the town's centerpiece, even though its Renaissance looks suffered during 19th-century renovations, and Schloss Sonnenstein remains on a hill above. The town's church. Stadtkirche St. Marien (open daily), is worth visiting for its vaulted roof and a Renaissance pulpit adorned with coquettish cherubs.

Return to the B172, going left towards Bad Schandau, After 8 miles (12 km) turn right to reach Festung Königstein; tourist trains ascend to the fortress from the parking lot.

### Festung Königstein Saxony; 01824

This mountain fortress (open daily) looks so impregnable that no attempt has been made to conquer it in over 600 years. The stronghold is 787 ft (240 m) above the Elbe with unscalable 138-ft (42-m) tall walls. Visitors can peer down a 499-ft (152-m) deep well dug by Augustus the Strong and tour the prison where he imprisoned an alchemist to force him to create gold from base metals. These experiments resulted in the creation of his "white gold" – porcelain. If inspired by

the views, visitors can drive 1 mile (2 km) east to Königstein village for walks to the Lillienstein (1,427 ft/ 435 m) or Pfaffenstein (1 362 ft/ 415 m) plateaus; maps are available at the fortress's ticket office (035021 646 07: www.festuna-koeniastein.de) and the village information center.

☐ Take the B172 and cross the river to reach Bad Schandau. Park by the river.

### Augustus the Strong

Frederick Augustus (1670–1733) was nicknamed "Augustus the Strong" either because of his physical strenath or his rumored 370 illegitimate children. Impressed by France's Palace of Versailles, Augustus styled himself as a Saxon Sun King and began to transform his capital to mirror his own magnificence. His admiration for omnipotent Oriental rulers also made him covet Asian porcelain. His alchemist, Johann Friedrich Böttger, cracked the secret of "white gold" while incarcerated in Festung Königstein.

# Bad Schandau Saxonv: 01814

Spa waters have attracted visitors to this gentle riverside resort for over a century. Take the Personenaufzug (open daily), the 164-ft (50-m) iron lift built in 1904, to a spectacular viewing platform. It is advisable to carry walking boots – an hour's walk east leads to another viewpoint at Schrammsteineaussicht which

offers sweeping views of the area's most fissured plateau. For another walk, take the Kirnitzschtalbahn (open daily), the historic tram from the Kurpark, for a rickety ride up a wooded valley. Alight at Lichtenhainer Wasserfall to walk to the waterfall and a rock arch called Kuhstall, or cowshed.

Return toward the bridge but turn riaht before it towards Bastei via Porschdorf, then a left turn at the main road toward Lohmen. If the

inner parkina lot is full, park by the turn-off and use the shuttle hus

### Bastei Saxonv: 01847


The astonishing sandstone formations at Bastei were created millions of vears ago by water erosion. Popular with 19th-century Romantics, the area was featured in the fantasy film The Chronicles of Narnia the Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe. A footbridge connects the pinnacles that jut high above pinewoods and leads to the remains of a 13th-century fortress. the Bastei (open daily) from where there are panoramic views over the river to Festuna Könjastein Arrive early before it gets crowded: there are postcard views from the path ascending to the left, before the bridge. Return to the main road to drive 1 mile (3 km) east to Hohnstein village, in an idvllic setting beneath a castle that is now a youth hostel.

Retrace the route toward Lohmen. and then turn right to Stolpen (left after Rathewalde if drivina from Bastei). Park on Marktplatz.

# Burg Stolpen

Saxonv: 01833

A picturebook-pretty Marktplatz shows no hint of Stolpen's somber history. Countess von Cosel (1680-1765), once wooed passionately by Augustus the Strong as a mistress and mother to three of his children. was imprisoned in the lofty 17th-century stronghold of Burg Stolpen (open daily) for 49 years.

Courtiers, fearing her influence over the besotted ruler, had plotted to have the 36-year-old black-eved beauty incarcerated in what was already a decaying castle. She died here at the age of 84. Indeed, some say that the countess still roams the castle - her ghost is said to haunt a dark cellar

Follow the one-way road from Marktplatz to the T-junction, turn left toward Dresden, then right after 2 miles (4 km) on to the B6 to Bautzen. Park in the multi-story lot on Lauenaraben, 329 vards (300 m) across the river.

# Bautzen Saxonv: 02625

The view of tightly packed medieval defense towers and spires seen on the drive across the Spree river is the finest introduction possible to the cultural capital of the Slavic Sorbs, Germany's only indigenous minority. Known mainly for its top-security jail for political prisoners during the German Democratic Republic era, todav Bautzen enchants visitors with its beautifully reconstructed old town. The winding streets with their

original houses, the city walls, the curiously crooked Reichenturm tower, and the Baroque town hall in the town square, all form a very attractive complex. Take a riverside. path past fortifications to see Slavic folk crafts and costumes in the Sorbisches Museum (open daily), located beside the late-Gothic Schloss Ortenburg. The Dom St. Petri's interior is curious – its nave bends to gain extra space on the square, and is divided and used by both Catholics and Protestants. A cathedral treasury (open Mon-Fri) is located behind in



the Baroque Bishopric.

### Grace and grandeur

In Dresden 5, visit the Zwinger and treasury, then drive to Schloss Pillnitz 6 and Augustus' beautiful garden, Gross Sedlitz 77 - the ideal way to work up an appetite for lunch in Pirna 8. Walk it off with a tour of the monarch's hunting lodge, Schloss Moritzburg 4, then go west to Meissen 3 to end the day with a taste of local wines in a Weinstube.

Follow the driving instructions to Pirna. Return to the dual-highway and continue north to Radeburg, across the A4. Then follow signs to Moritzburg. Follow instructions in reverse to Meissen.

### Mountains and vallevs

From Bad Schandau (10), drive to the Bastei 11 with a packed picnic to enjoy breathtaking views of this landscape. Drive to Burg Stolpen 12 then head south to Pirna 8 for lunch and window-shopping along the cobbled lanes of its Baroque grid.

Follow the driving instructions to Stolpen, return via the road to Lohmen, then continue to Pirna.

# In the Land of the Brothers Grimm

If at times this most quintessentially German of regions seems like a storybook brought to life, that is no surprise, since it nurtured the careers of the Brothers Grimm and of Germany's greatest writer. IW Goethe These literary giants have left their mark on Hesse, but so have the Landgraves and churchmen who held sway over it. Lovers of architecture will be enchanted by the area's many quaint small towns, those interested in art will take to the Baroque glories of Kassel or Fulda, and for those who wish to unwind, the region's lazy waterways and spa towns offer plenty of opportunities for relaxation.





# Wiesbaden

Hesse: 65183

The opulent 19th-century architecture of Hesse's leafy capital recalls its hevday as Kaiser Wilhelm II's favorite watering hole The focal point here is the colonnaded bowling green, fringed by the Neo-Classical Kurhaus the Casino (open daily), and the imposing Neo-Baroque Hessiches Staatstheater or Hessian State Theater which has an extravagant Neo-Rococo fover. The best of Wiesbaden's spa facilities is the Kaiser Friedrich Therme (open daily: Languasse 38-40:0611 31 70 60) Opened in 1913 on the site of a hot

spring, it has retained its original Jugendstil (Art Nouveau) interior.

Leave Wiesbaden alona the road uphill to reach the B417 to I imbura an der I ahn.

### Shopping in Wiesbaden

Wiesbaden's elegance extends to its shops, from the designer boutiques along Wilhelmstrasse to the antique shops and fine-art galleries of Taunusstrasse, where visitors can buy anything from vintage couture or antiquarian books to Art Deco glass. In keeping with the city's refined. "old money" ambience, established and independent firms prevail.

# 2 Limburg an der Lahn

Hesse: 65549

There is a powerful sense of antiquity to be discovered in the exceptionally well-preserved center of Limburg an der Lahn. In this lovely city, tall half-timbered houses built between the 13th and 16th centuries lean across narrow, meandering lanes and are overshadowed in turn by the seven-towered St. Georg's Dom. This cathedral was built in the 13th century on a dramatic site high above the Lahn river and is visible from miles around.

### A two-hour walking tour

Exit the parking lot and turn left on Konrad Kurzbold Strasse and left again on to the Alte Lahnbrücke (1), a medieval stone bridge over the Lahn. It dates from 1315-54 and is crowned by an early 14th-century watch tower. The bridge, damaged toward the end of World War II, was restored and widened between 1946 and 1947 There is a wonderful view of the Dom

high above the river on a crag, with the ancient Altstadt huddled at its base. Return across the bridge, bearing slightly left up Brückengasse (2) to reach the Altstadt. The 18th-century house at No. 2 was once an office belonging to the postal service of the aristocratic Thurn and Taxis Dynasty. Continue uphill into Rütsche, lined with tall, gabled half-timbered houses. The Werner Senger Haus (3) at No. 5.

built in the 13th century, is one of the oldest in Limburg. With a lofty, beamed hall on the ground floor. typical of the Altstadt's houses, it is now a hotel and restaurant Turn left into Römer (4), dominated by a beautifully restored 13th-century Gothic Hallenhaus, Archaeological

excavation at the site of this hall house has unearthed the remains of a Jewish ritual bath or mikvah. Turn right at the end of Römer and take the steps up to Domstrasse. Cross the road to reach

Diözesanmuseum (5) (mid-

Mar-mid-Nov: closed Mon) The museum's collection Sculpture in Limburg of ecclesiastical treasures an der Lahn's includes the Staurothek, a old town 10th-century Byzantine cross reliquary. Leaving the museum, turn right up Domstrasse on to the Domplatz to visit the magnificent redand-white bulk of St. Georg's Dom 6. The cathedral was built in the early 13th century with the wealth accrued by Limburg's merchants in the Crusades. Its architecture is a blend of Rhenish Romanesque and early French Gothic. The interior has some early medieval frescoes.

Return to the Domplatz and walk along the southern walls of the cathedral to reach the Schloss (7). Though built on a superb defensive site high above the river, it is hard to imagine anything less forbidding than the castle's picturesque collection of stone and half-timbered buildings grouped around a central courtyard. Return to Domplatz, turning left down the atmospheric Grosse Domtreppe. the great cathedral steps, to reach Bischofsplatz 3. On the right, tall half-timbered houses lean at giddy angles and on the left is the

Stadtkirche or parish church, built around 1300. From Bischofsplatz follow Barfüssergasse and Salzgasse through the bustling heart of the Altstadt stopping to admire the antiques and gift shops on the way to Fischmarkt (9). This contains the most impressive concentration of

> beautiful early-medieval houses in Limburg, including the Altes Rathaus, with its fine beamed hall and lovely spiral staircase. The old town hall now houses the municipal art collection (open durina exhibitions only). Turn left into Brückengasse and then left again into Konrad Kurzbold Strasse to reach the parking lot.





The Lahn Valley narrows and becomes steeper at Runkel, where the mighty Burg (Easter-Oct: closed Mon) overlooks a 15th-century stone bridge. The older, upper fortress was left a ruin by Austrian troops during the Thirty Years' War, while the 13th-century Unterburg, the lower castle, contains a museum and is the seat of the Wied family. On the opposite bank of the river stands another castle, Burg Schadeck. Known as the "swallows nest," it was built as a result of a dispute within Runkel's founding family.

Leave Runkel on Borngasse, following signs to Villmar and Aumenau, At Aumenau, turn left on to Elkerhaüser Strasse, then follow route to Weilburg. Use the Parkdeck Rathaus close to the tourist office to park.

# Weilburg

### Hesse: 35781

Tucked into a loop of the Lahn so tight that just one gate guards the entrance to its compact Altstadt. Weilburg is dominated by its sprawling **Schloss** (closed Mon). The castle's surviving Renaissance core was expanded in the 18th century to create a suitably palatial Residenz, or seat, for the counts of Nassau-Weilburg. The lovely complex stretches 438 yards (400 m) along the hillside above the river, and there is a sunny Baroque garden complete with an orangery and a café.

Cross the Steinerne Brücke below Weilbura's old town, then turn left and follow Bahnhofstrasse and Löhnberger Weg to Löhnberg. At Löhnbera, follow sians to Wetzlar, then join the B49 to Lahnbahnhof. From here, take Mühlenarund to the town of Braunfels.

# Schloss Braunfels

### Hesse: 35619

With its impressive forest of towers rising high above the half-timbered town of Braunfels huddling at its gate, Schloss Braunfels (tours Apr-Oct: open daily; Nov-Mar: open Sat, Sun & holidays) looks every inch the romantic medieval fortress, though it owes its present fairy-tale appearance to a 19th-century Neo-Gothic rebuild. The seat of the Counts of Solms since the 13th century, it remains in the hands of the Solms-Braunfels family.

□ Leave Braunfels along Wetzlarer Strasse. After crossing Oberndorf, take Braunfelser Strasse to Wetzlar.

### Goethe in Wetzlar

Wetzlar was the seat of the highest civil court of the Holy Roman Empire. This was the reason the young lawver Goethe traveled here in the summer of 1772. During his brief stay. Goethe formed an unrequited attachment to Charlotte Buff, who was already engaged. This unhappy romance formed the basis for The Sorrows of Young Werther, the novel that brought him international fame. Charlotte's family home is now a museum, the Lottehaus (closed Mon).

### Wetzlar Hesse: 35573

Rising steeply from the banks of the Lahn. Wetzlar's hilly Altstadt. or old town, with its sloping squares and lanes graced by attractive half-timbered houses, requires leisured exploration. The main focus here is the peculiar-looking Dom (open daily), in which parts of the original Romanesque Stiftskirche coexist with incomplete sections of the grander 13th-century Gothic hall church intended to replace it. Both Catholic and Protestant congregations use

Leave Wetzlar along Hermannsteiner Strasse. Follow signs to Dillenburg/B277 until Herborn.



the church.

Nestling beneath its 13th-century castle, Herborn has a beautifully preserved historic core. The stubby 16th-century Rathaus seems half fortress, and there is an impressive parade of five-story houses along

Hauptstrasse, half-timbered or shinale-huna, with aables facing the street. Also worth a visit is the 17thcentury tannery and the neighboring hangman's house in Schmaler Weg. Herborn's now defunct Hohe Schule was once an educational institution of international repute: the upper floors now house a museum (closed Mon) with displays relating to archaeology. war, and weaponry in the region.

Leave Herborn alona Bahnhofstrasse, following signs for Marbura to reach the B277, then follow the B255 signs to Marburg.

# Marburg

Hesse: 35037

Marburg is home to the world's oldest Protestant university, Philipps Universität, and with its arty cinemas. cheap cafés, and student bars, the hilly, attractive **Oberstadt**, or upper town, has a classic university town atmosphere. Crowning the heights above it is the impressive Landgrafenschloss former home of the Hessian Landgraves and now a museum (closed Mon). In the Unterstadt or lower town the Elisabethkirche (open daily) is Germany's oldest purely Gothic hall church, dedicated to Flisabeth of Thuringia.

☐ Take the B3 as far as Cölbe. then take the B62 toward Münchhausen/Bottendorf then on to B252 via Münchhausen to reach the town of Frankenbera.

### Frankenberg

Hesse: 35066

An attractive base from which to discover the unspoiled wooded hills of the Waldecker I and (www.waldeckerland de). Frankenberg has a halftimbered old town, the Altstadt. tumbling downhill from its tentowered early 16th-century Rathaus. The town hall's busy outline includes eight oriel windows and an eightsided stair tower dating from 1535. Neustadt - the present-day town center at the foot of the hill - was once a separate municipality with its own, much more modest Rathaus.

□ Leave Frankenbera alona Hainstrasse, then follow the B253 to Bad Wildungen. There is paid on-street parking in the Altstadt.

# Bad Wildungen

Hesse: 34537

The town's half-timbered Altstadt crowns a hillton overlooking its spacious 19th-century spa quarter. The 14th-century Lutheran Stadtkirche (open daily) blends Hessian and Westphalian influences and contains a beautiful winged altar by the medieval artist Conrad von Soest (1394-1422) North of the old town is the Baroque Schloss Friedrichstein which houses a museum (closed Mon) of Hessian military history and hunting.

□ Leave Bad Wildungen following brown sians for Edertalsperre on B485. Turn left for Affoldern then follow Randstrasse to reach the right bank of the Eder Dam.

# Edersee

Hesse: 34549

One of Germany's largest reservoirs, the 17-mile (27-km) long Edersee enjoys a scenic position amid the wooded hills of the Naturpark

Kellerwald-Edersee It is known for outdoor activities such as angling sailing, waterskiing, hiking, mountain biking, and Nordic walking; other pastimes include cruises on the lake . (personenschifffahrt.edersee.com). The dam here is famed as one of the targets of the 1943 Dambuster raids though it was swiftly renaired and looks as solid today as when it was completed in 1914

Continue beside the reservoir on — the Randstrasse, turnina riaht on to Abelauf/Seestrasse to reach Waldeck

### Waldeck Hesse: 34513

Although it is little more than a couple of streets lined with half-timbered houses. Waldeck attracts many visitors thanks to the town's scenic position high above the Edersee. Its castle. Schloss Waldeck (closed Mon), was

Leave Waldeck via Bahnhofstrasse. Turn right on to the B485 toward Bad Wildungen, before turning left at the roundabout on to the Lieschensruh through Bergheim to Fritzlar, Parking is available outside the town walls.

# B Fritzlar

### Hesse: 34560

The beautiful town of Fritzlar has preserved its original, nearly complete ring of medieval walls with watchtowers and bastions. Snug behind these lofty walls, Fritzlar has over 450 half-timbered houses from various periods, the grandest of which is the Renaissance Hochzeitshaus or wedding house. Built between 1580 and 1590, it now houses the **Regionalmuseum** (closed Mon). In the 8th century, the Anglo-Saxon apostle St. Boniface had the holy oak of the Germanic god Donar cut down to build a chapel here. This was later replaced by the St. Petri Dom (open daily), built in a handsome blend of the Romanesque and Gothic styles. The church's interior is rich in historic treasures. Adjacent to the church is a lovely 14thcentury cloister and the **Domschatz** or cathedral treasury (open daily); tickets for the Domschatz also allow a visit to the beautiful Romanesque crypt.

Leave Fritzlar along Kasseler Strasse, following the yellow signs for Kassel and Gudensbera, avoiding the A49 Autobahn. At Gudensberg, take Besser Strasse past Besse,

following signs to Kassel and Kassel-Wilhelmshöhe, then to Zentrum.

# M Kassel

Hesse: 34117

Ravishing garden landscapes are the legacy of Kassel's 18th-century heyday. The most impressive of these is the Neo-Classical Schlosspark Wilhelmshöhe, dominated by the Herkules-Oktagon, a hilltop folly from which the Wasserkünste cascade flows downhill to power a 170-ft (52-m) high fountain (May-Oct: open Wed, Sat, Sun & holidays). The castle houses the Gemäldegalerie Alte Meister (closed Mon) a picture gallery whose collection of Old Masters is particularly strong on Flemish and

# 15 Melsungen

A 16th-century stone bridge crosses the Fulda at the little spa town of Melsungen. The town has a beautiful **Altstadt**, in which, with the exceptions of the stone-built **Landgrafenschloss** and late-Gothic parish church, almost all buildings are half-timbered. Pride of place on the central market square goes to the dignified 16th-century **Rathaus**.

Continue along the B83 to reach Rotenburg an der Fulda.

# Rotenburg an der Fulda

Hesse; 36199

Pretty, half-timbered Rotenburg an der Fulda straddles the Fulda river and is dominated by the Landgrave's castle, the **Schloss Rotenburg**, which is now a college of law and finance. The town preserves poignant reminders of small-town Jewish life in Germany before the Holocaust, including the former Jewish school

at No. 19 Brotgasse, as well as the half-timbered building on the riverside that housed the **mikvah**, or ritual bath, which is now a small museum (06623 24 82; May–Oct: open on the first Sun or by appointment).

Continue on the B83 to Bebra, then take the B27 to Bad Hersfeld.


### Bad Hersfeld

Hesse: 36251

The austere ruins of Bad Hersfeld's **Benediktinerabtei** (*mid-Mar–Apr & mid-Sept–Oct: open Tue, Wed & Fri–Sun*) provide a memorable setting for the spa town's summer theater festival, the Festspiele. The museum (*closed Mon*), located next to the abbey, has exhibits on the history of the town and the region. Bad Hersfeld also has a splendid twin-gabled **Rathaus** in the Weser Renaissance style as well as many fine half-timbered houses.

☐ Leave Bad Hersfeld along the B27/ Frankfurter Strasse and follow this





### Fulda Hesse: 36037

Fulda was once an independent prince-bishopric, and its 18th-century Barockviertel, or Baroque Quarter, retains the air of a capital city. Its grand, twin-towered **Dom** was designed by Bayarian architect Johann Dientzenhofer The cathedral contains the tomb of St. Boniface, the Anglo-Saxon apostle of the Germans. The neighboring Dommuseum (closed Mon) displays Boniface's ghoulish skull reliquary. The **Stadtschloss** (open Sat-Fri). former residence of Fulda's bishops, has a cabinet of mirrors.

■ Leave Fulda's Aldstadt along the B254/Frankfurter Strasse, joining the B27 to the B40. This runs parallel to the Autobahn as far as Flieden: thereafter, the road has been declassified and is no longer marked as a trunk road, but continues via Schlüchtern to Steinau an der Strasse.

### Steinau an der Strasse Hesse: 36396

The childhood home of the Brothers Grimm certainly looks the part, with a stern-looking castle presiding over

a quaint, half-timbered Altstadt. untouched by time The Renaissance Amtshaus in which the family lived is one of the most impressive houses in the town: it is now a museum, the Brüder Grimm-Haus (open daily) The Amtshaus's former barn now hosts the Museum Steinau (open daily), a well-laid-out local history museum

### The Brothers Grimm

Born in Hanau near Frankfurt in 1785 and 1786, Jacob and Wilhelm Grimm achieved fame thanks to their collection and popularization of traditional folk tales, nurturing the image of a make-believe Germany that has much in common with their Hessian homeland They grew up in Steinau an der Strasse and studied law at Marburg University before working as librarians at the elector's court in Kassel, However, political disfavor forced them to move to Göttingen and they finally settled in Berlin. Though best known for stories such as Hansel and Gretel, Rumpelstiltskin. and Snow White, the brothers were serious academics who also wrote a German dictionary together.



# **Roman Ruins and Fine Wines**

The Ahr and Mosel, tributaries of the Rhine, carve their way through the Eifel uplands, creating deep and twisted valleys. Despite being in the middle of western Europe, these valleys remain among Germany's rural backwaters and the attractions along these major rivers offer a quieter version of those on the romantic Rhine. Both valleys offer the classic German mix of atmospheric medieval castles, such as the magnificent Burg Eltz, and pretty half-timbered towns surrounded by steep vineyards that produce wonderful full-bodied wines. The drive visits the Nürburgring, the famous Formula One race car track, and finishes at the venerable city of Trier, the region's southern gateway, with its major collection of interesting Roman ruins.



### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish: Remagen to Trier.

Number of days: 3-4 days, allowing half a day to explore Trier.

Distance: 162 miles (261 km)

Road conditions: Roads are paved and in good condition; most are relatively minor and twist along the Ahr Valley and over the Hunsrück mountains.

When to go: It is possible to tour the area all year round but the drive is particularly good during the wine festivals (late summer-early fall).

Opening times: Most attractions open daily, while shops are open from 9am to 5pm. Monday to Friday, but close early on Saturdays. Most shops and services are closed on Sundays, Restaurants generally close around 10pm.

Main market days: Trier: Mon-Sat.

Shopping: Pick up local wines. particularly those of small vineyards that are not widely exported.

Major festivals: Bernkastel-Kues: Weinfest (wine festival), first weekend, Sept: Trier: Mosel Musikfestival (Moselle music festival), Jul-Sept: Weinfest (wine festival), late Aug: Trierer Weihnachtsmarkt (Christmas market), late Nov-late Dec.

### DAY TRIP OPTIONS

Families should not miss a visit to the Nürburgring, where they can enjoy motor-racing before a relaxing stop at Burg Eltz. Wine lovers can explore one of Germany's best wine-producing regions, which can also be toured on river cruises. For full details, see p143.

### Remagen

Rhineland-Palatinate: 53424

The Ahr river flows into the Rhine just south of Remagen, but the town is better known for its pivotal position in World War II. It was here that American forces captured a bridge across the Rhine, in an act that was celebrated as a strategic victory. Located in the former bridgehead on the Rhine's left bank, the

Friedensmuseum Brücke von

**Remagen,** or bridge museum (early-Mar–early-Nov: open daily), details the history of the bridge and its conquest.

From the cul-de-sac road beside the museum, turn left down Goethestrasse then right down Südallee to take the B9 toward Koblenz. Turn right on the B266 to Ahrweiler. Get on to the B267, and follow signs to the Römervilla parking lot.

### The Bridge at Remagen

The capture of the Ludendorff Bridge at Remagen by American forces in March 1945 has been seen as a turning point in World War II, since this was the last remaining bridge over the Rhine. President Eisenhower declared the bridge "worth its weight in gold" and Hitler had the officers in charge of the bridge shot. Yet there were further crossings over the Rhine, and 10 days later, the bridge collapsed. Its symbolic significance has grown over time, partly due to the 1969 film The Bridge at Remagen.

### Römervilla

Rhineland-Palatinate: 53475

In 1980, road constructions at the base of vineyards just north of Ahrweiler chanced upon the foundations of an ancient building. Closer examination revealed this to be part of a

3rd-century Roman country mansion,
now protected by the **Museum** 

Römervilla (Apr–mid-Nov: closed Mon) where the building's foundations can be seen. Evidence suggests that the place, preserved under a 5th-century landslide, was inhabited from at least as early as the middle of the 1st century. After exploring the museum, walk down Am Silberberg and turn left along Walporzheimer Strasse for a stroll into the heart of the charming, half-timbered center of Ahrweiler.

☐ Turn left out of the parking lot, then right on the B267. Pass through a tunnel into Altenahr and park in the adjacent lot on the left.

### Altenahr

Rhineland-Palatinate; 53502

Surrounded by vineyards and wooded crags, the town of Altenahr is wrapped around a couple of bends of the Ahr river. Take a ten-minute walk uphill via the street opposite the parking lot. Rossberg, to the ruined 11th-century Burg Are. From the top of this fortification, the chairlift (Easter–Oct: open daily) further up the valley is clearly visible. It provides access to higher points and the Rotweinwanderweg. (www.rotweinwanderweg.de) a wellmarked red wine walking trail that can be followed for a pleasant hour or two of hiking (tourist office: Altenburger Strasse 1a; www.altenahr-ahr. de) around Altenahr. The chairlift also leads to a summer toboggan run.

☐ Turn left on to the B257 and follow it past Breidscheid to turn left in the direction of Nürburgring. Turn right on the B258 to the parking lots beside the Nürburgring grandstand.





# Mürburarina

Rhineland-Palatinate: 53520

Dubbed by British motor-racing driver lackie Stewart as "Green Hell" the Nürburgring is revered as one of the world's most difficult and treacherous motor-racing circuits. Completed in 1927, its 73 curves have claimed

dozens of lives. By the 1970s, the course was deemed too dangerous for top-class racing, but in 1984 Formula One returned to a safer loop. The track is regularly used for motorsports and novelty events, such as oldtimer races, but at other times it is possible to drive

the course in one's own vehicle. There are no speed limits on some sections, though passing on the right is prohibited. To experience speeds of up to 199 mph (320 kph), book a seat in the BMW Ring-Taxi (Mar-Nov: open Mon-Fri; 02691 93 20 20; www.ringtaxi.bmw-motorsport.com: children must be taller than 5 ft/150 cm). Otherwise. visit the excellent visitor center Ring Werk (open daily) with its many hightech racing simulators, films, and exhibits, which will keep children busy for hours.

Return to the B258 and continue on it. Turn right onto the B262 to Naunheim. From here, turn right again onto a minor road marked for Burg Eltz to reach the castle's parking lot.

# Burg Eltz

### Rhineland-Palatinate; 56294

Tucked in a hidden valley, Burg Eltz (late Mar-Oct: open daily) is one of Germany's most attractive castles. The construction of its cluster of archetypal turrets on a perfect knuckle of rock

began in the 12th century and. though plenty of additions followed. it has never been destroyed or rebuilt. It survived despite once being under a 2 year siege, and was saved during the French campaigns of 1689 by having a member of the von Eltz family in the French Army. The interiors

> are preserved as they were in medieval times. The treasury displays valuables of gold and silver, while the armory boasts many lethallooking weapons.

Return to Münstermaifeld and turn riaht to Hatzenport. Then turn right on to the B416 along the Mosel, which

becomes the B49. In Cochem, use the parking lot beneath the Mosel bridge.

### Cochem

### Rhineland-Palatinate: 56812

Half-timbered Cochem is striking. but can sometimes be overrun by visitors. From the town, a 15-minute marked walk leads up to the town's main landmark, the Reichsburg (mid-Mar-Nov: open daily). A turreted, medieval-style castle built in 1877, albeit on 11th-century foundations. its antique-filled interior can be explored. Take the chairlift, Cochemer Sesselbahn, (mid-Mar-mid-Nov: open daily) to the summit of Pinnerkreuz hill. Located along Endertstrasse, the main road through the town, the chairlift offers great valley views as well as a chancev to walk downhill between vineyards back into town.

Continue eastward on the B49. which becomes the B53, to follow the Mosel. At Traben-Trarbach, follow sians to Bernkastel-Kues, taking the B50 and the B53 to park beside the Mosel bridge. Left Impressive Burg Fltz perched on a hillton **Below** Nürburgring, the Famous Formula One race track

among woods and vineyards, the twin-towns of Bernkastel-Kues have the perfect Mosel setting. They have many amazingly crooked houses. some of which house wine taverns. specializing in the local Bernkasteler Doctor, Bernkastel clusters behind the Pfarrkirche St. Michael, once part of the town's defenses. The Marktplatz is surrounded by half-timbered houses. Before settling down to

wine-tasting, explore Burg Landshut (www.bernkastel.de), a 13th-century castle ruin with views of rolling hillsides. From the Marktplatz, follow Mandatstrasse to a 2-mile (3-km) hiking trail to the castle or take the hourly shuttle bus (Apr-Oct: open daily) from the riverfront tourist office.

☐ Turn right out of the parking lot on to the B53. In Trier, turn left on to Kaiser-Wilhelm-Brücke and then right on to Martinsufer to Friedrich-Ebert-Allee to Nordallee. Turn right at Simeonstiftsplatz to park on the left.

# Trier

### Rhineland-Palatinate: 54290

Founded in 15 BC. Trier boasts northern Europe's greatest collection of Roman remains. It became the capital of the Western Roman Empire in the 3rd century. Today, the town's wine culture, combined with its proximity to Luxemburg, provides a cosmopolitan feel.

### A two-hour walking tour

An alley from the Simeonstiftsplatz parking lot leads to the colossal 2ndcentury **Porta Nigra** (1) (open daily), the last of Trier's four city gates. Named for its blackening, which had already occurred by the Middle Ages, it is remarkable for its ingenious design the structure is supported by just a few iron rods. It was inhabited by a Greek hermit, Simeon, after 1028. Turned into a church after his death and sanctification, it was dissolved along with the adjoining monastery by Napoleon in 1802. South of the gate, Simeonstrasse leads to the Hauptmarkt (2), the hub of the old town where the sculpted fountain Petrusbrunnen lies encircled by grand houses including the vivid red Baroque Rotes Haus and the 15thcentury Steipe, once a banqueting hall now housing Germany's oldest pharmacy, the Löwenapotheke.



A block east of the Hauptmarkt lies Trier's Romanesque **Dom St. Peter** ③ (open daily). Technically the oldest church in Germany, it was once a basilica, but since the late 3rd century. it has been a hishons' seat. The current building originated in the 11th century and contains a robe believed to have been worn by Christ at his crucifixion, though this has not been scientifically authenticated. Housed in the extravagant Baroque Heilumskammer, the robe has not been on display since 1996

North of the church, the Bischöfliches Dom und Diözesanmuseum (Nov-Marclosed Mon) is famed for an early 4th-century Roman fresco removed from the palace that once stood where the Dom does today. Turn left then right for a walk down Liebfrauenstrasse to the

Konstantinbasilika (4) (Nov–Mar: closed Mon). It originally provided a throne hall for Emperor Constantine in the 4th century but later became a Protestant church for the princeelectors who resided in the Baroque Rokoko-Palais (5) next door. The formal gardens beside the palace lead to the Rheinisches Landesmuseum (6) (Nov-Apr: closed Mon), a Roman

archaeology museum with many beautifully nresented treasures including coins and mosaics. A walk south through the pretty gardens leads to the Kaiserthermen (7) (open daily) once the largest haths in the Roman world Their foundations remain intact, making it

easy to visualize the scale of this 4th-century complex. The scale also impresses at Trier's Amphitheater (8) (onen daily) a well-marked ten-minute walk southeast along Olewiger Strasse from the underpass at the southeast corner of Kaiserthermen This 20.000-capacity arena was built for gladiatorial and animal fights around AD 100, making it Trier's oldest Roman structure Return to the Kaiserthermen. turn right along Weberbach. left down Wechselstrasse, right again on Neustrasse, then left on Viehmarktstrasse to arrive at the Viehmarktplatz. The glassy cube in the center protects the Viehmarktthermen (9) (closed Mon), the smallest and oldest of Trier's Roman baths, From the opposite side of Viehmarktplatz, turn right Sculpture, Trier's down Stresemanstrasse, then Electoral Palace left down Brückenstrasse to

> Karl-Marx-Haus (10) (Nov-Mar: closed Mon) where this political philosopher was born and grew up in the 19th century. Now a museum, it focuses on Marxian philosophy. From here, turn left and walk along Fleichstrasse to the Hauptmarkt, Return via Simeonstrasse to Porta Nigra and turn left along the alley to the Simeonstiftsplatz parking lot.

plenty of motor-racing excitement and has an excellent visitor center. Then head to the fantasy castle, Burg Eltz 5.

From Trier, follow signs to Koblenz and drive north to the end of the A1. Follow signs to Nürburgring.

#### **Enchanting Mosel Valley**

From Burg Eltz 5, drive to Cochem 6, then drive back along the Mosel

river to visit Bernkastel-Kues 7. Wine lovers should consider heading straight to the twin-town via a cruise from Trier 8 to sample the wines without having to drive later.

From Trier, follow signs to Koblenz but leave the A1 at exit 123 to take the marked route to Bad Bertrich, then head to Cochem.

# The Romantic Rhine

Slicing through the Taunus and Hunsrück hills. Germany's mighty Rhine river has sculpted a craggy and dramatic gorge classified by UNESCO as a World Heritage Site. Here, nearperfect wine-growing conditions and the lucrative tolls on passing river traffic gave rise to a multitude of wealthy castles during the Middle Ages. Many of these were destroyed in the 17th century and then rebuilt in the 18th and 19th centuries during the Romantic

movement, which celebrated the valley as a source of Germanic identity. This tour visits many of these grand fortresses and explores the sleepy and traditional towns of Marksburg and Bacharach, where half-timbered houses have survived alongside Roman fortifications Scores of local wines await





#### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish: Kohlenz to Mainz

Number of days: 3-4 days, allowing a day to explore Koblenz, Mainz, and the major castles along the route.

Distance: 72 miles (116 km).

Road conditions: Well paved and marked alongside the Rhine.

When to go: A good drive year round. this route is particularly attractive in August and September when wine festivals abound

Opening times: Most attractions open daily: shops are open between 9am and 5pm, Monday to Friday, but close early on Saturdays. Shops and services are closed on Sundays, Most restaurants close their kitchens by 10pm.

Main market days: Boppard: Fri: Mainz: Tue Fri & Sat

**Shopping:** Pick up local wines, such as Rieslings, in Bacharach or Rüdesheim. In Mainz, browse the hand-printed posters, cards, and flyers of the Druckladen for aifts or souvenirs.

Major festivals: Koblenz: Rhein in Flammen (Rhine in flames - a fireworks spectacular), late Aug: Boppard: Weinfestwochenende Boppard (weekend wine festival), early Oct: Loreley: Rhein in Flammen, late Sept: Oberwesel: Weinmarkt Oberwesel (wine market), late Sept: Rüdesheim: Rhein in Flammen, early Jul; Mainz: Mainzer Fastnacht (carnival), mid-Feb: Mainzer Johannisnacht (midsummer night), late Jun: Rüdesheimer Weinfest (wine festival), late Aug.

#### **DAY TRIP OPTIONS**

Wine lovers will appreciate not having to drive after a visit to Bacharach for wine-tasting. Visitors can explore both banks of the Rhine separately, avoiding the use of car ferries. The highlights on both banks are the chairliftassisted walks and castles. On the right bank, the walk leads from Rüdesheim to Assmannshausen after a visit to the Marksburg. On the left bank, the chairlift climbs to hikes around Vierseenblick before a visit to **Burg** Rheinstein. For full details, see p155.

Rhineland-Palatinate: 56001

Located at the confluence of the Rhine and Mosel, Koblenz marks the northern end of the Rhine Gorge. Built in 9 BC as a Roman settlement, the city was repeatedly fought over for many centuries because of its strategic riverside location. Following its comprehensive destruction during World War II, it was rebuilt in a mix of old and new. Its pedestrianized center has many pavement cafés and is surveyed from across the Rhine by the grandiose Ehrenbreitstein citadel.


#### A 90-minute walking tour

From the parking lot at the Kurfürstliches Schloss turn left down Stresemannstrasse to the Rhine then left following the river to its confluence with the Mosel Known as the **Deutsches Eck** ① or "German corner", the headland is presided over by a giant equestrian statue of Emperor Wilhelm I. Behind it, the Deutschherrenhaus was once the 13th-century headquarters of the Teutonic Kniahts, but the building is now home to the Ludwia Museum (closed Mon), displaying modern and contemporary art. Walking west along the thin strip of parkland from the Deutsches Eck, the picturesque old town. Altstadt. comes into view. To the right is the arresting castle Alte Burg (2) on the banks of the Mosel. The first fortress the von Arken family, but in 1277, it was taken over by the archbishop of Koblenz, who sought to protect himself from the city's citizens, who were seeking independence. The fortress now houses the town archives. Walk through the archway just to the right, up a flight of stairs, and left on

Burgstrasse for the short walk to the **Florinsmarkt** ③. One of several focal points in the Altstadt, the Romanesque-Gothic church of Florinskirche (*Jun-Aug: open daily*) is known, above all, for the Augenroller, a figure that rolls its eyes and sticks out its tongue every half hour from its perch below the clock. The square is also

From the Florinsmarkt, head south





Löhrstrasse before intersecting with Am Plan (4) Kohlenz's most famous street corner. Here, the 17th-century buildings on each corner, Vier Türme, are celebrated for their ornate facades. Am Plan once served as a hutcher's market the city's main execution site and the venue for medieval tournaments. An alley off its left side leads to the Liebfrauenkirche (5), Koblenz's main church Despite its Baroque onion domes and Gothic choir and chancel the church is Romanesque in origin. With the church to the right, follow Braugasse east, turn left onto Entenpfuhl and then right along Firmungstrasse to head back to the Rhine. Alongside the river, the **Rheinpromenade (6)**, a pleasant promenade, stretches south and is worth strolling down as far as the quaint wine village Weindorf (7). Back near the junction of Rheinstrasse, a passenger ferry (Faster-mid-Nov: open daily) crosses to the right bank of the Rhine. From here, turn left then right down the Charlottenstrasse and Obertal to the chairlift (Easter-Oct: open daily) up to the **Festung** Ehrenbreitstein (3) (open daily), which has a commanding position over the city. First built in AD 1000, the fortress was extended by the archbishop of Trier who lived here between 1648 and 1768 until its destruction by Napoleonic troops in 1801. Today's version, a Prussian rebuild from 1832, houses the Landesmuseum (mid-Mar-mid-Nov: open daily). The state museum looks at local trade, including car manufacture in a tribute to Audi, which was

founded nearby. Return to the

on Münzstrasse which becomes

Rheinpromenade, turning right onto Stresemannstrasse to the parking lot.

From the Kurfürstliches Schloss turn left and aet on to B49. Turn right on to B42 in the direction of Lahnstein. Follow signs to the Marksburg parking lot.

#### Marksburg

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 56338

The huddle of towers and turrets high above the delightful halftimbered town of Braubach belongs to the Marksburg (open daily). Built in 1117, it is one of the Rhine's most impressive castles, and is particularly remarkable for being the only medieval castle in the region never to have been destroyed. It is easy to imagine lively banquets in its Gothic grand hall, while its armory and array of torture instruments recall a more gory past.

Return to B42 and turn left. Take the Kamp-Bornhofen-Boppard ferry across the Rhine, then in Boppard, turn left alona Rheinallee for parkina lot.

#### Boppard

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 56154

Just two horseshoe bends upstream from Braubach and on the opposite bank of the Rhine, the atmospheric town of Boppard gathers around a riverfront promenade. Located beside the ferry terminal, the Alte Burg is the most impressive building on the waterfront. Built as a stronghold and tollhouse in 1340, it now houses the Museum der Stadt Boppard (Apr-Oct: closed Mon), which celebrates local cabinet-maker Michael Thonet (1796-1871), who invented bentwood furniture. By soaking layered strips of wood veneer in hot alue and then bending them into shape in metal molds, he created

elegantly curved furniture that became hugely popular in the mid-19th century

A block southeast lies Boppard's marketplace and the tourist office (May-Sept: closed Sun; Oct-Apr: open Mon-Fri), which organizes wine tastings (open Apr-Oct; www. boppard-tourismus.de) at local vinevards. Just beyond. crossing Oberstrasse, the town's main shopping street, a short walk down Kirchgasse leads to the Römer-Kastell, where four of Boppard's 4thcentury Roman watchtowers are preserved.

Back on Oberstrasse, a few minutes' walk west leads to the Karmeliterstrasse and its church, Karmelitenkirche. Local farmers place the

season's first ripe grapes in a niche outside the church, beside the Traubenmadonna, or Grape Madonna. to gain her blessing. At the northern end of Boppard – a 20-minute walk along the promenade – a chairlift (Apr-Oct: open daily) ascends to a fine lookout known as the Vierseenblick or Four Lakes View because the four sections of the Rhine visible from here look unconnected Several hiking trails fan out from here, and bus No. 34 takes an easy one-hour route back into Boppard.

☐ Turn right from the parking lot and riaht again to turn left onto Mainzer Strasse and on to B9 to Sankt Goar. then follow sians up Schlossberg to the Bura Rheinfels parkina lot.

#### Bura Rheinfels

Rhineland-Palatinate; 56329 The Rhine's largest castle, Burg Rheinfels (Mar-Oct: onen daily: Nov-Feb: open Sat & Sun) is a maze of sprawling passages, trenches, and tunnels and ruined battlements (a torch is handy for exploration). Equally incredible is the fact that the castle was once five times its present size and mighty enough to survive a 14-month siege by 9,000 troops in 1255 and repel an army of 28,000 in 1692. It would never be taken by force, for in 1794 it was handed over without a shot to the French



Revolutionary Army who soon set about demolishing the citadel.

Return to Sankt Goar, turn right down B9 and park at the Sankt Goar-Sankt Goarshausen ferry terminal. I eave the car here and hoard the ferry across the Rhine as a foot passenaer if intending to walk or take the shuttle hus up the Loreley, since the tour returns this way.

#### 6 Lorelev

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 56346

The giant rock outcrop on the opposite side of the Rhine from Sankt Goar, and above Sankt Goarshausen, is known as the Loreley Vistors can either hike drive or take a shuttle bus (Apr-Oct: hourly) from the ferry terminal to the summit for breathtaking veiws. The visitors' center (Mar-mid-Nov: open daily: Besucherzentrum I oreley: www. loreley-touristik.de) has an Englishlanguage exhibition on the region's past and natural history.

#### The Legend of Loreley

The name Lorelev is thought to originate from the old German and Celtic words for "lure" and "rock" and the legend of a lady who threw herself into the Rhine near St. Goarshausen in despair over a faithless lover. On dving, she transformed herself into a bewitching siren and sat on the rock singing alluring songs. Distracted sailors would then fall foul of the undercurrents and rocky riverbed beneath the giant cliff that marks the narrowest point on the Rhine between Switzerland and the North Sea.



Return to Sankt Goar on the ferry and turn left on to B9. In Oberwesel, park on riverfront.

#### Oberwesel

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 55430

Located on the left bank of the Rhine the charming wine town of Oberwesel boasts a well-preserved 2-mile (3-km) long medieval wall around the old town that makes for a good walk. The local history museum in the central Kulturhaus (open daily) has a good collection of 19th-century engravings of the sort that helped romanticize the Rhine and photographs of the local ladies who have been crowned Weinhexe - the good "wine witch" who protects the wine harvest – every April since the 1940s, following a local tradition.

☐ Continue on the B9 to the Kaub-Lanascheid ferry. Leave the car and cross the Rhine on ferry as a foot passenger, then take the passenger boat to Burg Pfalzgrafenstein.



#### Burg Pfalzgrafenstein Rhineland-Palatinate: 56349

One of the most beautifully situated castles in Europe, the mighty fortress of Burg Pfalzgrafenstein (Jan-Nov. closed Mon) stands in the middle of the Rhine river With its unusual island perch, the castle was built to levy tolls on Rhine shipping. Constructed in 1325 by Ludwig the Bavarian, the castle's gun bastions and its present shape are the result of Baroque refurbishments in the 17th and 18th centuries.

Exit the ferry terminal parking lot and turn left on to the B9. In Bacharach, park in the riverside parking lot.

#### Bacharach

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 55422

The pretty town of Bacharach has a unique complex of historic buildings, with fortified town walls. the church of St. Peter, the ruins of the Gothic chapel of St. Werner, and Burg Stahleck - the 12thcentury castle towering over the town. Once the seat of the Count-Palatinate of the Rhine, today it is an impressive youth hostel.

A gate in the town wall, opposite Bacharach's main parking lot, provides access to its 14th-century fortifications, with views of the huddle of half-timbered buildings. Among these is the celebrated old house, Altes Haus on Oberstrasse 61, which is so wonky that it seems to lean in all directions at once. This building and many others house wine taverns, which serve up local wines such as Hahnenhof Riesling.

☐ Turn right out of the Bacharach parking lot on to the B9. Park at the signed parking lot beside the B9 in Trechtingshausen.

#### Bura Rheinstein Rhineland-Palatinate: 55413

The compact castle of **Burg Rheinstein** (mid-Mar-mid-Nov: open daily: mid-Novmid-Mar: open Mon-Thu & Sun) sits in a spectacular location 270 ft (82 m) above the Rhine. After falling into ruin. the 13th-century castle was acquired by Prince Friedrich Ludwig of Prussia and given a complete makeover in 1820. This helped begin a Romantic architectural trend, which swept down the Rhine and across Germany and saw many medieval ruins rebuilt as castles in an age in which fortifications no longer served a practical purpose. Here, the resulting twee pastel-colored interior rooms seem out of place in a castle, but convey a good sense of the early 19th-century tastes.

Continue south on the B9, turn left over a bridge into Fruchtmarkt, then Vorstadt and Espenschiedstrasse/ Mainzer Strasse. Follow ferry signs left down Hafenstrasse. Take the ferry across the Rhine. Turn right to Rüdesheim then left down Burgstrasse to the roadside parking lot opposite the Rheingauer Weinmuseum.

#### Rüdesheim

#### Hesse; 65385

Enjoying a picturesque location on the banks of the Rhine, Rüdesheim has a long history going back to Roman times. The town is famous for its main street, the Drosselgasse.

which is lined with countless wine bars and shops. There are also the remains of three castles: the Boosenburg, the Vorderburg, and the 12th-century Bromserburg which houses a wine museum The Rheingauer Weinmuseum **Brömserburg** (Mar–Oct: open daily) has a wide array of wine-making items from Roman times, particularly aged wine presses, but also antique amphorae, wine coolers, and goblets. Walking up Burgstrasse from the museum and turning right along Oberstrasse leads to the center of Rüdesheim and Drosselgasse, the tourist hub where strings of souvenir shops peddle their wares. The top of the lane is close to the chairlift (Mar-Nov: open daily) to viewpoints above, while around its base are many lanes lined with wine taverns serving samples of the celebrated local Riesling.

Rüdesheim also has several historic mansions, including the half-timbered Bromserhof (1559), with a collection of musical instruments, and the early 16th-century Klunkhardshof.

Above the town towers the Niederwalddenkmal, a huge 125-ft (38-m) statue of Germania built to commemorate German unity and the foundation of the German Reich in the wake of the country's victory in the Franco-Prussian War of 1870-71.

Return to the B42 in the direction of Wiesbaden/Eltville to Hattenheim. Turn left at Schlosseraasse, left on to Hauptstrasse, then right on to Eberbacher Strasse to sians for Kloster Eberbach parking lot.

#### Walk to Assmannshausen

Taking the chairlift from the center of Rüdesheim allows for an excellent two-hour hike to Assmannshausen from where it is possible to get a boat or bus back to Rüdesheim; the boat is included in the price of a "Ringtrip." The chairlift climbs to the impressive Niederwalddenkmal after which the hiking trail passes through a series of fine Rhine viewpoints before descending past vineyards into Assmannshausen.

# W Kloster Eberbach

The monastery of Kloster Eberbach (open daily) is best known as the Romanesque setting for the medieval murder mystery film The Name of the Rose (1986). Its most impressive feature is its austere basilica. Here, a steep staircase in the north transept climbs to the dormitory where monks slept on pallet-like beds. The walk around the cloisters to the lay refectory passes massive wine presses built of timbers sturdy enough for galleons; its shop has excellent wines.

From the parking lot, head south to the T-junction, turn left toward Erbach, and follow signs to Eltville. On arriving in the town, turn right and park at the Schwimmbad, then walk down to the riverfront and turn left toward the town center.



The oldest town in the region. Eltville is gathered around a cozy nest of lanes, but it is best known for its many rose beds, whose perfume thickens the summer air . Many rose bushes line the Rhine promenade and grow in the moat of the adiacent 14th-century castle. the **Burg**, which was laid to waste by fierce Swedes during the Thirty Years' War (1618–48). Stirred up by the Counter-Reformation, this war between the Protestant Union and Catholic League raged across Europe. Only the four-story residential tower of the Burg survived, and climbing it (open daily) provides a glimpse of a stained-alass window celebrating Johannes Gutenburg, as well as fine views of the town's waterfront.

Turn right out of the parking lot, following Wallufer Strasse, turn right again at the next junction. Head south to Mainz-Amöneburg. Take the B40, then the Theodor-Heuss-Brücke bridge over the Rhine into Mainz, then take the first left to a handy riverside parking lot.

## Mainz

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 55001

As capital of Rhineland-Palatinate, and with good transport links to Frankfurt, large and cosmopolitan Mainz (see p165) has none of the sleepy atmosphere of the rest of the Rhineland. Originally a strategic settlement at the confluence of the Main and Rhine, by the 8th century it was the main religious center north of the Alps. Its importance was enhanced by Johannes Gutenberg (c. 1400–68), who invented the printing press here in the 15th century.

Like Koblenz, Mainz suffered massive bombardment during World War II, though a large section of its half-timbered old town, including the cathedral, survived or was rebuilt to create an attractive town with many tempting traditional wine bars. Mainz's majestic six-towered late-Romanesque Kaiserdom (open daily) is of 12th-century origin and unusual for sharing its exterior walls with adjoining houses. Inside, the highlight of the spartan cathedral is the Dommuseum and the adjacent

Gewölbehallen (open daily), which stores its treasures. These include sparkling reliquaries, intricate 15thand 16th-century tapestries, a 13th-century rood screen by the Master of Naumburg, which vividly depicts Sin and Salvation, and

some Rococo choir stalls.

Celebrating Mainz's most famous son, Johannes Gutenberg, the Gutenberg-Museum (closed Mon) on Liebfrauenplatz shows a reconstruction of his workshop from 1450. and has a rare copy of his first major work: the 42-line Bible, from 1455. which was named after the number of lines on each page. The museum also puts Gutenberg's invention in context with a look at Asian printing techniques and the hand copying of manuscripts, which he effectively turned into a dving art. For a handson experience, visit the nearby printing shop **Druckladen** (closed Sun), where visitors can hand-set type (aprons are provided) to produce posters, cards, and flyers. Enthusiastic staff offer guidance to those trying their hand at printing.

#### Invention of the Printing Press

In the early 15th-century, goldsmith Johannes Gutenberg experimented with several technologies that led to the invention of the printing press. These included the development of movable metal type and molds oil-based inks, and the mechanical printing press, for which he initially adapted wine presses. The results changed the world forever as information could spread more quickly. This gave more power to the masses and helped to spread the Protestant Reformation.

#### Maus im Mollers expensive

This modern, upmarket restaurant blessed with magical night-time views of the marketplace and the cathedral offers an often-changing seasonal menu. Local dishes such as rack of lamb in goat's milk with vegetable chutney are worth ordering when available. Leave room for the phenomenal double-layer Sachertorte (chocolate cake).

#### DAY TRIP OPTIONS

All the stops on this route can be visited on day trips. Koblenz in particular is a good base for boat trips.

#### Medieval castles and monasteries

Drive along the banks of the Rhine, stopping at the Marksburg 2, the Rhine's most attractive castle. and the unusual islet-based Burg Pfalzgrafenstein **1** before arriving at the bustling

town of Rüdesheim 10 on the banks of the Rhine. Take its chairlift over the pretty vineyards to the excellent and downhill two-hour walk to Assmannshausen, with sweeping Rhine Valley views along the way. End the day with a sumptuous meal at the peaceful and atmospheric Kloster Eberbach 11.


Take the B42 along the right bank of the Rhine.

#### Mighty fortifications

Explore Boppard 3. with its remaining Roman walls, then ride the chairlift up to the Vierseenblick. Next, wander around the splendid medieval town fortifications of Oberwesel 6 and those of the quaint wine town of Bacharach 8 before a visit to the Gothic fantasy castle of Burg Rheinstein 9.

Take the B9 alona the left bank of the Rhine.

# The German Wine Route

Set in gently rolling countryside between Pfälzer Wald's wooded hills and the Rhine, with the French Alsace to the south, the wine-growing regions of Pfalz and Rheinhessen are Germany's largest. This area has much in common with its southern neighbor, Alsace – from its architecture to the dialects spoken. They also share a history of alternating periods of French and German control. The drive follows an established and well-marked wine route past picturesque vineyards, beautiful villages, chic hotels, and top-quality restaurants. A gourmet experience is guaranteed. Visitors can look foward to tasting the different types of wine made by the numerous small vineyards scattered throughout the region. Other highlights include the ancient and historic cathedral cities of Mainz, Worms, and Speyer.



#### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish: Deutsches Weinton to Speyer.

Number of days: 5 days, allowing half a day to explore Oppenheim.

Distance: 162 miles (260 km).

Road conditions: The region has well paved minor roads with gentle gradients. The Deutsche Weinstrasse is well marked: look for the grape symbol.

When to go: The tourist season begins with the Mandelblütenfest in March and continues until the end of October Some attractions close for winter

Opening times: Most attractions open daily, while shops are open 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday, but close early on Saturdays, Shops and services are closed on Sundays. Most restaurants close their kitchens by 10pm.

Maior festivals: Neustadt an der Weinstrasse: Deutsches Weinlesefest (wine festival) Oct: Gimmeldingen: Mandelblütenfest (almond blossom festival), Mar/Apr: Bad Dürkheim: Wurstmarkt (sausage festival), Sept: Mainz: Mainzer Fastnacht (pre-Lent carnival), Feb: Worms: Nibelungen Festspiele (theater festival), late Jul: Backfischfest (folk festival), late Aug/ early Sept.

#### DAY TRIP OPTIONS

Lovers of fine food and wine will find the Weinstrasse at its most chic between Edenkoben and Freinsheim and enjoy the drive from Mainz to Worms, which is famous for winegrowing villages. For the lost-in-time charm of sleepy villages and hilltop castles, a drive from Bad Bergzabern to Burg Trifels is particularly magical. For full details, see p167.

#### Deutsches Weintor Rhineland-Palatinate: 76889

Marking the start of the 53-mile (85-km) Deutsche Weinstrasse (German Wine Route) since 1936 the Deutsches Weintor or German Wine Gate (Ian & Feb: closed Mon-Wed) located in the town of Schweigen-Rechtenbach, is a monumental sandstone gatehouse on the French border just north of the Alsatian town of Wissembourg, Visitors can taste and buy Pfalz wines here and there is a

□ Leave Schweigen-Rechtenbach on the B38 north, then turn left at the Deutsche Weinstrasse symbol to Bad Berazabern and left on to Kettengasse to park.


restaurant serving regional fare.

#### Bad Bergzabern Rhineland-Palatinate: 76887

With its leafy spa quarter and a quaint historic center focused on the Schloss of the Counts Palatine of Zweibrücken. Bad Bergzabern is the capital of the southern Weinstrasse. The ornate Renaissance Gasthaus Zum Engel (Angel's Inn) near the Schloss houses a local history museum (open Wed, Fri-Sun). In the late 1930s, Bad Bergzabern formed part of the fortifications known as the Westwall: a bunker on

Kurfürstenstrasse (Jul-Oct: open Sun: Mar-Jun: open 1st Sun of month) now houses a museum

Leave Bad Berazabern alona the B48/Weinstrasse north to Rura Landeck. Park at the Bura.



#### Burg Landeck

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 76889

There is a fairy-tale quality to the village of Klingenmünster, nestling beneath forested hills and dominated by the ruined fortress of Burg Landeck (open daily), which towers 984 ft (300 m) above it. Built in the 13th century to defend a Benedictine abbey, it was destroyed by French troops in 1680 during the War of the Palatine Succession. It now houses a small museum and provides superb views.

Return to the B48 north, turn left and then right, following signs to Slevogthof, to reach Leinsweiler.

#### A Leinsweiler

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 76829

The arcaded town hall, the Rathaus of 1619, is the focus of this pretty, halftimbered village. Leinsweiler was the summer home of the German Impressionist painter Max Slevogt.



Where to Stay: inexpensive, under €70; moderate, €70-€150; expensive, over €150

who died in 1932 and is buried here His house the **Slevoathof** (open daily) stands on a hillside below the ruined fortress of Neukastel: the music room and library contain wall and ceiling paintings by the artist

☐ Continue to Birkweiler, take the access road up to the B10, turning left for Annweiler. Be careful as this is a danaerous iunction. Park near the town hall and tourist information office.

#### Wine Country

Vinevards dominate the pictureperfect landscape of the Pfalz and Rheinhessen region. Many local wine growers have a room set aside to sample and buy wines from the vinevard itself. However, German wineries tend to be family-run affairs. so it is wise to call before visiting. Dry white wines predominate – Rieslings are often excellent. Red wines made with the Spätburgunder (Pinot Noir) grape are also gaining popularity. The region also produces Sekt (sparkling wines) and small quantities of Tresterbrand, the German equivalent of the spirit grappa.

#### Annweiler Rhineland-Palatinate: 76855

A former Free City of the Holy Roman Empire, Annweiler lies on the Queich river, which was once harnessed to provide power for the town's tanneries. The Gerberviertel (tannery district) is particularly picturesque, with its watermill and half-timbered houses. three of which house the local history museum the Museum Unterm Trifels (Mid-Mar-Nov: closed Mon: Nov-mid-Mar: open Sat & Sun).



☐ Leave the town of Annweiler alona Altenstrasse, turnina left on to Trifelsstrasse and follow sians to Bura Trifels. Park below the Bura.

#### Burg Trifels

Rhineland-Palatinate; 76855

Perched on a narrow crag 984 ft (300 m) above Annweiler, Burg Trifels (Jan-Nov: open daily) is reached after a beautiful looping ascent through the forest. First mentioned in the 11th century, the castle was where the Salian emperors kept the imperial regalia of the Holy Roman Empire: Richard the Lionheart was briefly a prisoner here in 1193. The ruined castle was extensively restored between 1938 and 1942. Visitors can also explore two more castle ruins -Scharfenberg and Anebos – which crown neighboring crags.

Return to Annweiler on Trifelsstrasse, leaving Annweiler on Landauerstrasse. Reioin the B10 and then turn onto Weinstrasse to reach the village of Siebeldingen.

## Siebeldingen

Rhineland-Palatinate: 76833

The village of Siebeldingen lies on the Oueich river, which once formed France's northeast military frontier. Among the village's wine growers, the Ökonomierat Rebholz (open Mon-Fri: www.oekonomierat-rebholz.de) is the most distinguished, producing Grosses Gewächs wines - the German equivalent of the French premier cru.

☐ Follow the Deutsche Weinstrasse bevond Frankweiler and continue via Burrweiler to Hainfeld, Watch out for the sharp left turn in Hainfeld, Villa Ludwigshöhe is west of Edenkoben along Villastrasse.

#### B Edenkoben

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 67480

Edenkoben was Bavarian territory from 1816 until 1945. On the outskirts of the town, Bavarian King Ludwig I built his residence. Villa Ludwigshöhe (Jan-Nov: closed Mon), which was designed by Friedrich Wilhelm von Gärtner in the style of a Roman villa. It was built between 1846 and 1852

on an idvllic site between woods and vinevards and contains a gallery devoted to the German Impressionist painter Max Slevogt. It is also the venue for chamber music concerts (www.villamusica.de).

From the villa, return to Deutsche Weinstrasse, continuina north through Edenkoben to Maikammer.

#### Maikammer

Rhineland-Palatinate: 67487

With seeminaly every second building a Weinaut (winery), Maikammer is a Weinstrasse village par excellence. Grandiose 19th-century premises line the route from the village to its railway station; one of the finest buildings is home to Weingut August Ziegler (open Mon–Sat; www.auaust-ziealer.de). which has thrice been declared German Winemaker of the Year. Alongside Riesling and Pinot Noir, the estate also produces varieties of wine quite unusual for Germany, including Shiraz and Sauvignon Blanc.

St. Martin is marked from Maikammer along the side road.



#### St. Martin

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 67487

With a beautiful setting on the fringes of the Naturpark Pfälzer Wald (www. pfaelzerwald.de), a biosphere reserve. St. Martin is among the loveliest villages in the region. With plenty of surviving half-timbered cottages and noblemen's houses, it is also the starting point for a number of hiking trails into the Naturpark Pfälzer Wald: one popular route ascends to the summit of the 2.208-ft (673-m)

Kalmit, the highest hill in the district.

Return to Maikammer and turn north toward Hambach. At Hambach. turn left up Schlossstrasse to the Hambacher Schloss: the route is oneway. Continue on it, following signs to Hauptbahnhof (station) to Neustadt.

#### Neustadt an der Weinstrasse Rhineland-Palatinate: 67433

Neustadt is the most important urban center on the Deutsche Weinstrasse with a traffic-free historic core centered on the Marktplatz and its Gothic Stiftskirche and Baroque town hall. the Rathaus. The town's most famous sight is the **Hambacher Schloss** (open daily), a hilltop castle to the south. famous for the Hambacher Fest of 1832, during which a patriotic crowd hoisted the black-red-gold colors of German unity in one of the founding acts of German democracy.

Leave Neustadt an der Weinstrasse alona Karl-Helffenrich-Strasse, turn riaht on to Maximilianstrasse, takina Gimmeldinger Strasse, the middle of three roads, to reach Gimmeldingen. The village center is a one-way system.

## Gimmeldingen

#### Rhineland-Palatinate; 67435

The pretty wine growing village of Gimmeldingen lies on the edge of the Naturpark Pfälzer Wald and is the starting point for several hiking trails. The village is famous for its almond blossom, celebrated with an annual spring festival, the Mandelblütenfest.

Continue along Meerspinnstrasse to reach Deidesheim.

#### Deidesheim

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 67146

Designer jewelery jostles for attention next to a butcher selling the local delicacy, Saumagen, on Deidesheim's



Marktplatz. The juxtaposition of rustic authenticity and metropolitan chic makes this one of the most intriquing villages on the Weinstrasse The Rathaus houses the Museum für Weinkulture (museum of viticulture) (open Wed-Sun: Jan & Feb: closed). Local wine growers include Reichsrat von Buhl (open daily), a renowned producer of Sekt (sparkling wine).

Continue on the side road along the B271 marked to Wachenheim.

#### Wachenheim

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 67157

The impressive ruins of the 12th-century castle of Wachtenburg dominate Wachenheim. Constructed under the authority of Konrad von Hohenstaufen, half-brother of Emperor Frederick Barbarossa (1122-90), it was besieged in the 15th century, damaged in the Peasants' War of 1524-25, and finally blown up by French troops in 1689. Known as the "Balcony of the Pfalz" for the superb views it offers over the Rhine Valley. the castle ruins are a popular destination for hikers and are floodlit to spectacular effect at night.

Continue on the side road to Bad Dürkheim. Follow sians to Kurpark.

#### **15** Bad Dürkheim

#### Rhineland-Palatinate; 67098

The pleasant spa town of Bad Dürkheim has a neat, traffic-free core fringing the **Kurpark**, a grassy park where the 108-ft (33-m) long **Gradierwerk** – a giant outdoor saline air purifier – is one of the largest of its kind in Germany. Dating from 1847, it is the sole survivor of its similar structures in the town. To the west of the town center, on Luitpoldweg, are the ruins of the Romanesque Benedictine abbey of **Kloster Limburg** (open daily).

☐ Leave Bad Dürkheim along the B271 to Ungstein, then take the side road marked for Freinsheim.

#### 16 Freinsheim

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 67251

Snug behind its surviving medieval walls, Freinsheim is a historic gem with a perfectly preserved old town focused on the diminutive yet dignified 18th-century **Rathaus**. Visitors can take a walk around the inner circuit of the town's walls and discover houses built into them in

a picturesque fashion. A gastronomic hotspot, Freinsheim also boasts a number of interesting restaurants.

Return to Ungstein, then turn right along the B271 to Bockenheim.

#### Saumagen

Saumagen – stuffed pig's stomach is the Pfalz's great regional speciality. Like the Scottish dish haggis, it delights some and intimidates others; as with haggis, the stuffing is consumed, not the stomach itself. In the case of Saumagen, the filling is prepared with a mixture of potatoes, carrots, and pork, flavored with marjoram, and often served sliced, and seared.

#### Bockenheim

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 67278

Situated beside a lake, the village of Bockenheim is supposedly built in the style of a Roman fort. The Deutsche Weinstrasse ends at Bockenheim, where the **Haus der Deutschen Weinstrasse**, or House of the German Wine Route, acts as the northern counterpart



to the **Deutsches Weintor** at the southern end of the route. The building spans the road and contains a restaurant and tourist information office

Continue along the B271 Weinstrasse to Flörsheim, turning right toward Westhofen.

#### Westhofen

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 67593

Enjoying a pretty setting, the vinevards surrounding the village of Westhofen are dotted with stone huts. These are characteristic of Rheinhessen's wine-arowing country. and were originally built by vineyard workers to provide shelter during bad weather. Weingut Wittmann (Mainzer Strasse 19: 06244 90 50 36: www. weingutwittmann.de; open Mon-Fri, by appointment) produces top-notch dry Rieslings using organic methods.

□ Leave Westhofen along Mainzer Strasse, heading toward Mainz.

#### Mainz

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 55116

The capital of Rheinland-Pfalz, Mainz (see pp154-55) is dominated by the late Romanesque Kaiserdom (open daily). The magnificence of this imperial cathedral reflects the importance of the Prince-Bishops of Mainz, who were Flectors of the Holv Roman Empire. The cathedral was burned down the day before its consecration in 1009 and again in 1081. It was rebuilt in the first quarter of the 12th century. Mainz was also the birthplace of printing pioneer Johannes Gutenberg. Exhibits in the Gutenberg-Museum (closed Mon) include a priceless Gutenberg Bible printed in Mainz in 1455.

Leave Mainz alona Rheinstrasse. following signs to Laubenheim. At Laubenheim continue through Rodenheim to Nackenheim.

# 20 Nackenheim

Rhineland-Palatinate; 55299

Nackenheim is closely associated with the German playwright Carl Zuckmayer, who was born here in 1896. Nestled between vine-covered slopes and the Rhine, the village has a long history of producing wine. The long-established Weingut Gunderloch (Carl-Gunderloch-Platz 1.



06135 23 41: www.aunderloch.de: open Mon-Sat) produces traditional sweet wines of exceptional quality and some fine dry Rieslings.

☐ Leave Nackenheim on the Wormser Strasse, which joins the B9. Continue on the B9 to Nierstein, then turn left on to Pestalozzistrasse to the parking lot.

#### Mierstein

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 55283

Shuttered half-timbered houses and Strausswirtschaften – temporary wine taverns run by the wine growers – characterize Nierstein. The village is famed for its Riesling and is focused on its central Marktplatz Visitors can follow the signs on a 14-km (8-miles) walk, the **Drei Türme Wanderweg** or Three Towers Walk (www.nierstein.de). which heads up into the vineyards of the **Roter Hang** above the village for views over the Rhine and the surrounding countryside.

☐ Continue south on the B9 to Oppenheim, then turn right on to Mainzstrasse and follow sians to Zentral Park-Platz to park.

#### Discovering German Wines

Wine labels reveal much about the style and quality of German wine. Dry wines are labeled Trocken, semidry or slightly sweet wines are Halbtrocken, and sweet wines are Lieblich, Kabinett refers to a wine made with fully-ripened grapes; Spätlese means wine made from late-picked grapes, while Auslese, Beerenauslese, Eiswein, and Trockenbeerenauslese are made with grapes picked progressively later, producing intense flavor and longevity. Many, though not all, quality wines display the symbol of the VDP (Verband Deutscher Prädikatswein), whose members include several of the nation's top wine growers.

# ② Oppenheim

Rhineland-Palatinate; 55276

A ruined castle and a magnificent Gothic church are powerful reminders of Oppenheim's medieval hevday. Raised to the status of a Free City of the Holy Roman Empire in 1225, it lost its independence in the following century and was leveled by French troops during the War of the Palatine Succession (1688–97). This winegrowing village, on a pretty, sunny site overlooking the Rhine, also has an intriguing underground labyrinth to explore.

#### A one-hour walking tour

Park at the Zentralparkplatz.

on the western edge of the Altstadt, before heading uphill along Gaustrasse and Burgstrasse.

At the top of Burgstrasse ascend the Schlangenweg path to reach Landskron 1. a ruined imperial castle. At the far end of the castle. metal steps lead into a vinevard. Take the path through it, beyond the gate in the town wall at the far end. Cross the road to the Landskronhalle. The Burgrestaurant Landskrone here is a good place for a snack. Follow the road downhill to the Ruprechtsturm 2, a mockmedieval folly built in 1903 on the site of a medieval tower destroyed during the French occupation. Continue downhill to Geschlechterbrunnen, a Renaissance well dating from 1546, and the arched entrance to the churchyard

turning right to reach the Michaelskapelle 3. a 13thcentury Gothic chapel. In the basement is the macabre Beinhaus (ossuary) where the bones of 20,000 citizens of Oppenheim who died between 1400 and 1750 lie neatly stacked. Further

along the north wall is the Lapidarium, with gargovles and Gothic carvings. Continue around the outside of the Katharinenkirche (4) (open daily), a Protestant parish church, to enter on the south side. Construction began in 1225 in the Romanesque style, but most of what exists today is Gothic, including the 14th-century Rose of Oppenheim window. From the south side of the churchyard, go down the steps to Merianstrasse to the Oppenheimer Stadtmuseum (5) (open daily), with displays on local history, and the tourist information office



Where to Stay: inexpensive, under €70; moderate, €70–€150; expensive, over €150

(www.stadt-oppenheim.de), which organizes tours of the Oppenheimer Kellerlabyrinth (tours Sat. Sun & public hols), an extensive subterranean network of cellars and passageways. Merianstrasse leads onto the central Marktplatz 6, dominated by the 17th-century Rathaus Cross the square to reach the Catholic church of St. Bartholomäus, once part of a now-vanished Franciscan monastery Follow Kirchstrasse to Wormserstrasse to the **Deutsches Weinbaumuseum** (7) (Anr-Oct: closed Mon), with exhibits on Germany's winemaking history. Walk back up Wormserstrasse and turn left into Rathofstrasse, following the street around to the Rathofkapelle (8) a tiny chapel which is now a restaurant. Beyond it, a plaque commemorates Oppenheim's Jewish community on the site of a synagogue destroyed on "Kristallnacht" in an anti-Jew attack in 1938 in Nazi Germany. At the end of the Rathofstrasse, turn left into Krämerstrasse, which ends at the Gautor, a surviving gate of the town walls, built in 1566. Exit through the gate to return to the parking lot.

☐ Leave Oppenheim along the B9/ Rheinstrasse to Guntersblum, turn right, and continue through Alsheim and Osthofen to Worms

#### Worms

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 67547

One of Germany's oldest cities, Worms is closely associated with Protestant reformer Martin Luther and the Legend of the Nibelungen from Germanic mythology. It boasts a magnificent 12th-century cathedral, the **Dom St. Peter** (open daily) and an ancient Jewish cemetery, Heiliger Sand (open daily), where the oldest gravestone dates from 1076.

Follow Ludwigstrasse to the B9, then follow signs for Spever, At Spever follow signs for Zentrum along the B39.



#### Spever

#### Rhineland-Palatinate: 67346

The smallest of Pfalz's three great cathedral cities is also the most perfectly preserved, with a broad main street Maximilianstrasse which runs west from the Kaiserdom (open daily). One of the finest surviving examples of Romanesque architecture in Europe, the imperial cathedral is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

#### Jews of the Rhineland

Jewish culture was established in the region in the 10th century with settlements in Speyer, Worms, and Mainz. The cities had a major influence on the development of Ashkenazi Jewish culture, since it was here in the early Middle Ages that the Yiddish language emerged as an offshoot of the Middle High German.



# Franconia of the Prince-Bishops

For many centuries, Franconia's Prince-Bishops held both spiritual and political power in this region. Drawn from the ranks of the nobility, they left a lasting cultural legacy in this fascinating corner of northern Bavaria (Bayern), which ranges from Bamberg's well-preserved historic core to the splendid Baroque and Gothic masterpieces throughout the region. Amidst the palaces and churches are traditional *Weinstuben* and old pubs where one can enjoy Franconia's distinctive food, wine, and beer. Away from the cities, the smaller towns and villages often have a rustic, lost-in-time charm. This drive takes visitors through lovely land-scapes ranging from the valley of the meandering Main river to the startling geology of Fränkische Schweiz and the unspoiled rural idvll of Naturpark Steigerwald.

#### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish: Bayreuth to Aschaffenburg

Number of days: 5 days allowing a day to explore Bamberg.

Distance: 273 miles (440 km)

Road conditions: Roads are generally well paved and marked and have gentle inclines. Snow and ice can be a problem in winter.

When to go: The region is at its best from May to October, when the weather is most agreeable. In some smaller villages, hotels and museums are closed in January or February

**Opening times:** Shops are generally open from 9am to 8pm, while sights of interest are open from 9am to 6pm

#### Bavreuth Bavaria: 95444

The city of Bayreuth came into its own in the early 18th century. when it was transformed into a fine stone-built capital for Margravine Wilhelmine (1709-58), sister of Frederick the Great of Prussia, Her residence, the Neues Schloss (Apr-Sept: open daily: Oct–Mar: closed Mon). was built by Joseph Saint-Pierre. The elongated three-story palace combines Classical lines with a rustic around floor

Another highlight of the city is the magnificent Baroque opera house, the ornate Markgräfliches Opernhaus (open daily). Built in the 1740s, it has an interior designed by Giuseppe Galli Bibiena, who came from a famous Bolognese family of theater architects, and his son Carlo. The city is associated with composer Richard

Wagner (1813–83), who took up residence here in 1872. His home Villa Wahnfried (open daily), is on the northeastern side of Neues Schloss and is now a museum. In the villa's garden are the tombs of Wagner and his wife, Cosima, the daughter of Franz Liszt. Each summer Bayreuth hosts the Wagner festival, the Bayreuther Festspiele, held in the Festspielhaus, the imposing but spartan theater built between 1872 and 1875 to a design by Gottfried Semper.

Visitors to Bayreuth can also take a cure at the **Lohengrin Therme** (www. Iohengrin-therme de) a thermal spa

Follow signs to Fränkische Schweiz/ Hollfeld, Frlanger Strasse, later marked as B22, then turn left on to the road for Pottenstein

#### Pottenstein Ravaria: 91278

Four valleys meet at Pottenstein. vet the village feels almost walled in by the high crags surrounding it. One such rock is topped by the region's oldest castle. Burg Pottenstein (Easter: open daily: Apr: open Sat & Sun: Mav-Oct: closed Mon); below around are the Teufelshöhle Caves (Easter-Oct: open daily; Nov–Easter: open Tue, Sat & Sun). Besides visiting these sights, visitors can also enjoy the snowfree summer toboggan run (www. sommerrodelbahnen-pottenstein.de) here.

Head west from Pottenstein alona the B470/Forchheimer Strasse to reach the village of Tüchersfeld.





#### Tüchersfeld Bavaria: 91278

Looking as though its houses have been dropped at random among rocky pinnacles, tiny Tüchersfeld is even more improbably scenic than its bigger neighbor. Pottenstein. The village is home to the **Fränkische** 

Schweiz Museum (Apr–Nov: closed Mon: Dec-Mar: open Sun), which has peasant costumes, furniture, arts and crafts, and an 18th-century synagogue alongside displays on the region's geology and archaeology.

At the end of Tüchersfeld turn left to Unterailsfeld. In Unterailsfeld. turn right on to Oberailsfeld Strasse to Oberailsfeld. Take Burgenstrasse driving through the village of Oberailsfeld; follow the brown signs for Bura Rabenstein.

#### Burg Rabenstein Bavaria: 95491

Perched on a dramatic crag overlooking the Ailsbach Valley and with its oldest parts dating from the 12th century, the castle of Rabenstein (quided tours: Apr-Oct: Tue-Sun; Nov-Mar: Sat & Sun) looks every inch the impregnable medieval fortress, though much of it was ruined during the Thirty Years' War (1618-48). There are regular interesting

falconry displays (Apr-Oct: Tue-Sun) here. The Sophienhöhle Caves (auided tours: Apr-Oct:

Tue-Sun), among the most beautiful showcaves in Germany, are just a tenminute walk away.

☐ Take the B470 westward toward Forchheim. Parkina is available in the lot on Pradeplatz.

#### Crags, Castles, and Caves

The Franconian Switzerland (Fränkische Schweiz) has long been one of Germany's most popular regions for its startling, craggy natural beauty and dramatic castles and pretty villages, as well as for the opportunities it offers for outdoor activities, from cycling and hiking to rock climbing and canoeing. The region's limestone geology ensures the natural wonders continue underground in the form of strikingly beautiful cave systems. some of which can be visited.

#### Forchheim Bavaria: 91301

With a historic core centerd on the tall onion-domed tower of Martinskirche and a 15thcentury half-timbered Rathaus, this lively small town, with timberframed houses, is well worth exploring. It was the second seat of the Bamberg Prince-Bishops in the Middle Ages. Their palace, the Kaiserpfalz, has precious late-Gothic frescoes and is now the Pfalzmuseum (Mav–Oct: closed Mon, Nov-Apr: open Wed, Thu & Sun), with sections devoted to local history, archaeology, and folk costume.

> Leave Forchheim along Bamberger Strasse, following yellow signs for Bamberg. This joins the B22. At Bambera,

# 6 Bamberg

Ravaria: 96047

For centuries the seat of an independent Prince-Bishopric within the Holy Roman Empire, Bamberg has survived the turmoil of Germany's history unscathed, with an exceptionally well-preserved historic core that was added to UNESCO's list of World Heritage Sites in 1993. The city center is divided into three parts by the Main-Danube canal and the Regnitz river, but most of the major sights are in the hilly Bergstadt to the west of the river, dominated by a splendid four-spired cathedral. This walk explores the Bergstadt and the riverside areas of Bamberg.

Bamberg

#### A two-hour walking tour

From the parking lot, walk to the tourist office, where visitors can pick up the key to the tower of

Schloss Geyerswörth (1) (open Mon–Fri), which lies across the road from the office. There are fine views

over Bamberg from the top of this 16th-century Prince-Bishop's residence. Afterward, cross the river by the wooden footbridge. Then turn left into Schranne, right into Balthasargässchen, then left again to reach Judenstrasse, a street of historic townhouses, including the **Böttingerha** 

including the **Böttingerhaus** ②, built for the privy councillor Ignaz Tobias Böttinger between 1707 and 1713. Take the left fork into Concordiastrasse to reach another of Böttinger's residences, Concordia, which dates from 1722. Return to Judenstrasse. Thirsty walkers can

stop at Klosterbräu (open daily) on the right, which was once the Prince-Bishops' brewery.

At the end of Judenstrasse, turn left to head up Untere Kaulberg to reach the 14th-century **Pfarrkirche** 

reach the 14th-century **Pfarrkirche zu Unsere Lieben Frau** ③. The parish

church of Our Dear Lady has a lovely tabernacle in the ambulatory and Tintoretto's Assumption just by the door. Cross the busy road in front of the church, descending the steps labeled Dom to reach Hinterer Bach. Follow this curving cobbled lane uphill, admiring the 17th-century Alter Ebracher







Bavarian Dynasty, whose architectural influence reached as far as Prague. A guided tour goes through the richly decorated state rooms, but visitors are free to admire the German medieval and Baroque paintings in the palace gallery at leisure. Don't miss the lovely rose garden behind the palace, with its pretty Baroque café (open summer) and excellent views over the old city.

Leave Domplatz along Obere Karolinenstrasse On the corner of Domstrasse stands the Missionshaus St. Heinrich (7), an elegant mansion that was once the Bamberg residence of Bavreuth's Margraves, Turn right down Michaelsberger Strasse, following the street uphill to the former Benedictine monsatery of Kirche St. Michael (8), whose church (open daily) was rebuilt in the late-Gothic style after a fire in 1610. The Baroque monastery buildings contain a brewery museum, the Fränkisches Brauereimuseum (open Wed-Sun). On leaving the museum, stop by the garden behind the monastery. Next return to the Aufsess Strasse which becomes Flisabethen Strasse to reach the river. On the opposite bank is a picturesque huddle of fishermen's cottages known as **Klein** Venedig (9), or Little Venice. Turn back up Elisabethen Strasse and left into Obere Sandstrasse, which leads to Dominkanerstrasse. Bear right into Herrenstrasse then left to the Obere Brücke, a bridge that passes through the Altes Rathaus (10), set on a mid-river island. The old town hall houses the Sammlung Ludwig (closed Mon) collection of Strasbourg and Meissen porcelain, Retrace the route, turn left on to Geverswörthplatz. and then left again on to the wooden footbridge to the parking lot.

■ Leave the town of Bamberg along the B4/Hallstädter Strasse. At Breitengüssbach, follow signs to Bad Staffelstein via Zapfendorf and Ebensfeld to Grundfeld. At Grundfeld, follow the road signs to Vierzehnheiliaen.

#### **Bishops and Empire**

Formed from the eastern part of Charlemagne's empire in the 9th century and dissolved in 1806, the Holy Roman Empire was a loose alliance of states under the aegis of an emperor chosen by *Kurfürsten* (electors), though in practice the Habsburgs dominated. Bamberg and Würzburg were independent Prince-Bishoprics of the empire in which the bishops wielded temporal and spiritual power. Aschaffenburg was the second seat of the archbishops of Mainz, since the city dominated the largest of their territories.

# Vierzehnheiligen

A worthwhile excursion from Bamberg, Vierzehnheiligen is best known for its splendid pilgrimage church, **Basilika Vierzehnheiligen** (open daily), a masterpiece of southern German Baroque and Rococo styles. Designed by the Franconian architect Balthasar Neumann, it was built between 1743 and 1772 at the site where a shepherd had a vision of a crying child accompanied by the Holy Helpers – the Vierzehnheiligen – or 14 saints of intercession of the church's name

Return to Bamberg and take
Unterer Kaulberg and Würzburger
Strasse. Follow the yellow signs for
Würzburg to reach the B22 and
then signs to Pommersfelden and
Schloss Weissenstein.

#### Schloss Weissenstein Bavaria: 96178

The Prince-Bishops of both Bambera and Würzburg were members of the Schönborn Dynasty, and the familiy's wealth and power are reflected in the splendor of their family seat. Schloss

Weissenstein (Apr-Oct: open daily). The design was a collaboration between the Ramberg court architect Johann Dientzenhofer and the celebrated

Viennese Baroque master Johann Lukas von Hildebrandt. The palace was completed in 1718 and is notable for the ceremonial Treppenhaus (staircase) and its collection of Old Masters

Return to the B22, following signs for Steppach and Burgebrach, and continue alona it to Ebrach.



Ebrach sits at the heart of the idyllic forested Naturpark Steigerwald (www.steigerwald.org), offering scope for relaxing country walks. The village is dominated by the buildings of a former Cistercian abbey. The cathedral-like Klosterkirche (mid-Apr-Oct: open daily) is an important work of the early Gothic period and has a beautiful rose window; the Baroque abbey buildings now house a prison, but the splendid Treppenhaus and Kaisersaal (imperial hall) can still be visited (Apr-Oct: open daily). Ebrach is an ideal base for exploring Naturpark Steigerwald.

the unspoiled upland landscape which is notable for its biodiversity.

☐ Continue west along the B22 to Neuses am Sand, where there is a sian for a left turn that leads to Prichsenstadt



With a well-preserved set of defensive walls and towers rising above vine-

vards to shelter an intact historic core. tiny Prichsenstadt is a gem, its appearance to this day reflecting the urban forms of the Middle Ages. The town has a night-

watchman who conducts guided tours (Sat & Sun) that can be booked from all hotels. Wine aside. Prichsenstadt is also known for its asparagus and strawberries.

Leave Prichsenstadt on the road to Volkach from the west gate of the old town.

#### Wolkach Bavaria: 97332

With two lofty 13th-century town gates, a fine 16th-century Rathaus, and numerous Winzer (wine growers), Volkach is the attractive "capital" of the Mainschleife. Historic houses here include the splendid Baroque Schelfenhaus and Renaissance Echterhof. A short walk from the town is the late-Gothic pilgrimage church of Maria im Weingarten (Mar–Nov: open daily). Idyllically situated amid vinevards to the

northwest of Volkach, this church has a Madonna by the Würzburg sculptor Tilman Riemenschneider.

Follow Brückenstrasse to reach the bridge over the Main. then turn left after the bridge, on to Escherndorfer Strasse to reach the village of Dettelbach.

#### Dettelbach

#### Ravaria: 97337

Dettelhach is another handsome village behind intact defensive walls. Tucked between the medieval Rathaus and the eccentric-looking parish church is **KuK** (open daily) a modern cultural center where visitors can sample local wines and learn about Dettelbach's religious tradition. The pilgrimage church of Maria im Sand lies east of the village center. Visitors should not leave Dettelbach without sampling the delicious local Muskazinen – hard-haked hiscuits similar to Italian hiscotti

Follow the road leading southward alona the Main to Kitzinaen. In Kitzingen, follow signs for Ochsenfurt, then after the railroad bridge for Sulzfeld and Markthreit

The picturesque wine-growing village of Sulzfeld boasts a remarkably complete medieval town wall dating from the 15th and 16th centuries. With 21 towers, it creates a convincing



magically to life. The village's other main claim to fame is as the birthplace of the Meterbratwurst – a giant sausage sold by length (half-meter or meter).

☐ Take the An der Staatsstrasse, which becomes Sulzfelder Strasse to Segnitz, where a sign for a left turn brings drivers to the bridge to Markthreit

#### The Mainschleife

The Mainschleife is a loon-like meander of the Main river east of Würzburg at a point where the landscape has a particularly gentle beauty, framed by low, vine-covered hillsides and dotted with attractive small villages. The popular local explanation for the Main river's eccentric course at this point is that it is here the river feels most at home. One excellent way to enjoy the area's beauty is by bicvcle (Fahrradverleih "Gazelle." Am Bach 1; 09381 71 57 31) on the annual car-free Sunday in early May. #### Bavaria: 97340

Marktbreit was once a significant center for trade between the Main and the Danube With a splendid gabled Renaissance Rathaus of chateau-like proportions and a number of imposing merchants' houses this town has an architectural heritage that outshines its Sculpture in Würzburg's relatively modest presentday importance. It was the birthplace of the psychiatrist and

neuropathologist Alois Alzheimer (1864-1915), after whom the degenerative brain disease is named.

☐ Take Ochsenfurter Strasse, following signs for Stadtmitte (city center) to Ochsenfurt's old town.

#### (B) Ochsenfurt Bavaria: 97199

Though its outskirts are somewhat disfigured by the sugar works for which it is known. Ochsenfurt preserves a wonderful historic Altstadt (old town) behind high medieval walls. The focal point is the 16thcentury Rathaus, with a clock upon which miniature figures perform each hour The 14th-15th-century Stadtnfarrkirche St. Andreas

St. Andreas's church contains a statue of St. Nicholas by sculptor Tilman Riemenschneider (1460–1531), while alongside the wall is the Palatium the seat of the Würzburg cathedral chapter between 1334 and 1810

magnificent Residenz

#### Franconian Wine

Würzburg's traditional Weinstuben (wine bars) are excellent places to try Franconia's dry white wines. which are as distinctive as the stubby Bocksbeutel in which they are bottled. The climate encourages the use of earlier-ripening grape varieties, with Silvaner being the best known; Müller-Thurgau, also known as Rivaner, and Bacchus are also popular as well. Red wines are grown in the western part of the region, close to Aschaffenburg.

# Wertheim

#### Baden-Württemberg: 97877

Wertheim has a pretty Altstadt on a wedge of land at the confluence of the Tauber and Main rivers. The town is overlooked by **Bura Wertheim** (open daily), a castle that has been a ruin since the Thirty Years' War. Today. Wertheim is known above all for its shops, in particular at Wertheim Village (open Mon-Sat), a shopping center just east of town.

Continue along the south bank of the Main to reach Miltenberg.

# Miltenberg am Main Bavaria: 63897

Miltenberg am Main stands on a tight bend in the Main river and until 1803, was part of the territories of the Mainz Prince-Bishops. The focal point of the Altstadt here is the Marktplatz (marketplace). fringed by half-timbered houses and with a Renaissance fountain. the Marktbrunnen, which dates from 1583. The statue in the center depicts Justice.

Cross the Main and then follow Brückenstrasse to reach Klingenberg.

## Mingenberg Bavaria: 63911

Klingenberg lies at the foot of steep slopes on the Fränkische Rotwein Wanderweg, a footpath through the red wine country of Lower Franconia (Unterfranken) In summer the ruin of the castle of **Clingenburg** high above the village is the venue for the Clinaenbura Festspiele (www. clinaenbura-festspiele.de). The festival features open-air operas and plays.

Follow the road to Aschaffenbura.

# Aschaffenburg

# Bavaria: 63739

Aschaffenburg is dominated by the Renaissance Schloss Johannisburg (Apr-Sept: open daily, Oct-Mar: closed Mon), built for the Mainz Prince-Bishops between 1605 and 1614. Inside, visitors can see the princely apartments and admire a selection of Old Masters as well as the world's largest collection of cork architectural models. Overlooking the Main nearby is the **Pompejanum** (Apr-Oct: closed Mon), a recreation of a Roman villa built for the Bavarian King Ludwig I between 1840 and 1848.




## Wine and dine

# **Jurassic Crags and Feudal Fiefdoms**

Jurassic geology adds drama to the gentle landscapes of Bavaria's Naturpark Altmühltal, one of Germany's largest nature reserves. Castle-topped crags stand sentinel over the valley of the placid Altmühl river that flows east to join the Main-Donau canal and the Danube. Along the way, there are small towns of great historic and architectural interest, while the Danube has produced a landscape of extraordinary loveliness in the narrow gorge known as the Donaudurchbruch. Gourmands will enjoy the hearty regional fare served in rustic surroundings, while the Hallertau district to the south of Ingolstadt and Kelheim is the world's largest hop-growing region, supplying not only Munich's internationally renowned brands but also local brewers, whose beers are worth sampling.

# 1 Ingolstadt

Located on the Danube, bustling Ingolstadt was once a formidable fortress and, in the Middle Ages, capital of the Duchy of Bayern-Ingolstadt. The town houses many important historic buildings, including the whitewashed Gothic **Neues Schloss** (closed Mon), home to Germany's oldest military museum; the brick-built

Liebfrauenmünster (open daily), the largest late-Gothic hall church in Bavaria, with seven storys of attics in its roof; and the Baroque church, Kirche Maria de Victoria, a masterpiece by the renowned Asam brothers of Munich

■ Leaving Ingolstadt, follow the B13/Neuburgerstrasse west, bearing left 5 miles (8 km) west of the town to Neuburg an der Donau.

# Neuburg an der Donau

Bavaria: 86633

With a splendid Renaissance Schloss overlooking the Danube and a compact, beautiful old town, this historic Residenzstadt, or feudal seat, has architectural glories that outstrip its modest present-day status. From 1505, it was the capital of the independent principality of Pfalz-Neuburg for 300 years. Be sure to sample the Schrobenhausen asparagus, grown in the late spring in the countryside to the south.

#### A two-hour walking tour

Park the car on Luitpoldstrasse at the foot of the Obere Altstadt (upper town), and ascend the broad stone steps to pick up a free map from the tourist office on Ottheinrichplatz. Turn right at the **Stadttheater** ①, a former ducal grain warehouse,

following Residenzstrasse to reach the main portal of **Schloss Neuburg** ②. This magnificent Renaissance palace was built between 1530 and 1545 for Ottheinrich, the first Count Palatinate of Neuburg. Following a makeover, it became one of the earliest Baroque palaces in Germany.



Visit the Schlosskapelle (3) (open daily). a little further to the right, before entering the palace. The first purposebuilt Protestant church in Bayaria, it is decorated with frescoes. The arcaded inner courtyard, or Schlosshof, boasts faded murals depicting scenes from the Old Testament Created by Hans Schroer sometime after 1555, the murals remained long buried beneath a coat of paint and were only rediscovered in the 1960s. The palace houses the Schlossmuseum (closed Mon), whose varied exhibits include the Bayarian state collection. of Flemish Baroque painting, with

works by Rubens and Jacob Jordaens Inside the Schloss the grandest room is the Renaissance Rittersaal, or Knights' Hall, in the north wing, with a heavy wooden ceiling and stout stone columns. Return to the palace entrance and stop for refreshments at the

Vivat 4), a wine bar opposite, then ascend the gentle slope of Amalienstrasse. which is lined with townhouses from the 16th-18th centuries. Halfway along

Amalienstrasse is Karlsplatz, around which Neuburg's principal civic buildings are ranged. These include the late-Renaissance Hofkirche Unsere Liebe Frau (Court Church of Our Dear Lady), the Rathaus (5) or town hall a Renaissance palazzo built by Josef Heintz and Alexander Pasqualini between 1603 and 1609 - and the Rococo **Provinzialbibliothek** (6) or provincial library (quided tours on Wed). Dating from 1731, it has a Baroque hall on its upper floor. The neighboring Weveldhaus (7) is a fine example of a nobleman's townhouse. Built in 1517 and raised by one story in 1713. it has graceful stucco ceilings and houses the Stadtmuseum (Mar-Dec: closed Mon) with well-presented displays on the town's history. Continue along Amalienstrasse to reach the **Obere Tor (8)**, a Renaissance gateway whose terracotta-colored gable marks the western exit from the Obere Altstadt. Decorated with Neuburg's heraldic crest, it depicts

Ottheinrich and his brother, Philipp.

Pass through the gate to Wolfgang-



Wilhelm-Platz and the Hützeldörr the southern portion of the garden.

> Return to the Obere Tor pass through the gate and turn right into Herrenstrasse (9). which has some fine historic houses. It leads to the Luitpoldstrasse parking lot via Landschaftsstrasse.

From Luitpoldstrasse. head north over Elisenbrucke, followina sians for Eichstätt. After a few kilometers, turn left at the sian for Beraen.

#### Reformation and Counter-Reformation

Neuburg's pragmatic rulers straddled the religious divisions of 16th- and 17th-century Germany, Ottheinrich condemned Lutheranism in 1522 but converted in 1542; a later Count Palatinate, Wolfgang Wilhelm (1578-1653), converted back to Catholicism. to inherit his mother's estate

# Bergen

#### Bavaria: 86633

Nestled in the rolling countryside between the Danube and Altmühl. this sleepy village is worth a detour to see the pilgrimage church of Heilig Kreuz, whose elegant white-and-gold Baroque interior by the Eichstätt court architect Giovanni Domenico Barbieri dates from 1756. Be sure to visit the Romanesque crypt; water from the well in the north aisle was once believed to have healing properties.

Return to the T-iunction, then turn left and head to Nassenfels. Take Eichstätter Strasse, pass Adelschlag to get on to the B13, following signs to Eichstätt.

# 4 Eichstätt

#### Bavaria: 85072

The university town of Eichstätt, an independent Catholic bishopric for centuries, retains the feel of a miniature capital city. The **Dom** is remarkable for its Gothic Pappenheim altar, but Baroque architecture transformed the town after the Thirty Years' War. This is most apparent in the **Residenzplatz**, which is dominated by the bishops' palace. High above the town, the castle of **Willibaldsburg** houses the **Jura Museum** (closed Moo) with Jurassic-era

Explore Eichstatt's dinosaur trails by picking up a map from the tourist office to follow the Fossilienpfad or fossil path, which leads to the fossil quarry of Blumenberg. Afterward, ask at the tourist office for information about visiting the town's artist's studios and crafts workshops.

fossils from the surrounding district.

☐ Take the B13/ Weissenburger Strasse, turn left on to Rebdorfer Strasse after the bridge at the sign for Solnhofen. Follow the road along the Altmühl Valley to the Zwölf Apostel. Continue past it to the parking lot just before Solnhofen village.



# **5** The Zwölf Apostel

# Bavaria; 91807

The dolomite outcrops known as the Zwölf Apostel (Twelve Apostles) at Solnhofen are among the most impressive of the Altmühl Vallev's Jurassic landforms. Easily reached along the Panoramaweg footpath from the parking lot west of the cliffs. this site is a nature reserve. The 124-mile (200-km) Altmühltal Panoramaweg hiking trail (NATOUR; Gänswirtshaus 12; www.natouraltmuehltal.de) is a relaxing way of discovering the valley's scenery. The area southwest of Solnhofen has vielded many of the region's most outstanding fossils, while to the east, at Dollnstein. canoes can be rented on the Altmühl (www.kanuvermietuna-altmuehltal.de).

Continue north to Pappenheim.

#### **Fascinating Geology**

Solnhofen's fossils were formed in a salty lagoon on the edge of the sea. The animals that died in the lagoon were well preserved due to the lack of oxygen in the water. Among the specimens found are those of the earliest known bird, archaeopteryx.

# Pappenheim Ravaria: 91788

With its picturesque setting and historic architecture, Pappenheim is one of the most attractive small towns in the region. Impressive 18th- and 19th-century houses line the main street Deisingerstrasse where the merchant's house at No. 16 has an inscription giving the date of its construction as the year 5608, according to the Jewish calendar. In the Middle Ages. Pappenheim was the seat of the Holy Roman Empire's field marshal, but today there is nothing warlike about this sleepy, ruritanian town. It is dominated by a romantic ruined castle (open daily) that hosts one of the region's most atmospheric Christmas markets, Pappenheim also boasts two stately piles – the festive-looking Renaissance Altes Schloss, or old palace, and the Neo-Classical new palace, or Neues Schloss, built between 1819 and 1820 by Bavarian court architect. Leo von Klenze

Return to Eichstätt via Solnhofen. and enter the town on the B13. Turn left at the roundabout following signs for Kinding and Beilngries.

## **Romans and Bavarians**

The Limes – the frontier between the Roman Empire and the Germanic tribes – passed through the Altmühl region. A museum (Apr–Oct: open daily; Nov–Mar: open Sat & Sun) at Kipfenberg Castle. between Eichstätt and Beilngries, tells both sides of the story.



# Beilnaries

## Bavaria: 92339

Children and adults alike will be charmed by the magical old toys and dolls at Beilngries's Spielzeug and Figuren Museum (Apr-Oct: open Mon-Sat pm & Sun: Nov-Mar: open Wed, Sat & Sun pm). Take a stroll around the picturesque Innerer Graben street in the old town, which reveals the tov-town dimensions of the medieval fortifications, complete with nine of the original twelve 15th-century towers. The town also has a number of charming old inns, making it a good base for exploring this part of the Altmühl Valley.

☐ Take the Kelheimer Strasse/B299. then turn left following signs for Dietfurt/Kelheim. Continue bevond Dietfurt along the the north bank of the Main-Donau canal to Prunn, At Prunn, turn left to aet on to a side road, which ascends to the castle parking lot.

# 8 Burg Prunn

#### Bavaria: 93339

Its gravity-defying site aton a crag makes the medieval castle of Prunn (winter: closed Mon) perhaps the most photogenic of the Altmühltal's fortresses. In the Middle Ages, under the Frauenberg knights of Haag, it was an important cultural center: fragments of frescoes survive from this period. Later, the castle passed to the Jesuits, who were responsible for the rich stuccowork in its chapel The views from the castle, up the Altmühl Valley along the Main-Donau canal, are spectacular. Opposite the castle gates is a restaurant and café. the Burgschenke Schloss Prunn, serving snacks and cakes as well as full meals.

From the parking lot, return to Prunn village, turn left and then continue to Kelheim. At Kelheim turn right over the bridge along Alleestrasse toward the town center. Turn right again up Hienheimer Strasse to reach the Befreiungshalle, which is marked.

# 9 Befreiungshalle

#### Bavaria: 93309

High above the modest town of Kelheim lies the vast Neo-Classical Befreiungshalle, or Liberation Hall (open daily), which quards the entrance to the Donaudurchbruch gorge. It was commissioned by the Bayarian King Ludwig Lto commemorate victory over Napoleon's armies in the wars of 1813-15. The circular. domed interior has 34 winged angels of victory. Stairs lead to a viewing platform that has superb views over Kelheim and the gorge, Next, take a tour of the famous Schneider Weisse brewery in Kelheim (09441 70 50: www. schneider-weisse.de) followed by a boat cruise (May-Oct: open daily; www. schiffahrt-kelheim.de) through the gorge to Kloster Weltenburg.

Return to Kelheim, turn right along Alleestrasse and right again at the fork to reach the bridge across the Danube; on the south side, take the road to Weltenburg. Park in the riverside lot or in Kelheim and take the hoot





## Hop-growing

The Hallertau district between Kelheim and Landshut is the world's largest hop-growing region. Hops are climbing plants, and the distinctive posts and wires of hop fields enable the plant to grow high. Flowers from the female plant are used in the brewing process.

# Moster Weltenburg Bavaria: 93309

With a sumptuous Baroque chapel designed by the Asam brothers and excellent beer courtesy of the world's oldest abbev brewery (tours Apr-Oct: open Sat & Sun), the Benedictine Abbey of Weltenburg is well worth a visit. However, its beautiful setting on a tight bend of the Danube at the western end of the Donaudurchbruch is undoubtedly the highlight here. The most popular way to arrive is on a boat trip (late Mar-Oct) through the wooded gorge from Kelheim.

Return to Kelheim, followina Regensburger Strasse on the south bank of the Danube to the B16. before taking the road via Rohr in Niederbayern to Alzhausen. Here, the road continues via Rottenbura an der Laaber to Landshut.

# Landshut

#### Bavaria: 84028

The broad main streets of Landshut's handsome old town are lined with fine gabled houses overlooked by the slender 427-ft (130-m) high brick tower of the Gothic St. Martinskirche (closed Mon-Fri) The Stadtresidenz (open daily, quided tours), or town palace. has a lovely inner courtyard in Italian Renaissance style. Looming over the town is Burg Trausnitz (open daily). the ancestral castle of Bavaria's roval family, the Wittelsbachs.





The Northern Romantic Road

The northern section of Germany's most celebrated travel route is characterized by its breathtaking landscape. Rolling countryside provides a picturesque setting for small historic towns strung out along the rivers Tauber and Wörnitz This tour passes through the medieval townscapes of Rothenburg ob der Tauber and Dinkelsbühl, Further south. Nördlingen combines spectacular beauty with its curious setting in the Ries crater. This is by no means an unknown corner of Germany, but its popularity has not dimmed its charm; hotels are charming. regional cooking is hearty, and there are crisp Baden or Franken wines from vineyards to enjoy along the way

#### **ACTIVITIES**

Take a hike past vineyards, castles, and churches on the long-distance footpath that follows the "Romantic Road"

Encounter wildlife at Bad Mergentheim's Wildpark, where the attractions include deer, lynx, brown bears, and a pack of wolves

Discover Rothenburg ob der Tauber on an English-language evening walk with the town's night watchman

## PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish: Würzburg to Donauwörth.

**Number of days:** 3–4 days, allowing half a day to explore Rothenburg obder Tauber

Distance: 134 miles (215 km).

**Road conditions:** The route is marked with brown "Romantische Strasse" signs. Roads are generally well paved, with gentle inclines. However, some stretches in the Tauber Valley are narrow.

When to go: May to October is a good time to drive along this scenic route. Lively Christmas markets are an added attraction in December.

**Opening times:** Most attractions are open daily, while shops are open from 9am to 6pm, Monday to Friday, and close early on Saturdays.

Major festivals: Rothenburg ob der Tauber: Meistertrunk (historical re-enactment), May; Feuchtwangen: Kreuzgangspiele (theater frestival), Jun–Aug; Dinkelsbühl: Kinderzeche (children's and folklore festival), Jul; Nördlingen: Historisches Stadtmauerfest (town walls festival), every three years in Sept, next in 2013; Donauwörth: Schwäbischwerder Kindertag (children's historical procession), Jul.

#### **DAY TRIP OPTIONS**

The northern section of this wine producing country will be of special interest to **wine lovers**, while history-lovers will enjoy a visit to the **historic towns** of Rothenburg ob der Tauber and Nördlingen. # Würzburg

#### Bavaria: 97070

The capital of Franconia's wine country. Würzburg became an independent prince-bishopric between 1168 and 1803. Occupying a picturesque position on the banks of the Main river, the town boasts many impressive churches. Of these, the most notable is the Romanesque Dom St. Kilian (open daily), which was built between 1045 and 1188. Towering above the town, the mighty castle. Festung Marienberg. is also worth a visit. One of the later Baroque additions to the fortress. the former arsenal now houses the Mainfränkisches Museum with a valuable collection of medieval art treasures (open daily). However, Würzburg's greatest attraction is the Baroque Residenz (open daily), a palace of the prince-bishops, now a UNESCO World Heritage Site, Built between 1720 and 1744 the centerpiece of the palace is the sumptuous emperor's chamber, the Kaisersaal.

☐ Take the Röntgenring, cross the Main river, then bear left on the B27 as far as the A3, beyond which the Romantische Strasse continues

to the town of Tauherhischofsheim Park at the back of the Rathaus on Rinastrasse.

## Tauberbischofsheim Baden-Württemberg: 97941

Formerly part of the territories of the Mainz archbishops Tauherhischofsheim has an Altstadt or old town, focused on its Marktplatz. The market square is fringed by halftimbered houses and dominated by the Neo-Gothic town hall, or Rathaus. On the square is the Baroque house. the Reh-Hof (1702) and the old Sternapotheke (1670), or Star Pharmacy, in a house once occupied by Georg Michael Franck, grandfather of the Romantic poets Clemens and Bettina Brentano. The town's main symbol is the Türmersturm or Türmer's Tower, part of the **Schloss Kurmainz**. Dating from 1250, the castle now houses the Tauberfränkisches

Landschaftsmuseum (closed Mon) whose collections include local Tracht (peasant costumes) and handicrafts.

Take Würzburger Strasse, before turnina riaht on to Meraentheimer Strasse. This becomes the B27 and then, after the A81, the B290.



## Bad Mergentheim Baden-Württemberg: 97980

I ving in a charming spot on the Tauber river. Bad Mergentheim was home to the Teutonic Knights from 1527 to 1809 First built in the 12th=13th centuries the

**Deutschordensschloss** dominates this leafy little spa town. The castle houses a **museum** (closed Mon) with staterooms and displays relating to the Knight's history. Just south of the town. Pfarrkirche (closed Mon), the parish church at Stuppach, contains a masterpiece, the Stuppacher Madonna (1519), by German Renaissance painter Matthias Grünewald Around 1 mile (2 km) from the town is the Wildpark Bad

Mergentheim (07931 413 44; www. aeonark-ries.de), which is spread over 86 acres (35 ha), and features more than 75 species in a natural setting.

☐ Head east along the B19/ laersheimer Strasse. From laersheim. turn right. Follow signs to Weikersheim.



# Weikersheim

#### Baden-Württemberg: 97990

Weikersheim's neat central square acts as a picturesque frame for Schloss Weikersheim (open daily), transformed in the 16th century. on the orders of Count Wolfgang II of Hohenlohe, into one of Germany's most beautiful Renaissance palaces. The highlight of the interior is the Rittersaal, or knight's hall, a vast banqueting hall with a magnificent fireplace and painted ceiling. The Baroque palace garden, **Schlossgarten**, is graced by many fountains and more than 50 statues.

Continue along the Tauber Valley. Follow sians to Rottingen taking the same road to Bieberehren, then drive south to Crealinaen. Herraottskirche is south of the junction with Rothenburger Strasse: there is parking on the side of the road

#### The Teutonic Knights

Formed at the end of the 12th century to protect pilarims in the Holy Land, the Order of the Teutonic Knights of St. Mary's Hospital in Jerusalem turned its attention to Furope after the Crusades. In the 13th century it took Christianity and the German language to the Baltic. creating the German colony of East Prussia. After the Order's Grand Master Albert of Brandenburg converted to Lutheranism in 1525 its seat moved from Königsberg to Bad Mergentheim, The Order's distinctive black cross has become famous as the model for the Iron Cross. Germany's decoration for gallantry

# Crealingen

#### Baden-Württemberg: 97993

Upstream from Weikersheim, on the Bayarian border is the small town of Crealingen, Just south of its halftimbered center is the Herrgottskirche (closed Jan). This unassuming pilgrimage church shelters a masterpiece by sculptor Tilman Riemenschneider. Carved sometime between 1493 and 1510, the Marienaltar was so aligned that the central figure of Marv is illuminated through the chapel's rose window on the Feast of the Assumption on August 25.

Return to Creglingen, turning right on to the Romantische Strasse towards Rothenburg ob der Tauber.



# 6 Rothenburg ob der Tauber

Bavaria: 91541

Without the catastrophe of the Thirty Years' War (1618–48), Rothenburg ob der Tauber might have been very different, for the loss of population and vitality that followed the conflict helped preserve its medieval and Renaissance townscape. Once a Free City of the Holy Roman Empire, Rothenburg is now no more than a minor country town, but its exceptional architectural heritage and scenic position above the lovely Tauber Valley ensure that this perfect little time capsule is one of Germany's most beloved attractions.

# A two-hour walking tour

Park outside the old town, Altstadt, on Bezoldweg and head to the **Klingentor** ①, one of several lofty gates that punctuate Rothenburg's well-preserved medieval defenses. Built around 1400, the

Klingentor also served as a water tower. Within the bastion is the late 15th-century fortified church of St. Wolfgang, built into the town walls. Continue into the Altstadt, heading south along Klingengasse, with

the Gothic bulk of the Lutheran parish church of **St. Jakobs Kirche** ② (open daily) ahead. The interior is worth visiting for the Heilig Blut Altar, or holy blood altar, by the Würzburgbased master-sculptor Tilman Riemenschneider. The altar's detailed portrayal of the Last Supper ranks as one of Riemenschneider's finest woodcarvings. Leave the church and turn left along Kircholatz. to carry on

to the 12th-century **Weisser Turm** ③. Part of the original inner town wall, the "White Tower" is the highest point in the Altstadt. Next to it, the half-timbered Judentanzhaus, or Jewish dance hall, is a reminder of the town's


importance as a center of Jewish culture in the Middle Ages. The street leading east from Weisser Turm is known as Galgengasse, or Gallows' Lane, as it once led to the Galgentor, the town's pallows. Turn right down

the Galgentor, the towns gallows. Turn right down Pfarrgasse, then left into

Rödergasse, looking right to admire the picturesque huddle of buildings around the Markusturm and Röderbogen, a town gate and former prison built around 1200. Walk to the end of Rödergasse to the **Röderturm** 

(Mar–Nov & Christmas Market: open daily), the only one of the town gates that can be climbed for views over the town. It contains an exhibition on the bombing of Rothenburg





during World War II. of which barely a trace now remains. Head back to Markusturm, through the Markt, to see the splendid Rathaus (3) rising above The town hall consists of two structures: the Renaissance building in front of the Markt dates from the late 16th century, while the Gothic structure hehind it is much older To the right, the gabled Ratstrinkstube. or City Councillors' Tavern, is graced by a 17th-century clock. Mechanical figures emerge on the hour to depict the story of the Meistertrunk, the drinking bet that spared the city during the Thirty Years' War, Return to the Markt, heading downhill along Schmiedgasse to Plönlein (6), a

## The Meistertrunk Legend

Protestant Rothenburg sided with the Swedes during the Thirty Years' War, but was occupied by Catholic troops under General Tilly in 1631. According to a legend, Tilly agreed to spare the town from destruction if a councilor could down a 5 pints (3.25 litre) tankard of wine in one draught: former mayor Georg Nusch did so and Rothenburg was saved. This tale forms the basis for the Meistertrunk Festival, a re-enactment of the mythical story, which takes place at Whitsun.



charming little fork in the road, and one of the most photographed spots in Rothenburg. Return to the Markt turning left into Herrngasse which boasts the town's most imposing patrician houses. A vaulted passageway leads through the Rathaus to the historic vaults, or Historiengewölbe (7) (open daily). where Rothenburg's travails during the Thirty Years' War are brought to life. Continue down Herrngasse to Franziskanerkirche (8) (Jan & Feb: closed Mon-Fri) which contains another Riemenschneider altar. Turn right into Trompetergässchen, and then left into Klosterhof to reach the Reichsstadtmuseum (9) (open daily). Housed in a former convent, the imperial city museum's collections include the Rothenburg Passion paintings from the Franziskanerkirche and

a section on the town's Jewish history.

# Schillingsfürst Bavaria: 91583

Lording over the countryside from the

highest outcrop of the Frankenhöhe hills, the Baroque palace of **Schloss Schillingsfürst** (Apr–Oct: open daily) is still the seat of the princes of Hohenlohe-Schillingsfürst. While its history dates back to the 11th century, the present building was built in the 18th century to designs by Darmstadt court architect Louis Rémy de la Fosse. Highlights include the Empfangssalon, or reception room, hung with Gobelin tapestries.

☐ Take the Frankenheimerstrasse. From Feuchtwanaer Strasse, turn right on to a side road. Turn left to Wornitz. Follow sians to B25/Feuchtwangen.

## Feuchtwangen Bavaria: 91555

This city originated in the 9th century as a Benedictine abbey, which was dissolved during the Reformation Feuchtwangen's attractive old town. the Altstadt, is dominated by its two churches standing side-by-side: the larger of the two, the **Stiftskirche**, is the former abbey church. Nestling alongside is a 12th-century cloister. the setting for the Kreuzgangspiele Theater Festival held each summer Feuchtwangen's Fränkisches Museum (closed Mon & Tue) is one of southern Germany's best folk art museums.

☐ Leave Feuchtwangen on the B25/ Dinkelshühler Strasse to Dinkelsbühl.

# Dinkelsbühl

#### Bavaria: 91550

Though its peaceful setting on the Wörnitz river lacks the scenic splendor of Rothenburg ob der Tauber. Dinkelsbühl is one of the bestpreserved medieval urban complexes in Germany, with lofty walls and towers encircling the Altstadt. At its heart is the soaring Münster St. Geora, the town's 14th-century Gothic parish church. Its tower has a fine view of the town. Opposite, on Weinmarkt, is a parade of tall, gabled houses as grand as any in Germany.

Continue south along the B25. — Pass Wallerstein and continue on the B25, which becomes the B29 to Nördlingen. Obtain a Parkscheibe (parking pass) from the tourist office parking lot for 1-5 hours for free. Park for free on parkina lots outside Altstadt near the aates.

# Mördlingen Ravaria: 86720

This town stands at the center of the Geopark Ries (www.geopark-ries.de), in the Ries Basin, a huge crater over 110 yards (100 m) deep, formed millions of years ago by a meteor strike. With intact medieval walls encircling a well-preserved Altstadt, Nördlingen has its share of grandiose architecture. The late-Gothic St. Georgskirche or Church of St. George is a triple-nave hall church with round pillars and network vaults. It is possible to climb the 295-ft (90-m) high church tower, known as the Daniel (open daily), for a bird's-eye view of the distant rim of the Ries Crater, Visit the Rieskrater

**Museum** (closed Mon) to learn more about the meteorite strike that created the Ries.

# 11 Harburg

## Bavaria: 86655

Diminutive Harburg nestles on the banks of the Wörnitz river, which can be crossed on a restored 18th-century stone bridge that is worth a stroll for the views of the **Schloss Harburg** (mid-Mar-Oct: closed Mon) of the princes of Oettingen-Wallerstein. One of the best preserved medieval castles in Germany, it sprawls along the hilltop, dominating the town below. The 18th-century **synagogue** in Egelstrasse is a reminder that a quarter of Harburg's population was once Jewish.

Continue south along the B25 to Donauwörth. The Am Münster underaround parkina lot is well marked.

# Donauwörth

#### Bavaria: 86609

Donauwörth underwent careful restoration after terrible destruction in 1945. Its main street, Reichsstrasse, is lined with patrician houses that hint at the town's former importance as a Free City of the Holy Roman Empire. The abbey church of **Heilig Kreuz** is a florid example of southern German Baroque, while the wooden-

galleried **Invalidenkaserne** was originally built as barracks. From Reichsstrasse, a bridge leads through the **Rieder Tor** across a branch of the Wörnitz river onto the island of Ried. From here, visitors can get fine views of the town's medieval fortifications.

#### The Ries Crater

Around 15 million years ago, a meteorite 1,093 yards (1 km) in diameter slammed into what is now northern Bavaria at a speed of about 43,496 mph (70,000 kph). The impact had the force of 250 Hiroshima atomic bombs and left behind a crater 16 miles (25 km) in diameter, nown as the Ries. When viewed from a suitable vantage point – such as the top of the Daniel in Nördlingen – the rim of the crater is still clearly visible.

at Schillingfürst 7. Head to
Dinkelsbühl 3 and stroll around
its medieval fortifications. Stop at
Nördlingen 10 to see the Ries crater.

Take Rothenburger Strasse to Schillingsfurst, take the B25 and continue on it to Dinkelsbühl. Continue on the same road, which becomes the B29 to Nördlingen.

# The Southern Romantic Road

The southern section of Germany's most famous tourist route begins at splendid Augsburg. The city's creative and architectural splendor was funded by its bankers, making it one of Furope's richest and most important cities at the height of the German Renaissance, Further south, a dream-like artistic vision prevails in the heavenly creations of Baroque and Rococo church builders and in the Wagnerian fantasies of "Mad" King Ludwig at Schloss Neuschwanstein, Germany's best-loved castle. Overshadowing everything is the majestic grandeur of the Alps. visible on a clear day even from Augsburg. Swabian cuisine hints at Italy's proximity, with ravioli-like Maultaschen and gnocchi-like Spätzle or Kasspätzen featuring on menus, although beer remains the drink of choice.



# **PLAN YOUR DRIVE**

Start/finish: Augsburg to Füssen.

**Number of days:** 3 days, allowing a day to explore Augsburg.

Distance: 87 miles (140 km).

Road conditions: Roads are well surfaced and marked with brown "Romantische Strasse" signs. Traffic can be heavy in the urban sections in and around Augsburg, where drivers should also watch out for trams.

When to go: This drive is best from May to October. There are a limited number of winter sports available in the Alpine south during winter.

**Opening times:** Museums often close on Mondays, while the royal castles at Hohenschwangau are open daily. Shops are closed on Sundays.

Major festivals: Augsburg: Plärrer (folk festival and funfair), Easter and late summer; Landsberg am Lech: Ruethenfest (children's folk festival), every four years, next 3rd week Jul 2011.

#### **DAY TRIP OPTIONS**

Lovers of historic towns will enjoy Augsburg and Landsberg am Lech in the north, while for an unrivaled combination of scenic grandeur and architectural fantasy, the Romantic Road is at its prettiest in the south, between Schöngau and the royal castles at Hohenschwangau. #### VISITING AUGSBURG



# Auasbura

Bavaria: 86150

Founded by the Romans, Augsburg reached its zenith during the Renaissance. An important banking center during this period, the city attained renown all across Europe for its artists and craftsmen. above all in England, where the Augsburg painter Hans Holbein the Younger (1498–1543) became King Henry VIII's court painter. The city also played a key role in the Reformation, and its past glories are reflected in the impressive architecture of its city center.

# A two-hour walking tour

Park in the Annahof underground parking lot and walk through the courtvard to the church of St. Anna (1) (closed Mon) which contains the Renaissance burial chapel of the

There is also an exhibition on Martin Luther, who stayed here in 1518 during his meetings with papal legate Cardinal Cajetan following the publication of his famous 95 Theses Exit the church andheaddownMartin-Luther-Platz then bear left to Maximilianmuseum (2) Housed in a 16th-century merchant's house, the museum contains works by Augsburg's famed gold and silversmiths and by the Dutch sculptor Adriaen de Vries (1556-1626), who was responsible for several of the city's splendid fountains. From the museum, Phillippine-Welser-Strasse leads into Rathausplatz the city's market square. It is dominated by

designed by Elias Holl, Badly burned during World War II, it has since been carefully restored. Inside, Goldener Saal, or Golden Hall (open daily), is a masterpiece of the restorer's art, complete with a gilded walnut ceiling. Head northward up Karolinenstrasse. cross Leonhardsberg to the northern Altstadt, or old town, and Augsburg's Dom (4), a blend of the Romanesque and Gothic styles with 12th-century stained-glass windows and altar panels by Hans Holbein the Elder. father of the celebrated portraitist. On the northern side of the cathedral is the Diözesanmuseum (closed Mon). whose treasures include the cathedral's remarkable 11th-century bronze doors, illustrated with scenes from the Old Testament. North along Frauentorstrasse is the Mozarthaus (5) at No. 20 (closed Mon), where Mozart's father Leopold was born in 1719, and which now houses an interesting exhibition. Return to Rathausplatz and turn left down Perlachberg, past Elias Holl's gabled butcher's guild house, the Stadtmetzg, and left again into Auf dem Rain where the Brechthaus (6) (closed Mon), birthplace of the playwright Bertolt Brecht, is now a museum. Head back to the main road. and turn left along Jakoberstrasse to the **Fuggerei** (7) (open daily). Founded by Jakob Fugger the Rich in 1521, this

#### The Fuggers

In three generations, the Fugger family went from being weavers to bankers to the mighty Habsburgs. The greatest of the dynasty was Jakob Fugger the Rich, the wealthiest husinessman of his day who funded Charles V's ascent to the throne of the Holy Roman Empire. His town palace in Augsburg hosted the meeting between Martin Luther and Cardinal Caietan and is to this day home to the Fugger Privatbank. However, his most famous memorial is the Fuggerei, the world's first social housing complex.

group of almshouses is thought to be the world's oldest social housing complex. One of the apartments is preserved in its original condition as a museum.

Head back to the city center along Jakobstrasse and turn left into Oherer Graben, on the far side of which is the artisans' quarter or Handwerkerviertel

(8), a charming district of winding lanes. It was in one of the houses in this district, at Vorderer Lech, that Hans Holbein the Younger was born: the house was destroyed in World War II. In its place stands the Kunstverein Augsburg (closed Mon), which hosts temporary exhibitions of modern art. Continue along Vorderer Lech into Bäckergasse; at the end. turn right up Milchberg to St. Ulrich und Afra (9), a late-Gothic church which dominates the southern part of the Altstadt. Begun in 1474, it was not completed until 1603 and contains the tombs of St. Ulrich. St. Afra and St. Simpert, North from here stretches Maximilianstrasse. lined with mansions and cafés.

Among the grandest mansions is the Schaezlerpalais (10), built in 1765 as the town palace of the banker Liebert von Liebenhofen and now a museum of German Baroque art (closed Mon). The former palace's Rococo ballroom is the venue for concerts during the summer. In front of the Schaezlernalais. stands the Herkulesbrunnen, or Hercules Fountain, one of the three Renaissance fountains by Adriaen de Vries, completed around 1600. Go north along Maximilianstrasse. past the Fugger City Palace, or Fugger-Stadtpalast (1), to see the fountains Merkurbrunnen and Augustusbrunnen, which stand in

II in 1264. Friedberg is an impressive sight, snug behind wellpreserved town walls. The town's hilltop Altstadt is rather over-restored but there is a fine 17th-century Rathaus designed in the style of architect Flias Holl. Just beyond the fortifications is the Wittelsbacher Schloss, rebuilt in 1559 in Renaissance style, which is now a museum (closed Mon & hols). Its collections include beautiful watches and faïence, or tin-glazed pottery, for which Friedberg was known in the 18th century.

Return alona Auasburger Strasse and take the B300/ Haunstetter Strasse south from the city. This joins the B17 to Landsberg am Lech where there is limited parking on the main square.

# Landsberg am Lech Ravaria: 86899

With a sloping main square dominated by the historic town hall the Historisches Rathaus. Landsberg am Lech has a well-preserved historic core. The facade of the town hall is richly ornamental with stuccowork from 1719-21 by Dominikus Zimmermann, who, with his brother

Johann Bantist was also responsible for the Wieskirche. The town also has many gate towers, most notably the Gothic 15th-century 118-ft (36-m) high Bayertor, located at the top of the steep, pretty Alte Bergstrasse.

☐ Take the Katharinenstrasse, turn left on to the B17, and continue to Schonaau, where there is on-street parking in the Altstadt.

#### Hitler in Landsberg am Lech

For all its timeless beauty, Landsberg am Lech's chief historical claim to fame is as the place where Hitler wrote Mein Kampf. At his trial, following the disastrous coup attempt in Munich in 1923, the future dictator was given a lenient sentence despite charges of high treason. The case, far from being a humiliation, proved to be something of a propaganda platform, and Hitler used the months of confinement to complete his notorious political manifesto.

# Schongau

Bavaria: 86956

Perched above the Lech river in the district known as the Pfaffenwinkel (priests' corner), this former minor seat of the Wittelsbach Dynasty has an almost complete set of medieval town walls, which look particularly impressive when floodlit at night. The Ballenhaus in the center of the old

town is a former warehouse with a stepped gable, dating from 1420

Cross the Lech river to Peiting on the Peitinaer Strasse and head south alona the B23 to Rottenbuch. Parkina is available in front of the church: follow sians to Ortsmitte.

# Rottenbuch

Bavaria: 82401

Rottenbuch's former Augustinian monastery complex was secularized in 1803 although its appearance remains unaffected. The village's focus is the convent church of Maria Geburt. which has an opulent interior in the Rococo style, with stuccowork dating from the mid-18th century

Continue south on the B23. Beyond Achen, turn right on to Steingadener Strasse to Wildsteia. After Wildsteia. turn at the sign for Wies/Wieskirche. There is paid parking at the side of the road, close to the church.

# Wieskirche

Bavaria: 86989

Located 3 miles (5 km) from Steingaden is the meadow church of Wieskirche (open daily), Completed in 1754 at the spot where a farmer's wife had seen tears flow from the eves of an abandoned statue of Christ, the church was the work of Dominikus Zimmermann. The building is a masterpiece of 18th-century southern German architecture.

Return to the Wies/Wieskirche sian. Continue to Steinaaden, bearina left on to the B17. Follow brown sians. Köniasschlösser, to the castles at Hohenschwangau. There are paid parking lots at the base of the village. Ascend to Schloss Neuschwanstein by shuttle bus, horse and cart, or on foot.





## "Mad" King Ludwig II

Bavaria's famous monarch Ludwig II, has become a revered figure since his drowning in the Starnberger See in 1886. Coming to the throne as a vouth on the eve of Bavaria's defeat and incorporation into the Prussianled German Empire, he was denied real power; instead, he lived out his absolutist fantasies in extravagant building projects that threatened to bankrupt the public purse. As a result he was forced to step down shortly before his untimely – and some still say suspicious – death, a few weeks before his 41st birthday.

# Hohenschwangau Bavaria: 87645

Germany's most famous castle sits in dreamy splendor on a forested craq above Hohenschwangau. Schloss Neuschwanstein (open daily) was built for Ludwig II between 1869 and 1884 Schlosskonzerte or classical music concerts (www.schlosskonzerteneuschwanstein.de), are held here every September. The Neo-Gothic Schloss Hohenschwangau (open daily) in the valley below is where Ludwig spent much of his childhood. Enjoy a summer toboggan run (www. tegelbergbahn.de) or a cable car ride to the top of the the Tegelberg summit (www.tegelbergbahn.de) for spectacular views.

Exit Hohenschwanaau and take the Parkstrasse and turn left on to the B17 for Füssen. Park in one of the underground parking lots close to the tourist office and the Altstadt.

## B Füssen Bavaria: 87629

The Romantic Road ends at Füssen in an enchanting landscape of lakes and mountains. The Altstadt is dominated by the late-Gothic Hohes Schloss, former summer palace of Augsburg's bishops, which houses two art galleries (Apr-Oct: closed Mon: Nov-Mar: open Fri-Sun pm). The former Benedictine monastery of **Kloster St. Mang** (Apr-Oct: closed Mon: Nov-Mar: open Fri-Sun pm) has a series of Baroque staterooms, while the Heilig Geist Spitalkirche, or Church of the Holy Ghost, has a pretty painted façade.

#### **An Operatic Fantasy**

Conceived by theater designer Christian Jank, Neuschwanstein is the ultimate fantasy castle, inspired by the castles of the Age of Chivalry, notably the Wartburg in Thuringia. Ludwig II was the patron of the composer Richard Wagner, whose operas provided inspiration for the decor. The Sängersaal, or Singers' Hall, is modeled on the hall at Wartburg the scene of the singer's contest in Wagner's opera Tannhäuser.

Explore historic Augsburg 1 before heading to Friedberg 2 to admire the exhibits in Wittelsbacher Schloss. Stop at Landsberg am Lech 3 to visit its Baroque town hall.

Head east to Friedberg along the B2, then south along the B300/B17 to Landsberg am Lech.

# Scenic and architectural paradise

Stroll through Schongau's 4 old town, then head to

Hohenschwangau 1 to explore its royal castles, which stand amid superb Alpine scenery.

Head south to Rottenbuch on the B23. At Achen, the Steingadner Strasse branches off to Wildsteig. Watch out for brown signs to the Wieskirche, Bear left at Steingaden on to the B17 and follow signs to the castles.





# **Mountain Roads and Vineyards**

The town of Baden-Baden, with its classy spas and air of 19th-century grandeur, defines the northern Black Forest, which is less wild and more accessible than the south. This tour follows the Schwarzwaldhochstrasse (Black Forest High Road), which rolls along the western edge of the mountain range, revealing fine views over the Rhine Valley. The road then leads to the eastern end of the Kinzig Valley, at the heart of the Black Forest, where pockets of traditional life have survived in small logging and farming villages. Of particular interest here is the brewery town of Alpirsbach and the halftimbered village of Schiltach. The tour finally takes drivers to the Badische Weinstrasse. a scenic road that meanders through an area known for its vinevards and wineries.





#### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish: Baden-Baden to Durbach

Number of days: 3 days allowing half

Road conditions: Roads are well paved but often steep and twisting. though driving is not particularly difficult. In winter snow can cover higher portions of the drive

When to go: This drive is possible throughout the year, although the higher points may be blocked by snow between December and March

Opening times: Most attractions open daily. Shops open from 9am to 5pm on weekdays; and close early on Saturdays and remain closed on Sundays, Restaurants generally close at 10pm.

Main market days: Freudenstadt: Sat.

Shopping: The boutiques of Baden-Baden sport an array of luxury goods. while the vinevards and wine-sellers along the Badische Weinstrasse offer an excellent selection of local vintages.

# Raden-Raden

Raden-Württemberg: 76530

Founded as a Roman bathing spot, and a particular favorite of the Roman Emperor Caracalla (188–217 BC). Baden-Baden has an idyllic location in the midst of gentle wooded hills. In 1810, the Baden Margraves built Neo-Classical thermal baths around the springs here. to serve an early 19th-century fashion for bathing. Its importance has faded since, yet something of these halcyon days continues to live on in the elegant villas, grand hotels, spas, and manicured gardens.

# A 90-minute walking tour

From the parking lot entrance turn left to cross the park and the Oos river on a small footbridge. Then turn right along Lichtentaler Allee which becomes Kaiserallee This

leads to a large building in the greenery on the left known as the

Trinkhalle (1) (open daily). the grandest of a series of 19th-century buildings and follies built alongside the Oos as social centers. It now houses the tourist information office. Turning right out of the Trinkhalle, a path

leads through parkland to the Neo-Classical Kurhaus (2) (open daily), the main venue for cultural


and social events in Raden-Raden which includes a famous casino Visits to the interior are possible on 20minute tours, held every 30 minutes. Outside the Kurhaus a bandstand marks the start of Kurgarten, an ave-

nue of chestnut trees lined with expensive boutiques. A right turn at the bottom of this leads back to Lichtentaler Allee 3, a 2-mile (3-km) long prome-

nade. Down this avenue is the Kunsthalle (closed Mon). home to international contemporary art. Walk along the promenade to Bertholdstrasse, which is on

the left behind the Stadtmuseum, and turn right on to the footpath on the near side of the river. Over the next

> footbridge lie the thick beech hedges of the Gönneranlage (4). These are ornamental gardens where over 400 varieties of rose thrive. Exiting the gardens from the opposite side take the left turn that leads down Ludwig-Wilhelm-Strasse to the parking lot at Augustaplatz. From here, turn left then right down Lichtentaler Strasse to the square on Sophienstrasse. Gernsbacher Strasse. which is across the square leads into the old town, the Altstadt (5). This was reduced to ashes in 1689 during the Palatinate War of Succession; rebuilding it took a century. Follow Gernsbacher Strasse and turn left into an allev at Sonnenplatz. This leads to the marketplace.

where villas surround the Stiftskirche Liebfrauen (6) This church's landmark spire summarizes its architectural history, with a Romanesque square tower forming the base for an octagonal Gothic cap that carries Baroque cupolas, Behind the church, occasional wisps of steam drifting over the cobbled street announce the presence of the **Bäderviertel** (7) at the base of some stone steps. The baths quarter was established by the Romans and its ruins can still be seen at the Römische Badruinen (open daily). The ruins lie in the basement of the spa Friedrichsbad (open daily). which looks like a minor palace with its green copper cupolas and colonnades Return to Lichtentaler Strasse and Augustaplatz to reach the parking lot.

Turn left out of the parking lot, right on to Lichentaler Strasse, which becomes Hauptstrasse. Turn right when this road meets the B500, which becomes the Schwarzwaldhochstrasse. Park at the roadside parking lot at Mummelsee.

# Schwarzwaldhochstrasse Baden-Württemberg: 77889

The Schwarzwaldhochstrasse, or Black Forest High Road (B500), climbs from Baden-Baden through meadows and valleys to the pine-covered hills that pave the way to Freudenstadt. Various viewpoints and belvederes along the route provide views to the rolling hills and vinevards of the upper Rhine Valley and beyond to the French Vosaes Mountains, Visitors should allow time for several short hikes (www.schwarzwaldhochstrasse.eu) including the 1-mile (2-km) loop around the Mummelsee. Continue down the B500 and then turn right at the road with signs for Allerheiligen.



A 20-minute hike starts at the Gothic ruin of the Allerheiligen monastery and leads to an attractive waterfall.

From Allerheiligen, return to the B500 and continue south, then left on to the B28. In Freudenstadt, turn left on to the B462 to reach the parking lot.

# Freudenstadt

## Baden-Württemberg: 72250

Built on a high plateau, Freudenstadt was commissioned by Duke Friedrich I in 1599. The town's giant marketplace is the biggest square in Germany. The most imposing buildings here are the town hall and Stadtkirche. an oddly L-shaped church designed to segregate men and women.

Return to the B28, turn left down I auterhadstrasse, and then take the B294 toward Freiburg. In Alpirsbach, turn right into Alleenstrasse to park on the Krähenhadstrasse

# The Who's Who of Baden-Baden

Though still a playground for the extremely rich, Baden-Baden had its heyday in the late 19thcentury when the international elite flocked here to promenade and recuperate. Visiting luminaries included statesmen and monarchs such as Oueen Victoria, Kaiser Wilhelm Land Otto von Bismarck. composers, such as Pyotr Ilyitsch Tchaikovsky and Johannes Brahms, and novelists such as Leo Tolstoy and Fyodor Dostoevsky.

# 4 Alpirsbach Baden-Württemberg: 72271

Strung out along a tight valley, the town of Alpirsbach once basked in a medieval golden age that gave it the Romanesque Benedictine monastery **Kloster Alpirsbach** (mid-Mar-Oct: open daily; Nov-mid-Mar: open Thu,

sopen daily; Nov—mid-Mar: open Thu, Sat & Sun), whose church was built of regional red sandstone in the 11th century. The interior is largely empty, but worth a look for its powerful nave capitals, which illustrate the forces of good and evil. The cold Dormotorium and Calefectorium of the monks are visited by hour-long tours, which also give visitors background about life in the monastery. Other tours visit the adjacent brewery, the Alpirsbacher Klosterbäu (tours daily), which brews several fruity local beers.

☐ Return to the B294 from Krähenbadstrasse, turn right, following signs to Schiltach. Take the Schiltach-Ost entrance to the town,



turn right at Hauptstrasse, then left on to Schramberger Strasse for on-street parking. Walk back to Hauptstrasse, turn left, and take the alley on the right to the museum.

## Schiltach

## Baden-Württemberg; 77761

The picture-postcard town of Schiltach was built on the banks of the Kinzig river where a reconstructed lumber mill houses the **Schüttesäge-Museum** (late-Mar-Oct: open daily: Nov-late-Dec: open Sat & Sun). The black and white photographs at this saw mill museum illustrate a bygone era when the town was the hub of a logging industry. A short walk along the river toward Hauptstrasse leads to a marketplace surrounded by half-timbered buildings, none of which date from before 1533, when a fire reduced the town to ashes The **Rathaus** or town hall has murals of the blaze, including a depiction of the witch blamed for the fire.

Continue on Schramberger Strasse and turn right on to the B294. Then turn right on to the B33 toward Villingen-Schwenningen. Park at the marked roadside parking beside the museum.

## 6 Schwarzwälder Freilichtmuseum

#### Baden-Württemberg: 77793

Close to the Gutach's confluence with the Kinzig is the Schwarzwälder Freilichtmuseum (open daily), an openair museum. The focus here is the Vogtsbauernhof, a 1570 farmhouse. Its roof is typical of the local building style. Arranged around the farm are 26 other traditional buildings, brought here from around the region

to create a little village. Costumed guides and craft demonstrations help bring the place to life. Visitors can follow signs on the B33 from the museum to the

#### Sommerrodelbahn

(Apr–Oct: open daily), a summer toboggan run.

Return to the B33, turning left to Hofstetten. Turn right at Ringstrasse in Haslach. Follow signs to the museum and park in the lot beside it.



#### Schwarzwälder Trachtenmuseum

#### Baden-Württemberg: 77716

Packed with a comprehensive collection of local costumes, this folk museum (Apr-mid-Oct: closed Mon: Mid-Oct-Dec & Feh-Mar: closed Mon) in the town of **Haslach** includes items such as the Bollenhut, a straw bonnet clustered with pompoms once worn by the unmarried women of the Gutach Valley. Look out for some of the costumes worn at carnival. Behind the museum, the old town of **Haslach** is worth exploring for the cluster of half-timbered houses funded by a silver-mining boom.

Return to the B33. At Biberach aet on to the B415 toward Lahr. Drive through Lahr, turning left on to the B3 and then right on to at road with sians for the Europa-Park.

#### 8 Europa-Park Baden-Württemberg: 77977

The largest amusement park in Germany, Europa-Park Euro Mouse at the (late-Mar-Dec: open daily) offers Europa-Park 50 rides, making it very popular with children. Its huge landscaped grounds are of interest

too: the size of 80 football fields, they contain several fun villages themed by European countries.

 ■ Return along the B3 and head north through Lahr. In Offenburg take the Hauptstrasse and follow sians to Durbach. There are many places to park along the road through Durbach.

#### O Durbach

#### Baden-Württemberg: 77770

An important stop on the Badische Weinstrasse, Durbach is of particular interest to wine lovers for its shop.

the **Durbacher Winzergenossenschaft** (closed Sun). This wine cooperative offers a great selection of distinquished and well-priced local wines and is liberal with its samples. The shop is well-marked and lies to the

> right of the main road at Durbach's center, It faces the

Schloss Staufenberg, which looms over the town from a vinevard-draped hill. The occupants of this 11th-century castle have been documented as producing

wine since 1391 Visitors are not allowed inside the castle. but can sample its wines in

## **Cuckoo Clock Country**

Starting in the historic city of Freiburg, this drive leaves the broad Rhine Valley region and climbs up to the dense Black Forest on roads that twist through tiny villages and pass large, half-timbered farmsteads. The Black Forest is known as the land of cuckoo clocks and is famous for its Black Forest cherry gâteau. This tour takes drivers to the excellent clock museum. in Furtwangen and to Triberg, where these timepieces can be bought as souvenirs. The wilder region to the southeast of Freiburg comes next and gathers around the Feldberg, which has good hiking and, in winter, skiing, Neighboring valleys contain the tranguil lakes of Titisee and Schluchsee, and the spa town of St. Blasien with its Baroque church.

#### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish: Freiburg to Schluchsee

Number of days: 2-3 days allowing half a day to explore Freiburg.

Distance: 108 miles (173 km)

Road conditions: Roads are well payed but often steep and winding though driving is not particularly difficult. In winter snow can cover the higher portions of the drivewinter tires are recommended

When to go: This drive is best avoided in the winter months (December-March) when the top of the Feldberg is snowbound.

Opening times: Most attractions are open daily. Shops are usually open. from 9am to 5pm from Monday to Friday, and close early on Saturdays. Many shops and services are closed on Sundays, Restaurants generally close around 10pm

Main market days: Freiburg: daily.

Shopping: Cuckoo clocks and woodcarvings can be bought from Uhren-Park in Triberg.

Major festivals: Freiburg: Fasnet (pre-Lenten carnival), Sun & Mon before Shrove Tue: Frühlingsfest (spring festival). ### Freiburg

Baden-Württemberg; 79098

Blessed with the sunniest climate in Germany and wooded hills that rise above a picture-postcard old town, the Altstadt, Freiburg. or Freiburg im Breisgau, was founded in 1091. The old town fans out around a magnificent cathedral and has a series of quaint and historic squares with many tempting cafés and restaurants.

#### A 90-minute walking tour

From the Schlossbergring parking lot. turn left into Schoferstrasse, briefly right down Herrenstrasse and then left to reach the Gothic cathedral. the **Münster** (1). Rising above this is a tower (open daily) with an openwork spire. On leaving the Münster by its main west entrance enter the heart of a bustling daily market. To the left lies the bright-red Historisches

Kaufhaus (2) built in 1530 when Freiburg was ruled by the Habsburg Empire. The 1761 Baroque townhouse to its left is the

#### Wentzingerhaus (3)

once the residence of sculptor Christian Wentzinger (1710-97) and now the Museum für Stadtgeschichte (closed

Mon), which offers an interesting insight into local history. To the right of the Wentzingerhaus is Buttergasse, which leads to **Schusterstrasse** (4). one of Freiburg's best-preserved medieval streets. Turn left into this street and right into Herrenstrasse (5). where pavement mosaics announce tradesmen and shops as they have

done for centuries. Further down this street turn right into Salzstrasse looking out for the bronze tiles. Stolpersteine 6), laid into the cobbled pavement outside No. 7 Salzstrasse. l iterally translated as "stumbling blocks" these tiles commemorate the victims of Nazi persecution and are among 9 000 laid around Germany, Further down the street, a left turn down Annengässle

and another left into Grünwälderstrasse leads to Augustinerplatz, where the Augustinermuseum (7) (closed Mon) contains the extensive medieval art collection from a former monastery.

A walk diagonally across the square leads down to the old tannery street,

Gerberau. Continue to Kaiser-Joseph-Strasse, a main thoroughfare that leads to Martinstor (8), a surviving town gate from 1202 that marks the beginning of the university quarter. Bevond, a left turn down Niemensstrasse leads to Universitätstrasse, where pavement cafés encourage lingering. A right

#### Bächle

A curious feature of Freiburg is its Bächle little streams that flow in pavement troughs through most streets. These streams originally provided water for animals, washing and for putting out fires, but today are largely decorative, though plenty of people use them to cool their feet on hot summer days.

turn down this street leads to Rathausplatz (9), where the Renaissance Neues Rathaus houses the tourist office. Towering beside this is the mid-14th-century Martinskirche (10) (open daily), a former Franciscan monastery church that was battered during World War II, but has since been rebuilt. Bear right out of Rathausplatz and follow Rathausgasse to cross Kaiser-Joseph-Strasse and follow the length of Schusterstrasse across the street Turn left down Herrenstrasse, right on Schoferstrasse. and right along Schlossbergring to reach the parking lot.

☐ Turn right on to Schlossbergring and left at Wallstrasse, which becomes Kartäuserstrasse. Follow sians to the town of St. Peter then Sankt Märgen and Glashütte. Drive past Neukirch and turn left on to the B500 to Furtwangen. Turn right into Lindenstrasse to park.

#### Deutsches Uhrenmuseum Baden-Württemberg: 78113

Furtwangen's comprehensive Deutsches Uhrenmuseum (open daily) has a fascinating collection of 8.000 timepieces in myriad styles from almost every era. The display ranges from sundials and cuckoo clocks to mass-produced watches and clocks.

Continue down Lindenstrasse, turn left on Gerwigstrasse, left at Marktplatz, and then right on to the B500 to Triberg and park in the market square.



#### The Cuckoo Clock

It was in the 1730s that cuckoo clocks began to be made in the Black Forest area, with Triberg housing most of the early workshops. The quality of the craftsmanship quickly captured the imagination of the European market, as did the quirky designs, which included rooster clocks and moving automata of angry wives beating lazy husbands. as well as the traditional cuckoo popping out of a trapdoor.

#### Tribera

#### Baden-Württemberg; 78098

The undisputed capital of cuckoo clocks. Triberg is also known for air so pure that it is now a health resort. The town center, Marktplatz, is flanked by the Baroque Wallfahrtskirche. Uphill from here are two other attractions a series of seven waterfalls and the Schwarzwaldmuseum (Nov-Faster: closed Mon: May-Sep: open daily), with a large collection of clock-making apparatus. Continue on the B500. south of town, to reach Uhren-Park (Schonachbach 27; Easter-Oct: open daily), a shop that claims to have the largest cuckoo clock in the world.

#### HIKING AROUND FREIRURG

Freiburg is an excellent hub for hiking. An easy walk is the one up the Schlossberg or Castle Hill to the east of the old town, which links up with a good selection of further well-marked trails. Recommended is the trail to the Rosskopf, the highest point in this cluster of hills, where a huge viewing tower provides superb views over the entire region. A strenuous alternative is climbing the 4 000-ft (1 200-m) Hochfirst Mountain. Maps are available at the tourist office (Strandhadstrasse 4 79822) 07651 980 40). Several companies also lead short lake cruises or rent out rowing boats, both available on the lakefront near the town center.

☐ Turn right outside the parking lot to follow Neustädter Strasse, then turn right on to the B500 to join the B317. Turn right following signs to Haus der Natur to the large lot beside it.

#### Feldberg

#### Baden-Württemberg: 79868

At 4.898 ft (1.493 m). Feldberg is the highest point in the Black Forest It has a broad well-rounded summit which rises above the tree line to offer wonderful views of the region. With much of the upper mountain being a nature reserve wildflowers flourish here. The scattered presence of Black Forest farmhouses and the occasional Alpine hut add to the charm. There are good hiking options available here. The 8-mile (12-km) long Feldberg-Steig is an excellent hiking loop between five Alpine huts around the upper reaches of the mountain for experienced hikers, while others can reach the summit on the Feldberg chairlift (May-Oct: open daily).



Return to the B317 and continue on — it southwestward toward Todtnau. Turn left into Lindenstrasse to park at the Hasenhorn chairlift parking lot.

#### Todtnau

#### Baden-Württemberg: 79674

The quiet mountain town of Todtnau bustles in winter as a gateway to the network of ski-lifts around Feldberg, In summer, most visitors travel up using the Hasenhorn chairlift (Mav-Nov: open daily) for the summer toboggan run. This happens on a thrilling 2-mile (3-km) long track suitable for both children and adults Alternatively, explore a network of hiking and mountain bike trails. Maps are available at the tourist office (Meinard-Thoma-Strasse 21: 07671 96 96 95).

Continue on the B317 and turn left at Geschwend, following signs to St. Blasien. Take a left at the sian into town. Continue on this till the Hauptstrasse. Park on Hauptstrasse across the river from the monastery.





#### St. Blasien

Baden-Württemberg: 79837

Nestled in a heavily forested valley. Dom St. Blasien (open daily) dominates the skyline of St. Blasien. This spa town can trace its roots to its 9th-century foundation as a Benedictine monastery. The Dom itself appeared almost 1,000 years later. Commissioned by the powerful Prince-Abbot Martin Gerbert, this monastery was designed by French architect Michel d'Ixnard (1723-95), who used St. Peter's Basilica in Rome as his model Completed in 1783, it initiated a wave of monumental Neo-Classical architecture, which swept through Germany. The church has superb acoustics, which are best appreciated during the free classical music concerts (Jun-early-Sept: open Tue & Sat).

Return to the outskirts of the town and turn left on to the main road. At Häusern, turn left on to the B500 to Schluchsee. On entering Schluchsee, park in the lot on the riaht.

### Schluchsee

Baden-Württemberg; 79859

A larger body of water than Titisee, and further off the beaten track.

Schluchsee is a calm and clean lake There are many settlements on its eastern shore, the largest of which is also called Schluchsee This town has a popular beach and a waterpark that is managed as Agua Fun (late-May-mid-Sept: open daily). Boat rides are possible with **Thomas Toth** (May-late-Oct: open daily). which conducts trips around the lake with stops at various points. Since 1984 the Schluchseelauf an 11-mile (18-km) run around the lake has been held here

#### DAY TRIP OPTIONS

To break up the drive into day trips, it is best to stay overnight in Freiburg, which is easily accessed from the B31.

#### On the trail of the cuckoo clock

After viewing the large collection of timepieces in Deutsches Uhrenmuseum 2, the clock museum in Furtwangen, travel on to Triberg 3. Here, visitors can browse through the numerous cuckoo-clock shops

that sit cheek-to-cheek, as well as explore the town's church. regional museum, and waterfalls.

Follow the tour to Furtwangen, take the B500 to Triberg, and then follow signs on the B500 and B31 to Freiburg.

#### Lakes and mountains

Nature lovers will be enthralled by the beautiful scenery around the lovely Titisee 4. From here, it is possible to

climb the Feldberg 5 and then visit Lake Schluchsee 8. Adventure enthusiasts can also make a stopover at the mountain town of Todtnau 6 and then head to St. Blasien 7.

Follow the route to Titisee. Then follow signs on the B500 and B317 to Feldberg. Get onto the B317 to Todtnau. Pass Todtnau and come off the B317 at Geschwend and follow sians to St. Blasien and then to Schluchsee.

## **Castles and Caves**

A vast plateau that stretches from Bavaria to the Black Forest, the Swabian Jura (Schwäbische Alb) has always been sparsely populated. Beech woods dominate the landscape, whose system of interconnected stalagmitic caves was carved from sedimentary limestone rocks. The dramatically steep escarpments and craggy outcrops offer ideal perches for an array of romantic castles. The limestone scenery also offers interesting hikes, particularly along the southeastern edge of the Jura, where the Danube begins its trans-European journey along a gorge lined with huge jagged cliffs. This stretch is particularly colorful in spring when wild flowers bloom and in fall, when it glows in a magnificent blanket of golden foliage. The gateway cities of Tübingen and Ulm are both lively and atmospheric, with historic centers.

#### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish: Tübingen to Burg Hohenzollern

Number of days: 4-5 days, allowing half a day to explore Ulm.

Distance: 230 miles (370 km)

Road conditions: Though parrow and winding in places, all major and minor roads are well paved.

When to go: This route is generally accessible year round, though the Jura is sometimes snowbound in winter. Summer is the most enjoyable time to visit, particularly during one of Ulm's many festivals.

Opening times: Most attractions are open daily. Shops are open 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday and close early on Saturdays. Most shops and services are closed on Sundays Restaurants generally close around 10pm.



#### DAY TRIP OPTIONS

Families should visit the majestic castle of Schloss Lichtenstein before exploring the caves at Laichingen and rounding the day off with an ascent of Ulm's Münster spire. History enthusiasts should make the Münster the highlight of a walking tour in Ulm, followed by a visit to the local galleries. Those interested in castles can combine sightseeing at Lichtenstein with tours of Sigmaringen and Burg Hohenzollern. For a more scenic journey, a walk around Blaubeuren is rewarding before following the Danube down to Beuron to hear Gregorian chanting. For full details, see p233.

### 1 Tübingen

#### Baden-Württemberg; 72070

A charming medieval city, Tübingen first appeared in historical records in 1078, but only grew in status 400 vears later when one of Germany's finest universities was established here The Fberhardsbrücke over the Neckar river is a useful orientation point and the location of the tourist information office. The bridge overlooks the Platanenallee, a leafy boulevard on a narrow man-made island alongside which punts pass serenely in front of rows of pinkmustard- and cream-colored houses. Crossing the bridge, a left turn on Neue Strasse leads to Holzmarkt, a square dominated by the late 15thcentury Gothic Stiftskirche St. Georg (open daily). Inside, magnificent star vaulting spreads across the nave and aisle roofs and the choir is dappled with beautiful stained-glass windows. A climb up the church tower reveals fine views over the old town. On the opposite side of the Holzmarkt. Kirchgasse leads to Tübingen's Markt, whose centerpiece fountain. Neptunbrunnen has jolly cherubs depicting the seasons. Behind the fountain the Gothic Rathaus is decorated with Neo-Renaissance frescoes of local heroes, painted to celebrate the university's 400th birthday. On the lower side of the marketplace. Marktgasse runs into a network of old streets of the former wine-growing neighborhood. Back at the Markt, a walk uphill leads to Burgsteige, where antique shops encourage lingering on the way to Schloss Hohentübingen. Expanded in the early 17th century. this 11th- century castle now serves various university departments.

From the multi-story parking lot on Wöhrdstrasse, turn left and left again at Friedrichstrasse. Head south on B27, then turn for Gomaringen and follow Lichtensteinstrasse until signs for Genkingen. Look out for brown signs to Schloss Lichtenstein parking lot.

#### Tübingen's Scholars

Tübingen has attracted many fine scholars over the years, including theologist Philipp Melanchthon, philosopher Georg Wilhelm Friedrich Hegel, astronomer Johannes Keppler, and psychiatrist Alois Alzheimer. The Romantic poet Friedrich Hölder spent the latter part of his life in the city, while Johann Wolfgang von Goethe published his first works here. More recently, Hermann Hesse worked as a bookbinder here before achieving literary fame.



#### Schloss Lichtenstein Raden-Württemberg: 72805

Perched at the top of a cliff on the edge of the Swabian Jura, the photogenic Schloss Lichtenstein (Feb. Mar & Nov. open Sat & Sun. Apr-Oct: open daily) overlooks the plains around Tübingen conveying a sense of being at the very periphery of a mountain range. The gabled and turreted castle dates back to the 1840s, when it was built according to the exaggerated literary descriptions of fairy-tale writer Wilhelm Hauff about an earlier castle that occupied this site. Bristling with horrific-looking weapons, the castle's most impressive feature its armory is as vivid as any fairy tale.

Return downhill from parking lot then turn left toward Riedlingen/ Reutlingen, then Münsingen. From here, follow B465 through the town and on toward Laichingen until sians for Tiefenhöhle.

#### Laichingen Tiefenhöhle Baden-Württemberg: 89146

This cave network (open week before Easter-early-Nov: daily) was discovered in 1892 by local sand digger Johann Georg Mack, who wondered where all his piles of sand were disappearing until he found a crack in the ground into which he lowered his son. The local community developed Laichingen Tiefenhöhle into an attraction in the 1930s, building walkways and fitting ladders. It is now possible to descend 180 ft

(55 m) into the caves without any special equipment. Visitors can wander the caverns at their own pace, which provides a sense of exploration. Warm clothing is required as the caves are at a constant temperature of 46° F (8° C)

From Tiefenhöhle, turn left and follow signs for Blaubeuren via B28. Turn left at Marktstrasse, right at Berastrasse, straight on to Weilerstrasse, and then into Auf dem Graben where there is a parking lot.

#### A Blaubeuren

#### Raden-Württemberg; 89143

Blaubeuren is worth a stop simply to see the source of the Blau river which joins the Danube in Ulm. The 65-ft (20-m) deep Blautopf. or "Blue Pot," is usually an incredible, clear, turquoise-colored pool of water, although rain transforms this into areen, then vellowy-brown. Beside it lies the Hammerschmiede. a mid-18th-century mill and smithy. which is at the trailhead of a number of hikes. Over the road, but accessed by entrances to the right, are the town's half-timbered former monastery workshops. Dating from 1510. these only saw 25 years of use before the Reformation disbanded the monastery, which had been founded here in 1085.

Follow signs from center of Blaubeuren to Ulm via B28. At Ulm follow sians for "Stadmidt" over the bridge on to Wengengasse and turn right at Sedelhofgasse to the multistory parkina lot, Parkhaus Sedelhof.

#### HIKING AROUND BLAUBEUREN

The Blautopf is the trailhead of a number of hikes, including a circuit of Blaubeuren, Marked by an "A" on the trailhead map, this 4-mile (6-km) long trail circuits the valley to provide good views and takes around 90 minutes to complete. www.stadt-blaubeuren.de

#### 6 Ulm

#### Baden-Württemberg: 89073

I ving on the Danube river. Ulm grew prosperous in the Middle Ages. Over time corruption wars and epidemics undermined the city's wealth. In 1944, its alorious historic core was destroyed during bombing raids. Fortunately, its giant Münster came out relatively unscathed. Today, a great deal of the city has been replaced by modern buildings.

#### A two-hour walking tour

Turn left out of the parking lot. Parkhaus Sedelhof, right down Wengengasse, and left down Hirschstrasse to reach the vast sweep of Münsterplatz (1), which gives Ulm its focal point. The dimensions of the square are matched by the gigantic Gothic Münster (open daily) which was begun in 1377. Designed for a

standing congregation of 20.000, its plans included the world's tallest spire. However, it wasn't until 1890 that the spire reached its full height of 530 ft (161 m). The climb up its 768 steps offers fine views of the Black Forest and, on clearer days, the Alps. Inside, the eve is drawn upward by the 138-ft (42-m) high nave and the pulpit.


The elegant 85-ft (26-m) tabernacle is eye-catching, as is the vast 1471 fresco that covers the chancel arch. Turning left out of the Münster. cross Neue Strasse and turn right along Sattlergasse to arrive at Weinhof Square. The **Schwörhaus** ②, or oath house, is where Ulm residents gather

on Schwörmontaa in the annual tradition of hearing their mayor pledge the 1397 city oath. Back on Sattlergasse, a left turn leads to Weinberghof and down to the start of Fischergasse and the heart of the old fisherman's quarter Fischerviertel once home to medieval artisans. Look out for the pretzel carved in the door frame of a baker at Fischergasse

22, and the symbol of a boatman at Fischergasse 18. An alley at the end of Fischergasse turns left to the quirky medieval Schiefes Haus 4), or crooked house. which leans precariously over a stream. Return to Fischergasse and turn left to a small square where stairs climb onto the 1480



A walk further along reveals another crooked building: the 14th-century defensive tower of the **Metzgerturm** (5). Walking uphill beneath the Metzgerturm leads to the marketplace, where the glassy central library, Zentralbibliothek, by architect Gottfried Böhm, lies



opposite the Fischkastenbrunnen. or Fish Crate Fountain Retween the two, the 16th-century Rathaus (6) is decorated with frescoes celebrating Ulm's medieval heyday. To the right of the Rathaus, the Kunsthalle Weishaupt (open daily), a striking modern building over the square. displays Modern and Pop art by various artists including Andy Warhol. Paul Klee Wassily Kandinsky and Pablo Picasso. The gallery is joined to the **Ulmer Museum** (7) (open daily). the city's history museum, which is interesting for paintings of medieval Ulm Take the Neue Strasse then turn right into Köp Fingergasse and left into Hirschstrasse to reach Wengengasse: turn left to take Sedelhofgasse to the parking lot.

☐ Turn right out of parking lot, left on to B19, and left on to B311. Turn right on to B32 and left in Siamarinaen on to Fürst-Wilhelm-Strasse to the parkina lot.

#### The Tailor of Ulm

Dangling inside Ulm's Rathaus is a replica of the hang-glider of local tailor Albrecht Berblinger, who crash-landed this design into the Danube in 1811. Worn down by ceaseless libes with his business in tatters, he died bankrupt in 1825. His design has since proved to be the world's first workable aircraft.

#### Schloss Sigmaringen Baden-Württemberg: 72481

The stately Schloss Sigmaringen (closed Dec-Jan) dominates the skyline of the small regional town of Sigmaringen. First mentioned in 1077, the castle was brutally ransacked by Swedes in 1632 during the Thirty Years' War and destroyed by a huge domestic fire in 1893, leaving only two towers standing. Substantially redesigned in the eclectic style from 1899, the castle is still owned by a branch of the Hohenzollern family who unified Germany in the 19th century; a process helped by having this powerbase in the south. Its impressive armory is a highlight of the castle tours.

Return to B32, cross the bridge and turn left, following signs to Beuron. At Beuron, turn left at the sign for Kloster Beuron for the parking lot.



#### Kloster Beuron

#### Baden-Württemberg: 88631

Some of the most dramatic sections of the Upper Danube Valley lie around the village of Beuron. An enormous Baroque monastery, Kloster Beuron. was founded here in 1077 by Augustinians, Most of the buildings date from the late 17th century, and its church is relatively restrained by regional Baroque standards, though lively frescoes of the patron saints and legends of the foundation of the monastery decorate the naves. Of greatest interest is the glorious Gregorian chanting that accompanies all services (daily). Beuron is also a good base for hiking trips, and a map at the parking lot details well-marked local options.

Return to Beuron and turn left to Tuttlingen on to B311, which becomes B31. Turn left on to B27 toward Donaueschingen, then right for Donaueschingen-Mitte, following signs for Schloss.

The longest river in Western Europe, the Danube begins in Donaueschingen where its source is marked by a stone basin, Donauguelle, This lies on the fringes of the palace gardens of **Schloss** Donaueschingen (tours

Apr-Sept: daily), an 18thcentury Baroque palace that was extensively renovated in belle époque style at the end of the 19th century. Tours visit the luxurious rooms of the

Fürstenberg family who once resided here. In 1283, this family also started the Fürstenberg Brewery, which can be visited on pre-booked tours (Mon-Fri; 0771 862 73). To get there from the parking lot, turn right and then take the first right down Postplatz before walking left along Haldenstrasse

Return to the B27, following signs to Villingen-Schwenningen then to Schwenningen Ost. At the first roundabout, follow brown signs to Internationale Luftfahrtmuseum for the parking lot.

Baden-Württemberg: 78056 The private collection of an avid pilot. Schwenningen's Internationales I uftfahrtmuseum (closed Mon) is the fruit of a lifetime spent collecting and reconstructing aeronautical memorabilia. Among the collection are rebuilt versions of early World War I planes of the kind that the Red Baron, the German flying ace. once flew. But most of the aircraft are Cold War-era oddities, bought upon their decommissioning and flown here from around Europe Sadly, many were damaged by heavy hailstorms in 2002 and 2006

leaving smashed wings and broken windows Return to B27, then

turn on to B463 at Balinaen and continue northward, following signs for Haiaerloch. Turn riaht to park in small multi-story park in lower town center.



#### Maigerloch Baden-Württemberg: 72394

Pretty Haigerloch is draped around a ridge and surrounded by lush greenery where lilacs blossom in spring. It is a quiet town, and very remote, which is why, during World War II, an old beer cellar at the base of a cliff here became a secret atomic research laboratory. Today. the Atomkeller-Museum (Mav-Sep: open daily; Mar, Apr, Oct & Nov: open Sat & Sun) commemorates this research. At the time, atomic science was still in its infancy, but the threat of an atom bomb was taken so seriously by the occupying American forces that everything was methodically dismantled and destroyed, or shipped to the US. The whole site was to be blown up, but luckily, the priest from the 16th-century Gothic Schlosskirche (open daily), perched on the cliff above, begged for mercy. An explosion in the cave would have destroyed not only the cave, but much of Haigerloch. Fortunately, the Americans changed their minds once they saw the church's ornate Rococo decor and the impressive 1609 altar. The Renaissance Schloss Haigerloch



(1580) beside the church is now an attractive hotel restaurant and arts venue. On the opposite side of its courtyard, a short path leads along a cliff to a lookout with great views of the town. The steps up to the church and castle are found by turning right out of the Atomkeller and following the base of the cliff

From the parking lot, turn left in the direction of Rangendingen and continue towards the sian for Freilichtmuseum parkina lot.

#### Freilichtmuseum Hechingen-Stein

Baden-Württemberg: 72379 A fascinating open-air museum. Freilichtmuseum Hechingen-Stein

(Apr-May & Oct: closed Mon: Jun-Sept: open daily) preserves the ruins of a sizable Roman country estate. the result of a chance discovery during road construction. Between AD 1-3 this estate was of regional importance and a vital staging post for travelers passing through the area. Some key buildings have been reconstructed, while an ongoing archaeological excavation uncovers more foundations beyond the estate compound. Little is known about the estate - even its name is a mystery but it was certainly destroyed by Germanic tribes as they pushed the

Exit the parking lot and take the first riaht down Römerstrasse. Continue towards the B27 junction and drive south until brown sians for Burg Hohenzollern lead to the castle.

Romans out of southern Germany.



Turn right to parking lot at shuttle bus stop below Bura Hohenzollern.

#### Bura Hohenzollern Baden-Württemberg; 72379

Sitting on an isolated crag in a broad valley. Burg Hohenzollern (open daily) is one of Germany's finest fairy-tale castles. Yet its medievallooking battlements and towers are deceptive, since they were built between 1846 and 1867, albeit using the foundations of castles that have stood here since the 11th century. Only **St-Michael-Kapelle**, a chapel with ornate stained glass, survives in its original state. The castle still belongs to the Hohenzollern family, who reigned over a united Germany between 1871 and 1918 and the crown of German Emperor Wilhelm II is the pride of the castle treasury. Also among the family artifacts are several snuff boxes from the collection of Frederick the Great

With its pleasant atmosphere, Tübingen makes the best base along this drive. Local highways, particularly the A81, help speed up the return part of day trips to the southern portion of the route.

#### Caves and historic Ulm

Visit Schloss Lichtenstein 2 before heading to explore the caves at Laichingen 3. Tour Ulm 5 at a more relaxed pace with an ascent of the Münster spire and a visit to the art museum, Kunsthalle Weishaupt, as well as the Ulmer Museum.

Follow the tour to Ulm, but skip stop at Blaubeuren, Follow the B28 to A8 then to Ulm. Return via the A8 and B28.

#### Castle hopping

Treat yourself to three of Germany's finest castles – Schloss Lichtenstein 2, Schloss Sigmaringen 6, and Burg Hohenzollern 12 – in a day and enjoy scenic drives on minor

roads across the Swahian Alb

Follow the route to Schloss Lichtenstein and beyond to the B313, turn left to Gammertingen on to the B32. Turn left to Sigmaringen. Retrace the route,


follow the B32 to turn left on to the B463, and then left again to Bura Hohenzollern.

#### Scenic trail and chants

The walk around picturesque Blaubeuren 4 is a relaxed and scenic option. Next, follow the Danube to reach the imposing Kloster Beuron 7 to hear Gregorian chanting.

Follow the tour to Blaubeuren, take the B492, turn right at the B311, and right again on to the B32 via Sigmaringen to Beuron.


## Germany's Riviera

The giant Lake Constance (Bodensee) forms much of Germany's southwest border with Switzerland, which provides a spectacular Alpine backdrop. The lake's balmy, dry climate makes it perfect for lounging on beaches and for outdoor activities such as hiking. cycling on lakeside trails, swimming, and boating. The cosmopolitan hub of Konstanz has boat services to many points on the lake. Rich soils and a near-tropical climate have enabled Mainau to maintain one of Germany's most elaborate landscaped gardens, while Reichenau has specialized in market-gardening. The towns that line Bodensee's northern shore include the attractive, medieval Meersburg, which boasts the oldest castle in Germany. To the east, Friedrichshafen, once the hub for Zeppelin flights around the world, has a fine museum devoted to the airships. Further east, just over the Bayarian border, Lindau Island awaits with its charming half-timbered old town.

#### PLAN YOUR DRIVE

Start/finish. Konstanz to Lindau Island

Number of days: 2-3 days, allowing a day to explore the Bodensee Islands.

Distance: 56 miles (90 km)

Road conditions: Well-payed roads.

When to go: This drive is good year round, though in summer (June, July & August) traffic along the coastal roads can be heavy. Spring (April & May). when fruit trees are in bloom, is particularly attractive. Wine lovers should try to visit during fall (September & October) when many festivals are

Opening times: Most attractions open daily Shops are open from 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday and close early on Saturdays, Most shops and services are closed on Sundays Restaurants generally close around 10pm.

Main market days: Konstanz: Wed & Sat: Friedrichshafen: Tue, Fri & Sat.

#### **DAY TRIP OPTIONS**

A day can be spent exploring **historic** Konstanz and the nearby garden island of Mainau, with the option of **swimming** before heading back to Konstanz. The highlights of the north shore can be covered in a day and include **prehistoric** dwellings, a Baroque church, the fairy-tale town of Meersburg, and the intriguing Zeppelin Museum in Friedrichshafen, For full details, see p241.

#### WALKING AROUND KONSTANZ

The Rhine promenade begins at the Archäologisches Landesmuseum in Konstanz and joins a lakeside path that leads to the ferry terminal at Staad, and beyond to Mainau, from where boats return to Konstanz. This enables a oneway hike of around two hours, with a string of beaches to stop and swim along the way. Take bus No. 1 from the ferry terminal to get back to Konstanz.

#### Konstanz

Baden-Württemberg; 78462

The largest settlement on the Bodensee, Konstanz (Constance) avoided being bombed during World War II as it straddled the border of neutral Switzerland. As a result, its old town remains intact and is a reminder of the time when the town thrived as an imperial Free City. It became famous between 1414 and 1418 when the Council of Konstanz met here to restructure the Catholic Church. The town's picturesque lakefront is dotted with promenades and statues.

#### A two-hour walking tour

From the parking lot turn left down Fischmarkt and cross the main road. Konzilstrasse, to arrive at the lakefront. Here stands the Konzilgebäude (council building) (1), a conference and concert hall that began life as a granary and warehouse. Its name suggests that it probably served as a venue for the Council of Konstanz. Also linked to that era is the Imperia, a 30-ft (9-m) rotating statue of a woman at the end of the pier. It represents a courtesan in an Honoré de Balzac novel, who used her charms to manipulate the Catholic clergy during the Council. Back near the beginning of the pier, another statue commemorates Count Graf Ferdinand von Zeppelin (1838–1917), a pioneer of airships who was born in Konstanz. From here, the lakefront promenade passes a series of **old warehouses** (2).

which have been converted into a restaurant district beside a vacht harbor. At the end of the promenade lies the aquarium complex Sea Life (3) (open daily) Walk back and continue to the opposite end of the promenade cross the Stadtgarten to the Insel, an island which was long occupied by a Dominican priory that is today the Steigenberger Inselhotel. Cross the Konzilstrasse and turn right to a pedestrian underpass that resurfaces on the banks of the Rhine beside the Rheintorturm (4), a 15th-century defensive tower with a conical roof. The bridge over the Rhine leads to the Archäologisches Landesmuseum (5) or State Archaeology Museum (closed Mon). which is housed in a former convent.

Many of its finds are Roman, includ-

heads and sea leopards. Returning

ing 2nd-century bronzes of lion

and along the pedestrian underpass follow Konzilstrasse before turning right down Münsterplatz (6) which is surrounded by old townhouses from as far back as the 15th century. The nearby Münster (open daily) commands attention - built of local sandstone, the church has oak doors that are known for their carvings of New Testament scenes. Later additions include the Baroque high altar and the Neo-Gothic spires, which can be climbed for views.

From here, turn left

#### Jan Hus (1370-1415)

A Bohemian religious reformer, Jan Hus attacked ecclesiastical abuses and started the Hussite religious movement, which demanded a set of reforms that anticipated the Protestant Reformation, Hus was excommunicated in 1411, then invited to the Council of Konstanz in 1415 to explain his position. Instead he was incarcerated and placed on trial. He is believed to have stood in the central aisle of the Münster to hear the judgement which was that he should be burnt at the stake for heresy Later he became a figurehead for the Czechs

which becomes Hussenstrasse where the **Hus-Museum** (7) (closed Mon) occupies the house where the reformer Jan Hus staved prior to his imprisonment. This museum documents his life and ideologies through displays. Turn left from here, then right down Neugasse and left along Rosengartenstrasse. which leads to the

#### Rosgartenmuseum (8)

(closed Mon), the town's history museum. Its collection helps bring medieval Konstanz to life and includes the Chronicle of the Council of Konstanz, a richly illustrated book by Ulrich Richental, a local landowner. Turn right to Markstätte the commercial

hub of the town. Walk to the right along this and left down Brotlaube to return to the Fischmarkt parking lot.

From the parking lot, turn left and left again on to Konzilstrasse. Follow signs for Reichenan/B33, turning left to cross causeway to the island. There is a sign for the museum indicating the location of the parking lot.






#### Reichenau

#### Baden-Württemberg: 78479

Even though the causeway to the island of Reichenau is only 1 mile (2 km) long, the island's sense of remoteness, together with a perfect climate, encouraged Benedictines to found a monastery here in AD 724. One of Europe's centers of learning

> in the 10th century, it was famous for its library and scriptorium, where monks would produce manuscripts. Copies can be purchased in the Museum Reichenau (Apr-Oct: closed Mon; Jul & Aug: open daily, Nov–Mar: open Sat & Sun), which provides an introduction to the island's



#### Mainau

The thriving palm groves and flower gardens (open daily) of the island of Mainau are reminiscent of the Mediterranean but against an Alpine backdrop. The formal gardens here were planted in 1853 on the initiative of Grand Duke Friedrich Lof Baden and his current descendant. the Swedish Count Bernadotte. continues the tradition. In summer, the Italian Rose Garden blooms, while in fall, dahlias spring to life.

Return to Unterer Riedhaldeweg and turn left on to it. In Staad, turn left on to the B33 to the dock for the Staad-Meersburg ferry.

#### 4 Meersburg

#### Baden-Württemberg; 88709

Nestled between vineyards and with an atmospheric castle looming over its half-timbered pedestrian center, Meersburg is fairy-tale Germany come to life. From its main street, Unterstadstrasse, which runs parallel to the lakefront, Steigstrasse leads to the gates of the austere Altes Schloss (open daily). With foundations laid by Merovingian King Dagobert I in AD 628, this is Germany's oldest castle. The Prince-Bishops of Konstanz, who used it as a summer residence

#### Annette von Droste-Hülshoff (1797–1848)

Perhaps the greatest-ever German female poet, Annette von Droste-Hülshoff spent her later years in the Altes Schloss in Meersburg. The dank castle was the perfect muse for her tortured Romantic verses, but it was probably the cause of her death too, for she died of pneumonia here in 1848. Her flowery Biedermeier quarters have been well preserved and remain intact.



from 1268, were inspired to build a cheerful-looking palace in the 18th century. Baroque architect Balthasar Neumann built the pastelpink **Neues Schloss**, but this could only be enjoyed until secularization in 1802. It provides great views of the Bodensee.

☐ Turn left on to B31/Unteruhildingen, then on to Meersburger Strasse. In Unteruhildingen, turn right on to parking lot. Follow signs to the museum.

## 5 The Pfahlbauten Museum Baden-Württemberg: 88690

A reconstructed prehistoric hamlet, the Pfahlbauten Museum (closed Dec-Feb) features open-air recreations of Stone and Iron Age dwellings based on archaeological remains found here. These suggest that structures were built by driving huge stakes into the ground. The interiors provide a glimpse of what life was like here between 4000 and 850 BC.

☐ Turn right out of the parking lot towards Oberuhldingen and turn left for Birnau; park in Basilika's parking lot.

#### Basilika Birnau

#### Uhldingen-Mühlhofen; 88690

The Rococco **Basilika Birnau** (open Wed & Sun) was built between 1747–50 by a celebrity cast of designers, including architect Peter Thumb, sculptor Josef Anton Feuchtmayer, who crafted the altar, and fresco painter Gottfried Bernhard Göz. To the right of the main altar is a side altar dedicated to St. Bernard of Clairvaux, whose words were said to be sweet as honey, as depicted by the statue of a cherub who sucks a finger he has dipped in a beehive.

Return to Birnau and then take the B31 to Friedrichshafen.

Turn right on to Eckenerstrasse and park in the lot which is heside Seestrasse


#### Friedrichshafen

Baden-Württemberg: 88045

Although an industrial Bodensee town Friedrichshafen also has a lakeside promenade. At its eastern end is the 72-ft (22-m) high Moleturm tower. To the west, the **Zeppelindenkmal**. an obelisk, and the **Zeppelinbrunnen** fountain commemorate an aeronautical event. It was here on July 2, 1900 that Count Graf Ferdinand von Zeppelin launched his airships: within three decades, scheduled services began A Zeppelin Museum (May-Oct: open daily: Nov-Apr: closed Mon) celebrates this achievement. Although the Zeppelin's popularity declined after the 1937 Hindenburg disaster safer models have now been created. Trips on the Bodensee are run by the Deutsche-Zeppelin Reederei (www.zeppelinflug.de).

Turn right on to Eckenerstrasse. then aet on to the B31 toward Lindau. Follow signs to Langengraen, then past Wasserbura to Lindau. Turn right on to Langenweg, then cross the roundabout onto Chelles-Allee to take the causeway





to the island. At the roundabout, turn riaht on to Zwanziaerstrasse to park.

#### 8 Lindau Island

#### Ravaria: 88131

The old town of Lindau is crammed onto an island on the Rodensee The Mediterranean feel here stems from the influence of Italian merchants who converted the town into a trading hub in the Middle Ages. The town's Marktplatz is graced by Haus zum Cavazzen, a Baroque patrician mansion with witty murals. It houses the Stadtmuseum (Apr-Oct: closed Mon), which displays paintings with the family trees of the local nobility. From here, turn left along In der Grub to Schrannenplatz, where the 11thcentury Peterskirche contains the only surviving frescoes of painter Hans Holbein the Elder, Beside it, the **Diebsturm** or thieves tower once fortified the western limits of Lindau but later became a prison. Back on In der Grub, turn right on Schafgasse to Maximilianstrasse. Turn left along it and head to Reichsplatz, which leads to the old town hall, the Gothic Altes Rathaus. Its frescoes depict scenes from the imperial Diet held in 1496.

Frequent passenger ferries travel to Mainau from the dock at the southern end of the promenade in Konstanz.

#### Scenic north shore

Explore the prehistoric dwellings in the Pfahlbauten Museum (5)

before heading to the Basilika Birnau 6 and the attractive castle in Meersburg 4. Finally, visit the interesting Zeppelin Museum in Friedrichshafen 7.

Turn right on to the B33 and then take the Staad-Meersburg ferry to Meersburg. Then follow the tour from there on.





Road conditions: Roads are well surfaced but at times are steen and twisting. Ice and snow may be a problem in winter. There are some roads with brown "Deutsche Alpenstrasse" signs.

When to go: The best weather is from May to October, while December to Faster is ideal for winter sports

Opening times: Museums often close on Mondays, while shops remain closed on Sundays

Major festivals: Immenstadt: Viehscheid (the departure of the cows). Sept: Oberammergau: Oberammergauer Passionsspiele (passion play), May-Oct, every ten





The German Alps can be explored in a series of day trips. Lindau or Bad Hindelang are the best bases to explore the Allgäu, while Füssen and Oberammergau are ideal for experiencing the richest concentration of churches and palaces. For stunning lake and mountain scenery. Tegernsee or Bad Tolz are excellent bases, while the salt mining history and Nazi associations of Berchtesgadener Land are easily explored from Berchtesgaden or Bad Reichenhall, For full details, see p253.

Bavaria: 88131

Occupying an island off the north shore of Lake Constance, the lake resort of Lindau prospered in the Middle Ages owing to its trade links with Italy across the Alps. The town's architectural legacy is a reminder of its early prosperity, and with its café-lined waterfront and breathtaking backdrop of the snow-capped Alps Lindau is a delight to visit

#### A two-hour walking tour

Park in the parking lot and cross the footbridge over the railroad tracks to the main railway station. Continue past the station to the **Hafen** ①, or harbor, which is dominated by a mid-

19th-century lighthouse and the statue of the Bavarian Lion, the symbol of Lindau Pause here for cake or ice cream or simply to admire the lovely panorama of the Austrian and Swiss Alps. On the landward side of the harbor is the 13th-century Mangturm (2), a former lighthouse whose

campanile-like architecture is a reminder of the town's Italian links Continue along the waterfront, bearing left into Reichsplatz, which features the Lindavia Fountain and the step-gabled old town hall, the Altes Rathaus (3). Built between 1422 and 1436, it served as the venue of an imperial Diet or Reichstag in 1496. Turn right along Ludwigstrasse, at the

end of which lies the town's Theater 4) housed in a 700-year-old former church of the Minorite order. Continue past it into Fischergasse, where a half-timbered passageway between No. 19 and No. 21 leads to the

Gerberschanze (5) a fragment of the old town wall Return to Fischergasse, then turn right to reach the Heidenmauer (6), another surviving part of the town wall. Turn left into Schmiedgasse to the Marktplatz, which is dominated by two churches the Protestant parish

### Immenstadt

#### Bavaria: 87509

To the east of Immenstadt town lies the **Grosse Alpsee**, the Allgäu's largest natural lake. Popular in summer for water sports, visitors can rent pedal boats, rowing boats, sailing dinghies, or try windsurfing (www.immenstadt. de) here. To the west lies Germany's longest summer toboggan run, the

Alpsee Bergwelt Sommerrodelbahn (Apr-Nov: open daily: Dec-Mar: open Fri-Sun; www.alpsee-bergwelt.de).

#### The Viehscheid

Immenstadt's famous cheese is made with the milk produced by cows that graze the Alpine meadows above the town in summer. At the end of the season, in September, some 1.000 cows are brought down during the festival known as the Viehscheid. The herdsmen wear traditional folk dress, including Lederhosen.

Continue alona Sonthofener Strasse, Follow the B19/B308 to Sonthofen where the R308 leads to Bad Hindelana, Stay on the B308 to Reute. Park on the left next to the R308



#### 4 Nesselwang

#### Bavaria: 87484

Set amid meadows at the foot of the 5 167-ft (1 575-m) Alpspitze the village of Nesselwang is a center for activity holidays, such as mountain biking and canyoning in summer and skiing in winter (tourist office; Lindenstrasse 16, 08361 92 30 40). In 2003. Nesselwang opened Bayaria's first Nordic Walking Park, which is part of a 261-mile (420-km) network stretching into neighboring districts. In winter, the Alpspitzbahn gondola serves the Alpspitze's mostly blue ski runs, which are generally for beginners. There's even floodlit evening skiing on the lower slopes. The village clusters around the imposing church of St. Andreas, which was rebuilt in a Neo-Baroque style between 1904 and 1906 after falling into disrepair.

Continue along the B309/Fussener Strasse, which becomes the B310/Pfrontener Strasse just before Pfronten. Continue on the B310 to Füssen. Park in one of the well-marked underground parking lots close to the tourist office and the old town.

#### Füssen

#### Bavaria; 87629

The main urban center for southeastern Allgäu, Füssen is a charming town with an enchanting setting of lakes and mountains. The old town, or Altstadt, is dominated by the **Hohe Schloss**, a former summer palace of Augsburg's bishops, which houses two **art galleries** (Apr–Oct: closed Mon; Nov–Mar: open Fri–Sun). Also worth visiting are the former Benedictine monastery of **Kloster St. Mang** and the **Heilig Geist Spitalkirche**, or the Church of the Holy Ghost.

☐ Continue along Sebastianstrasse, then take the B17 to Steingaden.

#### Schloss Neuschwanstein

A visit to "Mad" King Ludwig II's (see p207) castle of Neuschwanstein (open daily) is worth a detour off the Alpenstrasse route. Perched on a crag above Hohenschwangau, the castle was inspired by Wagner's operas and only completed in 1884. To reach Hohenschwangau look out for the brown "Königsschlösser" signs along the B17.





In Steingaden, turn right and at the next iunction turn right again to Wies/ Wieskirche, There is paid parking close to the church.

#### Wieskirche Bavaria: 86989

About 3 miles (5 km) from Steingaden, in the district of Pfaffenwinkel (priest's corner), lies the dazzling Rococo Wieskirche, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, Completed in 1754 by German architect Dominikus Zimmermann, this spectacular church is a masterpiece of 18th-century southern German architecture

Return to last junction, head east, and pass Schwaig. Turn right on to the B23 for Oberammeraau. There is free parking near the tourist office.

#### Oberammergau's Passion Play

Performed in the last year of each decade - the next is due in 2020 the Passion Play has its origins in a promise made by the villagers in 1633 during the Thirty Years' War. They pledged to perform a play about the life of Christ if God would spare them from the plague that was ravaging the surrounding district. The play is still performed by locals on an open-air stage in the town. During the years when the play is not being performed, it is still possible to tour the Passionstheater.

#### Oberammergau Bavaria: 82487

Renowned worldwide for its Passion Play, Oberammergau is also worth a visit for its lovely setting in the Ammergau Alps, its strong tradition of handicrafts and woodcarving, and its southern German charm. The town's houses are decorated with some of the best Lüftmalerei work

in Bavaria, most notably on the 18th-century **Pilatushaus** (open daily) whose astonishing frescoes are the work of Franz Seraph Zwink (1748–92)

☐ Continue on the B23 to Ettal. There is free parking in front of Kloster Ettal.

#### 8 Fttal

#### Ravaria: 82488

Ettal, about 3 miles (4 km) from Oberammergau, was founded by Ludwig IV of Bavaria. It is best known for the Benedictine monastery of Kloster Ettal, one of the most grand of Bavaria's Baroque abbevs. The domed abbey church (open daily) assumed its present form between 1744 and 1753. when architect Joseph Schmuzer was commissioned to complete the firedamaged church. The interior is decorated with Rococo stuccowork.

☐ Turn left from the western end of Ettal. Get on to Linderhof Strasse to Linderhof. Follow signs to park.

#### Schloss Linderhof Bavaria: 82488

In the early 1850s, Linderhof was bought by the Bavarian King Maximilian II. This mountain district appealed to his young heir, who later went on to become "Mad" King Ludwig and was responsible for Schloss Linderhof (open daily). Set in terraced gardens, between Ettal and the Austrian border, Schloss Linderhof was originally built by Ludwig II as a hunting lodge for his father. It was transformed into its current Neo-Rococo appearance by Georg Dollmann between 1870 and 1872.

Return to Ettal, turn right along the B23, then right at Oberau to get on the B2 for Garmisch-Partenkirchen. Look out for signs for parking lots in Garmisch and in Partenkirchen.

#### Garmisch-Partenkirchen Bavaria: 82467

Facing each other across the narrow Partnacher stream in the shadow of Germany's highest mountain, the 9.718-ft (2.962-m) **Zugspitze**, the twin towns of Garmisch and Partenkirchen together comprise Germany's bestknown ski resort. The towns were amalgamated at the time of the 1936 Winter Olympics but still have quite distinct characters: Garmisch is cosmopolitan, while Partenkirchen preserves its old-fashioned Alpine charm. In Partenkirchen, composer Richard Strauss's villa (closed Sat &

Sun) is now a small museum.

Continue along the B2 to Krün, turn left on to the B11 for Walchensee. Park at marked parking lots along the route.

#### Winter Sports

The towering Zugspitze provides a spectacular backdrop for Garmisch-Partenkirchen's pistes, which include Germany's only glacier skiing and the fearsome Kandahar Run, used for World Championship downhill races. The Zugspitze offers 14 miles (22 km) of high-altitude skiing at a height of almost 9,843 ft (3,000 m); for beginners, runs are graded blue (www.zugspitze.de). Due to the altitude of its pistes, the ski season here is a long one, beginning in November and continuing through to May.

## **Walchensee**

#### Bavaria: 82432

Surrounded by impressive mountains, Walchensee lies 2.631 ft (802 m) above sea level and is among Bavaria's most beautiful lakes. Despite its scenic grandeur, it remains relatively undiscovered. In summer the lake offers everything from angling and swimming to windsurfing, and sailing. Enjoy an excursion in the Herzogstandbahn cable car (Am Tanneneck 6 82432) www.herzoastand.kochel.de; open dailv). which goes from the north end of Walchensee village to the top of the 5.679-ft (1.731-m) Herzogstand offering breathtaking panoramas of the surrounding landscape.

Take the B11 to Kochel am See. Park at the well-marked parking lots at the lake, city or museum.

#### Kochel am See Bavaria: 82431

To the north of Walchensee lies Kochel am See. The town is closely associated with artist Franz Marc (1880-1916), who, in the years before World War I, was a leading member of the Munich-based Blauer Reiter group of Expressionist painters. A villa overlooking the lake now houses the Franz Marc Museum (closed Mon), which displays about 200 of the artist's works.

Continue along the B11 to Benediktbeuern. The abbey is well marked and provides parking space.

## Benediktbeuern

#### Bavaria: 83671

Visible from a distance, the Bavarian onion-domed towers of the basilica of Benediktbeuern rise above an abbey complex of considerable size and

splendor. Founded around AD 725. the Benedictine abbey was rebuilt in Baroque style after 1669 and secularized in 1803; it is now home to the Salesians Don Boscos, a Roman Catholic order.

☐ Continue along the B11, bypassing Brichl, and turn right on to the B472 for Bad Tölz. Park in a riverside parkina lots or on-street in the spa auarter (Kurzone) close to the tourist office.

# Bad Tölz

# Bavaria: 83646

The town of Bad Tölz straddles the Isar river with a leafy spa quarter on the west bank facing an attractive, hilly old town The main street Marktstrasse owes its present appearance to the Munich architect Gabriel von Seidl. who in the early 20th century re-emphasized the street's Alpine character. To the south of Marktstrasse is the **Gries**, a quaint artisans' quarter.

☐ Take the B13/Lenggrieser Strasse. At Sylvensteinsee reservoir, turn left on to the B307 and continue to Teaernsee, Park at the marked parking lot in Strandbad and Ortsmitte.

# 1 Tegernsee Bavaria: 83684

Crystal-clear Tegernsee is framed by wooded hills and mountains rising from its southern shore toward the Austrian border. It is among the most chic of Bavaria's mountain lakes, with a sprinkling of resorts along its shores, and has a reputation as an upmarket destination. The lake acts as a scenic backdrop to a range of activities, from mountain biking to paragliding.

☐ Take the B307/Münchner Strasse. At Am See, turn right to Hausham, then right again to the level crossing. Turn riaht on to the B307 for Schliersee. Park along the route on marked lots.

# 1 Schliersee Ravaria: 83727

Modest in size and appearance in comparison to Tegernsee, Schliersee shares the same lovely mountain backdrop. The lake-

Ravaria: 83735

Nestled at the foot of the 6.030-ft (1.838-m) Wendelstein is the rustic village of Bayrischzell. Wendelstein can be ascended by cable car (open daily: departures hourly: www.wendel steinbahn.de) from Osterhofen just west of the village, or by old-fashioned cog railway from Brannenburg in the northeast. To the east of the village lies the **Sudelfeld**, Germany's largest contiguous ski complex. It has 21 lifts and 19 miles (31 km) of red (intermediate) and blue (easy) pistes, though there are some black (advanced) runs, too (www.sudelfeld.de).

☐ Continue on the B307/Alpenstrasse and pass Oberaudorf to Niederaudorf. Turn left to Brannenbera alona Rosenheimer Strasse. At Brannenberg, turn right on to Nussdorfer Strasse to Neubeuern. Turn right to Frasdorf and get on to the Rosenheimer Strasse to reach Aschau im Chiemaau. Park at the parking lot near the tourist office.

There's a garden with an outdoor pool. a spa, and a sauna. The menu of the hotel's restaurant offers Leberkäs (a form of meatloaf) and more elaborate fare such as fillet steak with truffles. # Aschau im Chiemgau Ravaria: 83229

This village is dominated by **Schloss** Hohenaschau (auided tours: Tue-Fri. Sun & public hols), an 800-year old fortress remodeled during the Renaissance It now houses the **Priental Museum** which explores the history of the iron industry in the Prien Valley and is the venue for falconry displays (Apr-Oct: closed Mon: mid-Jul-Aua: onen daily). Nearby, the Kampenwandbahn gondola ascends the 5.476-ft (1.669-m) mountain, giving access to ski runs in winter and hiking trails in summer (tourist office: Kampenwandstrasse 38: 08052 90 49 37).

□ Take Bernauer Strasse, At Bernau. turn left for the B305. Cross the A8 and take Priener Strasse to the nearest town, Prien, Park in the marked parking lot in the town or at the harbor.

# (Chiemsee

### Bavaria: 83209

The blue waters of Bavaria's largest lake, the Chiemsee, are a paradise for vachtsmen in the summer months (Chiemsee Yachtschule: 08051 17 40: www.dhh.de) Take a ferry to the lake's islands. Herreninsel and Fraueninsel. The former is the site of the **Schloss** Herrenchiemsee (open daily), which was King Ludwig II's attempt to recreate Versailles. The castle is modeled after the original museum and is devoted to the life of Ludwig II.

From Prien, return to Bernau. Continue on the B305 to Reit im Winkl. Follow signs to a parking lot.

# Reit im Winkl

# Bavaria: 83242

Situated in a broad valley surrounded by mountains, Reit im Winkl is a charming Alpine town with chaletstyle architecture and one of the



best snow records of any German ski resort. Skiing was introduced to the area in the 19th century by foresters and Norwegian students; the Skimuseum (open Tue, Wed & Fri) documents the story in detail.

☐ Take the B305/Weitseestrasse to Waich, turn left on to Seehauserstrasse for Ruhpoldina, In Ruhpoldina, follow the parkina lot routina system.

# Ruhpolding Bavaria: 83324

Ruhpolding is the perfect spot to ascend in a cable car to the 5.485-ft (1,672-m) Rauschberg, which offers a panorama of 600 Alpine peaks. The town boasts 99 miles (160 km) of cross-country ski runs. South of the town is the Holzknechtmuseum (May-Oct: closed Mon: Jan-Mar: open Wed: public hols) with exhibits relating to the area's woodwork tradition.

Return to the B305, turn left to Schneitzelreuth, then left again on to the B21 for Bad Reichenhall, Park at marked parking lots in the town or at Alte Saline.

# Bad Reichenhall Bavaria: 83435

A conservative German spa town. Bad Reichenhall is somewhat medicinal. The main focus of the town is the Kurpark, fringed by buildings such as the Gradierhaus, an outdoor saline inhaler originally intended to reproduce the health benefits of sea air. On the south side of the town is the former royal salt works, the **Alte Saline** (May–Oct: open

daily: Nov-Apr: open Tue-Fri & Ist Sun:



www.alte-saline-bad-reichenhall.de), with brine springs and a tunnel system.

Return on the B21 to Unteriettenberg, turn left on to the B305 for Berchtesaaden, Park in the parking lot at Kur-und Kongresshaus.

# Berchtesgaden Bavaria: 83471

Berchtesgaden was once an independent Prince-Rishonric living off the proceeds of the **Salzbergwerk**. or salt mine (Berawerkstrasse 83, 83471: open daily: www.salzzeitreise.de). The village has the atmosphere of a miniature capital city, notably on Schlossplatz, which is dominated by the Stiftskirche and the facade of the Könialiches Schloss (mid-Mav-mid-Oct: open Sun-Fri; mid-Oct-mid-Mav; open Mon–Fri), a former bishops' palace that now belongs to the Bavarian royal family, the Wittelsbachs.

Continue on the Salzberastrasse, up the steep ascent to Obersalzbera, Park at the Dokumentation Obersalzbera.



# Obersalzberg Bavaria: 83471

A favorite holiday retreat of highranking Nazis, the mountain village of Obersalzberg is home to the

Dokumentation Obersalzberg (Apr-Oct: open daily; Nov–Mar: closed Mon). This museum occupies the site of Adolf Hitler's former mountain home and documents the rise, fall, and crimes of the Nazis. It ends with a visit to the warren of tunnels in which the Nazis planned to make their last stand. In summer, buses depart from the adjacent terminal for the ascent to the Kehlsteinhaus, or Eagle's Nest, the dictator's mountain-top tea room.

🖪 Return to Berchtesgaden. Turn left on to the B305, then left at the roundabout on to the B20 to Schönau am Köniasee. Park away from the lake and complete the journey on foot.

# 25 Schönau am Königsee Bavaria: 83471

Around 2 miles (4 km) south of Berchtesgaden lies Schönau am Köniasee, which is home to the 5-mile (8-km) long fjord-like lake. Königsee. The lake lies in the shadow of the 8.901-ft (2.713-m) Watzmann at the eastern limit of the Deutsche Alpenstrasse. The chapel of St. Bartholomä. which stands at the foot of the mountain, can only be reached by boat.
