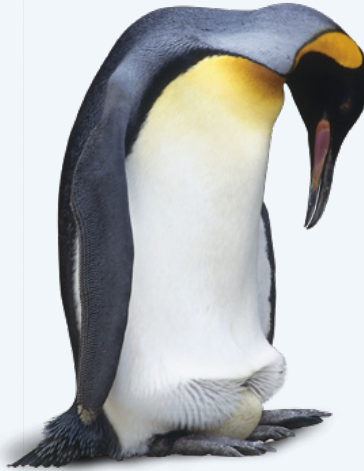

Brand-new coat

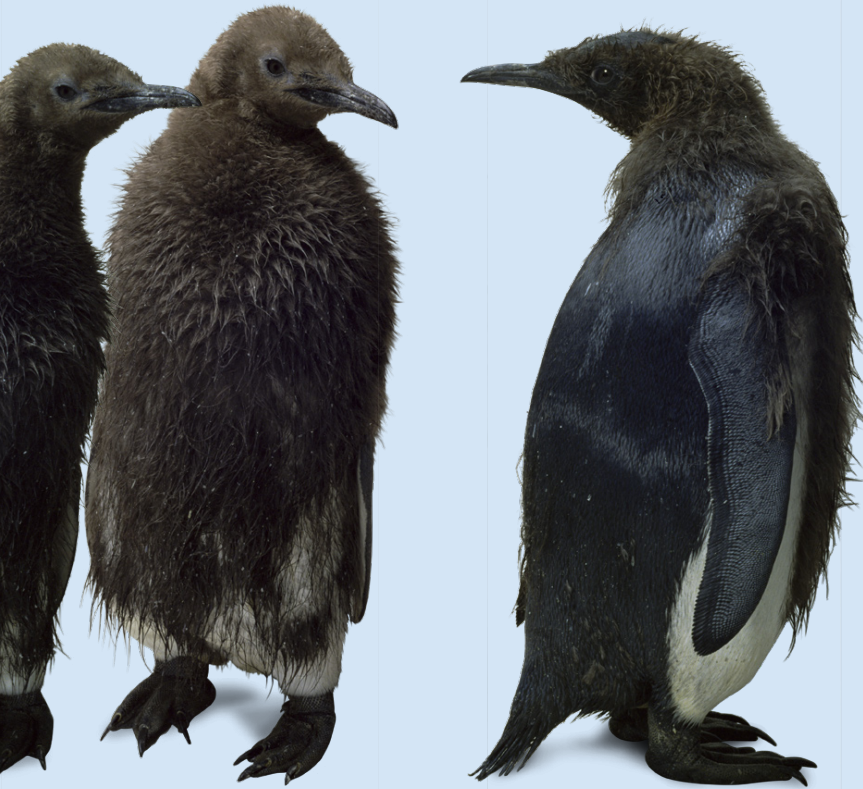


My coat is changing.

Eight months old



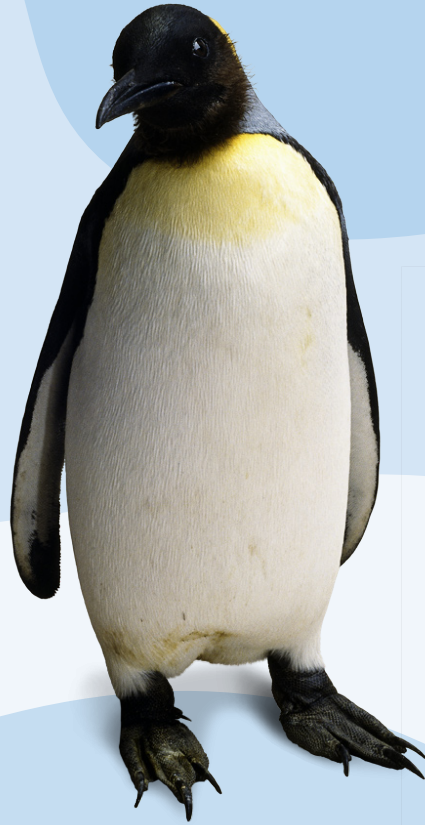
