“That’s my shoe.”

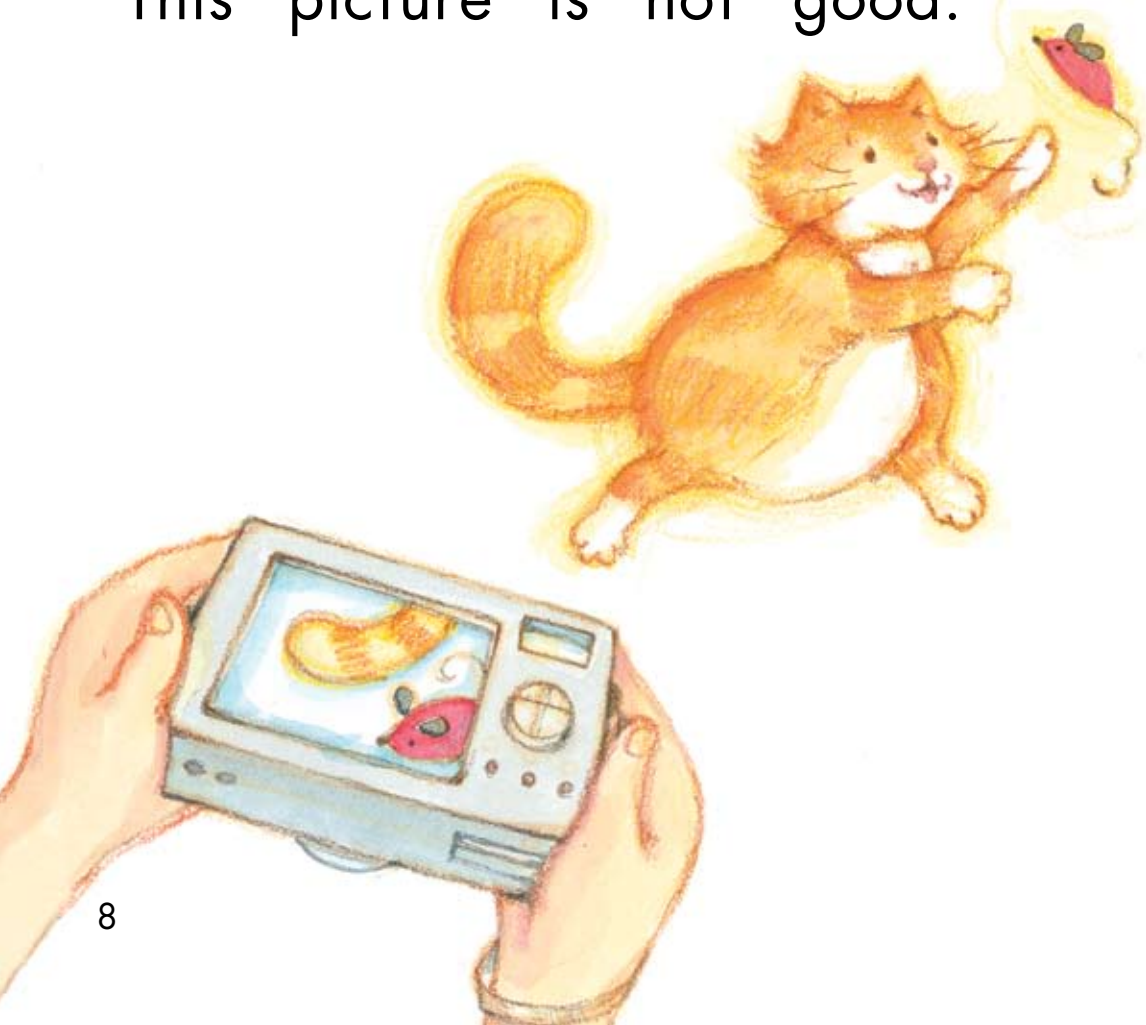
Click!
